housing guidelines to be discussed

The Moderate Cost Housing Committee will meet next Wednesday to review an ordinance drafted by Committee Chairman Zee Butler outlining some guidelines for moderate cost housing on Sanibel.

In its present form, the ordinance would provide for the City to enter into a franchise agreement with a non-profit private foundation that would be responsible for establishing a screening procedure for affordable housing units and who would review all proposals to contruct below market housing for sale or for rent. The foundation would determine rental and sale prices and maintain a pool of eligible applicants.

county installs markers on McGregor

Island residents travelling to and from the mainland recently may have noticed a veries of markers alongside McGregor Blvd. just after passing the toll booths. According to Don Brame, Assistant County Engineer, the markers were placed there by the Department of Transportation (DOT) in anticipation of Hurricane David to delineate the edge of the pavement in case the road floods. That particular stretch of road has been recognized by the National Hurricane Center as the lowest point between the Islands and the safety of Miner's Corner. Hurricane Specialist Dr. Joe Pelissier told the ISLANDER that the elevation (or lack thereof) of that part of the road sub-

stantially reduces the Islands' safety margin in the event of a hurricane

evacuation order. Road improvements for McGregor Blvd. from the Causeway to Miner's corner were part of a road repair package that was approved by the Florida Supreme Court for funding from the Causeway bonds, but Brame said Friday that the road improvements "were not going to happen overnight." The cost of widening and elevating the road is \$4.3 million per mile. according to Brame, and the targeted completion date is 1985. Brame said that the department feels that just fixing that portion of the road in the meantime would be a waste of money.

One Sanibel official voiced the opinion that he felt that the County was deliberately dragging its feet on the road repairs in the hopes that Sanibel might purchase the Causeway and then be responsible for the work. Repeated calls to DOT chief Ben Pratt were not returned.

Brame would not furnish the ISLAN-DER with any figures on the cost of elevating that stretch of road to bring it into line with the lowest part of the Causeway but he did say that it would take, in his opinion, a half-mile to taper the road so there wouldn't just be a "hump". Utilizing his \$4.3 million per mile figure (which was for a four-lane divided road), Brame "hypothesized" that the amount would be in the neighbourhood of \$2

Brame disagreed with a suggestion that the markers constituted a traffic hazard in the event that a car was forced to leave the road because of a traffic mishap and said that the County utilized the markers everywhere for flood prone areas. He also disputed the Hurricane Center's warnings.

"If people will follow the 25-hour evacuation notice, that road won't be a hazard," he declared.

Work on the design for the road was begun August 27 but Brame would not estimate when actual construction might start. "You can't do a thing like this overnight,"he said again. "It takes a long time.''

donax detour starts tomorrow

Beginning this Wednesday, September 19 and continuing for approximately 30 days, there will be a detour on Donax St. over the Sanibel River. According to Public Works Director, Gary Price, the detour will route traffic over Junonia to Pyrula and back to Donax St. The detour will allow the city to put in new river crossings and to replace those that are inadequate as part of the long-awaited Donax St. improvements.

Price also advised the ISLANDER that Periwinkle Way at Donax St. will be blocked "off and on" during the next three or four months as the City works on improving that intersection. Price asks Islanders to please have patience with the City during the construction period.

general permit signed

Captain Paul Munch of the Army Corps of Engineers has announced that Col. Adams of the Corps is expected to issue a general permit for development in Sanibel's interior wetlands within the week.

According to Munch, the permit conditions developed in public workshops held on the Island have survived the review process virtually intact. Minor changes were made in the provision governing fill in wetlands where a septic tank is located.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has requested permission to review the final permit draft before issuance by the Corps. Their comments are expected this week.

If issued, the permit is expected to decrease the waiting period for applicants requesting wetlands development. Adoption of the permit for general use is contingent on the approval of the Sanibel City Council.



