# **Below Market Rate Housing**

# Committee will propose housing

# foundation by July 1

deadline and present a new draft of an ordinance establishing a housing foundation to a joint City Council - Planning Commission orkshop in mid-June.

What the Committee hopes was the final efinement of the document establishing guidelines for franchising a foundation to provide affordable housing for Island esidents with moderate incomes completed at a meeting of the full Comnittee last Friday.

An editorial subcommittee, chaired by Ben Fuller and Emily Barefield, had worked on revising an ordinance first presented to the Council and Planning Commission a year ago, incorporating changes approved by a consensus of the Committee.

The ordinance outlines the responsibilities of the foundation to the City and conversely 'pins down" the City's obligations to the foundation as a franci

Though the thrust of the ordinance is to eliminate subsidization of the BMR housing units by the City, the ordinance does call for the City to provide the foundation with seed money for "start-up" operations and to defray administrative expenses, both on an if-needed basis.

Criteria for eligibility for BMRH applicants include financial need, employment on Sanibel, residence on Sanibel, and other extenuating circumstances. The proposed foundation will be guided in selecting applicants by using a point system developed by the BMRH Committee that awards numerical value in the four categories. The



# **Estuary decision lauded** by Sanibel Council

The Florida Supreme Court ruling in the Estuary Properties case, that affirms that "protection of environmentally sensitive as is the legitimate concern within the police power of state and local govern-ments," is being halled by Sanibel officials as a ratification of the City's innovative planning policies.

The City of Sanibel joined the petitioners in the Estuaries suit as amici curiae eight years ago when it first developed after Lee County refused to allow Atlanta millionaire Robert Troutman's Estuary Properties, Inc. to build 26,500 units, housing about 73,500 ons, on a 6,500 acre tract along San Carlos Bay south of the Santhel Causeway

The property included a 1,000-acre black mangrove swamp and 2,800 acres of red mangrove that would be left undisturbed.
The State Supreme Court's decision will

permit the developer to cluster half as many residential units on only 700 acres of high ground, leaving several thousand acres of mangroves undisturbed.

"It is indeed a landmark decision," City Attorney Neal Bowen, who had argued the City's position before Governor Bob Graham and the State Cabinet, said, "with both a direct and indirect impact on Sanibel.

"For the first time the Court has used a new test for property rights in wetlands, Bowen added.

"A more sophisticated and critical examination of property rights by the Court shows they are not all the same," Bowen

very significant," Councilman Porter Goss said of the Supreme Court's reversal of the First District Court of Appeal's findings that development of the mangrove swamps would not have an adverse impact on the surrounding region.

"It will have a terrific impact on land use statewide," he added, "and is a welcome relief and a breath of fresh air for conservation interests."

"It's a vindication of Sanibel's early policies," Mayor pro tem Duane White commented.

The Supreme Court disagreed with the District Court that denial of Estuary's building permit constituted a "taking" of private property for a public purpose without compensation in violation of Florida and United States Constitutions.

The Justices found that "preventing destruction of the mangrove forest was necessary to avoid unreasonable pollution of bay waters causing attendant harm to the ublic" and would be in the purview of the government's police powers.

Estuary Properties are expected to appeal

And the City Council indicated it would stay with the case to the end.

Bowen pointed out thet "Sanibel has taken a strong position backed up by its innovative history of conserving its own environment. "It should be an interesting party," he

added.

# **By-the-Sea Motel** agrees to 18

# conversion conditions

A revised site plan for conversion of the By-the-Sea Motel to a 19-unit condominium complex received the blessing of the Sanibel Planning Commission after R.J. McCormack, the project's architect, agreed to 18 conditions imposed by the City planning staff

The Commissioners last unanimously approved By-the-Sea Associates' request for a development permit paving the way for the razing of 18 existing units at the Gulf front motel and the relocation of the nineteenth.

The 18 apartments will be housed in three six-unit buildings with elevations for the first "habitable floor" a minimum of 12-feet above mean sea level. Their height will be limited to 45-feet.

Ground floor levels can be used for open space, and for storage only with "break-away" walls. The existing swimming pool, now forward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line, will be removed and filled.

During construction a protective fence must be erected at the Coastal Setback I

Two ponds on the site will be utilized as a storm water retention area and the propo tennis court must be located a minimum of 20-feet from either pond

A beach boardwalk will be constructed after a permit is obtained from the Florida Department of Natural Resources.

