More water cutbacks urged

Sanibel City officials are seeking the help of tourists and visitors to achieve the 25 percent cut in water consumption ordered by the South Florida Water Management District last Thursday.

Thousands of flyers suggesting ways to conserve water are being distributed to guests at Island motels, hotels and condominiums.

At an emergency meeting Saturday morning, the City Council approved a proclamation issued by Acting Mayor Mike Klein banning washing of sidewalks, driveways, porches, the exterior of homes, automobiles, trucks, trailers and, mobile homes. The proclamation also bans the use of water for dust control except as required for public health.

Watering lawns and vegetation is prohibited except between 8 and 10 p.m. every third day under the proclamation.

Residents and visitors alike are also urged to cut down their general use of water inside their homes.

Last Friday, with Mayor Duane White and Councilman Porter Goss absent, the Council opted not to approve a mandatory ordinance and to continue voluntary restrictions on water use that for a week had failed to produce the required 10 percent reduction mandated by the SFWMD.


"It will be very difficult if not impossible for Sanibel to achieve a cut in consumption either by mandatory or voluntary methods because of the number of visitors to the island that are not as concerned as residents," Councilman Fred Valtin said.

The influx of vacationers every weekend creates a dramatic fluctuation in water use, he said.

"Permanent residents of the Island are outnumbered by vacationers," Klein added.

Co-op recommends overhead lines

Lee County Electric Cooperative's response to a request from Sanibel's Ad Hoc Electric Distribution Negotiating Committee for a cost comparison of underground versus overhead installation of a third feeder line on the Island was a two-inch thick

At the end of the three-hour presentation by three of the electric company's top officials last Thursday, it was apparent the utility had not changed its position.

Running the new transmission line through four residential subdivisions is still "in the best interest of the community," O.D. Reynolds, director of operations for the co-op, said.

Councilman Fred Valtin, chairman of the Council-appointed committee to study electrical distribution on Sanibel, expressed disappointment that the co-op was "not more sensitive to the people's wishes" that the new line be constructed completely underground along the San-Cap Road rather than "half and half" through a highly developed residential area.

Valtin echoed the sentiments of other Committee members who said they had hoped the co-op would be more cooperative.

The report stressed the need for beefing up electric power on the island and pointed out that demands for service from Chateau Sur Mer, Tahiti Shores, Gulf Pines and East and West Rocks at the peak of last winter's season exceeded the capability of the present transmission system.

"Increased demands for power this summer are expected to tax severely the two transmission lines if construction of an additional line is not begun immediately," Diane Christensen, the co-op's vice president for Community Relations and Communications, told the Committee and interested Islanders who packed MacKenzie

The transmission line from Pine Island to Sanibel and the co-op's substation will be able to meet the projected growth of both Sanibel and Captiva through 1994 if Sanibel's current 180-unit per year ceiling on residential construction is maintained. Christensen said.

The capacity of both distribution lines was exceeded by consumer demands in 1980, Christensen said.

"The Lighthouse circuit that serves Periwinkle Way from Tarpon Bay to the Lighthouse was overloaded by 10 percent," she said, adding that the Gulf Drive circuit (Rabbit Road and Tarpon Bay Road to West Guil Drive and east to the Rocks and Pines) was overloaded by 27 percent.

Sanibel residents do not quarrel with the need for more power. Their objection is to the route of the third feeder and overhead construction proposed by the co-op.

The utility's choice, approved by the City Council last November after a stormy public hearing, would run the third feeder line underground from the substation along San-Cap Road to Jamaica Way.

The capacity of the co-op's existing overhead single-phase distribution lines along Jamaica Way and Rabbit Road would be increased, and an underground three phase line in the Gulf Pines area would connect with the overhead lines along West Gulf Drive and upgrade those lines from one- to three-phase, Christensen said.

The cost of the proposal is now estimated at \$317,468, which is \$75,000 more than last November's estimate.

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Cab company 'stalls' on occupational license

John Bullard apparently has operated his Sanihel Taxicah Company without an occupational license since October 1980 while his request for a development permit to operate the taxi service at Scotty's Village was pending before the Planning Com-

The Commissioners admitted they were haffled at last week's meeting when they were asked to act on that request, which has an continued three times since March 1980. The Commission was also asked to act on a request for a Specific Amendment to permit Bullard to construct a taxi garage office on property located between Three Crafty-Ladies and the county park on Periwinkle

Adding to the confusion was Attorney John Wilcox's disclaimer of any knowledge of his client's request to operate the cab business from Scotty's Village.

