

### moderate cost housing proposal continued

A request submitted by Al Duncan for a Specific Amendment to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan that, if approved, would have been the first large multi-family moderate cost housing development on the Island, was continued by the City Council until such time as guidelines for low income units are established.

Duncan had proposed to build a 12unit complex behind his restaurant (Scotty's) on Periwinkle Way to house "employees of the adjacent commercial areas."

In his introductory remarks Duncan told the Council he "felt more confident about the economics of the project" and that he would not apply for a development permit unless he was sure he could rent the individual units for under \$300 a month. "I don't feel," he said. "that rental above that constitutes moderate cost housing."

Councilmembers Francis Bailey and Zee Butler urged Duncan to wait until after moderate cost housing guidelines had been established by the City to assure that the units would not later be put on the open market. Butler said she was "in the process of drafting guidelines," but they would have to go before the housing committee, the Planning Commission, and the City Council before they could be approved.

Butler called Duncan's proposal "A little premature," but assured him that she too felt that "time is of the essence," and the low income rental guidelines were being considered her "top priority."

Mayor Duane White had other concerns with Duncan's proposal.

"This gives me a big problem," he said. "When somebody comes in with a piece of property that is already overdeveloped and is wetlands. . . there's no way I'm going to sit here and vote for something that punches holes in the land use plan." Duncan's response was, "You can find objections where ever you want to."

Duncan told the Council, "If this is going to drag on for a year I'd rather bow out and let somebody else do it." He did however, agree to a continuation on his Amendment request until the guidelines were more secure.

Sanibel taxpayers are going to be footing the legal bill for expenses incurred by City Councilmembers Zee Butler and Porter Goss during their fight to clear their names before the

Florida State Ethics Commission.

city to reimburse butler, goss

State legislation provides that public officials found innocent of malicious or frivolous complaints or have had charges dismissed against them may counterfile against their accuser for reimbursement of costs incurred. According to Lawrence Gonzalez, Director of the Ethics Commission, five such petitions have been received

by the Commission for reimbursement but thus far a ruling of "malicious intent," which is necessary to levy reimbursement, has never been made.

Butler and Goss, who had conflict of interest charges brought against them by former Assistant City Manager Steve Maxwell, have had charges against them dropped, but at a special Commission meeting in Miami several days ago the Commissioners voted 4 to 2 against levying reimbursement fees against Maxwell.

At last week's City Council meeting Butler and Goss requested the City bear the burden of their \$9,036 in expenses, and the Council voted unanimously to do so. At that meeting Butler voiced her disappointment in the Commission's decision not to find Maxwell guilty of "malicious intent" and reimburse her and Goss' expenses, one-third of which were incurred by counter-filing against Maxwell. "It's unfortunate that a precedent hasn't been set," she said. "I don't feel they're (the Commission) following their own rules. . . I feel very strongly that a person who brings charges like this should be accountable for his actions."

Butler said that she did not intend to pursue legal remedy through the courts because the expense of such action would be hers to bear and also becaus she didn't want to give Maxwell "additional publicity." She did, however, say that she intended to pursue the issue "through the Legislature." Maxwell, who was seated in the front row at the Council meeting, called Butler's remarks "inappropriate," and told the Council, "The issue is over."

### energy ordinance adopted

an Ordinance amending Appendix "J" of the Standard Building Code which governs energy conservation in new construction was unanimously adop-

Essentially, five new energy saving regulations have been mandated by adoption of the Ordinance. All structures with a heated or cooled area of 750 square feet or more must now be "constructed so as to provide the required thermal performance of the various components." All water shower facilities will be required to have a flow control device which permits "a maximum of three gallons

At last week's City Council meeting per minute, except for safety considerations." and all hot water pipes are now required to be insulated. The new Ordinance also mandates electrical ventilating and air conditioning equipment systems to have a minimum EER rating of 7.2. The new Ordinance also prohibits the heating of swimming pools with gas, oil, or electricity, except for medical reasons and allows for overhangs, and tinted, filmed, or glazed glass to be incorporated in calculating the allowable percentage of permitted glass in structure.

