



Exploring The Dark Continent

This week we start a new feature called the "Weekender" which describes places to go and things to do for minivacations in Florida

Weekends were made for Michelob ... a Sahara adventure...a dolphin show...a rousing German singalong...and Budweiser, Busch, and Natural Light. But there's plenty besides the beer to delight practically everyone at the fantasy land known as the Dark Continent at Busch Gardens in Tampa.

Enroute to the Dark Continent one recent weekend, I survived the 130 mile trip, which seemed longer - road food consisting of 7-11 microwave burritos, Burger King french fries, and convenience store doughnuts, plus the usual passthe-time car games which are designed to relieve boredom, but don't.

I forgot my discomfort and the fact that five people were jammed into a compact car the minute we arrived at the park located, appropriately enough, on Busch Boulevard.

The 300 acre entertainment center is an impressive sight. After parking the car in the "lion" section of the parking lot (parking costs \$1 per car) my entourage rode the tram to the place designed to entertain, amuse, astound and delight young and old alike.

A single admission price of \$9.35 (children under three are free) entitles you to all rides, shows, and attractions. If so desired, you may also tour the brewery located smack dab at the entrance to the grounds.

Turn of the century Africa is the main theme at the Tampa Gardens. So expect to see lots of exotic, wildly colored animals, fish, and fowl.

In fact, even if you're not into rides, shows or shopping, the animal exhibits alone are an incredible sight. The Dark Continent ranks as one of the top zoos in the United States.

What to do first? We all stood around gaping at the never ceasing hustle and bustle, unable to decide. Maps in hand, we began our safari. It's a good idea to have some sort of game plan for your day-long adventure, but don't expect to see everything; it's simply impossible.

First stop - Nairobi. In Nairobi, animals abound. I saw alligators and more alligators (huge ones!), playful spider monkeys, and contented lazy fish. It must be wonderful to have the easy, unpressured life of a Busch Gardens resident. A must-see Nairobi attraction is Nocturnal Mountain. Visitors tour through a dark tunnel where all the

animals believe it is nightime. It's fun to see bats in action, porcupines eating their dinner, and the other creatures that only come out at night. For the young and the young at heart, a small animal petting area is also located near here. After the tour of Nairobi, unable to contain our anticipation any longer, we continued our journey to the highly touted newest section of the Dark Continent - Timbuktu. Timbuktu features a breathtaking, daring thrill ride - the 1,817 foot long Scorpion, a German festhaus, and the "Dolphins of the Deep" theatre.

What is a German Festhaus doing in the middle of the desert? Well, legend has it that German born Heinrich Barth (after surviving a 55 day desert crossing) established the thriving outpost of Timbuktu. The Festhaus is a wonderful place to cool off or grab a bite to eat. It's also one of the two places on the grounds where Anheuser Busch products are served (the other area is the Hospitality House located near the Brewery).


German dancers and singers entertain hourly in the Festhaus. Bedecked in colorful native costumes, the dancers swirl and perform intricate movements. If you enjoy audience participation, be sure and stop by; a sing-anddance along is part of each show. Especially fun is when the audience is taught to say "one, two, three, - down the hatch" - in German. You can imagine what everyone does once they have mastered the phrase - quaff whatever beverage, they're drinking! I loved the Festhaus...but the desert beckoned.

While in Timbuktu, we stopped to catch the dolphin show, starring Budweiser (Buddy) and Michelob (Michy). Dolphin shows are always fun, but these creatures seem to be especially bright and endearing.

Time was slipping away - there's just so much to do. My group boarded the skyride and began the trip across the Serengeti Plain. From high above, we saw the animals roaming freely through the expansive, 160 acre natural setting. Giraffes, elephants, lions, water buffalos and hippos as well as other big game call the Plain home.

A monorail takes the visitor straight through the center of the Serengeti Plain, providing a close up look at the animals. The cars are almost eye-level with our four legged friends! One of the more impressive sights are the brighly colored pink flamingos - so colored from the shellfish they eat.