"Mr. Bullard says he never made such a Wilcox told the Commission.

"But John tends to be a little confused these days," Wilcox explained."He has undergone two major surgeries and just went back into the hospital today."

Wilcox said Bullard does not want to run

his business from from Scotty's Village but from an office-garage be would build on bis property near Three Crafty Ladies.

In response to a Commission question Wilcox said that "as far as I know be now operates mostly from the airport.'

But Jane Myers, a neighbor of Bullard's, told the Commission that the Santbel business is operating from Bullard's home on Lindgren Boulevard, where the dispatch tower is now located.

The Planning Department also needs to know the proximity of adjacent structures and bodies of water to the development and the placement of the building on the lot to minimize its effect on adjacent residential

Commissioner Don Manchester said be attempted to help Bullard fulfill these requirements in the past, saying he com-municated with Bullard "like a father."

Commissioners Bill Hagerup and Joe Searing, however, said they interpreted Bullard's conduct as "taking advantage of the city" and "deliberately stalling and getting away with operating without a license



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

Selective shelling urged by committee

Gathering sea shells by the sea shore is a favorite pastime of many Island residents and visitors.

But sometimes certain seas shells should stay on the shore to insure the survival of their species rather than become part of a coffee table collection.

In an effort to educate beachcomber bout which shells should be left on the sand, the Sanibel Live Shelling Committee hopes to establish a public information board at the Chamber of Commerce

Committee Chairwoman Barbara Toomev said last week that, pending the chamber's consent, a list of shells that are in breeding will be maintained on an information board at the chamber office on the Causeway

The list will be updated as needed according to the types of live shells committee members and serious shellers in the com-

munity spot on bay and Gulf beaches.

Mrs. Toomey and former committee chairwoman Pat Kair explained that when live shells are in breeding they tend to wash up on the beaches more than during other times in their life cycles.

When the shells are in breeding, Mrs. Kair said, it is important that they be allowed to return to their breeding grounds off shore to insure their reproduction.

Only the names of those shells that are in breeding will be posted on the information board, and the public's participation in the effort to preserve the live shells will be strictly voluntary, Mrs. Kair said.

The concern and respect of most Island

residents and visitors for live shells prompted the committee's idea for the information board, Mrs. Toomey said.

There is a quest for knowledge about how care for our shells on the Island," she said. "We consider this project more a public education service" for people who





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Buntrock building exempted from flood proofing

Although owner Robert Buntrock failed to convince Planning Commissioners last week that the cost of renovations at the former Woods 'N Things building in Sanibal Plays is less than 50 percent of its market or replacement value, the Commission consented to exempt the building from flood proofing requirements

In return Buntrock agreed not to hold the City responsible for for any increase in flood insurance premiums that he said could be 10 times higher than the subsidized rate.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the federal flood insurance agency officials have told him that if the city grants a variance to the flood proofing regulred by CLUP for new construction or "substantial

improvement" the benefactor would be ex-

cluded from sharing in subsized insurance.
Commissioner Bill Hagerup added another condition, extracting a promise from Buntrock "to do something to soften that ugly building.

Hagerup suggested a thick buffer of mature trees and heavy vegetation on the Periwinkle Way frontage and asked Buntrock to report once a month to the Com-

mission on the beautification project.

Buntrock recited "facts and figures" that he said would prove the estimated \$50,000 remodeling of the building is less than 50 percent of either its replacement or market value and does not constitute a "substantial vement"that would be subject to flood proofing

The Planning staff, to Buntrock's "super currence?" recommended that the request be granted on the basis that flood proofing ording to standards set in Section 3.7.1 of CLUP is "an inappropriate response to the threat of flooding on a barrier island.

The staff indicated it will recommend as a part of the Hazard Mitigation Program and proofing option be deleted unless federal egulations are amended.

Strengthened by Planning Commission approval, the specific amendment will move on to hearings before the City Council.




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

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


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On the water

If you are going to get good at fishing you have to develop what I call the "two plan" system. This week, let's talk about what to do when your virgin-fishing-territory-never-been-fished spot turns out to look like downtown Fort Myers at 5 p.m. on a Friday afternoon.

