

"Dredging" the topic of SCCF presentation

Today's Tuesday at the Center presentation at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation will feature Richard Peddicord, from the Army Corps of Engineers, speaking on "Dredging Impact." Peddicord will highlight the findings of dredge material research programs with emphasis on turbidity and sediment deposition and biological consequences.


Peddicord is the biological evaluation and criteria team leader at the Environmental Laboratory of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Waterways Experiment Station.

He is also responsible for assisting in implementation of research findings, and is a technical consultant to the Office Chief of Engineers in developing, refining, and implementing the regulatory criteria governing dredging and disposal.

Peddicord, being an authority on the subject, should offer a very informative discussion on the topic of dredging impact. All concerned individuals are urged to attend Tuesday at the Center, beginning at 2 p.m. at the Conservation Foundation on Sanibel-Captiva Road.







Unabridged fun





What game is a descendent of the early 17th Century, comprised of four players paired off into two intellectual mind teams, uses a 52 card deck divided into four suits ranging from Kings to Aces and lasts a good four hours of the day or night? Bridge, of course. How could it be anything else?

Sanibel and Captiva are home to a large number of avid bridge buffs who turn up at the Sanibel Community Association various times during the week for the challeging awe of bridge.

There are a variety of reasons why Islanders join the many bridge groups in the community. Mainly, though, it is because bridge is a relaxing recreational activity that also offers intellectual stimulation for the players. For many, too, it is a social outlet and a wonderful way to meet new people.

Bridge seems to be one of those games you either know or don't play. Those who know the game seem to have acquired their knowledge of it while young, either from their parents or peers. Others know just a touch of the game and then take bridge classes and read books to supplement their knowledge. Still others just simply "play from the seat of their pants.'

Whatever the reasons and whatever their sources, many Islanders are keeping up with a tradition that is nearly a century and a half old. Bridge is the new name applied to the modern grandchild of the earlier games Contract Bridge, Auction Bridge and Bridge Whist. All of these variations are derived from old English games and have retained the essential elements of the original game called Whist.

Apparently, Whist originated in the early 17th Century. It as a game so common in England that children eight years. old already had a "competent knowledge" of the technique. Initially, Whist was a game for the lower orders but it was from the seat of their pants, everyone is undoubtedly having soon picked up in the London coffee shoppes by English a great time playing.

In 1742, Edmond Hoyle wrote the first book on the subject. Entitled "Short Treatise on Whist," the publication soon became a bestseller, opening the door for the upper classes to engage in a challenging new recreation. Not long after, the Whist craze spread throughout Europe and Asia, reigning supreme over any other card game for the next 150

The evolution and ensuing improvements of Whist into Bridge Whist, Contract Bridge, Auction Bridge, and Duplicate Bridge have greatly enhanced the game's scope of challenge, inferential reasoning, strategy, and partner


Although is takes longer to learn the laws of Bridge ti. does most games, it appears to be, by far, one of the most fascinating of card games. It has shown no sign of tiring in force even in this day and age. There are over 80 million people all over the world who engage in this recreation and there are more than 55 hundred Bridge clubs in North America alone.

There is a World Bridge Federation, whose members take their sport as seriously as the Olympics. Over 5,000 books have been published on the subject of Bridge and sell an estimated one million copies per year. Newspapers all over the world carry bridge articles and community group

It's no wonder then that so many Islanders partake in this delightfully stimulating sport. The Community Courses Committee offers classes in the art of Bridge, and the Community Association seats the Bridge for Fun group each Wednesday afternoon and the Duplicate Bridge group on Thursday afternoon and Friday evening



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
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Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon

The Third Annual Sanibel-Captiva Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon will be held Sunday. November 30 on Sanibel. The announcement was made by Rotarian Mark C. Webb, chairman of the 1980 ride.

'Madeline Fitch organized and ran the first two rides but has since left Sanibel,' Webb said. "Members of the Sanibel-Captiva Rotary Club feel the program is too important not to be carried on and have taken up the challenge."

It is a challenge. In 1978, \$5,037 was collected and \$6,012 in 1979. For the size of the community, these have been the largest ammounts raised in Florida. More than 150 Sanibel and Captiva residents have ridden in the two previous bike-a-

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. Even though one out of 20 Americans carry the gene which causes cystic fibrosis, very few people are aware of what the warning signs are, or what to look for in their own children. As a result of money raised through such efforts as the bike-a-thons, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has been able to raise the life expectancy of affected children from infancy to the teen years, and in some cases, into young adulthood.

