Leap year brings gasoline increase


Thanks to leap year and a booming tourist season area gas stations may manage to squeeze by the month of February without exausting their precious allocations of gasoline.

The State Energy Office has announced that an extra 152,000 gallons of gasoline will be distributed to dealers in Lee, Charlotte and Collier counties this month, bringing to 440,000 the number of gallons released in the Lee county area in February from the Florida counties reserve pool.

The increased allocation amounts to about two percent more gasoline than the county would normally receive. Federal law mandates that five percent of a state's total monthly gasoline allottment be set aside in a reserve pool, which is then later doled out where deemed necessary toward the end of the month.

Although Sanibel spokesmen have met with Representatives Frank Mann and Skip Bafalis, local energy officials, and an administrative aid to Senator Chiles to request extra allocations for the Islands, it is uncertain how much of Lee County's extra gasoline will actually be delivered here. Assistant City Manager Gary Price said yesterday he had not been informed as to how the determination for local allocation would be made.

Island service stations have been plagued with gas lines for the last few weeks and most have been limiting hours of operation to mornings only in order to conserve their monthly allocations.

A lonely jogger takes long, sweeping strides along the water's edge, gliding past early morning beach strollers and leaving waffled footsteps as his Nike shoes meet the wet sand.

Beads of sweat form on the runner's forehead and upper lip and glisten in the morning sun. Breathing becomes slightly more labored with each step. The runner's intense concentration is seemingly undisturbed by the seagulls flapping and scurrying out of his path or the shellers nonchalantly collecting treasures along the long, uninterupted sand track.

Another runner nearing from the opposite direction catches the first's attention for a moment. Both nod and smile as they cross paths and continue on their course.

Jogging continues to grow in popularity as men and women of all ages take up the sport under the encouragement of physicians, psychologists and other joggers. The sport has been said to cure chronic headaches, lower blood pressure, strengthen muscles, lower pulse and improve the stroke volume of the heart.

pools, the show was moved indoors with a different theme the next year after the new restaurant was completed.



Jogging

Running" writes the most important single indicator of overall health is cardiovascular endurance, which running develops. "Running uses large thigh and leg muscles in rhythmic fashion at a personally controlled weight. This is a requirement for safely developing maximum cardiopulmonary function," writes the author.

'Running helps your entire body feel better -- not just your legs and lungs. When you run regularly you feel lithe, springy and energetic. You have a sense of power obtainable from few other sources. Furthermore, an easy run of a few miles can cure minor indispositions - a headache, an upset stomach a hangover. Once, when a friend told me he wasn't feeling well, I asked him whether he was going to see a doctor. 'Running is my doctor,' he replied," writes author Jim Fixx.

The specific physical benefits of jogging are considerable. The nerves become more efficient at transmitting impulses and activate more muscle fibers, according to Fixx. Muscles become stronger enabling faster and stronger contractions. The adjacent arteries sprout new branches and the capillaries become more dense.

Blood clotting ablility is enhanced through jogging also, according to Fixx. It has been proven that certain libids, such as cholesterol and triglycerides associated with heart disease become less concentrated.

A continued running program helps the heart become a more efficient organ. The heart muscle fibers lengthen, allowing chambers to enlarge and pump more blood with each concentration. The exercise also produces lower blood pressure during the resting phase.

The lungs are also affected by jogging. As exercise begins, the lungs' blood vessels dialate, expanding the area through which oxygen passes into the bloodstream. If running is continued, the breathing muscles become stronger and more efficient, Fixx writes.

It has also been shown the specific in-

dicators of aging, which are a maximum heart rate, oxygen processing ability and pumping power of hearts, did not increase in middle aged men on a ten-year jogging program. A California opatholmologist believes jogging reduces incidents of upper respiratory infections, Fixx writes.

In addition to the physicial benefits of running, a California psychiatrist claims success in using jogging as a treatment for depression. addiction drug schizophrenia.

Fixx maintains running also indirectly helps prevent cancer because runners rarely smoke. Taking all physical and emotional benefits into account, the facts that jogging is possible almost anywhere

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with practically no equipment and costs it's nothing the proper equipment and almost nothing, makes the sport all that more appealing.

However, some medical professionals believe running is dangerous, in fact, almost deadly.