After the Serengeti adventure, we headed our tired and thirsty bodies back to the Hospitality House. Here we sipped complimentary samples of Budweiser's pride and joy and relaxed, watching the antics of the many exotic birds who live near the Hospitality House before commencing to do something I had looked forward to all day - shopping.





The shops in Busch Gardens will please everyone from art collectors, t-shirt fanatics and wicker lovers to, of course, persons interested in drinking paraphernalia and tourist souvenirs. It's a good thing that time limited my browsing, otherwise my visit to the Dark Continent would have rendered me centsless!

Finally it was closing time, 6 p.m., and there were still shows we hadn't seen, rides still unridden, and stores left unshopped. But one of the magical things about the Dark Continent is that it will always be there, waiting to provide entertainment, adventure, and one heck of an exciting day.

Visibly dragging from all the activity (the old "tired but happy" syndrome), we boarded the tram to return to our car in the "lion" parking lot.

"Did everyone have a good time today?" the driver calls from the front of the tram.

"Yes!" shout most of the passengers.

"What about you lions? I didn't hear anything from you," he calls back.

The day of adventure had left we lions too exhausted to reply. But don't worry, we'll be back.

City-County workshop resolves issues

The City of Sanibel may assume responsibility for construction and maintenance of Sanibel-Captiva Road and Bowman's Beach, it was decided Monday, July 14. At a joint meeting of the Sanibel City Council and Lee County Commissioners, four issues were discussed.

- Bowman's Beach. It was decided that an interlocal agreement could be attained, in which the City of Sanibel would maintain the facility and be reimbursed by the County. The City and County will also pay \$50,000 each for phase one of Bowman's Beach improvements.

"We would like to have you retain us to maintain the park," said Councilman Porter Goss. "We need to achieve an interlocal agreement on who is going to do what."

Commissioner Harry Rodda said he saw no problem with such an agreement, except in the area of pay-scale for the employees maintaining the beach-park. Since these employees would be paid by the City of Sanibel, Rodda said, would they be paid more than County employees, and if so, would the County, through reimbursement, bear the burden of the excess cost.

"You would (only) be responsible for your normal cost," Goss answered. "I would say the trouble area is if it becomes a county posture to charge a user's fee. That maybe something we someday have to argue about.

"Our main concern is that we are well aware of the need for a beach park in Lee County. We would like it (Bowman's) to be a natural-type beach. Whether or not we charge a parking fee, we might have to look at later."

In addition to more parking spaces, the construction of restrooms was mentioned

as an important step in phase one of development.

- Sanibel-Captiva Road. Steps were taken to give the City of Sanibel responsibility for construction and maintenance of Sanibel-Captiva Road. Under the proposed interlocal agreement, the City would assume the \$1 million cost of the three foot widening of the road.

"Sanibel-Captiva Road has had a bad shoulder problem," Goss said. "We want to do the job right. We are also aware that the County is going to take over that road."

Could the City of Sanibel, Goss asked, retain responsibility of the road, under an interlocal agreement, since Sanibel was paying for the road improvement?

"The statutes give the leeway to have an

"There are two factors: weight and speed. If we can control these two things, I think we can have good preventive maintenance," Pratt said. "There were 651 overweight trucks charged a fee in the month of June. I think we need a scale that would stop the overweight trucks before they came over the bridge."

Pratt said that about 8,000 overweight trucks traveled the Causeway annually. The combination of speeding cars and overweight trucks put a great strain on the structure. All the Councilmembers agreed that very few drivers obeyed the 20 mph speed limit on the Causeway. "People that cross the Causeway every day," said Duane White, "know that the speed limit is a joke."

interlocal agreement," County Attorney Jim Yeager said. "In my opinion, I think we can do it. I don't think we can change it from a County to a City road, but I do think we can change the liability (for maintenance)."

- The Sanibel Causeway. The County Department of Transportation will look into stricter enforcement of speed and weight limits on the Causeway, it was decided.

