Co-op recommends overhead lines

Lee County Electric Cooperative's response to a request from Sanibel's Ad Hoc Electric Distribution Negotiating Committee for a cost comparison of underground versus overhead installation of a third feeder line on the Island was a two-inch thick report.

At the end of the three-hour presentation by three of the electric company's top officials last Thursday, it was apparent the utility had not changed its position.

Running the new transmission line through four residential subdivisions is still "in the best interest of the community," O.D. Reynolds, director of operations for the co-op, said.

Councilman Fred Valtin, chairman of the Council-appointed committee to study electrical distribution on Sanibel, expressed disappointment that the co-op was "not more sensitive to the people's wishes" that the new line be constructed completely underground along the San-Cap Road rather than "half and half" through a highly developed residential area.

Valtin echoed the sentiments of other Committee members who said they had hoped the co-op would be more cooperative.

The report stressed the need for beefing up electric power on the island and pointed out that demands for service from Chateau Sur Mer, Tahiti Shores, Gulf Pines and East and West Rocks at the peak of last winter's season exceeded the capability of the present transmission system.

"Increased demands for power this summer are expected to tax severely the two transmission lines if construction of an additional line is not begun immediately," Diane Christensen, the co-op's vice president for Community Relations and Communications, told the Committee and interested Islanders who packed MacKenzie Hall.

The transmission line from Pine Island to Sanibel and the co-op's substation will be able to meet the projected growth of both Sanibel and Captiva through 1994 if Sanibel's current 180-unit per year ceiling on residential construction is maintained, Christensen said.

The capacity of both distribution lines was exceeded by consumer demands in 1980, Christensen said.

"The Lighthouse circuit that serves Periwinkle Way from Tarpon Bay to the Lighthouse was overloaded by 10 percent," she said, adding that the Gulf Drive circuit (Rabbit Road and Tarpon Bay Road to West Gulf Drive and east to The Rocks and Gulf Pines) was overloaded by 27 percent.

Sanibel residents do not quarrel with the need for more power. Their objection is to the route of the third feeder and overhead construction proposed by the co-op.

The utility's choice, approved by the City Council last November after a stormy public hearing, would run the third feeder line underground from the substation along San-Cap Road to Jamaica Way.

The capacity of the co-op's existing overhead single-phase distribution lines along Jamaica Way and Rabbit Road would be increased, and an underground three-phase line in the Gulf Pines area would connect with the overhead lines along West Gulf Drive and upgrade those lines from one- to three-phase, Christensen said.

The cost of the proposal is now estimated at \$317,468, which is \$75,000 more than last November's estimate.

The alternative proposed by the Ad Hoc

More water cutbacks urged

Sanibel City officials are seeking the help of tourists and visitors to achieve the 25 percent cut in water consumption ordered by the South Florida Water Management District last Thursday.

Thousands of flyers suggesting ways to conserve water are being distributed to guests at Island motels, hotels and condominiums.

At an emergency meeting Saturday morning, the City Council approved a proclamation issued by Acting Mayor Mike Klein banning washing of sidewalks, driveways, porches, the exterior of homes, automobiles, trucks, trailers and, mobile homes. The proclamation also bans the use of water for dust control except as required for public health.

Watering lawns and vegetation is prohibited except between 8 and 10 p.m. every third day under the proclamation.

Residents and visitors alike are also urged to cut down their general use of water inside their homes.

Last Friday, with Mayor Duane White and Councilman Porter Goss absent, the Council opted not to approve a mandatory ordinance and to continue voluntary restrictions on water use that for a week had failed to produce the required 10 percent reduction mandated by the SFWMD.

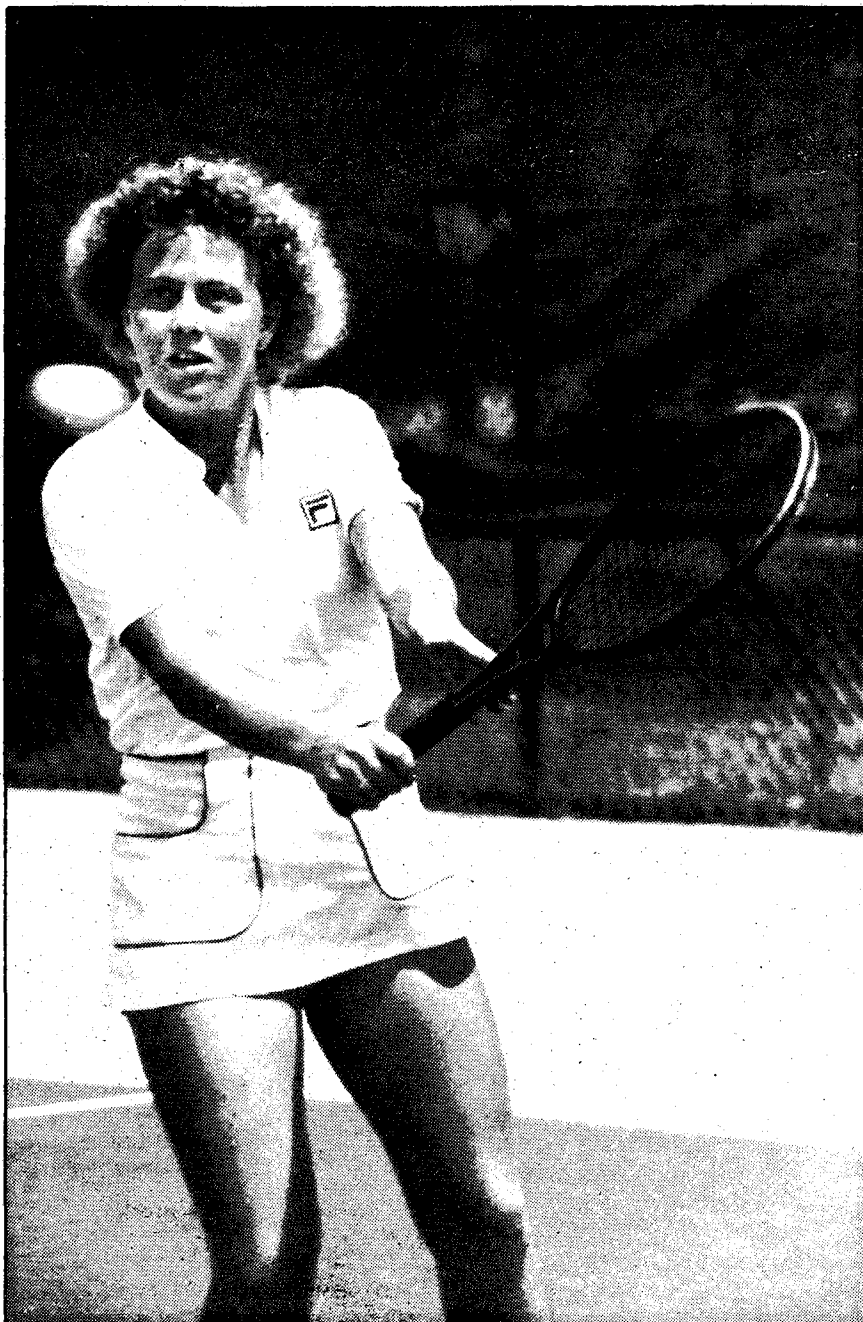
"It will be very difficult if not impossible for Sanibel to achieve a cut in consumption either by mandatory or voluntary methods because of the number of visitors to the island that are not as concerned as residents," Councilman Fred Valtin said.

The influx of vacationers every weekend creates a dramatic fluctuation in water use, he said.

"Permanent residents of the Island are far outnumbered by short-term vacationers," Klein added.