"There is no evidence that coronary arteries can be protected against vigorous exertion," states Dr. Meyer Friedman, a their lives by jogging. Jogging is doing exactly what high blood pressure does. It asks the heart to beat more vigorously."

procedure can't overcome. Some people encounter problems with their feet and legs because they don't wear high quality jogging shoes. It is also important

warm up and cool off gradually. Many people don't take the time to unwind gradually and develop abnormal cardiac conditions. Someone who is not accustomed to jogging should start out walking and work up slowly.

Other problems people encounter when beginning a jogging program include attempting too much too soon on a hard surface without performing necessary stretching exercises beforehand.





Some of her work will be included in a book about contact sheets to be published this year by Lustrum Press. Hitchcock and produced by David O. Selznick on Sunday, February 24, at the Community Association Building, Show time is 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$2 in advance, \$2.50 at the door, and \$1.50 for children under 12.

"Spellbound" is based on a novel by Francis Beeding with photography by George Barnes and screenplay by Ben Hecht. Music is by Miklos Rosza with a film dream sequence designed by Salvador Dali. The stars are Ingrid Bergman, Rhonda Fleming, Leo G. Carroll, Michael Checkhov.

The enormous success of "Spellbound" continues for four major reasons: its use of psychoanalysis in a romantic melodrama; its imaginative staging of a dream sequence by Salvador Daili; its musical score; and Hitchcock's genius for maintaining suspense despite the sentimental involvement of his major characters. Audiences are much more inured today to the complexities of dementia praecox than they were in 1945, and yet the forthright presentatin of the hero's aberrations are so entertainingly presented that whatever naiveties exist in the script are easily ignored.

In an era of glamour figures, Ingrid Bergman could be accepted as a doctor in an insane asylum, and Gregory Peck costarred as the quirky pseudopsychiatrist haunted by guilty dreams. In fact, "Spellbound" is enormous fun, crammed with veiled hints in the dialogue about madness, and the masterful photography (George Barnes) is replete with images of

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gleaming knives, the glint of a razor, and the terrifying symbolisms to be found in parallel lines. If anything, one might be slightly disappointed when the reasons for Peck's behaviour turn out to be less horrific than expected. It must be remembered, too, that public interest ran high during the 1940's regarding the behaviour of asylum inmates, for the tragic plight of war-shocked veterans was very much in the news. Bergman and Peck were formidable enough as a romantic team to bring convincing grandeur and sympathy to their characters and their first embrace made screen history, literally opening doors into the spectator's subconscious.

Miklos Rosza's lush musical score was additionally historic, utilizing the eerie sound of a theremin, an electronicallycontrolled instrument, created by a Dr. Hoffman.

On Sunday afternoon, February 24, at 3 p.m., a concert of Japanese music featuring three artists from Florida State University will be presented by the Fort Myers Music Teachers Association in the auditorium of Edison Community College. Miss Yoko Sato and Miss Mieko Suzuki are from the Tokyo University of the Arts, and are Artists-in-Residence in the School of Music at the Florida State University where they teach and perfrom on the Japanese koto and shamisen. They will be assisted by Dr. Dale A. Olsen, associate professor of ethnomusicology and shakuhachi artist. The concert, open to the public, will feature representative classical compositions for the koto (a 13string zither instrument introduced into Japan from China about 700 A.D.), the shamisen (a three-string lute or banjo type instrument of Chinese origin), and the shakuhachi (an end-blown bamboo flute), ranging from the 17th to the 20th centuries. This is a rare opportunity to see and hear

these unusual instruments. The musicians will perform in costume. Although there is no specific admission charge, donations will be accepted and will be most appreciated. The presentation is an effort on the part of District X, Florida State Music Teachers Association, to raise moneys for the state scholarship fund. 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
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


Collograph exhibit at Art Fac Gallery

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



\$10,000 earned just over \$650 in interest las t year. I did not withdraw any of the interest nor did I have the bank enter the \$650 in my savings account passbook. Do I have to pay tax on the interest?

ANSWER: Yes. The fact that interest is not actually removed from the savings account or entered in a passbook will not render the interest nontaxable. The doctrine of "constructive receipt" requires that both cash and accrual basis taxpayers repoort any income credited or made available without restriction during the year. Interest is considered constructively received as it is earned, not when withdrawn or entered in a passbook.

single candle gives off in a one foot area. The ideal temperature would be somehwere around the 70's during the day and 60's at night. Try and keep the soil uniformly moist but never wet. The-Chinese Evergreen will do better dry than wet. If the choice came down to between the two, you would do best to let it dry somewhat between waterings. As for feedings, an every two month's schedule would be best. However, if you are keeping your Chinese Evergreens in very low light siutations, it would be my recommendation to let feedings go to perhaps twice a year. Once in the early spring, the other in mid summer. This is due to the lower metabolic rate of the plant's system due to the low light environment they are living in.

