




The District 9 windsurfing champs were on Sanibel last weekend where they vied for status - and wind.



First jewel theft arrest made

Members of the Sanibel Police Department have apprehended a man they believe was involved in a \$250,000 jewel heist that occurred early last Thursday evening on Sanibel.

William Bryant Caldwell, 39, of Fort Myers was arrested Sunday evening by Sanibel police officers and charged with concealing stolen property. Several pieces of jewelry, including a 13 carat diamond ring, were recovered.

According to sources, Mrs. Jane Carter, of Isabel Drive on Sanibel, entered her home last Thursday evening shortly before 6 p.m. to find a man, wearing a stocking mask and armed with a gun, waiting for her inside the house.

According to police officials, the man apparently gained entry by prying open a sliding glass door.

The burglar had Mrs. Carter lie down on the kitchen floor and then tied her hands with stockings. After removing the rings from her fingers, he reportedly told her, "I know you've got a big stone. Where is it?" When Mrs. Carter did not immediately reply, the man allegedly began to threaten her and then took her into the bedroom, where she finally told him the ring was.

After taking the 13 carat ring, the intruder then reportedly laid the woman face down on a couch and tied up her feet, warning her not to move for 10 to 15 minutes.

After the burglar had left, the woman was able to free one hand and untie her feet. She then ran to a neighbor's house for help.

According to Sgt. Ray Rhodes, the apprehension of Caldwell was the result of a joint effort between the entire Sanibel Police Department, concerned Island residents and the Lee County Sheriff's Department.

Investigation into the incident is continuing and other arrests may be forthcoming.

Council opposes county park tax

Sanibel's City Councilmembers indicated last week that they were unhappy with the proposed ad valorum tax millage increase which would fund parks and recreational facilities in Lee County.

The tax increase, 34 of a mill yearly for 10 years, would generate approximately \$38,890,000.

The tax is based on property value, not population - the estimated growth predicted for Lee County is 7.5 per cent each year. Each year, the revenues from the tax would be divided into five categories, and the money split according to this formula: 40 per cent of the revenue to be used for acquisition and development of 10 area parks, including Turner Beach on Sanibel; 20 per cent returned to each individual planning district to be used at their discretion with the approval of the County; 15 per cent of the tax money would be used for libraries; 10 per cent of the dollar intake for bike paths and 15 per cent for operation and maintenance.

This plan has been approved by the Lee County Community Services Advisory Committee, which is comprised of 15 representatives from throughout Lee County. (Resident Conrad Lickel is Sanibel's representative.) The proposed tax increase has also been supported by the cities of Cape Coral and Fort Myers.

Bill Hammond, Lee County Community Services Director, indicated to Council that the program was designed with "a main factor of flexibility. Our main intent is to see everyone receives their fair share."

Councilmember Zee Butler said, "I have one basic question: what are you really proposing? Are you trying to Mickey Mouse this thing around and try to give little pieces out in a carrot-and-stick operation?"

Hammond answered, "We're trying to play catch-up. We are realizing we are deficient in many areas. We should have been in this position with regard to County park facilities 10 years ago."

Butler told Hammond that the categories to receive the proposed tax money were already being actively pursued on Sanibel with the City's money. She cited libraries and bike paths as examples. "It seems to me that if you really want to acquire regional parks you will concentrate stictly on that," she said.

"I have trouble with getting us locked into a millage increase for 10 years because I don't know if you're asking for 38 million from the voters or a blank check," Butler continued. "You've only figured in a 7.5 per cent increase in population. Nothing in here says what you'll use the money for if there is an increase in population. I'm very wary."

Councilman Duane White also seemed concerned over the proposal. "I'm willing to say to you today that the voters of Lee County will never support this, and I will fight you teeth and toenail unless you provide a definite program and project detailing all the specifics," he said.

"Your big job is to come back with an understandable project that the people will understand," he added.

Mike Roeder, Lee County Planning Director, told the Council, "I think this is a detailed project, and I don't know how much more detailed we could get until we actually get into it."

Hammond assured the Council, "I think with the district representatives, and the five member board which will be established to govern the distribution of monies, I think there will be enough checks and balances to make it come off."

Resident Gordon Kiddoo said, "This thing won't sell because residents of this Island have no confidence in County government. We now have a competent government. I'm not prepared to turn over my money to be administered in a half-baked program. The County should get on

with running their own programs

Planning Commissioner Judy Workman reminded the Council that the Planning Commission had endorsed the program and recommended that the City Council endorse it.

