Don't forget to vote today on the five proposed amendments to the Florida Constitution.

Proposal number one proposes a 10 year exemption from ad valorem taxes for the installation of solar and other renewable energy equipment in homes and businesses.

Proposal number two authorizes the issuance of revenue bonds to finance or refinance housing and related facilities and permits establishment of a state housing finance agency to administer the funds.

Proposal number three permits local voters to authorize local governing boards (except schools) to establish a mechanism for exemption of qualified new or expanding businesses and businesses located in blighted areas from ad valorem taxes on property

# Fitness through dance





Aerobics are now in motion on the Islands. Muffet Hayes, a certified aerobics instructor for the Lee County Y.M.C.A., is offering classes in aerobic dance at 7 p.m. each Tuesday and Thursday evening at the Sanibel Community Center.

"Aerobics in Motion," explains Muffet, "is a cardiovascular fitness program of choreographed dances, designed to enhance endurance, improve flexibility and muscle tone, and at the same time, have fun."

According to the Towson, Boston Y.M.C.A., which holds the patent on aerobic exercises, the basic objective of any aerobic exercise, such as, running, swimming, bicycling, jogging, and dancing, is to increase the maximum amount of oxygen that the body is able to process within a given time. This is called "aerobic capacity."

"Aerobic capacity" is the ability to breathe large amounts of air rapidly, which forcefully delivers large volumes of blood and oxygen to all portions of the body. It is, therefore, one of the best indicators of physical fitness.


"The classes," Muffet explains, "consist of a pre-warm-up which is intended to stretch muscles; a two part warm-up which starts at a low level and works up to a medium level rate." But that is only the beginning.

"Then nine dances," Muffet continues, "each three to four minutes in length, ranging from medium to high level activity. These dances put enough stress on the heart to achieve 'aerobic effort,' that is, enough stress to cause the heart to become stronger and more efficient and pump more blood with each stroke.


"It's demanding at first," Muffet says, "but most people learn very quickly. Women past 45 are just doing great." Since the class meets only twice a week, Muffet feels it is a good idea to take up some other aerobic exercise to complement the

Children are getting in on aerobics as well. Each Wednesday morning Muffet visits The Children's Center of The Islands to explore different "locomotions" with the children. The song "This Old Man" is used to familiarize the children with creative movement. Together, Muffet and the children go hopping, skipping, galloping and rolling around to the music. The kids love it.

Oftentimes, people would like to get themselves into an exercise routine but find the imagined drudgery of it enough reason not to exercise at all. That is why Aerobics has become so popular; it is exercise put to music so that you're dancing and having fun, not just exercising.










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# Cayo Costa - Upper Captiva low on state's priority list

State Representative Frank Mann (D-Fort Myers) is criticizing the recent low ranking of Cayo Costa and Upper Captiva on the state's priority list for acquisition of environmentally sensitive lands.

Mann still maintains, however, that "there is still a good chance of successfully concluding those purchases next year" despite their low ranking.

According to Mann, "public pressure" on the Governor and Cabinet could help in upgrading the priority ranking of the project to within a "fundable limit" in 1981. He has announced that the State Department of Natural Resources will be conducting a public hearing on the environmentally sensitive land acquisition list on October 21, in the Lee County Commission chambers at 6 p.m.

"It is extremely important for as many people as possible to attend this hearing and testify in favor of upgrading the priority ranking of Upper Captiva and Cayo Costa," said Mann, adding that he would be seeking support from local and County governments, environmental organizations and concerned citizens.

"The State of Florida has already spent \$11.2 million to acquire more than 1,100 acres of those two islands, and it is simply inconceivable to me that we would now turn around and say that it is not the first priority to conclude those acquisitions before we consider any new ones," said Mann.

"I think anyone who has taken an objective look at this situation would agree that Cayo Costa-Upper Captiva should be among the top priorities of the selection committee, rather than risk the development of those remaining parcels or waiting even longer to finish the purchases while the market value of this 'exclusive' land continues to inflate," he added.

Mann said that the state estimates it will take an additional \$13 million to complete the acquisitions on the two islands, which have already been designated the Cayo Costa State Preserve. "If this project slips through our fingers this next year, then the chances of completing the purchases becomes more remote with each year that passes," Mann warned.

The Governor and Cabinet will still have to rule on the recommendations of the committee and could scrap the list or revise it, said Mann, and "it is extremely important that they hear from the people of Southwest Florida that we want this project upgraded and funded for next year."