Now, realistically, anyone can look good as a fisherman when armed with the right information. For instance, let's say that a neighbor comes home with 50 Spanish mackerel and naturally you pump him until his lips won't work about where, how and when he got them. Let's also say your friend is actually honest about it all and says that the macks were hitting one mile south of the lighthouse on Sanibel Island at 6:30 a.m. on silver spoons, size 2, with a yellow feather attached

You go running back to your condo and are on the phone for the next half hour telling every friend you've got that the mackerel are "in" and you know where they are and how to find them. And if they are real nice to you, you might take them along tomorrow morning to help rake in the fish because you are going to kill 'em.

So, by 6 a.m. the next morning, a trail of sleepy fishermen come stumbling down the dark dock to your boat. Well,

neighbor Bob brought his wife, might as well, they were both up anyway. And Arnold, he's down the hall in the same unit, has his six-year-old grandson along. Kid never caught a fish, you know. Then there is the widow down on the ground floor - the one with all the money! She never get's enough fish to eat, but you can tell from her size, that she makes up for it with steak and potatoes. And don't forget, Ted and Mary. They are the ones that cause all those so down at the pool? Ted brings in Bloody Marys. Nope, he didn't forget the Tabasco sauce -- matter of fact, he slipped and put the whole bottle in the jug. Well, it's not a fishing trip at 6 a.m., unless you can have a little waker-upper. right? Ted's been up since 4 a.m. sampling the concoction. So, with some fanfare, they're off, headed for the glory

At 6:30, there is a shuffling of bodies and a couple of lines go into the water. The captain checks his position and yes, he's right where he should be. They all smile at each other and Ted starts to deliver one of his recipes on how to cook mackerel. The fat lady from down at 106 says she's got a better one. Better listen to her: she's eaten in every restaurant from here to Boston and back.

It's now 7 a.m. and the sun is up. No fish. The captain is getting anxious. Ted makes the sad observation that the lady from 106 has finished the last of the Bloody Marys. She denies the fact and challenges Ted's wife and Ted - at the same time - to an arm wresting match for the warm beer the captain just found next to the gas tank.

The kid with Gramps is getting sea sick. The water is smooth enough to use as a mirror. Gramps says that if the captain had put a few extra dollars into the boat, it would be more stable and wouldn't make people sick all the time.

It's 8 a.m. and there are signs of open rebellion on the boat. The captain is on the VHF radio trying to get the marine operator to connect him into the home of his friend who caught all the mackerel the morning before. He's secretly placed his fish billy club near the wheel just in case the troops get more unruly. He scans the horizon for signs of birds feeding over schools of mackerel.



Moral? Always have plan two -- a back-up spot -- when plan one fails. Lesson two? Keep your mouth shut when you find a good thing.



Shelling Tips

Shelling seems like such a safe, innocent pastime, but we are in the middle of the spring season and that means mating lime for various rays. This week, we should talk a bit about what to look for to avoid problems with rays, crabs and other potentially dangerous sea creatures.

I almost hate to mention the possibility of getting jabbed by the stinger of a stingray, or shuffling your foot into the barb of a nesting horsehose crab, because some people become so fearful that they avoid shelling completely. That's not the object of the warning.

This time of the year you are apt to see not one but often dozens of rays just at the surf line along the Gulf of Mexico. They come in schools to fan the sand, looking for tiny bits of food. Many fishermen working the shore will hook into rays this time of the year too.

I think that one of the most thrilling sights I ever encountered while snorking once was to come upon a school of what I call but rays, as they swam perhaps ten feet from me. When diving along the Florida Keys, it was an unusual day not to see a hig snortde leonard ray to gracefully nest

day not to see a big spotted leopard ray go gracefully past. Over here, along Sanibel and Captiva Island waters on the Gulf, you most likely will see the small manta or bat rays and the more common sting ray.

The sting ray is by far the one you should show respect to and avoid. On about the last third of this flat, roundish shaped ray's tall is a barb. A ray the size of a dinner plate will have a barb perhaps an inch long. When threatened or stepped upon, the tail will be lashed about and if that barb goes into your leg, you'll swear that someone has shoved a kindfe blade into you - it's that painful.

The string ray can get up to over 100 pounds and have a "wing" span of over six feet, but the average you will see in shallow sunny waters will be 12 to 16 inches across the wings.