Conrad Lickel, Sanibel's representative to the Community Services Advisory Committee said, "Between now and the time this list becomes a question on a referendum there's tremendous information which will be distributed so the individual voter will be knowledgeable and will be able to vote with confidence."

The tax is not expected to go to public referendum until the spring or fall of 1981. In the meantime, petitions must be circulated and at least 5,200 signatures gathered indicating Lee County residents' interest in having it go to public referendum.

Estuaries ownership won't be determined until '81


The determination of who is the rightful owner of over 5,000 acres of the "Estuaries" development site will probably have to wait until the Florida Supreme Court decides if the city of up to 73,000 people should be allowed, according to the circuit court judge handling the case.

The Honorable Thomas Reese, who is hearing the mortgage foreclosure action against Estuary Properties, Inc., has said that the high court ruling is necessary because of claims by Estuary Properties that the State of Florida and Lee County have taken possession of the property through "inverse condemnation."

On May 18, 1978 trustees for the property

in question known as the "Windsor Tract," sued Estuary Properties, alleging that \$940,000 in mortgage payments were never made. But last February the company responded by accusing the government of "taking" the land by not allowing the development, and said the State broke a 1970 promise which would have allowed the dredging of canals through environmentally sensitive mangroves.

Reese's statement means it could be 1981 before ownership of the 5,000 acres is determined. The Florida Supreme Court is presently considering whether the State and County must be forced to issue development permits for the Estuaries, and a ruling is not expected for at least six months.



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




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Boggles and blurs

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
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Cars, cars, cars



"Slick" dies

"Slick," the timberwolf that won the hearts of thousands, is dead.

The goodwill ambassador to the wolf world who appeared at the Sanibel Community Association last January was killed by a county dog warden recently in Ontario County, N.Y.

According to a report in the Lake Region Audubon Society Newsletter, Slick was running loose and made his way from owner John Harris' yard to a neighboring farm. The farmer reportedly called the sheriff who summoned the warden.

The report said that Slick had not bared his teeth nor shown signs of vici. sness prior to the shooting. The warden tried to cover up the incident, the report claimed, by having Slick's body incinerated at a local veterinarian's office before an attempt was made to notify the owner.

Shortly after the incident, John Harris was summoned to court to face charges of failure to protect the public from an attack by a wild animal. Harris countered with a \$1 million suit, the results of which are pending:

When Harris brought Slick to Sanibel last year, over 300 people howled to the good-natured wolf in an attempt to get him to howl back. Slick remained silent then, as he now will forever.





Duffy's quick thinking saved more than a truck and possible brush fire, though. There was a barn filled with horses sitting dangerously close to the truck.







Henry Dean, Esq., Hearing Officer Florida Dept. of Natural Resources 202 Blount St., Tallahassee, Fla. 32301

Dear Sir:

One of our weekly newspapers, on July 3rd, reported in some detail on your recommendations to the Governor and Cabinet on the proposed beach renourishment project on Captiva Island.

The press account seemingly was based upon a copy of your "12 page report" made available to them. I was chagrined that our other newspaper and myself were not made privy to it. You will recall that my brief testimony at the May 28th public hearing was uniquely confined to the advertised topic - establishment of the erosion control line required by Section 161.161 F.S.

The thrust of my presentation was the preservation of the integrity of Florida's splendid sovereignty land policy. That has been the well known goal of extensive correpondence with DNR and the former Coastal Coordinating Council for the past

decade.

Accordingly, it was most disappointing that no mention was made of the validity of my suggestion that the application of the equitable ownership vesting of the artificially accreted land in this case was inappropriate. You will recall that I urged that such a provision in Chapter 161.141 F.S. failed to recognize the valid distinction between the two types of artificial accretions made by the Florida Court in the Sidenor v. Pensacola case as discussed in Professor Maloney's 1973 report to DNR.

It is my continuing belief that, in light of that Court ruling, the type of artificial accretion involved in the Captiva case can vest title to it only in the State. I also feel that there is insufficient established "public benefit" involved in this particular instance to warrant the alienation of that sovereign land - in accord with the Florida Constitution.

Because of the imminent July 15th date set for the Cabinet's consideration of your recommendations, a copy of this letter is being furnished directly to the Governor for relay to the Cabinet.

Your courtesy to me at the May 28th

hearing is deeply appreciated.

