

## Don't park, walk!

Now there's one more reason why you should car pool, ride a bike or walk to where you have to go on Sanibel.

Beginning last Thursday, the Sanibel Police Department is now issuing Uniform Traffic Citations to motorists violating parking regulations on the Island.


Where before you might have been issued a Sanibel Police warning or citation for violating a City ordinance, you will now be issued one of those little "civil penalty" forms usually associated with parking meters in downtown Fort Myers, But where Fort Myers snags you for \$1 the City of Sanibel will now get you for \$25 - and a court appearance within 10 days of issuance if you haven't paid the fine.

Parking on the bike path, alongside or opposite street excavation in a manner that obstructs traffic, upon a bridge, within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, within 20 feet of a crosswalk, driveway entrance to a fire station or intersection, opposite a fire station within 75 feet of the entranceway, within 40 feet of a mailbox during the day, on the traveled way of any public road or in a handicapped reserved parking spot on Sanibel will get you a ticket - and a big one.

The magic of Christmas

Erosion control will be a topic of discussion and experimentation on Sanibel and Captiva as long as the Gulf and Bay waves continue to lap away at our shores. .

Bay Islander Al Lloyd has watched his beach retreat foot after foot, year after year. He has watched his neighbor attempt to halt erosion by securing palm fronds on the beach to protect the shore and he has seen the fronds being washed away and degenerated with the wave action, instead.

The experience did, however, spark an idea in Lloyd's mind to use another natural resource which would dissipate wave energy without being washed away or destroyed. As a member of the Research Committee for the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Lloyd presented his idea to the rest of the committe.

His idea is to use casuarina pine trees, a heavy non-floatable wood, and weave them into mats which are then placed on critical erosion areas and, it is hoped, serve as a

breaker to soften wave energy and trap sand.

"It seems to anchor enough and dissipates wave energy, maybe, let's hope," Lloyd said, adding, "Casuarina pine is a readily renewable natural resource."

Under the auspices of the Research Committee, there have been three "work parties" of committe members to cut down the pines and construct the erosion control mats.

Since the introduction of these mats, Lloyd has noticed an accumulation of sand where they have been placed. "Some of these things may happen anyway, but it seems encouraging," he said.

"We either stop erosion or we don't," Lloyd said, adding, "We may slow it-down though. We'll wait a few months and try to evaluate it."

For the time being, however, Lloyd believes this may offer a bit of encouragement to the ever-present problem of


You see, also included inside the presents was a note that told everyone they were going for a ride in the van to find their real Christmas gift, and it didn't take long for them to pile into the van, either.

Even at Christmas time, the Resources Center sticks to its philosophy of using all available "resources" to teach its students, even if it is an old cereal box!








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## Santa visits the Children's Center

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
#### **Commerce**

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

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

## Sanibel Disposal requests rate hike

On Jan. 6, the Sanibel City Council will hear a request from Sanibel Disposal for a 13 percent rate increase for a nine month period beginning January 1.

#### **Buntrock case continued**

The City of Sanibel last week gave City Attorney Neal Bowen the go-ahead to defend them against charges filed by Island realtor Bob Buntrock.

Buntrock has named the City, Planning Commission members and the City Manager as defendants in a suit seeking the overturn of a commercial moratorium adopted last

Circuit Judge Wallace Pack, however, agreed last Thursday to allow Bowen and William Haverfield, Buntrock's attorney, to submit briefs instead of holding a hearing. The Judge could possibly make a decision based on the attornies' briefs or, at a later date, set a time for a hearing. Haverfield has 15 days to submit memorandum to the court and then Bowen has another 15 days to respond. Haverfield will then be given five days to rebut, according to Bowen.

#### **Algiers RFP ready**

Sanibel's City Council last week unanimously approved a Request for Proposal prepared by the City staff for possible renovation of the Algiers steam-

The RFP outlines City expectations for an engineering study of the Algiers, the results of which will be used to determine the Algiers' fate - destruction or renovation.

#### **CONA** resolution turned down

A draft of a resolution submitted to Sanibel's City Council last week by the Committee of Neighborhood Associations (CONA) met with resounding defeat and offended feelings for some of the officials involved in the debate it engendered.

The proposed resolution called for a policy food expenses.

against the City entering into agreements that did not provide "adequate remuneration" and did not require "assumption of tort liability for claims arising from services not performed by the

Councilman Francis Bailey told the Council he was "offended" by the proposal and said it implied "we don't know what we're doing."