The disease factor of the Chinese Evergreen is remarkably good. They suffer very little from insects and pests in the home. However, a common disease that will sometimes plague the Chinese Evergreen, is bacterial leaf spot. This disease looks like a dark brown spot on the leaf with a yellow ring around the spot. The remedy is to keep the foilage dry and improve the air circulation around the plant. If the infected leaf is in very bad condition remove it from the plant.

There are many different species of the Chinese Evergreen and many different variations in leaf pattern. The Chinese Evergreen will send up flower spikes much like the spathiphyllum (Peace Lily) or the Anthirium. Look for these flowers in the early summer. Actually the flower is very tiny and is located in the spadix of the plant. If you ever have any question, please feel free to call me at 472-3125. Happed graving!

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
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

Asking someone what they would like to read about themselves in the newspaper is always a risky business their answer usually falls into one of two categories: boring or scandalous. But not Roy Davis. His favorite headline would read "ROY DAVIS HAS BEEN CLONED." And his rather novel response rolls off the tip of his tongue as though he's been waiting a long time for someone to ask him that very question.

A lot of things, in fact, roll quite glibly off the tip of Roy Davis' tongue. It was not his somber demeanor as a student that won the intrafraternity fundraising joke-athon back at Florida Southern. And it's not his serious side that appeals to the promoters pushing a "Night With Roy Davis" act for Scotty's Pub. ("An Evening With Roy Davis? Not if I can help it!" says Roy Davis.)

"If I have a reputation," he says, adding, "and I have quite a few! - my reputation as a story teller is probably the biggest. I enjoy making people smile."

Roy, in fact, smiles an awful lot himself. But his is a sense of humor cultivated the hard way. "I had a heart attack several years back and I attribute a lot of my attitude to that," he says, and then cracks.."I told the doctor I was too young to have a heart attack but he wouldn't take it back!" And then the serious Roy Davis, "The heart attack made me grow up. I had a lot of time to think and re-group. I spent the first half of my life doing a lot of things and probably didn't do any of them well. I decided that in the second half of my life I would do one thing at a time."

It sounds good in theory but it's obvious that Roy has just too much energy to be as "laid back" as he professes to be. Running his Hurricane Protection business keeps him on the go in three counties. He's as active as time permits in the Island chapter of the Lions Club, he's learning to play golf, he plays all kinds of musical instruments - drums, harmonica, guitar, piano, and bass to name a few - but, in typical Roy Davis fashion, prefers to play medleys over concertos. Tasting each of Life's Tidbits rather than stuff himself with the Life Main Course.


Roy came to Sanibel some 10 years ago "in search of utopia just like everybody else," and found it "a good place

Despite the easy smile and fast jokes it's obvious that Roy is a multifaceted man with a deep concern for the Islands and their future survival. ("No one writes Sanibel Island anymore - they just write Sanibel.") He is concerned about his business and his customers. ("We've built our reputation on service not advertising.") And he's concerned about living a long and useful life - but not enough to give up smoking and partying and staying up all night long with friends. "There's some fantastic people on Sanibel and I really enjoy my life here," he says. "If I fall down dead tomorrow at least I'll be smiling."





What's new for you

What was the value of shrimp caught in the United States in 1977? How many pounds of tuna fish were caught in 1977? How many commercial fishermen were employed in New England, in the Gulf States, in the Pacific Coast States? In which area were there the greatest number of fishing vessels?

What are the normal daily high and low temperatures in February in Miami? The highest and lowest temperatures on record in March in Miami? The latest data of a freeze in Jacksonville? What is the average wind speed in March in Duluth, in Chicago, in Miami?

In the income field, what was the per capita personal income in 1965 and in 1975? How many persons had gross estates of \$60,000 to \$99,999? \$100,000 to \$499,999? Over \$1,000,000? Of what assets were three estates composed, i.e., real estate, stocks, bonds, cash, etc.? Compare the figures over the years of 1953, 1958, 1962, 1969, 1972.

The answers to all of these questions can be found in the "Statistical Abstract of the United States," issued annually by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census. The Sanibel Public Library has recently acquired the 99th edition containing statistics for the most recent period available up to mid-September 1978.