Additionally, the CF treatment programs in Florida have proven effective in alleviating the suffering of children with severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition sometimes called "childhood emphysema."

Which is probably why so many people on Sanibel and Captiva are willing to give their energy, time, money and goods in their efforts to raise money for the program.

"We intend to carry on Madeline's program of sending in every cent collected by providing sponsors for all costs of providing prizes and putting on the ride,' Webb says.

Prizes this year include:

First Prize: Choice of a man or woman's 10-speed or a BMX bicycle valued at \$200. Second-Prize: Man or woman's 3-speed,

donated by Island Moped, valued at \$125. Third Prize: A 12 inch black & white television set, valued at \$90.

Fourth & Fifth Prizes: Bicycle back-

Sixth Prize: Two free dinners at the Coconut Grove Restaurant.

Riders get sponsors to pledge so much per mile and then ride the 4.5 mile course which begins at the Community Association Building on Periwinkle, east to Casa Ybel Road, then to Tarpon Bay Road, and back down Periwinkle to the Community Association Building.

Sponsor sheets are available at the Bank of the Islands, Bailey's Supermarket and at the Post Office.

"We are hoping that sponsors will pledge a minimum of 10 cents a mile," Webb commented. "In the past two years, many sponsors pledged as much as a dollar a mile or more.'

Participants have two weeks after the bike-a-thon in which to gather their pledge money and turn it into the Bank of the Islands. Prize winners will be judged on the most money turned in within the first 10

Riders will have the opportunity for a free bicycle inspection before the ride. Two check points will be set up, one at the Start-Finish Line and one half-way around the course. Riders will carry cards which have to be checked each time around. Sanibel Police will put out traffic cones to mark the route and will patrol from 1-5 p.m.

In addition to the bike inspection, the Bike Route bike shop will have an air pump to inflate tires, plus - at cost - tubes or patch kits for riders who have flats.

Free refreshments will be available to all riders at the Community Association

Building and the half-way checkpoint. In addition, all entrants will receive a door prize from either Dairy Queen, Duncan's Restaurant, Joey's Hamburgers, or the Burger Emporium.

Sponsors for all other expenses, except specifically donated prizes are: Blue Bill Properties, Inc., Bike Route, Inc., Century 21 - Ray Hoxey Realty of the Islands. Island Moped, Island Real Estate by Bissell & Holtz, Inc., Knudsen Realty, Inc., and San Carlos Realty, Inc.

"In the past, most riders were children although there have been adults up to their 60's riding. This year, we hope to see more adult riders who will sponsor themselves and have a good time in so doing," Webb commented.

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It's all part of living on a barrier island

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's weekly program, Tuesday at the Center, last week invited Dinesh Sharma, Southeastern States' Coordinator of the Barrier Island Coalition, to discuss and illustrate the problems and issues surrounding barrier islands and beaches.

Sharma presented to Islanders one of the major contributions to the 1980 Year Of The Coast, the "Barrier Islands and Beaches" slide show which was written, produced, and photographed by Sharma under a joint grant from the National Science Foundation - Science for Citizens Program, the Conservation Foundation, Office of Coastal Zone Management, U.S. Department of the Interior, and Barrier Island Coalition.

Sharma has a unique relationship with barrier islands. He is one of the few "lucky and goofy scientists" to study 150 Islands for the Barrier Island Coalition, the only organization to focus scientific evidence upon public policies. Thus, Sharma's perspective is "somewhat different."

"It's not true if you've seen one you've seen them all," Sharma says of the uniqueness of each and every barrier island. They are fragile, dynamic, rich and diverse, explained Sharma. And for those reasons, barrier islands draw three to four times more population than the mainland.

Sharma feels that the hazards of living on a barrier island are underemphasized. For the most part, according to Sharma, most of the newcomers to barrier islands have never experienced a major hurricane.

Due to the high population growth, the

islands have become urbanized like the interior mainland, which poses a great threat if the islands should experience a hurricane now. He feels that the access roads are "low and narrow" and subject to high wave activity during an evacuation. Hurricane costs to these islands has. totaled billions of dollars in damage.

The development which follows the increase in population is, according to Sharma, "inappropriate development." The minimum development requirements are just that, Sharma said, "minimum, but

According to Sharma, new development should be built on elevated pilings able to withstand 100 years of sea level rise. This amounts to one to three feet of "shoreline mitigation" or "beach retreat" each year.

