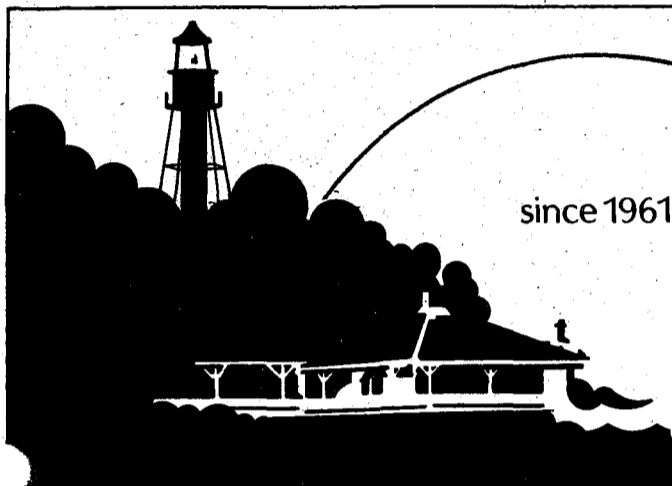

planners approve eastern connecting road

In another of its recent reluctant approvals, the Sanibel Planning Commission voted yesterday 4 - 1 to approve a development permit request allowing the city of Sanibel to build a neighborhood access road connecting Beach Road and Elinor Way. The route will proceed west from Beach Road, just north of Loggerhead Cay Condominium, crossing three lots in Los Conchas Del Mar Subdivision to connect with Elinor Way.

In justifying his recommendation for approval Planning Director Bruce Rogers emphasized that the request was only for a shell surface neighborhood access road and not for either a southern bypass or hurricane evacuation road. Rogers added the Transportation Element of the CLUP recognized the Island's traffic problems and recommended more roads as one of the solutions. He also pointed out that the proposed route would alleviate some of the problems with left hand turns from Periwinkle Way onto Donax Road.

One of the problems that has been raised by area residents concerns drainage in the area the route will take. Public Works Director Gary Price said, "Of all the alternatives the City has examined, the proposed route does the least amount of harm to drainage." Price contends that the proposed construction will not increase the drainage problems in that area at all. Price did admit, however, that large amounts of vegetation will have to be removed, although he said the width of the right away does give him the

flexibility to "wiggle around" some of the existing foliage. Price said the City was planning a plant giveaway to take care of the vegetation he had to remove. He also said that at least one gopher tortoise would have to be relocated.

"It will be tortuous to follow this route," said Price. "There will be four stop signs one way, and five the other. It won't be any throughway by any means." Area residents have also complained that the road will send more traffic through their neighborhood.

Commissioner Judy Workman disagreed with the proposal saying that she didn't think more roads were the answer to solving the Island's traffic problems and the City should be looking at alternate forms of transportation or restricting cars before building more roads. "The more roads we build, the more cars we will have. It's that simple."

Commissioner Robinson agreed with Workman but concluded that she had no choice but to approve the request because, "That route is clearly spelled out in the Plan." Commissioner Manchester said that he was hopeful that "With more of these neighborhood access roads a major route paralleling Periwinkle Way might not be needed." Area resident Don Cooperrider told the Commission that he didn't think the road would do what the City wanted it to do. "I think it's going to be a southern by-pass, no matter what you say," he argued.

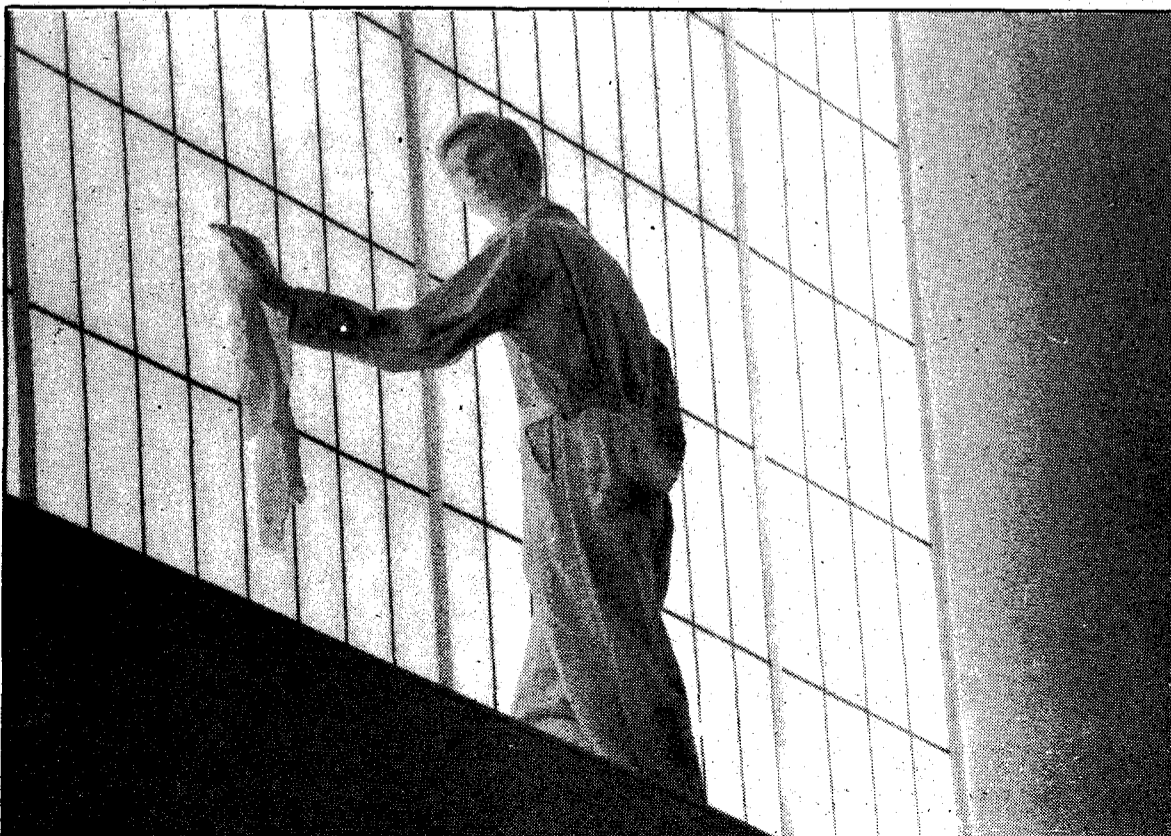
Manchester moved to approve the permit adding as a condition that, if the council decides to include it as part of the southern bypass, a complete drainage study will have to be made and additional rights of way be acquired. Workman cast the only dissenting vote, although all the Commissioners said they hoped the