CONA member Paul Howe responded that the proposal was "preventative" and should be adopted in the form of an ordinance to offer legal protection to citizens.

One section of the resolution in particular angered Councilmembers: "...the City shall enter into only such interlocal agreements that it finds appropriate and timely and which provide for adequate remuneration for the services to be performed by the City, whether by its own employees or independent contractor."

"This accomplishes nothing," said Councilman Duane White. "We should keep doing what we've been doing. This implies we haven't.'

Councilman Fred Valtin agreed and told Howe citizens should not be able to sue the Council on grounds of "appropriateness and timeliness." "If citizens feel Council is way out of line," said Valtin, they should "recall" not sue.

"This is totally inappropriate," said White. "It opens the door to things we do not want."

Councilman Mike Klein was not offended, however, and told the Council that if what the draft resolution called for was already a City policy perhaps the Council could "reaffirm" it. Valtin, too, said he was willing to consider a reworded version of the

Howe, who was amenable to rewording, queried the Council, "Do you want to or don't you want to put your policy in writing?" To which White responded, "This is an uncalled for piece of legislation that doesn't do what you want it to do."

Before further debate could ensue, Councilman Bailey called the question and the resolution was defeated.

#### To eat or not to eat

To eat and where to eat became an issue last week for Sanibel's City Council as they grappled with the realities of out of town

Reimbursement for travel expenses and room costs incurred by City officials and staffmembers out of town on City business was easy to agree to: it was the price of food that stuck in everyone's throats.

Currently, state legislation provides that in the absence of a municipal ordinance governing such expenses, government employees should be provided with \$2.50 for breakfast, \$3.50 for lunch and \$6 for dinner.

As Councilmembers haggled over proposed limits and debated the economics of various locales, Urban Palmer, president of the Committee of Neighborhood Associations, told them, "This is embarassing as hell to hear you sit here and rangle...you're not \$65,000 a year Congressmen...the least we can do is buy you a meal!"

The Council eventually accepted a first reading on an ordinance allowing up to \$5 for breakfast, \$6 for lunch and \$15 for dinner.

#### Library agreement readied

A draft agreement between the City of Sanibel and Lee County governing control of the Sanibel Public Library met with Council dissatisfaction at last week's meeting.

According to Mayor Zee Butler, "we're still shooting for withdrawal from the County system," but the initial agreement being worked out now would have to be in effect for two years before the City could request the State Legislature to "back us out of the County program."

City Manager Bernie Murphy was instructed to rework the County's draft version of the agreement and send it back to the County Commission.

#### **Gulf Coast First National** caught in moratorium

Action by Sanibel's City Council last week assured that The Bank of the Islands will be the only bank on the Island of Sanibel for at least another two years.

**Gulf Coast First National Bank President** Paul Horton, architect Roland Stout and Priscilla Murphy Realty President Stan Johnson appeared before the Council seeking relief from the commercial moratorium - and were unanimously denied.

According to Horton, Gulf Coast had been waiting for an artist's rendition of their proposed bank when the City enacted its retroactive commercial moratorium last October. In seeking relief, Horton told the Council, "because of the timing of construction and the timing of the season it will be two years before we can get into this building (if denied). We would like to have the bank open next November."

Horton told the Council he did not intend to compete with The Bank of the Islands but, in his opinion, "A banking facility on the east end of the Island will aid in the traffic flow." The proposed site of the Gulf Coast bank is the Open Gate Boutique located near corner of Periwinkle and Lindgren.

The Planning Commission had earlier denied Gulf Coast's request for a setback specific amendment to the land use plan.

Councilman Mike Klein told the applicants, "This is a perfect case of why the moratorium" is needed, because this involves a change of use from a dress shop to a


Johnson responded, "This is a service centered area, it's not geared to tourists...there's no intention to increase congestion," and maintained that, "If not for the moratorium we'd be well underway...We're here requesting fair treatment."

Urban Palmer, president of the Committee of Neighborhood Associations, labeled Gulf Coast's proposed site "in bad taste" and told the Council that UNA objected "very strongly to this bank."

Councilman Fred Valtin told the applicants, "I have a certain amount of sympathy for the time bind you find yourself in," but said he would vote against moratorium relief on the grounds that there were other problems and "too many uncertainties" in the Gulf Coast proposal.

The motion to deny passed 3-0 with Francis Bailey and Zee Butler abstaining on Conflict of interest grounds.



