### Thieves get \$20,000 in gems

The second Island jewel robbery in eight days occurred last Friday evening at the Sanibei Arms West, netting the thieves jewelry and other items with an estimated value of more than \$20,000.

Ms. Heidi Wegryn Soja, daughter of Dr. Stanley Wegryn, and Mr. J. Robert Hamley, her fiancee, reportedly left their apartment at the Sanibel Arms around

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9:30 p.m. Friday evening to go to Captiva for dinner. Upon their return, around midnight, the couple found the apartment totally ransacked and numerous valuable items missing.

According to the Sanibel Police Department, entry to the apartment was apparently gained through a west window. The thief, or thieves, then exited through the sliding glass doors.

Items stolen from the apartment included an emerald pin valued at \$500, an antique cameo brooch valued at \$50,000, a diamond ring valued at \$10,000, several pearl necklaces worth more than \$1,000, three gold bracelets valued at \$2,000, to diamond earrings valued at \$2,000, to wedding bands and a set of pearl and gold earrings valued at \$1,000.

Numerous other pieces of jewelry were missing as well as an electric hairdryer, a color TV, a gold lighter, cosmetics, beer, cigarettes, ashtrays, a lamp and company records from G.E.S.T. Inc., of which Mr. Hamley is president.

A rubber raft belonging to the couple was found outside the building and may have been used to transport the stolen items from the apartment. SPD investigators were able to lift numerous fingerprints from the site and the investigation is continuing.

vestigation is continuing. SPD officials say that at this time there is no evidence linking the burglary to the July 3 jewel heist from a private residence

### Planners pan CLUP violations

Sanibel's Planning Commissioners will be recommending that City Council deny an application for a specific amendment to the land use plan (CLUP) submitted yesterday by Neal Thompson. If approved, the amendment would allow retention of an existing boat ramp and baleony constructed closer than the required setback from the water. These improvements took place at Thompson's home in the Castaways subdivision.

Thompson began construction on thesefacilities, plus a concrete block retention wall (which Planning Commissioners voted should be allowed to remain) even though his development permit as

for him to do so. Commissioner Joe Searing asked Thompson why he did indeed begin construction without having permission. Thompson responded, "It was out of ignorance."

A letter written by a City building inspector on April 17 instructed Thompson that a "stop work" order had been posted and that he was to cease all construction until a specific amendment could be obtained.

Commissioner Arthur Wycoff asked Thompson who did the construction work, and Thompson explained that he had acted as the general contractor, sub-contracting the work to various firms and individuals.





# The micro-universe of the frog is rapidly changing on Sanibel




It is during this period each year that we normally bear the choruses of breeding frogs throughout Sanibel's freshwater wetland areas and also, believe it or not, in some of the semi-saltwater areas too.

Altogether there are 12 kinds of frogs and toads found on Sanibel, but today we are going to principally discuss the large foreign interloper, the Cuban Tree Frog, Hyla septentrionalis.

This is a semi-domesticated foreign creature that has invaded Sanibel in recent years in plant pots via the nursery trade, much to the detriment of a number of native frog species. It may be found nightly, even in dry periods, in gardens that are slightly damp from sprinkling or in places where there is standing water in which it can lay its gegs.

The Cuban Tree Frogi is our largest tree frog; a big female may be four inches long, taillone to nois, when in the sitting pesture. The big female in my personal study is, perhaps erroneously, called Field, but that is her name anyway. She does a fine job of keeping the cockroach. or palmetio bugpopulation within manageable levels. This was accomplished after her species thad already wiped out the two native tree frogs of Sanibel - the Squirrel Tree Frog and the Green Tree Frog, bold of which, as recently as four of five years ago, existed around my house in huge numbers. Now it is impossible to find more than one or two and/even that is a rare occurance. The reason, of course, is that this large Cuban interloper swallows the little fellows whole. The two native species may soon be literally exterminated on Sanibel.

A very unpleasant thing about the Cuban Tree Frog is that it is toxic to the touch. It has a poisonous mucous exudate originating in the skin. If this material gets into a cut or wound it will cause excruciating pain for long periods of time. A strong scop and water wash helps but the pain will endure for many hours in any case. If anyone is foolish enough to grasp one of these animals and then ruh his eyes temporary but very painful blinchess will result.