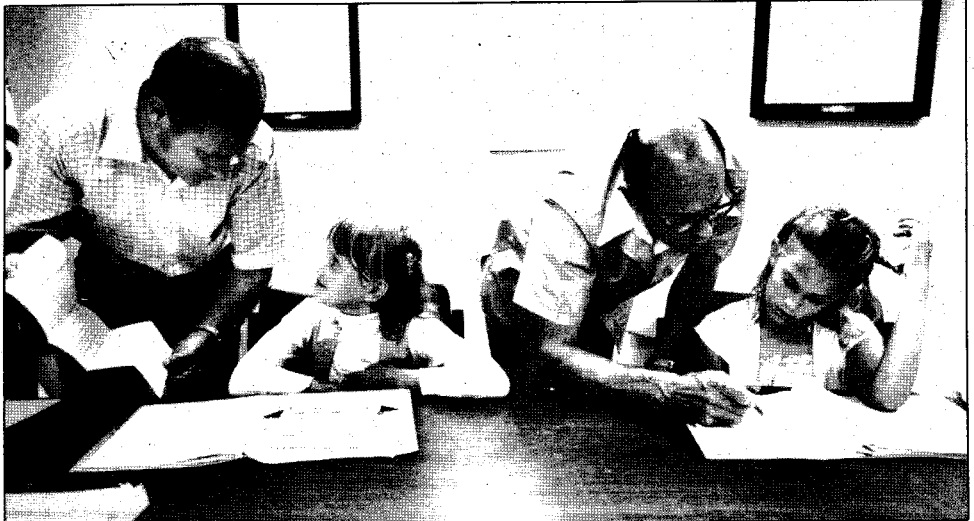

Student Government Day

The students ended their tenure in office by reading their winning essays at a luncheon at the Community Association Center.

Sanibel's Acting Mayor Mike Klein said he was impressed by the students' understanding of the problems the City is struggling with.

City Manager - David Muench

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Cab company 'stalls' on occupational license

John Bullard apparently has operated his Sanibel Taxicab Company without an occupational license since October 1980 while his request for a development permit to operate the taxi service at Scotty's Village was pending before the Planning Commission.

The Commissioners admitted they were baffled at last week's meeting when they were asked to act on that request, which has been continued three times since March 1980. The Commission was also asked to act on a request for a Specific Amendment to permit Bullard to construct a taxi garage-office on property located between Three Crafty Ladies and the county park on Periwinkle Way.

Adding to the confusion was Attorney John Wilcox's disclaimer of any knowledge of his client's request to operate the cab business from Scotty's Village.

"Mr. Bullard says he never made such a request," Wilcox told the Commission.

"But John tends to be a little confused these days," Wilcox explained. "He has undergone two major surgeries and just went back into the hospital today."

Wilcox said Bullard does not want to run his business from Scotty's Village but from an office-garage he would build on his property near Three Crafty Ladies.

In response to a Commission question Wilcox said that "as far as I know he now operates mostly from the airport."

But Jane Myers, a neighbor of Bullard's, told the Commission that the Sanibel Taxicab business is operating from Bullard's home on Lindgren Boulevard, where the dispatch tower is now located.

"We are friends, and I know John would

not deliberately evade obtaining a license," she said. But she pleaded with the Commission to grant the specific amendment to get his cab business out of a residential neighborhood "where it doesn't belong."

But the Planning Department said Bullard must "clarify several items on the site plan" before a recommendation to approve the specific amendment can be made.

Because the land is below the base flood elevation, the building must be elevated, a condition Bullard has agreed to meet. Location of parking spaces, vehicular maneuvering area and the access driveway must be clearly designated on the site plan, the staff said.

Bullard must also provide the Planning Department with a calculation of the percentage of vegetation clearance and impermeable surface cover and a landscaping plan for vegetation buffers on Periwinkle Way and along residential property lines.

The Planning Department also needs to know the proximity of adjacent structures and bodies of water to the development and the placement of the building on the lot to minimize its effect on adjacent residential properties.

Commissioner Don Manchester said he attempted to help Bullard fulfill these requirements in the past, saying he communicated with Bullard "like a father."

Commissioners Bill Hagerup and Joe Searing, however, said they interpreted Bullard's conduct as "taking advantage of the city" and "deliberately snubbing and getting away with operating without a license."

Attorney Wilcox agreed with Commission

Chairman Ann Winterbotham, who blamed "lack of communication between an attorney and his client" for much of the confusion.

Wilcox agreed to provide the information needed to complete Bullard's application for the specific amendment and relief from the commercial moratorium.

The Commissioners voted to continue the hearing.

They also agreed to continue Bullard's request to operate his business from Scotty's Village while this application for a development permit is pending.

Searing voted against the continuance and said it was "absurd."

But Winterbotham called it "charity to Bullard and to all of us on the island who need taxi service."

More parking for Periwinkle Place?

The question of whether the easement along Meridian Drive can legally be used for parking must be answered before the Planning Commission can approve Mariner Properties Management, Inc.'s request for a specific amendment to "tidy up" the parking areas at Periwinkle Place shopping center.

Periwinkle Partners, a Mariner subsidiary, owns the Meridian Drive right-of-way along the west side of the shopping center, where parking overflows during the peak tourist season.

The plan proposed by John Mitchell of Mariner Properties would provide 57 spaces along the western boundary of the easement with a 23-foot driveway between rows.

The Planning staff told the Commission that owners of the residential and commercial property to the west had not complained of parking on the easement, which also serves as an access road for Periwinkle

Properties' subdivision of 23 plotted lots. But residents behind Periwinkle Place have complained of the overflowing dumpsters that are an eyesore and a health hazard.

"The needs of the residents are more important than commercial," Commission Chairman Ann Winterbotham told Mitchell. Winterbotham requested that the dumpsters be removed from the residential property line.

As tenants of Periwinkle Place, the City staff is well aware of the parking inadequacy during the tourist season and is of the opinion that a more orderly arrangement would be in the best interest of the community.

But the Commission passed unanimously Commissioner Don Manchester's motion to continue the hearing until Mitchell returns with a revised plan and until the dumpsters are removed and the legal entity of Meridian Drive is investigated.

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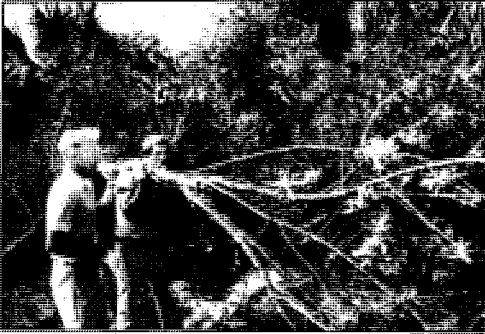
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Islanders 'dig' native plants

Selective shelling urged by committee

Gathering sea shells by the sea shore is a favorite pastime of many Island residents and visitors.

But sometimes certain sea shells should stay on the shore to insure the survival of their species rather than become part of a coffee table collection.

In an effort to educate beachcombers about which shells should be left on the sand, the Sanibel Live Shelling Committee hopes to establish a public information board at the Chamber of Commerce.

Committee Chairwoman Barbara Toomey said last week that, pending the chamber's consent, a list of shells that are in breeding will be maintained on an information board at the chamber office on the Causeway Road.

The list will be updated as needed according to the types of live shells committee members and serious shellers in the community spot on bay and Gulf beaches.

Mrs. Toomey and former committee chairwoman Pat Kair explained that when live shells are in breeding they tend to wash up on the beaches more than during other times in their life cycles.

When the shells are in breeding, Mrs. Kair said, it is important that they be allowed to return to their breeding grounds off shore to insure their reproduction.

Only the names of those shells that are in breeding will be posted on the information board, and the public's participation in the effort to preserve the live shells will be strictly voluntary, Mrs. Kair said.

The concern and respect of most Island

residents and visitors for live shells prompted the committee's idea for the information board, Mrs. Toomey said.

"There is a quest for knowledge about how to care for our shells on the Island," she said. "We consider this project more a public education service" for people who

care about preserving live shells, she added. "And we believe most people on the Island do care."

Mrs. Kair explained that by leaving the live shells that are in breeding untouched, the public can be assured that nature's course in time will supply plenty of beautiful, dead shells for collectors to take home.

"You can't destroy the factory and expect to keep the store," she said.

Martha Sudler

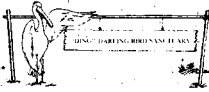
Long-time winter Captiva resident Martha Sudler died last Friday following a long illness in her Pennington, N.J. home. She was 75.

Funeral arrangements were made in New Jersey. The family's address is Twin Hunt Farm, Pennington, N.J. 08554.

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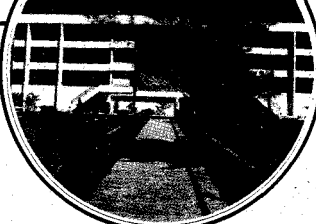
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Buntrock building exempted from flood proofing

Although owner Robert Buntrock failed to convince Planning Commissioners last week that the cost of renovations at the former Weeds 'N Things building in Sanibel Plaza is less than 50 percent of its market or replacement value, the Commission consented to exempt the building from flood proofing requirements.

