The City of Sanibel will be holding several meetings this week of general interest to the public.

Today (Oct. 21), at their regularly scheduled meeting, the City Council will be reviewing a rate adjustment for Sanibel Disposal, a recommendation regarding beach access and parking strategy and a request from Mariner concerning a density determination and fact-finding team. The above issues will be discussed between 9 and

Construction of an eight car parking lot for use by Sanibel residents at the intersection of Nerita St. and Tulipa Way is scheduled for discussion at 10:40 a.m.

A second reading of a specific amendment to the land use plan requested by Jerry Paulsen for a 53,800 square foot shopping center on Periwinkle Way is slated for a 2:15 p.m. hearing. Final action on the request may be taken at this time.

A second reading will also be held at 2:30 p.m. on the establishment of a City vegetative disposal center proposed for Island Inn Rd.

On Oct. 28 the City Council and Planning Commission will be meeting in a special workshop session to discuss revisions to the land use plan under the mandated five year review and hear a presentation by Smith and Gillespie Engineers, Inc. on the proposed addition by the Lee County Electric Co-op. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. at MacKenzie Hall.

A motion was unanimously passed by the board to purchase the new truck from the '79-'80 SFCD surplus funds. This new rescue vehicle will provide the community with two emergency units.

During the season, emergency calls often come within a few minutes of each other. and it has been difficult in the past for the SFCD to respond to both calls proved. simultaneously. However, the new truck will prevent this from being such a problem in hydrants in response to the new ISO inthe future.

The new rescue truck, a utility body, matching the paint of the truck with the utility body, and new radio equipment will cost the SFCD an estimated \$14,220.

Another investment that the SFCD approved was the allocation of funds to purchase a hurst tool, commonly referred to as "the jaws of life." The hurst tool becomes an essential element in situations where there is a threat of entrapment or if someone has a limb pinned.



Ray Rhodes is marching a controlled march up and down the sidelines when, for a split second, he screams wildly into a headphone set that has been shorting out on and off all night.

If you blink you miss the emotional display and are witness to only the march.

When the score hits 14-8 in the third quarter, over crosstown rival North Fort Myers, he erupts again, "I want those SOB's 46 to eight!" he screams at any players within earshot, shaking his fist at those too far away to hear.

Ray Rhodes, better known to Islanders as a sargeant on the Sanibel police force, is performing this ritual in the persona of a Cypress Lake High School assistant varsity football coach. A role he comes by naturally.

Ray himself was more than a little bit involved in competitive athletics back in his high school heyday - so involved, in fact, that he managed to separate both his shoulders, pop a knee out and break an ankle.

But high school sports, football in particular, have changed in recent years, or so says the 6' 2 Cypress Lake alumnus (class of

'68) who played football on Cypress' first varsity team and participated in both basketball and track.

Today, as Cypress' varsity line coach, Ray says there's more coaching emphasis put on discipline, responsibility, weight training and academics.

"We're teaching our kids responsibility," he says, "not only for the game but for life. Our boys have to carry so many credits and keep their grades up but we don't try to "fix" up a kid's grades with the other teachers. We tell them that classes come first. The only concession made for team players is that we try to get them all scheduled into the same P.E. class so they can take their weight training together."

Ray, who for the second year in a row has volunteered his time for free, works out with the Panther team from 2:30 till 5:30, Monday through Thursday. Friday is game night and Sunday evenings are spent studying films of the upcoming competition and developing strategies.


"There are," says Rhodes, "60 combinations we can call to screw up the other

teams' offense!"

The days of one on one, do or die high school athletics are over, he says, and more emphasis is given to the game as a means of staying in shape and perhaps furthering an education.

"Coaching today has moved a lot of the college level play down to the high school level," Ray says, adding, "It's more sophisticated, more complicated; we've put more responsibility on the kids and they've

"I like the little mental games," he explains, "guessing their plays and that kind of thing, more than the hitting and screaming. Each week is a different preparation for a totally different team."

