## Paulsen suit follows Outer Island victory

On the heels of a victory in a federal court in the Outer Island Development Inc. civil rights case, the city of Sanibel was hit last week with a new law suit challenging its interpretation of its Comprehensive Land Use Plan by city officials.

Gerald Paulsen and Florean Ventures Inc., a Michigan corporation, are asking a judge to order the city to issue a development permit for a 53,000-square-foot supermarket and shopping center on Periwinkle Way on land now owned by Florean. The suit was filed in Lee County's 20th Judicial District Circuit Court.

Sanibel's Planning Commission, which denied Paulsen's application on grounds that the project was of too great a magnitude for the island's human support system to maintain.

Last April 7 the City Council by a 3-1 vote denied Paulsen's request for specific amendments to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan that sought council clarification of Economic Assumptions and Community Design elements of CLUP and a deter-

mination of whether Paulsen's plans were in compliance with the land use plan.

Councilmen Duane White, Mike Klein and Fred Valian who voted to deny Paulsen a specific amendment on the basis of the criteria cited by the Planning Commission in its recommendation to deny, are named defendants in the suit.

Councilman Porter Goss voted against the denial because he said he did not have all the facts. Councilman Francis Bailey, owner of Halsey's General Store, abstained because of a possible conflict of interest.

Also named in the suit are Planning Commissioners Joe Searing, Bill Lagerup and Arthur Wycoff, and former Planning Commissioners Judy Workman and Emily Twink Underhill, all voting members of the commission that turned down Paulsen's development permit for the shopping center because it was not compatible with the quality of life on Sanibel.

The suit filed by Fort Myers attorney William Haverford charges that Paulsen's

## Trolleys will travel Island route this winter

All signals were on Go this week for a trolley transit system to begin a trial run on Sanibel this December.

Last Tuesday the City Council gave its blessing to the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce proposal to operate two trolleys along four routes linking the chamber office on Causeway Road to the Lighthouse and the mid-island Island Shopping Center.

The goal, according to Chamber President Bill Frey, is to take cars off the road and help relieve the congested traffic conditions on Periwinkle Way during the winter season.

For its part in the pilot operation that the council agreed is "worth a try," the city will guarantee up to \$15,000 to cover any shortfall in rider fare revenue, provide parking near the chamber office for "day trippers" who opt to use the trolley, provide a facility for parking the trolleys overnight and for their maintenance and ensure cooperation from Sanibel Police in selecting trolley stops along the routes.

The council also agreed that, the city would

expedite the issuance of necessary licenses and a variance to the Graphics ordinance needed to permit advertising on the exterior of the trolley.

Walter Kile, the chamber's executive director, said Friday he had started the ball rolling with the Planning Department for a specific amendment to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The business community will support the project by buying up to \$42,000 in advertising, Frey said. The chamber will coordinate the system's operation through a lease agreement with the Naples Transit Company, which owns the trolleys.

At a joint workshop last Tuesday some council members and planning commissioners expressed concern that advertising signs would make the wood trolleys "traveling billboards," and labeled the bright red decorative panels "garish."

Frey pointed out that revenue from advertising is essential to help finance the

## A Day at the Children's Center of the Islands

Children need love especially when they don't deserve it

In a quiet neighborhood off Casa Ybel Road with little to disturb the learning process the Children's Center ideal fulfills its purpose.

The multi-roomed well-equipped building resists comfortably away from the bustle and bustle of the rest of the world. The Maria Muench Memorial Playground also a learning tool is right outside.

A sign inside says "Share your toys and have fun and the nearby 30 children do just that while they learn. This sign "Sunshine peeping in my window will you come and play with me?" Yes said the sun. Oh we are jolly friends forever more.

Mr. Frog jumped out of his pond and he found home. In the rain said he "I'll get wet and he jumped into the pond again the children sing.

Why isn't that silly? teacher Miss Martha says. The children are learning about water.

To help the children better understand the qualities of water Miss Martha directs an experiment with a tray of water and Crisco oil.

When the oil is spilled into the water it beads on the top like little fried eggs. Each child places a sheet of paper in the water and the oil makes dark spots.

Miss Martha (Martha Ryckman) and Miss Wendy (my wife) appointed teacher Wendy March) patiently teach the children the things they have to know in life.

Ranging from age 2 1/2 to 6 the children are at a stage when education of this sort is an important step in their development and the center programs fulfill that need.