This point has been underemphasized in the past, Sharma illustrated, which has resulted in the ocean almost slapping upon the doorsteps of those developments which now practically sit on the sea level mark.

In Sharma's opinion, any development on a barrier island should be able to withstand winds of up to 150 miles per hour. This is a maximum requirement, not a miniumim, which is why, as Sharma illustrated, homes and buildings on barrier islands have been ripped to shreds while experiencing a major hurricane.

Due to the constant formation changes of barrier islands from sea level rise (caused by melting glaciers) and other weather factors, beach erosion has become a critical problem, Sharma noted.

Erosion control programs cost barrier islands billions of dollars. Sea walls,

groins, and other erosion control tactics "do not work," Sharma said, adding, "Any erosion plan must envelope the whole beach.'

Sharma admitted that, "pumping sand is the best idea, but it requires frequent maintenence and gives a false sense of security. It encourages high development." According to Sharma, one beach renourishment program cost the community six million dollars per one mile of

There are other detrimental causes and effects of living on a barrier island. Dams constructed on waterways starve the sand sharing system from land and sea of the barrier islands, Sharma said. High development and inadequate sewage is polluting the water, causing an adverse affect to nature by the "incompatiblility of man."

It costs two to six times more money to provide services for those who live on a barrier island, Sharma claimed. The general problem with barrier island living, in his opinion, is that people treat them like any other part of the mainland and not like a highly dynamic island, as they should.

Sharma believes there is a "two way approach" for successful barrier island life. First, is the conservation and preservation of the remaining unpopulated barrier islands.

For those islands that are already populated, people must, according to Sharma, "design with nature." They must be treated as islands, and each island must have a detailed comprehensive plan greatly emphasizing "density and

Any construction must give consideration to the sea level rise for at least 100 years, as well as incorporating an intensive pre-disaster plan for each island Sharma said, adding, "Conservation and preservation are the same side of the


Sharma also addressed the controversial issues surrounding Lover's Key. Another slide show illustrated the expensive but unspoiled island which has become a haven for those who prefer natural island beauty and no beach congestion.

Sharma said he was glad that the recent Lover's Key referendum did not go through and he is hopeful that the newly elected County Commissioners will work in harmony with the Barrier Island Coalition.

The recomendations which Sharma has already put before the County Commission include: leaving Lover's Key the way it is; not to support any development proposals; to install quieter engines on the trams and reduce the speed limit to five miles per hour; the need for special trams for the handicapped; a separate catwalk for pedestrians; to build piers off the catwalk for fishermen; and to lower the fee from \$1 to 50 cents for adults, permitting children, the handicapped and senior citizens in

Sharma was well received by the Islanders, and demonstrated a special feeling towards them, saying, "The people of Sanibel are a unique bunch. I wish all communities were as aware, concerned, involved and enlightened."

This service will be held at the Church of Christian Science Society, 2950 Gulf Drive, Sanibel, on Thanksgiving Day, November 27, at 11 a.m.

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
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
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Dr. Bailey at Community



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Upper Captiva and Cayo Costa priority status upgraded

The State Endangered Lands Selection Committee voted last Wednesday to upgrade the Cayo Costa-Upper Captiva State Preserve from number 14 on the state's endangered land acquisition priority list to a number four ranking that virtually assures the completion of state purchase of the untouched barrier islands on Southwest Florida's Gulf coast.

State Rep. Frank Mann (D-Fort Myers), in Tallahassee last week for the final meeting of the committee, looked on as months of intense lobbying paid off in the upgraded priority rating by the Committee. The final Committee recommendation now goes to Governor Bob Graham and the Cabinet for their approval next month before actual purchases can begin again after being suspended several years ago.

"I am very happy with the final outcome of this effort," Mann said, "and the broad public support for the acquisition and the show of that support at the recent public hearing really made a crucial difference in this effort.'

recommend to the Governor and Cabinet that a cap of \$5 million per project be spent in the 1981 fiscal year. Mann said that although the price tag for completing the acquisitions on Cayo Costa is estimated from \$6.7 to \$10 million, the funding cap decision by the committee would not be detrimental to the effort to complete those acquisitions.

"The sheer mechanics of acquisition the negotiations, the appraisal procedure, the surveys, and the legal work - is very time consuming, and frankly I don't think we can move fast enough to expend more than \$5 million this year anyway," Mann said. He added that state DNR Director Elton Gissendanner had indicated to private property owners at a recent hearing in Fort Myers on the Endangered Lands Selection List that an additional \$5 million could be available in the next fiscal year to complete Cayo Costa-Upper Captiva acquisitions.