There's good and bad news next. If you only like to walk the beaches looking for dead shells (as we would urge), then you can aimost forget about tangling with rays. On the other hand, if you like to walk the bay flats, looking for shells in muddy, shellow waters, then at this time of the year you can nearly bet that you will see rays — lots of them.

I've walked I don't know how many miles of flats and have never been struck by a ray, crab or jellyfish. That's because I walk slowly, never jumping or taking long steps and always watching for that peculiar outline of a half buried ray in the sand ahead of me. You can perfect the "sting ray shuffle" where you never pick up your feet, but actually shuffle them along to warn the ray of your approach so it can get out of the way.

One thing I am always cautious of is having someone walking next to me. There is a chance they will spook out a ray and it will inadvertently come at me. So, when walking the Itals, spread out, keep watching for rays and shuffle those feet in the sand. Sometimes, I stamp my heel hard on the sand, letting the rays know just where I am so they can get away.

I would suggest not going on those shallow sandbar flats in high water. You know the rays will be up there feeding, but on the low tide, you will see much less of them.

If you get stuck, you can use ice, then stop the bleeding as best as possible. The doctors on Sanibel do a lot of "ray"

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

Island artist listens to 'the Puffin Man'

Island wildlife artist George Weymouth recently completed this colorful wood sculpture in honor of the striking Puffin.

Weymouth carved the Puffin at Nest piece hopes of returning the Puffins to Egg Rock ocean to find their own food Island in Maine. Puffins have not nested on the North American Atlantic Coast since the turn of the century

For several years now, Dr. Steven Kress

Of Cornell University and his volunteers, a visit during the summer when they are with permission of the Canadian government, have removed 100 Puffin chicks each to breed until the following year. year from Witless Bay in Newfoundland and placed the chicks on Egg Rock Island.

The young are taken from their nests just before their parents would normally cut them off from their usual fish diet.

Kress' team feeds the chicks for a few under commission from a Tampa resident days once they are taken to Egg Rock, but who has taken part in years of research with they are soon cut off and are forced to the

Kress hopes the transplanted Puffins will return to Egg Rock to nest and expects to see the results of his work this summer.

Puffins normally return to their homes for three or four years old, but do not come back

During the nesting season Puffins leave their ocean home for rocky islands. Their feet turn bright orange and their bills develop a parrot-like growth that turns almost crimson.

Weymouth searched long and hard to find the piece of wood he used for his Puffin piece. He found the 3 x 2-feet chunk of Acacia at the Cypress Knee Museum near Palmdale last spring.

The wood itself has an interesting history as it is a "leftover" from a totem pole sculpture by artist Peter Toth.

Toth has sculpted more than 30 giant totem poles in honor of the American Indian. He found the 75-year-old, 10-foot thick Acacia tree from which Weymouth secured the "leftover chuck" in Punta Gorda

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

SUBJECT: CLUP Amendment Defining "Single Family Dwelling Unit."

I urge adoption of a CLUP clarification to dispel the mounting divisiveness among home-owners caused by insensitive rental practices in many of Sanibel's single-family zoned or deed-restricted residential neighhorhoods

Note that Part 3.1 of CLUP (Definitions) is glaringly deficient because it fails to provide an expressly quantified definition of a Single Family Dwelling Unit. Nonetheless, that term is used extensively in CLUP and sundry ordinances.

Quantified definitions, however, of other types of dwelling units such as Duplex and Multi-family appear in Sections 3.1.8 & 15 respectively, but they as quantified in relation to Section 3.1.7 which defines the term "Dwelling Unit" in a very general

Florida's Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act requires CLUP's housing element to be based upon "ap-propriate data." In this instance. I can suggest nothing more appropriate than a

TO: Sanibel City Council & Planning time-honored, popular definition of Single Family Dwelling Unit sanctioned by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1974. It was reported to you by the City Attorney in his memorandum of May 16, 1977 (His comment on CLUP's definition of Dwelling Unit was that it "appears to be drafted very broadly, and would seem to contemplate any number of unrelated persons.")

The definition of Single Family Dwelling Unit can readily be clarifled by adding the brief one offered by the City Attorney to CLUP's current Section 3.1.7. The new subparagraph would then read:

"(b) When the term SINGLE FAMILY is used to quantify DWELLING UNIT, it shall mean:

(1) a group of any size related by blood. marriage, or adoption; or

(2) a group not so related if there are no more than two persons."

Your immediate action on this matter would obviate many disruptive neigh-borhood disputes and minimize the intensity of land-use in single family communities.