> The new Ordinance is applicable only to new construction in the City.

### council adopts causeway bond resolution

special meeting vesterday morning to adopt a resolution approving the sale of Causeway revenue bonds and to discuss the implementation of proposed road improvements.

At the regular council meeting July 3, the City learned that only one bid had been received for road improvements outlined in the comprehensive land use plan. The bid of \$586,910.65 submitted by the company of Howard, Needles. Tammen and Bergendoff, would go for the resurfacing of San Carlos Bay Dr., Captain's Walk, Schiff Rd., Donax St., and Schooner Rd., and for improvements suggested in the circulation element to the Tarpon Bay -Palm Ridge - San-Cap intersection, Donax-Periwinkle intersection, Periwinkle-Palm Ridge intersection, and the Periwinkle-Causeway Rd. intersection.

According to Assistant Manager Gary Price, the proposed improvements would eliminate the first four of the seven short-term priorities listed in the land use plan. The contractors estimated that it wuld take about two weeks to get the project

The Sanibel City Council held a underway and the proposed completion date was set for November 15.



### beach story not designed to malign Beach

The ISLANDER has received a request from some Beach residents requesting an "Editorial Apology" for a story done when Patti Horn, a popular waitress on Sanibel, was killed. (See page 5) Reporter Pat Harmel visited the Beach and described some of the places she observed in "Fort Myers Beach - a Personal Odyssey." The story was

assigned and written to delve into how someone as highly thought of as Patricia Horn could have suffered such a terrible fate and to bring to light what we felt was, at the time, a lack of intensity in the investigation of her murder. During subsequent weeks, we have worked closely with Pat Horn's friends and the Lee County Sheriff's Office in their attempt to isolate the

murderer. The Sheriff's Office also added Sgt. Tom Wallace, their number one homicide investigator, to the case, shortly before they charged Frank Shoemaker with Patti Horn's murder.

We did not intend to malign or insult the Beach. We did intend to bring whatever power we could to isolate the individual who delivered that final insult of Pat Horn by depriving her of

her life. We also hoped that by so doing we might set in motion some action that would alter the atmosphere that contributed to her murder. If those who objected to the article can ally themselves with the numerous people from Fort Myers Beach who saw it for what it was designed to be, then we will feel that we have rendered a service to both island communities.

(of all people!) by the Clerk of the House of Representatives. It charts a seven-way split of executive power that involves forty departments and agencies and would make a Chinese puzzle seem simple by comparison.

The greatest number of governmental units under one head are the thirteen reporting only to the Governor. Next comes twelve units each of which is ruled only by one of the six Cabinet members. Third ranking goes to the nine units that report to the Governor and the six Cabinet members as a body. Trailing that group are the three so-called "Independent Agencies" two of which are under the wing of the Governor and the other is under the joint command of the Governor and the six-man Cabinet. Off in left field are: The lone Office of Executive Clemency under the Governor and three unspecified Cabinet members sitting "en bloc;" the individual Board of Administration presided over and composed of the Governor, the State Treasurer, and the State Comptroller: and finally-the-well-publicized fiveman Public Service Commission that is actually an arm of the Legislature whose members are not selected by the Governor rather than elected by the

With a line up such as the above, is it any wonder why it might be more difficult for one branch of government to dominate the others than such a feat would be on Sanibel?

Captain Paul Munch, coordinator of the Army Corps of Engineers general permit hearings on Sanibel, announced last week that Col. James Adams of the Corps has signed a public notice on the proposed general permit for development in Sanibel's interior wetlands.

There will be a 30-day comment period in which Sanibel residents can express their opinions on the proposal or request a public hearing. At the end of the comment period Col. Adams can either approve or deny the permit, or, if he feels necessary, call for a public hearing.