Council would reconsider putting in the road.

At yesterday's meeting City planner Bob Duane reported on the progress of a commercial study the Planning Department has undertaken. City Planners are attempting to determine if there is enough commercial land in the right locations to meet Sanibel's existing and future needs and, if not, what alterations should be made.

The first step in the process, was to inventory all existing commercial developments on Sanibel - a task that Duane reports is about three quarters completed. Fulfilling the second objective, that of determining future commercial development types and locations, has two answers. "The hard way," said Duane, "is to conduct a full market sampling of the

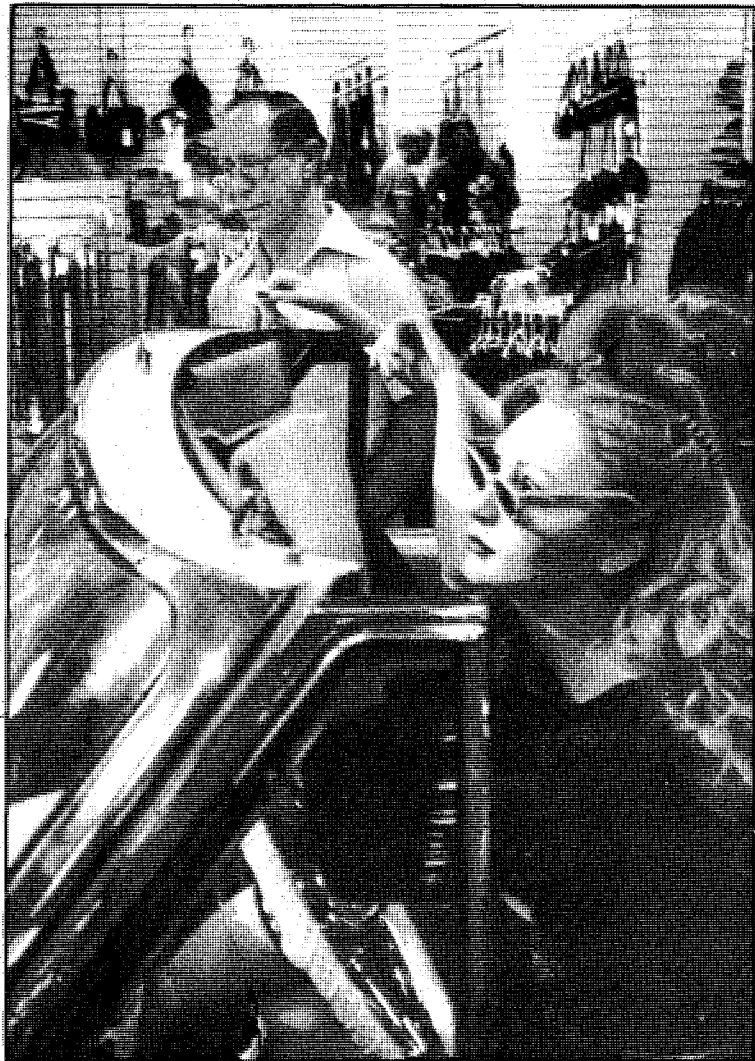

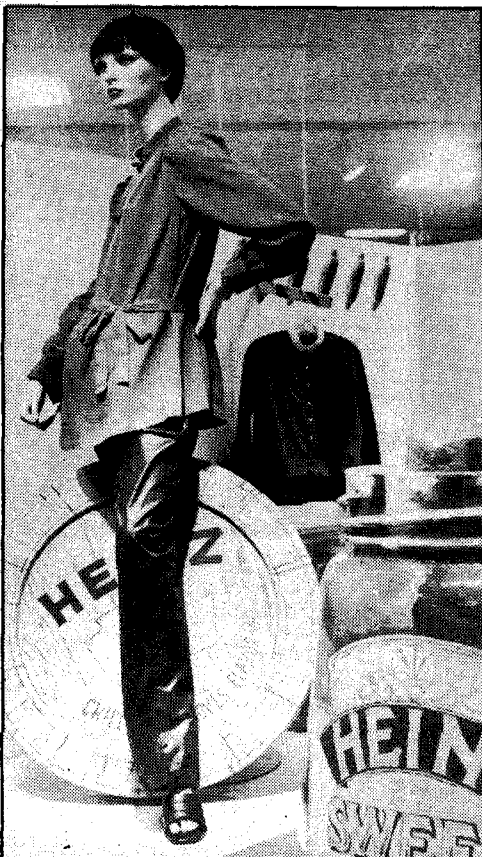
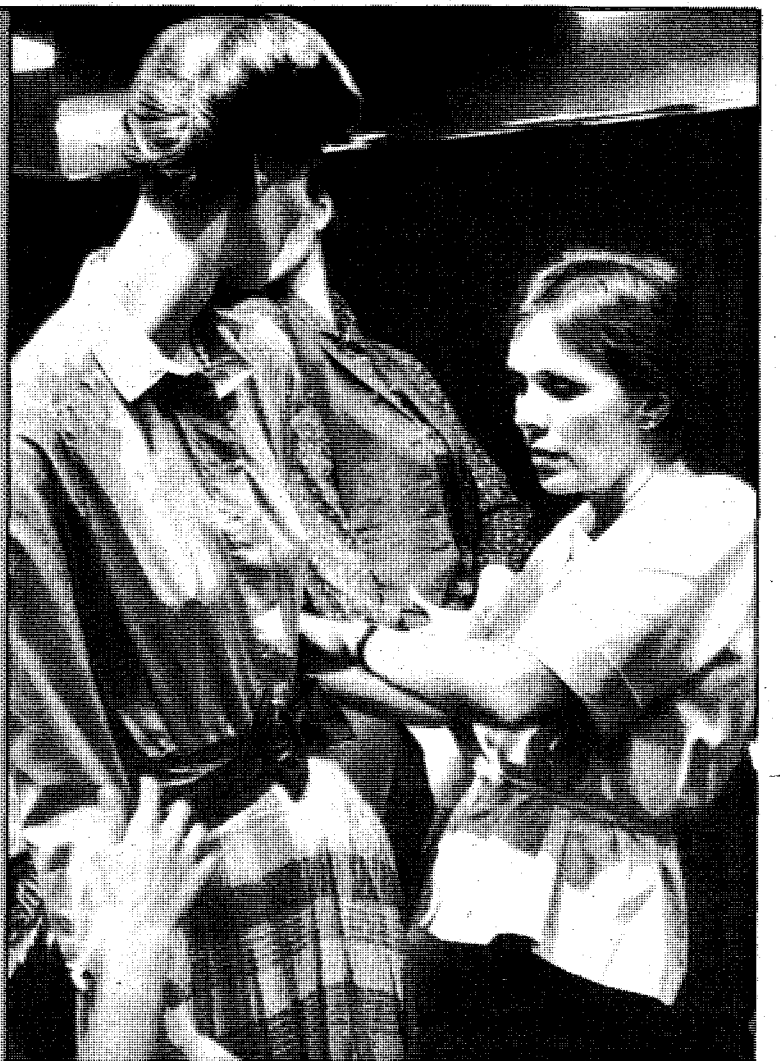

residents - where they shop, what they buy. That would probably take about a year to complete. The easy way," he outlined, "is a more generalized approach that examines past trends of commercial development and the ratio of acres to population and project that into the future. That could be done in several weeks," Duane said. He added that market areas outside Sanibel, such as Miner's Corner, should also be included. Duane pointed out that, based on data gathered thus far, the ratio of commercial land that has been developed is about equal to the un-

developed commercial property. Commissioner Fenton pointed out that the Planning Department should consider commercial development the same way the Rate Of Growth Ordinance viewed residential construction. "It is important to get a good commercial balance on the Island," said Fenton. "The resort industry is a very fragile one and we need to have commercial development that makes the Island self-sustaining." He cited services like plumbing, hardware, and a food co-operative as some of the areas to be considered. "You might find

that we have to increase commercial zoning for that kind of enterprise," he said, pointing out that an economic assumption of the Land Use Plan was to increase the dollar flow around Sanibel.

The Commissioners decided that after the next status report a workshop between the staff and the Commission would probably be in order. Duane estimated that the remaining data gathering should be completed in about a month.