Victnamese Refugees find a new home at South Seas **Plantation**

America has 11 new residents; South Seas Plantation has 11 new employees; Lee Countians are opening their bearts 11 times over; and 11 Vietnamese refugees - Boat People - couldn't be more pleased about it if

It all began when Michael Peceri, general manager for South Seas, was watching a "60 Minutes" segment on atroclous conditions in the Malaysian camps established to house the fleeing Boat People. Peccri, a 20 year veteran of the Foreign Service and not a shockable man, found himself "appalled" at the conditions revealed by the broadcast. He returned to work the next day and called a personnel meeting to sound out resort staff on the idea of adopting a dozen refugees in need of sponsorship. The response was

The next step was to contact the inter-

national Rescue Committee (IRC), responsible for the charters transporting refugees from Malaysia to the States, with the sponsorship offer. Then, as is often the case, bureaucratic red tape got in the way of a worthwhile gesture. When results were not forthcoming Peceri contacted Mike Wallace of the "60 Minutes" staff directly to ask for assistance. The good news came a week ago last Friday; the refugees were on the way, eight would reach Fort Myers Tuesday and three more could be expected Wed-

"All I can say is that it's been a warming last 24 hours," smiled Roy Collon, South Seas personnel director, as he greeted the media last Wednesday. Eight refugees had arrived the night before, accompanied by Hung Nguyen, a representative and translator from the IRC. Upon resort arrival at 1:00 a.m. they were greeted with an oriental snack prepared by Andrew Chan, a native of Singapore who works for South Seas in data processing. Chan also found he was able to converse with four of the refugees in Chinese an undoubtedly reassuring discovery for the immigrants who speak no English.

According to Peceri, the refugees were being "well received" by the entire community. "My phone has been ringing off the book," be said, "with offers of help for the refugees."From all appearances South Seas new residents are making themselves right at home. Captiva's climate and mutive wildlife is similar to that of VietNam, and one of the refugees first experiences in their new environment was a 4:00 a.m. swim M/Silesoby moralis.

Communication is expected to be the

biggest barrier to adjustment for the Virtnemese The IRC translator returned to Washington D.C. last Friday, lenving the refugees with only his phone reimber and the words "long distance" for comfort. Chan's ability to converse with four of them in Chinese, and English lessons that will hopefully begin immediately, should case the readjustment period in time. The refugees will be living in the resort complex for employees and will be paid for the service jobs they perform. Their job level is expected to rise as communication skill improve and, although they are not obligated, Peceri hopes they will choose to ... stay with the company. "The refugees have a need that we're filling," he said, "and we have a need that they're filling .. We have the facilities to help them, and we certainly have the will."

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

Butler defines a moderate cost housing unit as one that has been granted an increase in the density allocation and which will remain in the moderate cost market for "not less than 25 years." Rentals are limited to an annual basis in the proposed ordinance and cannot be subject to sub-

Any offically-designated moderate cost housing unit that comes up for sale must first be offered to the housing foundation and the re-sale price is strictly regulated. (The foundation is not obligated to purchase the unit, however.) The purchase price of the unit will be restricted to the original purchase price minus the cost of any necessary improvements to bring the unit into compliance with city ordinances and building codes, multiplied by a factor equal to the Bureau of Labor statistics housing price index for the month preceeding that of the sale. That figure would then be divided by the Consumer Price Index for the month the owner purchased the unit. The costs of any improvements, other than normal upkeep, would be added to the sale price along with selling costs.

The teeth in the proposal are provided by the establishment of a fine for violations based on one-twentieth of the amount of the current purchase price of the unit and assessed daily for the length of the

Qualification for a moderate cost using unit would be determined by a person's income, length of residency on Sanibel, employment on Sanibel, whether that employment contributes to the health and welfare of Sanibel's citizens and physical handicaps. (A revised draft by

City Attorney Neal Bowen limits qualification to full-time employment on Sanibel and physical handicaps.)

The draft ordinance, which Butler has termed a "starting place", has been submitted to Planning Commission members for their comments. Commissioner Ray Fenton, who also sits on the housing committee, said that he felt the draft "definitely needs work". Fenton thought the draft needed to be more explicit, especially in terms of rental and sale prices. "Everything needs tightening up," said Fenton. "All the data needs to be in black and white."

Meanwhile, one Sanibel developer is withdrawing his application for a Specific Amendment for increased density to permit a moderate cost housing development. Frank Joyce canvassed Islanders who had responded to a housing committee survey last spring indicating they would be interested in a purchase and found no takers. Joyce cited timing as one of the reasons. "A lot of the people who responded affirmatively in March or April have gone and bought property off the Island," said Joyce. Joyce said that many of these people also did not want their resale potential limited as much as the City would do.

Based on his discussions with the potential applicants for moderate cost housing. Joyce said that the City definitely needs to concentrate on rentals. Joyce said he might do some low-cost building on Sanibel but that it would be "on a one-toone basis".