In return Buntrock agreed not to hold the City responsible for any increase in flood insurance premiums that he said could be "10 times higher than the subsidized rate."

Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the federal flood insurance agency officials have told him that if the city grants a variance to the flood proofing required by CLUP for new construction or "substantial

improvement" the benefactor would be excluded from sharing in subsidized insurance.

Commissioner Bill Hagerup added another condition, extracting a promise from Buntrock "to do something to soften that ugly building."

Hagerup suggested a thick buffer of mature trees and heavy vegetation on the Periwinkle Way frontage and asked Buntrock to report once a month to the Commission on the beautification project.

Buntrock recited "facts and figures" that he said would prove the estimated \$50,000 remodeling of the building is less than 50 percent of either its replacement or market value and does not constitute a "substantial improvement" that would be subject to flood proofing.

The Planning staff, to Buntrock's "super surprise," recommended that the request be granted on the basis that flood proofing according to standards set in Section 3.7.1 of CLUP is "an inappropriate response to the threat of flooding on a barrier island."

The staff indicated it will recommend as a part of the Hazard Mitigation Program and the Five Year Review of CLUP that the flood proofing option be deleted unless federal regulations are amended.

Strengthened by Planning Commission approval, the specific amendment will move on to hearings before the City Council.

Buntrock last week won one battle with the City when the Council instructed City Manager Bernie Murphy to issue an occupational license to permit Sanibel Realty

to operate from the former Weeds 'N Things building.

The Council agreed that the real estate business would not be a more intensive use of the property than the florist shop.

As a condition of the Council approval, Buntrock and his partner, Bert Jenks, agreed that in addition to installing vegetation buffers, they would try to improve parking facilities at the over-crowded Sanibel Plaza shopping center.

But Mayor Duane White warned Buntrock that the Council "will watch very, very carefully what goes on down there over the next five months."

Occupational licenses expire each year on Sept. 30.

Panel scrutinizes 11 properties for City Hall site

Eleven island properties received careful consideration by the City Hall Site Selection Committee last week on the basis of 28 standards ranging from price to ecological zoning.

The Committee scored the properties according to price, zoning, current development status, traffic density, ingress and egress, storm damage potential and a host of other standards considered most important in the selection of a site for the new Sanibel City Hall.

In addition to addressing unanswered questions about eight properties that had already received the Committee's attention, the committee added three new properties to

its list of candidates last week.

Jim Cipriani of Sanibel made available 12 acres he owns on Periwinkle Way west of Tahitian Gardens. The Committee estimated the property would cost \$2.39 per square foot.

L. L. Anderson of Illinois offered the city 8.51 acres he owns behind San Carlos Realty on Periwinkle Way. Anderson indicated price and terms would be negotiable.

Virginia Jensen of Fort Myers also offered a 7.39-acre tract on Purdy Drive at Periwinkle Way. She did not include a price in her offer.

One of the offers previously under consideration was withdrawn by the property owner last week, and the Committee

unofficially disqualified another property on the basis of its lowlands-wetlands ecological zoning.

When the Committee receives sufficient details about all of the properties under consideration, the list will be narrowed down to a final, specific recommendation to the City Council.

Committee Chairman Al Edwards said last week he hopes the recommendation will be ready in mid-June.

A meeting between the Committee and representatives of Stewart-Richmond Architects, Inc., of the Tampa-based firm under contract to design the City Hall complex, has been scheduled for 4 p.m. May 21.

Edwards said the meeting is intended to help himself and Committee members Urban Felmer and Ed Underhill narrow down the list by providing input about what is desirable for the site from the architect's professional viewpoint.

The City Council had informally selected a city-owned parcel between Bailey Road and the Causeway Road on Periwinkle Way as the site for the new City Hall. Objections to that site from residents, however, prompted the council to form the City Hall Site Selection Committee to examine alter-

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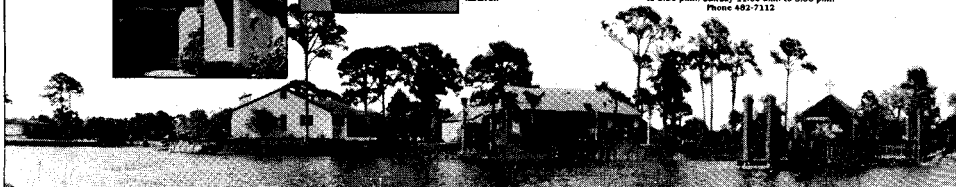
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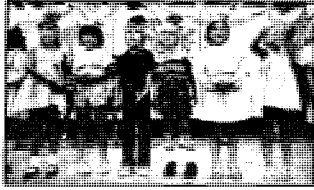
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Students delight spring program audience

The first story is a touching account of a

Roger Tory Peterson writes about penguins in the Antarctic, and Olin S. Pettigill Jr., another well-known authority, tells of his experience as a member of the

scientific staff aboard the "Explorer" on her maiden voyage to the Antarctic in 1970.

A young couple turned their New Jersey farm into their own wildlife sanctuary -- a truly inspiring story. Some of these essays are humorous, some touching, some informative -- but all are interesting whatever the degree of one's interest in birds.

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
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On the water

If you are going to get good at fishing you have to develop what I call the "two plan" system. This week, let's talk about what to do when your virgin-fishing-territory-never-been-fished spot turns out to look like downtown Fort Myers at 5 p.m. on a Friday afternoon.

Now, realistically, anyone can look good as a fisherman when armed with the right information. For instance, let's say that a neighbor comes home with 50 Spanish mackerel and naturally you pump him until his lips won't work about where, how and when to get them. Let's also say your friend is actually honest about it all and says that the macks were hitting one mile south of the lighthouse on Sanibel Island at 6:30 a.m. on silver spoons, size 2, with a yellow feather attached.

You go running back to your condo and are on the phone for the next half hour telling every friend you've got that the mackerel are "in" and you know where they are and how to find them. And if they are real nice to you, you might take them along tomorrow morning to help rake in the fish because you are going to kill 'em.

So, by 6 a.m. the next morning, a trail of sleepy fishermen come stumbling down the dark dock to your boat. Well,

neighbor Bob brought his wife, might as well, they were both up anyway. And Arnold, he's down the hall in the same unit, has his six-year-old grandson along. Kid never caught a fish, you know. Then there is the widow down on the ground floor -- the one with all the money! She never gets a enough fish to eat, but you can tell from her size, that she makes up for it with steak and potatoes. And don't forget, Ted and Mary. They are the ones that cause all those scenes down at the pool? Ted brings in Bloody Marys. Nope, he didn't forget the Tabasco sauce -- matter of fact, he slipped and put the whole bottle in the jug. Well, it's not a fishing trip at 6 a.m., unless you can have a little water-upper, right? Ted's been up since 4 a.m. sampling the concoction. So, with some fanfare, they're off, headed for the glory hole.

At 6:30, there is a shuffling of bodies and a couple of lines go into the water. The captain checks his position and yes, he's right where he should be. They all smile at each other and Ted starts to deliver one of his recipes on how to cook mackerel. The fat lady from down at 106 says she's eaten a very restaurant from here to Boston and back.

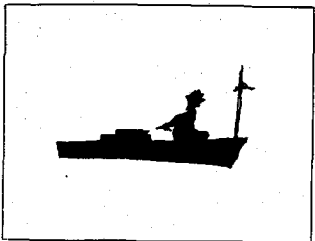
It's now 7 a.m. and the sun is up. No fish. The captain is getting anxious. Ted makes the sad observation that the lady from 106 has finished the last of the Bloody Marys. She denies the fact and challenges Ted's wife and Ted -- at the same time -- to an arm wrestling match for the warm beer the captain just found next to the gas tank.

The kid with Gramps is getting sea sick. The water is smooth enough to use as a mirror. Gramps says that if the captain had put a few extra dollars into the boat, it would be more stable and wouldn't make people sick all the time.

It's 8 a.m. and there are signs of open rebellion on the boat. The captain is on the VHF radio trying to get the marine operator to connect him into the home of his friend who caught all the mackerel the morning before. He's secretly placed his fish Billy club near the wheel just in case the troops get more unruly. He scans the horizon for signs of birds feeding over schools of mackerel.