For most children of the island the center in the neighborhood Miss Martha says. The community at large the center staff aides and parents cooperate to make each child's first school experience a pleasant one she adds.

The school is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. An educational program is from 9 a.m. to noon and the Children's Center Afternoon Program is from noon to 5 p.m.

The morning educational program is the main thrust of the center and is designed to provide developmental experiences in the areas of physical mental social and emotional growth.

A series of meaningful learning experiences encourages children to function effectively as group members while developing their own individual potential.

The integrated program is planned and supervised by preschool teachers and includes creative arts literature and language experiences musical activities and games science and nature appreciation and supervised indoor and outdoor play as well as an organized pre-reading and pre-math readiness program.

The center provides a group learning experience in a relaxed and casual atmosphere insuring a less demanding transfer to a more formalized learning structure in kindergarten setting.

The afternoon program provides a home-like environment which begins at noon with a supervised lunch hour. If the child has attended the morning program the lunch he or she brought to school is refrigerated for the lunch hour. The center needs a new refrigerator this year.

Call the center for further information about how to help. The afternoon program includes a storytime nap time for free play supervised playground activities and special educational projects.

The Children's Center of the Islands Inc. admits students of any race to all the rights and privileges programs and activities generally accorded or made available to students of the school.

Before a child can attend the center an application for admission must be completed and registration for a medical examination and immunization record form a field trip and beach release and authorization for emergency medical treatment must be submitted.

Because of the center's policy of keeping fees as low as possible volunteer help from the community is sought. The Board of Directors made up of parents of students and interested persons plans fund raisers clean-up days and field trips and calls upon parents to give of their time and efforts for such events.

Many trips are planned to enrich the children's educational experience sign-up sheets are posted at the school prior to each trip. Miss Martha feels the school has developed a fine program to aid in preparing the child in his or her continuing education.

There are some basic rules at the center. Children are expected to arrive on time and children should not bring a toy or book to school unless they are prepared to share it. No candy or gum is permitted and a change of clothes and underware labeled with the child's name should be kept at the school as needed. Children are not permitted to wear things so that they may safely participate in activities. Shows are a must. Birthday treats are permitted.

Tuition is \$75 a month for five days a week. Alternate rates are available for students who attend less than five days a week. Tuition for additional children from the same family is one half the regular rate.

A scholarship fund to defray up to half of the tuition cost is available to qualifying parents. Applications can be requested from the center.

To give visitors an idea of the general attitude of the center a plaque on the bulletin board says "Children need love especially when they don't deserve it."

plans complied with all general requirements of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

During extensive negotiations to reach a compromise satisfactory to city officials Paulsen agreed to at least 24 concessions to his original proposal that called for a major grocery store drug store and up to 15 tenant shops to serve the needs of residents rather than tourists.

The developer offered to donate \$15,000 plus 15 feet of right-of-way to improve the traffic situation at the intersection of Periwinkle and Casa Ybel Road. He also offered \$400 a year for a police officer to direct traffic there and agreed to set aside a \$50,000 bond in case a traffic signal should become necessary in the future.

To comply with Planning Commission requests Paulsen agreed to incorporate 12 Below Market Rate Housing apartments on the second story of the building.

Unless the court grants relief (by ordering the city to issue a development permit) the suit reads Paulsen will suffer irreparable damage in that he has become indebted in the approximate sum of \$40,000 for services rendered in preparation of the shopping center plans.

The suit also seeks damages in excess of \$5,000 for Paulsen and Florcan to compensate for denial of the right to use their property.

Haverfield claims in the suit that the denial of the development permit was not based on specific and articulated facts and instead was based upon general unsupported conclusions which related to the general policy considerations found within the Sanibel Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The final hearing of Paulsen's specific amendment request was continued from December 1980 until April while the city's consulting attorney Fred Bosselman reviewed the files to determine if there

might be surface similarities between the Paulsen case and the Outer Island Development case which was then in litigation. The Outer Island case resulted in a \$1 million law suit against the city and members of the Planning Commission.

On March 17 Bosselman reported to the council that he had found "no parallels" in the two proposed developments.

But Bosselman recommended the council reject the proposed Paulsen specific amendment without reaching the merits of the proposal because of procedural defects in the ordinance.