You can always tell the Cuban Tree Frog adult by its large size. Even the baby ones may be distinguishable by tiny bumps on their backs. They usually range in color from almost white or cream to a dark brown. They are agile climbers equipped with large terminal digital disks which enable them to stick to many surfaces, even glass. They are generally very efficient in rapidly colonizing, not only on Sanibel but in many other parts of Florida as well. Probably they came into Florida via Key West, after having crossed in smacks from the Bahamas or Cuba or both, as they are maive to both of these countries.

On June 6, Fidel laid a few thousand eggs in one of my aquariums which hatched into tiny flat tadpoles after about 24 hours of incubation. They grew rapidly on a diet of Purina Cat Chow to almost two inches overall by June 30.

The accompaning photograph shows some of Fidel's youngsters. They are all from the same batch. The little ones have simply been deprived of food as they had lived several weeks forgotten in a cottage cheese carton. The larger ones that are well fed are ready to metamorphose, and the one individual still sporting a tail already has all four of its legs and is about ready to disappear into a bush somehvere.

I feel that having Hyla septentrionalis here is better than having no tree frogs at all, so Tm not one of those people who rush around trying to kill them. We're not going to get rid of them anyway. They can withistand all limits of abuse. I even experimented with a tray of tadpoles and an insecticide, pyrethrum. They seemed to grow a little faster on the pyrethrum than did the ones that it was feeding cat chow, In addition to the other frags mentioned, Cabane consume large quantities of flying insects at night and they will also east small to half grown mice. So really, Tm not to unhappy with the existence of this species here today, considering the fue-squared tree Frags poulding around my house.

# ROGO point system still untested By Roxanna Motchan

Rate of growth allocations were distributed Friday by Sanlbel's Planning Commission for the four month period ending June 30, 1980. As a result, a total of 65 dwelling units will be under construction shortly.

This is five units in excess of the normal allocation amount, because five applicants withdrew applications from the previous rate of growth allocation period. Because of this, the previous leftover allocations were added to this period's 60 - the number normally given out in any rate of growth period.

Once again, more than a year after the Rate of Growth Ordinance's (ROGO) adoption, all dwelling unit distribution was made without resorting to the point rating system which goes into effect when there are more applications than allocations.

It almost didn't happen that way. On Monday, July 7, the Planning Commission met with the intention of allocating the units. Planning Director Bruce Rogers explained that 68 applications had been processed and issued development permits, three in excess of the 63 allocations available. The Planning Staff went through all the applications and applied the first criterion of the ROGO, which is whether or not the property already has obvious "beneficial use."

Three of the applications were determined to have existing beneficial use, therefore they would not be allowed a dwelling unit. These were: Porto and Graesser, Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife (C.R.O.W.), and Signal Inn. Although each of these developers had requested more than one unit, and is all that would have been granted at this time. "This does not mean that these applications have been denied," Rogers said. "It means only that those applications where more than one dwelling unit is being requested and who already have beneficial use are being deferred to the next allocation period without having to apply for a new building permit."

N all seemed cm and dried, but Sambel attorney John Wilcox, representing Porto and Graesser, questioned whether or not his client had beneficial use. Wilcox contended that the four Shell Harbro lots purchased by his clients in 1973 (1051 11, 119, 120, and 121) were being developed as two separate parcels, since two of the parcels had been sold. Sea Wind Condominiums, a tounit development, is on two of the parcels of land. "In 1973 my clients received two

"In 1973 my clients received two building permits from Lee County," Wilcox said. "And when the City incorporated we had to stop building because of the moratorium." "We applied to finish after the City in-

We applied to finish after the City incorporated, but were denied, and this became the subject of a lawsuit. "On October 9, 1979 the suit was settled

and terms of the agreement were that five more units could be built subject to the ROGO." Wilcox said.

"Now there's some sort of idea he has beneficial use because of the 10 units on the other parcels," Wilcox continued. "Mr. Graesser feels he's being stepped on. This new application has nothing to do with the 10 Sea Wind condominiums. Graesser sold them."

Rogers said that the four lots had always been combined as one parcel for the development application, and has always been referred to as "in addition to." He mentioned some of the plans for shared facilities between the condominium groups. A tennis court and a pool will be shared between Sea Wind Condominiums and the new development.

