## Mysterious manatee deaths continue

The gentle and threatened manatees are rapidly becoming more threatened. "They seem to be dying like flies," said an official of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Servie in Gainesville late last week.

The sea mammals, which are estimated to number in total about 1,000, began dying mysteriously in early February. Since then more than 35 dead manatees have been found in Lee County alone

Between Monday, March 28, and Friday, April 2, five were discovered dead and two were reported to be in severe respiratory distress, which usually precedes death. One washed up off Sanibel in Tarpon Bay last Monday, two were found dead in Cape Coral on Thursday, and two died in the Fort Myers area. In addition, there was an unconfirmed (according to the Marine Patrol in Fort Myers just before they closed Friday) report of another manatee death on Friday.

The aquatic mammals share characteristics with whales, porpoises and elephants, all of which are related to the manatee. The shy and retiring creatures are slow swimmers, and until very recently one of the main causes of their deaths was collisions with the propellers of pleasure boat motors. This appears to have diminished somewhat very recently with wide publicity advising boaters to be

## The Rocks residents hear Neighborhood Watch program

More than 150 members of the Sanibel Rocks Civic Association turned out last Wednesday night to learn how to "beat the burglar" with the establishment of a Neighborhood Crime Watch.

Residents of the area along West Gulf Drive between the West Wind Inn and the Wood-

of the Sanibel River listened to a presentation by Sanibel Police Department Crime Prevention Officer Jack Primm.

It was the first general membership meeting of the Rocks Association in seven years, President Carter Leslie said. The 277member civic group was founded in 1965 "to

mere Preserve and along Rabbit Road south preserve the ambience" of the single-family area, he said.

Sponsored by the Police Department, Neighborhood Watch (Sanibel's version of Citizen's Crime Watch) is already working in other Island neighborhoods, Primm said. It is funded by the state's Help Stop Crime program.

A film on residential burglary pointed out ways to make homes more secure, and island locksmith Tom Holtz displayed both good and bad locks.

Deadbolt locks are best to secure homes, Holtz said. "But an unlocked door is no

careful of the endangered animals.

A number of ecologically-oriented societies have become interested in saving the manatees, including the Audubon Society, and great amounts of money are being spent in an effort to discover the mysterious manatee killer, which at first was thought to be a type of pneumonia.

According to those who are working on the manatee mystery, including Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Center Manager Steve Phillips, Sgt. Ross Eisemenger of the Marine Patrol in Fort Myers, and Cathy Beck, a biological techinician with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Gainesville who assisted with the necropsy of the manatee found on Sanibel last Monday, the mammals are fascinating and it will be a great loss to everyone if they become extinct.

The manatee's scientific names is trichechus manatus, and they are found only in the peninsula of Florida and southern Georgia. They are members of a little studied order called Sirenia, which originally contained four species of manatee and another sea mammal called a dugong.

One species of manatee, called Steller's sea cow, was discovered in 1741 in the Bering Sea in the Arctic but was efficiently exterminated by man within 25 years, apparently by sailors on fur-hunting expeditions.

Manatees are invariably described as "gentle."

"They are one of the few creatures who apparently have no natural enemies. No larger sea-creatures, such as whales or sharks, prey on them. They, in turn, prey on no

one," Eisemenger explained.

"They eat vegetable matter -- a tremendous amount, perhaps 50 pounds a day," he added. "For this reason, they are helpful in keeping waterways from getting clogged by

Manatees eat six to eight times a day in feeding sessions that last up to two hours. However, they are not creatures of

When it is cold, they can rest on the bottom of a river or spring for up to 10 hours. They are sub-tropical creatures, and the largest population of them in Florida (more than 300) is found in Lee County because here is some of the warmest water in the state.

During the winter months they stay around factory areas and electric plants, where the water is warmer than nor-

Manatees are "shy," and that is why until recently not much was known about them. They spend a lot of time alone but do get together and "play." During "courtship" several males may court the same estrous (fertile) manatee for more than a month. There is a strong bond between mother and calf.

When the animals play, they kiss (touch mouths -- they are very particular about keeping their mouths and teeth clean), nudge, nuzzle and embrace. In spite of their reputation for being shy, manatees have been known to get curious and "kiss" human divers.

The gestation period for the manatee is around five months, although the exact length of manatee pregnancy is not known. Life spans are believed to go up to 50 years, and there are captive manatees known to be in their late 20's.

They are exuberant at times and somewhat intelligent, as befits relatives of the porpoise. A famous manatee living ar Miami was so tame it would roll over and have its thick, gray, rough and wrinkled belly scratched.


