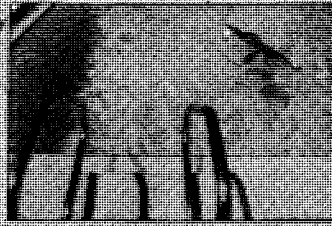

**Off Island  
oil-drilling  
this fall**

An area 80 miles west of Sanibel and Captiva Islands has been selected as the first offshore oil-drilling site in Southwest Florida.

Tenneco Inc., reportedly paid some \$8 million for the oil and gas drilling rights to 30 tracts of land totaling 172,900 acres.

The oil-drilling end of the operation is expected to begin sometime this fall. Tenneco's lease on the Gulf site runs through 1983 at an annual rent of over \$17,000.

United States Department of the Interior officials have also announced that a 10 million acre Gulf area located south of Naples will also be up for review by interested oil-drilling companies after the first of the year. Nearly 100 parcels off from Lee County's shores will also be put up for sale late next year.

An oil spill -  
could it happen here?

# Republican hopefuls address Island audience

The 1980 Primary Elections are approaching, and with that thought in mind, the candidates have feverishly hit the campaign trail.

Last Friday night, the Lee County Republican Committee sponsored a "Meet the Candidates Party" at the Sanibel Community Center. The objective of the meeting was to outline clearly in the minds of the voters the platforms of each candidate.

Cassius Peacock, chairman of the Lee County Republican Committee, served as the Master of Ceremonies, and introduced to a group of 50-60 Islanders the 16 off-island Republican hopefuls. The 16 candidates are running for positions on three County Commission seats, two School Board vacancies and three, of five, County constitutional officers' posts, including property appraiser and tax collector.

Although these spots are off-Island positions, the Republican Committee and the candidates stressed the need for each and every individual vote here on the Islands. Each candidate addressed the voters in an attempt to present their views concerning matters that touch the Sanibel-Captiva citizens.

After the candidates aired their individual platforms, there was a brief period for questions from the Islanders. Their questions addressed some of the immediate issues here on Sanibel and Captiva.

Some concern was raised about the Barrier Island Bill which will be on the Sept. 9th ballot. The consensus of the candidates on the issue was to get the County and state involved to protect the natural systems of barrier islands and estuaries.

There were also questions raised concern-

ing the Lee County land use plan. Some of the candidates felt the plan had not been implemented properly. They felt that the policies were vague and often meaningless in court. What the County Commission candidates hope to do is to develop a code of implementation and correct the introduction to eliminate the vagueness of the plan.

Interval ownership was also a topic of

discussion. Some of the candidates felt that the problems presented to the community by interval units was the extra impact on public facilities and roads. To deal with the matter, the candidates, when elected, would try to deal with those impacts.

Along the same lines, Islanders wanted to know whether Lee County or Sanibel and Captiva should be responsible for

public utilities used by tourists, off-Island County residents and day trippers. Some of the candidates felt that tourism should pay for tourism and a tourist tax could help subsidize tourist use.

Each candidate has been campaigning on a similar yet different platform. Brochures, pamphlets, and newsletters have been mailed to registered voters in Lee County by each candidate.

# Coastal organizer works for island protection

By 1990, 75 percent of all Americans will live within 50 miles of the coast and that has Lewis Taylor concerned.

Taylor is the Southeast Regional Coordinator for the Coast Alliance, working out of Savannah, Ga., and was in Fort Myers last week to look at the state of the barrier islands along Florida's west coast.

The Coast Alliance is a consortium of conservation groups largely responsible for 1980 being designated "The Year of the Coast," because, according to Taylor, "Conservationists realized we still had a lot of problems we had to deal with."

Taylor feels the "Year of the Coast" has been helpful in heightening public awareness concerning the fragility of the nation's coast, and the dangers of overdevelopment.

"What has been missing in the past has been a guidance of growth," Taylor said. "Guidelines have to be developed that address the public good."

Taylor is a native of Savannah, but spent several years working as a naturalist in the Everglades and is familiar with the problems of South Florida.

One of Taylor's present priorities is the adoption of a Coastal Zone Management Plan for Florida, which has been in the works since 1969. A public hearing is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Sept. 8 at Edison Community College.

"What are the extent of resources in our coastal areas and how can we best use them?" is the question the plan will answer, Taylor said. "The lack of this program results in degradation that need not occur."

But Taylor feels government policy towards the coast, barrier islands in particular, is slowly shifting in the right direction. "I think the federal government will tend toward policies that protect the barrier islands," he said. But in a personal aside, he also noted, "That could all change if we have a new president."

Taylor doesn't feel the conflict between private property rights and the public welfare should become a stumbling block in the protection of the nation's coastline. "As a body of citizens, we have a right to determine what's going to happen to the land in our community," he said.

"I respond to people who say they don't want further federal interference by asking, 'Does that mean you don't want federal subsidies?'"

Taylor hopes that adoption of a coastal zone management plan, the end of federal subsidies that encourage development in coastal areas, and legislation to protect barrier islands will be the result of the "Year of the Coast."

"Unless we come up with a product, it will all have been in vain," he said. "If we can accomplish any of this, it's served its purpose." \*



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## Federal resource management plan begins here

Next month the Federal Bureau of Land Management officially begins a study that is expected to evolve into a total resource management plan sometime late next year.

Ed Roberson, a representative with the Tuscaloosa, Alabama bureau, was on Sanibel last week talking with area environmentalists and city planners regarding alternative uses for federally owned parcels in the area, including the Sanibel lighthouse property.

According to Roberson, 55 federally owned parcels in the area will be included in the management plan. From September till December the Bureau of Land Management will take applications from groups concerned with how federal parcels should be developed - or not developed, protected and managed. Approximately

one year after the 90 day comment period ends, the management plan should be completed.

"We have no preconceived notions of what we'll be doing," said Roberson. "Organizations and governmental bodies will be making application for control of the various parcels. We'll hold public hearings and we'll be asking for detailed plans on how those groups expect to manage or maintain the property."

The Land Management Bureau will not be opening an office locally, but concerned citizens or groups are encouraged to contact The Bureau of Land Management, 1315 McFarland Blvd. East, Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

A three year planning process for the entire state of Florida is expected to begin sometime next year.

## Governor gives nod to South Seas project

Acting on the recommendation of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the Governor and Cabinet voted last week to give the public full use of the new beach proposed for South Seas Plantation.

Controversy over the proposed project had stemmed from South Seas' request to set an erosion control line delineating two-thirds of the beach created through renourishment as private and one-third public. Disagreement over whether or not the Captiva Erosion Prevention District had the legal authority to sponsor the South Seas' project was not addressed by

the Governor and Cabinet at last week's meeting.

The State did agree to give South Seas \$765,000 worth of public sand from Redfish Pass free of charge. The \$2.5 million South Seas renourishment project calls for the dredging of 785,000 cubic yards of state-owned sand from Redfish Pass to be spread along the severely eroded 10,000 northernmost feet of Gulf front Captiva shoreline.

The project must still receive approval from the Department of Environmental Regulation before proceeding.

## CONA still reviewing candidates

The Committee of Neighborhood Associations (CONA) met last Wednesday to further hammer out possible methods of dealing with neighborhood problems and review, in general, their official position on various subjects.

CONA accepted the "temporary volunteer" services of Paul Howe to act as public information director and media liaison.

According to Howe, "Several new concerns were expressed at last week's meeting and action on those issues will be taken at subsequent meetings."

These new concerns, according to Howe,

include possible action by CONA towards the "preservation of the integrity of residential neighborhoods, and the desirability of a Sanibel Code Enforcement Board and its possible membership."

CONA is also still looking over potential City Council candidates, according to Howe.

"Before we close the door (on candidate endorsement) we'd like to discuss the possibilities with COTI (the Committee of the Islands) and the condominium associations," said Howe. "We'd like to see a coalition of common community interests produced by COTI, CONA and the condominiums."

## SPD Rec Club begins pool fund

The Sanibel Police Recreation Club, champion of Island children's activities, has come up with an idea that may one day affect the Islands' 407 children and all the adult residents too.