The sewer line to service the com down Gulf Drive to Tarpon Bay Road, must he adequate to full the needs of all future development in that area

Final construction plans, with cer-tification of flood proofing, must be reviewed and approved by the Planning Department prior to issuance of a building

The development permit will not be issue until the developer provides a site plan conforming to all 18 stipulations, and a Certificate of Occupancy will be dependent on the installation of all landscaping as proposed on the plans.

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# Chamber of Commerce holds annual meeting

Since most of the business covered during the past calendar year had already been mailed out to Chamber members via the annual report prepared by Chamber President Bill Frey, the business end of the meeting was informal and brief.

The past year was termed "the most successful" of years for the Chamber and marked the 25th anniversary celebration of Chamber service to the Islands.

Bill Frey, who has served as president for the duration of the term vacated by Councilman Fred Valtin, was re-elected last week o serve a full term. Fred Comlossy was elected to serve as vice president, Pat Slater was re elected Chamber secretary and Pete Skehan was elected to serve as treasurer.

Members of the Chamber board will also include Bob Gibson, Michael Peceri, Ralph Woodring and Mike Fuery.

Chamber membership leaped to almost 400 patrons over the past year but the board still managed to stay well within the bounds

of their projected 1980 budget.
According to Bob Buntrock, 1980 Chamber treasurer, the Chamber now has an actual "cash" supply of \$22,162 in the bank or in certificates of deposits and in savings and

The Chamber was budgeted at \$80,000 crsus the \$78,700 actually spent. They brought in \$85,000 during the year and the difference was contributed to the cash

complishment" involved the develo "comprehensive statement of goals and objectives" for the Chamber.





Colonel James W. R. Adams, District Engineer Jacksonville District, U.S. Corps of Engineers

Dear Colonel Adams:

Congratulations on the recently reported candor you and Neil Frank publicly expressed at the National Hurricane Conference in Saint Petersburg.

That urging of local government officials to get on the stick when growth threatens to worsen the chances of successful evacuation in the face of killer hurricanes, indeed, needed saying. The following day, Richard Krimm of the Federal Flood Insurance

Agency, apparently encouraged by your forthright address, reportedly emphasized your point by indicating that Federal insurance coverage and reconstruction ald would likely be denied on "undeveloped" barrier islands.

barrier islands.

Coincidentally, the April issue of DNR's GEOJOURNEY had a most informative and thought-provoking two articles on the Suwanee and Ichelucknee Rivers of North Florida. The former article stated: "There is considerable resistance to the concept of planning in North Florida and some local governments are dragging their feet to the last possible legal moment." It went on to say that the natural defense constraints on the Suwanee which has afforded protection in the past is changing because of the quickening development in the flood plain.

Also mentioned in somewhat derogatory terms was the Corp's Four Rivers Basin Study. Particularly singled out was the alternative to pipeline 350 million gallons per day of excess Suwanee surface water to thirsty areas of Southwest Florida. That is a proposal that would certainly be heartily endorsed by Cape Coral and other commutities in Southwest Florida thirsting from a current prolonged dry spell. (Can 1 have some further information on the proposal?)

It seems to me that the reported local
footdragging on development regulation of
those North Florida Rivers and the lack of
legislative mandates for a coordinated
Water Management District solution calls
for the courageous action that the Corps is
capable of providing. The Band-Ald treatment apparently favored by local and state
governments will never achieve the more
lasting cure that the Corps traditionally
strives for.

We, on Sanibel, are certainly indebted to the splendid guidance the Corps has given us on similar problems. We also take seriously the consequences FEMA forecasts for failue to heed such guidance. Incidentally, I note that the dormant proposal for a coal-sturry pipeline to our area is being reconsidered by the Florida Legislature. Would it be feasible to use a common right-of-way for that and your proposed pipeline for Southwest Florida;

# Elementary students receive middle school orientation

By Barbara Brundage Thirty-six fifth graders who will graduate mentary School June 5, had from Sanibel Ele a preview of the Sixth Grade World they will enter next fall.

Via a slide presentation, the students made a vicarious visit last week to Cypress Lake Middle School where they will be bused for classes beginning next September.

Roger Jones, a guidance counselor at Cypress Lake, told the Sanibel children economic conditions in the school system led to a cutback in field trips" and made a physical visit to the school in South Fort Myers impossible.

A Day at Cypress Lake Middle School, photographed and narrated by students, "I hope will be the next best thing to being " Jones said.

The biggest difference new students will ace is seven different teachers and seven

different classrooms, Jones said.