"Where I'm concerned is we need to keep the bridge open to traffic," said Transportation Director Ben Pratt. "I think we're looking at a matter of preventive maintenance. To control the speeding problem, Pratt suggested the Sanibel Police Department patrol the Causeway area more frequently. Since the Causeway is Countyowned, the County must pay for maintenance and repairs to the structure. The County would therefore, reimburse the SPD for their aid.

Sanibel Councilman Zee Butler said she saw no problem in having the SPD patrol the Causeway. Duane White said he was in sympathy with keeping the overweight trucks off the bridge and controlling speeds, but Goss brought up some possible problems.

"First, enforcing speed limits is ex-

tremely unpopular," Goss said. "Second, there are some legitimate concerns of the people who operate the trucks; garbage, groceries, oil and gas. Third, your weight scale program is going to knock out our weight scale program." The Sanibel scale produced over \$250,000 in revenue for 1979-80. If overweight trucks were prevented from ever getting on the Causeway, there would be no revenues from overweight fees.

"If that's what the true cost of living on Sanibel is, though, that's what it's going to take," Goss said.


- The Sanibel Library Councilman Zee Butler told the Commissioners that the Sanibel Library Board wanted the City to take over funding of the library from the County. Before such a step was taken, however, the Library would have to be removed from the County Library system.

The reason for switching to a City-run Library, according to Butler, was that the amount of tax money collected was not commensurate with that returned to the Library.

County Administrator Lavon Wisher explained that such a move would have to be scheduled for the Florida legislature and would not become effective until 1982.

Commissioner Rodda said he understood the reasoning of the Library Board, but said they could be cutting themselves off from state and federal revenues by leaving the County system.


Rodda said it might be beneficial for the Library to remain County-run due to fund availability. "My understanding is that there are some very desirable reasons for a county-run library system," Rodda said. "I think the (Sanibel) Library Board needs to look at what they're going to do in the future."



City gives SCCF \$50,000 for wetlands

The City of Sanibel will give \$50,000 to [the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF) for the purchase of undeveloped lots in Sanibel Gardens subdivision, Councilmembers decided last week.

The money will be given at the rate of \$10,000 per year for the next five years. The source of the money is the Causeway surplus funds. All Councilmembers voted in favor of helping the SCCF acquire this property with the exception of Mayor ancis Bailey who said, "This isn't a function of City government. I think we should spend our money on property we own ourselves.

Councilmember Zee Butler appeared concerned that the funds were coming out of the Causeway surplus funds, saying, "That source is practically dried up."

"Supporting that program by those funds is probably one of the wisest things we can do." said Councilman Duane White. "Every piece of that property would cause us a lot of problems and trouble down the road if we do not take this step."

Dr. William Webb, Chairman of the SCCF, said. "All those lots have potential to be developed. If they are developed it will cost the taxpayers a tremendous amount of money for maintenance of roads and schoolbuses to serve the area. It's terribly expensive to provide fire and police protection.'

"This is definitely a penny-wise solution." said Councilman Porter Goss. "We are going to be in the position where for a very moderate figure we are going to be taking off the marketplace many, many dwelling units."

"It's only \$10,000 year, and it seems to me the best investment we've made in a long time," White said.

Council reviews bonfire ban

Until recently, a recreational bonfire was legal on Sanibel, providing its builder acquired a permit from the Fire Department, but no more. The Sanibel Fire Board has adopted a new ordinance, effective last Friday, which prohibits any fire not made in a container for cooking purposes. on the beach.

Sanibel's City Councilmembers got a chance to review the new law at last week's meeting.

The ordinance state that "under special circumstances" a person may apply in writing for a fire permit to the Fire Chief. who may issue a permit at his discretion. Fire District Commissioner Floyd Wakefield said one special circumstance might be, "if the Boy Scouts wanted to build a fire. We have to have a permitting procedure in case something like this did happen."

Mayor Francis Bailey seemed skeptical. "Suppose the Fire Chief felt in a very magnanimous mood and said yes to just anyone"" Bailey inquired.

Wakefield said that he could not foresee that happening.

Councilman Porter Goss said, "I am totally opposed to this but that's your business. It's your charter. I'll let you take the heat on it.