Water cutbacks urged

The Council has been assured by the Island Water Association which services customers on Sanibel and Captiva, that there is no water shortage here

We have 18 million gallons of water in our rserve tanks," IWA General Manager Robert Hollander said.

"IWA recharges its wells from the Lower Hawthorn and Suwannee aquifers in north Florida," he explained. "Our hydrologists say we have no shortage problem since we have no dependence on Lake Okeechobee."

Although SFWMD originally told IWA it was exempt from the mandated cut, that decision was later reversed and the association and the City of Sanibel were ordered to comply with the consumption cut that was increased to 25 percent last

Convinced that there is no a water emergency on Sanibel, the Council was reluctant Friday to invoke mandatory messures to comply with the SFWMD order.

"There is more water use inside (homes) than outside on Sanibel," Klein said.
"There's no way that use can be

properly assessed their water resources and taken the appropriate growth management measures should not be cause for residents of Sanibel to be inconvenienced today," Goss' memo pointed out. "Apparently the South Florida Water Management District is caught in a bad spot and has been made to look had in the media. 

Commission okays two conversions, denies third

By Barbara Brundage

Two requests for specific amendments to convert motel units to condominiums were approved and a third denied by the Planning Commission last week.

The Commission ruled that a duplex located seaward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line adjacent to Sandpiper Cottages on West Gulf Drive can be converted to two condominium units if the City Council follows the Commission's recommendation.

Conversion of seven other units at the former motel were approved for conversion last Dec. 8

The renovation of all the units started prior to a change in City policy. A development permit is now required when motel units are converted to condominium ownership.

May 5 when the City Council adopted a new ordinance requiring a specific amendment for property owners to develop seaward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line.

Because issuance of building permits for the renovations represents vested rights, the staff reported that there was no reasonable reason to deny Edward Hillstrom's request.

Hillstrom. who represents Union Properties, was also given the nod by the Commission to convert a former ceramics shop at Dugger's Tropical Cottages Condominium to a single-family unit, with the provision that it cannot be rented for periods of less than one month.

But Roger Larson, representing the Blind Pass Association, was denied a development permit to repair and convert 13 Blind Pass Cottages rental units to condominium ownership.

The cottage colony, built prior to the adoption of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan, is a lawfully existing use. But because three of the units are located forward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line, four encroach on the required setbacks from San-Cap Road. one is located in the right-of-way itself and three others violate the 20-foot setback from the water, Larson needs a special amendment to CLUP to convert the complex.

The cottages in the Del Sega subdivision do not have the 7,500 square feet of open space required for a resort unit.

The vote in all three requests was unanimous.







The nature of Valerie Hutchens' profession more often than not puts the director of the new Sanibel-Captiva Counseling Center on the receiving end of a conversation.

But when given the chance to talk about herself, Valerie unleashes a wealth of sensitivity and insight spiked with laughter and unmistakable enthusiasm for where she is and what she does.

"I just know this is the way it is supposed to be," she says with confidence about her new private practice. "I didn't to work very hard to be accepted on the Islands."

e to work very hard to be accepted on the Islands."

Veletre was enjoying a simple "rest and relaxation"

Vekend on Senibel last year when conversations with

Tillanders brought to her attention the need for a counseling

center here.

"People I talked with were concerned about drugs, alcohol, depression," she says. "They made me realize Sanibel is not immune to those problems and could benefit from its own counseling center."

That need coupled with growing dissatisfaction with her counseling job for the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services in Fort Myers prompted Valerie to open her counseling center at 1833 Periwinkle Way.

Response to the center since its grand opening May 1 has been "terrific," Valerie says. "I had sessions on the floor before I got any furniture in here."

Valerie sees her job as a helper as opposed to a "saver" or "curer."

"I listen to people and see things in them that they never see themselves," she says. "Then I try to help them gain an awareness of themselves in terms of self-esteem. "It's like being the wise old lady of the tribe," she ex-

"It's like being the wase old lady of the tribe," she explains. "I'm somebody who can listen and really comprehend - that's the reason we counselors exist."

The emphasis of her "couples counseling (married

couples aren't the only couples who need counseling)" is on listening to, not necessarily agreeing with, what one's partner is saying.

"I listen to two people react to things that aren't even said," she says. "I try to teach them to listen with kindness and acceptance.

"They don't have to accept what the other person is saying - but they should always accept that fact that the other person is saying it," she explains of her philosophy.