"That was brought upon us by the choice of the City." Wilcox said. "In our original petition it was one parcel...but it's not our choice it's your choice. The attorney putting this together is making a lease arrangement with two separate associations."

Formet Planning Commissioner Betty Robinson pointed out that as a member of the fact finding team associated with the lawsuit, "the parcels of land were considered separately. The proposed solution was in relation to the five units on the two remaining lots."

City Attorney Neal Bowen offered to call the consultant who drafted the ordinance, Fred Bosselman, "to see what he envisioned in a case like this."

After contacting Bosselman, Bowen said. "He is of the opinion that here is no retenilon of property interest in the Graesser corporation, and therefore Graesser would be without beneficial use. However, this is based on the court stipulated settlement, and no other aplicant should rely on this as a precedent."

Commissioner Joe Searing made a motion to support the staff recommendation that 65 dwelling units be allocated, "to bring City Council into Jpdy." (Wilcox said that if this happened he would contest the decision before Council). The motion failed 5-1.

Commissioner Bill Hagerup seid, "In my opinion there is a strong probability that Porto and Graesser do not have beneficial use and I would move that the Planning Commission allocate or determine by vole that they do not have beneficial use on the parcel as presented." That motion failed 4-2 (with Hagerup

and Commissioner Judy Workman voting

in favor). Finally, Commissioner Arthur Wycoff made a motion to continue the meeting so that the City Planning staff could further study the case, and that passed unanimously.

On Friday, at the continuation of the meeting, Rogers sold that the Planning staff had gone back and checked the tax rolls, and Seawind Condominium is definitely represented as being on parcels 120 and 121, with separate ownership on parcels 118 and 119. "This would support the applicant's position that there is no beneficial use," Rogers asid.

Attorney Wilcox said that he had spoken with Graesser and that the developer had agreed to 'back off until the next go round' if the beneficial use question could be resolved in his favor.

Searing moved that the development permit by Porto and Graesser be deemed to have no obvious beneficial use. The motion passed 6-0. (Planning Commission Chairman Ann Winterbotham was absent.)

That left the Commissioners with 65 units to allocate, exactly as had been planned at the beginning of Monday's meeting. However, there was another fly in the ointment when developer Rick Hugger of Signal Inn contested the decision that his property had beneficial use.

"The two lots adjoining Signal Inn are owned separately," Hugger said. Workman pointed out that the obvious

Workman pointed out that the obvious difference in this case was the Porto and Graesser decision was based on a court stipulated settlement, and "the Court said two parcels, regardless of the intent of the City."

We were quite shocked to observe the amount of debris in the way of beer cans, coke cans, beer botles and even broken beer bottles on virtually all the beaches. We visited Bowman's Beach perhaps on five occasions during our stay. We noted the signs placed by the City of Sanibel including the very famous slogan "Leave Nothing On The Beach But Footprints." It was quite dishearlening to say the least to note that the trash barrels which had been filled, overflowing at the woods edge of the beach were still overflowing when we left and that the collec-

tion of broken bottles particularly on Bowman's Beach seemed increased with every visit. You folks enjoy a rare treat in nature's wonders present on both the islands of Sanibel and Captiva; however, it seemed quite apparent to me particularly as a retired service officer that no attempt has been made to enforce your laws other than threat of penalties. FROM: Paul A. Howe, Taxpayer SUBJECT: Proposed CLUP Amendment Defining "Single-Family Dwelling Unit"

The proposed clarifying Ordinance on the above subject was received by me today and was carefully analyzed.

It does not appear to strike at the heart of the problem as envisioned by City Attorney Bowen's memorandum to you of March 16, 1977 nor mine of June 24, 1979

Simply stated, the problem is lodged in the fact that CLUP's Definition Section (Part 3.1) fails to expressly define the term "Single Family." The other two terms "Duplex," and "Multi-Family" also ended to quantify the term "Dwelling Unit," however, are so defined in Sections 3.1.8 and 3.1.15 respectively.