Councilman Duane White, however, supported the new rules. "If Sanibel were like it was 10 or 12 years ago that would be a different matter." he said "You (now) have people who come here for a whoop it up, burn it up time."

Police Chief John Butler said that the SPD might have a problem enforcing the new rules. "We have no arrest power in this matter. All we can do is drive up and say 'Hey, you can't build a fire, the Fire Department has an ordinance against that."

Sanibel resident Alice Kyllo commented 'Remember what happened when Nero had a recreational fire?'

Canal tax requested

The City of Sanibel has received its first. request for the establishment of a special axing district which will allow for canal dredging and maintenance. The request was submitted by Buhl T. Burgoyne. representing the Board of Directors of the Harbor Property Owners Shell Association.

At last week's City Council meeting. City Manager Bernie Murphy addressed Council regarding Burgoyne's request. He suggested that they authorize him, by notion, the right to contract with an ngineer who can determine cost. Council

voted unanimously for Murphy to procede Councilmember Zee Butler asked Murphy if perhaps this couldn't be accomplished in time to have the matter come up for vote in November's general election. Murphy said yes, unless he discovered that the cost would exceed \$5,000, in which case he would have to abide by the Professional Negotiations" Act. which would take more time.

Burgoyne said that he thought Snell Harbor Subdivision would make a natural. taxing district, because of the similarity of seawall construction, canal widths and public ownership, lot sizes, property values and freedom from questions of mangrove and other marine growth.

Charitable graphics

Sanibel's charitable and non-profit groups must now conform with the graphics ordinance just like every business on the Island. Last week, City Councilmembers unanimously passed an ordinance which provides that these groups must be regulated by the same provisions of the graphics ordinance as the profit making establishments.

In recent months many non-profit organizations had requested specific amendments to the graphics ordinance. including the American Legion. Sanibel Elenientary School, and others.

The graphics ordinance states that one street or wall mounted sign is permitted. must not exceed certain size requirements, and must meet certain setback requirements

New parking law

Beware of no parking signs. They will be strictly enforced from now on. Sanibel's City Council unanimously approved last week an ordinance which will impose a \$25 fee on any illegally parked car

An offender will have 48 hours to pay the fine, or request a court hearing. According to the ordinance, "upon failure to pay the civil penalty in a timely manner and in the prescribed amount or upon a court hearing request, the ticket may be referred to the County Court for further action."

The ticket will be the common mail-in variety, but may also be paid in person or dropped off in a special box outside the Sanibel Police Department.

Also at last week's meeting, Councilmembers unanimously approved an ordinance which allows the Sanibel Police



Department to impound (seize and hold in the custody of the law) cars if they have been reported stolen, are subject to seizure and forfeiture under the laws of the State, are subject to being held for use as evidence in a criminal trial, and cars which pose a danger to the public safety or to the motor vehicle.

City Manager Bernie Murphy assured the Council that "the City is not intending to go into the impounding business," but indicated that Sanibel's present impounding laws are inadequate.

Vegetation recycling

A lease agreement with the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF), which allows the City to use lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Block 20 of Sanibel Gardens for a municipal vegetation recycling center was unanimously approved by the Sanibel City Council last week.

The lease will be effective for two years. At the end of the that time, if the project proves to be successful, the lease will probably be renewed. Terms of the lease are \$1 dollar per year.

Assistant City Manager Gary Price appeared before the Councilmembers to discuss the plans for the vegetative debris site. He indicated to Council that he is currently researching prices of a chipper and other equipment. The project is expected to cost approximately \$20,000. Permits and approval must be received from the Planning Department and the Planning Commission.

The City will charge a minimal fee for individuals who wish to have their vegetative debris picked up. There will be no charge for drop off.

Algiers "nuisance"

Calling it an "attractive nuisance." Sanibel's Councilmembers briefly discussed last week what could be done with the City-owned Algiers property. A special joint City Council and Planning Commission Workshop will be held September 23 at 9 a.m. at MacKenzie ball to more thoroughly discuss use of the property.