Manatee calves stay with their mothers for up to two years, during which time they are suckled. Then they enter an intermediate stage, sub-adult. According to Beck in Gainesville, who assisted at the necropsy of the male manatee found on Sanibel near Tarpon Bay Road last Monday, the manatee was an "adolescent" -- not a calf, but not sexually mature. Beck also said the animal was very fresh and had not been dead for more than a day.


The manatee was cut apart here after it was quickly frozen. Portions were flown to Gainesville. Samples of blood, tissue and body fluids were sent to various labs across the state, but no results were available as of Friday.


One suspect in the deaths, a tiny organism called the sea squirt, which the manatees eat and which may be contaminated by the red tide, has been found in the gastrointestinal tracts of "many of the dead manatees," Beck said.

"That it is the squirts that are doing this is only a working guess," said Eisemenger.

In conclusion, the manatees are happy, shy but friendly and have no enemies. They are smart and in captivity can learn tricks and play games - but they are not as smart

whales or porpoises.

Sexually, the males are always the agressors, and the females appear mildly annoyed by such aggression. They breed all vear long.

When excited, happy or sexually aroused, manatees may squeal, squeak and chirp. When they are frightened, they may scream. However, they do not appear to have a "language" such as dolphins do.

"People are concerned about this not because manatees have nice personalities or would make good pets or something," Eisemenger said. "They are concerned because these are large mammals and it would definitely be bad ecologically if this important animal became extinct. It's not like a plant or an insect or something.

"It would be as if elephants were going to become extinct -- it is a blow to the system," he added. "It is a sign that something is wrong.'

### County Commission to hear renourishment request

The Lee County Commission this Wednesday afternoon will consider a request from the Captiva Erosion Prevention District to approve the district's plans for renourishing 17,000 feet of Captiva's beach.

The district asked for the approval from the county at last week's regular commission meeting, but the County Commissioners said they would not endorse the project before it was discussed at a public hearing.

"You are asking us to say this (renourishment) is fine when we are not sure," Commissioner Mike Roeder, who represents Captiva and Sanibel on the county board, said. "It's putting the cart before the horse."

Roeder and his fellow commissioners said they would like to see more detailed results of the biological monitoring that is taking place at the borrow site of the South Seas Plantation renourishment project that was completed last fall. Sand for that renourishment was dredged from Redfish Pass, which is one of four sites proposed for the CEPD renourishment.

Interim reports indicate the Redfish Pass borrow site is recovering from the dredging, but the commissioners want more statistics from the state Department of Environmental Regulations and Department of Natural Resources.

Roeder did say, however, that he personally thinks renourishment of Captiva's beaches would be for the good of the public.

"There is a serious problem with erosion out there," he said. "If we don't renourish, then the whole Island will be rip-rapped.

Then we would go to seawalls, and we all know that won't work."

Even if the County Commission does endorse the renourishment proposal, Roeder said it would be up to the CEPD on the local level to determine how the project would be financed. The environmental significance of the project should be determined at the state level, he added.

At their regular meeting on Monday, the CEPD commissioners agreed that they would immediately begin negotiations with Roeder and County Administrator Lavon Wisher to secure more county funds for the renourishment project.

CEPD Commissioner Lloyd Wright, who heads the district's Finance Committee, called the county's offer of \$70,000 a year for the renourishment "miserly."

CEPD Chairman Dick Butze was in Tallahassee last week and told the commissioners on Monday he had received assurance from the state Department of Natural Resources that \$710,000 will be available if and when the project gets underway.

Butze also announced that Gov. Bob Graham has accepted Commissioner John Oster's resignation from the CEPD. He said Ed Manthei, a Captiva newcomer, intends to run for the governor-appointed position along with Captivan Peg Hofschneider.

The public hearing on the CEPD request will be heard sometime after 3:45 p.m. Wednesday at the regular County Commission meeting in the Lee County Courthouse in downtown Fort Myers.

deterrent to a burglar," Primm pointed out. Be sure patio and garage doors are locked, he said, adding if the doors are electrically

he said, adding if the doors are electrically operated the devices should be unplugged when the house is not occupied.

Other tips Primm suggested for burglar proofing homes include: putting a peephole in solid wood doors to allow insiders to see who is outside without opening the door; lighting the outside of the house as well as the interior when away; trimming shrubbery that might conceal an intruder and planting yuccas or similar vegetation under windows or other entry ways.

Burglar alarm systems do help, Primm acknowledged, because the noise they make usually scares intruders away.

Lt. Ray Rhodes reminded the home owners that the Police Department offers a

free vacation check service that insures an officer will check doors and windows of empty houses once a week.

Either Rhodes or Primm will, at a homeowner's request, visit a house, make a security check and suggest steps for maximum protection from break-ins.