All sixth graders will take five classes: math, science, social studies, language arts and reading

In addition, sometime during the year, sixth graders have a choice of subjects in related arts, including health, physical education, home economics or business education

Some students, at the recommendation of their teachers, will be assigned to a "selfcontained classroom" under the supervision of one teacher, Jones said, while other children will be enrolled in an accelerated program, working one grade level above the rest of the class.

Cypress Lake's extracurricular activities include band and orchestra, a school newspaper and yearbook, drama produc-tions, field trips, and a variety of sports. "After three years at Cypress Lake



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# On the water

The Annual Island Fishing Derby is underway for another and perhaps we will see some of the past catch records broken. It looks as if the fishing should be as dependable as

The Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the contest, which started on April 27, and lasts for nine weeks, ending June 28. As with last year, there will be prizes awarded for the largest fish entered each week in categories of redfish, sea trout, cobia and, of course, snook.

The Chamber even allowed me to work in gathering

prizes and related items for the Derby. I've got some great help, including Frits and Norma Stoppelbein; last year's chairman of the Derby, Ralph Woodring; and Walter Klie, Executive Director of the Chamber who keeps us all ogether most of the time.

It's a contest designed for maximum participation and ou don't have to buy a fancy boat or go out with a guide to catch a fish large enough to enter.

This is one event where nearly every fishing guide on the islands helps out with prizes, most donating part of a lishing or shelling charter as a prize in the weekly awards. There are a couple of things to keep in mind, should you or

a friend catch a fish that you feel has a chance to win something. First, you should get the fish weighed as soon as possible. Fish seem to lose weight if left in the boat or on the beach. Ounces count here, so get to one of the weigh stations fast. This year, take your fish to one of the following: The Bait Box, Sanibel Marina or Tarpon Bay Marina on Sa nihel Island, or Twin Palms Marina, South Seas Marins or Tween Waters Marina on Captiva Island. They will also have all the forms you will need to enter the fish. You will need to deliver or mail your entry blank to the Chamber office. located near the entrance to the causeway

As we were going over the contest rules for this year's Derby, we were all somewhat worried about the condition of the snook population, but more importantly, what the State Legislature would do about the fish.

There is a very well founded concern about the future of the snook. The fishing pressure, especially during the spawning months of June and July, are depleting the stock of this very popular game fish. I know I have people from all over the country come down to Captiva laland just to charter fish for snook. It's a great gamester and an excellent eating fish.

There is now a law which states that an angler can take up to four snook per day, providing they are over 18-inch in length. However, this session of the Legislature might change that. Right now, Senate Bill 513 is being considered for passage into law. Here is what this proposed Bill will do for snook fishing:

The new Bill will amend section 370.111 of the Florid Statutes to allow only two snook in poss which will be under 18-inches. In addition, as the proposed law states, "No person, firm or corporation shall take or have in his possession, regardless of where taken, any snook of any size between June 1 and July 31 of the years 1982 through 1986."

If passed, and it appears that it will, the law will go into effect on Ocinber 1, 1981. In summary, this will be a five-year study by the State to see what reducing the limit and stopping fishing in the spawning period will do to help the snook make a comeback.

Meanwhile, the law won't affect this season's a and I expect that many large snock will be entered in the Flahing Derby, along with cobla, redfish and sea trout. Enjoy the contest and weigh that fish as soon as you can.



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
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

# **Shelling Tips**

Small, roundish shells seem to all belong to the same family and end up being misidentified as often as not. This week, let's look at some of the shells you might find on our beaches which share similar features but are quite different in locations found and living habits.

There is a shell called the bubble shell, which is found around our beaches, but looks very much like a cowrie. It's not unusual to have someone tell me they have found a cowrie, the only trouble is that I've never seen one found here and the books say the cowrie is limited to the Florida Keys and southward. Now, it's possible to find one here, but ances are you have some sort of bubble shell instead.

Same goes for one of my favorite little shells, the margin shell. Margins seem almost magical to me because of their almost jewel-like appearance and aheen. Now, with margins, we are talking about an adult shell which might be a quarter-inch long. You don't exactly stumble over margins. I first learned how to find them by just standing quietly on the edges of grass flats in Pine Island Sound and watching for something to catch my eye. After a time you start to see all sorts of tiny shells going about their work of living. The margins are active shells and a greenish-gold

color for the most part and, incidentally, they look very much like a tiny cowrie. See what I mea

To make matters worse, there is even a bubble margin shell, but not to worry, they are only found in Brazil.