The steamboat has been a continuus source of fascination for tourists and Island youth, and has suffered several instances of vandalism. "I'm terribly concerned about injury," said City Manager Bernie Murphy.

Murphy informed the Council that à four foot cyclone fence will be erected around the steamboat to discourage unwanted visitors.

Cayo Costa purchase

Although the funds available to purchase environmentally endangered lands have been frozen for more than a year. Governor Bob Graham approved last Tuesday the purchase of an additional 65 acres of Cayo Costa land.

Don Moody, Assistant to Representative Frank Mann, said, "Florida's Attorney General has ruled that a state option to purchase the land is exempt from the provisions of the freeze. The option has a reverter clause in it. If the State couldn't have come up with the money, then the option would revert to Ad Miller Associates, a Naples Real Estate firm.

"The cost to purchase the 65 acres is \$697,000, and the option has been extended 60 days from June 30 in order that the AG could rule on Coya Costa being exempt."

Lover's Key bridge panned

A resolution requesting that a bridge connecting the barrier island of Lover's Key to State Route 865 not be constructed was unanimously passed by Sanibel's City Councilmembers last week.

"My concern is that when you build a bridge, you expect something to come at the end of it," said Councilman Porter Goss. "The question of this bridge being built has been switched from the Army Corps of Engineers to the U.S. Coast Guard."

The bridge, which will span 1,290 feet if constructed, will be financed by the Lover's Key Development Corporation.

Huxter's requests property rezoning

Bob Potts, owner of Huxter's Plaza. and his attorney John Wilcox appeared before City Council last week to request a rezoning of his property from residential to commercial.

City Planners had informed Potts that in the event of 50 per cent destruction following a disaster, he would not be allowed to rebuild his business. Potts, not wishing to build a house on the Huxter's site after a hurricane, requested the specific amendment.

Councilmembers mentioned some of the problems experienced in the Plaza including parking, access and egress, and setback requirements.

Recommendations by the Planning Department were that Potts contribute \$5,500 for a turning lane in front of the parcel which should help alleviate some of the parking and traffic problems.

Wilcox took exception to that suggestion, saying, "Mr. Potts does not wish to acquire the same reputation of another person who is making a payment to the City in return for a request."

Councilman Duane White exclaimed, "That's absolutely false and I'm surprised that a man of your integrity would say something like that."

Wilcox answered. "There are people who feel this way."

"Your property has lawfully existing use," Councilman Porter Goss said, "so actually you're in pretty good shape. You could build back commercial.'

Potts appeared satisfied, since he had been concerned about something that wouldn't happen. The second reading of this specific amendment is scheduled for August 19, at 2:10 p.m.

on the water

A few days ago the Department of Natural Resources closed shellfish harvesting in Le^o County waters which includes, of course, Sanibel and Captiva Islands. This week, let's talk about what this might mean to fishermen and shellers who enjoy our beaches.

The shellfish ban comes as a direct result of fish kills associated with a discovery of red tide organisms in Boca Grande Pass, about 12 miles north of the Islands. There are a lot of things unknown about the red tide, but most scientists agree that it is a bloom of algae which releases a toxin affecting the breathing, or gill system, of many kinds of fish and shellfish.

If you have never seen a red tide, what you will notice first on a beach is the presence of dead fish. Many will be what we call "junk fish," such as catfish, but others killed will be little grunts, pinfish and mullet - all of which are highly valuable as baitfish.

The presence of red tide doesn't mean that fishing and shelling come to a halt. What it will mean, especially for the fishermen, is that there could be a very large reduction in the number of baitfish and that will make snook fishing very

es difficult.

The red tide might also drive out, or kill, the small grouper which are just now coming back into the shallow Gulf of Mexico waters after a very bad red tide kill several years ago. The reef being built off Redfish Pass is starting to draw grouper and a new red tide problem will surely hurt that infant reef.

We don't really know how the red tide affects the game fish, such as snook, tarpon or redfish. I have seen several bad fish kills from red tide, but can't recall seeing many dead snook. Perhaps the big fish can tell of the coming problem and move offshore to wait out the tide, but on the other hand, they might leave the local waters because the baitfish are dying in large numbers.

