# 4-H coming to Islands

4-H clubs have come a long way since most of us were kids.

The national organization, symbolized by a four leaf clover (remember "health, heart, head and hands"?), is no longer limited to children in rural areas who raise rabbits or grow corn for an annual project. 4-H has evolved with the times and groups now exist in virtually every town and city in the country. Virtually everywhere but Sanibel and Captiva, that is.

But now, the Sanibel Police Recreation Club and the Lee County Extension Service are determined to open the thirty-second 4-H club in Lee County right here on the Islands.

According to Audrey Flanders of the Lee County Extension Service, four group leaders have already been lined up for Sanibel and Captiva - all they need now are

some members.

There are more than 100 projects that a 4-H member can work on and Island expertise has been volunteered in the areas of marine science, wildlife, biology and shells. Other resource people within the area, however, are also available to work with members.

"If a child signs up for a group that's focusing on marine science," says Ms. Flanders. "and she's really interested in photography or outdoor survival or anything even remotely connected, we can work it out. We've had scuba divers teach snorkeling through the marine science group, and net repairing, fishing and ecology are taught too."

Because the Extension Service is a






lunch.




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
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# Island electricity - a shocking dilemma

The Sanibel City Council and Planning Commission met in a joint-workshop session last week to discuss the findings of an outside consultant on the proposed Lee County Electric Cooperative addition to the Sanibel electric system.

Tom Chappel, representing Smith and Gillespie Engineers, the consulting firm hired by the City, was on hand to answer questions as were representatives from the Lee County Co-op.

Chappel's recommended alternative solutions to the Island's electricity problem shocked both residents and members of the co-op alike and included; the construction of an additional substation to serve the Island area; a load management program which could either voluntarily or involuntarily shut down air conditioners and water heaters for sevenand-a-half minutes out of every hour at peak use times; the addition of the proposed Lee County feeder - and another additional feeder at a later time; a moratorium on all Island development.

The City originally agreed to hire Smith and Gillespie when the Co-op proposed to construct another electrical feeder that would alternately go underground and overhead through the San-Cap Rd.-Jamaica Drive-Rue Bayou-Gulf Pines area - a proposal that was unacceptable to the affected residents.

Chappel pointed out to Council that the land use plan was based on a formula of 6,000 dwelling units "but now we're looking at a build-out number of 7,800. You have a ratio of one dwelling unit to one electrical customer now," he said. "Lee County is very near, if not over, their capacity now and their proposed feeder won't be the

Chappel said that during the winter of 1979 the Island's electrical use was near

this year the peak demands would exceed capacity. He also maintained that the additional feeder proposed by the Co-op would not be sufficient at build-out - a theory vehemently opposed by Co-op representatives.

Jim Sherfey, Co-op general manager, told the Council that the Co-op had originally wanted two substations on the Island but the necessary environmental permitting agencies' demands were so stringent that the idea had been given up. "We welcomed the City with open arms," added Sherfey, "because you began controlling growth."

"I wouldn't even consider a fourth feeder," maintained Sherfey, "as long as I could convert three. We recognize the limitations of a third circuit, that's why we're here. But it would be absurd to design a fourth circuit that we didn't have any place to put it."

In response to charges that the Co-op was negligent in protecting Sanibel's environment, Sherfey especially took exception, saying, "We do address the environment, we have to, but we have a four county area to serve and we have to be consistent."

"We're sure," continued Sherfey, "that we have a plan that will mesh with your plan. We hope to get this in before the winter peak."

When questioned by Commissioner Fred Valtin whether the City should agree to what the Co-op asked for and proceed with another substation, Chappel's response was that the only alternative would be some type of building moratorium.

Councilman Duane White told the audience, "I'm in favor of the attorney drawing up a moratorium and having it ready," but Councilman Francis Bailey pointed out that a moratorium would take

a year to go into effect because of prior issued permits.

"It's a very emotional issue," said Bailey, "we forget the facts at times. I think we should get on with it but if I lived in the area I might feel differently."

Sherfey again made a plea to the City, "The system we're proposing is the most reliable and efficient. We're asking permission to do the best," adding," There's

Chappel also agreed that the Co-op proposal was "the most logical at this time."

Both Chappel and Lee County Cooperative representatives will be present when the proposed addition is an agendaed item at the Nov. 18 Council meeting.

Editor's Note: Islander saleswoman, Lynn Daus, is most commonly known to our readers as a fanatical gourmet food binger. What you might not have known (did any of us?) is that she is also a physical fitness nut.