City Planner Robin Smith yesterday reviewed a draft of a definition of "moderate cost housing" required by the Rate of Growth Ordinance. The Ordinance states that the City should use Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as a basis for that definition. Ms. Smith pointed out that HUD procedure is to determine rents based on a fair market value for the area, then to decide how much a family can afford and HUD makes up the difference. According to HUD figures for Fort Myers, the maximum amount of rent that could be charged for a one bedroom, walk-up apartment would be \$295 per month under their program. She pointed out that a 10 percent increase

could be granted by local HUD officials for higher cost areas like Sanibel, and a regional office could approve a 20 percent raise.

Fenton objected to using a strict interpretation of the Fort Myers figures because, "Those numbers just wouldn't work on Sanibel." He suggested that Sanibel more closely resembled Key West than Fort Myers in terms of both costs and income. (A fair market price for the same one bedroom apartment in Key West is \$346) He recommended that Smith come back to the Commission with dollar amounts based on a range of 50 to 90 percent of the difference between Fort Myers and Key West.

In other Commission business' The planners decided to submit a recommendation to the City Council tomorrow that the planning department budget be revised and put on a self-sustaining basis, rather than eliminating personnel as recommended by the City Manager. Fenton suggested that one way to increase the departments revenue would be to increase the fees for construction permits.

sanibel elementary to hold "Get Acquainted Night"

The Sanibel Elementary School parent teacher organization will hold its first meeting of the season at 7:30 p.m., September 25. A "Get Acquainted Night" for parents, children and teachers, the meeting will also feature the dedication of the new building completed last winter.

Among the dignitaries present will be Mayor Duane White, Police Chief John Butler and members of the Fort Myers School Board. A group of students will perform for the attendants.

The new board of directors of the organization will be elected at a meeting to be held the end of October; installation will follow immediately after the election.

Meanwhile, the group has set the refurbishment of the school library as its priority project for the school year, and will be issuing a list shortly of items which they hope will be donated by members of the community.