Now, the common bubble shell we find on the beaches of

Sanibel and Captiva Islands is about a half-inch long, more brownish and easily crushable with two fingers. I've never seen a live bubble shell, but by the ease with which they can be found, there must be large colonies out there.

There are a couple groups of islanders who are very concerned with the emerging crop of live shells which might be encountered on the beaches at this time of the

They asked me to get a few words out on what to look out for if you walk the beaches or flats. There are three shells which are found live near shore and are in the process of producing offspring. The Florida fighting conch is that colorful, brown shiny shell with the hook-shaped foot. It's often found near mud beds and you are urged not to disturb this ahell If you find one.

The same goes for the moon snall, better known as the

shark's eye, and the whelks. These shells are trying to make a comeback after years of being picked over by live shellers. It's possible for them to regain some of the lost numbers, if they are allowed to deposit their eggs undisturbed in warm shallow waters.

You are most likely to find the egg cases of the adult whelk shell. These egg cases are kind of sand colored and flexible and most new shellers say they look like a snake flexible and most new answers say they now have a small skin. Once washed upon the beach, the egg case is probably doomed, but there is a plan to work on that problem I'll tell you about later. In the meantime, if you do see a live or attached egg case growing offshore or in the hay, leave it

The majority of the winter visitors have returned home and the beaches are far less crowded, especially in the middle of the week, so your chances of collecting shells are much better.

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
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#### Council asked to withdraw North Captiva development opposition

Sanibel City Councilmen were non committal last week when Bruce Waters. representing Safety Harbor, a proposed 53-unit residential community on North Captive Island, asked them to withdraw the objections to construction of a 285-foot wharf

to provide boat access to the property.

The only other access to the barrier island. currently undeveloped, is by private plane, Waters said

Sonibel Planning Director Bruce Rogers at the direction of the Council, had filed an objection with the Army Corps of Engineer

to the issuance of a permit to fill the red approach had been discarded and the mangroves would be spanned by a wooden bridge into deep water. Slips for 36 boats would be provided.

He claimed there would be "zero impact" on Sanihel since boat traffic to North Captiva leaves from Pine Island.

In response to Goss' concern about hazard mitigation. Waters said there are no plans

for getting people off the island in the event of a major storm.

"They'll be on their own," he said. Both Goss and Mayor pro tem Duane
White viewed the project as a "first step...a

beginning" of development that, down the road would be more intense than a barrier island could withstand. There was no response from any Coun-

cilman when Waters suggested that his presentation had changed their minds and rrective action had been taken.

"Your position is strong and a second letter modifying it would bein." Waters said.



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

The game plan for the eradication of th nuisance species is largely the brainwork of SCCF staff naturalist Steve Phillips, who once suggested declaring the Brazilian pepper an endangered species hoping that reverse psychology would rid the Island of Nevertheless, the new plan appears sound and the Foundation believes it will be effective provided it is continued and monitored for at least five years. The plan itself is scheduled to begin this summer, but the Foundation has been conducting preliminary research on several

ching poison, uprooting and other means of controlling peppers; studying methods, cost and feasibility of herbicide application; (and) choosing the best time of year to poison and scheduling follow-up maintenance."

The Foundation has divided the Center property into areas already defined by the nature trails and plan to treat the most productive areas first.

According to the Foundation, the most productive areas are generally located on the border of the ridges where an "edge effect" occurs, where two different ecozones meet and where most of the wildlife and

vegetation activity occurs.

It is also in these areas that the peppers arecrowding out under-storey vegetation and where the Australian pines lay down a blanket of needles making it difficult for other vegetation to take root. Canopy trees are also fighting a losing battle with the exotics in these areas.

The remaining areas, mostly wetlands, are not in as great a danger as the ridges and will be treated last. The wetlands do not have as wide a variety of wildlife or affected vegetation and peppers do not grow as fast in wetter soil.

Therefore, wetland vegetation is much

easier to replace ecologically as compared to the delicate understory plants in the more valuable regions.

The Foundation has already begun research on prescribed burns for controlling peppers in the wetland areas but until the best control methods are established and because the pepper threat is not as bad, these areas will be left alone for the time

The ridges and edge affect areas, the most productive lands, will be dealt with first. Three poisoning methods have been determined as successful for treating the peppers.

The first method would be to spray a defoliate on the pepper causing the leaves to fall off. The second approach would be to cut down the tree and treat the stump with a herbicide. The third, simplest and most effective method is to make an incision into the trunk and apply a herbicde underneath the bark and into the cut area.