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Accessibility: major barrier to handicapped

Last week we addressed accessibility to food establishments by the handicapped for one of their basic needs, food. This week we will discuss the accessibility to restaurants by the handicapped, for food that is served by a waiter or obtained from a buffet table. We do not address the quality of food or the service provided by the many fine restaurants mentioned or not mentioned here. If the restaurant is not mentioned it usually means they have an unpaved parking area that is unsuitable for the handicapped, or there is an elevation change between the parking area and the entrance and the restaurant, or the handicapped person is unable to reach the buffet table to make food selections of personal choice. These obstacles are of little concern to people without physical impairments, but they are a matter of great concern to people in wheelchairs.

The most distressing problem barring handicapped people from areas that provide meals, continues to be small elevation changes at ramps or at doorways. These elevation changes are usually less than four inches between surfaces and would not be noticed by the average person. It seems ironic that the general public, when polled, are seemingly sympathetic and aware of these problems, yet many of these elevation changes could be corrected for a nominal sum, probably for a lot less than an increase in premiums caused by an injury.

The other access problems preventing accessibility to the handicapped are unpaved handicapped parking spaces, entrance doors that do not open automatically, and ramps that have too great a pitch. Realistically, these conditions will not improve until we show the eocnomic feasibility of such improvements, or until the government adopts a uniform building standard, such as: ANSI 117.11. You can hasten the day when architectural barriers to the handicapped are eliminated by urging your Congressional representatives and local Council people to adopt this single uniform standard.

We have visited or eaten at every establishment serving food on Sanibel and Captiva. The restaurant we selected to

discuss is Sundial because it happens to have all the necessities that provide good accessibility without assistance to the handicapped.

We found the parking area fully paved and without elevation changes. Because handicapped people have a tremendous mobility problem, we would suggest that the management of Sundial consider designating a handicapped parking area adjacent to the walkway leading to the elevator. This minimal cost provision will enhance the visit of the handicapped to this fine restaurant.

The walkway at ground level, to the right of the automobile ramp, is paved and without elevation changes. You can proceed to the end of this walkway and turn left through the arch to the elevator on the right. The automatic door of the elevator serves as the entrance door to the establishment.

Pressing button number two on the elevator panel will cause the elevator to activate and take you to the restaurant level. Incidently, the elevator button number is also in braille to aid the blind. Two turns to the right from the elevator brings you to the hostess, who will seat you at a table overlooking the Gulf of Mexico. If a buffet is being served you may select your meal from the buffet table, otherwise you may select food from the menu. The ambience of this fine restaurant is a great morale booster for my Rotary Ann who happens to be handicapped. In good conscience we recommend the Sundial Restaurant, as it meets all the accessibility requirements of the handicapped.

There are other fine restaurants available to the handicapped - but they all have architectural barriers that make other assistance to the handicapped a necessity. They would require assistance to open doors and-or to cross unpaved parking areas to the restaurant doors at the following establishments: Beachview Country Club, Coconut Grove, Cafe Orleans, Scottys' Pub, 'Tween Waters Inn, The Timbers, The Quarter Deck, and The French Quarter.

There are many good restaurants on Sanibel and Captiva





that do not meet the criteria for accessibility by the handicapped. Frankly, we patronize these places and will continue to do so as long as we can enter them safely, enjoy the food and the ambience of the establishment. It is not our purpose to embarass anyone into supplying access to their establishment for the handicapped. Hopefully, the best examples of accessibility in the areas of food, clothing, shelter and places of worship will first of all inform, and then motivate business people in these areas to corre conditions barring the handicapped where and when proves to make good economic sense.

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
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There's a shelling joke going around that claims there are two good places to shell in the world: one is Sanibel Island and the other is the Florida-Georgia borderline - that's where the live shells get dumped after eight hours of riding in a can in the trunk of the car.

There is another joke about shelling that says the maids who clean up the Island motel rooms have the best collections imaginable. A shell that looks so beautiful after long hours of searching sometimes just doesn't fit into the suitcase when the "big bird" takes off for Chicago.

Shelling is a strange hobby. It's a lot like rock hunting. You get the casual collectors and off-and-on collectors and then those who live just to walk a beach and find something that doesn't match their hundreds of shells back home.

I think that the funniest people are the husbands who don't understand what it's all about. They'll sit impatiently under the shade of a tree while their wives inspect every inch of shell along a two-mile walk. The husband of a rock hound will know exactly what I'm talking about.