To correct this unintended CLUP omission, I suggest that the following simple addition be made to Section 1 of the proposed Ordinance that now defines "Dwelling Unit." The total Section 1 would read:

"Any structure or portion thereof which is designed for, or capable of use as a selfsufficient, independent unit for residential purposes. When the term "single-family" is used to quantify "dwelling unit," it sha

a, a group of any size related by blood. marriage, or adoption, and b. a group not so related if there are no more than two persons."


The above bold faced addition is taken verbatim from the City Attorney's 1977 memorandum. He was reciting the U.S. Supreme Court's language in the 1974 case of The Village of Belle Terre (Long Island, N.Y.) vs. Borass. The Court then held that requirements (a) and (b) above were violated when a rental occupancy was permitted by six unrelated university students at that resort community.

I believe that the City Attorney will agree that the inclusion of my proposed addition to the draft Ordinance will obviate the need for any revision of CLUP's Permitted Uses (Section 3.4.1) that is now proposed under Section 2 of the draft Ordinance. Obviously, the title would change.

### Captiva erosion

## Core samples prove suitable

The core samples taken by an off-shore drilling device last week indicate a suitable source for Captiva beach renourishment, it was announced at the Captiva Erosion Prevention District (CEPD) July 7 meeting.

According to project manager Dick Stevens, the special floating device hired by the CEPD last week took nine core samples, three in the limestone shelf and six in the shell mounds area near Blind Pass

"The material beneath the limestone is very thick and unsuitable for beach renourishment," Stevens said. "However, preliminary findings support the shell mounds as a suitable source."

The cost of last week's core study was slightly over \$8,000, Stevens said. This figure was about \$2,000 less than anticipated. The reason, according to Stevens, was that the work was done in one day instead of two.

Coring and engineering was supervised by Tetra Tech, the firm working with CEPD on erosion prevention. Stevens said he had instructed Tetra Tech not to do any more engineering on the project at the present time.

We must, as soon as possible, allow Tetra Tech to go ahead, to permit us to work together with South Sea s in a single contract." Stevens said

"Tetra Tech compared the 1979 findings with those found this spring," Stevens continued, "and found that erosion on Captiva this year has been twice what it was in previous years."

Completing the project manager's report, Stevens said the District has applied to the Army Corps of Engineers for assistance.

### ROGO cont'd.

Searing moved that the application already had beneficial use. The motion passed unanimously.

Finally, Commissioner Fred Valtin moved that the Planning Commission allocate the dwelling units in conformance with the Planning staff recommendations, noting for the record that the application by Porto and Graesser had been with drawn for the time being. This motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Workman noted that in the event of disagreements regarding the allocations, individuals have seven days to respond by writing a letter to the City Manager.

### **Bonfires outlawed By Bill Motchan**

The Sanibel Fire Board signed into law last week an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the ordinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18 (ten days after the signing) it will be illegal.

An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48" X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without permit

"Actually, what we're doing is extending the beachfront what the rest of the Island already had," said Fire Chief Allen Nave at last Tuesday's board meeting. 'From our point of view, it (the new ordinance) will control the size of a fire to a point where it will be safe

The decision to adopt the bonfire policy came as a result of a special Fire Board meeting held May 29 during which City Manager Bernie Murphy and Police Chief John Butler were present to discuss the

At that meeting, Chief Butler express concern over controlling the crowds that eensed to congregate at beach boufires. A fire in a hibachi or barbecue grill would not draw as big a crowd as a large open fire, the board members decided. The chance of the fire spreading would also be greatly reduced.

'If we can keep fires down to this size container," Nave said last Tuesday, "the safety aspect will be taken care of. If anybody doesn't use a container of this size, it will be an illegal activity." According to the Fire Board, the Sanibel

Fire Department now has the legal power to put out open beach fires, but that is all they can do. Arrest power (by the Sanibel Police Department) for violations must come from the City.

Continuation of public hearing and a second reading on the issue will come before Council today.

"It's called 'Operation Koumbite,' which is actually a reforestation all over their country," according to nursery manager Norma Jeanne Byrd. "They have come to learn some of the methods we use for growing plants, trees and ahrubs.