A multitude of subjects are covered under the broad headings of Population, Vital Statistics, Health and Nutrition, Education, Geography and Environment, Social Insurance and Welfare Services, Labor Force, Employment and Earnings, Prices, Elections, Energy, Science, Agriculture, and many, many, more.

The sources of all these statistics are given below each table. Preceding each section is an introduction which includes a guide to other sources of information, both governmental and private.

In the appendix is a detailed "Guide to Sources of Statistics." This includes all the government sources with many references to related subjects. For instance, under "Business," further information can be found under Economic Indexes. Investments, Manufacturers, Retail and Wholesale Trade, Scientific Resources, and Service Establishments. There are eleven government bureaus such as the Board of Governors of Federal Reserve System, Bureau of Census, Federal Trade Commission, Internal Revenue Service, and Small Business Administration. In addition are the following private sources: The Conference Board, Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., Fortune (Time, Inc.) and National Bureau of Economic Research.

Most of the statistics are for the United States only. Many tables break down the figures into regions and individual states and some into metropolitan areas and selected cities.

Many tables compare the figures over a period of a year, thereby presenting trends. For instance, the number of marriages and divorces are given every five years from 1950 to 1970, then 1972, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976, and 1977. Preceding the general text is a section called "Recent Trends." It covers the period from 1960 to 1977 for all the major subjects.


Every effort has been made to make this 1,057-page book easy to use. Right in the front is a small booklet entitled, "U.S.A. Statistics in Brief" which is a condensed supplement. In the Preface, general information is given and changes from the preceding edition noted. New tables are listed. The Table of Contents is quite detailed. A map of the U.S. showing all the census divisions is on the inside front cover; on the inside back cover is a list of other Statistical Abstract Supplements giving brief descriptions, dates and prices.

"A Guide to Tabular Presentation" explains in detail the abbreviations used, the headnotes, the footnotes, the meaning of such terms as average, median, index numbers, etc. For frequent use of the "Abstract" these explanations prove very helpful.

A most detailed index in the back completes the tools to make this "Statistical Abstract" very easy to use.

This useful book can be purchased from the Superintendant of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. It can also be consulted in the Reference Department of the Sanibel Public Library from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. every day except Sunday, and Wednesday evenings from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.


Some enterprising fishing developer should come up with an interval ownership plan for our finned friends. That way there would always be some fish swimming around during their week - no matter how bad the weather.


Not all anglers have come up with empty hooks despite the weather. There are still some trout around the Causeway, in Tarpon Bay and off of Captiva.

Canada Candidly...

I have always been proud to be a Canadian but never more than in recent weeks. The gratitude of the American people in the wake of the diplomatic coup in Iran has been overhwelming. Maybe Canada is finally coming into her own.

For years, we have had a national inferiority complex fostered by our close ties to the Old World and to the new one south of us. If it were "better" it was British; if it were "bigger" it was American. Not until the economic slide in England and the Watergate scandal in the U.S. did Canadians feel that we weren't so bad as a nation after all. As a military power, we can't cut the mustard but our diplomatic corps has always been second to none and the proof is in the safe return of six Americans without bloodshed.

A French Canadian journalist on LaPresse in Montreal has been sitting on this story since December 10. He was asked not to breathe a word and it speaks well for his fortitude and integrity that he didn't break the story until a leak came out of Washington. I see no way this event could have been kept secret once the Americans were home and in circulation again. It has had the positive effect of showing the U.S. and the world that we are more than just passive allies. I feel the U.S. needed to know that they are not alone in this crisis and to quote an old clicheactions speak louder than words. Ken Taylor, our ambassador deserves all the kudos coming to him but I believe Flora MacDonald orchestrated the whole situation. With her expertise in Ottawa and Taylor's cool head in Iran, the operation had every chance of success. When told that this country had been condemned by the Iranian governemtn, Miss MacDonald retored, "We did not design our foreign policy to suit Iran."

Some questions still intrigue me. Can the Iranians count? They must have known how many Americans were in one embassy and how many Canadians in the other. How did Taylor explain six extra members of his staff? Well, I suppose the answers to all these questions will come

out in due time. We are the first country in American histroy to be publicly commended by the U.S. House of Representatives.



"After that," he continued, "We'll begin citing violators. If they don't comply with the ordinance within seven days, we'll remove the sign."