Some of the best shellers I have ever worked with are little girls around 10 or 12 years old. They are serious, studious and close to the beach in stature. In other words, they can see shells that most of us can't pick out of a shell mound. Little boys of that age are happier looking at the water, checking out the bordering beach and so on, but your best shellers every time will be the tiny gals.

While I'm thinking of it, I want to relate a story told to me a couple of weeks ago by a fella who operates a shell shop in Northern Florida.

He said that he had been visiting Sanibel and Captiva Islands for twenty-some years and never failed to marvel at the shells, even though he sold hundreds of shells in his shop

I believe that the two stories he told me will amuse you. The first was that years ago he used to scoop up the most common of shells on the beaches while he vacationed here and then put them in paper cups in his shop. Nothing fancy here, just old worn clam shells and the like, but he could sell all he wanted to for 65 cents a cup.

Of course I was interested in his collector shells and most of them were imported from the South Seas area of the for more information.)

Pacific. The gaudy, big and bright shells still come from that area of the world, while our local collector shells are smaller, but just as bright. It all depends upon what you consider valuable for your collection.

A couple of weeks ago I mentioned skin diving for shells along the surf line, and it really paid off for a family out with me the other day. It was one of those very calm days when there was nothing coming up on the high beaches. The shells can't get to where most shellers walk without a shove from a few waves. However, you can find a great number of shells in about two feet of water just where the beach dips down a foot or so. Anyway, these people snorkeled along the surf line, picking up various shells like nutmegs, naticas, olives and shark eyes. It really works on calm days and besides,

If possible, go to the beaches early in the morning, and remember the shelling limit of two live shells per species, per person. Enjoy the beaches!

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
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

On the water

First, you won't even notice the difference between a well made regular fiberglass rod and an UglyStik unless you are 'still'' fishing. I believe that the UglyStik was developed for fresh water bass fishing more than for saltwater use. Bass fishermen are used to sitting motionless for hours while their shiner wanders around on the bottom waiting to be eaten by a big bass. When still fishing on the bottom like that, the graphite rod is superior. But when fishing and casting for, say, trout on the grass flats, you really don't need that super sensitivity that you can pay so much extra

Another thing I have found with the new material rods is that the tips are just too light for saltwater use where the angler has to set the hook in a snook 70 feet from the boat. There are some models of special rods which are thick enough, of course, but again the marketing seems to be aimed at slim tipped fresh water use and not what you're after for brine water fishing.

The way that fishing rod materials are advancing, baron will be replaced by something even more special for the fishermen, so when it comes to buying that new rod keep in mind the many changes and select something which will give you all around fishing performance.

The day of the quality \$10 fishing rod is about over.

It used to be that a fisherman could get a fairly good outfit for \$20, but with changes in rod making over the past year or so, you had better get ready to pay more.

Modern fiberglass manufacturing techniques have given fishermen some of the most exciting advances in rod sensitivity and strength that could ever be expected from a couple ounces of petroleum derivitive.

A couple of my fishing rods are three years old and out of date compared to what's on the market now. I imagine that you have an old favorite rod around the house, and this isn't meant to make you think that you need to run out and replace it with a "miracle" rod. Keep those special rods, but when it comes time to get into the market here's some of the things to look for.

BARON. You'll hear a lot about this new type of material not only in rod making, but in everything from antenna to skiing equipment. It's basically the next step in the advancement of sophisticated fiberglass materials and, for its weight, is one of the toughest rods you can by.

I had my first experience with the baron rods several years ago when a man on my charter boat brought one along for snook fishing. Rods are rods, right? That was my feeling until I held one of my rods in one hand and a baron in the other as we drifted over the rough sand bottom of Redfish Pass. No doubt about it, the baron offered much more sensitivity.

Now for the bad part. That particular baron rod was made by Browning, of Utah, and sold somewhere in the vicinity of \$125. I had a fella from K-Mart out the other day who said his stores will carry some of the baron models for around \$80 or less, depending on who makes the models selected.

There is another material used for fishing rods called graphite and, until a year or so ago, it was considered the ultimate material in making light, strong fishing rods. The Shakespeare Company has marketed thousands of these rods called "UglyStiks" and it seems that they will go right on selling for many years to come.

I have two uglystik rods and like them both very much. But, before you plunk down your \$40-\$60 for one, let me give you a couple of observations on these black rods with clear glass tips.