The Foundation prefers the latter for reasons explained in their report. "The poison is held in these pockets until the tree absorbs it. If killed, the dead tree is left standing to be used as a wildlife habitat and

Islander Duey Liber has always had busy fingers and her hands have alway needed to be doing something - as her cabin-like Sanibel home, blanketed with intricate quilts, can testify to

Just two and a half years ago Duey finally discovered what it was her hands and fingers had really been wanting to do all along - pottery.

Duey, as a potter, disagrees somewhat with the allty philosophy of most clay craftamen who desire most to "become one with the clay."

"The only thing I can relate to my clay is the enjoyment of it," Duey says today of her new-found forte, adding with a smile, "Sometimes the clay feels so good my mouth will start watering!

"(it's the child in everybody," Duey explains of the puerile derience of sitting before a goosy lump of clay and huishing your hands through it. "It's in your blood, so far as to say, it's addicting," she confesses.

Despite all the fun involved in her claywork, Duey also has to take a professional approach to it because, it is, afterall, how she makes a living. And that fact in itself, Duey says, poses some archaic gaps that she is trying to bridge.

"Most people I talk to don't even consider that this is my living," Duey explains in her typically controlled manner of how being a potter is not the "accepted norm" of what a woman's career objective should be.

william a career topective snown or should be working in a real estate office as a secretary - a nice solid job," Duey says, towing at the thought and then adding, "I don't think! I could cope with a nine to five job. I'd feel too cooped up." But, in spite of the conventional objections, Duey has, nevertheless, reached the point where she can say, "I am a

potter and proud of it."

And athough Duey has just passed the last winter spanning pots, lampa, ast trays and hummingbird feeders from 14 hour days, her occupation allows her to be home when her daughter peeds her, she is her own boss, and her

work is also a rewarding creative outlet.

"I really haven't been in it that long," Duey explains of her continuing initiation to the clay world, adding however, that she is working hard to build up a reputation and a following for her earthy endeavors.

Duey's collection is included among the inventory of many island shops. And almost every other week during the winter she exhibits her pottery at local arts and crafts shows where she has received some "fanisatic exposure," made valuable contacts and went on to "bigger and hetter

shows."

During the upcoming summer, Duey plans to stock up on her pottery so that she can better pace her time during the season when there is a greater demand for her work. She also plans to take an intensive pottery course to be able to extend her skills.

A child of Michigan summers and Buffalo winters, Duey came to Sanibel with her husband and daughter. Kelly, almost three years ago. She has recently become "unmarried" which has boosted her into action in order to put bread on the table and raise her daughter.

Duey specifically chooses to differentiate "unmarried" from "divorce," for the former carries a connotation she now ascribes to

"It's a whole new ballgame," Ducy says of the changes she is facing, adding, "Being a single parent is extremely difficult but very rewarding.

"Being a production potter with the necessity of making a living," Duey continues, "I have to sell to people what they want." This means that her pottery list consists mainly of lamps, ashtrays, bird feeders, cups and the like.

Before Sanibel entered the picture, Ducy attended grade and high school in Buffalo while flourishing in the "fantastic" anowstorming winters. (Which, believe it or not, she still misses.) Her summer months where spent with her family in their Michikan cabin.

Duey was graduated from Bowling Green State

University where she majored in cartography and minored in anthropology in hopes of "making maps for anthropolgists," she says, adding with chagrin, "My big job offer was to map sewers."

"I ended up getting married and became a civil engineer," Duey explains of how anthropological map makers weren't in such great demand.

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# The alligators are on the move



The cold weather gone and with warmer days ahead, alligators are on the move and much more visible.

Alligators are cold-blooded reptiles, their body temperature depends on the surrounding air temperature. During winter months alligators are in a state of semi-hibernation, they can't actively function well in cold temperatures. As the weather warms alligators become more active and start moving around.

Younger alligators are dispersing, seeking less crowded more suitable waters," said Dennis David, Wildlife Biologist with the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. "Both male and female adults will be out looking for mates as the nesting season approaches."

Nesting runs from the end of May until the first part of July with the peak season in mid-June. The female generally remains attentive to the nest during the 65-70 day

incubation period. These nesting females may be defensive of the nest and demonstrate more agressive behavior.

"Although the alligators are more active they aren't necessarily deagerous," David said. "Because they are moving, even across land, there is an increased possibility of conflict with people. We get reports of alligators in pools and driveways."