Operation Identification is another important phase of Neighborhood Watch.

To help police identify stolen property, residents are urged to mark their valuables with their drivers license number using an electric etching tool available at the Sanibel Police Department. During a security check the officers will mark property for residents. Do not mark your valuables with your Social Security number, they cautioned.

Home owners are also encouraged to inventory and photograph their valuables

and file the list with the Sanibel police.

But the best deterrent to home burglary is Neighborhood Watch, "with 8,000 pairs of eyes on the lookout for suspicious persons," Rhodes said.

Jim Fox is the coordinator for organizing the Rocks in blocks of 10 to 15 homes. Block leaders will establish lines of communications through a telephone network.

"We also hope to tie this into the Emergency Preparedness Evacuation Relief Team (EPERT) program and be able to alert the entire Island to an evacuation ordered during an emergency," Primm explained.

But the Police Department's primary need is for the help of citizens in preventing home burglaries by reporting any suspicious actions in their neighborhoods. "We want you to call us and not feel dumb if it turns out to be a false alarm," Rhodes said. "It is worth nine false alarms to catch one crime in progress."

About 50 percent of the burglaries on Sanibel are in the daytime, Rhodes said.

Signs identifying a neighborhood as protected by Neighborhood Watch are available from the city. The first sign is free of charge; others will be installed for \$48.50 each, Primm said.

Operation Identification stickers are also available to identify homes in which valuables have been marked.

Property stolen from Sanibel residents last year totalled \$243,000, Rhodes said, adding that about 43 percent of the stolen goods were recovered.



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## **HOWE NOW!**

Economic Views of the State, established by the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council, is published monthly and annually to keep our six-county region's public officials abreast of the key economic trends that affect their governmental operations.

The publication reports comparative trend data such as: unemployment, growth in the labor force, airport passenger volumes, telephone cusomters, building activity, retail and gasoline sales, new housing volumes and the consumer

The current Annual Report reviews 1981 data and ventures an outlook for 1982 based on the behavior of those key economic indicators. It is possibly the most objective analysis available for those who contemplate migrating here or who are potential investors in our area's future. (Regrettable is the failure to report the number as well as the dollar value of new single- and multi-family dwelling units under permit.)

The general look-back at 1981 reveals mixed effects in the economic indicators. The year started off fairly optimistically, but by the end many indicators had declined as the national recession bit into them. The declines, however, were not as severe as those in many other areas of the state and nation.

On the bright side, several of the indicators showed general improvement during the year when compared to 1980. Regionally there were increases in housing starts, retail sales and telephone customers. In contrast, prices continued to rise, unemployment increased and gas tax collections and airport activity declined.

The reported changes from 1980 to 1981 in the 11 economic indicators were far from uniform. In some instances they varied geographically; in others, for instance, between types of telephone customers and housing permits. The ranges in the percentage changes of the 11 indicators are:

- 1. Airport passengers at the region's four fields were off from 1.9 percent at Fort Myers to 12.3 percent at Sarasota-Bradenton;
- 2. Telephone customers increased 6.1 percent in the residential sector and 13.7 percent in the commercial sector. Charlotte and Collier counties lead in the region;

- 3. Housing starts geographically declined from 46.6 percent in Charlotte County to 2.1 percent in Lee County and increased from 70.6 percent in Collier County to 7.3 percent in Glades County (single-family home starts regionally were off 17.6 percent, and multi-family starts were up 23.4 percent with the latter accounting for two-thirds of the total residential market - excluding mobile homes whereas three year ago it accounted for less than half);
- 4. Gross sales were regionally up 17.2 percent for the second vear:
- 5. Taxable sales were regionally up 16.2 percent for the second year;
- 6. Gas tax collections were regionally off 0.1 percent for the second year;
- 7. Consumer price index was regionally up 8.9 percent;
- 8. Unemployment was regionally up 2.6 percent as compared with 2.3 percent for the state (geographically Sarasota was hit hardest with an increase of 13.7 percent while Lee and Hendry counties bottomed out with only 2.2 percent increases);
- 9. Labor force increased regionally 6 percent as compared with 4.2 percent for the state;
- 10. Employed sector of the labor force increased regionally 3.1 percent on par with the state; and
- 11. Unemployed sector of the labor force increased 65.7 percent as compared with only 50.9 percent for the state (the region's three most agriculturally-oriented counties added more substantially to the increase).

The Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council's forecast for 1982 is; "a continuation of the current recessionary pattern with a decline in some indicators and slow growth in others.

"Growth will continue to occur in general, but at a slower rate than the preceding years, which were exceptionally

The January 1982 data for building, however, indicates that building permits continued to decline to a regional total of 778 - the lowest since 1976 -- with Lee, Glades and Hendry counties recording increases that may presage development shift away from the coastal areas.