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
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Traucht keeps E.S.I. swinging

"We were getting beaten 20-5 in a lot of games and we finished the season second to last," he admits.



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
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


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
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


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Cablevision controversy

City Manager Bernie Murphy addressed Councilmembers last week regarding Cablevision service on Sanibel, saying, "I'm satisfied that a letter written by William Ryan (Vice President and General Manager of Palmer Cablevision) goes a long way to answering a lot of complaints.'

Councilmembers disagreed, however, and expressed unhappiness with the Palmer Cablevision service on the Island and according to Councilmember Zee Butler "people are going to pull out."

Ryan's letter, dated June 11, stated that "each customer complaint has been addressed." He went on to explain each customer's complaint and how the problem had been rectified. Most of the complaints centered around Channel 3's poor reception.

Ryan also indicated in his letter that "by the time you receive this letter, the pick-up facilities atop the 500 ft. Pine Island Tower will have been inspected again to confirm that nothing has deteriorated since its last inspection a few months ago.'

A computer prepared study is also being conducted on the reception parameters that can be expected. However, Pyan indicated if the computer report is negative, Palmer Cablevision is prepared to construct additional microwave facilities to bring in WPBT, Channel 2 Public Broadcasting located in Miami, to replace WEDU.

However, Ryan could not be specific as

to the time frame of implementation, as the project will require frequency coordination, an application to the FCC, and ordering equipment.

Councilmember Zee Butler expressed concern that no specific time frame had been established.

"I feel the whole thing is a runaround," Councilman Duane White charged. "The people on Sanibel are not getting what they pay for. I'm tired of the complaints, and I feel an investigation should be instigated."

Murphy assured the Council, "I will ask him to be more precise and provide a time schedule," adding, "I think we're on the right track with them."

Price appointed to Housing **Committee**


Sanibel resident Nancy Price was unanimously appointed to the Housing Committee at last week's Council meeting, filling one of two vacancies on the Committee.

The remaining position will be filled at a future Council meeting.

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

Windsurfing championships

"I came here to windsurf," read the bumperstickers on cars and vans lined up in the parking lot of the Reef Motel. And surf they did, coming from as far away as Tennessee

The occasion was the 1980 District 9 Windsurfer Championships. District 9 encompasses most of the Southeastern United States and the Bahamas, but Floridians won almost every event.

The strength of Florida windsurfers is not surprising, according to Regatta Co-Chairman Jeanne Lester. "Florida used to get whipped by California all the time in the World Championships," she said, "but now, Florida is consistently coming out on top."

Californians will get their chance to better Floridians in the 1980 World match this October in the Bahamas. The first and second place finishers in last weekend's tournament on Sanibel automatically qualify for the October classic.

The importance of winning any windsurfing championship is surely measured by the personal satisfaction of the participants; there is no prize money awarded.

According to Ms. Lester, a Fort Myers area windsurfing instructor, there is a good chance that the sport will be added to the 1984 Olympics. For that reason, windsurfers must maintain their amateur status, and surf for love, not money.

Most windsurfers maintain that they feel a great freedom floating out on the water, with only the breeze to power their flight. All you need to get started, they say, is a board and a fair sense of balance.

The competition at the District 9 match was divided into three categories: Slalom,

championship racing and freestyle. "Slalom is a one-on-one competition," Ms. Lester said, "where windsurfers weave through a course of six buoys in three laps.

"Freestyle is probably the most interesting to watch. All the participants have to make up a routine of tricks in a three-minute routine almost like a gymnastics exercise, but on the water."

Some of the tricks freestylers do include: somersaults, head dips and rail rides. "The rail ride is when they turn the board over and ride on its side." "The surface to get a footing on is no wider a balance beam.



No memorials allowed

Mike Klein, Chairman of Sanibel's Vegetation Committee, appeared before City Council last week to request that a triangle of land at the intersection of Palm Ridge Road and Periwinkle Way be designated as the "Richard Beebe Memorial Park."

Councilmembers unanimously denied the request, claiming that adequate criterion for setting up memorials had not yet been explored.

Klein said that the project was first discussed two years ago with the former director of Public Works, John Goode. Plans were made at that time to place vegetation, trees, and shrubs in the triangle. Klein proposed placing a large

rock bearing a simple bronze tablet explaining Beebe's contribution to the City of Sanibel and his founding of the Vegetion Committee at the site.