Southwest Florida garnered the "lions share" of the Endangered Lands Priority list, with three projects placing in the top four on the list. Besides Cayo Costa-Upper

Captiva, the remaining wetlands around Charlotte Harbor were ranked number 3. and the completion of a state-federal acquisition of Rookery Bay and the Ten Thousand Islands in Collier County ranged number 1.

Mann said that although Six Mile Cypress dropped considerably from its number 10 spot, the low ranking was not a "disaster" for that acquisition. "We have supported this project all along on the premise that Lee County would negotiate and expend the available dollars they have first before any state money would be made available to complete those acquisitions," he explained, "and it is doubtful that Lee County will have been able to expend all of their funds within this next fiscal year, so no state dollars would have been spent in 1981 anyway."

"When we redraw the priorities for 1982, hopefully Lee County will have completed all the acquisitions it can negotiate and spent the money they had available," Mann said. "In that way, I would then be in a much better lobbying position to appeal for state dollars to complete the acquisitions because of the County commitment which had already been manifested in money they had spent."


"The state is certainly going to be a lot more favorable towards projects that already have local financial commitments than new ones without any local money involved," he explained.

Mann has spearheaded the effort to acquire Cayo Costa-Upper Captiva since the initial selection of the project in 1974, and was instrumental in hammering together a coalition of property owners who already sold more than 1,122 acres of the pristine barrier islands to the public. Lee County controls another 640 acres of land on the northern end of the island as a county park. There is an estimated 630 acres still to be acquired to put the islands under complete state ownership and management.

"Florida has an \$11.2 million investment in protecting these sensitive barrier islands, and we simply cannot afford to waste this investment by allowing private development of the remaining parts of the island," Mann said.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and foour minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide. In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.



On the water

This week I want to relate two fish stories which perhaps we can turn into information to help you get in on some angling action.

The first has to do with a fish that wasn't even supposed to be in our waters. I had a couple of gals and a guy, all from Michigan, out on the boat recently and we were looking for sea trout. We were on the inside of Captiva Pass and for the past hour had put just three fish - a flounder, a grouper and one lone trout - into the fish box. As I approached the Pass we noticed a big fish jump out of the water about 300 yards in front of the boat. I figured it was a King mackerel as we had spotted a few feeding along shore with blue fish and Spanish mackerel in past days, but no one seemed to be able to hook up with one and get a King back to the boat.

I pulled up near the spot where we had seen the fish and the four of us tossed out trout lures into the deep pass. We were using shrimp imitator, rubber bodied lures clear in color. Right away we started into the trout and grouper, with three fish on the lines at once. When they were in the box, we all cast again. I put out my lure, let it settle to the bottom and felt a slight tug. I thought it had connected with one of the many rocks at the bottom of the Pass. At the same time, a tarpon I estimated at 70 pounds came rocketing out of the water not 40 feet from the boat. I had hooked him with the trout lure.

I couldn't run the boat and fight this sixfoot fish at the same time, so I gave the rod to the fella on board and we were off. Remember, I had practically no leader, had hooked the big tarpon on only a 3-0 trout hook and we had him on 15-pound test line. When we fish in the spring for tarpon we use 50 or 80-pound test line and huge reels.

We hooked up with the fish just an hour before sunset. It took us about 300 yards out into the rough Gulf of Mexico, then brought us all the way back into the middle of Captiva Pass. As it got dark, I knew that we would have almost no chance on keeping up with the circling, diving and jumping fish. Twenty minutes after sunset, we decided to tighten the drag in one last hope of getting it to where it could be gaffed. The fish was to be mounted by the trio if we could get it in. We went tighter with the drag, but it only made the fish more angry. It jumped way out in the darkness, then thundered down into the hole in the Pass. We couldn't get it to budge.

After an hour and 25 minutes, in total darkness, we tightened the drag down all the way. The line popped.

The unusual thing about all this is that there was even a tarpon around in the first place. Then, later that night, I talked with Capt. Randy White of Tarpon Bay Marina and he said that he had seen one in shallow waters while trout fishing. Perhaps they will stay with us for a time, but I expect that it was purely luck that we hooked up

with one. I would hate to bet that I could repeat that performance.

The other incident I want to tell you about was an outstanding catch of large redfish. They have been showing up around the deep trench outside of the fishing pier on Sanibel, but these fish, averaging over 10 pounds, were caught along the Gulf beaches. I suspect that if the weather doesn't become really riled up you might just be able to get in one some surf red fishing too.