This year the Recreation Club will be handling the Island telephone directory. Originally, the Club had planned to deposit the proceeds from the project into a police education fund, but concern for the lack of recreational facilities for Island children sparked an even more industrious project.

Citing the need for community recreational facilities for youth and adult use alike, the Club has decided to establish

a fund for the construction of an Island swimming pool.

According to Officer Dick Noon, future plans also include a recreation building with facilities for rollerskating and basketball, community education classes and after school activities.

Revenue from the Island directory, an estimated \$7-14,000, will now be going towards the construction of the Island pool. Businesses will be contacted in the coming weeks for advertising support of the directory and donations to the fund are, of course, welcome. 7

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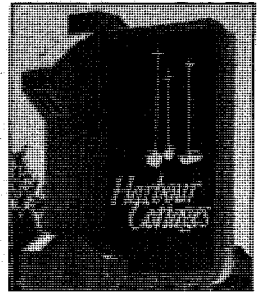
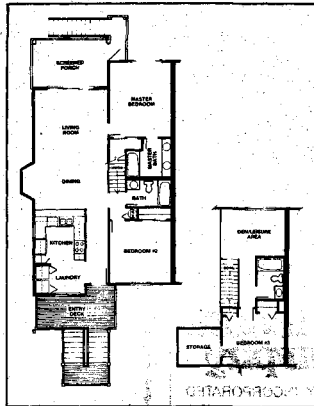
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# SKYFLIER!

"My parents told me to go fly a kite when I was young," smiles Reid Coffey, "and I took them seriously."

Reid, a 25 year old hang-glider fan from Bradenton, brought his favorite toy to the Islands last week: an 85 lb., ultra-light, motorized hang glider. "It's a crowd pleaser," he explained, "and I like the attention."

Well, he was right on both accounts.

Delighted vacationers watched in amazement as Reid flew up and down the beach in his quick-silver glider. No sooner had he landed before a crowd of interested onlookers came by to see just what this guy was all about.

Reid has been doing construction work on the Islands, and when he's not working, he's out flying with the birds. "Like they always say," he explained, "it's a natural high. There's only one thing better," he joked, "and you can't put that in print. When you're up and flying that's the best feeling. You're out of reach and out of touch with the world."

Although Reid feels it is a safe sport he firmly believes no one should ride a motorized glider unless they have years of experience under their belt. "I make it look easy," he says, "but it really isn't. You've got to take it seriously. I've got a lot of respect for it."

The quick-silver glider ranges in speed from 25-65 m.p.h. and carries 100 pounds of wind thrust. The 48 inch wooden propeller and the 10 horse power engine provide power for Reid to fly on days when there is no wind; although, as Reid says, the beach

is a great place to fly because there are 10 m.p.h. winds coming off the Gulf that are very steady and predictable.

Reid has flown his glider 45 miles at a single stretch and it's a great way to travel because he gets about 100 miles to the gallon. Reid has even surprised his friends on occasion by landing his glider right in their backyard when they least expect it. He has also done such crazy things as landing on rooftops and condominiums.

"I have 100 per cent control of the glider," claims Reid. "I'm the stick. It goes where I want it to just by shifting my body weight. I could land in a lawn chair if I had to."

In the past Reid has even made a living out of his interest in hang gliding. He used to fly a Delta Kite at Cypress Gardens in their water exhibition show and from time to time he carries advertisements from his glider. In that way he gets to do what he enjoys most and manages to get paid for it too.

There are many elements of danger in a sport like hang gliding, obviously Reid has had planes fly over him and under him

where the jet stream can swoop him in the worst enemies while he is airborne. Helicopters and stormy weather.

A true high-flyer, Reid has taken his glider as high as 8,000 feet into the clouds. "I turned off my engine," Reid said, "and it took me an hour and a half to get back down."

"Everyone thinks I'm crazy!" he confesses.

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# Sanibel team sweeps Championships

The Greater Lee County YMCA (GLCY) team, including 17 Sanibel Swim Team members, won the coveted Gulf Coast Championships swim meet in Venice this weekend.

In only their second year of competition in the Gulf Coast Championships, the GLCY team topped the perennial powerhouse Sarasota YMCA team.

"We won by almost 200 points. I couldn't believe what happened," said Sanibel coach Dick Noon. "Sarasota has won (the Gulf Coast Championships) ever since I can remember. Our kids really got up for the meet."

The Fenton twins, Lisa and Laura, topped the Sanibel team and both came home with first place prizes. Lisa is the new Gulf Coast Champion in the 25 yard freestyle, and Laura teamed with her sister and two GLCY swimmers to win the freestyle relay.

The Gulf Coast Championships is the major A.A.U. meet in Southwest Florida. Ten teams with 489 swimmers were entered in the competition.

Winning the Gulf Coast was all part of a scheduled plan devised by GLCY coach Mac Kennedy, and Dick Noon. The timetable planned by Kennedy and Noon called for the GLCY to win the Gulf Coast Championships this year, finish in the top five teams in the State Championships next February, and win the State meet the year after.

Going into the meet the coaches had determined that the GLCY team was as strong as the Sarasota YMCA team. "We thought we matched them in overall strength," said Noon. "We were stronger in the eight and under group and 11-12 year old boys. They were stronger in the older swimmers."

What won the meet for the GLCY were the relay teams and the eight and under swimmers. "The eight and under's were

just unbelievable," said Noon. "We just tore them up, placing four to five people in the finals of one event."

Everyone of the 17 Sanibel swimmers that went to Venice qualified for the State YMCA meet in February. "Our kids swam very, very, well," said the thrilled Noon. "They all swam better times than they ever swam before."

I hope that this gives us a big impetus toward getting our own pool," he added. Results of Sanibel swimmers:

**Lisa Fenton** - First place 25 yard breaststroke. First place 100 yard freestyle relay. Placed in the 25 yard butterfly, 25 yard freestyle, 50 yard freestyle, and 100 yard individual medley.

**Laura Fenton** - First Place 100 yard freestyle relay, fourth place 100 medley relay, fourth place 100 yard freestyle relay. Placed in the 25 yard butterfly, and 25 yard backstroke.

**Heather Maench** - Seventh in the 25 yard butterfly, fourth in the 100 yard medley relay, fourth in 100 yard freestyle relay, and placed in the 25 yard backstroke.

**Jennifer Maench** - Placed in the 50 yard freestyle, 50 yard breaststroke, and 50 yard butterfly.

**John Feeny** - Sixth in 100 yard medley relay, fifth 100 yard freestyle relay.

**Jason Lewis** - Sixth in 100 yard medley relay, fifth 100 freestyle relay.

**Scotty Feloso** - Fifth in the medley relay.

**Garret Goss** - Fifth in the medley relay.

**David Maench** - Sixth in the freestyle relay.

**Todd Noon** - Sixth in the medley relay.

**David Bantrock** - Sixth in the medley relay.

**Reggie Noon** - Seventh in the freestyle relay.

**Peter Evens** - Fourth in the freestyle relay, sixth in the medley relay.

**Amber Noon, Jessica Lockice, and Chris McCann** all swam faster times than they had swam before.

Dear Editor:

In your issue of July 1st, you reported on the City Council's discussion of the Helen Evans Bikeway which is to run along the western edge of Sanibel River Estates and connect the Sanibel-Captiva Road with Gulf Drive. One of the Sanibel residents brought up the question of whether I had promised to donate more than \$2,000 for building a footbridge over the Sanibel creek. It was this resident's opinion that I had promised more and that if so, I should be stuck for more money. (Mr. Campbell is referred to.)

Let it be noted that the U.S. Government donated \$50,000 for bike paths on Sanibel Island. The U.S. Government is supported by 212 million people with a gross national product of 2.6 trillion dollars and a Carter "stringent" budget of over 600 billion dollars per year. But they gave only \$50,000. The Evans family gave land valued at \$84,000 by 1977 prices of per square foot value of lots being sold in 1977, when the land was donated to the city. In exchange for donating this land, I was forced to reduce the number of lots in a legally recorded subdivision from 11 lots to 8 lots, thereby losing over \$60,000 in potential sales. Also, for three years, 10 lots were tied up under requirements for a different density, forcing us to sell our Gulf front property which we had hoped for 22 years to build on. During these years our three college student children were forced to borrow money from Lee County Bank in order to continue in college because we were not allowed to sell any of the 10 lots as single homesites, per lot.