Contributions are still pouring in for Captiva's annual big ABC (Attic, Basement, Closet) sale this Saturday, February 23 at the Captiva Community Center.

Volunteers are busily sorting, labeling, and pricing the boxes and armloads of items donated or made by Island residents.

The ropes will be down at 8:30 a.m., but experienced ABC shoppers usually arrive early for coffee and doughnuts and to browse through items on display outside the building that will be auctioned off at 12 o'clock. Tickets for a raffle may be purchased during the sale preceding the auction for the goods and services given by Captiva merchants. Specialties donated by some Sanibel merchants will be sold at a separate booth at bargain prices.

Clothing, baked goods, antiques, appliances, books, Island shells, plants and jewelry also will be offered at the sale.

Some of the more unusual items will be displayed in a huge tent and from a recently built storage shed behind the center. These offerings include two

oriental prayer rugs, a pair of bedspreads hand-made in the late 1800's, little shadow boxes filled with miniature furnishings made of shells, irons, and old "ice cream" chairs. There is also a shuffle board set with instructions retrieved from the grounds of the Island's first inn. the Captiva Lodge, built in 1910 and destroyed by fire in 1948.

A 17-foot Glaspar Airfloat boat and trailer are among the more glamorous items to feature the auction. There will also be a "silent," or "Chinese" auction where individuals may write down the price they want to pay for various items. The highest bidder will get the article.

Proceeds from the sale will benefit the Captiva Civic Association and the Captiva Memorial Library. Last year the event raised almost \$9,000.

Income from past ABC sales have enabled the Civic Association to aircondition the library and meeting hall, paint the inside and outside of the center, spend \$4,000 on new books for the library, build a ramp for the handicapped, and erect a storage shed that is now crammed with items for Saturday's sale.

CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, you'll have to get a permit to have one on a Sanibel public beach. The Fire Department on Palm Ridge Road will supply you with a fire permit for \$1.00. In addition, you'll be required to make a \$25.00 deposit, returnable the day after your beach party when the beach has been inspected for litter or debris. Make sure you clean the area thoroughly or you'll be out \$25.00! Condo owners or managers may submit a letter to the Fire Department, acknowledging that they will assume responsibility for clean up after a fire in front of their buildings. The \$25 deposit will be waived in those cir-

GATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel city limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both.), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator, he's close enough to feed on you. An alligator fed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.

FISHING

While no license is required for salt water fishing, fishing in fresh water ponds or the Sanibel River requires a Florida fishing license, available at Bailey's General Store on Periwinkle Way. The fee is \$3.75.

SHELLING

The City of Sanibel Resolution limiting the taking of shells to 2 live shells per person per species is one to be scrupulously obeyed. As a matter of fact, in order to preserve Sanibel's beautiful shelling beaches, most collectors refuse to take ANY live shells whatsoever.

SPEED LIMITS

The varying speed limits as one comes across the causeway may seem almost schizophrenic, but there is a very good reason for them. The stress and strain of traffic over the years has weakened the bridge supports (not to the point where there is any danger, fortunately) so in an effort to preserve the existing structure, the speed limits have been imposed.

They are to be taken seriously, for they are rigidly enforced by radar on a 24-hour a day basis by the Lee County Sheriff's Department. Observe them, please.

DOGGY DO'S ... & DON'TS

If you're visiting Sanibel with the family Fido in tow, all the better All family members can enjoy Southwest Florida sun and surf. The Chamber of Commerce can tell you what ac-commodations are available for families with pets. REMEMBER - wherever you are - CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR PET! The friendly reminder - "Leave nothing on the beach but footprints" - applies to dogs, too. There's no feash law on Sanibel, but of course an excitable or unruly animal is better off when controlled with a leash better off when controlled with a leash.

BICYCLE RULES

If you're not used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out for it on Sanibel. The extensive network of bike paths on the island is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path. A state law and a city or-dinance combine to PROHIBIT PARKING OR DRIVING ON THE BIKE PATH. MOPEDS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE BIKE PATHS. Planning on spending some time on a bike to enjoy the island sun and sights? Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike flag, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding. Under Florida law, bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. DRIVE SAFELY.



While Sanibel and Captiva have no hospitals, they are served 24 hours a day by a team of paramedics who are widely recognized for their competence. 

Sections showing hummingbirds in flight, taken in slow motion, are unusual.


Drumming with wings is shown with photos of ruffed grouse, and prairie chicken.