"They have grown their young trees in plastic bags until they're about 12 to 18 inches high. We're going to show them how to grow the trees larger before replanting so they'll bave a longer survival rate." Ms. Byrd said that she would show the

visitors how to treat the seeds before planting, how to plant them, and use of pot size gradation. "This will produce a hardier plant that's better suited for the wild." -B.M

### New gallery for Captiva


Sanibel and Captiva seem to attract many artists so, naturally, art galleries seem to follow. A new gallery on the scene will open its doors for business Monday, July 21.

### Trolley trivia

Ben Pickens' hobby is somewhat unique. In fact, he knows of only about 70 other people worldwide who share his particular interest.

Pickers, the owner of Photo-Sanibel, collects St. Louis streetcar transfer tickets; and they are not easy to come by, as streetcars were phased out of St. Louis in the mid-1900's.

"It goes back to St. Louis when I was a kid," Pickens says. "Anywhere you went, you used

mass transit. I think I started out to see how many different streetcar lines I could collect during a year's time. Then relatives and friends found out I collected them, and they started saving them for me. Even a couple of motormen on the streetcars got to know me and started saving them."

Millions of people collect stamps and coins, and Pickens "looks at the transfers as funny shaped stamps. I obtained almost all of mine by trades, although 1 bought a few. The oldest date back 100 years. The tearly ones have excellent quality engraving. Some even have advertising on the back."

Pickens has a fairly complete collection of the streetcar passes, and started compiling a history of them about a year ago. He has traced mass transit in his homelown from horse-drawn cars to electric cars to the buses used today.

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
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# City approves \$55,000 hazard mitigation study

Sanibel's City Councilmembers voted unanimously in a special meeting last week to direct City Manager Bernie Murphy to establish a contract with the consulting firm of Wallace, Roberts, and Todd (WRT) for the process of carrying out a hazard mitigation program.

The firm, which will charge \$55,000 for the six-month study, helped develop Sanibel's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP)

Bill Roberts, one of the principals of the firm, appeared before Council to describe just how the company plans to respond to the request for proposal submitted by the City

Roberts said that he will act as team coordinator of a group consisting of Bob Hubenette, author of the transportation section of Sanibel's CLUP; James C. Nicholas, a professor of economics at Florida Atlantic University; and Robert Simpson, former Director of the National Hurricane Center.

First, the firm will collect all data ssary to complete the study. Roberts said that the team would research procedures and compare them with other communities that have experienced disasters.

Next, the existing City procedures will e studied, such as Sanibel's EPERT ystem. "Because the City is taking a vstem. esponsible attitude, it is necessary for us to re-address every issue," Roberts said After the first two steps are completed, the warning element and the evacuation ment, WRT will come back to the City with the findings. "At this point," Roberts

said, "it will be identified if any additional studies are ne sary.

Councilman Porter Goss said. "I don't want to spend our money re-inventing the wheel. It may be from the purist planner point of view that we have indadequacies. I would be extremely unhappy if your data proves inadequate.'

The discussion turned to Lee County, the evacuation plan for the County, and how the County might hinder or help Sanibel's efforts to evacuate.

Councilman Duane White said. "I'm not going to sit here and appropriate Sanibel ad valorem taxes to give Lee County a plan.'

We haven't examined how adequate Lee County is in meeting needs to evacuate from Sanibel's point of view," Roberts said. ''I am of the opinion that experts will find substantial deficiency in the evacuation routes."

The recovery element will also be studied in detail, in addition to damage reduction, coordination and im-plementation. However, some of these subjects will only be briefly touched on, as Roberts indicated that the money to be spent on the study is not adequate for indepth study into each area.

The firm will provide 120 man-days to work on Sanibel's study under the constraints of the budget. Roberts said that WRT expects to make a 12 to 15 per cent profit

Roberts also warned the Council, "If you wish to select our team you have to have some confidence in our ability. cautious about undertaking this work. It's

going to be extremely difficult if everything we produce is going to face counter proposals. Who do I have to satisfy? We think we've got better experts than those who reside

Sanibel...otherwise do it yourself. We plan on reporting to the City Manager and the Planning Director, as is traditional, in-cluding a series of checkpoints with the Council."



Sanibel Island isn't the only place worried about the future of its live shells. Now, people living on the islands called the Florida Keys are alarmed about their Queen Conch population.