Whatever the reason, I stuck it out. I was running in the first of two events in the Southwest Florida Biathlon, a dual event contest in running and swimming. The run is 4000 meters (two-and-a-half miles) and the swim is 300 meters (13-25 yd. lengths). Decathlon type points are awarded for each event and totaled for final rositioning. I had had just nine days to repare for this event.

Two weeks ago I cheered several friends on in the Lee Memorial Hospital Health Run. They weren't content that I just watched, these runners wanted me to enjoy the pain, too. They handed me an application for this biathlon at the Fort Myers YMCA on Nov. 1. Foolishly I took it, filled it out, mailed it, and only then realized what I had gotten myself into: pain is what I had gotten myself into. Now I would have to go from Lynn's binges to Lynn's shape-up-quick plan.

I have run a mile a day for nine years and hated every step of the way. I have never gotten "high" from running and I have always said that I could never run more than a mile. And now, in less than two weeks, I would have to race two-and-aty miles.

took the plunge. Every day I increased my distance by half a mile. It was tough, but in four days I was miraculously running three miles. And I hated it. But I had a good friend cracking the whip to keep me going and my son was contributing

training techniques. I was committed now. I had too much pride to back out-although the thought occurred to me.

The real killer though, was that I wasn't finished with my daily training when I had finished running - I still had to get into my tank suit and head for the pool to swim 500 meters in preparation for the 300 meter race. It was dark and lonely at the pool at 7 p.m. and a little chilly. I have swum competitively in the past though, so this part of my training was definitely the easiest part. I was expecting to do well in this event, but I would find out soon enough. Too soon.

The day of the biathlon came quickly. The temperature was in the sixties, the one thing I was hoping wouldn't happen. Cold makes me too tight and tense, especially when swimming.

I woke up at 6 a.m. to get to the Y early to warm up. When I arrived the Y was deserted. I couldn't imagine why the other runners hadn't started to show up too. But finally, when two other men showed up, we discovered that even though our application blanks said 8 a.m. for the start of the race, it actually wasn't supposed to start until 9 a.m.

I had another hour-and-a-half to get scared and nervous.

But 9 a.m. did arrive. And, by then, the temperature was warmer. I was psyched; I didn't know yet just how much it would hurt. My son had warned me about the start. He told me not to panic when the other runners took off at a pace I could not hope to match. And they really did take off at the starting gun.

I stayed calm and ran at my own best pace. The adrenalin must have been flowing though, because my split at the mile mark was two-and-a-half minutes

faster than I had ever run in training. My split at two miles was also faster than I had ever run before, but I was definitely winded and tired. I didn't see how I could make it to the finish line; most of the runners were well in front of me and the rest were breathing down my neck.

It was no fun at all.

I did have enough guts though, because I never gave in to those demons in my head that repeated over and over, "Quit and walk, quit and walk." I quelled them with words of my own, "GO FOR IT!"

And I went for it all right, I made it to the finish line but I had nothing left in me. I couldn't finish with a sprint like my son had told me I should. I was too tired. I had given my all.

Twenty minutes later the swimming event started. The first runners in were the first swimmers off the block, and so on down the line. I was the fiftieth runner to finish so I had plenty of time to rest and get re-psyched. More points were awarded for swimming than for running, so I was hoping to make up for lost running time in swimming points.

I was relaxed and ready to go and by now the sun was even shining. My name was called and I was on the block. The starting gun fired and I was off.

Oh, how I love swimming as compared to running. Most swimmers can run but there are a lot of runners who can't swim. This time I was in my element, and it was the runners who were starving for oxygen, not me. The 300 meters went quickly and easily and I knew that my time was very fast. That knowledge compensated somewhat for the agonizing run, but still, I had no thoughts of winning a ribbon. I just

considered it a fantastic accomplishment, considering that I had had such a short time to get ready.


I felt good but I was embarrassed to stick around for the awards. Still, I had swum so well that I thought I might get a ribbon for sixth place if I were real lucky.

Well, I was real lucky. They called my name FIRST. I won a great big blue ribbon for the female winner in my age group and I was very happy and very proud.

I plan to continue running and swimming so I can prove myself a masochist beyond a doubt one more time and enter the biathlon that's coming up in December. I wish I could rest on my "laurels," but I seem to have caught the fitness bug for good.

### Yes on beach strategy

Dear Editor:

After many months of hard work, Mr. Gary Price and his staff in the City Planning Department have come up with a plan for the long felt need for beach parking access for Sanibel residents. The difficulties of constructing such a plan were great because of Federal requirements governing the use of the land the city owns at various access sites. Mr. Price has done an excellent job under these circumstances, and is to be commended.