One of the better places is off the "rocks" at the Sanibel "elbow." The rocks in the water draw smaller bait fish and, of course, along come the bigger ones. Another good place for the surf caster is just north of Turner beach and along Blind Pass. See if you can buy small pinfish and toss the bait out with a light sinker, then hope for the best. Big reds have been moving along, perhaps you can get a couple too.

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

According to several CONA members, many misunderstandings were clarified, and the committee will be drafting up its findings in the near future along with recommendations to be transmitted to Sanibel's City Council.

City requests South Seas hearing


The City of Sanibel has petitioned the Department of Environment Regulation (DER) for a hearing on the issuance of a dredging permit for South Seas Plantation.

In its petition, the City requests that conditions be attached to the DER permit for the South Seas project outlining monitoring and work reporting requirements for the adjacent waters and beaches of Sanibel.

South Seas proposed project calls for the renourishment of 10,000 feet of Captiva beachfront by dredging sand from a Redfish Pass borrow site.

Although DER's notice of intent to issue a permit to the renourishment project calls for monitoring and reporting of work on the Captiva site, it does not provide such safeguards for the neighboring island of Sanibel.

Maintaining that any work on Captiva may have an adverse effect on Sanibel's beaches and waters, the City's petition requests that monitoring of Sanibel's marine resources, littoral drift systems and benthic community be provided by South Seas.



Sanibel Jaws

The Sanibel Fire and Rescue Department has been practicing ripping doors open and cutting the tops off of cars.

No, they're not out on a rampage, the Department is learning to use its new \$6,000 Hurst tool, sometimes referred to as "the jaws of life."

The hydrolic arms of the tool may be opened, as pictured, to pry open doors, move back seats, or even to lift a car. A set of steel jaws may also be placed on the arms to convert the Hurst tool into a powerful cutting tool that can cut the top off of a car.



"I said to myself in college," Kathy McClintock explains to you of her new resolution and purpose in life, "I'm going an interesting person."

The majority of Kathy's first 21 years was happily spent in the small midwest town of Farmington, Missouri. It wasn't until she was a student at the University of Missouri that she began to feel that she had missed out on something. The sensation that her peers had already experienced more in life than she had even imagined was possible bothered Kathy.

"People aren't happy with what other people do, unless you do it yourself," Kathy says today, recalling the twinge of envy she felt towards her college friends for having done things she never had.

But the envy was small compared to the real yearning it created inside. What's more, Kathy wasn't one to sit around and wait for life to come and get her -she went out and found

Traveling to Europe with her sister during her sophomore year in college only "wet" Kathy's appetite for travel. After hing school, she promptly headed for Munich and lived "au pair" with the family of an American consulate, moving on a few months later to stay with a French family in Italy.

"This wet my appetite to travel more," Kathy says today of her "first big fling alone." Although by this time, financially and for other reasons, she began to realize that it was time for her to seek out a job.

Finding herself drawn to Atlanta, feeling it was "the key to unlock the door," Kathy went through four or five different jobs trying to get one in advertising, for it was, in fact, her college major.

Eventually, the right connection introduced Kathy to the assistant to the advertising and promotion director of the Rouse Company in Atlanta, "the Cadillac of the shopping center industry," she explains with a smile.

With that introduction, Kathy found herself assisting in the promotion of a new shopping center. "They did things in a very big way," Kathy says, recalling how the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra performed at the mall to draw people in to see it.

But, since her trip to Europe, Kathy found it hard to stay in one place for very long. After 13 months with the ad agency, she was ready for a change. Kathy packed up her car and headed for Boston with \$600 in her pocket and the recommendation of a good friend.

Riding on the Boston subway, Kathy laid eyes on an advertisement for WNAC-TV's Chuck Scarborough, who was at that time the local announcer for the Boston station. Having met him earlier in Atlanta, she thought this might be a good "in" for a job.

"I called him up, said I was from Atlanta and that I wanted a job," Kathy explains of her job searching exuberance. Chuck Scarborough put Kathy in contact with Mel Bernstein, news director for WNAC, who was looking for a secretary. He already had many applicants but Kathy says today, "I convinced him that he should hire me."

After a few months, Kathy applied for a production job that had opened up in a Boston ad agency and was hired as the account executive for shopping centers with the agency. Her ulterior motive, however, was to save enough money to take a "trip around the world."