Either way, even a mild fish kill from the red tide will probably mean fewer fish caught and they will be more difficult to find. I hope this is all premature and that the red tide discovered recently will dissipate before working its way down the coast.

On the shellfish gathering side of the problem, it means meantime, don't take any that the state officers have said that oysters, clams and the for human consumption.

like are not fit for human consumption until the danger of the red tide passes. That could take a month or several months, depending on how long the tide stays.

This won't really matter to a great many people. Not too many shellfish are being taken from our waters anyway, but there are some people intent upon taking local clams and oysters and they should hold back on that until the state clears the red tide problem.

For you who are brief visitors to the Islands, unly there is a massive fish kill which washes up on the beaches, you won't know that there is a red tide.

For those of us who fish a great deal, it means working harder to get bait and perhaps settling for fewer fish until the red tide moves out or dissipates.

Red tide isn't uncommon and it might be nature's way of thinning out fish populations, but this will pass as the ones previous to it have done. As I mentioned earlier, let's hope that the red tide doesn't even come this far south, but in the meantime, don't take any shellfish from the County waters for human consumption.

Valtin named Cablevision Manager

Island resident Fred Valtin was recently named Manager of Cablevision of Sanibel Island. Valtin also holds the position of Planning Commissioner and President of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce.

In his new position, Valtin will serve as office supervisor, handle work assignments and customer complaints.

"I conceive of this very much as a twoway street," Valtin said. "As an employee of Palmer Cablevision, I must be responsible to their needs. I also have a responsibility to be an ombudsman for the Island community."

Valtin said improving service to subscribers is important to Cablevision of Sanibel. Two major steps will soon be

taken to do just that.

"Some time this fall," Valtin said, "we expect to install a receiving dish which will enable us to get direct satellite reception. We will get a number of additional channels, including Home Box Office (HBO)." In order to receive HBO, Valtin said, subscribers would be charged about \$10 additional per month.

"We have an overwhelming technical and public relations problem in Channel 3, the Public Broadcasting Station (PBS)," he said. "It is of course true that most people contract with Cablevision to get stations other than the three local ones. Principal among the additional stations is PBS.

"The reception on channel 3 has not been

good," Valtin continued. "The Tampa PBS station is received directly at the Pine Island tower. Due to electric line arcing on Pine Island, unless the electric company makes major changes in their system, the problem cannot be solved by anything we can do. Also, co-channeling (far distant stations on the same channel) causes interference. The solution is to install a microwave relay via the Miami PBS station."

The Miami station, a wealthier one than its Tampa counterpart, will have better programming, Valtin said. Therefore, reception and content on channel 3 will improve.

'Technically, to bring them in means the construction of two additional

microwave relays. Palmer Cablevision has already ordered the hardware. After FCC approval, construction, installation and testing, it is our hope and expectation that channel 3 will be completed by the end of the year.

Valtin said a new automatic sensor system has been installed. which will improve switching capabilities. He also said that reception problems experienced recently by some subscribers was due to digging on Sanibel-Captiva Road by subcontractors of United Telephone System.

"They have been very careless in cutting through our lines," he said. "They have done constant daily damage to the cables.'


Kiwanis present Community Association with \$500

"I need a goal or something to motivate me; I find it hard to motivate myself without an incentive," says Mark Westall, known to most Islanders as "Bird."

It's a confession that's hard to buy, coming as it does from such a well known environmentalist, nature guide and osprev authority.

Mark's prime motivator for the last three years has been s concern for Island wildlife. Studying, teaching and constantly working in the field, he has earned the respect of not only local residents but his peers in the area of enironmental study as well

foreseen agonies.

"For the first time in my life," he says today, "I was able to do anything I wanted. I threw a lot of parties and played a lot of football. You didn't take classes on Friday afternoon because you had to play football with the guys, priorities you know! I lived in the dorm and went absolutely wild." But the initial joys of constant partying wore thin, as did

Mark's interest in his chosen field, anthropology. he had hoped to one day work for the Bureau of Indian But as time wore on he began to realize the futility of working for a government that only wanted to turn Indians into white men. Three years into college his world began to crumble.