On April 7 three councilmen knowing that Paulsen intended to seek relief in the courts voted to support the Planning Commission's position that the Paulsen project was too big for the island's human support system to sustain.

Last Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Fort Myers the city emerged the winner in the Outer Island Development suit which charged the denial of a development permit to build eight condominium units on Buttonwood Lane was a violation of the corporation's civil rights.

U.S. District Judge William Terrell Hodges ruled that the city was within its rights to turn down the condominium project because it was incompatible with the surrounding neighborhood of single family homes.

Sanibel City Attorney Neal Bowen called the victory significant as the first land use civil rights case in Southwest Florida.

I'm pleased and gratified that after three years of vigorous litigation the city and commissioners were found not to have violated anyone's civil rights. Bowen said.

There's no doubt (Hodges' ruling) is precedent setting and will have a positive influence on the decision-making process in land use matters in the whole of southwest Florida, he added.

It was evident Bowen said that Hodges placed great reliance on the testimony of the city's expert witness Dr. David Godschalk, a professor of city and regional planning at the University of North Carolina and a former planning director in the city of Gainesville Fla.

Godschalk said Outer Island's Buttonwood project was not compatible with the surrounding neighborhood in 1978 because the plans were out of scale the access inappropriate and the intensity and density much greater than in the existing neighborhood.

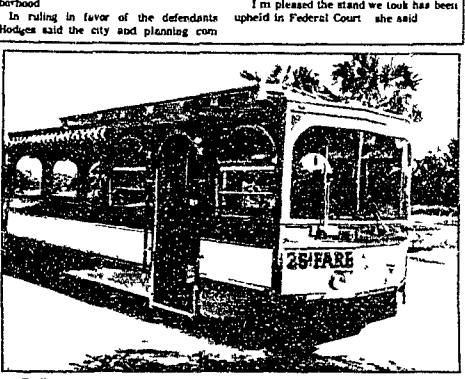
In ruling in favor of the defendants Hodges said the city and planning com-

missioners were acting in the interest of the general welfare and to good faith.

He said neighborhood compatibility was a recognized principle of planning and there was no evidence that the commissioners were acting in denying the permit had been arbitrary and capricious as the plaintiff charged.

Commission Chairman Ann Winsor (both) and a defendant along with Commissioner Don Mrnchster and four former planning commissioners were elated at the outcome.

I'm pleased the stand we took has been upheld in Federal Court, she said.

## Resident suggests erosion district, city, county cooperation

To the Islander:

The Capt. was on an Oct. 1981 proposal to restructure the southern end of that barrier island's Gulf beach is now under active discussion on its future depends upon the outcome of a bonding referendum to be held Nov. 3.

Unfortunately the recent furor over the privately financed beach renourishment project at South Seas Plantation at the island's northern end has obscured the vast potential for now doing something beneficial for the southern end at the Blind Pass sector. That area is in dire need of attention so as to enhance its usefulness to the general public.

A Sanibel Comprehensive Land Use Plan labels that area "the least stable part of the islands that 100 years ago was mostly non-existent."

The plan also recommends care in modifying or stabilizing the near-shore systems that are important for storing sediment as an energy sponge during storms.

My personal observations of that fickle open-and-shut Blind Pass inlet area, both from sea and from land, over the past score of years leads me to believe that a cooperative and constructive undertaking by the city CEPD and Lee County has great potential for benefiting both Island residents and mainland visitors.

As a touchstone to test that potential I offer for discussion the following scheme: a) extend to reverse the tidal flushing action of the key natural resource. It has indeed suffered badly from extensive sluggishness low tide at risk and poor navigability for many years.

1. Extend the existing county-built heavy rock groin at the Turner Beach parking area out into the open Gulf to a distance to be recommended by the experts.

2. Build a similar and parallel groin at least channel width to the south of the other groin.

3. Install a regulating weir at the Sanibel end of the bridge connected to a large (12 inch) concrete culvert laid in the tidal pool bottom lying southeasterly of the bridge, and then extend the culvert in a drag-lead trench for about 1,000 feet to the easterly dead-end of "Clam Bayou" in the vicinity of Silver Key.

4. Fill in the current breach in the Gulf beach where Clam Bayou exits with heavy rock and rip-rap to permanently seal it off from tidal flow from the Gulf and

5. Backfill and bury the entire length of the culvert with adjacent beach sand to the desired level of the bathing-shelling-fishing beach.