Harry T. Cottman, a former agrticultural adviser to the state government, died Monday, March 15, 1982, at John Hopkins Hospital after a short illness.

Services for Cottman, who was 76 and had maintained homes in Pocomoke City, Md., and at 320 Palm Lake Drive, Sanibel, were held on March 20 at Cokesbury United Methodist Church in Pocomoke City, Md.

He was agricultural adviser to Maryland's Department of Budget and Fiscal Planning when he retired 11 years ago. This activity had extended over 25 years.

Earlier, he was employed by the Department of the Interior in Washington as assistant manager of the St. Elizabeth's Hospital farm. He was in charge of the dairy operations at the farm.

A native of Princess Anne, he was a graduate of Pocomoke City High School and the University of Maryland's agricultural school.

Cottman was a life member of the National Association of Institutional Farm-Food Managers. He was a member of the National Audubon Society and served in the society's Christmas bird count at Sanibel. He was also active in the Somerset County Historical Society.

While at the University of Maryland, he became a charter member of the local chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho, an agricultural fraternity.

He is survived by his wife, the former Dorothy Dryden; a brother, James Cottman, of Princess Anne; and several nieces and nephews.








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

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

Goss said that by having only one hearing for specific amendments the council might be accused of "railroading" items through. Under the current procedure everyone is guaranteed "total knowledge and total say so," he said.

The council discussed suggestions by the city's staff on ways to improve the general efficiency of the departments and relationships with the public and how to streamline the conduct of council meetings.

The council looked favorably on City Treasurer Mildred Howze's suggestion of placing minor matters such as a call for bids, acceptance of easements, committee appointments and first readings of ordinances on a "Consent Agenda."

All such items could be adopted simultaneously without discussion, which would reduce the length of the meeting. But any one councilman at the time of the meeting could request any item be removed from the Consent Agenda if he felt the issue required more attention.

White pointed out that, "Frequently debate on an issue goes on and on, and that is the fault of the council.

"Two or three (councilmen) like to talk," he added, to which Councilman Mike Klein responded "Amen."

Goss, who as mayor chairs the meetings, pointed out that, "Traditionally there are no rules for the meetings. The format has

always been very flexible.

"I have always felt strongly that to preserve the equality of all the councilman there should not be a strong chair," Goss said. "Any one councilman can shut off discussion.

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

The council liked his suggestion to issue all permits needed for a construction job to the prime contractor and to establish a fee for utility permits. It was the consensus that those items are administrative matters and are not in the legislative purview.

"This is just the kind of thing I've been talking about," Valtin said. "The council should not be discussing executive or administrative matters.'

But Goss was concerned about "how much latitude the city manager and staff should have in interpreting laws."

"That is the crux of this meeting," he said. 'How much is enough and how much is too

Planning Director Bruce Rogers supported Bowen's concept and recommended that CLUP be amended to to make a distinction between major and minor authority to issue permits for one-time amendment requests and to shorten the procedure for their adoption.

Performance standards for fences, which are becoming a problem, could be streamlined, he said, by exempting those that meet certain other standards from the front setback requirements.

Goss said fences are an inevitable consequence of growth as more and more people pursue privacy. He favored the suggested change.

Rogers said CLUP makes no distinction between a permanent (building) and a temporary structure (tent for a concert). Both need a development permit, he said.

He proposed that the council adopt an

ordinance giving the city manager the events.

Goss said it was absurd to try and apply land use standards to a concert and suggested the city manager expedite drawing up an ordinance but limit its application to non-profit, one-time events for community benefit.


Other measures Rogers suggested to streamline the permitting process include expanding the list of developments that can qualify for a short form permit, which eliminates a hearing before the Planning Commission; and requiring a single permit for installation of security lights, which currently requires both a development and electrical permit.

Code Inspector Richard Baker concurred that a single permit would be more desirable. The cost to the applicant could be reduced from \$55 to \$15 or \$20.

Baker said the requirement for a development permit to remove Brazilian Peppers on small improvement projects causes a "great deal of controversy."

Planning Commissioner Louise Johnson, who also serves on the Vegetation Committee, told Baker a subcommittee has been appointed to study the problem and will make a recommendation to the council.

Goss advised Baker reasonableness" in enforcing the requirement until some adjustment can be



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
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
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## ON THE WATER

The spotted sea trout is one of Florida's most popular game fish, but at this time of the year it starts to change some of its habits that might leave you wondering what happened when you go to your old reliable "trout hole."

There are endless stories I could tell you about these colorful fish that so many of us fish for, but for the newer anglers, the trout is great to eat, has two large front teeth and comes with green top of head, spots on the side and a yellow mouth. They range up to 30 inches, but must be 12 inches long to keep.