The moderate cost housing committee meeting will be at 8 p.m. at MacKenzie Hall and is open to the public.

Hyde pointed out a decrease in the engineering department due to the resignation recently of the City Engineer and the City's plans not to replace him. The Public Works Department is adding three men plus a caretakerfor the Algeirs steamboat property,

A suggestion from Maxwell that federal revenue sharing monies might be used to "get a bonafide recreation program for kids off the ground." met with council approval and, af ter some discussion. council members told Officer Dick Noon that they thought they might be able to expend about \$8,000 in that area.

Councilman Goss told the audience that the proposed millage for 1979 of 4.203 is the first time the millage has gone up. since the incorporation of the City. The 4.203 total represents a basic millage of 3.070, which is the maximum the city can levy for general operating expenses, plus .645 to cover the expenses of the Tax Anticipation Notes and .488 required because of a millage assessment mistake last year.

According to Goss, the basic millage rate (not counting the make-up from last year) represents and increase of 14.5 percent. Goss said that Sanibel taxpayers must also ask themselves if their assessed value has also gone up. "Relative to other cities. Sanibel has the lowest tax bite including, I thinnk, Captiva and it's offset by the growth in the value of your property.

Goss said he also felt very strongly about returning the position of the Council secretary to the budget because of a need that he sees for a "central repository" for information. Council member Zee Butler, who had suggested eliminating the position, said that she did so because she felt that if the Council, were going to ask the Planning Department to make cuts, the Council should also take the first step.

Goss said that he felt it was more important to keep the cou cil running

smoothly than it was to provide public rèstrooms. A member of the audience. Hugh McCreary supported Goss, telling him that he had had three contacts with the Council secretary and all his queries had been answered promptly.

Goss suggested that the City take out a \$50,000 allocation for the Tarpon Bay weir and begin negotiations with the Lee County Mosquito Control District to see if the District would support the weir financially. Public Works Director Gary Price said the City would have to negotiate withthe District anyway since they own the weir. Goss suggested that the weir might also qualify as a project under the Saniubel Causeway funds, as the restrooms might. The council also concurred that a \$50,000 allocation for planning a municipal services complex might be re-evaluated. Council member Zee Butler demurred, saying that it was "ludicrous to spend \$46,000 a year in rent and get back nothing but a little piece of paper."

The council also agreed to a suggestion by the City Manager that an additional one percent cost ofliving increase, totalling about an extra \$9,000, should be given to the city employees.

The Council will probably adopt the budget officially at tomorrow's council meeting.

My initial reaction was one of disbelief to your General Counsel's response to my July 29th plea to reject Lee County Sheriff Wanicka's budget appeal to the Cabinet.

A front page story in today's local press, however, gave me a clearer insight to the alternative strategy for achieving one immediate goal my letter had suggested. It was statesmanlike, if somewhat expedient, to placate the Sheriff by a state grant funding his six traffic control positions; and the coincidental application by the County Commissioners of "left over" money to fund his six new deputies.

The significance of General Counsel Aurell's terse statement that you would act "in the best interests of the citizens of Lee County" is now apparent.

It still seems fitting, however, for you to initiate appropriate action for the 1980 Legislature to: repeal all such questionable statutes granting power to the State's executive branch to overrule the Home Rule powers and duties of local governing bodies; and, to clearly define the powers and duties of the socalled"Constitutional officers of the County" vis-a-vis those of the local governing bodies.

Thank you for your continuing efforts to perfect the governance of Florida, which I shall continue to wholeheartedly support as a concerned citizen of the State.



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

We figure we'll get our money's worth in a couple of years — and then no matter what inflation does — we'll still be taking first class vacations every year.

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
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
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

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Captivans approve \$3.5 million beach project

The official results of a poll taken by the Captiva Erosion Prevention District are inand the Island's residents have voted 3 - 1 in favor of a \$3.5 million beach renourishment project.

According to District Chairman Dan Burner, the District's activities for the last three years have been focused on determining what Captiva residents were willing to do to curb erosion. Federal funds were ruled out by residents who preferred not having to guarantee public beach access in exchange for financial support from the government. A proposal for a 50 cent toll at the Blind Pass entrance to the Island met with similar resident opposition.