The conceivable benefits to be derived from the above scheme are:

A. Natural renourishment of the Gulf shoreline in the vicinity of the new channel groin.

B. Use of compatible spoil sand now stored near the southeast end of the bridge and that accreted in other treated small islands in the fishing channel in the pass to renourish where needed in the immediate area.

C. Enhanced tidal flushing (outwash) in Howeyville Channel, Dinkley and Clam Bayous. Old Blind Pass up past the county facility to Bowman's Beach and resultant restored shell and fish breeding beds in those inlet areas.

D. Elimination of the uncertainty of maintaining the closure of the unsafe and unstable beach-outlet from Clam Bayou to the Gulf (see item 4) and assurance of continual tidal flushing of Clam Bayou and Old Blind Pass.

E. Provision of a much desired small-boat navigational channel with continuous tidal flushing to connect the Pine Island Sound and Gulf boating, shelling and fishing areas.

F. Possible build-up of a shell and fish breeding sandbar seaward of the new channel-groin and

G. Accelerated natural renourishment of the adjacent Gulf Beach areas.

This scheme is a challenge to our local public officials to now undertake a constructive approach to a problem that has galloped here for generations.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Florida Department of Natural Resources could also contribute at least their experience and expertise to the project. It would certainly serve as the public for all the time.

Four readers comments will be most welcome.

# Final presentation scheduled for hazard mitigation report

Questions about hurricane damage reduction never asked or left unanswered at last week's City Council and Planning Commission joint workshop with the Hazard Mitigation Study consultants will be on the docket at the final presentation of the study Oct. 20.

In the interim input from the council and commissioners on the Hurricane Evacuation element of Rogers, Golden and Halpern's study is set for 9 a.m. Wednesday Oct. 7.

Patrick Kennedy's technical presentation of ways to build on Sanibel to reduce structural damage from an 105-year storm was cut short at 1:30 p.m. last Tuesday to make way for a Planning Commission meeting that was postponed from Sept. 14.

The planning staff initially expressed disappointment in the draft report.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers in a memorandum commented, "It is apparent that a great deal of work is ahead before the Sanibel Building Code can be revised to reflect (the consultants') recommendations."

Rogers said his overall impression is that "the consultants' answer to hazard mitigation is to build structures higher and stronger."

"The thrust of the study contemplated that the damage reduction element would address more than building code revisions," Rogers said.

The report also failed to address in-depth standards for floodproofing but did recommend keeping the percentage of damage for bulldoek at 50 percent.

The council has considered increasing to 80 percent the amount of structural destruction needed before the lawfully existing property owner would be required to bulldoek under CLUP regulations.

Rogers favors deleting the floodproofing requirement from the land use plan with the exception of "wet flood proofing" which he believes might be appropriate in some instances.

Rogers also disagreed with the consultants' recommendation for the use of fill as a structural support. Changes in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's regulations now under consideration make it difficult to set up positive policies for the future for subsidized federal flood insurance standards, Kennedy said.

Under the new law that goes into effect in 1983 these policies may become irrelevant, Councilman Porter Goss said.

As the law is finalized, Kennedy said, reasonable adjustments could be made.

According to Rogers, the consultants' recommendations that will need further discussion include the possibility of requiring 15-foot pilings for dwelling units in some areas using a 12-foot storm surge instead of the 14-foot surge recommended by Dr. Robert Simpson as the average number on which to base building code revisions and the reliance on local certified engineers and architects for assurance that buildings are designed and constructed to withstand anticipated loads and the retention of break-away walls on ground levels of structures in the V Zone.

Associate City Planner Bob Duane also pointed out deficiencies in the report on the non-structural solutions to hazard mitigation.

My general reaction is that they are all but omitted, Duane said.

Bulldoek policy is generally under-emphasized in the report," he said and relocation policy is not addressed at all. Duane said he was not sure why the report suggests that there be no distinction between the A and V Zones in terms of bulldoek. The report states that 80 percent damage be utilized for the basis of bulldoek in both zones be added.

## Public hearing scheduled for \$2.3 million budget

Sanibel is proposed \$2.3 million budget for 1982, 30 percent higher than this year's budget for taxpayers scrutiny Thursday at a public hearing at MacKenzie Hall beginning at 5:30 p.m.

At that time the City Council will pass a resolution adopting the tentative budget for the next fiscal year.