I have always suspected that the sea trout was named by early settlers after the northern fresh water speckled trout. They have the same spots on the sides.

There are actually two types of sea trout in our waters. The spotted, or speckled trout, is by far the most easily found, but there is the grey trout too. The greys have no spots and are nearly always found along the outside of the Islands in the Gulf of Mexico. Some people like the greys better for eating than the spotted, but I can't tell much difference — both are very mild and good eating.

A funny thing might happen if you have just gotten into trout fishing here in the waters of Sanibel and Captiva

Islands. When you reach your traditional trout fishing flats, those shallow waters where you usually find trout, you might not catch very many.

This is because it's spring and this time of the year, these colorful fish start to move off the waters of Pine Island Sound, and in the process, gang up to spawn.

Of course it's an annual thing, but we can never really predict when it will happen. We have had such a warm winter, over-all, that I would expect that all the fishing will be moved up including the annual trout spawning rites. So the trick is to find where the trout go to spawn and then present the right baits to take some good fish.

As I said earlier, the trout seem to leave the inside flats. They tend to end up on the outside, where sometimes hundreds of trout get into tight schools for spawning. Some of the guides call these trout "muds."

It doesn't happen very often, but being in the right place when one of these occur is a time you will never forget — any and every cast brings back a fish. It's hard to believe that you can catch a fish on every cast, but all of us who have fished it have seen it. The trout become so hungry that they strike any lure or bait, be it alive or dead.

One time last spring I went 15 trout for 15 casts, lost a couple then went 14 straight again. Now, that's good fishing. I might add that we kept only a total of a dozen fish or so and turned the rest back unharmed.

Beach anglers will encounter this fishing more, of course. Just where the trout will perform this annual mating rite is always more chance then by plan. There were a couple of spots near Redfish Pass that we used to fish which were productive, but now the sands have shifted and that area is no more.

The trout will be out in the Gulf for the next few weeks, then eventually will move back into the inside waters and resume their normal feeding cycles during the summer, fall and winter.

Some trout will always be found over the flats, so don't be discouraged if you fish for three hours and only catch a half dozen or so.

Finding a trout "mud" is truly unbelievable. It's one of those "can't miss" situations, but please remember to take only what fish you can use and release the others.



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
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



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
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## SHELLING TIPS

Did you ever notice that some of the best and most interesting items in a shell display aren't even shells at all?

Recently we talked about the crucifix shell that came from the head of a catfish, but this week let's talk about the odd shaped things you might see on the beach that will enhance your collection.

The other day, up on North Captiva Island, I came upon a shell that fits into that category. I had not seen one in a long time, and since the seas were high and the winds over 20 miles per hours, I figured that this one had made a long trip from the gulf to the shore.

It was rectangular shaped but with odd curved-in "fingers" on each end of it. The color was black and when shaken, it rattled.

We examined it and way back, I recalled that it was some kind of unusual egg case. I called a couple of friends when I got home and we came to about the same conclusion -- it was an egg case from either a skate or a shark.

Either way, it was a very interesting gift from the sea and makes a very good addition to other shells you might be

Actually, this is the time of the year that many of our locally found shells start the reproductive process. Shells are unusual in that some are male-female in the same shell, and others mate in separate shells. It's spring, and in any

language, even shell talk, the results are the same.

In addition to this strange casing from either a shark or skate, you might also come upon other egg cases and it's important that you know about these.

The first and more common that you will find is from the huge whelks that live in our waters. Each winter, the big females make their way into shallower waters and produce a string of eggs, which are encased in a protective structure which resembles an accordian. Only this one is a light brownish color and is joined by a "backbone" of tissue.

It is really ingenious to find that these primitive creatures take into account tides, winds, waves and currents, in addition to sunlight and salinity, to carefully lay these eggs in the right place so when the tiny whelks hatch they will be in an area where they can feed and get their start on the warm sandy bottom of the gulf or Pine Island Sound.

I am always amused to find that my charter groups are frightened by the harmless egg case. This is because wading the flats, the egg cases are found anchored in shallow water sands. When winds or tides move them, they look much like an underwater snake. You can imagine the

One word of caution here -- please don't pull out or touch these live, growing egg cases. They are our future for shelling in the Islands and some of those tiny, tiny eggs inside each capsule will have the ability to grow into productive adults.

There is another egg case that you just might encounter while on the beaches or the flats, and it's hardly ever found in as shallow a type of waters as the whelk egg case. This one comes from the Florida horse conch, the largest of all shells that once was found nearly everywhere on the Islands.