Another experience we have had is this: When the city was incorporated I had a planned unit development for 120 beautiful apartments for moderate income people at \$39,000 per 2-bedroom, 2-bath; with 1,200 square feet. This was eliminated and the density was reduced from 120 units to 19 units; a loss of 101 units. In addition, I had to donate part of the acreage so the bike path could go all the way from the two streets named above. I had spent over \$64,000 in predevelopment expenses and advertising for the planned units - Sanibel Hamlet.

The actual and potential losses would more than double the above figures, but the above should be sufficient to explain why we are not obligated to donate more.

In your August 26th issue, Sanibel's shadowy pedant revived his boorish bombast against the Islands' curmudgeons for publicly speaking out against the fast-growing and disruptive violations of Sanibel's zoning laws.

At his advanced chronological age, Noel MacCarray certainly should have learned that there is a great deal of native wisdom in Oscar Wilde's classic rejoinder to such diatribes that goes: "There is only one thing in the world worse than being talked about, and that is NOT being talked about."

Noel, however, did clearly broadcast from whence he is coming. He quoted the 19th century English economist and philosopher John Stuart Mill. Were Mill to have been around in this last fifth of the 20th century, he would unquestionably be dubbed either a Communist or a radical Socialist by his free-world contemporaries.

Be that as it may, in quoting Mill, Noel slyly ignored the significance of the words: "for any purpose not harmful to others" in the passage. That caveat applied to the recommended "freedom of individuals to unite" that was written in Mill's 1859 "Essay on Liberty."

Apparently, Mill was alert to the need for such a restraint. He undoubtedly had

read the poems of his famous fellow-Briton - John Milton. That poet cautioned: "Licence they mean, when they cry liberty." Our laws provide such restraints through zoning - for instance. Sanibel's proposed ordinance, which its detractors erroneously call a "bedroom ordinance" provides that needed constraint.

Noel's idol (Mill) cautioned also that: "with small men no great thing can be readily accomplished." Sanibel's pending ordinance, I believe, was not conceived by "small men." Further, its purely-objective goal is to insure that single-family homes on Sanibel are used solely for such occupancy as contemplated by CLUP and defined by the U.S. Supreme Court. (CLUP consigns multi-family housing - sought by his cohorts - to duplex and multifamily zoned neighborhoods which are many.) The CLUP's framers based their density controls on that land allocation.

Because my avowed goal is to insure compliance with the intent of CLUP, I believe that it is in harmony with that Noel attributes to Planning Chairman Winterbotham, namely: "better means for protecting the community's peace and quiet." It also is in line with similar objectives of the newly-formed Committee of Neighborhood Associations (CONA) - as I understand them.

As a proud and dedicated curmudgeon, I pledge to continue the struggle to uphold the law of the land that outlaws congregate housing in single-family neighborhoods. Mindless and misinformed detractors shall not dissuade me - for I consider their prattle as sound and fury and signifying nothing.

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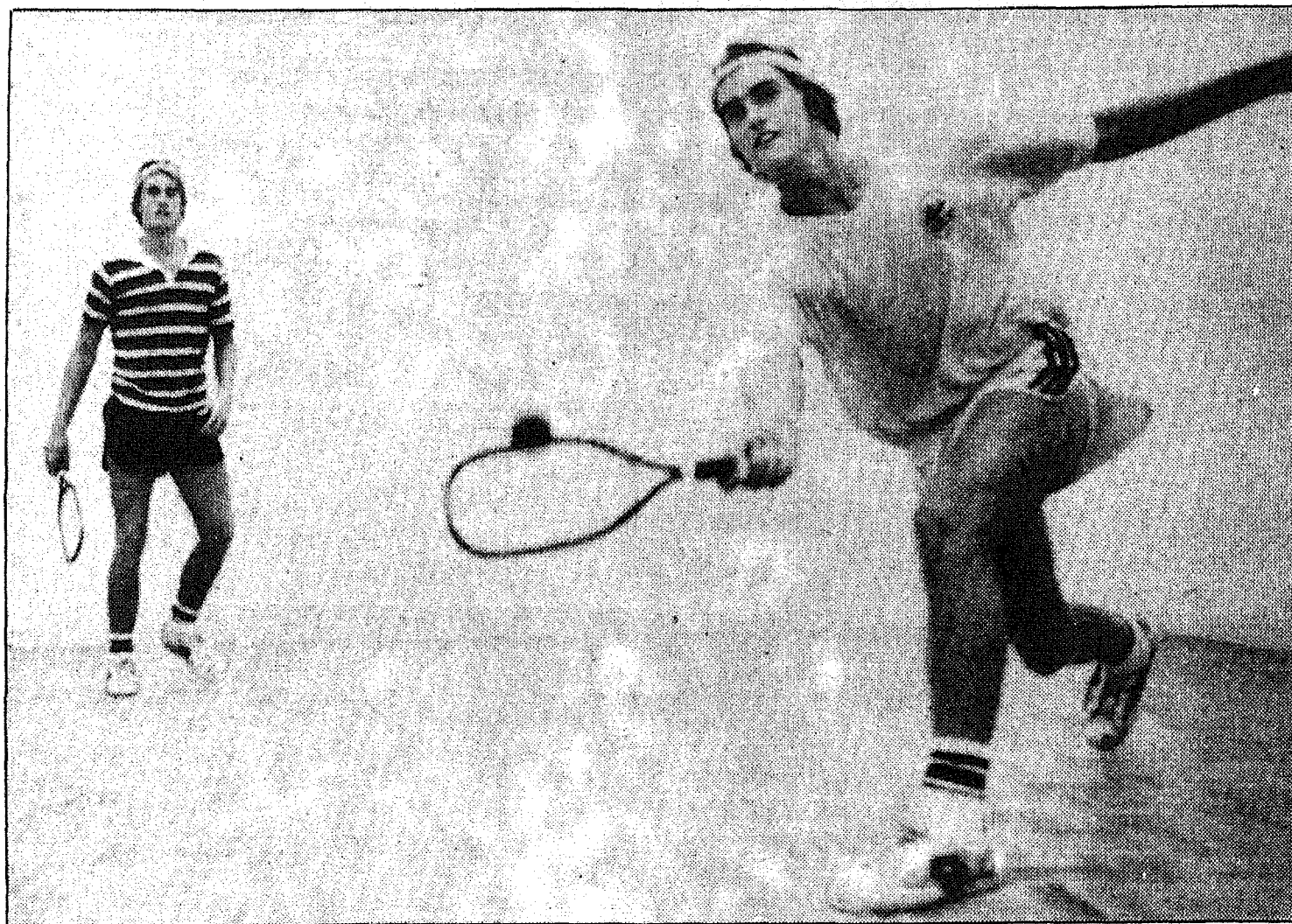

# Racquetball

## Can 5½ million Americans be wrong?

There is no doubt that racquetball has increased in popularity over the last 18 months. According to the racquetball industry and *Women's Sports* magazine, 5½ million Americans have already taken up the sport.

Included in that number are many of our own Island residents. "It's the best sport!" claims Rick Hugger, owner of Signal Inn and Racquetball Club. According to Rick, who has been in the racquetball business on the Islands for three years now, "it has definitely increased in popularity here."

As Rick sees it, there is no one particular element to racquetball that explains its increasing appeal. It is a multi-faceted sport; racquetball seems to have picked up where other sports have left off.

There are many advantages to racquetball. "It is second to mountain climbing for burning calories," claims Rick. "That's more calories than any other sport," he adds. "It doesn't take a long time to understand, it doesn't take years to build up to where you can have a good game." Rick feels that most people can get the hang of racquetball after just the first few games.