The project approved by the majority of residents in the recent ballot poll calls for offshore sand to be dredged from Redfish Pass and piped to shore forming a 100-foot de beach stretch.

Funds for the massive project are being sought from a variety of sources, according to Burner. The District is now in the process of hiring engineers to implement the project while pursuing the necessary legal steps to gain funding from the state, property owners, the county, and causeway bond revenues. The institution of a special tax for beachfront property owners and a referendum to increase ad valorem taxes to help repay a possible \$1.59 million bond issue are also being sought by the District.

The District also intends to request the State Legislature for an increase in their current maximum bond limit of \$1 million (at six percent interest) in order to finance a \$1.59 bond issue for the project. The District's 1979-80 operating budget of \$189,155 provides for \$100,000 to be spent on engineering and permitting expenses involved with the renourishment project.



Cities mean business: county must follow law

Lee County's three municipalities will give the county commissioners one more chance to comply with the law requiring them to break the county budget into county-wide and Municipal Service Taxing Unit items. If the commissioners don't comply this time, Cape Coral, Sanibel and Fort Myers vill take the issue to court.

Cape Coral City Attorney Richard Roosa said this morning he intends to file a petition with the courts that would require the county to do what it is supposed to do by law. The petition, called a writ of mandamus, would act as a stay, preventing further budget action until the issue is resolved.

In a meeting at Cape Coral City Hall this morning representatives from

Sanibel and Fort Myers said their cities would more than likely go along with the petition, which would make it much more effective.

State Law 129 requires county commissioners to break down every budget item into either a county-wide MSTU category. But Rossa said even though the law has been on the books for several years, it has been no more than a "sleeper" law.

Fort Myers Finance Director Maynard Matz said if the municipalities are ever going to win the dual taxation battle, the county must provide necessary information.

"We must force the county to reveal the figures, we can't even tell what their decisions are." Roosa also said he has previously requested that Lee County Attorney Mike Yeager write a legal opinion and present it to the county. "But as far as I know, he hasn't done that yet."

But Matz and Sanibel Council woman Zelda Butler said the commissioners should be given one last chance to comply with the law. "This is a big thing we're dealing with, and it could tie up the county budget process for months if it gets to court," Butler said.

Matz added that he thought an honest effort should be made to settle the issue amicably out of court.

"I would like to see the issue settled out of court, too," Roosa said. "We could present our argument to the county and say we don't want any hassles or delays, but we do want to exercise our rights. We definitely have a valid case here."

"We're all reasonable people here, and I think the commissioners are, too," Matz said. "We want good government for as little money as possible, and if 129 is complied with we should be able to get just that."

The officials from the municipalities decided to schedule a meeting-workshop with the commissioners as soon as possible, but a time has not yet been arranged.

Cash Audit shows "everything in order"

Richard Pagett of the city's accounting firm of Taylor Endenfield reported to the council last week that a cash audit, requested by former City Manager Bill Nungester when he left, has shown that "everything was in order" as of July 31, the last day Nungester was authorized to handle city finances.

Council resolves to take over Sanibel library

The Sanibel City Council last week approved a resolution to assume the responsibility for the Sanibel Public Library. The action was triggered when the Lee County Electric Cooperative appeared a few weeks ago to turn off the library's power. Untility bills, supposed to have been paid by the county, were several months in arrears. The action culminated many years of frustration as Sanibel residents have paid Lee County far more in taxes for the county library system than the library on the island received. Board representative George Tenney told the Council the Sanibel Library would not require any funding from city coffers for the upcoming fiscal year. Tenney told the council that their action would, in no way, affect any future action the council might wish to take. Tenney reported that Lee County Commissioner Harry Rodda was probably going to recommend the formation of a Municipal Services Taxing Unit to permit a separate millage for the library.

Tenney told the council that the coming budget only allows the Sanibel library \$3100 for operating expenses, with no provision for new books. The county budget does provide over \$12,000 for a parttime librarian, which Tenney says the Sanibel library doesn't want. (The library is staffed by over 80 volunteers). Tenney said that he didn't know if the money for the staff allocation could be transferred to other areas. One of those volunteers, Harriett Howe, commented after the resolution passed that Wednesday was "a day I've been waiting for".