Over collection of the live horse conchs, which are a golden color in their younger years, has nearly resulted in the elimination of the species. It's a real pleasure to find a conch now, because I always take it from the beach and remove it to the deeper Gulf waters, out of harm and sheller's way, to try and let the conch catch up on its numbers.

The egg casing looks like a fancy clear ruffle and is often attached to pen shells. As with most egg cases, once they have been washed high upon the beach they are dead as far as further reproductive use goes. If you do find one dried out, take it for your collection.

Good shelling this week.

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide. For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and subtract hour and 16 minutes for each low tide. For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and four minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide. In between these points, gulf or hay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shelling.

Architectural historian Richard Campen winters on Sanibel. His book about the area, published by West Summit Press in Ohio, is Sanibel and Captiva: Enchanting Islands, which has just gone into its third printing.

Campen grew up in Ohio and attended Dartmouth College in New Hampshire. He graduated in 1934 with a bachelor's degree in chemistry and zoology. He later did graduate work at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.

He worked for Celanese Corporation and several companies of similar nature doing chemical research and developing different paints.

In April 1937 he married Helen Selden. The Campens have two sons, Richard and Selden, and five grandchildren.

In about 1967, Campen says, he revaluated his life and decided to change the focus of his career to his main interests – architecture, photography and writing. "We had saved our money and invested it," he explains, "so fortunately I was free to make that kind of choice."

They had always traveled widely; Campen took his German cameras everywhere and made many color slides, mostly of buildings and some other works of art such a paintings and sculptures. He sold his photographs to many colleges, art schools and schools of architecture for about 15 years.

"I sold thousands and thousands of slides," he remembers, "but I have given up on that now."

One of his first books, most of which are about the architecture of Ohio, was about a man named George Brown, an early stone mason in Gates Mills, Ohio, ("Which is sort of a horsey town," he says. "Somewhat like Captiva, only a little more exclusive than it is now."), who had created some unusual dwellings there.

He has written several books about Ohio architecture, especially in the northern part of the state and the Cleveland

Campen joined the Decorative Arts Trust and belongs to the Society of Architectural Historians, which holds conventions in various architecturally interesting cities, such as New Orleans, which Campen attends faithfully.

He finds the Carolinas pleasant and scenic places to visit because of the large number of intact ante-bellum homes there

The Campens also travel abroad, and recently went to Egypt. As is typical, they brought home many books about the treasures of the ancient kings of the Nile.

They collect art and have many works by local Island artists. Their collection includes tapestries and mobiles as well as paintings. Mrs. Campen makes wall hangings and does embroidery and needlepoint, not from kits, but from designs she draws herself.

One of Campen's more recent projects involved arranging for a series of art films at the Sundial. Topics included

printmakers, Andrew Wyeth, Edward Degas, Matisse and the Louvre art gallery in Paris.

Campen is a staunch believer, even in today's economy, of a liberal arts education.

"Knowing about history and literature and architecture will help you no matter what you do and no matter what job you find yourself in," he says. "For some people a degree in business administration for that specific skill is fine," he adds. "For a lot of others, though. it might be totally wrong."


Campen occasionally teaches courses at Hiram College in Hiram, Ohio. The Campens are only on the Islands for a few months of the year; they will return home later this month after several stops, including one in Camden, S.C., ("Just a very old and beautiful city that is not too well known.").

Campen's book on Sanibel and Captiva has pictures and text; the text is written almost in the form of a personal diary, with more subjective impressions in it than in some Island histories. In it he mentions many of the old Islanders, such as Clarence Rutland, who recently died.

He is obviously proud of the book. "I really like the feeling people are reading what I write," he says. "It is thrilling—and the book has sold over 10,000 copies, so I know people must like it.

"I just wanted to tell everyone how beautiful Sanibel and Captiva are and share that knowledge with others."

# THE WAY WE WERE

#### Five Years Ago April 1977

Many visiting naturalists and birdwatchers waxed disconsolate last week upon encountering a "road closed" sign at the entrance to the Main Tract of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge here on Sanibel.

Refuge officials were forced to close the popular wildlife drive through the main tract of the refuge at about 4:30 p.m. last Tuesday. In recent weeks, growing numbers of cars have gotten stuck in loose sand along the scenic wildlife drive — a result of the continuing and somewhat alarming drought conditions that have prevailed in Southwest Florida for much of the past few months.

Sanibel City Manager Bill Nungester reported last week that he has appointed city employee John Goode to the post of Director of the Engineering and Public Services Department for Sanibel's small but growing municipal bureaucracy.

A group of youngsters from the Children's Center of the Islands swept down over Sanibel's bay beach near their school to gather up cans, bottles, paper litter and other manmade debris that had accumulated along the shore through the carelessness of boaters and beachgoers on and around the Island. The young students from the Children's Center went about their work with high spirits and even managed to make a game of it.