One of the challenging aspects of racquetball is the awareness of angles the players must develop. "Racquetball is akin to billiards," says Rick. The ball plays off the wall the way a cue ball plays off the pool table. One needs to play off the walls to create a certain angle of advantage. "It's a thinking game," says Rick, "strategy is very important."

According to Rick, it's not hitting the ball as hard as you can that counts as much as it is outmaneuvering with a hit. "You don't have to be a football player," he says, "you just have to use a lot of finesse."

Although one of the favorite reasons cited for playing racquetball is the concept of one on one competition, if you can't find a partner, you can still play alone. "Many people practice by themselves," says Rick. It is generally considered a good way to work out and keep in shape between games.

"It's great for keeping muscles toned," explains Rick. "There is a lot of sideward movement and you use every muscle. After three games, you feel them all," he laughs.

As with every sport, there is an element of risk involved with the game. "The main problem," states Rick, "is carelessness. People run into walls and each other. You have to be aware of other players or you can hit them with the racket."

"It's a safe sport," says Dr. Harry Kair, Island chiropractor. "I treat racquetball

problems very seldom. Most problems (with racquetball players) are twisted ankles." Dr. Kair's advice to racquetball players is to warm up before a game by batting slowly against the back wall. Because of excessive foot movement properly fitted shoes are a must.

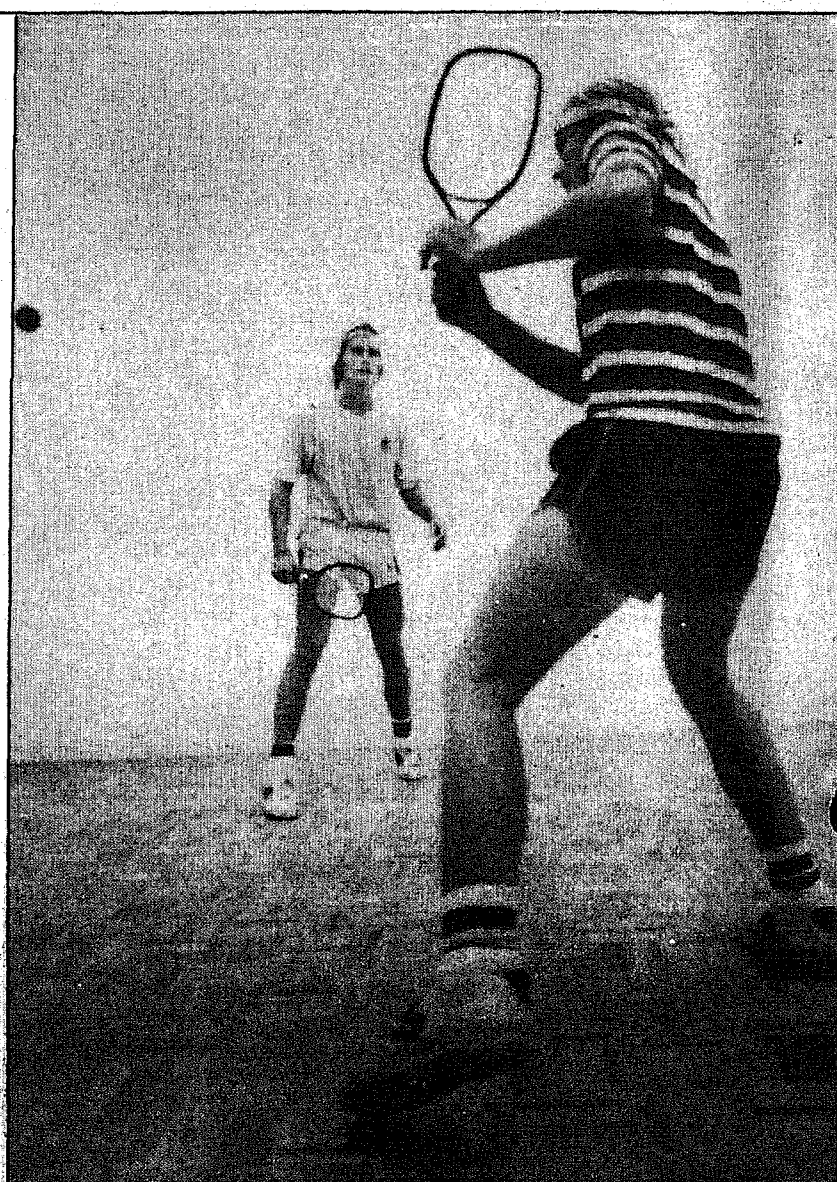
It seems that the cliché "different strokes for different folks" applies well to the game of racquetball. Barbara Hill and her 17 year old daughter, Kris, describe themselves as "exercise fanatics." Racquetball provides them with a fun way to exercise and gets their blood flowing.

"It's a sharpening of instincts and reflexes. That in itself is exhilarating." Mark also likes the element of one on one competition. "It's all focusing on you," he says, "unlike team sports, you play and concentrate harder."



"Racquetball is a very immediate thing," says Kris, "it's not boring like tennis." Some of the advantages racquetball affords the Hills is the ability to get exercise fast and yet have the rest of the day free. Also, air conditioned courts are much nicer to play on than a tennis court during the day. "There are no

walls; you'll be able to adjust. I try to play as often as I can," he adds, "except I slack off when school is in."

Missy Meunch, another Island racquetball fan, started with tennis but didn't like chasing the ball. "It's a good release from frustration," she says. "If you play someone better, you work harder.

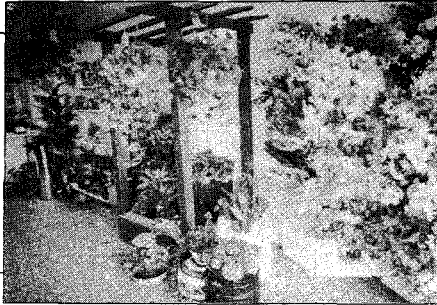
Taking over the job as head stem trimmer and flower sniffer are Charlotte Fisher and her partner, Judy Eichler. Both ladies have been Sanibel residents for

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# On the water

This week I wanted to pass on a few observations and tips I've come across which might help you add a snook, redfish or trout to your stringer.

When it comes to fishing for snook in the passes, every angler knows that while snook have no teeth, they do have very abrasive lips which will wear through even a 50-pound test leader in a matter of minutes.

So, the average fisherman puts on a leader, but from what I have noticed most people use one way too short for the job. When we fish for trout, for instance, 18 inches of stout monofilament between the hook and swivel is plenty. But when drifting in the passes, the live bait bounces too closely along behind the sinker.

Snook and redfish in the passes, and along the beaches too, are careful, cautious feeders. I think that they are spooked, not attracted, by a short outfit. The sinker deters the fish from striking.

Obviously, lengthening the leader is the answer, but how much? Some fishing guides I know use a leader of perhaps

eight feet long. They tie the leader, of 40 or 50-pound test mono, directly to the 20-pound test fishing line - without a swivel. This way you can reel most of the leader back on the rod and even some onto the reel. You can cast this heavy line without a swivel to interfere.

That is probably going a little longer than I feel the average angler really needs. I cut my leaders at about five feet, or three-quarters of the rod length. I use a swivel between line and leader and put the slip sinker, or rubber core sinker, just above the swivel.

Now, the lengthened leader will work a new way for you. As your outfit bounces along - that is as the sinker bounces along - with the added length of leader, the baitfish rises off the bottom. Before, with the short outfit, the bait was right down there with the sinker. It wears out the fish more quickly, and you've got to be a good fisherman to get a snook to strike a half-dead baitfish.

One other thing I want to mention about fishing, be it snook, trout or anything in between. When you are drifting

with the current, put on only enough weight to keep the fish down near or on the bottom.

Some people buy five bucks worth of three-quarter ounce sinkers and, come hell or high water, they aren't going to switch sinkers. Their weights work just fine when the water is tearing in or out, but on slow tides only perhaps a quarter of an ounce is needed. With the lighter weight, the bait can move around more freely - and attract fish for you.

There are many, many other little things that fishermen do to get fish when no one else seems to be able to get a bite. I certainly don't know them all, or even very many of them, really, but give the longer leader idea a try next time you are out.