You have probably seen the Queen Conch either in piles around some of those roadeid: whell shops' or in personal displays. It's a delicate colored, pinkish shell with a large outer lip. While it is a good shell for collectors, it is also a great shell for human consumption. That's why, while driving in the Keys, you see signs reading, "conch chowder," "conch fritters" or "raw conch salad."

It might be interesting to note that this shell is the only one protected by the State of Florida.

There is only one problem with the Queen Conch - she can be found too easily and that's the reason for her greatly diminished numbers. This shell is, or I might say "was," found fairly easily along the shallow islands which bordered the Overseas Highway, that two-lane road which ends in Key West. Twenty years ago, it escendy there was no end to the numbers of these shells and I think that there have been plenty of families who survived hard times, thanks to the debiate mest of this conch.

That era might be coming to a crashing halt now, however. Shellers along these islands are becoming concerned about this conch, and I wouldn't be surprised in newer restrictions aren't enacted or possibly "safe" or sanctuary size setablished that are off-limits to those who take shells in large numbers.

If you have been to the Bahamas, you know that this shell also plays a big part in the economy, but there the depletion story is about the same. I remember standing next to a Bahamian conch fisherman about 15 years ago and wat-

ching him reach into his boat and bring out conch after conch. He poled his skilf over the flats and in the clear waters, he would reach into the depths with a pole and hook to pick out the conchs.

He beached the boat at the same place each day to take the conchs out, knock a hole in their shells, cut the muscles and then pull out the conch meat. He then tossed the shell onto a mound in the water.

Sanibel, of course, has a limit of two live shells, per person, per species and from those I've talked with who are active in shelling, the ban seems to be helping in bringing back the live shell populations.

One shell you'll probably never find alive is the coveted junonia shell. It just might be the most sought after collector's shell found on the falands and, thinking over the past year of shelling, I don't recall a more unproductive year for finding these rare shells.

The reason for this has to be the comparatively mild winter, without too much of the strong winds and high seas that seem to enhance finding shells on the beaches. I don't think my groups found more than two junonias this

I don't think my groups found more than two junonias this past winter season when most of the big storms came, but the year before we found about 10 in that same period.

Good shelling out there this week and, given the choice, I would say that working the lighthouse end of Sanibel Island at dawn - if there is a southerly wind - will be your best bei for finding a few good shells.

Wycoff said, "My concern is that more and more situations are coming to light where construction is taking place which is outside planning procedur s. Our Com prehensive Land Use Plan is only as good as the support it receives from the residents and the City. I think we are rapidly reaching a point where we are going to have enforcement or no Plan. I do believe it is important now for the City to take action to prevent a contractor or sub contractor to undertake work without a permit."

The City staff report recommended that Thompson be able to keep some of the improvements he had started. In the case of the retaining wall, the report stressed that to remove it "will cause more damage than leaving it there." However, several logs have been placed between the wall and against mangroves in the area, and the staff recommended removal of the logs. Staff also recommended that the 9 foot by 16 foot balcony which was already contructed be removed since it violates setback requirements. Finally. recommendation to the Planning Com-missioners was made that the boat ramp be allowed to remain since removal "would achieve little."

Commissioner Searing asked, "What's unique about this situation? The fact that a development permit was received and ignored

ompson attempted to explain that be had been "quite excited about getting the permit. Perhaps I acted childishly. I think I left it lying on the building inspectors desk or I dropped it. Either way, I didn't read it."

Commissioner Fred Valtin moved that the Planning Commission deny the specific amendment with the exception of allowing the retaining wall to remain, since everyone concurred that to remove it mangroves. 
 A specific amendment allowing a tennis court to be built at Seawind Condominiums was unanimously approved.

The planning staff report indicated that the tennis court will encroach upon the setbacks from both the road and canal. In addition, the clearing and coverage will exceed that permitted. However, report recommended approval on the contention that a tennis court on the site would be beneficial to the community because it would reduce the impact upon the public courts and the traffic to them

ibel resident Alice Kyllo commente "I think we're building too many tennis courts. They are generating too much heat, and wasting vegetation. They're changing the whole climate of the Island.'