By noon, as the boat pulls back into the dock, everyone has forgotten about "splitting the gas bill" and "sharing the catch." There isn't any catch, but there is a whopping fuel bill.

Moral? Always have plan two -- a back-up spot -- when plan one fails. Lesson two? Keep your mouth shut when you find a good thing.




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
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

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract hour and 16 minutes for each low tide. For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and four minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide. In between these points, gulf or bay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.

Shelling Tips

Shelling seems like such a safe, innocent pastime, but we are in the middle of the spring season and that means mating time for various rays. This week, we should talk a bit about what to look for to avoid problems with rays, crabs and other potentially dangerous sea creatures.

I almost hate to mention the possibility of getting jabbed by the stinger of a stingray, or shuffling your foot into the barb of a nesting horseshoe crab, because some people become so fearful that they avoid shelling completely. That's not the object of the warning.

This time of the year you are apt to see not one but often dozens of rays just at the surf line along the Gulf of Mexico. They come in schools to fan the sand, looking for tiny bits of food. Many fishermen working the shore will hook into rays this time of the year too.

I think that one of the most thrilling sights I ever encountered while snorkeling once was to come upon a school of what I call bat rays, as they swam perhaps ten feet from me. When diving along the Florida Keys, it was an unusual day not to see a big spotted leopard ray gracefully past.

Over here, along Sanibel and Captiva Island waters on the Gulf, you most likely will see the small manta or bat rays

and the more common sting ray.

The sting ray is by far the one you should show respect to and avoid. On about the last third of this flat, roundish shaped ray's tail is a barb. A ray the size of a dinner plate will have a barb perhaps an inch long. When threatened or stepped upon, the tail will be lashed about and if that barb goes into your leg, you'll swear that someone has shoved a knife blade into you -- it's that painful.

The string ray can get up to over 100 pounds and have a "wing" span of over six feet, but the average you will see in shallow sunny waters will be 12 to 18 inches across the wings.

There's good and bad news next. If you only like to walk the beaches looking for dead shells (as we would urge), then you can almost forget about tangling with rays. On the other hand, if you like to walk the bay flats, looking for shells in muddy, shallow waters, then at this time of the year you can nearly bet that you will see rays -- lots of them.

I've walked I don't know how many miles of flats and have never been struck by a ray, crab or jellyfish. That's because I walk slowly, never jumping or taking long steps and always watching for that peculiar outline of a half buried

ray in the sand ahead of me. You can perfect the "sting ray shuffle" where you never pick up your feet, but actually shuffle them along to warn the ray of your approach so it can get out of the way.

One thing I am always cautious of is having someone walking next to me. There is a chance they will spook out a ray and it will inadvertently come at me. So, when walking the flats, spread out, keep watching for rays and shuffle those feet in the sand. Sometimes, I stamp my heel hard on the sand, letting the rays know just where I am so they can get away.

I would suggest not going on those shallow sandbar flats in high water. You know the rays will be up there feeding, but on the low tide, you will see much less of them.

If you get stuck, you can use ice, then stop the bleeding as best as possible. The doctors on Sanibel do a lot of "ray" business.

He presented Noon with a check for that amount last Tuesday evening at the Legion building on San-Cap Road.

The Kiwanis presented their donation to Noon last Wednesday at their regular meeting.

Kiwanis President Dr. Harry Katz said the \$750 represents half of the proceeds from the club's spaghetti dinner that was held in February.

After the pool is completed, plans for the complex include a gymnasium equipped for roller skating, basketball, volleyball, shuffleboard, handball, gymnastics, weightlifting and more.

The Sanibel United Way fund last Friday totaled \$9,310 toward a goal of \$25,000.



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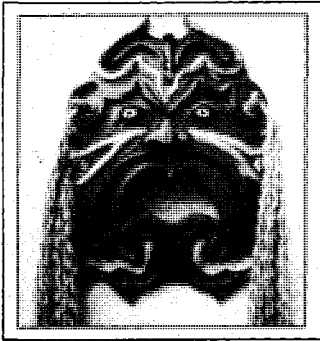
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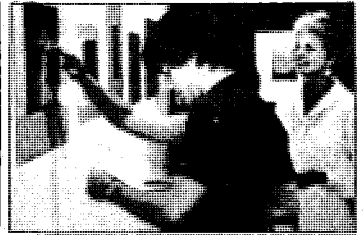


Photography show opens at gallery

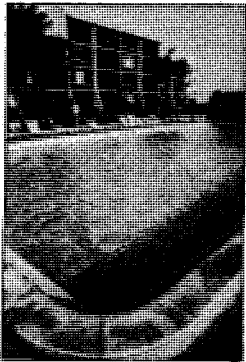

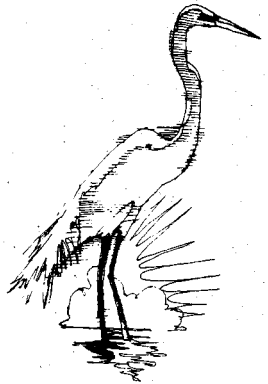

Island artist listens to 'the Puffin Man'

Island wildlife artist George Weymouth recently completed this colorful wood sculpture in honor of the striking Puffin.

Weymouth carved the Puffin at Nest piece under commission from a Tampa resident who has taken part in years of research with hopes of returning the Puffins to Egg Rock Island in Maine. Puffins have not nested on the North American Atlantic Coast since the turn of the century.

For several years now, Dr. Steven Kress of Cornell University and his volunteers, with permission of the Canadian government, have removed 100 Puffin chicks each year from Witless Bay in Newfoundland and placed the chicks on Egg Rock Island.

The young are taken from their nests just before their parents would normally cut them off from their usual fish diet.

Kress' team feeds the chicks for a few days once they are taken to Egg Rock, but they are soon cut off and are forced to the ocean to find their own food.

Kress hopes the transplanted Puffins will return to Egg Rock to nest and expects to see the results of his work this summer.

Puffins normally return to their homes for a visit during the summer when they are three or four years old, but do not come back to breed until the following year.

During the nesting season Puffins leave their ocean home for rocky islands. Their

feet turn bright orange and their bills develop a parrot-like growth that turns almost crimson.

Weymouth searched long and hard to find the piece of wood he used for his Puffin piece. He found the 3 x 2-foot chunk of Acacia at the Cypress Knee Museum near Palmdale last spring.

The wood itself has an interesting history as it is a "leftover" from a totem pole sculpture by artist Peter Toth.

Toth has sculpted more than 30 giant totem poles in honor of the American Indian. He found the 75-year-old, 10-foot thick Acacia tree from which Weymouth secured the "leftover chunk" in Punta Gorda.

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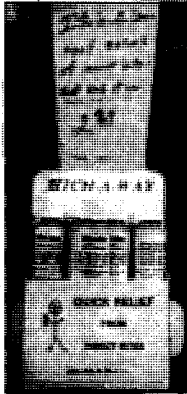

Even though no one sees 'em, signs of the imperceptible pests abound as tourists and residents alike fall prey to the biting insects and suffer a maddening itch that is worse than any mosquito can impart.

One Sanibel resident, however, plans to rid the Islands of the No-See-Um itch once and for all with a tiny yet powerful bottle of "Itch-A-Way."

Mike Zoss' miracle cure has been on shelves in Sanibel businesses for two months and is making a name for itself as the Islands' own cure for one of the Islands' worst problems.

In two months, Zoss says, he has sold 2,000 bottles of what some people see as a magic potion. Last week he received confirmation from an Ohio distributor who plans to add "Itch-A-Way" to his line of products he sells to sporting goods stores.

"It sells itself," Zoss says with confidence about the \$2.29 plastic bottles of watery, pink solution. "Like it says, Itch-A-Way takes the itch away - and with only one application. It's not like the other stuff that you have to keep soaking yourself with."

A little dab of Itch-A-Way on the affected area brings fast relief from the No-See-Um curse (It's true - I tried it). And Zoss says the solution is also good for other insect bites and even sunburn pain.

Sunburn pain and other insect bites receive second billing on the Itch-A-Way label, however, Zoss' main concern is the No-See-Um itch that seems immune to all other conventional solutions.