And get a variety of sinker weights. Even with the rising cost of lead, sinkers are still pretty darn cheap, especially if it means the difference between getting a big one or not.

Good fishing out there this week and keep an eye on the eastern skies in the late afternoons when those big thunderstorms come off the mainland at us.

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide.

For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract four and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and four minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points, gulf or bay, guestimate and have good fishing or shelling.

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
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# Police beat

Thanks to investigation by the Sanibel Police Department, the Lee County Sheriff's Office may finally have the break they need to solve a series of burglaries at South Seas Plantation.

Last month Officer Lew Phillips pulled over Jeffrey Blain, 25, on a traffic stop and found him to be carrying a concealed weapon. He also found several stolen pieces of property and a set of suspicious keys in the car. Blain was driving. The suspicious keys turned out to be a master set to South Seas' residences.

Blain, however, claimed no knowledge of the keys and explained that the car was not his, but belonged to David Burns, also 25. Both Blain and Burns are ex-employees of South Seas Plantation and Burns has an earlier conviction on four counts of passing bad checks.

The Sanibel police moved ahead with the Captiva investigation and on July 16 received permission to search Burns and Blain's apartment. The search turned up even more master keys and numerous stolen items.

At the time of the search Burns was in Atlanta but was expected back the next day. The SPD had airport police detain Burns at the Fort Myers airport when he arrived on the Atlanta flight on the 17th and found him to be carrying two loaded weapons and a camera later traced to a burglary at South Seas.

The camera, along with \$500, was stolen from a Tennessee resident staying at the Plantation.

The results of the SPD investigation have been turned over to the Lee County Sheriff's Department and charges are expected to be forthcoming.

Ten used batteries valued at \$30 were reported stolen from behind the Gulf Station this week. A fire extinguisher was also reported stolen from Sundial and nine

pieces of pipe, valued at \$540 were reported stolen from IWA at a West Gulf Drive site.

Two bikes, valued at \$125 were reported stolen from Sundial and a quick change strident took advantage of clerks at both Duncan's and the Island Pizza.

Gumbo Limbo Rd., from First Federal to Tarpon Bay, was sprinkled with heavy construction nails late last Thursday night.

Priscilla Murphy and the Open Gate Boutique were both broken into last week but nothing was taken.

Between \$150 and \$200 was reported stolen from a desk drawer at the Bank of the Islands last week. Investigation into the incident is continuing.

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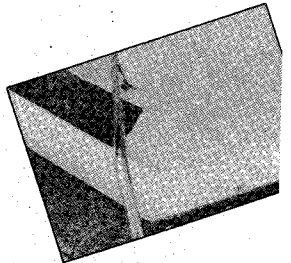
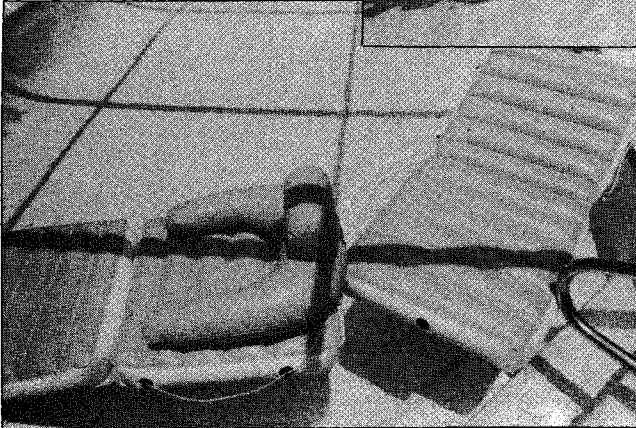
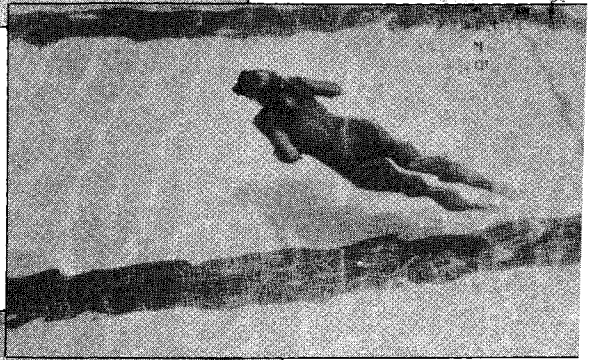
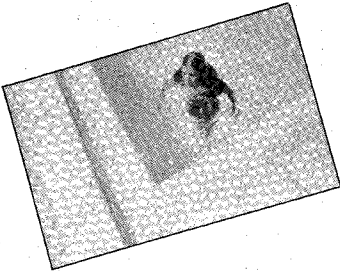
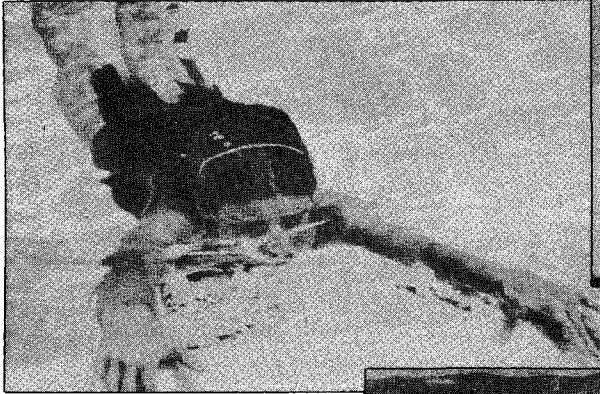
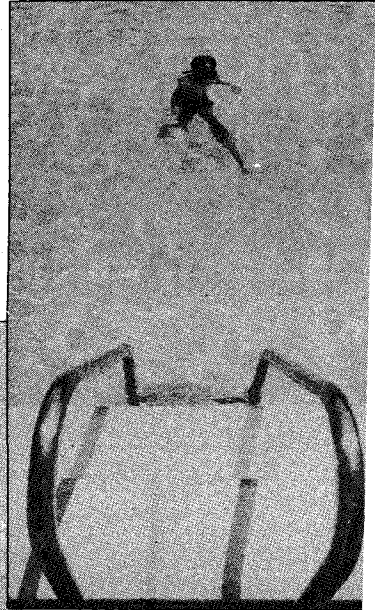
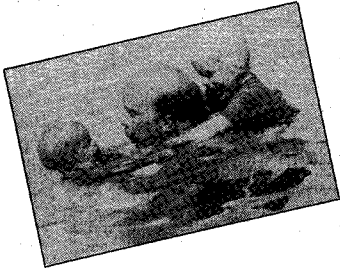
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
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# Island Textures

# 3 counts dismissed from Maxwell suit



Three of eight charges brought against the City of Sanibel and Police Chief John Butler by ex-City employee Steve Maxwell were dismissed last week by Circuit Court Judge John Schoonover.

Maxwell's charges stem from a July 1979 incident when he was committed for psychiatric observation under the Florida Baker Act by Chief Butler.

Judge Schoonover agreed with City Attorney Neal Bowen's argument that the City had neither violated Maxwell's equal civil rights nor his state constitutional rights.

The judge also ruled that Butler had not

violated Maxwell's state constitutional rights by involuntarily committing him against his will.

The Baker Act provides for involuntary commitment by law enforcement officials when a person appears to be either a threat to his own safety or to that of another person.

Maxwell's charges that he had been falsely imprisoned was also dismissed by the judge on the grounds that false arrest, another of the charges, was virtually the same as false imprisonment.