The resolution now goes to the Board of ee County Commissioners

Judge rules in favor of City on Algiers bond

Circuit Court Judge John R. Schoonover ruled in the City's favor last week when he decided that a typographical error in the legal description of the ordinance authorizing the purchase of the Algiers steamboat property was not significant enough to invalidate the purchase. Sanibel voters last fall voted to approve the purchase of the steamboat property and the property fronting along the Causeway Road. With the judge's decision, the city can now complete the purchase.

The council last Wednesday complimented City Attorney Neal Bowen on his memorandum to Schoonover outlining the city's arguements that the error was not a meaningful one.

Sanibel resident Steve Maxwell, who first revealed the error to Schoonover, said that he was considering an appeal to the Florida Supreme Court.

Council considers sign variances

The city council last week considered several requests for sign variances from island busineses. They denied a request by Sanibel Seafood, whose sign lies within the setback from the road, and gave them 60 days to bring their sign into compliance with the city's graphic ordinance.

The council granted an extension until January 15, 1980 to 4015 Gulf Drive (formerly Casa Yurques Motel) to bring their sign into compliance with the qualification that they do whatever they can to maintain a sea grape tree in front of the property.

The council continued variance requests from the Dairy Queen, Dunham's of Maine and the Lighthouse Restaurant.

Sundial gets occupational license for entertainment

The city council voted three to one, with Duane White dissenting, to allow the Sundial resort to purchase an occupational license allowing them to have bands and entertainment at that resort. The occupational license fee was set at \$500.

White was vehement in his opposition to the Sundial proposal because he felt that there were not enough restrictions on the license and because he felt the fee should be three times as high. Goss' motion included a provision that a yearly review of the license was mandatory.

Goss told the council that the conception of Sundial was different from anything they foresaw when they were drafting the land use plan. "Beach life, as much as I

regret it, has changed," he said, adding that he would hate to see a "Nassau-type environment spring up on Sanibel's

Sundial controller, Adele Daw, told the council that the license was just to accomodate resort guests who might want entertainment at banquets and would be limited to guests. Daw said that Sundial was willing to rope off the area to the beach to prevent intruders if the entertainment were held by the pool.

Goss brought up the problem of background checks into entertainers because he felt "the criminal question was one of the things you have to look out for in the entertainment business.'

Punk Trees, Brazilian Peppers outlawed

An ordinance proposing to outlaw planting of the Australian pine tree, the Brazlian pepper and the melaleuca tree drew sharply divided opinions from council members last week. The proposed law stated that anyone who planted one of the three species would be subject to a fine of up to \$50 and-or a maximum jail sentence of 60 days. Council member Francis Bailey disagreed sharply with the inclusion of Australian pine trees in the

"The Australian pine tree has been part of this island for many years-it is the only tree that grows up in the air," he stated, adding that he thought if an all-out effort was mounted, the island could completely eradicate the cajeput or malaleuca tree

Councilman Goss agreed with Bailey, saying that the pine tree, in his opinion. was aesthetically useful and provided shade--an important energy consideration. He pointed out that the pine trees were also important nesting habitats for birds.

"I'm a little surprised at council," stated Mayor Duane White."We all know what is pointed out in the land use plan about all three of these trees." White cited the danger of falling trees or tree limbs impeding possible hurricane evacuation and said that the Australian pine was preventing the proliferation of native vegetation. Goss disagreed, saying that he had a row of pines on his property and native vegetation was flourishing under them.

Island naturalist George Campbell argued that the proposed law wasn't promoting the destruction of old pine trees, just preventing the introduction of new ones. Bailey disputed White's contention that the trees were dangerous in high winds. "In past hurricanes, the only causarinas that fell were ones close to the water whose roots washed out," Bailey



Campbell pointed out that the other two species were highly toxic to humans and were making "Fort Myers allergists

A motion by Goss to pass the ordinance prohibiting the intentional planting of just

the Brazilian pepper and Cajeput trees finally passed unanimously. Goss also proposed that the Vegetation Committee should prepare an order of management for the Australian pine, including restrictions on its locaation so the trees don't constitute a public hazard.

Blaine named head building official

City Manager Warren Hyde announced to the Council last Wednesday that he had appointed the City's senior building inspector, George Blain, as the new building official. Blain replaces Harold Bassman who resigned abruptly on September 4. after a disagreement with Hyde over personnel procedures.

Bassman also held the position of City Engineer, which has been temporarily abolished. Hyde also told the Council that Blain had indicated that he did not feel the City would need to hire an additional building inspector to replace him.