There are many neighborhoods in Sanibel with no deeded beach access, and too far away to walk to the beach. These residents must depend on competing with day trippers for parking at public beach accesses, and this plan would give them a chance to find a place.

As always, when compromise is necessary, no plan can please everyone. At the recent hearing at the Planning Commission meeting, a remark was made by a Sanibel resident that those who couldn't afford to pay the high price for beach front property shouldn't expect to have beach access! Hopefully this attitude is not a

general one.

Each time in the past that this subject has been brought up someone always brings up the fear that "interval owners" will be considered bona fide Sanibel residents and will fill up all the parking places. This seems unlikely to happen because all of the interval ownership resorts except the Lighthouse are on the Gulf, with a parking place assigned to each owner. Also, though there are 52 owners for each unit, no unit is occupied by more than one owner at any given time.

There will always be "bugs" to be ironed out when any new and untried system such as is proposed here, is started. The plan is to offer stickers on an annual basis to every Sanibel resident and to a limited number of off Island residents. There is no foolproof way to determine ahead of time how many stickers would be feasible for the parking places available. It would seem wise to pick a best estimate number, try it for a year, then raise or lower the number according to the experience gained in that year.

The plan is going to have its first reading at the City Council meeting on Tuesday, November 4th, and the second and final reading on Tuesday, November 18th. All those interested should attend these hearings to make their opinions known.



Dear Chairman McDonald:

It was most gratifying to note that your added role as head of Edison Electric Institute (EEI) is evident from the Institute's illustrated public message "Saving Leftover Electricity" that appeared in last Sunday's "Family Weekly" supplement to our local daily paper.

As you may have heard, the Lee County Electric Cooperative (LECO) (to which FPL supplies electricity) has been beefingup its distribution system to pace the booming development of our Sanibel and Captiva Islands. LECO and the City of Sanibel, therefore, are engaged in a

continuing dialogue about the system's adequacy and reliability to cope with the unusual growth demands.

Unpredictable and extreme demandpeaking problems result from the popular and seasonal resort nature of the Islands as well as a single FPL power source line from Pine Island over the waters of Pine Island Sound. To satisfy those irregular peaks is a real and expensive problem for LECO.

At an October 28th public meeting between the City Council and LECO, I inquired as to the feasibility and




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# A message to my fellow islanders

# **Bureau of Land Management to hold** area hearing on public lands

The Federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has begun preparation of a resource management plan (RMP) for public lands and islands under its jurisdiction in Lee, Charlotte, and Collier Counties. The document will be entitled the "Pine Island Sound-Sanibel Resource Management Plan." Involved in the planning area are three inland tracts and 46 islands - about 900 acres altogether. BLM will hold a public workshop on the RMP on Thursday, November 6 in Fort Myers. Formal notice of the initiation of planning in the three-county area appeared in the Federal Register on October

"What we're beginning is a comprehensive plan for the future of these public lands, as well as the mineral resources located in the planning area and owned by the United States," said Robert

L. Todd, manager of the BLM office in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. "The RMP is scheduled for completion by February 1982. By then, we expect to decide whether it is in the public interest for BLM to retain and manage these lands, to transfer certain lands to other government agencies or non-profit organizations, or perhaps to sell certain lands to private parties."

The possible transfer of some BLM lands is only one of several anticipated issues, Todd said. "We start the planning process by determining all of the issues at stake, and what specific criteria must be met to ensure an effective and well-informed plan. This couldn't be done without the participation of all interested parties from other Federal, State, and local agencies, to community organizations, conservation groups, businessmen, and private individuals." For this reason, Todd

said, BLM encourages the public to become involved in the process. "We're hoping to learn a lot at the workshop, which we've scheduled in two separate sessions to make it easier for people to attend. It will be the first of many opportunities the public will have to hear what we're doing and to help determine what course we'll take.'


The public workshop will be held on Thursday, November 6, at 1 p.m. and 6 p.m., at the Sheraton Inn, 8900 South Tamiami Trail, Fort Myers.

Resource management planning is a careful, step-by-step process," Todd said. "After we determine the issues and the criteria we'll follow, we will inventory the holdings under our jurisdiction and gather information on every facet of the local scene that may be affected by our decisions. That means resource data,

environmental data, social, economic, and other information. From there we'll analyze the management situation, determine alternative management schemes, estimate the effects those alternatives could have, and select a preferred alternative. The preferred alternative will be incorporated into a draft resource management plan and environmental impact statement."