The hours team members and coaches spend together frequently lend themselves to an intimate relationship. Oftentimes the coach becomes counselor as well, a role that Ray does not recoil from.


'The kids have to like you and respect you," he says, "but they have to hate you too - so they'll go out there and prove you wrong when you get on them. If a kid's having

trouble at home we usually know about it and try to help build him up and not get on him. Drinking and smoking and drugs are absolutely not allowed but we don't get on the guys too much about their girlfriends

"You're not their friend, as such," he continues, "and sometimes they hate you because of what you put them through. But, when the chips are down, they'll often talk to a coach when they won't talk to their own parents.

Ray also dispells the traditional "dumb athlete" myth with a laugh. "Most of our kids want to go to college for a career, not just to play sports," he says. "We emphasize that being good at sports is a good way to get help in paying for college.

"We realize that a lot of our kids are never going to set the world on fire," he admits,"but we're trying to instill in them, 'Right now you're in high school and you're playing football and you should be doing the best you can."





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
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## County and City endorse upgrading islands' status

At the urging of State Rep. Frank Mann (D-Fort Myers) the Lee County Commission voted to unanimously endorse a resolution to Governor Bob Graham and the Florida Cabinet supporting the upgrading of Cayo Costa and Upper Captiva on the state's priority list for renewed acquisition of environmentally sensitive land.

Mann told Commissioners that the state and the people of Lee County "have too much at stake" to allow efforts to buy the barrier islands to falter because of a lower ranking on the state's priority list.

"The state of Florida has spent \$11.2 million of your tax dollars to acquire these barrier islands and protect and manage them for all the people of Southwest Florida," Mann said, "and it is unrealistic to now weaken our commitment when we are so close to completing those purchases."

"It is simply inconceivable to me that we can come so far and then let this simply slip through our fingers," he added. "It does not make good political or fiscal sense to begin

new acquisition projects without completing ones that we have a realistic chance of concluding successfully.'

Mann said that Florida Division of State Lands officials concur in his opinion that Cayo Costa and Upper Captiva should have ranked high on the state priority list, "but unfortunately, under the new rules of the game, they are only one vote among equals."

Cayo Costa is currently ranked number 14 on the state's acquisition priority list. State DNR officials have indicated that there may only be enough money in the state coffers to acquire the first 10 projects on that list. although prolonged negotiations on some of those parcels may allow them to tap those funds for projects lower on the list that are ready to be acquired.

Mann appeared before the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council last Thursday and received their support for the upgrading of the projects on the state priority list. The City of Sanibel and almost organization in Southwest Florida have also upward and available state dollars continue passed resolutions of support for upgrading the priority which will be presented at a public hearing in Fort Myers next week.

"We must have a strong show of public support for upgrading this priority on the current list," Mann said, "or face the prospect of losing this acquisition in the

environmental future as land values continue to spiral to dwindle."

The state will conduct a public hearing today, October 21, at 6 p.m. in the County Commission chambers to take public comments on the priority ranking of the 1980 Conservation and Recreational Lands projects.



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## Water resource workshop

An in-depth look at water resource studies being conducted in the lower west coast area, including the Caloosahatchee River and the Big Cypress Preserve, will be Florida Water Management District, and featured in a two-day "Shirt-Sleeve Symposium on Water Resource Studies," sponsored by the South Florida Water Management District (WMD). It will be held at the Secret Woods Nature Center in Fort Lauderdale, November 20 and 21.

The Symposium came about after members of the WMD Governing Board noted that nearly a dozen governmental agencies were active in South Florida, seeking solutions to water management problems. They wondered if there were some duplication, or perhaps some gaps, in the studies being conducted.

As a result, representatives of eight first come, first served basis. federal, state, and regional agencies met to of programs to better inform the agencies and the public about studies being conducted, results of these studies, and goals for

Agencies particpaing in the lower west coast area session include: U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Geological Survey, South Everglades National Park (Big Cypress Preserve).

The lower west coast studies will be discussed from 3:05 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, November 20.