Mayor Francis Bailey said that he could not support such an idea. "I have a great deal of trouble with taking someone's name arbitrarily," he said, "just because we have a ground swell of emotion. I will not support this until we get the ground rules."

"It's incumbent upon City Council to draw up these rules," Councilman Duane White pointed out.

Councilmember Zee Butler agreed, saying, "I support the direction to have our City Manager explore the situation and bring back criterion."

Klein then told the Council, "I don't want to make this a competition of who gets memorialized on Sanibel."

Planning Commissioner Fred Valtin, who was in the audience, said, "The simplest ground rule is to simply not have such a program. I recommend that the policy be adopted that the City not memorialize anyone."

City Manager Bernie Murphy was directed by Council to appoint a committee to study how other cities set up memorial programs, however, he is not to act on this direction until after the 1981 budget has been adopted.

"I think there are many more important issues," said Valtin.

Periwinkle addition denied

Sanibel realtor Bert Jenks was denied a specific amendment at City Council last week which would have allowed him to build a second story on the Weeds 'n Things building located on Periwinkle Way.

Sanibel's Planning Commission had earlier recommended denial.

"That building is so close to the road it seems to me we're compounding the problem," said Mayor Francis Bailey.

City Planner Bob Duane told the Council, "The total utilization of the parcel is more development than it can support."

The request was denied unanimously.

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

Jack Ronan, the advertising and public relations director for Sundial, has a very busy mind. So busy, in fact, that it appears to have erupted in a curly mass on top of his head.

Jack Ronan a.k.a. 'Happy Jack' of the Eastern airwaves, came to Florida four years ago to see if oranges really grew

"Ever since I was a kid," he swears, "I wanted to see an orange grow on a tree. I couldn't die without seeing that

In fact, he planned his first drive to Florida in such a way that dawn would just be breaking as he entered the Sunshine

"I stopped in Orlando," he admits unabashedly, "and asked a guy in a gas station where oranges grew on trees." But after finding the grove the service station attendant directed him to, Jack only looked "for about two seconds." The childhood wish had been fulfilled.

Jack defines his entire life as "crazy," but then philosophically adds, "We live in a crazy world. It takes a crazy person to live in a crazy world."

Part of Jack's personal craziness undoubtedly stems in part from his early career choices - namely broadcasting.

He began his media career sweeping floors in a New York radio station. "I would have done anything after high school to get into radio," he recalls. The job eventually turned into a weekend air-time show and he was on his way.

"Radio phoniness" was a professional pitfall, however, that Jack did not manage to escape. "It was unreality," he says. "I was close to living beyond my means and I didn't want to leave the unreal disc jockey world. It was low pay but all the ego you wanted."

But eventually, he met a man while doing a story who saw through it all. "I was coming out of radio and being a TV reporter," he recalls, "and I did a story on this credit manager named Bill Spencer. He spotted the phoniness in me right away and eventually managed to break me down."

Phoniness or no, Jack's future plans still include radio owning his own radio station, to be exact.

"I'd like to show people here what real good Top 40 is really like," he says, and then goes into the old time fast talk patter: "Love is love, gold is gold, look what happened when the goldfish died!"

He admits to conducting a "running commentary" while conducting Sundial business and has a tendency to chatter his own introductions to songs on the radio. "And," he says, "I love to critique the news."

The only other love that even comes close to radio in Jack's heart is sports. His pastime is memorizing media guides, the little books published by sports promoters containing every kind of information about various sports,

professional players, schedules and prizes.

"I just like sports so much," he says, "I want to know more and more." But he isn't crazy about the thought of being a play-by-play announcer: "I get too involved when I do play-by-play. I might swear or something!"

Jack was, in fact, covering a sailboat race when he met Pierre Lenders - the man instrumental in bringing him to Sundial. And Jack has apparently taken to the world of advertising as easily as he slipped into radio.

"Here," he maintains, "you don't have to take a Madison Avenue approach; you use strictly common sense. You need to throw out everything you've ever known and not try to go by the book. Mr. Lenders stresses credibility and the personnel here are allowed to be themselves, as long as they will be themselves."

Even though Jack swears he doesn't miss the limelight and claims to love his job, he admits that plans for one day owning his own radio station are never far from his thoughts. But now, you have the feeling that common sense has the upper hand in Jack Ronan's life, despite his claim to

Erosion District hires boring device

A special floating boring device was hired by the Captiva Erosion Prevention District (CEPD) last week to take core samples at possible future borrow sites.