In August the council approved a proposed millage of 3.64 mills down from this year's 3.3 rate levied to support the \$1.32 million

budget. Adjustments in the budget since then brought about the change. City Manager Bruce Murphy said.

The appraisal of real property on Sanibel was increased to \$603,531,760 a figure that represents 85 percent of market value.

Input from the public will also be sought on the proposed uses of General Revenue Sharing funds.

Murphy has said the city's budget is deliberately on the high side and can be

trimmed with no problems.

Under TRIM law regulations increasing the total budget involves a complicated procedure and is not recommended, Murphy said.

Higher appropriations for eight departments in the city government and the creation of a new Recreation Department account for the more than half a million dollar increase in expenditures for the new fiscal year, he said.

A public hearing on the proposed tentative

\$172,400 budget for the Shell Harbor Canal Maintenance District is scheduled for 8 p.m. Thursday.

The council is expected to adopt the amended budget with a millage rate not to exceed 7.5 mills.

On Oct. 6 voters living in the Shell Harbor Canal Maintenance District will go to the polls to approve or disapprove the proposed rate cap.

## Commercial moratorium extended

Planning Commissioners last Tuesday gave a nod of approval to an ordinance that will extend Sanibel's original commercial moratorium six months beyond its Oct. 8 expiration date.

At its Sept. 1 meeting the City Council voted to extend the moratorium until changes in the commercial element of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan generated from Barton Aachman Associates study for the city are finalized.

At that time City Attorney Neal Down was instructed to draft a new ordinance amending the original moratorium that was approved by the council on Oct. 16, 1980. That ordinance was declared invalid by Lee County Circuit Judge Wallace Peck last February.

Peck ruled in a suit filed by businessman Robert Bumtruck against the city that the council had followed the wrong procedure in enacting the moratorium.

The city appealed Peck's ruling. On Feb. 27 the council initiated a second ordinance virtually identical to the October 1980 document except for the addition of a more liberal relief route following the procedure for a general amendment to the land use plan.

The council agreed to extend the date of this ordinance also and Monday the commissioners were scheduled to approve the continuation of the ordinance beyond its expiration on Oct. 8.

If the city wins its appeal of Peck's ruling, now before the Second District Appellate Court, the latest ordinance would be repeated, Boven said.

## The Dunes entrance sign to be moved

Representatives of Martner Properties Inc. bowed to Planning Commission objections and agreed to move a sign marking the new entrance to The Dunes subdivision back from the Sandcastle Road right-of-way.

The sign is incorporated in a design for a post and rail fence to landscape the entrance which has been moved south on Bailey Road from the present location.

A specific amendment to CLUP's Residential Yard requirements needed to locate the fence and sign forward of the 75-foot setback for residential front yards was unanimously recommended for council approval by the commissioners last week.

## Commission recommends 39 campsites

Dick and Terry Muench's request to expand the Periwinkle Trailer Park with additional RV campsites on 4.5 acres of the former Uncle Clarence Rutland property on Periwinkle Way got only lukewarm approval from the Planning Commission last week.

The commissioners required the number of campsites to be permitted from the 40 requested by the Muenchs to 39 recommended by the Planning staff.

Commissioner Arthur Wycoff was not convinced that a recreational vehicle park even belonged on Sanibel and cast the lone vote against Commissioner Louise Johnson's motion to recommend council approval.

There are no development standards for campgrounds outlined in the Comprehensive Land Use Plan and that category is not included in Permitted Uses in the plan.

Wycoff pointed out the commissioners questioned whether campsites should be treated as units of high impact which are subject to the state of Growth Allocation process.

Commissioner Larry Simon's motion to continue the hearing for specific amendments until City Attorney Neal Bowen could give a legal opinion on their RGOG status failed when the vote was 3-2.

Architect Ray Fenton representing the Muench brothers argued against delay saying that the question could be resolved at a first hearing before the City Council scheduled for Oct. 20.

Johnson proposed approval of the staff recommendation for 39 campsites which did not include 1.5 acres of land where the Rutland house is located in the computation for the number of campsites permitted under current density standards.

The Muenchs have said they will donate that portion of the property fronting on Periwinkle Way and the Rutland house to the city if their request is granted.

Fenton said it was not fair to the commission to take away the Muenchs' use of that land and then hope they will give it to the city.