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

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


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# On the water

One of the most common mistakes a person new at fishing makes is to select tackle way too heavy for the conditions. The next worst mistake is to buy equipment which is not matched, or balanced. When everyone sems to be catching fish but you, these problems might be your problems too.

A couple of years ago I happened to go into a hardware store that carried my favorite brand of fishing rods, call the UGLYSTIK. I found a \$40 rod that I thought would be just perfect for my new casting reel. Having never owned a good casting outfit, I wanted to get a good combination that would last many years. There never was any problem with the Penn reel, but boy did that rod give me fits.

First of all, it was five-and-a-half feet long and looked like a broomstick. Which meant that no matter how good the reel, it couldn't be cast because the rod was too short.

When I picked out the rod, I was looking for something to stop any, and I mean any, fish. The action was so stiff that I couldn't feel those small bites or strikes on lures. The result was a rod that was totally useless for the type of fishing we do around the Islands. That's what is known as a \$40 fishing

Nothing takes away from fishing pleasure like using

tackle way too heavy for the job. I've heard people complain that snook are no fight at all, but they were using 30-pound line, long surf rods and big game reels. A 100 lb. shark would be a pushover for that kind of outfit.

At the other end of the scale are the mini outfits, called in most tackle shops "ultra-lite" combinations. There is a fella I take out snook fishing every year and each year some new catastrophe seems to befall him just when he seems to be on the verge of landing a snook.

He builds his own rods and is very good at matching them to conditions - up where he lives on Long Island Sound. We were fishing along the Gulf one day last summmer when a big snook picked up his bait and, with only an 8-pound line, proceeded to run out about a 100 yards of line. I suggested that he might consider turning the fish and be in a hurry about it. He leaned back on the rod and the line broke. This happened two other times before he became convinced that he was trying to go too light for his particular experience.

Ideally, you should pick out a spinning rod and reel set up for line in the 10 to 12-pound class. Make sure the outfit is balanced. I try and rest the whole combination, without lure, on my finger and see where the center of balance is. If the reel is too big and heavy, you'll have to get the balance way back under the reel. If the rod is too heavy, the balance point will be way up ahead of the top grip above the reel.

I like the balance point to be three inches ahead of the reel, or right at the forward part of the top grip. This is where I place my right hand when casting. Check out your own rod and reel and see where it balances for you.

Having an off-balance outfit will really make it a chore for casting longer than a couple of hours. In my fishing group we often cast for three or four hours without letting up. That's when it's critical to have matched equipment

Don't buy your rods and reels with the thought that someday, someplace, somehow you are going to hook (and then lose) a large, prized fish because you didn't go heavy enough. Forget it. That balanced outfit will handle fish twice the weight of your line, if played correctly. In other words, go light and give the average fish you will catch a better play.

We all have some equipment around that never quite worked out but, keep in mind, that lighter action combinations are always the most fun out there on the water. Good fishing this week.



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

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide. For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract

hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and foour minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.

# Shelling Tips

Sometimes I'm asked about shells which are supposed to be found in our waters here along Sanibel and Captiva Islands, but hardly ever turn up in the shell lines. This week, let's talk about these "ghost" shells.

One shell which is often mentioned is the "paper nautilus." I imagine that we have all seen this uniquely spiraled shell on proud display in many shell shops and in some homes where collectors have bought one for themselves. But have you ever picked one up on our beaches?

I had a sheller out on one of my trips the other day who is also an active scuba diver. He had just come back from a Caribbean island where he said it was not unusual to find one along the beaches - but by diving more than coming across them washed up on the beaches. He mentioned that he thought there might be some along Florida's Southwest Coast, but as far as I have found, finding a paper nautilus would be something rare indeed.

Another ghost shell is tiny and nearly comical looking. It's called the "cup-and-saucer" shell. This shell is light colored, perhaps an inch wide and consists of a round shell with a smaller cupped shell inside. With a little imagination, you could see how it could resemble a small cup and saucer.

A few years ago, I remember a woman finding one or these. At least it looked like one to us. Yet they are supposed to be found around our Gulf beaches. Add one more to our almost-never-found list.

Of course, if you are having trouble finding any shells you would consider good collector pieces, then nearly every desirable shell is rare, but how about the fabled junonia?

The junonia is probably the most sought after shell on the Islands. It's rare, alright, but two years ago, we found six of them. Last year we found one. At least in the case of the junonia, we know that there are some out there. But finding one is purely accidental, you know.