Blain, a Sanibel resident, was hired as a building inspector in 1978 and was formerly employed as an electrical engineer.

Bassman's resignation brings to three the number of people who have resigned from a city position in the last six weeks.

Porto Graesser compromise approved

City council last Wednesday voted to approve a compromise recommended by a city fact-finding team in the case of Porto and Graesser against Sanibel.

In voting to approve the committee's recommendation, Council member Porter Goss told the Council that he felt the situation was unique because of its specific location (with condominiums adjacent to the property) and the activity around the parcel and therefore, in his mind, the density increase did not constitute a precedent.

The developers had requested a density of 11 units, but eventually agreed to the committee's compromise of four, in addition to the one unit they were allocated in the land use plan. The condominium project, entitled Sea Wind condominium, is located on East Gulf Drive across from Sanibel Arms West.

Emil Fray appointed to MCH Committee

Sanibel resident Emil Fray was appointed to the City's Moderate Cost Housing committee last Wednesday to replace Warren Hyde who resigned to assume the interim city manager's position. In nominating Fray, Council member Zee Butler, who is the chairman of the committee, said that she felt his presence on the committee would give that group a "better pipeline into the people who need this (moderate cost housing)." Gerald Wierman, who was defeated in his bid for a city council seat last fall, had also indicated that he would be willing to serve on the committee but Butler reminded the council that the committee was limited to a membership of seven.



fast. Then it rushes out, grabs the bait and tries to get back into the branches. That's where you either set the hook and get your fish out, or kiss that terminal tackle good-bye.

One of the big secrets to successful redfish action is to get close to those mangrove branches. The redfish feeds back under the shade of these trees, so a popping cork and bait cast four feet out could sit untouched for hours, while one cast nearby and allowed to drift closely to the trees will pay off in strikes.

It's also important to be quiet when going after these fish. They spook easily and then you might as well move on.

There are several popular places to fish for reds, but you'll need a boat for most of them. One of the best is to follow the Intracoastal Waterway until you get to Marker 18, then head south for the opening into the Sanctuary. Work

the creek in there. Another good place can be found by following the northern set of powerlines and working your way into the Halloway Bayou area. This is a branch system of good territory for reds. It's quiet up there and often has snook and trout as well.

Down around Tarpon Bay, go inside and work the Ladyfinger Lakes region. The waters get shallow in there, so watch which tide you're traveling with.

Speaking of tides, stick to the last couple of hours of the rising and the first couple of the falling hours. This way, you work both sides of the high tide when most redfish are back in the "woods" feeding.

We are all waiting to see the redfish make a healthy

It's about that time again in the late summer when redfish are supposed to start appearing around the passes and along the mangrove islands. The big question is whether or not the reds will make a comeback and provide the popular kind of fishing they have over the years.

Many of us who fish the islands in upper Pine Island Sound think that the red tide experienced by the waters last fall hurt the spring redfish run, but it's possible that the problem could be carried over into this fall as well.

As the snook fishing begins to decline over the next few weeks, many fishermen will turn to the redfish. I have always felt that the redfish are just as good eating as the snook and are somewhat easier to catch.

There are already reports of reds showing up around Tarpon Bay and up in Charlotte Harbor, but I haven't seen a single red come in from the middle ground between the two points. That doesn't mean that the reds aren't out there. though, so this week let's discuss some of the methods and places you might try to catch a few of these fish.

First, for tackle, about any servicable medium spinning or casting outfit will do. I like 12-pound test line and 30pound leader with a cork about 24 inches above a 3-0 hook. I like to fish the mangroves; casting close to branches while drifting in a small pigfish or large shrimp should do the trick if there are any reds in the area.

Remember, just as with the snook, the redfish is an ambush feeder. It likes to get settled back into the mangroves, close to where the incoming tide brings food in




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
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

Naves get approval for duplex

The City Council last week gave a

convoluted approval to Chuck and Barbara Nave to construct a duplex in an area that was rezoned from duplex to single family housing under Sanibel's land use plan. The approval was granted with the condition that the second unit would be subject to moderate cost housing guidelines "when and if" they are established. The Naves will also be required to supply the City with construction costs and the unit may only be rented annually:

The Naves contended that their situation was unique because the area, just off Casa Ybel Rd., contains only duplexes and they are "land-locked" -- unable to buy any adjoining land to give them enough square footage for two units. The Naves wanted a decision Wednesday so they could qualify for the October rate of growth allocations.