The work was conducted on Tuesday and Wednesday, July 1 and 2, after the project was approved at an emergency CEPD meeting held Tuesday morning.

"The purpose of this meeting is to consider the modification of Tetra Tech contractors with the District to accomodate additional coring and engineering deemed necessary to evaluate the borrow sites," said CEPD Chairman Dick Butze.

"The reason for the immediate action," Butze continued, "is that we can save a lot

of money by availing ourselves of the floating equipment that is in the Sarasota area coming south (at this time)."

Erik Olsen, Senior Engineer for Tetra Tech, explained the importance of using the floating device.

"We were down in March and April taking core borings in all of the borrow sights," Olsen said. "We found enough sand, but not the quality of sand needed for the South Seas (renourisnment) project. It is important to have quality sand, as high a quality as the beach sand.

"At our two potential (dredging) sites, all our borings bottomed out at a limestone layer," Olsen continued. "The equipment we had couldn't go below that layer. The

floating equipment is equipped with a jet pump, and can probably go below the limestone.

"Also, there are a series of shell mounds lying off-shore. We'd like to identify the quantity and quality of this material," Olsen said. "We could assess the possibility of using a hopper dredge versus a cutter-head dredge, but we need to know the quanity of materials to viably assess dredging techniques."

Olsen said the cost of using the floating boring equipment would be much less if it was used now, while the unit is in this area. Since the equipment is based in New Jersey, mobilization costs run in the neighborhood of \$6,000.

The total cost of a two-day boring would come to about \$10,000, Olsen said. The savings if done now, he concluded, would be about 50-60 per cent. "We will also keep the momentum going on the project," he

CEPD members present unanimously voted to proceed with the boring. "I think it's very important to exhaust all possibilities," said project chairman Dick Stevens. "In my opinion, it would be advisable to avail ourselves of the equip-

I think we need it," said Commissioner Charlie Miller. "It's going to give us a lot of back-up information."





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


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City Attorney won't be fighting Maxwell case

Finally, Bowen said, "Nothing in this conversation should be intended as a waiver of our insurance."

Council approves power line study

The consulting firm of Smith and Gillespie, located in Jacksonville, is reponsible for the study.

Hopefully, questions regarding overhead versus underground lines, whether or not the work is actually necessary, and which is the correct way togo if it is necessary will be answered.

Councilmembers instructed City Manager Bernie Murphy to inform the consultant that they would like to know the Island wide impact of implementing the proposed overhead modification. Murphy indicated that the firm could start the work within the next two weeks and the study could feasibly be completed within the next six weeks.


Special City workshop

BEACH ACCESS

Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

On Captive Island, public beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to

South Seas Plantation.
.NOTE: STATE
PROHIBITS NUDE SUN-BATHING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, you'll have to get a permit to have one on a to get a permit to have one on a Sanibel public beach. The Fire Department on Palm Ridge Road will supply you with a fire permit for \$1. Their hours are from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. In addition, you'll be required to make a \$25 deposit, returnable the day after your beach party when the beach pas heen inwhen the beach has been in-spected for litter and debris. Make sure you clean the area

Make sole you'll be out \$25! Condo owners or managers may submit a letter to the Fire Department, acknowledging that they will assume that they will assume responsibility for cleanup after a fire in front of their building. The \$25 deposit will be waived in those circumstances.

GATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in fail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator,

he's close enough to feed on you. An alligator fed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and

FISHING

While no license is required for saltwater fishing, fishing in freshwater ponds or the Sanibel River requires a Florida fishing license available at Bailey's General Store on Periwinkle Way. The fee is \$3.75.

The City of Sanibel Resolution limiting the taking of live shells to 2 live shells per person per species is one to be scrupulously obeyed. As a matter of fact, in order to preserve Sanibel's beautiful shelling beaches, most collectors refuse to take any live shells whatsoever.

SPEEDLIMITS

There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway. and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department.

Driving or parking a motor vehicle or moped on the bike path is strictly prohibited. Violators will be ticketed. BICYCLE RULES

If you're not used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out for it on Sanibel. The extensive network of bike paths on the island is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path. A State law and City Ordinance combine to PROHIBIT PARKING OR DRIVING ON THE BIKE PATH. MOPEDS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE BIKE

Planning on spending some time on a bike to enjoy the island sun and sights? Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike flag, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding. Under Florida law, bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers.