The General Permit should not be less restrictive than the Sanibel Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Any changes in the CLUP should, be reported to the USACE.





### specific amendments to be heard aug. 7

Changes made in building plans after they have already been approved by the City are not looked upon kindly by City officials charged with enforcement of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. When two such changes came before the Planning Commission two weeks ago in an attempt to obtain Specific Amendments that would permit the already committed violations the Commissioners decided they had very few options and recommended approval of the Amendments to City Council. But when the requests came before City Council last week they decided to create options for themselves and refused to into compliance before the second take the blame for a contractor's noncompliance with setbacks mandated by the land use plan.

Robert Leonard Jr. appeared before the Council to request permission for encroachments upon both the front yard setback line and the mandatory setback from an open body of water. Leonard's home, located in Sanibel Isles, is nearly completed although he admits the encroachments were discovered while the house was still in the framing stage.

Leonard maintains that he originally changed the plans to avoid an encroachment, and when he elevated the platform house higher than had originally been approved he discovered that the staircase configuration would have to be changed in order to provide more steps, thus creating another encroachment. Leonard said his architect was not familiar with Sanibel regulations and had never been told during the approval process that he had to "build at any one height." He had raised the height of the home, he said, based mainly on information gained from newspapers during the Federal Flood Insurance regulation hearings.

Mayor Duane White questioned why the encroachments had not been caught sooner in the inspection process, but was told by City Manager Bill Nungester that setbacks are not measured during inspections. White maintained that if Leonard had made "unauthorized changes" then he should have to "take the consequences."

Councilmember Zee Butler said she had "a problem" with Leonard's request because he "knowingly violated our setbacks and now he wants us to approve it."

Councilman Francis Bailey, however, did not totally agree. Bailey said Leonard should not be "punished" for trying to comply with Island rules governing flood elevations.

Butler asked Leonard what would

happen if the Council refused his request. He responded that it would be "a great expense now to change the configuration. . . and no matter which way I go I'll be encroaching on a setback.'

Island resident Paul Howe objected to "financial reasons" being used as an excuse for plan violation. Calling Leonard's predicament "a self-'inflicted wound," Howe urged the Council to not let "dollars or aesthetics stand in the way" of plan enforcement.

Mayor Duane White asked Leonard to "demonstrate" that he had done "everything he possibly could" to come hearing on his Amendment request.

Zee Butler agreed, saying, "I think it's home into plan compliance. unfortunate and in some ways I feel sorry for you. . . But if I were to vote today I'd turn it down."






Deterioration of the original Thistle



## on the water by mike fuery



The most innocent looking fish can be somewhat dangerous to a fisherman, even a snook.

This week I'm doing this report with four good fingers and a thumb on the left hand and only three workable fingers and a thumb on the right. The

reason is that a "dead" snook shook his head the same time I reached into the fish box to lift out the newly landed fish. The result was a deep, slashing cut on a finger and another hard-learned lesson in the handling of fish.

As most snook fishermen will tell

you, these fish don't have teeth. People new to snook fishing usually can't believe this because big, strong game fish are supposed to have a set of real grinders. But, the snook has strong, abrasive jaws that crush and kill live

So, when you are snook fishing, why do you get a good one on and then fight it for a couple minutes only to have it "break" your line? The answer is that the gill cover plates on the rear of its mouth are sharp enough to cut leaders, or fingers.

This is one of the main reasons why successful snook anglers always use strong leader material. Many times fishermen will use a leader which is double the strength of the main fishing line. If you have only 12-pound line on the reel, I would suggest lots more strenth than 20 to 30-pound leaders, however. I use 30 and 40-pound leader mono line. I've never known of anyone to use wire or braided wire leader on snook with any success. The fish have a bit harder time seeing mono and any advantage you can get on these fish will make life for the snook fisherman easier.