Several new committees are being formed, among them a screening committee

that will check all new material and textbooks to make certain they conform to guidelines, a refreshment committee, a library committee and the selection of room mothers whose function it is to coordinate such events as the Christmas party and the Easter egg hunt.

Pat Kair, a Director of the parent teachers organization, was lavish in her praise of new principle Barbara Ward saying, "We are just so happy with her...and we hope she's as happy with us. She really has some nifty ideas."

The Sanibel Police Department also came in for its share of praise for their school bus escort service. "All last year they worked overtime to provide this service...often on their own time," said Mrs. Kair. "Starting October 1, we'll have a budget that will enable us to hire two aides to ride the buses and help guide the children off at every stop."

Applications for these positions are being accepted now.

tranquilizers linked to traffic accidents

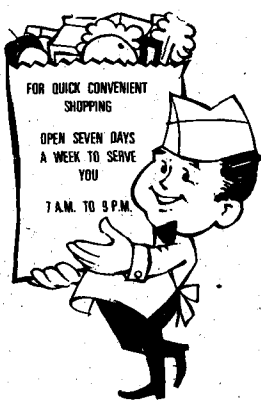
Drivers who are users of Valium or other mild tranquilizers are five times more likely to become involved in crashes than other patients, three British researchers have reported.

In a two year study of 43,000 people, prescriptions issued by general practitioners were tied with hospital admission records and deaths. For 57 people killed or

injured while operating motor vehicles or bicycles, "A highly significant association between use of minor tranquilizers and the risk of a serious road accident" was found. The researchers urged doctors who prescribed tranquilizers to warn their patients of the dangers of driving while under their influence.

You can't fight city hall

Greetings

At the public meeting on the subject of the road connecting Beach Road to Eleanor Way via Diboe Lane, it was apparent that the decision to complete this road had already been made and that the meeting was to defend the action. This in spite of the well-stated opposition of all the affected residents of Las Conchas del Mar subdivision. The following needs to be brought to your attention as well as the people of Sanibel.

1. No one has been able to demonstrate a need for this road. It was very low on the priority list of the Heubennette report.

2. It will be a "shell road" and as such, will be a rutted, chuckhole-filled "short cut" to Lindgren Boulevard for all the transient beach visitors trying to go to Middle Gulf Drive.

3. It will cut a 50 to 60-foot swath through "sensitive" upland wetlands which now support Joewood, seagrapes and cabbage palms.

4. It will be an extreme hazard for the five gopher tortoises of various sizes that inhabit the Nerita, Diboe Lane, Eleanor Way area. There were six until one large one was smashed by an unknown car about four months ago.

5. The planning officials recognize the dangerousness of the route by the anticipated placement of nine stop signs on four corners.

6. Present streets, Nerita, Cardium and Junonia which are the exits for this new street are already so chuckholed, rutted and "hog-wallowed" that traveling them is very difficult and even hazardous. (This is about the only effective speed control in the area, but it is hard on tires and suspensions.)

7. The lack of water control and drainage for the area causes the massive accumulation of water in undrained pools which serve as breeding places for species of mosquitoes which can carry encephalitis to humans. (This has been verified by Lee County Mosquito Laboratories.)

This entire fiasco has not even been examined, studied or commented on by

those on the island who appear to maintain an interested attitude in conservation and environment so it must be presumed that they agree to this tearing up of the "sensitive" wetlands. They are always using this to stop a developer, but apparently they do not apply this to whatever the city plans to do.

I realize that the decisions have already been made and this is another exercise in futility and another example of, "It does no good to fight city hall."

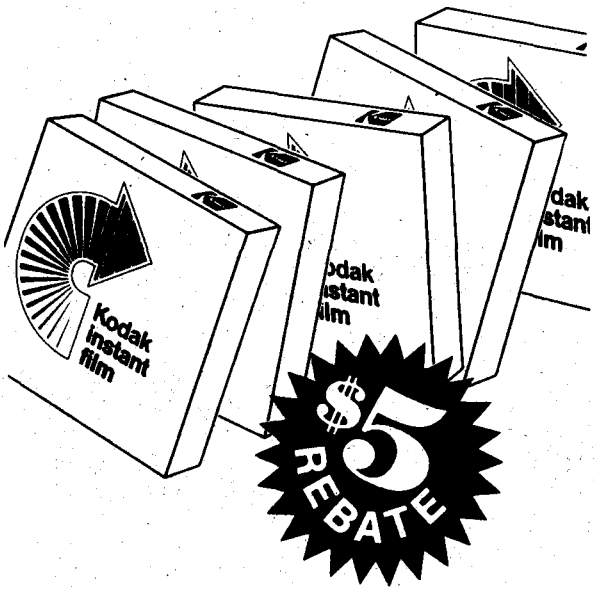
Ernest J. Wilson

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The Green Thumb

Remember that gorgeous gloxina you received not too long ago? It did beautifully the first month or so and then it started to look a little parched. The day finally came when you pronounced it dead and threw it in the trash. Now, what would you say if I told you that today it's probably blooming in the Fort Myers' dump?

Well, this is entirely possible because the gloxina, unlike its cousin, the African violet, doesn't bloom all year round, but becomes dormant for a month or so between blossoming periods.

Let's begin with the plant in its prime and follow it along its life cycle. When you first received your gloxina, it had large, lush, green leaves with velvety, bell-shaped blossoms. At this stage in the plant's cycle, you should keep the soil barely moist at all times. Do not over-water, as the gloxina is extremely sensitive to excessive moisture. (By the way, it's best to bottom water your plant to keep the top soil from getting too moist, since moisture on the top soil is an open invitation to rot.)