Mann also said that state DNR officials have also indicated that a "willingness" to conclude purchase negotiations quickly by potential sellers of Cayo Costa land could accelerate the purchase even if the priority ranking is still low. "We have some indications," he said, "that as a practical matter, if people are willing to sell at a reasonable price without any prolonged negotiations, then the state is going to act to acquire land when it is available and not simply wait until everything else on the list is acquired before whatever number on the priority list Cayo Costa is eventually

State land acquisition officials indicate that almost two-thirds or more of the two islands have already been acquired and most of the remaining tracts of land are subdivided into smaller lots. Lee County owns the upper portion of Cayo Costa and operates it as a County

Although Division of State Lands Director Richard Luddington had predicted that Cayo Costa would be the state's top priority, the new selection process created after the grand jury investigations and indictments of former DNR Director Harmon Shields placed that project 14th on the list. "I know that Dick (Luddington) was very disappointed also, but the committee simply did not follow the recommendations of his professional staff in ranking the projects," Mann said. "Dick has been extremely supportive throughout this process and has been a real friend to our efforts here in Southwest Florida.

"We simply have to regroup and begin to work on the Governor and Cabinet on this issue, and letters and telegrams of support should be sent to every one of them from as many people as possible," Mann said. "It's going to take public and private pressure to turn this thing around."

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

I wish to bring to your attention the remarks made by you at the Planning Commission hearing on September 29, 1980 at approximately 5:15 p.m. wherein you conveyed your feelings about the commercial rape of vegetation as done by the Burger Emporium and one other establishment, to a full audience of Island residents that included committee chairmen, City Council members, the press and candidates for public office, to mention a few.

To set the record straight, be advised that the developer of the Burger Emporium in Gulfside Plaza did not destroy vegetation but instead spent many thousands of dollars to transplant the existing vegetation removing only the unwanted pepper and casuarina trees. In addition, much new vegetation was purchased and planted.

I resent the inference of your placing the Burger Emporium in the same light with a developer that violated the vegetation plans and was required by the City to post a performance bond to replace the destroyed vegetation, which was never

We broke no laws at this site and received no favors, nor asked for any. We worked hard and diligently to preserve what was here and still provide walking and driving safety through the grounds,

and did this through consultation with City officials who were responsible in this area, including George Campbell.

If you deem it necessary to cite examples at public forums, I am sure there are several asphalt jungles that could be ad-

#### Commercial ROGO?

The Islander Editor:

Presumably, last year's Rate of Growth Ordinance was calculated on the basis of how many persons, at peak levels of dwelling-unit occupancy, the public facilities (utilities, protective services, etc.) on this Island could effectively and efficiently support. After all, there is just so much useable land and available water.

A similar kind of calculation suggests itself for administering applications for commercial development. This community of so-and-so many persons, according to RoG figures, can support (profitably for the "commercants") only so many business-professional establishments of various kinds. Free and fair competition would dictate that at least two of each kind of establishment be approved, within the context of the Comprehensive Land-Use Plan, of course. This could be expanded to three, or even four, perhaps, given the geographical distribution of the population on this long, thin strip of

"paradise." It is too late to "cluster" all commercial ventures at one designated mid-way point, even if that were desirable.

For example, we could probably support at least one more hardware-building supplies outlet, dry-cleaning establishment (including a cobbler?), stationerysupplies store, and perhaps another pharmacy to allow for seven-day, 24-hour availability on a rotating basis. Duplication-triplication of such services should, if possible, take into account the population-spread throughout the Island.

On the other hand, we do not need yet another supermarket or grocery, fast-food emporium, shell shop, or "boutique." Shopping centers tend to attract such places; we would do better to encourage the small businessman rather than the commercial developer, in the directions appropriate to our needs.

It would seem reasonable, logical, and uncomplicated to administer both the CLUP and the RoG Ordinances in terms of (1) the Island's capabilities to provide essential public utilities and services, and (2) how many commercial outlets of various "necessary" kinds the accepted population-level (1) can support, consonant of course with the principles of free and fair competition.


Whatever device will make this work: moratorium, yet another "study," and-or a loud and clear mandate from the people, strictly observed, is most clearly essential.

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
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


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# Register now for community courses

The Community Courses Committee is paving the way for their fourth year in a row of serving the Island community with quality adult education classes.

Initiators of the Committee in 1976, Carol Davenport and Ann Marsh, established the program to serve several functions. At that time, the Edison Community courses were petering out on the Islands and the first objective of the newly formed committee was to provide courses on the Islands for the people who live here.

The committee wanted to create an environment where the Islands' socially isolated residents could meet new people and make new friends, which can sometime difficult in a resort oriented area. This ideology was twofold in effect: It provided Islanders with an opportunity to pursue interests that they could not have pursued otherwise, while giving them the chance to get out and meet other Islanders with similar interests.