Those magnificent king helmet shells and equally colorful and large, queen conch shells that grace shelves, hold doors open and in general make a collector go crazy for one, unfortunately aren't found very often either.

The queen conch is protected by Florida Law and it's a good thing because this is the shell which provides all those delightfully good dishes, including conch fritters, conch chowder and conch steak. Trouble is, the shelling pressure is wiping out the queen conch population. All those mounds of shells along the road in those horrible "shell shops" lining

major tourist highways in the state use hundreds of conchs and whelks.

Whether you are for or against taking live queen conchs and helmet conchs, you are going to have a very difficult time getting them around here. I have seen two big helmet conchs brought in by shrimpers who have caught them in nets far out in the Gulf, but I have yet to hear of anyone picking one up on the beach.

Those large sets of lion's paw shells make beautiful displays in a shell collection, but I've never seen a set "found." We have come upon single paws and were grateful for them, but a double? Not yet. It's possible, of course, because unlike the other shells mentioned, we do have a few lion's paws washing about.

Good shelling out there this week and work the Bowman's Beach area if winds come from the west or northwest in the next few days.

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# Island Bridge

One of the difficult actions that duplicate bridge players must take - difficult, because it's contrary to human nature - is to learn when it is profitable to "take a loss." It is essential, if you wish to become an excellent duplicate player.

The vulnerability situation is very important. As you take your hand from the Heart contract to score 620 points, you can

boards, immediately observe which pairs, if any, are vulnerable. Taking a loss is particularly advantageous if you are not vulnerable, competing against vulnerable

Mathematics is the key! If you are playing a vulnerable pair who have a lay-down fourprofitably accept a two -trick set doubled or a five-trick set undoubled, if vulnerable.

Profit through loss

Not vulnerable, a three-trick set doubled or a 10-trick set undoubled gives you a better score than allowing your vulnerable opponents to make game. Beware of the danger, if you are vulnerable, to take a set of more than one trick when the bidding indicates that your opponents will stop their bidding at less than a game contract.

Let's consider a hand which you might be

Your right-hand opponent, vulnerable, deals and bids one Heart. You, invulnerable, bid two Clubs. Opener's partner bids two Hearts. Your partner says "three Clubs." Opener jumps to four Hearts.

Here's your hand:

Spades - AJxx Hearts - x x x Diamonds - x Clubs - A Q 10 x x x

What do you do? Bid five Clubs fast! And go to six if your opponents bid five Hearts.

Opener's jump to four Hearts indicates that he is certain that with his partner's single raise, the contract is makeable - 620 points for his pair. You can show a profit in down three for minus 500.

But maybe you'll get the contract and make five Clubs. Let's analyze the possibilities.

Your partner has at least three Clubs, possibly four, hopefully to the King; a singleton or blank in Hearts, and at least three or four points in Spades (you hope) or Diamonds. If he has the King of Spades, you have an excellent chance to make five Clubs.

Opener has at least five Hearts, probably six because of his jump bid to four. His partner has at least three Hearts for his raise. This leaves either a blank or one Heart in your partner's hand, so you will be able to trump out at least two Hearts, perhaps all three, from your hand.

But, the key to your bidding is that with the worst possible dummy with an honor in Clubs and outside strength in Diamonds, it is highly probable that your set will not be more than three.

So - you've profited by taking a loss!

BEACH ACCESS

BEACH ACCESS

Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. Lighthouse Point is a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Donax Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and (off Sanibel Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between

located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.
On Captiva Island, public beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.
NOTE: STATE LAW PROHIBITS NUDE SUNBATHING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING

Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to the or-dinance, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18, 1980, it is now but as of July 18, 1980, it is now illegal. An exemption to the ordinance is a fire in an approved cooking container (not to exceed 48"X 24" X 12" deep with an extruded metal grill) for noncommercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have had your beach party, it is recommended that you assume the responsibility for the cleanup of any debris or litter in your area.

GATORS

Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in fail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator, he's close enough to feed on you. An alligator fed for fun loses his natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.

WARNING! SAFEGUARD YOUR VALUABLES.

in order to protect your valuable possessions from theft, it is recommended that you TAKE THEM TO A BANK OR HOTEL VAULT FOR SAFEKEEPING. Do NOT leave them in your room or car.

SPEED LIMITS

There are varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them...to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar on a 24-hour basis by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee

County Sheriff's Department.