"I've watched people on the Island scratch themselves crazy for six years," he says. "Three years ago I decided to see if I could come up with anything that would help."

For three years the retired pharmacist who now works part-time at The Island Grog Shop researched No-See-Ums and experimented with various combinations of chemicals to combat the itch.

His tireless efforts ultimately lead to Itch-A-Way, which he says he sampled "on everyone I knew and some people I didn't know" last year before deciding to market the product this year.

"I wasn't ashamed to walk the beach and watch for people scratching," he says. "I'd go right up to them and say 'Here, try this.' Most of them were amazed - and grateful."

A copy of the following letter was given to The Islander for publication.

TO: Sanibel City Council & Planning Commission
 SUBJECT: CLUP Amendment Defining "Single Family Dwelling Unit."

I urge adoption of a CLUP clarification to dispel the mounting divisiveness among home-owners caused by insensitive rental practices in many of Sanibel's single-family zoned or deed-restricted residential neighborhoods.

Note that Part 3.1 of CLUP (Definitions) is glaringly deficient because it fails to provide an expressly quantified definition of a Single Family Dwelling Unit. Nonetheless, that term is used extensively in CLUP and sundry ordinances.

Quantified definitions, however, of other types of dwelling units such as Duplex and Multi-family appear in Sections 3.1.3 & 15 respectively, but they are quantified in relation to Section 3.1.7 which defines the term "Dwelling Unit" in a very general manner.

Florida's Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act requires CLUP's housing element to be based upon "appropriate data." In this instance, I can suggest nothing more appropriate than a

time-honored, popular definition of Single Family Dwelling Unit sanctioned by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1974. It was reported to you by the City Attorney in his memorandum of May 18, 1977 (Ela comment on CLUP's definition of Dwelling Unit) was that it "appears to be drafted very broadly, and would seem to contemplate any number of unrelated persons.")

The definition of Single Family Dwelling Unit can readily be clarified by adding the brief one offered by the City Attorney to CLUP's current Section 3.1.7. The new subparagraph would then read:

"(b) When the term SINGLE FAMILY is used to quantify DWELLING UNIT, it shall mean:

(1) a group of any size related by blood, marriage, or adoption; or

(2) a group not so related if there are no more than two persons."

Your immediate action on this matter would obviate many disruptive neighborhood disputes and minimize the intensity of land-use in single family communities.

Water cutbacks urged

The Council has been assured by the Island Water Association, which services customers on Sanibel and Captiva, that there is no water shortage here.

"We have 18 million gallons of water in our reserve tanks," IWA General Manager Robert Hollander said.

"IWA recharges its wells from the Lower Hawthorn and Suwannee aquifers in north Florida," he explained. "Our hydrologists say we have no shortage problem since we have no dependence on Lake Okechobee."

Although SFWMD originally told IWA it was exempt from the mandated cut, that decision was later reversed and the association and the City of Sanibel were ordered to comply with the consumption cut that was increased to 25 percent last Thursday.

Convinced that there is no water emergency on Sanibel, the Council was reluctant Friday to invoke mandatory measures to comply with the SFWMD order.

"There is more water use inside (homes) than outside on Sanibel," Klein said. "There's no way that use can be

properly assessed their water resources and taken the appropriate growth management measures should not be cause for residents of Sanibel to be inconvenienced today." Goss' memo pointed out. "Apparently the South Florida Water Management District is caught in a bad spot and has been made to look bad in the media. The fact that Sanibel has water and has managed its resources carefully makes SFWMD look even worse.

"If there is some emergency need for conservation," Goss continued, "I suggest limiting each household to a fixed number of gallons (of water) and leaving the decision to the household of how these gallons will be utilized."

Councilman Francis Bailey agreed with Goss' remarks.

"I think if a man wants to give up a shower to save his plants he should be allowed to do monitored."

Goss, who was in New York on Friday, conveyed his opposition to a restriction ordinance via a telephoned memorandum to the Mayor and Council.

"The fact that other communities have not

so," Bailey said.

Though City Manager Bernie Murphy had prepared an ordinance calling for mandatory cutbacks and punishment for violation, the Council decided that a concentrated push for voluntary compliance by tourists and visitors would more likely achieve the cutback goal.

"I want to leave no stone unturned to get the word out," Klein said.

Representatives of Island motels, hotels and interval ownership complexes present at the emergency meeting promised cooperation in the drive to educate the tourists of Sanibel's need to comply with the water conservation mandate and agreed to distribute water saver flyers to their guests.

The flyers will also be handed out at the Chamber of Commerce Tourist Information Center and at the Causeway toll booths, Klein said.

Spot announcements on radio and television urging voluntary cooperation from residents and visitors alike and listing easy ways to save water may used by the City as another way to "get the word out."

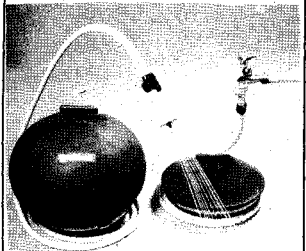

City Manager Bernie Murphy suggested these 12 ways to conserve water:

1. Check for leaks. A leaky commode can waste more than 50 gallons a day.
2. Don't use your toilet as a waste basket or ashtray - every flush uses seven gallons.
3. Bathe by shower (four minutes or less). Turn water off while you lather up.
4. Don't leave water running while brushing your teeth or shaving.
5. Wash dishes only once a day by running only full loads in the dishwasher. One run uses 25 gallons.
6. Run washing machine only with a full load. It uses 30 to 50 gallons per load.
7. Avoid running the tap for a cold drink - keep a pitcher of water in the refrigerator.
8. Cover your swimming pool to avoid evaporation.
9. Water lawns and shrubbery sparingly between 8 and 10 p.m. every three days.
10. Don't wash automobiles and boats.
11. Don't let the water run while you wash vegetables or prepare - use a bowl or a sink stopper.
12. Avoid washing sidewalks, driveways, porches, home exteriors or other outdoor surfaces.

Commission okays two conversions, denies third

Two requests for specific amendments to convert motel units to condominiums were approved and a third denied by the Planning Commission last week.

The Commission ruled that a duplex located seaward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line adjacent to Sandpiper Cottages on West Gulf Drive can be converted to two condominium units if the City Council follows the Commission's recommendation.

Conversion of seven other units at the former motel were approved for conversion last Dec. 8.

The renovation of all the units started prior to a change in City policy. A development permit is now required when motel units are converted to condominium ownership.

May 5 when the City Council adopted a new ordinance requiring a specific amendment for property owners to develop seaward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line.

Because issuance of building permits for the renovations represents vested rights, the staff reported that there was no reasonable reason to deny Edward Hillstrom's request.

Hillstrom, who represents Union Properties, was also given the nod by the Commission to convert a former ceramics shop at Dugger's Tropical Cottages Condominium to a single-family unit, with the provision that it cannot be rented for periods of less than one month.

But Roger Larson, representing the Blind Pass Association, was denied a development permit to repair and convert 13 Blind Pass Cottages rental units to condominium ownership.

The cottage colony, built prior to the adoption of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan, is a lawfully existing use. But because three of the units are located forward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line, four encroach on the required setbacks from San-Cap Road, one is located in the right-of-way itself and three others violate the 20-foot setback from the water, Larson needs a special amendment to CLUP to convert the complex.

The cottages in the Del Segua subdivision do not have the 7,500 square feet of open space required for a resort unit.

The vote in all three requests was unanimous.

Committee and the first choice of the City's consultant, Smith and Gillespie Engineers, places the new circuit underground from the substation to Rabbit Road along the San-Cap Road, by-passing Chateau Sur Mer, Tahiti Shores and Gulf Pines.

The Committee requested cost estimates for connecting the three subdivisions to one of the existing overhead lines on San-Cap Road by an underground feeder running from the entrance of Tahiti Shores on White Ibis Drive.

In addition, the Committee sought cost estimates for upgrading to three-phase the overhead lines along West Gulf Drive for .8 miles west of Rabbit Road and two-phasing it to the dead end.

The Committee also sought the estimated cost of removing the overhead lines and replacing them with underground lines.

The co-op estimates the combined cost of all three projects at \$489,263, which is \$171,795 more than its option.

When Valtin suggested cost was the co-op's main concern for its preference, Christensen said "reliability of the system" had a high priority.