Another gap the Community Course Committee filled, was to create an opportunity for Islanders who had previously been teachers to come and share their talents with other Islanders.



While they are certainly interested in presenting new information in their classes, their real interest is in providing students with an enjoyable time; a place to meet friends while enjoying the opportunity to expand one's knowledge in selected subject

One of the most popular courses offered has been Bridge. Although the course was only offered for five weeks, many students are still playing with members they met in their class. Parapsychology and ESP was a course that also received much acclaim. There was so much interest generated over the topic of ESP that five weeks just didn't suffice. Over the past four years, the Community Co Committee has provided the Islanders with over 50 different course selections and has enrolled more than 1,500 students. 

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
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# Sanibel Scouts participate in Camp Lanochee weekend

For dinner, Mark Mellaci, Todd Noon, and Grant Slay prepared spaghetti with meat and sauce, garlic bread and fruit juice.


The time after dinner was opened for free time for the Scouts. The Scouts used this time to engage in a football game as others went out to explore the camp.

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
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# On the water

The most crucial part of boating a large fish comes during those last frantic moments when a snook, redfish or whatever is thrashing about at the side of the boat. All the skill of setting the hook and playing the fish will not amount to much if you or your partner fouls up the netting procedure and allows the fish to escape.

We have all had it happen to us and "the one that got away" stories usually boil down to a bad job of netting the fish. This week, let's talk about some of the tips you may want to keep in mind when it comes time to put that big one in your boat.

I remember just a few days ago when I went against my own better judgment and fought a 16-pound snook all the way up to the boat, but allowed one of the passengers on board my charter boat to give netting the fish a try. I truly had my hands full, with the fish having run under the engine and the anchor line.

As the snook began to splash about at the side of the boat; a well-meaning fella reached down and tried to net the fish. It only took the snook, now halfway into the net, a second to slash a large hole in the material bag. After a second try to get the fish, I just about fell over when the fish went right through the hole. Then it really began to swim wildly at the side of the boat, but the net was virtually useless. Somehow, the guy wrapped the snook into the net by twisting it around fins, gills and tail. It was about as bad a netting job as I could ever imagine - but we still got the fish!

It brings to mind some things I try to remember when embarking on the job of landing a fish. Probably the most important aspect is the net itself. If you ever wander through a tackle shop, you know there are many kinds of nets. Some are good and some should never be sold.

Two of the biggest mistakes you can make is to buy a short-handled net, of say less than three feet long, not including the hoop; or buying the wrong-sized mesh.

On the net handle, I look for one about four to five feet long. You never know how far down you may have to work from a seawall, pier or boat side. A short-handled net will have you hanging from your toenails from the side of the boat to get it under a fish.

There are some specially built nets that have handles eight to 12 feet long. These are for bridge fishing, mostly. The material of the handle is important also. I used to be partial to wooden handles until I learned the hard way. A handle made ofwood will snap right where it goes into the round net hoop if there is enough pressure. I would suggest keeping with the more reliable tubular aluminum material. Some of the better manufacturers put foam inside the handle so that if you drop it over the side, it will float. That's an important factor if you have ever lost one and had to watch your \$10 net slowly sinking to the bottom.

The mesh size is something I change with the fishing

seasons. I usually will wear out or tear up approximately three nets a year. In the winter fishing season, when we mostly fish for sea trout or small redfish, I use the smaller mesh nets that have one-half to one-inch between knots in the material. For snook season, I take a longer-handled net with larger openings in the knots.

Incidently, don't buy any net that doesn't come made from man-made materials. The old style made of tied cord or material that will rot is just a waste of money -so avoid it. Don't worry about the color of the net. A big snook is going to be "hacked off," when he sees that net, and the color won't make any difference to it. The quality of the net material and the strength of the handle is what puts 'em in

The final consideration is the shape of the net hoop. 'Ine old, standard round size is still popular and works fine, especially for smaller fish. There are, however, some new nearly rectangular-shaped nets with offset "dips" in them. You can get the net down under the fish somewhat easier. I use this type, and many guides I work with like them too.

All the netting skill in the world won't keep a poorly hooked snook or redfish from escaping at the side of the boat. But a well selected net (which should cost you approximately \$6 to \$12) is about the best insurance you can have against having to say, "You should have seen the size of the one that got out of the net."




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

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide. For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract

hour and 16 minutes for each low tide. For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add I hour and foour minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing of shelling.

# Shelling Tips

Have you ever noticed that there are different kinds of sand on the various beaches you have visited on Sanibel and Captiva Islands?