Feed your gloxina once a month with a good house plant fertilizer. Handle it carefully, as the leaves are very brittle and will break off easily. Should one break, however, root it

in moist sand or perlite and in six months or so you'll have another blossoming plant!

As the plant goes into its dormant stage, the blossoms will fade and the plant will look a little parched. Your gloxina is actually saying to you, "Hey! I want to rest, give me a break!" It's best to heed your plant or it will, indeed, die. Cut back on the watering and stop all feeding. Soon the leaves will become very leathery and dried and when this happens, your plant is asleep. Cut away all the dried leaves and discontinue all watering.

In two to four months, your gloxina will reawaken and will send up new sprouts. As this new growth takes place, you should re-pot and plant in fresh African violet soil. Resume your normal feeding and watering routine and place the plant in bright, indirect sunlight where it is happiest.

One interesting footnote: some well tended gloxina plants have been known to survive for 50 years or more...so proper care of your plant can certainly be effective for many, many years.

As the Cypress Lake High School student body files into the purple painted Panther Pit you can almost anticipate the ageless school spirit about to be turned loose for yet another school year.

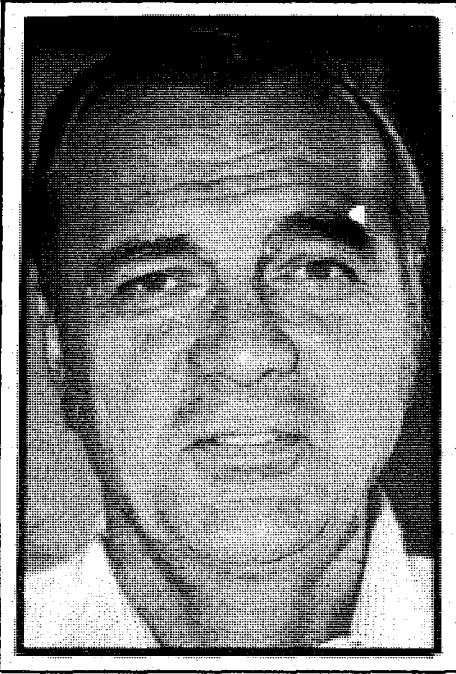

price would include just about everything except the refrigerator, washer and dryer, draperies, and landscaping. If your lot cost \$22,000 and your landscaping ran \$2,000, this would put the total package at \$86,000, which is approximately \$8,500 below the price of a comparable resale. These savings, plus the added advantage of having everything new, is a tidy reward for your efforts and patience during the construction period.

When you do decide to build, you'll have to find a builder and fortunately, this is relatively easy to do here on the Islands, since almost all of our local builders enjoy good reputations. Furthermore, using an Island builder will generally save you frustration, as many off-Island builders don't fully understand permitting procedures and aren't familiar with special building requirements in the Land Use Plan.

While our Island builders do specialize to some degree, almost all build custom homes. They operate similar to building contractors everywhere and normally work under a specific dollar amount contract. Nonetheless, not all of the builders work under such a contract, as some prefer a cost-plus basis. Both systems have advantages and disadvantages, so you will no doubt want to discuss the pros and cons with your realtor.

Most of us, as we approach retirement, have accumulated a drawer full of house plans for our dream house. We treasure these plans and ideas because they express our taste, life style and retirement dreams. Then we retire to Florida and immediately realize that many of the best ideas cannot be built into a "Florida home". For instance, what do you do about the basement rec room when the ground water table is only 4 feet below the surface? In addition, the energy situation has forced all of us to rethink and shrink some of our large home ideas.

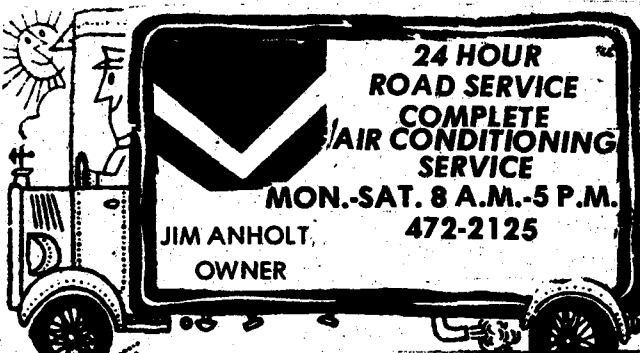
If, after all of this, you still want to build that dream home here on the Island, you are brave indeed but even more, farsighted. The rewards are certainly there for those who are patient and don't expect to finish in six months; it may take as long as a year. Generally speaking, building on your own lot is a considerable saving over purchasing an existing home and you will wind up with the home you really want.

Perhaps a look at a typical situation would be helpful. For example, you can build a three-bedroom, two-bath, elevated home on your lot for approximately \$62,000. This



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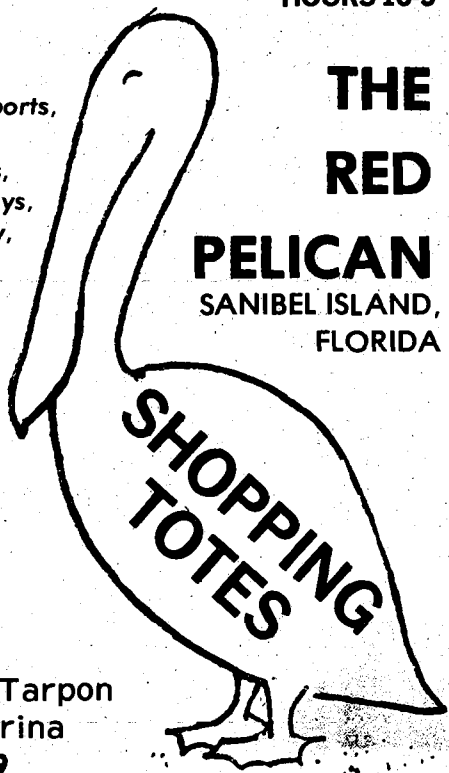

municipal records

The City of Sanibel has received a copy of a letter sent to Roland Eastwood of the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council from Wesley Johnson, Regional Administrator of the General Services Administration, regarding the city's request for aid in obtaining the lighthouse property located at the east end of the island.