The Sanibel Lighthouse property is one of the parcels being considered in the Bureau's land management process. The City of Sanibel will have representatives present at both workshops to urge that control of the Lighthouse be given to the City for preservation as a historical monument. Citizens are urged to attend these very important workshops to air their opinions on the future of the area's public lands and islands.


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# Barrier BOOO's

Adults, not to be left out of the fun, gathered at the Photographers' Gallery or the Community Center for their trick or treating.


Halloween, no doubt, is the best time of year to let it all hang out. After all, nobody knows whose you are!

# On the water



Once in awhile I get a day or two off from my charter fishing business and sneak away to a small apartment on the ocean over in Stuart, Florida to do - what else but fish!

I was amused to find that their fishing is very much like ours here on Sanibel and Captiva Islands in many ways, but I always am able to learn a few new things while there.

The Atlantic Ocean side of the state is in the middle of a bluefish run, just as we are, but while we have been using jigs, they rely upon silver spoons. That's why when I went into a tackle shop to pick up a lure they were out and it took a couple more stops before I located one. The fishermen line up along shore and toss the spoons into the surf and retrieve it on the top. A couple of casts soon bring in some hungry blues, along with a jack and a ladyfish. I was kind of hoping that the latter two might have been left back in Pine Island Sound, but as you probably know, pesky jacks and others are found all over the state.

One thing that I have always admired about the East Coast of Florida is that they build catwalks, or side extensions, on all the bridges so that their shorebound fishermen can use them.

The bridges over there are alive with anglers of all ages

who look upon bridge fishing as much as a social event as a fishing adventure. They are still catching snook over there, along with trout and redfish. They get blues and mackerel in the Indian River, where the bridges are built.

There is a sign on one of the bridges which always makes me smile. In bold letters it says something to the effect, "Only two rods per person. State law." State law? did you ever hear of a law like that? Me either. Can you imagine a deputy having to check each fisherman to make sure he or she didn't have too many rods in the water?

If you are a big game fisherman, then you know of Stuart not as a center for bluefish, but rather for sailfish. It's called the sailfish capital of the world and it does seem to deserve the reputation.

I talked with a gal who, along with her fiance, operates a 40-foot fishing boat offshore of Stuart where they fish exclusively for sails. They practically guarantee the party a sailfish, under reasonable conditions, of course. This is the time of the year when sails are getting easier to catch and if you have ever wanted to get out after one of these colorful fish, you might give it a try before the big winter visitor season hits and all the boats are booked.

Sails run in what seems like the worst weather. When the seas are six foot high and it's cold as can be with a northern front, that's when the captains head out. Right now, the ocean is relatively calm and it's easy to fish. Actually, from our room overlooking the ocean, I could count many boats of only 20 foot length, so you know that it's easy to fish offshore.

Something else I found interesting involves the OMC testing facility near Stuart. This company is the one that gives you the OMC sterndrive units and tests all sorts of ideas for saltwater power operation.

They are working on something which could change inboard boats a great deal. They have taken a pair of outboards and mounted them into a special fitting where they can be bolted directly on the transom of former inboards up to about 33 feet in length. They say that the new installation gets a lot of weight out of the boat and provides more speed and better gas mileage. It's a surprise to see such large boats powered by twin outboards, but if it continues to test out, OMC apparently will market them within a few years.

Good fishing out there this week and work the causeway flats for trout on the high tide.

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


Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide.

For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and foour minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.

# Refuge Report

Construction has finally begun on the Visitor Contact Station-Headquarters building. A pre-construction conference was held at the beginning of the month between representatives of the VOL Construction Company of Knoxville, Tennessee and personnel from the Atlanta Regional Office of Engineering. Construction began later the next week. A completion date of July 1 is anticipated. When completed, the building will house a small auditorium, exhibit area, and office space.

After the first of the year we will be installing a traveler's information radio system along the wildlife drive. This system consists of a series of interpretive

messages that can be tuned on a car radio. This radio system, which will replace the current wildlife drive brochure, will enable us to update the material more readily at a lower cost. As far as we know this system is the first of its kind to be installed anywhere in the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service

The Refuge recently acquired a rotary mower. This piece of equipment will enable us to keep the south dike and Bailey Tract mowed for public access.

Biological Technician Larry Narcisse is attending a nine week law enforcement training course at the Federal facility in Glynco, Georgia.

# Police beat

The Sanibel Police Department made four arrests last week and numerous Island thefts are still under investigation.

Officer Jamie Phillips will be presented a commendation from Chief John Butler for the role he played in stopping a burglary in progress at the Casa Ybel pro shop.