"Don't you think you're putting the Naves in an impossible situation?" White asked. "You're asking them to buy a pig in a poke. Suppose they build a duplex and can't comply, what happens then?"

"Then it becomes a single family home," Goss replied.

Barbara Nave told the council that the duplex, because of its location, was locked into rentability. She told the council that four months ago, they had estimated that they would have to charge \$350 for each unit to cover their costs. Each unit is approximately 900 square feet.

Goss told the Naves they had three choices: "You can build a single family house; you can wait for the moderate cost 'ousing guidelines to be established or you can take a chance. The option is up to you."

White dissented with the majority ruling because he told the council they were not being responsible. Goss defended his motion because, although the council has turned down duplexes in other areas, in this case, "there's a community benefit." City Attorney Neal Bowen told the council that, in his opinion, there was a potential for a real legal nightmare.

Builder Bill Frey, who was in the council chambers on another matter, commented that the whole situation was difficult for him to comprehend. "Ve've been tryingfor moderate cost housing for two or three years," he said and "here the Naves are willing to put up a duplex in an area that won't support more. During the time we're treading water, inflation is catching up with us at the rate of one or two percent in the building field."

Frey argued against Goss' proposal, saying it meant that the council was losing the opportunity for two moderate cost units. "You're going from two birds in the

hand to one bird," Frey stated. Realtor Don Bissell, also present for another hearing, told the council that the land had all been zoned for duplexes and that there had never been a single family home built in the area. "Now we're asking people to build a non-conforming use up there (with single family zoning) when you have an area that's duplex zoning."

The Naves did not indicate to the council what their ultimate decision might be.

The Police Department will also offer the Sanibel Police Department Physical Fitness Test to the first 30 entrants to the event. The test is open to children 12 and over.


Sanibel residents and children of families working on the Island are eligible to enter the Olympics. Refreshments and hotdogs will be served to all participants.



shelling tips

We don't often think of the oyster as being a very desirable shell to add to a collection, but there are a couple of kinds you might want to look for while on the beach.

I have always felt that the oyster shells you find washed up on Sanibel and Captiva Islands are interesting because they tend to look like paws. Actually, many people get the

small coon oyster shells and the kitten's paw mixed up, because they do look similar when under an inch or so in size

What I look for when examining oyster shells is the color. I tend to favor the black oyster shells and there are plenty around on our beaches. One of the best things about adding the oyster shell to your collection is that you don't have to take live ones. The dead shells are clean and easily examined. If you do come upon an oyster bed while looking for some unusual shells and find a live one, you're going to have some cleaning to do and chances are it won't be as good as a dead one.

I'm not talking about using oyster shells as your prime display item, but as background material. You will find several shades of black and white oyster shells, and as a base for displays or designs, the lowly oyster is a fine tool for you.

The beach line on Upper Captiva Island seems to have about as many of the coon oyster shells as anywhere I can think of. It's a long, pretty and usually deserted beach. You'll need to take your own boat up there, or rent one, to comb this beach, however, since there are no roads or bridges leading to this island.

Good shelling this week - and keep an eye out for those oyster shells. They're an interesting addition to any collection.

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

When the Ohio Express made an appearance at a local night spot recently a man from the audience jumped on stage to join the band in a few of their classics—the most memorable of which is of course that old, infamous ode to pubescent infatuation, "Yummy, Yummy, Yummy, I Got Love In My Tummy."

you're dead a very long time."

Strangely enough, the impromptu musician knew all the notes to the oldies and even knew all the words - a feat few of us can claim eight years after a tune slides from the charts. The reason behind the man's nostalgic musical expertise in golden oldies, and the reason behind the crowd's ecstatic rise to their feet, is the fact that the man who jumped from the audience was none other than Jim Pfahler -the Ohio Express' original organist.

The hefty, slightly balding Pfahler is fortunately not going the route of many post-adolescent rock n' rollers. At 31, along with wife Pam and daughter Phaidra, Jim leads a relatively peaceful existance on Sanibel where he serves as President of Pro-Com Security Systems. But he remembers the old days, "When Jimi Hendrix couldn't get a gig," and, "Tiny Tim was carrying his ukelele around in a grocery sack," like they were yesterday.