Valerie says she leaned toward applied anthropology during her undergraduate work at the University of Florida. Several months observing people and groups in out-of-theway European villages, however, tapped an interest in group behavior and led her to try social work when she returned to Gainesville.

"I learned a lot from my travels," she says. "It can be a great education if you are open to the people."

She says her main complaint about typical tourists, which she definitely is not, is that they hide behind their cameras and never see the real people and way of the land they visit. "Their cameras have a great time," she laughs. "But the

people themselves never see anything. Then they go home and show all their pictures and tell people they were there." Valerie worked with HRS in Gainesville for six years before transferring to the Fort Myers office a year and a half ago.

The necessary paperwork and processing that had to be done for each client at the state agency, however, made her feel less like a counselor and more like a definer of coun-

"I was frustrated and tired of fighting a value system that I didn't agree with." she says. "The idea at HRS was that if you spent more than 30 minutes with a client you were wasting time – that's not enough time to make any kind of

improvement."

Valerie's counseling has been directed mainly toward children and their parents, but she plans to offer Island adults an array of group help sessions as well as private counseling.

Five basic group programs will form the core of the counseling center's curriculum for introduction to the Islands. Valerie and a team of fellow counselors will guide the workshops.

The "Rites of Passage" workshop is geared toward helping adolescents learn to make their own decisions as they break away from their parents. "My Parents Drink..." is intended to teach the necessary

"My Parents Drink ..." is intended to teach the necessary "survival skills" to young people who have alcoholic parents.

The Pitfalls, Problems and Pleasures workshop is planned around parents who want to increase and improve communications with their children.

Alcohol and Addiction is an information session geared toward adults who want to ascertain whether they do have a drinking problem. A volunteer from within the community who is an alcoholic will assist in the workshop.

The fifth workshop planned for the initial stage of the counseling center is Instruction in Self-Hypnosis for those who want to overcome habits such as smoking and overeating.

The workshops are set up in six week blocks and can accommodate six to 10 participants.

Valerie has ambitious plans for the center, and those

plans are outdistanced only by the petite blonde's energy and determination to implement them.

"I want to make the center a community center," she says. "I plan to meet whatever need develops."

Loggerhead patrols start

Caretta Research was organized in 1968 and conducts field research including tagging and other monitoring of the endangered Loggerhead turtle population of Southwest Florida

Loggerhead are 300-pound marine turtles that make nightly landings on area beaches during May, June, July and August for

Each female nests on the average of every two years, and during a nesting season she may deposit up to six clutches on 13-day intervals. An average clutch contains about 110 ping-pong size eggs.

CONA discussion focuses on interval ownership

The Committee of Neighborhood Associations at its monthly membership meeting on May 14 discussed at some length the interval ownership issue as it increasingly affects Sanibel.

Reports that interested lobbylsts in Tallahhassee are pushing a bill in the Legislature denying or severely limiting the power of local governments to regulate interval ownership development gave rise to especial concern.

CONA is trying to obtain from Lee County Tax Appraiser Ken Wilkinson an explanation of the seemingly wide disparity between the percentage of market value at which single family homes and interval ownership units are assessed.

CONA also voted to give its official backing to a letter Paul Howe recently sent to City Hall urging the amendment of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan to provide for a more precise definition of what is meant by a "single-family home." Numerous examples were cited of the

Numerous examples were cited of the overuse of rented single-family homes involving habitation by what seemed to be inordinate numbers of individuals, sometimes coming and going with haleidoscopic frequency. The current review of CLUP would seem to provide an ideal opportunity to tighter up the definition of single family homes.



At the urging of Commission Executive Director Robert Brantly, the Board gave permission for the state to seek approval of the site from the federal Fish and Wildlife Service for the use of the land for the WUSF

Mann, who has been spearheading the push for the public television station tower. said that the area suggested by the Commission is not used by bunters and the tower

would not cause any environmental concern. Since the Cecil Webb Management Area was purchased with federal grant funds, any

non-wildlife management uses must be approved by the federal agencies and the land must be purchased or land of equal value donated to the state for wildlife

The Florida House of Representatives Appropriation Subcommittee has reserved additional state funds to pay for the land for the tower once the federal officers set an appraised value on the parcel.

Mann said if everything moves forward as planned, the WUSF Public Television Station will be serving Southwest Florida in March of 1982.