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
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




The concert will be performed in a cabaret setting with a cash bar. Tickets, priced at \$4, will be available at the door.





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



#### Mackerel and bluefish

It appears that we are in the midst of one of the best fall runs of mackerel and bluefish in recent years, but the method of fishing for them has now changed somewhat.

The mackerel are averaging a pound in weight and about 12 inches in length; not big fish by most standards. The blues are the same, mostly one to two pounds and on the small side. Because of their relatively small size, they seem to be feeding a little bit differently this early in the season.

The traditional way to get macks and blues in your boat's fish box is to troll small spoons. I started out that way this season, as the first schools of bait brought in the roving bands of migratory fish. But, I recall an afternoon when we worked one after another bait schools and never did get a strike. That's unusual if there are larger fish feeding.

The next time out I remembered what we had been forced to do the year before, which was to get near the school, shut off the engine and cast to the feeding action. With the gas prices, trolling can become a very, very expensive way to catch fish.

When we slid the boat up where the baitfish and birds were working and cast, letting the lures get down deep

before being jigged up, then the fish started to strike.

I have done some trolling since, but now only to locate the feeding schools of blues or mackerel. After locating them we get lined up along the boat and start throwing lures. Now, this may change later on in the fall when some of the larger fish move into the Island waters. But for now, remember this method if you want to save gas and increase your chances of having fish for dinner.

Incidentally, don't overestimate the ability of these fish to take large lures. You can tell right away if you are on the wrong sized spoons or jigs because you will feel the fish "bump" the lure, but never get a hook set.

When looking for ideal spoons, I tend to go for the Reflecto, size one, if I am going to cast and not troll. These spoons are killers, but if you troll too fast they will severely kink your line. For trolling, I like one called the Clark Spoon. It usually won't ruin your line.

The main thing here is to keep to the small sizes. The fish are feeding on live glass minnows and those are only an inch

Another popular way to get not only one, but perhaps two

fish at the same time is to use a tandem jig rig. Our bait shop buys them already made up for us, usually with one yellow and one white jig tied with small wire or mono leader. Makes a nice tidy outfit and comes without a swivel.

Not having a swivel is important because it helps reduce the number of lost outifits when the blues strike the swivel instead of the lure and cut you off.

Most of these ready-made outfits sell for from one to two dollars and you better get a couple of them. The nice thing about them is that the outfit can be used on about anything

Sometimes I think that I might get a little over enthused when I say that the blues are better now than the past few years, but this is exciting fishing that even the beginning angler can have fun with.

One last note, just to get your adrenalin going; in the past four years I've had one kingfish, or king mackerel as they are called, landed on my boat. The other day I noticed that there were large fish in the small mackerel school. They turned out to be kings. We hooked one, but lost it. Those big fish average 15 to 30 pounds so let's hope they stick around.



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

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide.

For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add I hour and foour minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.

# Shelling

Fishermen and shellers don't always get along too well, especially on a crowded beach. But, when looking for a certain type of shell the two groups might be able to help

What I'm talking about this week is not actually a shell in the technical sense at all, rather, it is cartilage found in the upper skull section of a fish.

If the dead fish wash up on the beaches decay and the skin comes away from the head, then you have found yourself an already "processed" crucifix shell. It should be white, but at times I have found them a light brown color. A little time in bleach will cure that nicely.

In the skull of the catfish is a peculiar formation that, once dried and cleaned, is a sheller's prize.

And that fish is the catfish, probably one of the most despised creatures that ever found its way upon a hook in Florida waters. I know that many people think of the freshwater variety when you mention catfish, but in this case these fish are the saltwater type and not very good at all for eating. In fact, fishermen regularly heap verbal abuse to no end on the slippery, slimy whiskered fish that loves to steal shrimp and other baits used in fishing. Actually, catfish will eat about anything, and I mean anything!

But in the skull of this fish is a peculiar formation that once dried and cleaned, is a sheller's prize. It's called the crucifix shell and many of the finest collections have one or two Here's what to look for.