At the age of 14 Jim began playing that old time rock n roll and it was an accepted fact that sooner or later destiny would pluck him from the grasp of obscurity and drop him in front of that big light show in the sky. After "playing all of Ohio and half of the Midwest," Jim and the Ohio Express were indeed "discovered" by Cameo Parkway Records - the same company that made Chubby Checker the patron saint of chiropractors everywhere.

Unfortunately for the Express, however, the company folded shortly after recording "Beg, Borrow, and Steal" for the group - a tune that Jim is convinced should have been

"reeealy big." But never mind. The band had nowhere to go but up. And up they went like a bubble gum rocket. They signed with the William Morris Agency. They made appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show, the Johnny Carson Tonight show and American Bandstand. "Yummy. Yummy" hit the charts both here and abroad - and stayed there. It was number one in Japan. A group in Germany released a translated version. And the offers poured in

Bubble Gum music, according to Jim, was an invention of some very bright agency people. "We did our own other stuff at gigs," recalls Jim, "and people didn't know who we were unless we told them. We knew that 'Yummy, Yummy' was silly and we laughed - all the way to the bank!"

The offers for commercials rolled in too. Weiners, deodorants, Rice Krispies, and soda pop were all sold to the Express bop beat. "We were all absolutely crazy," says Jim. The Who and the Young Rascals were just two of the groups the Ohio Express headlined with, and a career highlight came when the Express packed the Jacksonville Gator Bowl with 85,000 screaming fans. "Screaming," recalls Jim, "was very 'in' back then."

Jim made hay while the sun shined and then left it all behind eight years ago. "I always knew it was just for awhile," he says. "I never imagined myself being a rock n' roll star all my life. Nothing in life is ever for certain forever."

Jim returned to Mansfield, Ohio, married his childhood sweetheart, (Police Chief John Butler's daughter Pand and returned to school. Today he has a degree in elementary education, although he has never even taught for a day. He has also turned down offers to produce for Columbia Recording Company ("The job was in Manhattan, and I knew I couldn't stand the nuts New York lifestyle.") and to

get back with the band ("They're thinking about moving to Florida and renaming themselves The Orlando Express'.") What he HAS done is work with the Jiffy Photo Company, first in Ohio and later in Fort Pierce. Florida until something happened that literally changed his life.

One day while working in the Fort Pierce, Jiffy Photo store Jim was held up by two hoodlums. Finding himself nose to barrel with an Army automatic 45, knowing that the store had no interior alarm system and no direct line to the police department, was absolutely the most "incredibly helpless feeling" he had ever experienced. Fortunately, the hoodlums chose only to relieve the store of \$3500 worth of camera equipment and \$600 cash, but the experience had left its mark and Jim Pfahler was a changed man

"I found myself getting apprehensive around strangers after that," recalls Jim, "and just generally itchy. I decided it wasn't worth the effort. I had been learning about security systems and I just decided to get out of cameras and into alarms."

As president of Pro-Com Security Systems Jim has acquired "A great feeling of accomplishment." His company protects over 30 million dollars worth of property on the Island alone and Jim truly feels that he is in the "Peace of mind" business. "After all," he says, "people out here don't live, in glass houses anymore. People believe that they do and it bothers me because I know that it just isn't true. There's thousands of people coming over that bridge and it's very likely that there's some bad ones."

Today Jim's organ stands quietly retired in a bedroom closet under boxes of security equipment. He seldom plays anymore, enjoying his music through the stereo instead. It's o.k. though, nothing is for certain forever—not even rock n

Sanibel Library opens Oct. 1

The Sanibel Public Library will reopen on October 1. At that time, non-residents and visitors who are not library members will be asked to pay an annual fee of \$5. The new fee replaces the current \$10 refundable deposit. This deposit was put into effect to cover the cost of lost or unreturned books and replacements. Many visitors, impressed by the library service, have donated their deposits and thus helped to defray operating costs.

The new user's fee will help offset budget cuts imposed by Lee County. No budget money is available for the purchase of new books and the library requires funds, not only for adult fiction and non-fiction, but for juvenile and reference books as well. Many reference books have to be replaced on an annual

Inflation has affected the price of books; the average hardcover book now costs in excess of \$10, with reference volumes costing considerably more. The library's book budget has averaged \$6,000 annually. excluding reference books and subscriptions to periodicals. The new user's fee will help provide these funds.