Bob Dever, engineer and manager of System Planning for the co-op, stressed that, "Underground installation is not the panacea for the problems of outages that some of you people believe.

"Many utilities have had many problems

with underground systems, and some are abandoning them and going back to overhead lines," he said.

Dever disagreed that maintenance of underground lines is less expensive than overhead systems and maintained that in the long run, the maintenance cost does not cancel out the higher cost of initial installation.

Jack Hutchings, a retired electrical engineer and a member of the Committee, countered that the trend nationwide is toward underground lines.

"It's what the people want, both for esthetic reasons and safety during big storms," Hutchings said.

Hutchings outlined ways to cut the cost of the co-op's estimate of the Committee's choice and reduce the differential to only \$100,000.

He suggested the difference might be absorbed by the City by using franchise fees.

Christensen said later the co-op would look with favor on this solution.

"In fact it's what we have hoped would happen from the beginning," she said. "We want to be able to give Sanibel customers what they want without burdening the other consumers in our system."

Valtin expressed the Committee's appreciation for the co-op's presentation.

"It has given us a point from which to begin negotiations," he said.



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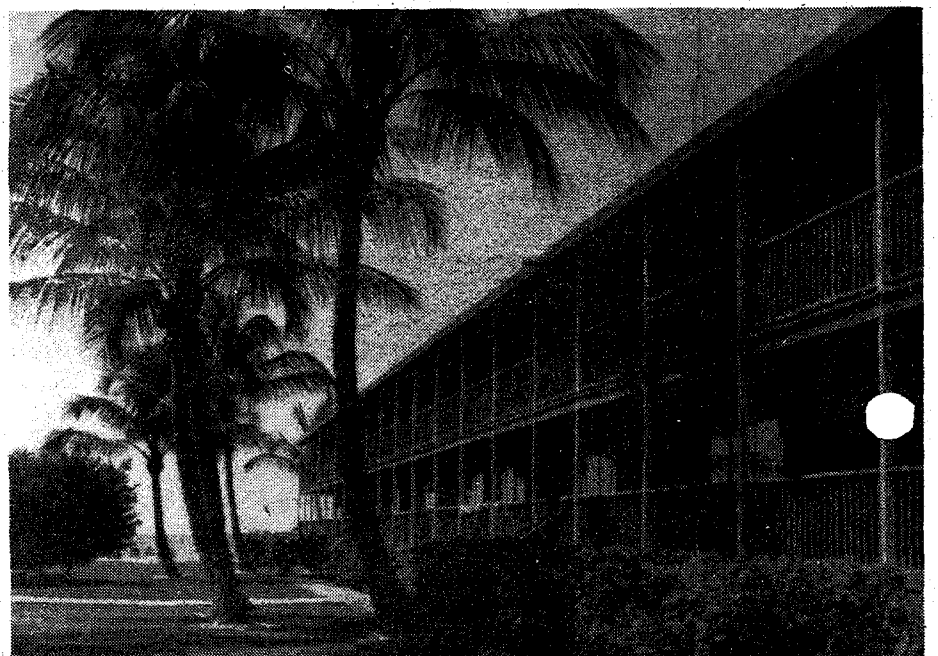
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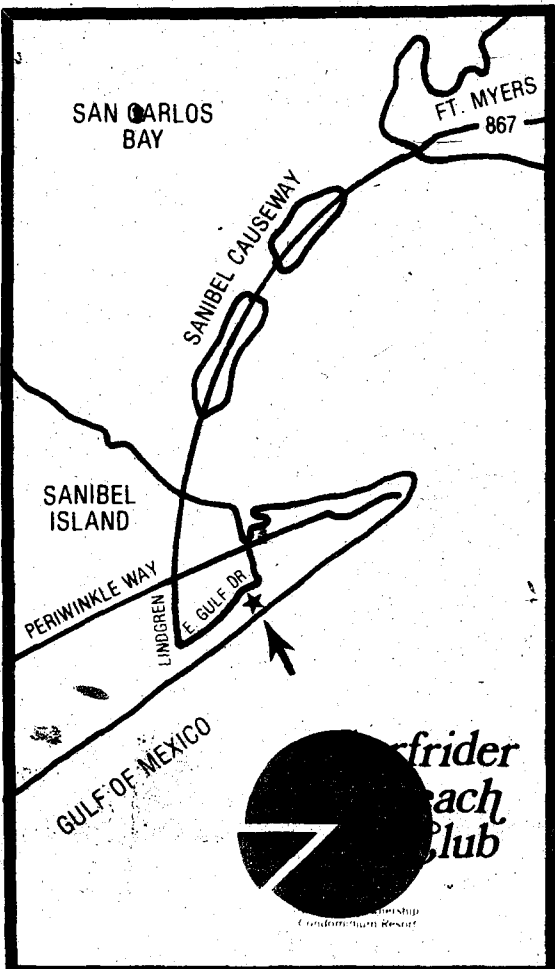
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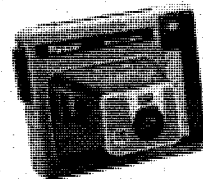

The nature of Valerie Hutchens' profession more often than not puts the director of the new Sanibel-Captiva Counseling Center on the receiving end of a conversation. But when given the chance to talk about herself, Valerie unleashes a wealth of sensitivity and insight spiced with laughter and unmistakable enthusiasm for where she is and what she does.

"I just know this is the way it is supposed to be," she says with confidence about her new private practice. "I didn't want to work very hard to be accepted on the Islands." Valerie is enjoying a simple "rest and relaxation" weekend on Sanibel last year when conversations with Islanders brought to her attention the need for a counseling center here.

"People I talked with were concerned about drugs, alcohol, depression," she says. "They made me realize Sanibel is not immune to those problems and could benefit from its own counseling center." That need coupled with growing dissatisfaction with her counseling job for the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services in Fort Myers prompted Valerie to open her counseling center at 1633 Periwinkle Way.

Response to the center since its grand opening May 1 has been "terrific," Valerie says. "I had sessions on the floor before I got any furniture in here."

Valerie sees her job as a helper as opposed to a "saver" or "curer."

"I listen to people and see things in them that they never see themselves," she says. "Then I try to help them gain an awareness of themselves in terms of self-esteem."

"It's like being the wise old lady of the tribe," she explains. "I'm somebody who can listen and really comprehend -- that's the reason we counselors exist."

The emphasis of her "couples counseling (married

couples aren't the only couples who need counseling)" is on listening to, not necessarily agreeing with, what one's partner is saying.

"I listen to two people react to things that aren't even said," she says. "I try to teach them to listen with kindness and acceptance."

"They don't have to accept what the other person is saying -- but they should always accept that fact that the other person is saying it," she explains of her philosophy.

Valerie says she leaned toward applied anthropology during her undergraduate work at the University of Florida. Several months observing people and groups in out-of-the-way European villages, however, tapped an interest in group behavior and led her to try social work when she returned to Gainesville.

"I learned a lot from my travels," she says. "It can be a great education if you are open to the people."

She says her main complaint about typical tourists, which she definitely is not, is that they hide behind their cameras and never see the real people and way of the land they visit.

"Their cameras have a great time," she laughs. "But the people themselves never see anything. Then they go home and show all their pictures and tell people they were there."

Valerie worked with HRS in Gainesville for six years before transferring to the Fort Myers office a year and a half ago.

The necessary paperwork and processing that had to be done for each client at the state agency, however, made her feel less like a counselor and more like a definer of counseling.

"I was frustrated and tired of fighting a value system that I didn't agree with," she says. "The idea at HRS was that if you spent more than 30 minutes with a client you were wasting time -- that's not enough time to make any kind of

improvement."

Valerie's counseling has been directed mainly toward children and their parents, but she plans to offer Island adults an array of group help sessions as well as private counseling.

Five basic group programs will form the core of the counseling center's curriculum for introduction to the Islands. Valerie and a team of fellow counselors will guide the workshops.

The "Rites of Passage" workshop is geared toward helping adolescents learn to make their own decisions as they break away from their parents.

"My Parents Drink ..." is intended to teach the necessary "survival skills" to young people who have alcoholic parents.

The Pitfalls, Problems and Pleasures workshop is planned around parents who want to increase and improve communications with their children.