Later, Mark began to realize, 'Hey, people can even make a decent living at this. I should get a degree in this." So he returned to school.

Mark decided to go back to school in the Public and Environmental Affairs field, but found he only needed three more credit hours for his anthropology degree. He decided to carry a double major in both fields.

Shortly after graduation he came to Sanibel, following on His main interest revolved around Native Americans and the heels of his new girlfriend who had found employment with the Island Reporter.

Growing up in Indiana, Mark has few memories of early environmental concern, but a few distinct memories do stand out in his mind. His father bringing home baby rabbits. Fishing. And the traumatic memory of smashing a rabbit's skull after having mortally wounded it with a .22 rifle in his father's garden.

"My dad had a garden in the back yard and the rabbits were getting into his lettuce," Mark recalls. "He said, 'Let's go get some rabbits,' so I took the gun my grandfather had given me and went out with him. I shot a rabbit from about 150 feet, never thinking I'd hit it, but I did. It was wounded pretty bad and I had to kill it. Have you ever heard a rabbit cry? It sounds just like a baby."

The seed of that experience sprouted roots. "I asked myself, 'Why am I doing this? My dad gives away half the lettuce in the garden to the neighbors anyway.

"I know now that I'll never shoot at another living thing." Later, Mark's compassion for all living things would help him find a niche when he felt out of sorts with everything else around him. But not for awhile.

In 1973 his beloved grandfather died, he and his longtime girlfriend broke up and he dropped out of school.

"I just didn't know what I wanted to do with my life," he recalls. "I kept thinking, 'We're only here for a short period of time so what am I doing trying to please everybody else?"

Rather than returning home, Mark stayed in Bloomington, working several nondescript jobs and going out nights. He worked at a Bonanza steak house and as a kitchen appliance installer. Then, nearly a year later, he began to find his way again.

"One day I saw a sign posted that was advertising an organizational meeting for the Sierra Club," he remembers. 'It said, 'Bring your ideas,' and I almost didn't go because I didn't have any ideas. But I wound up going anyway."

Mark showed up at the first meeting, as did more than 100 other people. "Everybody had all these great ideas," Mark recalls, "and finally I stood up and said, 'All these ideas are great but we need to get organized first.' 



The Island handicapped

This week our article deals with accessibility to the beaches by the handicapped. Sanibel and Captiva are often characterized by the Chamber of Commerce as "The Enchanting Islands." Truly the Islands are enchanting and wistfully beautiful. Often my favorite handicapped gal and I go out to the Causeway to watch the setting sun, to feel the breezes, to hear the surf and to commune with the beauties of nature. We don't look for or require anything except each other, as we ponder the inexplicable wonders that surround us.

Unfortunately the sun soon sets, the lights in the buildings come on and we are forced to return to the realities of everyday life. Realities, what are they to the handicapped? A blind man can't articulate the beauties of a sunset, or the lights of buildings coming on at dusk. A deaf mute can't listen to the sound of the surf, or the crescendo of a musical passage. An amputee, too often, can't walk to a bus, go to a movie, purchase food or clothing, eat at a popular restaurant, write to a friend, or have mobility without the indulgence of relatives or friends. That's reality for many of our handicapped friends.

I recently suggested to some handicapped people that we try to obtain a private parking area, boarded walkways, and a pavilion on the Gulf, especially for the handicapped. From the rhetoric that followed my suggestion, I gathered that I was insensitive to their problems. Handicapped people don't want special facilities and they don't want special favors. They want to go to the beaches to sun, to picnic and be with family and friends. They want a fair share of the tax dollars to provide social benefits that are needed for a reasonable existence.