He said to sites could be placed on the property if the 1.5 acres were set apart as part of the open space requirement.

Johnson a long time camper said 60 campsites on the property would crowd the site.

Sanibel should set standards higher than the county's for an RV park, she said.

Thirty-nine campsites are not economically feasible, Dick Muench pointed out adding that the present park is filled only for three months during the winter season.

## Specific amendments recommended for approval

Planning Commissioners last week recommended approval of two specific amendments to permit encroachments of roof overhangs on property setbacks required by the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

Both violations resulted because the structures are too big for the sites. Commissioner Larry Simon charged and the possible problems should have been evident long before this by City Hall.

These variance requests should not be before us now, Simon said adding that this may point up a weakness in the building inspection procedure.

But because of the unique circumstances, Simon moved that the commission recommend the council approve Lewis Umland's request to allow encroachments on front, rear and side setbacks by two commercial buildings moved to his property on Florence Way in 1978.

After a completion permit was issued last December for remodeling the buildings for commercial use, inspector discovered that overhangs added to the buildings encroached on all four setbacks.

Umland said he had added only a fascia board and soffit to the buildings since the initial permit was issued.

Commissioner Louise Johnson pointed out that Umland had failed to provide a vegetation buffer around the property and added this as a condition for approval.

Simon's motion passed by a 4-1 vote. Commissioners Bill Hagerup, Don Manchester and Joe Searing were not present at last Tuesday's meeting which was continued from Sept. 14.

The commission also recommended for

approval James and Pamela Pfahler's request for a variance to permit one corner of the roof overhang on their new home in Sanibel Isles to encroach 2.4 feet into the required 10-foot setback from an open body of water.

Mrs. Pfahler told the commission that removing that portion of the wide overhang on their early Florida-style home would expose that part of the house to the morning

sun and undermine their attempts for maximum energy savings.

She said because of the odd shape of the property it was difficult to place the structure on the site.

This type of encroachment should have been noted early on Planning Director Bruce Rogers said.

Commissioner Arthur Wycoff's motion to recommend approval passed unanimously.

## Priscilla Murphy Realty office addition approved

Realtor Stanley Johnson was granted a development permit last Tuesday to construct a 700-square-foot addition to the Priscilla Murphy Realty office at 1021 Periwinkle Way.

The planning staff recommended approval of architect Ray Fenton's plans for the addition but suggested that the realty office be physically joined to the adjacent Macintosh Book Store with a two-year rated fire wall.

Four parking spaces directly in front of the current office will be blocked off with appropriate plantings leaving eight parking spaces.

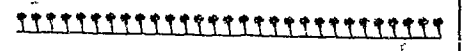
Johnson said the proposed addition will occupy only 2.2 acres of the property that he

plans to develop after new commercial building standards are finalized in a few months. He objected to removing all the Brazilian Pepper and Melaleuca trees on the entire site at this time.

A Brazilian Pepper hedge along the eastern boundary of the property shields the realty office from the gasoline service station next door, Johnson explained.

But Johnson agreed to follow Chairman Ann Winterbotham and Commissioner Louise Johnson's suggestion and begin replacing the hedge with native vegetation now.

A motion by Commissioner Arthur Wycoff to approve the permit with conditions passed by a 4-0 vote.

# The Way We Were...

THURSDAY SEPTEMBER 28 1978

Island residents are now able to hear the local television stations every evening at 6 and 11 p.m. The long awaited service was made possible by Walter K. Kle of the Sanibel Captiva Chamber of Commerce and Larry Howell for the Island Water Association.

Consider the time of the year it was a pretty busy week at the Sanibel Police Department. One alarm went off 13 times and each time checked out as 10-4 which means no break in - false alarm.

Both City Planning Director Sam Shannon and Planning Commission Chairman Duane White tendered their resignations for quite different reasons at the regular Sanibel City Council meeting.

THURSDAY SEPTEMBER 28 1978

Chairman White formally resigned from the seven member Planning Commission in order to qualify as a candidate for the City Council seat number four not wishing to give the impression that he was using the commission as a political forum.

William Hammond environmental education coordinator for Lee County talked to teachers at Sanibel School about current environmental problems relating to the islands. The workshop was sponsored by the Florida Audubon Society and close to 200 leaders and teachers from all parts of the state gathered to take part in the project.