According to Mr. Johnson, the Coast Guard advised the Department of Interior Bureau of Land Management of their intention to relinquish 26.52 acres of land at the lighthouse site back in 1976.

Johnson said however, that the Coast Guard intends to retain the lighthouse tower and 50 X 50 feet of land for continued use, as well as a six acre tract for use as an antenna field.

According to the letter, the property in question has not been declared excess to the General Services Administration for disposition and a determination as to the suitability of the property for return to public domain has not been made.

Island naturalist and author, George Campbell, has been nominated for the 1980 American Motors Conservation Award in the category of "non professional conservationist."

The nomination came from Dick Workman, Administrative Director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, with an endorsement from Mayor Duane White. White praised Campbell's "efforts in protecting the American alligator," along with his concern for the "preservation and protection of the native vegetation on this barrier island."

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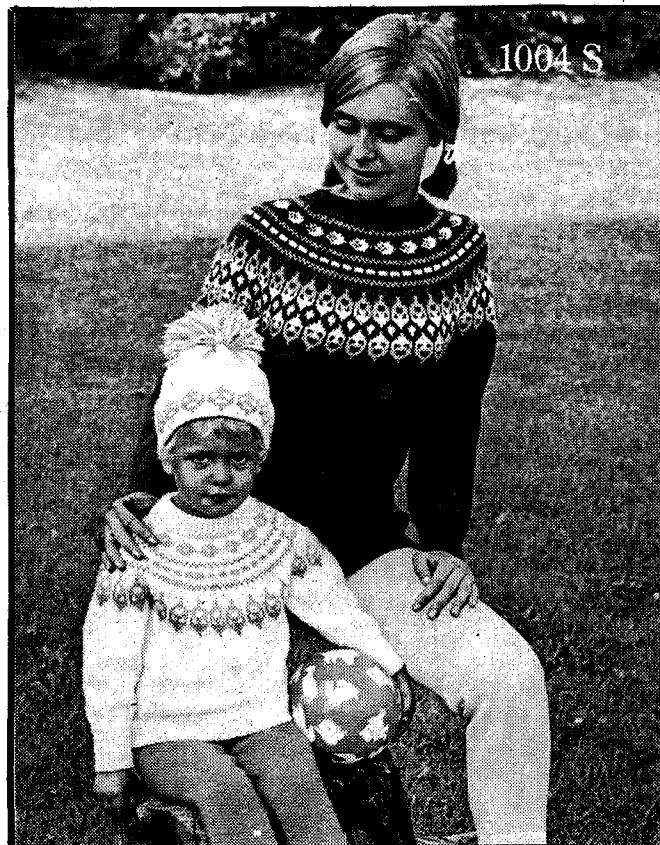
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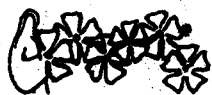
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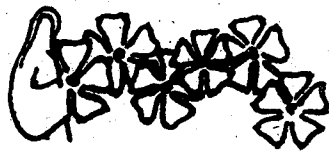


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shelling tips . . .

Shelling during hurricane conditions is something most serious shell collectors dream of, but when David kicked up the seas last week most of us out on the beaches didn't fare too well.

We here on Sanibel and Captiva Islands didn't get the full hurricane force winds or resulting high seas, as residents of Florida's East Coast did. We did get some high waves and the surfers were out along the shore of Captiva but strangely enough the shelling was not as good as expected.

Even in some of the strongest winds there were people walking the beaches, but what they found were broken shells or no shells at all. This points out an aspect of shelling which I am frequently asked about, and that is whether or not shelling is supposed to be better during a storm.

It all depends upon the direction of the winds. The southern shore of Sanibel, from the lighthouse to Tarpon Bay Road, isn't much good unless there is strong southerly winds. Often, in the winter when cold, gusty winds whip the state from the north, visitors will head for this section of the beach only to find the water smooth and the beach bare of shells. However, if those shellers had gone

further northwest on Sanibel, around the "elbow" of the Island where it heads in a more northerly direction, the wave action would have been better, resulting in more shells washed up on the beach.

The important thing is to watch which way the winds are coming from. Hurricane David blew mostly out of the southeast, then changed to the east and northeast as it traveled up the state. The only west winds we had lasted just a day and the waves were so strong that most of the shells were broken washing up.

If David's winds had hit the area on a very low tide, or had caused the water along the shore and the sound to drop drastically, I'm sure the shelling would have been fantastic for those brave enough to try storm shelling. This would have been because more of the sea bottom normally covered by water would have been exposed.

I've frequently seen better shelling during our regular winter "northers" than we had during David. But now our weather is back to its normal hot, sunny self again, so don't forget to bring along that mask and snorkle when you come shelling. Lots of good shells will be found just off the shore.