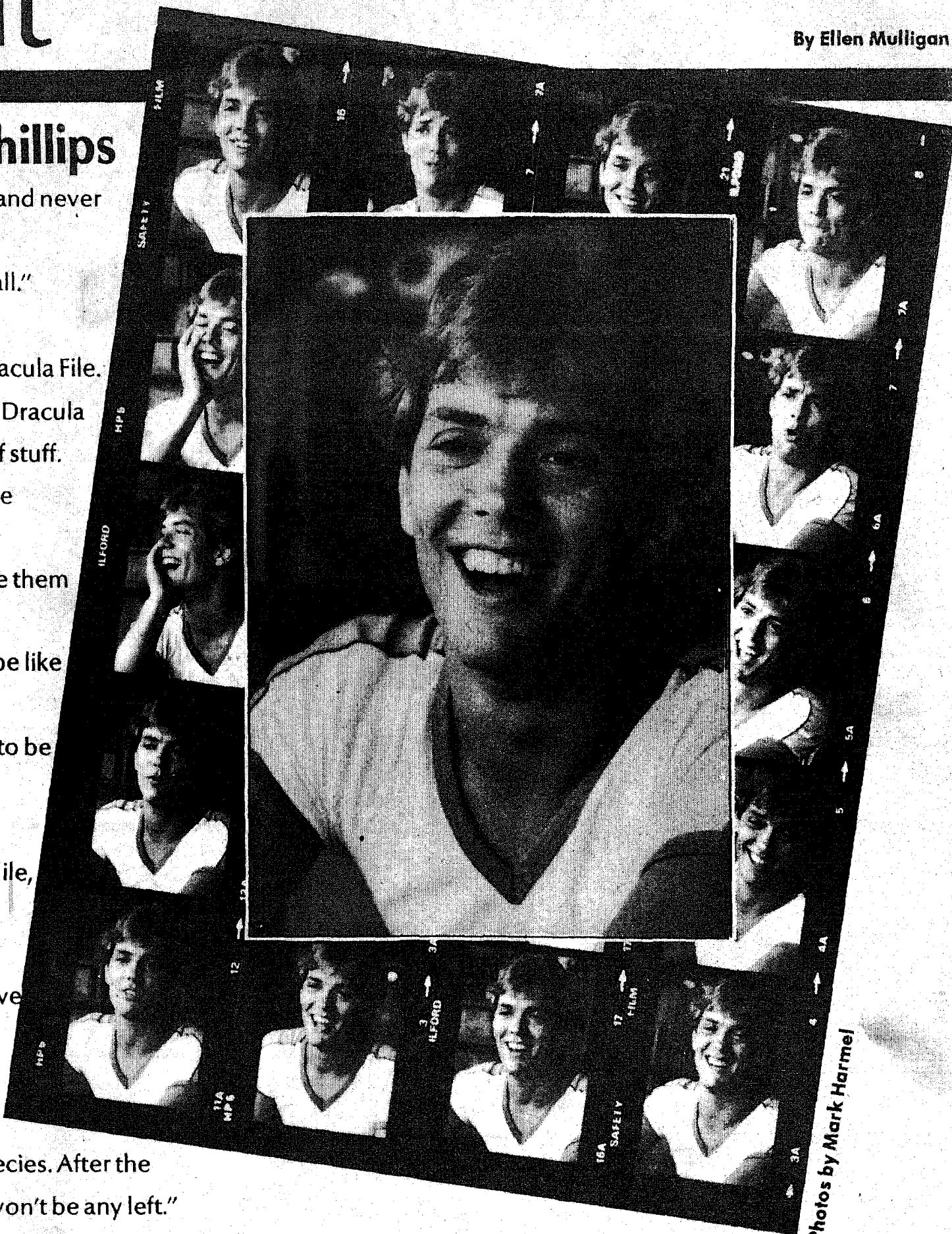

Steve Phillips literally bursts with energy; one could undoubtedly make a fortune if they could figure out a way to bottle and put him on the market.

Steve is a member of the notorious Phillips' clan that migrated from Kentucky to pop up in peoples' lives all over the Islands.

A conversation with Steve may leave one confused for a while, but after listening and digesting what he says you realize that he makes a strange kind of sense. You also realize that everything he says comes right from the heart.

"People say, 'Steve you're weird,'" he says. "I'm not weird, I'm different. I'm different by saying I'm like everybody else."

Just let those words sink in. They are a prime example of the Steve Phillips logic.

"I don't consider myself a naturalist," he says, although other people may consider him one through his association with Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF).

"I'm a field biologist or a wildlife biologist," he explains. "Everyone says they're a naturalist. I don't even know what that means."

For Steve, his job with the SCCF "turned out perfect." After graduation from Eastern Kentucky University, he was unable to find work. So, he did the natural thing and decided to take a vacation and visit his brothers, Lew and Jamie, on the Islands.

While visiting here, he took a part time maintenance job just to keep in the money and then, much to his advantage, the SCCF opened up a position for a staff naturalist.

"I was not aware that the Conservation Center did things

that I was trained for," Steve says today. "A lot of people don't get a job in what they are trained for."

Steve now does a little bit of everything at the Center. He helps prepare exhibits, clears the nature trails, and does much of the program coordination. "It changes everyday," he says. The main goal at the Conservation Center is to keep what wildlife population they do have and to provide a natural environment for those species.

"Actually," Steve says, "we're making it the way it was before man came, and trying to make it compatible for man and animals."

Steve Phillips is the type who doesn't mind getting a call at 2 a.m. to rescue a nuisance alligator or snake. In fact, that happens to him quite often. The first time it happened, he had to rescue an 11 foot alligator out of the Jolly Roger motel's swimming pool.

Unlike many licensed poachers who go out and kill the nuisance gator or snake, Steve tags them and returns them to a place on the Island where they are back in their natural environment- yet no longer a nuisance or threat to the community.

Though Steve feels cats and dogs are too much trouble, he has always been a pet collector. He has a collection of 20-30 exotic snakes that he maintains easily and conducts research on at the same time. Their names are as exotic as the snakes themselves. "One is called Houdini because he gets out all the time," Steve laughs. "Then there is Sodom and Gomorrah," he continues, and since the Wizard of Oz is his favorite story, he named others after the characters Toto and Dorothy.

Having grown up in Kentucky, Steve considers himself to be one of the best hillbillies to ever have come out of the mountains. He attended Eastern Kentucky University where he followed the 'six year plan.' According to Steve, organic chemistry was one of the things that kept him in school so long. It's one of those college courses that is like the plague; almost impossible to get rid of.

He eventually received his Bachelor of Science Degree in wildlife management, and compares his old college dorm room to "Tarzan's Jungle." It was full of snakes, lizards, hamsters and iguanas until the dorm director found him out. "I had to get rid of them or find another place to live," Steve says.

Today, Steve finds himself "going in all different directions." At this point in time, he manages to do a little bit of everything he enjoys. He works on his drawings, he works on making people smile, he works with his animals, and he works with his snakes. "If anything comes up in one of those areas, I can go that way if I want," he says.

"I get a kick out of people," Steve confesses. "I like freaking them out, and I like to make them smile." Though he may like 'freaking' people out, it's not in the sense of scaring them to death. Rather, Steve likes to shed a new perspective on things which may be considered ordinary. For instance, on one of his tours at the Center, he says to his group, "Next we are going to see the world's largest fern," and then he steps back to enjoy the chorus of oooh's and aaahh's that follow.

"I like to make people happy," he says, and everyday, that's exactly what Steve Phillips does.

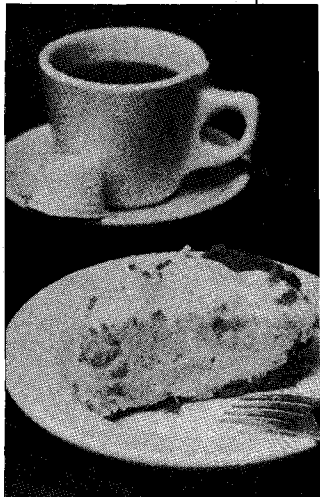
This morning for breakfast at the Lighthouse Restaurant I had Anne's Banana Cheese Pie. To some of you, pie in the morning may seem a bit much, but for me it's as easy as "falling off a log."

Anne Adams, a favorite waitress at the Lighthouse, often makes 10 of these pies a day and some enthusiastic aficionados order an entire pie to take home. Anne won't give out her recipe, though, so I'll attempt a sufficiently mouthwatering description of this heavenly confection myself.