Despite pressure from many Island residents concerned about the indiscriminate live-shell collecting that has been witnessed on Sanibel's beaches over the past winter, the Sanibel City Council decided to assign a relatively low priority to the pursuit of a proposal to ban the taking of live shells from city beaches and from the waters surrounding Sanibel

Islander Paul Howe argued in behalf of the need for the council to enact tight controls on live shelling in the city to prevent any further abuses such as those which have been reported in recent months.

#### Ten Years Ago April 1972

A recent survey by United Press International indicates that long curly locks for males have just about seen their day. The fad came in with the Beatles and appears to be going out with them.

United Nations Secretary Gen. Kurt Waldheim and his family are spending a three-day vacation at The Colony on Sanibel. The Austrian family flew here from New York. "We love it here," said Mrs. Waldheim.

The apparent low bid for construction of the new Sanibel Island fishing pier was \$27,000. Three county commissioners expressed surprise when they opened the bids last week that the offers were not lower.

The new pier is to be built 300 feet west of the old fishing pier near the Sanibel Lighthouse and will extend 162 feet into San Carlos Bay and has received approval from all required state and federal agencies.





Fifteen Years Ago

April 1967

# Poisonous cucumbers of Sanibel

An intriguing little vine native to tropical Africa and Asia ass escaped in our South and is doing quite well in disturbed areas of Sanibel Island.


The Wild Baisam Apple is not an apple at all but is really a strange cucumber, being a member of that useful family Cucurbitaceae which includes squash, pumpkins and melons as well as the familiar pickle fruit.

Momordica charantia, however, commands caution. Don't just pop the delicious-looking bright orange fruit into your mouth, for it has poisonous parts. In fact, most of it is poisonous. The fruit may be one and one-half to two inches long and perhaps an inch in diameter, furrowed lengthwise and pointed at both ends, with lots of tubercles all over its surface.

When ripe, the fruit opens at the flower end and splits longitudinally into several parts. The outer bright orange "shell" or husk rolls backward, exposing the seeds, each of which is encased in a soft, bright scarlet material – the aril.

Right here and now let me emphasize that the seeds are oisonous. The orange husk is poisonous. The scarlet aril is tasty and edible. But one must use care in enjoying this wild food. It is all right to suck the seeds and consume the scarlet arils, but be sure not to swallow any seeds or orange husk or you will experience a very bitter taste and may become quite ill, with vomiting and diarrhea the principal symptoms.

This wild cucumber is a delicate vining plant with fine tendrils and palmately-lobed three-to-four inch simple leaves. Usually there are five lobes, but sometimes seven often the lobes are edged with notches. The leaves are dull green and pubescent beneath. Vines may be six or eight feet



long - often growing in such profusion as to completely cover small shrubs and low trees. The flowers are solitary and are a conspicuous yellow. In fact, either in bloom or in fruit, this plant is not hard to find.

Although wild on Sanibel, it is often grown in the tropics to cover a trellis or to shade a verandah. In China it is grown for food and medicine. Chinese are said to eat the unripe fruit which is prepared by boiling. (But I do not suggest experimentation!) The Chinese also eat the pulpy arils. Lakwa rind, as it is called in Cantonese, or Mu-pieh-tzu in Mandarin, is used in traditional medicine.

A Barefoot Doctor's Manual, the official Chinese paramedical manual, confirms the bitter taste of Momordica but states that it stimulates digestive function, detoxifies the G.I. tract (I can't see how!) and "promotes a good appetite to put on weight." It is used in China as an anthelmintic in little children and for enteritis and dysentery. Seeds are prepared for topical use in treating moles. The Chinese state that internal uses should be approached with caution.

Chinese traditional medicine is gaining respectability in

the West. I have observed on my two recent visits to China that Western doctors are listening whereas in the past they merely scoffed.

I venture to suggest that A Barefoot Doctor's Manual deserves close study by our scientific health care community. Thousands of botanical and animal products are discussed. Without doubt, some of these merit consideration of possible uses in our country.

Another plant, sometimes assigned to Momordica is the explosive M. elaterium, whose oblong prickly fruit, when ripe, literally squirts out its seeds when touched or disturbed by the wind. Internal hydraulic pressure, suddenly triggered, throws the seeds for substantial distances.

Because of its behavior, some early botanists called this strange cucumber M. asininus. For generations, an abstract of this plant, Trituratio Elaterini, was listed in the British Pharmacopoeia as a powerful cathartic.

The next time you see a wide-open, ripe Balsam Apple, you may try its tasty scarlet arils, but do use care - avoid eating any of the rest of the poisonous beauty.