Officer Phillips responded when a Pro-Com silent alarm at Casa Ybel sounded at the police station last Wed. at 7:54 p.m. Upon arrival at the pro shop, Phillips discovered a bathroom door on the west side of the building ajar. Phillips entered the building and was contacted by night clerk Larry Ross, also responding to the alarm.

Ross reportedly told Phillips that he had seen someone leaning over putting something into the trunk of a car on the closed service road east of the shop. Phillips then went outside and saw a black male getting into a car parked on the service road. He identified himself and ordered the man to stop, but the vehicle began backing down the road.

Phillips, pursuing the car on foot and followed by Ross, caught up with the driver, opened the car door and identified himself again, ordering the driver to stop. The driver then accelerated the car to the

point where Phillips could no longer hang on and the driver had no control. The car crossed West Gulf Drive and went into a canal, with the driver fleeing into the mangroves.

Phillips radioed for assistance and then went in pursuit of the suspect. Phillips was able to apprehend Jesse James Major, 19, of Palmetto Court, Fort Myers. When Officers Mike Blackmore and Betty Weir arrived Majors was handcuffed and arrested, charged with third degree burglary, dealing in stolen property and attempting to elude an officer. A black and white TV and 8 pairs of tennis shoes were found in Major's vehicle and police records indicate that Major confessed.

Major's car had been towed to the Sanibel Station for a more thorough check by police officers when approximately 30 black men and women arrived at the station, inquiring as to Major's whereabouts and using abusive language. Officer Weir radioed for assistance, Sanibel Sgt. Ray Rhodes, Officer Mike Blackmore and the Lee County Sheriff's Dept. responded and the crowd was eventually dispersed.

On Oct. 26 at 12:56 p.m. two women riding bicycles on West Gulf Drive were startled when a car stopped in front of

them and a totally nude man stepped out into their path. The women pedaled away quickly and contacted the SPD, resulting in the arrest of Leonard Charles Crawford Jr., 21, of Naples by SPD Officer Dick Church. Crawford, who has a past arrest record for similar incidents, was charged with exposure of sexual organs and booked into the Lee County Jail.

A 17 year-old Fort Myers youth and a 17 year-old Lehigh Acres youth were arrested last week for the break-in of the F & B Oyster House. The youths were charged with burglary and police reports indicate that both youths confessed to the crime. One of the youths, while being questioned by Sanibel Sgt. Ray Rhodes at the youth detention center, jumped through an open window but was later apprehended. Both youths have been charged with similar offenses by the Lee County Sheriff's Dept.

A money box was reported stolen from a pop machine at FiFi's Beauty Salon on Periwinkle Way last Friday.

The SPD was called to intervene when an Island employer began threatening an exemployee with a gun last Tues. The gun, a Smith and Wesson 6" Model 14, was confiscated by Officer Betty Weir.

Several broken bags of concrete mix were discovered dumped in a canal at Casa

Ybel and Southwind Drive last Wed. City building officials were notified of the incident.

Last Mon. the Captain's Walk Apts. reported that several nightlights had been broken out and on Tues., a boat owner reported that a battery, horn, compass, boat hook, spare propoeller, metal gas tanks and a fire extinguisher had been stolen from his boat while stored at Aguatronics.

An apartment at Gulfside Place was reportedly broken into and liquor and linens stolen. The apartment owners have not been able to be contacted, however, for verification.

Tuesday's Child reported \$102 worth of plants stolen from their store last week and \$430 worth of interior doors were reported stolen from a construction site at Dinken's Bayou.

A bicycle was reported stolen from Lighthouse Condominium and Huxter's Market reported money missing from their change box.

Two pieces of siding were reported missing from a house under construction in Sanibel Bayous and the Wegryn Clinic reported \$600 damage to screens that were slashed on the porch.

Sanibel and Captiva Islands.
On Captiva Island, public beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public

Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.

NOTE: STATE LAW PROHIBITS NUDE SUNBATHING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING
Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the ordinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18, 1980, it is now lilegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48"X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for noncommercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have had your beach party, it is recommended that you assume the responsibility for the cleanup of any debris or litter in your area.

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both), but can be extremely both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator, he's close enough to feed on you. An alligator fed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.

WARNING! SAFEGUARD

YOUR VALUABLES.

In order to protect your valuable possessions from theft, it is recommended that you TAKE THEM TO A BANK OR HOTEL VAULT FOR SAFEKEEPING. Do NOT leave them in your room or car.

SPEED LIMITS
There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee

County Sheriff's Department.