Officials of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District reported that recent heavy rains were very beneficial to the major south water holding areas. The water level in Lake Okechobee has

risen more than half a foot and now stands at almost 14 feet above mean sea level. The optimum is 14.75 feet on Sept. 17. The dig site only has to rise a little more than a foot to reach its full regulation schedule.

THURSDAY SEPTEMBER 28 1978

The main building and a storage building at Casa Ybel which was established as a hotel around the turn of the century was burned to the ground on Sept. 23 by one who was injured.

Some of Serge's poems are already well known on the islands especially Beautiful Captiva and Sanibel Star of the Sea.

# On the water

Does the person you fish with lie cheat and in a sneaky extend the truth beyond belief? If so you probably have the best person another fisherman could ever hope to find.

It's very important to pick the correct person or sharing your angling adventures with you. You definitely don't want anyone who when the Florida Marine Patrol pulls up volunteers. Great day. We got our limit and then some. Hope that partner has seen his last shrimp dunking excursion with you probably for six months to a year and \$50 later.

Another thing you want to weed out in the ranks of potential fishing partners is a clock watcher. You know the kind who when you ram your boat high and dry on a sandbar sits there and tells you "Well we've been here for five hours seven minutes and 43 seconds. It won't be more than 12 minutes and 13 seconds before the tide floats us out. Then a long hour back to the dock where I can call my wife and tell her that I'll be three hours late for her dinner party. No you don't need that kind of grief.

And you definitely want to keep away from the free loaders. They know the ones—they get moody if you ask them to chip in and pay for the monthly boat payments after you foot the dockage bill all by yourself.

And a free loader never says "Thank you" when you pull that fishing line from the back of his you know where after he sits on the fish after you just happened to let reel on his chair while you opened a can of Vienna sausages.

No there's a little loyalty a tymer out there. You have to be careful about finding just the right people for fishing partners.

For instance do they like to drink beer? Can they drink a beer like a 225-hp outboard drinks gas? Better to ask on to them then because studies have shown that drunk people hardly ever get seasick. This is because they usually sway and fall down anyway and when they get out on the bonding main it's just normal for them to have to crawl to the head. So even though it's a little bit messy they think it's dead calm and get you home everytime.

By far the most valuable item make some of the finest folks to have on your boat especially when you get back to the dock with no fish.

You know this kind of fisherman no matter how big your fish was he caught one bigger. Like the other day this guy came in and said he saw a sting ray that was as wide as his small motorboat. That is possible of course. This other guy the cooperative falls said he caught one the day before that was as long as the boat.

If you are going to get skunked you might as well get skunked royally so take the second guy with you. Have you ever fished with one of those people who always wants to be exact about everything? They say "Cast 2 1/2 feet to the right or that stump over there."

Well after a couple of visits with Mr. Jack Daniels you might have trouble even seeing the stump. Naturally you are going to cast over the stump and get your buddy a little excited. He'll shout something like "I said 2 1/2 feet to the right of the stump not that woman shelter with your shrimp."

But what you really want to seek is a partner man or woman who will back you up. When you get to the dock and you say "I caught that tarpon for three hours before he cut the line your partner says "It was four hours if it was a minute."

And when you say "That snook ran on 500 yards before I finally turned him your friend will say "It was longer than that. The fish went around Captiva Island two times before it stopped."

Good people are hard to find but you just keep looking and good fishing out there this week.

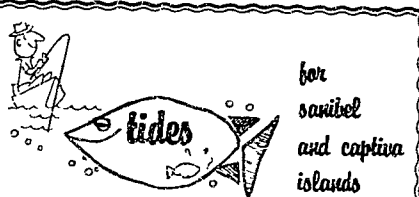

# Shelling Tips

Several months ago a Captiva Island resident asked me to keep an extra surrury venus clams I might have for him because he wanted to eat them.

Eat those beautiful shells! Yes. Since then I've talked with other people who like to eat the delicate surrury meat and consider the clams quite a delicacy. Just a few months ago one of Florida's leading sport magazines reported how people look for and find surrury and other clams north of Tampa on the Gulf of Mexico. If you are new to shell collecting the surrury venus clam is a beautiful colorful and prized specimen. Most people walking the beaches find just one side of this bi-valve shell but even that is a great catch. To find a full deed surrury is a real treat and is getting more difficult all the time.

The surrury I find are usually from three to six inches long. They are in an elongated shape to this flattened down clam.