David, who heads up the Commission's Nuisance Alligator Control Program in the South Region, advises not to be surprised if you see an alligator, just use common sense and give him a wide berth. If, after awhile, the alligator doesn't continue on his way or seems bold, contact the Sanibel Police Department.

"Our Nuisance Alligator Control Program was designed to deal (only) with those alligators that pose a threat to humans, pets or livestock," David said.





The defoliate is suggested for area there is a large concentration of young pepper seedlings. Cutting down the pepper trees and treating the stumps is suggested for areas already being cleared of peppers for revegetation. The process of notching the trunk and applying poison will be the most commonly used method.

Every treated area will be under periodic examination for regrowth and new seedlings. According to Phillips, "It would be most advantageous for the Foundation to contol peppers throughout the year and to take data from the results of various test

The Foundation will cover the Center property in plots and patches but a precis schedule has not yet been determined. Eventually every plot, every Brazilia pepper, every Australia pine and Melaleuca will be treated over the next five years through this continuing program.


In the few test areas that have already been treated, all that remains is dead exotics - an encouraging note for the Foundation to begin their master plan on.

happy and reaching compromises, said Refuge Manager Del Pierce. The vegetation maintenance that is conducted in the refuge is primarily to keep the corridor cleared for viewing the wildlife.

Along the road, mangroves are cut back regularly to keep them at low levels. Despite local opposition to the contrary, refuge management believes this makes the mangroves grow back bushier and stronger.

Brazilian pepper is almost non-existent along the drive although it does dominate a great deal of the refuge. Mowing along the shoulders of the drive removing annual weeds and perennial vegetation maintains a lower level of vegetation for better viewing.

With strong hopes to break up the mono-type habitat that has developed over the years due to the invasion of Brazilian pepper and Australian pine, the refuge plans to split up the large impoundment. Half will be fresh water and the other half brackish, Pierce explained. They hope to pump the west inpoundment into the east impoundment.


This pumping will raise the water level up, increase the salinity and hopefully kill off in the making, but plans for the center are vegetation.

Buntrock, back at his deak at Executive Services Inc., maintained he is not "unhappy at losing."

"I ran a good race and I expect a lot of good things to come out of the campaign,

he said "I think it is better that Porter was opposed and that there was a campaign," Buntrock said. "I intend to pursue the issues I've raised and work for orderly develop-

ment under the plan. "I intend to be a lot more involved in the review (of the CLUP), too," be promised.

Another fringe benefit of his candidacy,
Buntrock hopes, will be the organization of a second citizens' political group, a counterpart to the Committee of the Islands, to support the opposite viewpoint of "The Club", and the establishment of a "twoparty system" on the Island.

Gosa said his top priorities in the next 18 months will continue to be the commercial study, hazard mitigation, and the five year review of CLUP. In that area, he said he will focus on the "little problems" such as regetation control and providing a fast track for minor variances.

"If he's not doing what he said be would I'll call him on it," Buntrock promised.



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

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# Public CLUP review hearings begin this month

By Barbara Brundag

Public hearings for the five-year review of Sanibel's Comprehensive Land Use Plan will begin at the Planning Commission's second May meeting, Commissioner Don Manchester announced last week.

In the absence of Chairman Ann Winterbotham, Manchester presided at the regular Commission meeting April 27.

Winterbotham had announced the plan would be reviewed "section by section," with imput solicited from the public.

The four elements of the plan have been under review by assigned members of the Commission for the past year.

Many changes and proposed amendments to the plan were initiated during a preliminary review over the past 18 months, Winterbotham told the City Council earlier.

"What was surprising during the hearings chaired by Judy Workman (a former Planning Commissioner) was the lack of public comment," Winterbotham said.

Commissioner Joe Searing was worried that bearings on each separate section of the plan would drag the process out for years. City Manager Bernie Murphy agreed but pointed out that there is no deadline for completion of the review.

"It's not a curtain going down, lights out sort of situation," he said.

Commissioner Arthur Wycoff, who's been reviewing the "Power portion" of the plan, agreed to consider a change proposed by some members of the Ad Roc Committee for Electrical Distribution. To strengthen the City's position on underground utilities, the committee proposes the language in the plan be made mandatory. "Instead of whould' be underground."

"Instead of 'should' be underground," Commissioner Bill Hagerup, also a member of the Ad Hoc Committee, reported, "the Committee recommends 'shall' be underground be substituted."

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