Alcohol and Addiction is an information session geared toward adults who want to ascertain whether they have a drinking problem. A volunteer from within the community who is an alcoholic will assist in the workshop.

The fifth workshop planned for the initial stage of the counseling center is Instruction in Self-Hypnosis for those who want to overcome habits such as smoking and overeating.

The workshops are set up in six-week blocks and can accommodate six to 10 participants.

Valerie has ambitious plans for the center, and those plans are outdistanced only by the petite blonde's energy and determination to implement them.

"I want to make the center a community center," she says. "I plan to meet whatever need develops."

Loggerhead patrols start

Charles LeBuff, Director of Caretta Research, Inc., announced this week that his sea turtle conservation group has started nightly beach patrols.

Caretta Research was organized in 1968 and conducts field research including tagging and other monitoring of the endangered Loggerhead turtle population of Southwest Florida.

Loggerhead are 300-pound marine turtles that make nightly landings on area beaches during May, June, July and August for nesting purposes.

Each female nests on the average of every two years, and during a nesting season she may deposit up to six clutches on 13-day intervals. An average clutch contains about 110 ping-pong size eggs.

In many areas the eggs are destroyed by raccoons or storm tides. To counter these negative impacts the turtle researchers sometimes relocate such threatened eggs; however, not all eggs are moved.

To conduct this work the organization is authorized by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Florida Department of Natural Resources.

Sea turtles and their eggs are protected by Federal and State laws. In 1978 the Loggerhead turtle was listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act.

Turtle patrols begin shortly after dark and may continue throughout the night during peak nest periods. Jeeps, three-wheeled motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles are used, and an all-volunteer force conducts the



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CONA discussion focuses on interval ownership

The Committee of Neighborhood Associations at its monthly membership meeting on May 14 discussed at some length the interval ownership issue as it increasingly affects Sanibel.

Reports that interested lobbyists in Tallahassee are pushing a bill in the Legislature denying or severely limiting the power of local governments to regulate interval ownership development gave rise to special concern.

CONA is trying to obtain from Lee County Tax Appraiser Ken Wilkinson an ex-

planation of the seemingly wide disparity between the percentage of market value at which single family homes and interval ownership units are assessed.

CONA also voted to give its official backing to a letter Paul Howe recently sent to City Hall urging the amendment of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan to provide for a more precise definition of what is meant by a "single-family home."

Numerous examples were cited of the overuse of rented single-family homes involving habitation by what seemed to be


inordinate numbers of individuals, sometimes coming and going with kaleidoscopic frequency. The current review of CLUP would seem to provide an ideal opportunity to tighten up the definition of single family homes.

George Christensen reported on the progress made in the Gumbo Limbo Neighborhood Watch program. In addition to instituting random patrols by neighborhood volunteers for the purpose of reporting to the police any untoward developments, Gumbo Limbo residents are developing block-by-

block registers of who lives where, when they are away, and where they can be reached.

CONA President Urban Palmer urged that other neighborhoods avail themselves of the Neighborhood Watch Program, which is being promoted and supported by the Sanibel Police Department.

Discussion of city plans to install toilet facilities at the Algiers and Causeway properties - the latter in the back of the Chamber of Commerce building - inevitably drew the comment that \$40,000 was slotted to pay for a "chamber pot."




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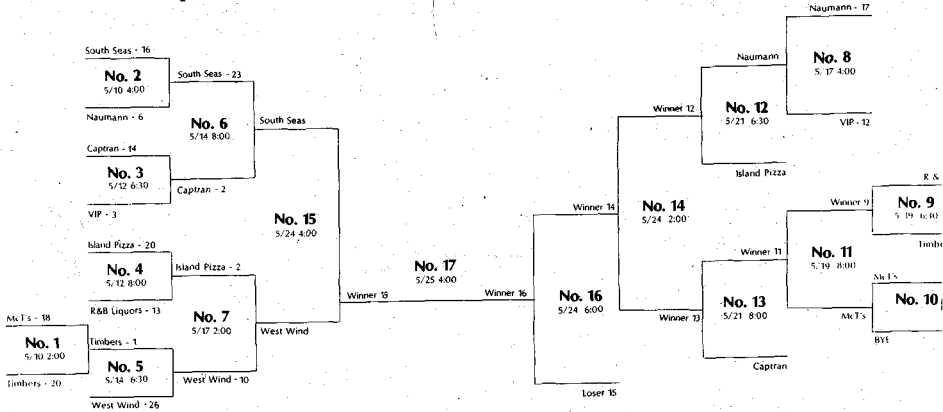
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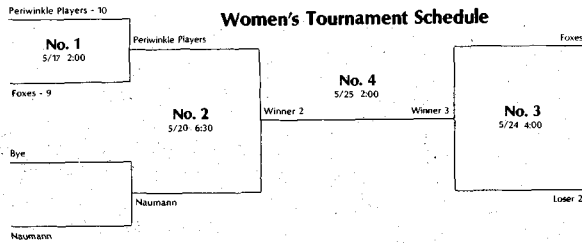
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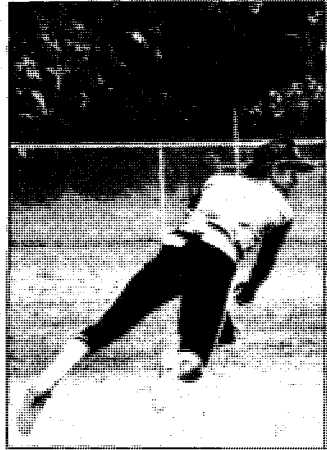

PBS transmitter okayed

The executive board of the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission last week approved a request from State Rep. Frank Mann (D-Port Myers) and the University of South Florida to allow the use of a portion of the Cecil Webb Wildlife Management Area for the construction of a public television transmitter tower.

At the urging of Commission Executive Director Robert Brantly, the Board gave permission for the state to seek approval of the site from the federal Fish and Wildlife Service for the use of the land for the WUSF transmitter tower.

Mann, who has been spearheading the push for the public television station tower, said that the area suggested by the Commission is not used by hunters and the tower

would not cause any environmental concern.

Since the Cecil Webb Management Area was purchased with federal grant funds, any non-wildlife management uses must be approved by the federal agencies and the land must be purchased or land of equal value donated to the state for wildlife management.

The Florida House of Representatives Appropriation Subcommittee has reserved additional state funds to pay for the land for the tower once the federal officers set an appraised value on the parcel.

Mann said if everything moves forward as planned, the WUSF Public Television Station will be serving Southwest Florida in March of 1982.

Kindergarten, first grade registration starts this week

Registration for children who are entering the Lee County Schools for the first time in kindergarten or first grade will be Monday, May 18 through Thursday, June 18 at each elementary school from 9 - 11 a.m. and 1 - 3 p.m.

Parents are urged to register their children early. It is not necessary to bring your children to the registration.

Before school starts, each child needs:

1. Birth Certificate
2. Evidence of a medical examination completed within nine months prior to school entry
3. Certificate of Immunization

Children must be completely immunized for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, measles, rubella and mumps. Certificates of Immunization may be obtained from the Lee County Health Department or family doctor.

Starting Age for Kindergarten
During the 1981-82 school year, children may begin kindergarten if they are 5 years old or before Nov. 1, 1981.

Children who are 5 after Nov. 1, 1981 but before Jan. 1, 1982 can enter kindergarten in

August by passing the early entrance test. Application for this test should be made before July 15 at the Elementary Education Department of the Lee County District School Board Office, 2055 Central Ave., Fort Myers.

Completion of kindergarten will be a requirement for admission to first grade in 1982-83; therefore, kindergarten attendance will be necessary in 1981-82 for promotion to first grade the following year.

Starting Age for First Grade
Children may be admitted to first grade during the 1981-82 school year:

1. If they will be 6 years old on or before Sept. 1, 1981; or
2. If they have completed kindergarten and will be 5 years old Sept. 2, 1981 through Jan. 1, 1982.

Children who become 6 by June 30, 1982 can enter first grade in August 1981 by passing the early entrance test. Application for this test should be made before July 15 at the Elementary Education Department of the Lee County District School Board Office, 2055 Central Ave., Fort Myers.