The real beauty of the surrury comes from the fact that when you find a colorful shell devoid of creature you can hold the shell to the sun and see each ray of light come from the heart of the shell and extend all the way to the

edge. I always say it gives a stained glass window effect and is one of the few shells in the entire region that do so.

You will see surrury quite extensively in shell decorations. This is because in their natural state besides that amazing coloration or rays they have a high shine too. The surrury lives in sand usually half buried. The more pointed end of the live shell extends to the water where its system takes food from the passing tidal water.

Because the surrury feed in this manner only half buried it is somewhat easy for shellers to find them. And that is just why it is getting more difficult to find good surrury venus clams. Other clams dig into the sand and are hidden. I've found live surrury right on the beach not a bit covered and very much alive and feeding.

There is one discouraging aspect of looking for surrury however. Not only are shellers out after this particularly handsome clam so are larger shells and some fish.

Big sting rays hover over the shallow bay waters foraging for small crabs and shells and have been known to dig out a surrury or two.

They aren't filled with teeth but they can crush shells.

The surrury is also pursued by larger shells like the horse conch and the lightning whelk. These larger shells of 12 to 15 inches in length will search the sand dredging for clams if they find a surrury they have a feast.

Once I came upon two large old whelks in a fight over a surrury clam. The two whelks had powerful muscles and were locked in a tugging battle with the poor little surrury doing his best to keep his two doors closed.

We urge you to keep strictly to the two live shells per person law but if you do have two live surrury clams and want to try eating them here's what to do. Tenderizing with a hammer first helps. Then cut the meat into strips and according to the article in the Florida magazine brood the clams in cornflour and deep fry at 375 degrees in peanut oil until they float.

**CROW staff, 'patients' prepare for move**

It will not be long now until care and rehabilitation of Wildlife (CROW) moves to its new quarters directly across the road from the Sanibel Elementary School.

Laboratory equipment should be moved in today with the rest following in the days ahead.

CROW staff Vice Dwyer says cages must be built and everything must be moved from CROW's present Captiva location.

For four years the non-profit wildlife-saving organization has operated in and around the Jabber's Guest House courtesy of landowner Adelaide Chertouner who maintains her residence behind the CROW center.

CROW has use of a acre of land on the property.

Ms. Chertouner has paid all the bills for the CROW facility which serves as an animal hospital and houses CROW Director Holly Davies.

CROW owns the new site and facility which includes laboratory and office space, large ponds for the birds and larger cages.

Making the move with CROW caretakers and personnel will be an array of "patients" including a sparrow hawk that was crippled a year ago when hit by a car and "Owl"

a 3 year resident barn owl that helps with educational tours.

New arrivals including an immature red shouldered hawk two crippled fish crows a great horned owl several pelicans two double-crested cormorants and other patients will also make the short trip down the Sanibel-Captiva Road.

One of the more interesting residents is a mature red shouldered hawk that was hit by a motorcycle in front of Tween Waters Inn.

The bird lost all his primary wings and suffered a broken femur in the accident.

Dr. Phyllis Douglas of the Coral Veterinary Clinic at Cypress Lake Drive just

off the Island placed a pin in the bird's bone to hold it together until the natural healing process is completed.

Dr. Douglas donates her services to CROW.

CROW workers are justifiably excited about the move. More space for more patients is important to them.

As Ms. Dwyer says, "The animals will be much happier in their new home because we will have a more suitable environment for them."

We will have several large ponds and larger cages giving them a habitat more like what they would have in the wild, she says.

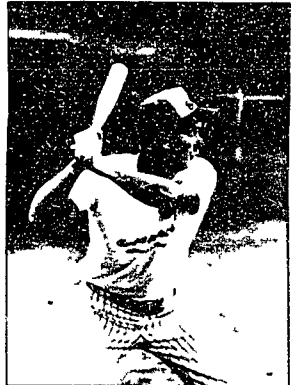

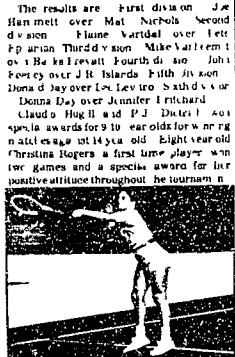
Some of the participants never had played tennis before they were introduced to the game's scoring system and etiquette and the fun that is inherent to racket sports on Saturday.