In the head of the catfish there is something resembling a cross with a figure on it. That's where the name crucifix shell comes from. It is really quite plain a figure in the shell and I have had people out on my charters who have found one and, without me ever having mentioned the shell, remarked that it looked like a cross.

As with many shells which are rare or unusual, there is no one place where I could direct you to find one of these shells. They wash up on the beaches all over the Gulf of Mexico side of the Islands. Never in any numbers though, you understand.

We have a natural phenomenon called the "red tide"

There is one other way to get a perfect shell from the catfish and that is from fishing areas, such as around the Sanibel Fishing Pier where large numbers of catfish are caught each day.


Fishermen usually toss back the live catfish although some just leave the fish to die on the beaches or dock. If you ask, you will probably be more than welcome to take a couple off the hands of the fishermen.


The best way to take care of the surrounding skull meat is to cut the fish's head off, just ahead of the dorsal spine. Watch out, because these fish have three spikes, two on the side and one on the top and they can give you a painful puncture wound. Handle the fish carefully.


Once the head is off, get out the pot and boil it until the meat comes away. You can then get the crucifix out very easily. Sounds terrible, I know, but this way you get the best specimen of this shell.


I am always slightly amused to think that the bane of one person is the treasure of another. Good shelling this week and keep an eye out for the crucifix shell. Now you know



Five nominations for the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF) Board of Directors were made at the monthly meeting of the board last week.

The five nominees are Porter Goss, Arther Johnson. Malcolm Beattie, Rose Rogers, and Jane Stegman.

The five names will be presented to the general membership at the annual meeting on December 8.

It has been an SCCF policy for the board to select replacements for the five directors that rotate off the fifteen member board each year. Nominations from other members may be presented with a 10 signature petition before the annual meeting, or from the floor at the meeting.

The Board also moved to apply for the necessary permit to undertake a proscribed burn of the spartina marsh behind the Foundation building.

The proscribed burn to protect the boardwalk and building is requested to burn the accumulated fuel in the marsh under controlled conditions, lessening the possibility of a wildfire starting from a stray cigarette, or lightning.

Before the burn, the SCCF must obtain permits from the City, the State Department of Environmental Regulations, and the Division of Forestry.

Action was also taken to oppose the building of three docks in Roosevelt Channel now in the DER application process.



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


Van Patten's appeal is reinforced by a recent study of interval owners that reveals his "Eight is Enough" character as representative of the major buyers of interval units.

Thrilled vacationers witnessed a tanned Van Patten smoothly reading his lines while drinking a coke.



"Ever since I can remember, I've wanted to be a doctor," says Eleanor Goldbloom of her continuing love affair with the medical profession.

Eleanor Goldbloom wasn't always called Eleanor Goldbloom, however, for, until she came to Sanibel she was known as Dr. Eleanor Scott, obstetrician and gynecologist.

Reminiscing back to the time when she was five years old, Eleanor recalls the times she spent playing with dolls. Playing dolls, however, went further for Eleanor than just changing their outfits and having imaginary tea parties.

Besides her dolls, Eleanor also had a truck that she had painted a red cross on. She remembers setting up accidents just so she could bandage up her injured dollies.

From that time on, Eleanor pursued her interest in medicine, reading everything about it (from her neighbor's brary) that she could get her hands on.

'I felt free to do things, and was explains Eleanor of her unusual quest to become a doctor at a time when most women were interested in no more than becoming a good housewife.

appendicitis. She diagnosed her illness and drew a picture for the doctor so she would be sure that he knew what was wrong with her.

Eleanor began her formal education in medicine at Vassar College in New York in 1935. After a year there she moved on to the University of Wisconsin where she received a B.A. degree and her first two years of medical school training.

After finishing her last two years of medical school at Cornell University in New York City, Eleanor found an internship at Philadelphia General Hospital. It was there that she had her first taste of what being a doctor was all

Her first months at Philadelphia General were spent on ambulance duty. "We picked people up off the street," explains Eleanor, adding, "We judged the situation and would pick up the patients that would live. If not, we would wait and take them to the morgue."