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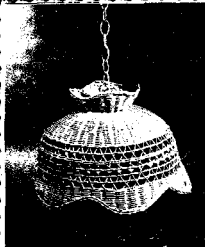

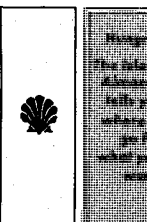

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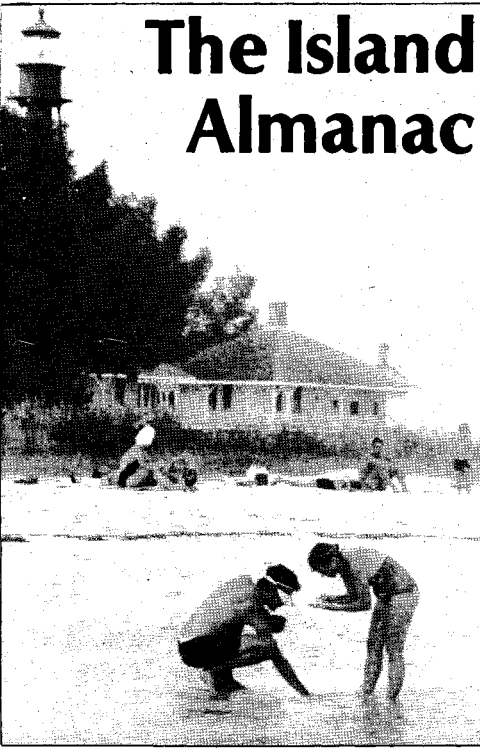

At the Lighthouse (Eastern end of the Island, Punta Ybel Plaza and The Sea Horse Shops are right across the street from each other, providing a variety of products that can cure your sweet tooth or tickle your shell finder's fancy. Tall Australian pines shade Periwinkle Way as the shopper travels west along this main thoroughfare. This stretch of road is truly a shopper's paradise! It's all here...the fast and not-so-fast eating spots, casual and elegant boutiques, hand-wrought jewelry, craft designs, shell shops and baiters for health produce fanatics. Watch to your right and left as

you drive or cycle along. Photographic supplies, bait and tackle, deli foods, fresh seafood and baked goods, knock-knocks and what-nots can all be found along the drive to the intersection of Periwinkle Way and Tarpon Bay Road. Along the way, shopping centers such as the Heart of the Islands, Periwinkle Place and Tahitian Gardens offer a variety of island delights.

Palm Ridge Road, the Periwinkle Way turn-off to Capiva, offers several new shopping centers, featuring everything from imports to gift shops for the discriminating shopper, plants and shells, a sandwich shop, cream parlour, pizza parlor, boutique shop and the island Apothecary pharmacy.

At the Tarpon Bay-Periwinkle Way intersection, the island Shopping Center features the island's only supermarket, dry cleaners and movie house.

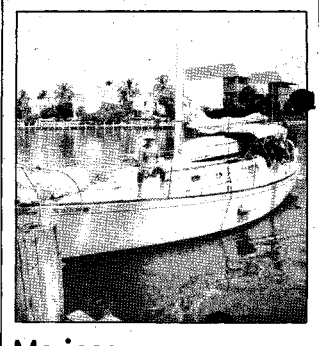

BICYCLE RULES
If you're not used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out for it on Sanibel. The entire network of bike paths on the island is marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path. A State law and City Ordinance combine to PROHIBIT OPEN DRIVING ON THE BIKE PATH. MOPEDS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE BIKE PATHS.

Planning on spending some time on the beach? Sanibel Island sun and sights? Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike rack, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding. Under Florida law, bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers.

DOGGY DO'S & DON'TS
If you're visiting Sanibel with the family, it's in your best interest to follow the rules. The Chamber of Commerce can tell you what accommodations are available for families with pets. Remember: Leave nothing on your pet! The friendly reminder: "Leave nothing on the beach but footprints" - applies to dogs, too. There's no leash law on Sanibel, but of course an excitable or unruly animal is better off when controlled with a leash.

BEACH ACCESS
Sanibel has miles of public Gulf-front beaches, any one of which is only minutes from your lodging. A lighthouse sits on a stretch of Federal land on the Eastern tip of Sanibel Island, and from there, the Gulf beach is accessible again at the end of Doggy Street, at Tarpon Bay Road, at Bowman's Beach Road (off Sanibel-Captiva Road) and Turner's Beach, which is located at Blind Pass, between Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

On Captiva Island, public beach access can be found at Turner Beach (which has public facilities) or further north, just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.

NOTE: STATE LAW PROHIBITS WADING ON ALL FLORIDA BEACHES. VIOLATORS WILL BE PROSECUTED.

CAMPING
Camping on the beach is prohibited and while everyone enjoys a beach fire, the Sanibel Fire Board has signed into law an ordinance prohibiting open beach fires. Prior to 1980, a permit was necessary, a permit was necessary for a beach bonfire, but as of July 18, 1980, it is no longer. An exception to the ordinance is a fire in a approved cooking container (not to exceed 4'x24" x 12" high) on an extruded metal grill for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container is not allowed on the beach without a permit. After you have your beach party, it is recommended that you assume the responsibility for the cleanup of any debris or litter in your area.

GATORS
Feeding alligators anywhere within the Sanibel City limits is not only illegal (violators of the law are subject to a fine of up to \$500, or up to 60 days in jail, or both), but can be extremely dangerous. Alligators can run 45 m.p.h., so if you're close enough to feed an alligator, he's most likely to feed on you. An alligator fed for fun is a natural fear of humans and becomes a potential threat to children and pets.

WARNING! SAFEGUARD YOUR VALUABLES
In order to protect your valuable possessions from theft, it is recommended that you TAKE THEM TO A BANK OR HOTEL VAULT FOR SAFEKEEPING. DO NOT leave them in your room or car.

SPEED LIMITS
Varying speed limits (20-30 m.p.h.) as one comes across the causeway, and there is a very good reason for them: to preserve the bridge supports from strain and stress. This speed limit is strictly enforced with the use of radar at 12-hour bases by both the Sanibel Police Department and the Lee County Sheriff's Department.

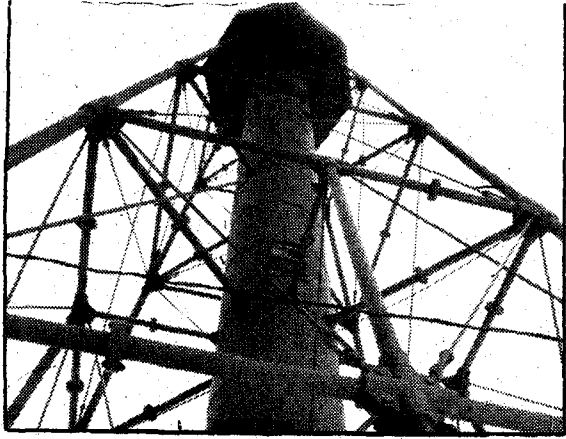

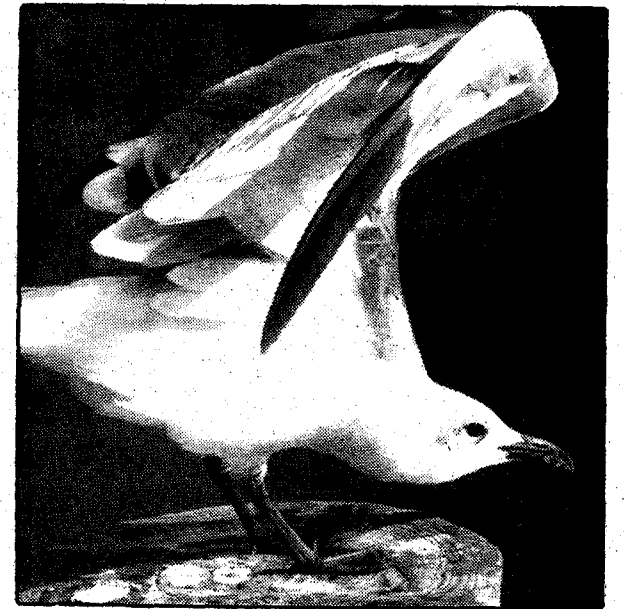

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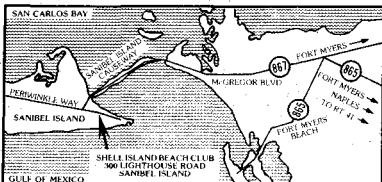
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