Commissioner Fred Valtin made the motion to recommend to City Council that the tennis court be approved subject to the staff's recommendations that the tennis court not exceed certain dimensions; that it be no closer to the canal than 15 feet; that the land surrounding the tennis court be vegetated with native vegetation; that rain rupolt from the tennis court be directed into a retention-percolation area between the road and court; and that lighting of the tennis court not be permitted. The motion passed unanimously.



# The Islandhandicapped

### By George Christensen

This week our article deals with accessibility to clothing stores by the handicespect We continue to stress accessibility because one of the basic needs of handicapped people is clothing. Very often the cost of safe adequate walkways and entrances to the shops are minor as compared to the cost of an accident, and the increased cost of insurance pre-minums resulting therefrom.

The clothing stores selected this week as being the most accessible to the handkapped are those located in the Tahltian Garden Shopping Center and the new Palm Ridge Shopping Center.

The skores in Tahilian Garden offer the most shopping variety to the handlcapped. Such stores as Jeanette Daniel Tropical Fashions, Jeanette Daniel Menswear, Sanibel Beachwear Center, Sportsware by Nicole and Island Shoes and Sandals offer a wide variety of clothing.

The parking area for the shopping center is endrely paved. We would advise a handlcapped shopper to park as close to the ramps as possible. No handlcapped parking spaces are provided - but 1 believe that once the management of the shopping center becomes sware of the tremendous mobility problem the handkapped person faces. they will correct this minimal cast oversight.

The slope of the ramps leading to the floor level of the shops is greater than the one inch per foot recommended. Ramps with slopes greater than those mentioned cause

handlespind people great approximation, whether they be on crutches or in a wheelchair. The wide walkway in front of the shops provides a acid and convenient means of reaching all of the stores. Assistance is required, however, to open the doors to all the shops.

The Palm Ridge Shopping Center is new. It deserves mention not only for its new clothing store (India Imports of Sanhel) - but for the concern shown by our City planners, the Flaming Commission, and the architect. These abops have a pawed handicapped parking paed, while the remainder of the parking area is so-called permeable: shell and sand. There is a continuous pawed walkway from the handicapped parking area to all of the shops. The dorways to the store floor levels are without elevation changes but assistance is also required here to open the doors to all the stores.

The aisles between the racks of clothing are wider and more accessible than many larger shops in town. The dressing room is adequate for a person in a wheelchair and, again, more accessible than those in town.

It's nice to be part of a community that is planning for the welfare of all its people. It's nice to know that the Cty Council has apointed a Planning Commission that shows empathy and concern for those with afflictions. And it's even better when they demonstrate visible evidence of that concern with visible action.

We recommend both shopping centers mentioned in this article to bandlcapped people looking for clohing. It's regrettable that assistance will be required to open the doors to the shops. This will change with time, however, when men d good will realize that it's good business, and that it generates good public relations to help those least able to help themselves.



### CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, you'll have to get a permit to have one on a Sanibel public beach. The Fire Department on Palm Ridge Road will supply you with a fire permit for \$1. Their hours are from \$ a.m. to \$ p.m. in ad-dition, you'll be required to make a \$25 deposit, returnable the day after your beach party when the beach has been in-spected for litter and debris. Make sure you clean the area thoroughly or you'll be out \$25!

Condo owners or managers may submit a letter to the Fire Department, acknowledging that they will assume responsibility for cleanup after a fire in front of their building. The \$25 deposit will be waived in those circumstances.

### GATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are sublect to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in [all, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator,

he's close enough to feed on you, An alligator fed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.

### FISHING

scrupulously obeyed. As a matter of fact, in order to preserve Sanibel's beautiful sheiling beaches, most collectors refuse to take any live shells whatsoever.

### SPEED LIMITS

There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department. Driving or parking a motor vehicle or moped on the bike path is strictly prohibited. Violators will be ticketed.

DOGGY DO'S & DON'TS If you're visiting Sanibel with the family Fido in tow, all the better. All family members can enjoy Southwest Florida sun and surf. The Chamber of Commerce can tell you what accommodations are available accommodations are available for families with pets. Remember: wherever you are, clean up after your pet! The friendly reminder..."Leave nothing on the beach but footprints"....applies to dogs, too. There's no leash law on Sanibel, but of course an ex-tende or unruly animal is citable or unruly animal is better off when controlled with a leash.