Eleanor spent two years as an intern at the hospital,

switching from ambulance duty to obstetrics, to pediatrics

Onward next to general practice, Eleanor spent four years at Chesnut Hill where again she played the medical roulette game; being a pediatrician on Monday and an obstetrician on Tuesday and so on. By that time, however, she had decided to specialize, saying, "I had decided on obstetrics and gynecology.

"It was difficult for women to get surgical residencies," explains Eleanor today, "but World War Two was beginning to happen and men were being drafted so it was a good time to get one." She obtained her surgical gynecology residency at the Women's Hospital in New York City.

While in New York, she met Herbert Goldbloom who was on a business trip up from Maryland and who later became Baltimore with Herbert and continue her profession

"It just goes to show you what luck can do with your When she was 12 years old, Eleanor came down with career," Eleanor laughs today on how fate took hold of her life. Before leaving New York she went to her own gynecologist for a pre-marital examination.

Her doctor had just received a letter from John Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore saying that two staff gynecology assistants had been drafted - Eleanor was later offered one of the positions.

Once in Baltimore she acquired a staff position at Hopkins, but found there were no hospital beds for newcomers, saying, "they rationed the beds," and you had to be an established doctor with the hospital to have any beds saved in your name.

Fortunately, though, through the private practicing obstetrician with whom she worked, Eleanor did manage to get bed space for her patients. In order to do so, however, she says, "I found myself on the staff of seven different

It was during that time that Eleanor began building her own practice. "I built my practice patient by patient," she finding out what it's like to be a person," she now says, and says, adding, "my first OB was my hairdresser, and my

second OB was her replacement!"

Having finally established herself in Baltimore, Eleanor found her career to be, "life lasting and very satisfying." From 1964 to 1974 she served as chief of the obstetrics ward at the Church Home and Hospital, located in the suburbs of Baltimore. Eleanor had her hours full, being mother, wife, obstetrician and gynecologist simultaneously. But, she attributes her success in all four areas by saying today, "You have to have an understanding husband, and an Elizabeth." Elizabeth was their housekeeper, actually, she was more like family, and stayed with the Goldblooms for 35 years.

Eleanor retired only two years ago at the age of 70. "65 was my target to retire," she explains, "but it wasn't until I her husband. Soon after, she decided to marry and go back got to be 70 that Sanibel began looking better and better."

Always having had a deep interest in civic matters, Eleanor has involved herself with the League of Women Voters, and also serves as the alternate representative for the County Committee on the Handicapped.

But most of all, Eleanor is discovering herself. "I'm apparently, she is enjoying doing just that.

## For Your Information

BEACH ACCESS

Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

On Captiva Island, public beach access can be found at beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.


NOTE: STATE LAW PROHIBITS NUDE SUNBATHING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. dinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18, 1980, it is now illegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an ap-proved cooking container (not to exceed 48" X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have had your beach party, is recommended that you assume the responsibility for the cleanup of any debris or

While no license is required for saltwater fishing, fishing in freshwater ponds or the Sanibel River requires a Florida fishing license available at Bailey's General Store on Periwinkle Way. The fee is \$3.75.

SHELLING

The City of Sanibel Resolution limiting the taking of live shells to 2 live shells per Sanibel person per species is one to be scrupulously obeyed. As a scrupilously obeyed. As a matter of fact, in order to preserve Sanibel's beautiful shelling beaches, most collectors refuse to take any live shells whatsoever.

SPEED LIMITS

There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department.

Driving or parking a motor vehicle or moped on the bike path is strictly prohibited. Violators will be ticketed.

**BICYCLE RULES** 

If you're not used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out for it on Sanibel. The extensive network of bike paths on the Island is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the caution when driving hear the bike path. A State law and City Ordinance combine to PROHIBIT PARKING OR DRIVING ON THE BIKE PATH. MOPEDS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE BIKE PATHS

Planning on spending some time on a bike to enjoy the Island sun and sights? Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike flag, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding. Under Florida law, bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. Drive Safely!