Sand is sand, right? But, apparently shells are very sensitive to the type of sand in which they feed and live. Take the delicate angel wing shell, for instance.

These white shells like to burrow into the sand and often live up to 18 inches below the surface. But the angel wing shell doesn't like pure beach sand, rather, it seeks out a type of sand found on the Pine Island Sound side of the Islands because that sand is mixed with a type of muddy sediment material. The reason the shells seek this type of material is because they send a long siphon up to the surface to gather microscopic bits of food. That passageway from the shell to the surface is packed sand and mud and will remain open so that the live shell will always be able to feed. If a live angel wing tried to burrow out in the Gulf in the regular sand the sides of the hole would continually cave in. So, it is a very special type of sand which attracts the angel wing.

There used to be several of these mud banks in the Sound where the angel wing could be found but, unfortunately, this shell was a victim of over shelling and today they are practically wiped out because so many were dug up by

shellers determined to take as many live ones as possible.

The tiny coquina, or donax shell, is another which picks out its living quarters very carefully. These are highly colorful shells, about half an inch long and are sometimes called butterfly wings. The gulls and other sea birds eat these tiny shells as they wash in and out with the surf on the beach side of the Islands. You hardly ever find coquina shells alive on the Bay side of the Island because they need clear water and light sand to burrow in quickly as the wave washes back to the deeper waters. These shells are found in large numbers on certain parts of the beach, but sometimes you will walk for several hundred yards before encountering a bed of them.

The live sunray venus shell is a clam family collector's shell which has a stained glass effect when opened and held up to the light. These shells like to bury themselves just under the sand, but they like dirty sand. That is, they like the soft sand which has lots of sediment mixed in. On a small sandbar Island along the Gulf of Mexico, you can often find the sunray on the back side, or side facing away from the wave action of the Island. Apparently, the surf makes the sand too hard for them to properly bury themselves and search for food too.

The big horse conchs, so sought after by beginning collectors, like that same type of sand that the sunray seems to avoid. In other words, the horse conch likes to bury itself on the outside, or wave side, of the sandbars. I have often come upon these shells with their foot end sticking perhaps an inch out of the sand. The shells work their way along the sand, trying to locate suitable clams or other shells on which

I have come upon horse conchs on mud flats, of course, but the majority of them are living on the Gulf side of the Islands where the clean sand is easy to hide in and also easier for them to search out and get food.

Sand dollars are seekers of a type of sand which always feels grainy to me. It seems that these live shells like a coarse sand and often are found just under, or half buried, in the sand. There are certain areas along the beaches which have this type of sand and that is why you don't find dollars all along the beaches.

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
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

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
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# Refuge

# For Your Information

**BEACH ACCESS** Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between

Sanibel and Captiva Islands.
On Captiva Island, public On Captiva Island, public beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.

NOTE: STATE LAW PROHIBITS NUDE SUNBATHING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING
Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel enjoys a beach fire, the satisfies Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the or-dinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire. but as of July 18, 1980, it is now illegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48" X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. 

The Editor:

As many concerned Sanibelites are painfully aware, an anachronism in the City's Charter has recently created many dilemmas in getting only six candidates for Council membership vacancies. Those results are a sad comparison with the enthusiasm displayed by the sixteen candidates for the original 1974 vote.

The Charter's device, called "seats," was intended as a temporary bridge to reach the ultimate goal at which each vacancy would be filled for a four-year term on a staggered basis.

It seems that, after more than six years, the desired staggering has been achieved. Consequently, either the "seats" should be given a geographical significance - or they should be scrapped as a cumbersome and unnecessary tool.

The Charter's Section 3.01 requires the five Councilmembers to be: "elected by the electors of the City at large. Each Council seat shall be designated by

number." As is done for the County Commissioners, I propose that our Council seats could be otherwise designated to Unquote continued seats could be otherwise designated to represent districts of the City and continue to be elected "at large." Because of the to be elected "at large." Because of the insular nature of our small city, there seems little prospect that a heavy demand will be made for such geographical representation.

> Accordingly, simple changes in Sections 3.01, 3.02, 5.03, and 5.05 of the Charter could both eliminate the requirement for a candidate running for a specific "seat" and still produce the desired staggering of the four-year term of office. Those amendments, in effect, would permit simple plurality ranking of candidates for filling vacancies. That would result in eliminating the expensive "run-off elections" now mentioned in Section 3.07.

> The above-suggested Charter amendments can be initiated either by a prompt Council ordinance placing them before the voters, or by a tax-expensive Citizen Initiative Petition as provided in Section 7.01. The more desirable Council ordinance route seems the preferable one.