The crust is a thick, homemade, authentic, rich with butter and sugar, honest-to-goodness real graham cracker crust. It can't be beat! Even homemakers these days seem to be using those frozen, cardboard imitation crusts. The pie itself is filled with slices of ripe bananas enfolded in - I don't exactly what. But it seems to be an addictive blend of sweetened condensed milk, cream cheese and the merest hint of lemon, to keep the bananas from turning brown. The result is wonderfully rich, not too heavy, and a dessert that you'll crave occasionally and want to introduce to your friends.

Unfortunately, the Lighthouse will be

closed for the month of September. You'll have to slave off your Banana Cheese Pie binge until the restaurant reopens in October.

# Danny Morgan - dreamweaver

Danny Morgan is a painter of dreams, a historian of times gone by, a singer of romantic epics and a documentarian of the Islands' ebb and flow.

Three years ago he came to the Islands for the first time for a weekend - "and after 30 minutes called up Cincinnati to cancel the rest of my life."

That first trip, strictly a business venture, lasted four weeks and since that time he's been an on-again-off-again Islander, so enamored with the Island ambience that his band is named the Floating Island Revue and his repertoire contains a goodly number of Island inspired songs.

Currently he is an on-again Islander, playing his tunes and weaving his dreams nightly at the Casa Ybel Thistle Lodge.

At a time when self-confessional music revealing romantic passion and autobiographical change seems a bit antiquated, Morgan fearlessly forges ahead, independent and adamantly refusing to be swept up in the 80's 'done music syndrome.'

"I try not to be homogenized," he admits, "and I avoid putting myself in situations where I'm forced to be homogenized. I prefer to look for the 'groove' in life, the place where things naturally flow."

Indeed, a conversation with Danny Morgan is a step back into the Sixties when all things were thought possible, when creative juices flowed through the national consciousness and independence reigned supreme. "I'm 32 going on 18," he laughs. "I refuse to grow up. I was very much involved with everything that was the Sixties."

"Everything involved with the Sixties" for Danny Morgan, included working with

a band named the East Orange Express (three former Express members are now with the Pure Prairie League), serving as class president and making the Dean's List at Eastern Kentucky University, being named to Who's Who in American Colleges and being the first conscientious objector in his state to receive a deferment based on his philosophical beliefs.

"It wasn't that I didn't want to serve my country," explains Danny, "I volunteered for the draft; I just wasn't interested in blowing away people who lived halfway around the world, people who weren't invading our soil."

The Fifties and Sixties had a definite creative impact on Morgan, whose first musical idols included Buddy Holly, Elvis Presley, Eddy Arnold and the Beatles. Indeed, his nightly performances at Thistle Lodge feature favorites from the past, including Jackson Brown, Arlo Guthrie, James Taylor and Beatles' standards. The real treat comes, however, when he performs his own music, which sounds like no one else's at all.

Morgan can't read music and has learned everything he knows either by ear or through having others show him how. The reason he is a musician, he explains a wee bit facetiously, is because he's not an athlete.

"I came from a real hard-core sports area," he says. "Our high school had an undefeated team. I played second string halfback and was getting beat to a pulp; I broke my leg, my thumb and almost had an eye put out. These guys were my buddies but they were animals!"

Watching other performers was the initial spark that fired an interest in music that would eventually take Danny out of

sports into the world that became his career. "The football team would use me to get girls," he laughs. "They'd come and get me and say 'Get your guitar, we're going to the beach.' I'd sit on the beach and play my guitar and the girls would get the girls that gathered around!"

Music offered Danny a niche at a time when he was suffering the identity crisis common to youth. After finally making a commitment to music his grades in school

improved, as did his self-image. Later, he would tour with such big name bands as the Beach Boys. He did, in fact, tour the

roads of America for six years. Now, however, he limits himself to the Islands, Colorado and his hometown of Cincinnati.

More than a decade after his first guitar, Danny still believes in the magic of music. "People write or create because they're moved emotionally, not intellectually," he explains of his fervent creations. "My songs are about powerful events: romance, the romance of these places and the romance of people. My songs reflect a whole lot of falling in and out of love."

Danny Morgan will be at Thistle Lodge for seven weeks, playing nightly from 8:30 till midnight, Tuesday through Sunday.

## Sanibel resident appointed to advocacy group

Sanibel resident Noel J. MacCarry has been appointed by the Governor to an advocacy group responsible for protecting the legal and human rights of Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) clients in a 10 county area.

The Human Rights Advocacy Committee (HRAC) was established by Florida Statute and is comprised of a state committee and a network of units from the 11 HRS districts.

According to Committee Chairman Robert Weston, of Lakewood, "The Committee serves as a third party mechanism for investigating and helping resolve complaints and reports of abuse or deprivation of constitutional and human rights of clients participating in programs funded or regulated by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services."

HRAC members serve on a voluntary basis and are selected on the basis of their "involvement in community affairs and concern for the welfare and rights of citizens," according to Weston.

For all you ol' fishing fans, does the word popper ring a bell? Don't be alarmed if it doesn't because it isn't what one would consider to be a household word. Yet.

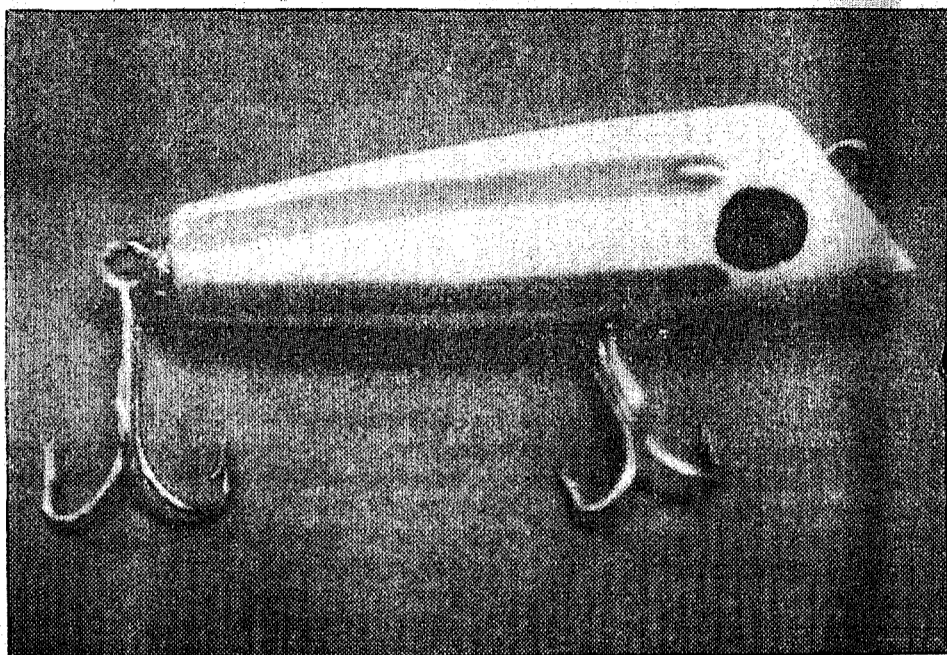

"It's part of that old history that has gone by," explains Capt. South. It's just such a great fishing lure, however, that he continues to keep it among his tackle inventory.

The Sanibel Popper isn't just a lure. It is a precision, hand-crafted plug that must float "just right" on the water in order to be effective. Several different kinds of wood were tested before the discovery of the "trade secret" that provides the popping sound the popper makes when a fish has been hooked.

The popper was very popular years ago before being taken off the market. Capt.

## City receives new chipper

A new landscaping tool that will also recycle vegetation on the Islands has just been purchased by the City of Sanibel.

A brush chipper, purchased new for \$3,880, will be set up off Island Inn Road to mulch and compost vegetation as small as a flower or as big as an eight inch log.

Pending Council approval, the site on SCCF leased property will be manned as a drop-off point for vegetation a couple days a week. The hours will be announced after the site is opened in October.

After the vegetation is mulched the City hopes to sell the chips. "I hope people will want the chips, we will have the same thing that you buy at K-Mart but it will be Island material," said Public Works Director Gary Price.

Some of the material, especially Brazilian pepper chips, will be composted and sold as compost material.