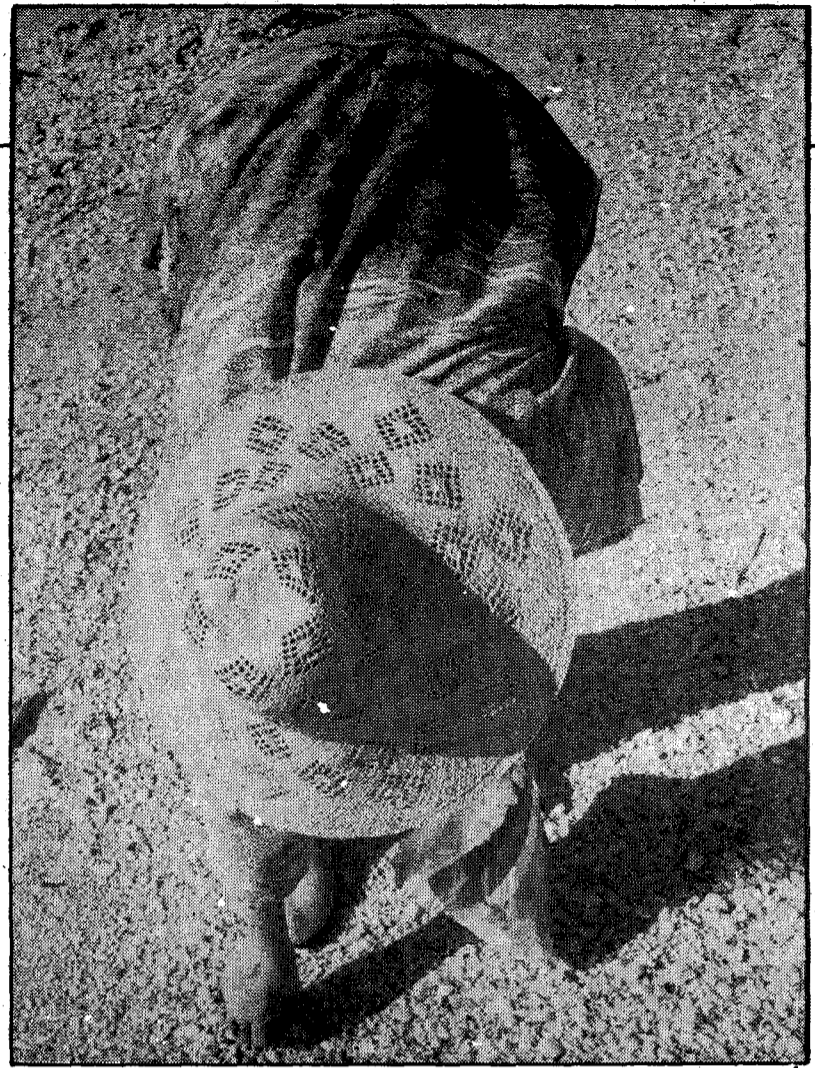
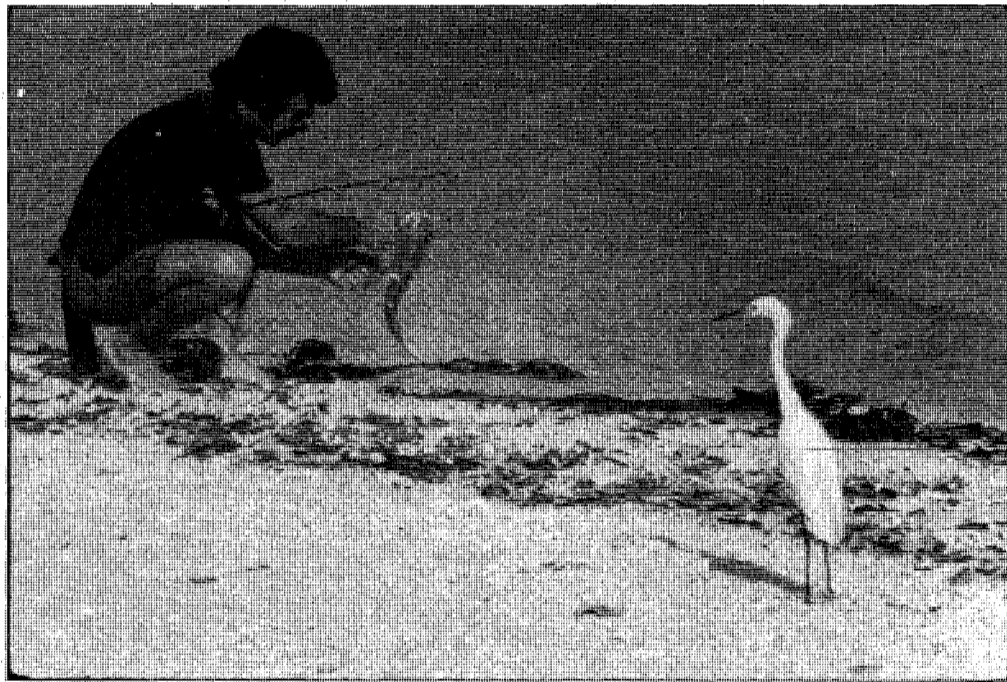

Although Hurricane David missed the southwestern side of the state he managed to mess up local waters and fish. Towards the end of last week the water began to clear however, and the fish are expected to be biting as usual.

The second big redfish in as many weeks has been caught at the public fishing pier. This one weighed in at 22 lbs. and some people view the two big catches as a signal that redfish season has begun. Sanibel Marina suggests fishing for reds either at the pier or the west side of the mouth of Tarpon Bay.

The snook are moving but still being caught. They can be found in the Tarpon Bay mangroves and at the mouth of the Caloosahatchee.

Trout fishing is the news at Tarpon Bay Marina. They report catches of pound and a half to two pound trout from the flats within the Bay. They also report sighting redfish and black tip sharks.

For snook fishermen, check out the passes. South Seas Marina reports snook in Captiva and redfish pass. 'Tween Waters reports snook also in redfish pass and off the surf, with trout being caught outside of Buck Key and inside redfish pass.