Having worked with the agency for just about a year, Kathy came to Sanibel to join her parents, save more money and, as she explained to her Boston friends, "I'm going to go to that Island, write a book and scoop ice cream!"

Kathy stayed on Sanibel for about nine months, where she spent three months scooping ice cream at Duncan's, "I always wanted to scoop ice cream" she explains. She also started writing a murder mystery which evolves around a Boston TV station.

"That's one of my long range projects," Kathy explains today, "to be a successful novelist." She does still, however, have that book, but knowing Kathy, it will undoubtedly be finished before she is.

Still planning her "big trip," Kathy started another job, this time as the first full time promotion director for WBBH channel 20. "Since I loved TV, I went over there," she says today. That job managed to fill Kathy's time until she was finally ready to take her trip around the world.

With \$3,500 and seven months free, Kathy was off. "I traveled eighth class, if that's possible," she jokes. Hopping a bus to California then up to Seattle, Kathy took a freighter to Yokahoma, Japan. Her guide book was entitled "Asia on the Cheap."

The trip took Kathy to such far away places as India, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Tehran, Egypt, Israel, Greece, Italy and England. "By then," Kathy explains today, "I was absolutely broke and I was a zombie." But she did, however, treasure the experience.

Back in the United States, Kathy found herself working on Madison Avenue in New York for Batten, Barton, Durstine and Osborne Advertising. "Then by a fluke thing," Kathy says, "I got a job with Walter Cronkite!"

The series of events that led to Kathy's association with Cronkite started with her interest in working in TV. Through Mel Bernstein, she accumulated a list of TV contacts. Kathy called everyone on the list and by the time she reached the last name was sure she wouldn't even be able to get a job "sweeping floors."

The last name on her list, however, turned out to be Kathy's breakthrough. This man happened to be the "inhouse counselor" for CBS and he had two job openings. One was to work for Morton Dean and Rick Wagner, and the other was for a corresponding secretary position with Walter Cronkite. She received the latter.

"I answered his mail, got tea for him and his lunch," Kathy says today of what that job entailed. She made sure that Walter had his jacket on in time for his newscasts and she also made sure he had his contact lenses in. Not long after, however, Kathy became "stir crazy" once again.

It was during this time that Kathy became interested in writing comedy scripts. Having written a story for "Laverne and Shirley" (which never was sold) she decided California was the next place she would investigate.

Landing a job as production coordinator with EMI television, she was put in charge of the meticulous details for the production of different movies the company was producing, one of which, was a movie with Racquel Welsh.

"I didn't like what I was doing," Kathy recalls of the experience, adding, "I was getting lonely, and older now and I wanted different things out of life than when I was younger." So, she headed back to Sanibel.

"I love this - it is paradise," Kathy says of her feelings toward the Island, adding, "Having been all around the world, I can say Sanibel is a unique spot." And for once in Kathy's life she can finally say, "I do not even want to think of moving!"

Kathy seems to have finally found a job that satisfies her intellectual as well as creative talents. Having been "Weekend Post" reporter at WINK channel 11, the CBS affiliate, Kathy was recently promoted to a full fledged reporter's position and will now have a regular spot on the WINK newscasts.

Having made the decision to become an "interesting person" at the age of 21, Kathy, now 32, could never be disputed on that point.





This is a good contract. After the opening lead of the spade 10, the declarer counts his sure tricks: three spades, two hearts, three diamonds and two clubs.

The next step is to look for potential low card winners. The two suits in which he can hope to gain additional tricks are hearts and clubs. It is quickly seen that clubs is the suit to select because of the length and high card strength.

If the clubs are divided 3-2, the slam is ice cold regardless of how the suit is played. To guard against uneven distribution, there is a way to make four club tricks against a 4-1 division.

Declarer could win the spade lead with the Ace. He can then play the King of clubs, return to his hand with a diamond. Now he plays a small club to dummy's J-4.

If West started with Q-10-x-x, West can make only one club trick. If East started with Q-10-x-x, East can win his Queen, but his 10-x will lose later when declarer leads the club from dummy for a proven finesse.

Incidentally, this line of play must be used while there are still entries in the North hand. It is the only way to guard against a 4-1 division on either side.

Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the ordinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18, 1980, it is now illegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48"X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for noncommercial food preparation. commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have had your beach party, it is recommended that you assume the responsibility for the cleanup of any debris or litter in your area.

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator, he's close enough to feed on you. An alligator feed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.