Snook can also give you a real bad cut with their gills as you fillet them at the end of your fishing time. I guess that wearing a good set of gloves would solve the entire problem, but most of us only think of that after we've gotten the cut from that gill cover.

Tarpon fishing is still fairly good up

in Boca Grande Pass. The tarpon never seemed to get going off Sanibel's southern shore this year. I often see 50pounders rolling around all the passes, but these scattered fish are difficult to entice over to a bait. Your best bet for hooking into a big tarpon is up in Boca Grande.

Last month I was fishing with from 20 to 40 boats per day, but now that the grand old Gasparilla Inn Hotel has closed on the island, many of the fishermen have gone home for the season

This means that you can get up there and chase a couple without battling boat traffic too. So far this year, my boat has been hit twice by other boaters, so you can see that I'm really happy when the crowd thins out.

Best tarpon bait is the little pass crab during the early part of the day and squirrel fish in the later morning and afternoon. Last week, we hooked up with one on a pigfish, which is lots cheaper to buy than the 9-12 dollar a dozen squirrels.

The shortage of gas wasn't such a big factor on the Independence Day Weekend, so perhaps the summer will be easier on boaters than what we first expected.

Be careful out there on the weekend and remember the law requires you to have a new state registration sticker on your boat effective July 1.

### islander angling . . .

Snook and trout are providing the most fishing action this week. Snook are again, biting off the beaches and trout are showing up on the Gulf side and in the usual bay flats.

'Tween Waters Marina reports snook off the Captiva beaches and in Captiva Pass at night. Brook trout are hitting well out on the sandbars in the Gulf. 'Tween Waters' Randy Bending has had good luck with trout, fishing with small grunts and pinfish at Johnson Shoals. Bending's biggest trout was a 6 ½ pounder. The surf is also providing some good catches of triple tail. Tarpon fishing has been slow.

The beach south of Blind Pass is a good spot in the morning for snook, according to Blind Pass Marina. Whiting and triple tail are also being caught off the beach. Blind Pass also reports trout in the grass flats.

The grassflats in Tarpon Bay and near the Causeway are yielding trout, according to Tarpon Bay Marina. One of their guides. Alex Payne found some 15-17 pound triple tails out in the Gulf. and Tarpon Bay also report snook catches at night and early morning surf fishing off Lighthouse Point.

The marker buoys and crab pots out in the Gulf are good spots to fish for triple tails, according to Sanibel Marina. Cobia are around the Causeway, black tip shark are scattered around, and trout are being caught both in the sound and the Gulf. And finally, a visitor to the Island took an unusual trip to the artificial reefs at San Carlos Pass and came back with a good catch of grouper.



David Potter of Olmey, Illinois pulled in a 57 pound cobia during the sixth week of the Derby. The catch won him a week at the Sundial.



supervised by Pete Pavel, assisted by Bill Thomas.



# shelling tips

Sometimes things that aren't shells add a great deal of interest to a shell collection. Drift wood and coral, of course are great background items, but the best displays often have a couple of crabs, long since dead and preserved. You can find good crab specimens too, so this week let's talk about where and what to look for.

At this time of the year, shellers often encounter large blue crabs in the water. People I take out on charters often ask me if it's safe to be in the water looking for shells while there is a blue crab near them. There's not much danger of getting pinched by a crab, but don't crowd those little fellas or try to pick them up and you're okay.

On occasion you will come upon a dead blue crab on the high tide line. If you are lucky, it could be already cleaned out and ready to add to your collection as is, but more often you'll have to carefully remove any of the meat in the shell before you can display it. You can usually pry up the main body shell of the crabs you will find here and scoop out the meat.

One of my favorite crabs found on the Sanibel and Captiva Island beaches is the sand crab. You probably have seen large holes in the sand where these crabs live. They are very shy, and fast if you try to catch one. However, as all things, they die and again if you can

find a clean, dead one, you have another interesting aspect added to your collection.