The chipper will spend most of its time at the Island Inn Road site, but it can be transported to City landscaping projects where it can blow the chips into the weeds.

The City is working on the vegetation recycling program with the SCCF.

## SPD Rec Club donates \$100 to Cypress Panthers

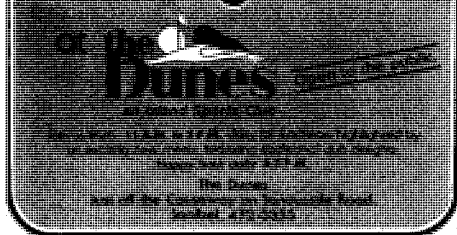
The Sanibel Police Recreation Club has donated \$100 to the Cypress Lake High School football team for the purchase of team jerseys.

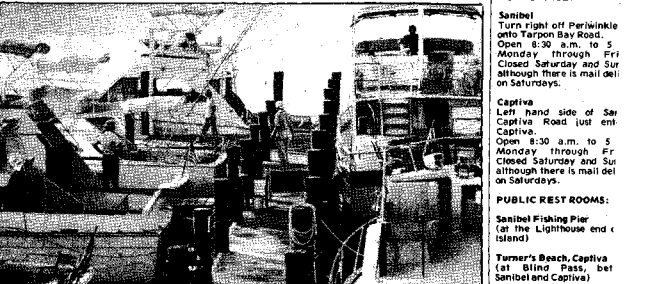

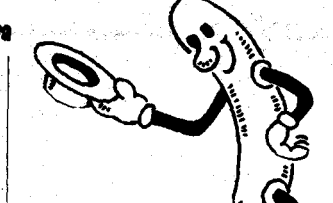

# For Your Information

## BEACH ACCESS

Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes away from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Stormwater Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

## CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. If you desire a permit, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 1, 1986, it is now illegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48" x 24" x 12" deep with an enclosed metal grill) for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have had your beach fire, it is recommended that you assume the responsibility of cleaning up any debris or litter in your area.

## CATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators are fined or subject to a fine up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run in m.o.s., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator,

The City of Sanibel prohibits the taking of live shells to 1/2 live shells per person per species. Shell collectors are to take any live shells whatsoever.

## SPEED LIMITS

Time limits are varying speed limits: 20-30 m.p.h. as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them, to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department. Driving or parking a motor vehicle or moped on the bike path is strictly prohibited. Violators will be ticketed.

## BICYCLE RULES

If you're not used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out for it on Sanibel. The extensive network of bike paths on the island is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path. A State Law and City Ordinance prohibit parking or driving on the bike path. MOPEDS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE BIKE PATHS. Planning on spending some time on a bike to enjoy the island sun and sights? Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike rack, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding. Under Florida law, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. Drive safely.

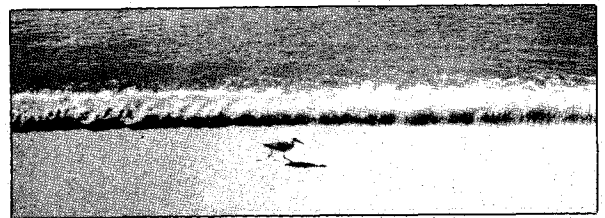

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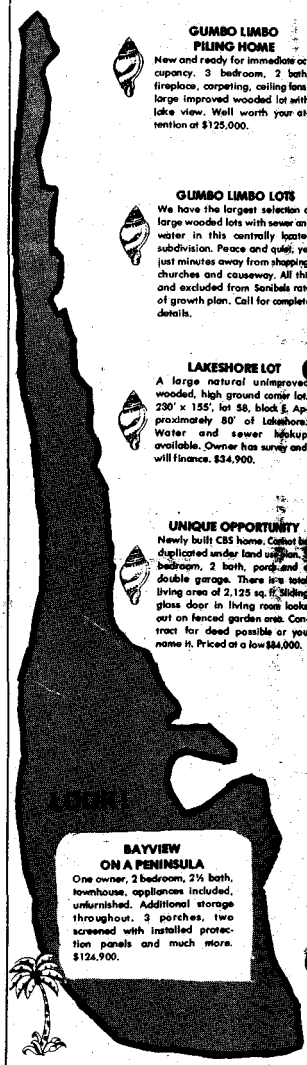

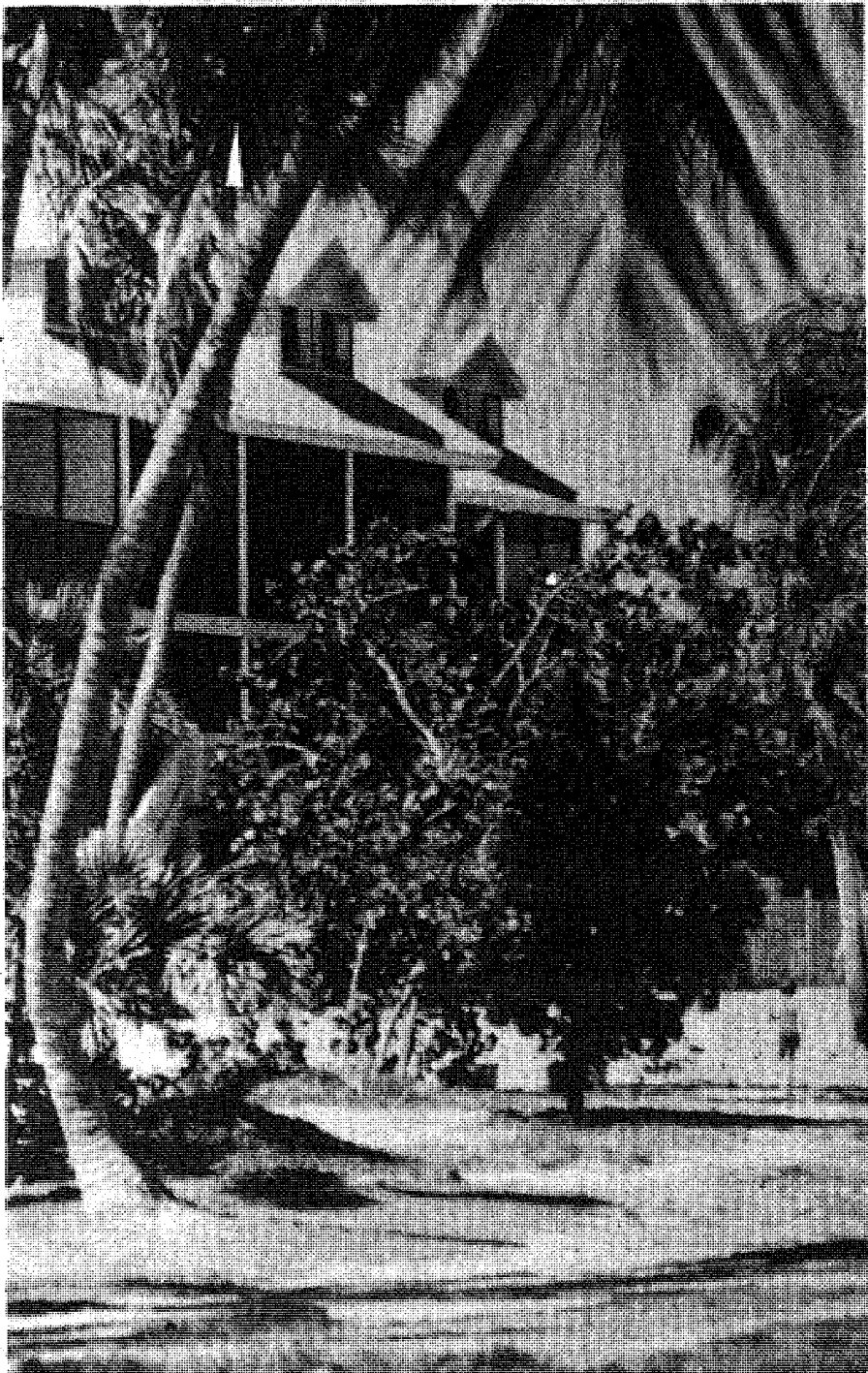