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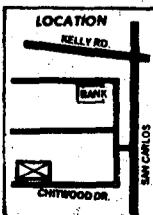


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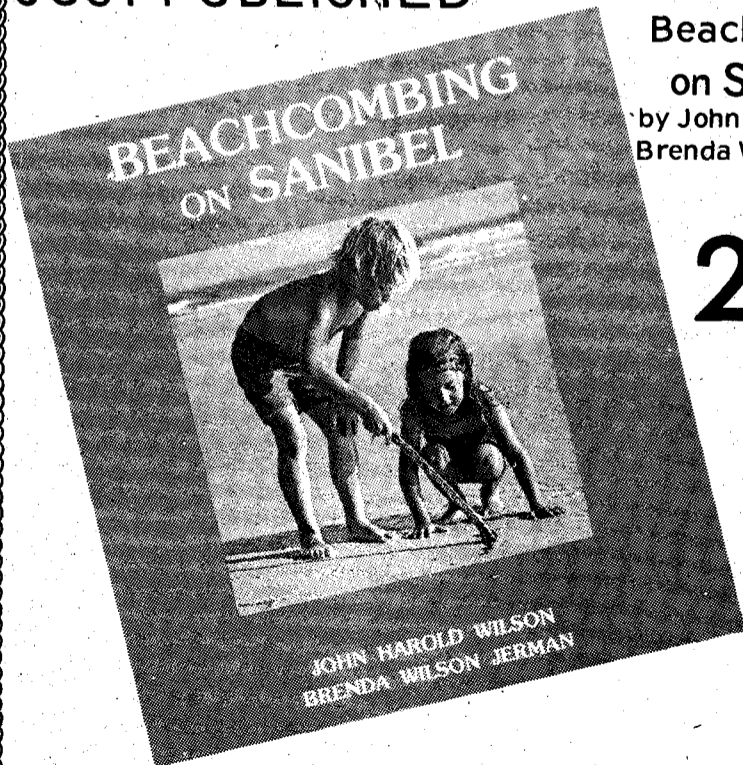
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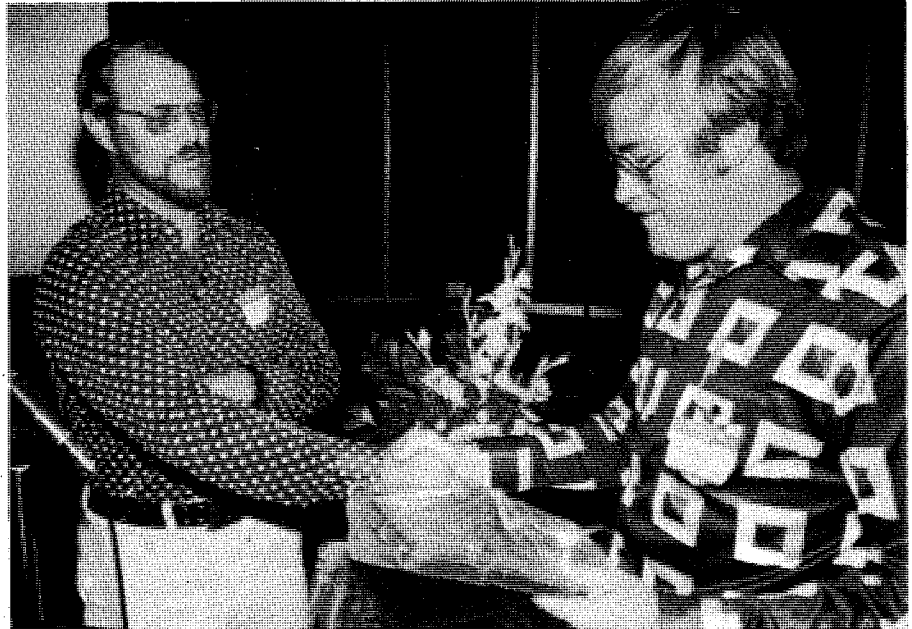

1st annual Sanibel swim meet slated for Sunday

The First Annual Sanibel Swim Meet is slated to be held September 16, at Casa Ybel and will be an open AAU sanctioned swim competition.

Approximately 50-75 men and women master swimmers from Sanibel, Sarasota, St. Petersburg, and possibly a team from Venezuela are expected to attend. Sub-master swimmers are eligible to participate but will not be eligible to win awards. Sub-master swimmers are those between the ages of 20-25, master swimmers are 25-75 years old.

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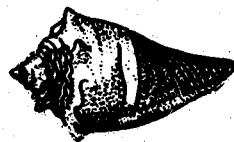


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Lions Club sets date for ladies night

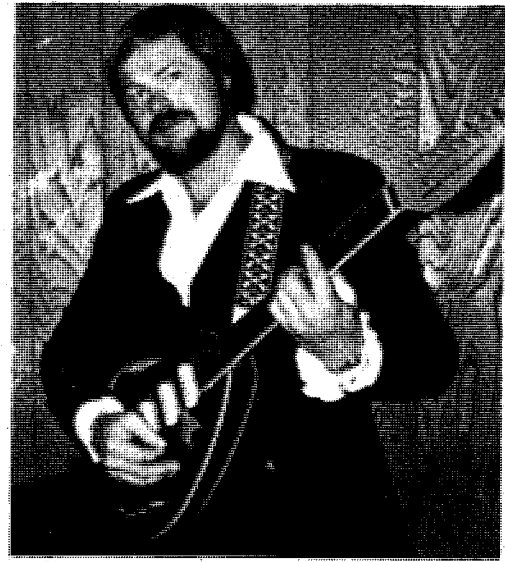
Sanibel police are making a determined effort to apprehend the man, who is believed also to have attempted to assault a woman