There is a colorful crab called the calico that often washes up dead on our beaches. The dotted shells is a favorite of collectors doing shell lamps, that is shells displayed on the inside of a glass lamp base. A small, perfect stone crab is a valued "shell." too.

Even the little fiddler crabs and the lowly spider crabs can be an addition to your shells.


As for where to find crab shells, look high up on the beach where the highest water has been. There's where light crab shells sometimes gather.

In another shelling tip, it seems that

sand dollars are about everywhere along the beaches. There are generally as many dead, white dollars as the live, brown colored ones, so look for those already cleaned, white shells when you wade along the beaches.

Recently a woman out with one of my groups found an all-black live sand dollar. The color was really interesting and also quite unusual. Good luck shelling this week and remember the shelling ban of two live shells peperson, per species. Thanks.



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
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

"I'm not talking about retired or unretired nor any specific age group," he points out. Sanibel needs to attract young people. according to Smith, although he adds that they don't have to be poor young people. He says that COTI's charter which mandates that the organization "preserve the unique character" of the Island puts that problem squarely in COTI's province. The Island character has traditionally been a mixing of age groups in a non-country club atmosphere which Smith thinks Sanibel is losing.

He thinks that the moderate cost housing com-

mittee is on the right track. "They've gotten away from the "project" concept and now are thinking about ownership," Smith says. "When you get people to make a committment to the Island, they are more likely to stay," he maintains. The retirement element of Sanibel's community is an exciting one, Smith believes, primarily because of the ability for contact with young people.

Smith favors a design review committee for things like signs to "help people" get better graphics in their signs. He doesn't see anything difficult about telling people what color their house should be. "After all, you don't have to look at your own house — the guy across the street does." Although he is surrounded by modern functional decor, he prefers old Florida architecture like the White Heron home on Sanibel Captiva Road.

Causway and Algiers parcel met with general Commission concurrence except for the proposed commercial use of the Algiers. Committee recommendations had included use of the boat as a temporary city hall headquarters with possible future plans for a museum or educational facility.

Commissioner Ray Fenton led the dissent against refurbishing the boat with his comment, "The design of that structure suggests several uses - none of which are legal." Fenton maintained the boat could not be refurbished at the estimated \$50,000 cost, and he favored investing no money at all in the 30-acre parcel other than would be required for installation of picnic tables, nature trails and bike paths.

Underhill agreed and pointed out that the boat was located almost totally seaward of the coastal construction setback line. "The City," she said, "should obey its own laws."

Other Commissioners agreed, pointing to the extravagant cost for refurbishment and upkeep, potential city liability and insurance problems and the fact that the steamboat per se had "little to do with Sanibel history." Commission Chairman Ann Wirterbotham labelled the boat, "an exotic," and said it had no place on the Island.

Proposed use of the Causeway parcel, including the possible development of a city complex fared better with Commissioners. Concern over problems that might arise from a proposed fishing pier and a children's

park were noted by Commissioners to be included in a recommendation to City Council.

In other Commission business:

City Planner Ty Symroski presented the Commission with a list of 10 suggestions needed to correct the ecological zone map. Labelled a "housekeeping chore" the Commission unanimously voted to recommend Council approval.

Chairman Winterbotham asked for Commission input on the growing problem of development setback encreachments. Recent applications for a Specific Amendments to the land use plan that would approve encroachm violations have been a major concern of the Commission's.

Winterbotham pointed out that "a tremendous setback violation had occurred during the building of the Atrium but other than levying a fine, no. corrective measures were taken. She said the Council was on the verge of denying an amendment request to permit an encroachment of three to five feet by an entrance staircase which she felt "was hardly in the same league as the Atrium violations."

Despite the objections of Planning Director Rogers who saw the move as an expensive one, Commissioner Manchester moved that the Calmission request City Council consideration of a provision mandating building inspections during the site stake-out period, in order to discover encroachments before foundations are

Sanibel continued to be free of traffic accident fatalities, if not the accidents. There were 20 of those in June.