About a year ago, two of our favorite beach access areas were altered. Walkovers were installed at the Fulger Street and the Tarpon Bay Road beach accesses on the Gulf. The prime purpose of the walkovers was to protect beach vegetation. Both of these walkovers do this and more. They intentionally bar motor vehicle access to the beach at these points but unfortunately, they also bar our friends, the


handicapped. I cannot honestly find fault with the reasoning that prompted the implementation and the installation of the walkovers. Until I became personally concerned by the problems of the handicapped I probably would not have noticed the elevation changes at both ends of the walkovers, nor would I have noticed the sharp rise and fall to and from the apex of the walkovers. I am now better informed and intimately concerned.

Our city government has cataloged 40 public and private beach access points. Thirty of the access points are public. None of the public access points are readily accessible to the handicapped. They do not have paved handicapped parking areas or walkways to the beach. I suggest that if we support the paving of roads as a condition for an interlocal agreement, for tourism and for safety, then surely we can support the paving of parking areas at the beach and boarded walkways to the beach for our taxpaying, handicapped friends. It makes good sense for the community to deal with this social and humanitarian issue

Shelling Tips by Capt. Mike Fuery

Have you ever come across a strange looking creature in warm waters. the Island waters which looks something like a fat butterfly. but gives out a purple "ink" when disturbed?

They are from a family named Sea Hares which are found in warm waters around the United States but here, along the shore of Sanibel and Captiva Islands, these interesting shells are known as Spotted Sea Hares.

There are two things you will want to know about our Sea Hares. First, they are one of those hard to classify things because they are really a shell without a shell. That is, there won't be any hard protective coating surrounding their soft bodies. Nothing like an ordinary shell would be, for instance.

Secondly, Sea Hares make terrible collector items for your display shelf. This is good in a way, because people won't take them alive in large numbers, but bad in another because there is no way to preserve the beauty of this creature other than to observe it while it feeds in shallow,

I think that the Sea Hare is about as fascinating a swimmer as you will see in our waters. I referred to it as a fat butterfly, which is about what it looks like as it moves.

The Hare is perhaps five or six inches long, and probably a green color with spots on its body. It has a body which resembles a "slug" or snail, but with thin wings. There is a head, but it is almost covered up with the fatty body tissue and on the end of its head it has flared things which I think hold the eyes. It probably sounds perfectly dreadful, but get around the description and you have a very attractive shell.

I haven't seen any Sea Hares in the past couple of months. It seems that in late spring they are often seen coming up on shore with the strong winds. I've seen them swimming along by themselves out on the grass flats of Pine Island Sound, but I have rearely seen them in groups.

Unfortunately, this isn't true when they die. The heavy body of this Sea Hare makes it very uncontrollable when

caught in heavy tides or winds. I've come upon many, many dead or dying Sea Hares on the eastern shore of Cayo Costa Island over the past few years.

They don't seem to be harmed or sick, just caught in the elements and hurled onto the beaches where they can't get off. They eventually are stranded there by low tides and the birds sometimes eat their remains.

I've tried many times to put back the Hares, but with little success. It is when handling these things that you will notice that if alive they will spray out a purple substance in the water. Sort of a smoke screen to shield them from an attacker, I expect. It isn't harmful, or never has bothered me at least, so don't be frightened by this colorful display if you try and coax one back into the waters.

I mentioned earlier that the Sea Hare doesn't have a hard shell. That's not completely true for all of the Sea Hares. It seems that several varieties do have a somewhat hard shell, but inside the flesh, not outside, as most shells would be built

They are fascinating to watch in the water and if you should see one caught in shallow water, give it a gentle shove back to the deeper water.



BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, you'll have to get a permit to have one on a Sanibel public beach. The Fire Department on Palm Ridge Road will supply you with a fire permit for \$1. Their hours are from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. in ad-dition, you'll be required to make a \$25 deposit, returnable when the beach has been in-spected for litter and debris. Make sure you clean the area thoroughly or you'll be out \$25! Condo owners or managers may submit a letter to the Fire Department, acknowledging that they will assume responsibility for cleanup after a fire in front of their building. The \$25 deposit will be waived in those circumstances

GATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator,



SPEED LIMITS


There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department. Driving or parking a motor vehicle or moped on the bike path is strictly prohibited. Violators will be ticketed.