# CROW celebrates opening of facility

The new CROW facility on Sanibel-Captiva Road was open to the public Sunday so Islanders could catch a rare glimpse of the 10-acre tract, housing, and small but dedicated staff that cares for the Island's sick and injured birds and animals.

CROW staffers are still busy moving their headquarters from Captiva to Sanibel, and there is a long list of chores, tasks and projects that CROW head Holly Davies would like to see undertaken as soon as volunteers come forward to help out:

Some of the projects include building cages,

clearing Brazilian peppers, researching and general cleaning.

"We'd like people to call if they're interested. The more volunteers we have, the more we can do," Davies said.


Some of the most urgently needed items on a CROW "Wish List" include lab caging, reed fencing, aluminum ladders, a gram scale, an incubator and any clinical equipment.

In addition, CROW hopes to start a college intern program in which staffers would work with students caring for injured wildlife and undertaking research projects. Sunday also marked longtime CROW staffer Vicci Dwyer's last day with the organization. After nearly five years with CROW, Vicci is leaving for a farm in upstate New York.

"It's going to be tough without Vicci," said Davies, who, along with new staffer Heidi Heinrich, handles the work and patient load. Last year more than 500 sick and injured animals were treated at CROW. The facility currently has about 20 patients.



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

## SCCF programs end with water re-use talk

In the "last show of the season" at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Center last Tuesday afternoon, water re-use, a matter of growing concern to the Southwest and eventually to all of America was discussed by an expert in the field.

Although there is still plenty of "potable" water -- water you can drink with no ill effects to your system -- water shortages for industrial use and also for such things such as watering lawns are growng more common, especially in states like Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, said Bill Cooper, who heads a research laboratory at Florida International University.

Cooper is studying for his doctorate in chemical oceanography at the University of Maine. He has bachelor's and master's flushing) makes up only about 23 percent of degrees from Allegheny College and Penn the 700 billion gallons of water used every State University. Cooper's from Allegheny College, introduced Cooper to the audience.

Cooper began his talk, which included a slide show, by saying that a 1980 study sponsored by the Carter adminstration showed the Southwest and parts of Wisconsin and Illinois would have critical water shortages by the year 2000.

He said after the talk that it is possible that by 2000 the government might put restrictions on water use, such as each home being allotted only so much non-potable water -- "Perhaps a shower only every other day," he said.

However, families are not the real culprits in the water crisis, he said. Private water use averaging about 100 gallons a day per person (50 percent of that is from toilet day in this country. Industry and agriculture States will go up to about a trillion and half gallons -- twice what is is now, according to

"We use and waste water like it is not a resource," he explained. "And it is certainly a bargain. What other resource can you have delivered to your door and costs you around \$2.50 for 21/2 tons?"

Area water rates are not as realistic as they should be, Cooper said. However, as Lake Okeechobee goes down, rates will go up and will perhaps induce a more sensible attitude toward water use, much as the gasoline crises of 1973 and 1979 did to the use

Cooper said the solution to water problems will eventually have to be the cheap desalinization of sea-water. The process can be done now, but only by the long and tedious process of evaporation and re-condensing.

He said the laboratory he heads at Florida

By 2000 or so, usage per day in the United International University is developing a process right now using sand filters, a standard method to get solid suspended particles out of sewage water, for example, so it can be used again to water your garden. and involving raising the temperature of the salt water by 10 degrees.

He did not completely explain the process; it is still a secret, and will be until July, when it is expected to be completely developed. However, he did say the process may reolutionize the water business to the point where there won't be any water shortages until, he said, "pretty far into the future, because there is a lot of ocean.'

Conservation Center Manager Steve Phillips spoke to the group gathered for the final Tuesday at the Center program and urged everyone to return next November when the programs resume.

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
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

#### Dead alligator found, gunshots suspected

A 10-foot alligator was found dead in a Beachview Country Club pond on Thursday afternoon, March 31. The gator apparently died from two gunshot wounds, according to Conservation Sanibel-Captiva Center Manager Steve Phillips.

Although the cause of the alligator's death is not confirmed, Phillips said he strongly suspects the gator was shot. He said there were no marks on the animal other than two

holes in his side.

"I don't know what else could have killed a gator this big," he said. "There have been a lot of people feeding alligators and a lot of poaching in that area," he added.

The alligator was buried and will be exhumed and examined after it has decomposed sufficiently to allow officials to find any bullets.




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
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#### Island artist recovering from accident

Artist Gregory Pastorius, who suffered near-fatal injuries in a motorcycle accident on Feb. 24, is on the slow road to recovery. He is still hospitalized but has started physical therapy to give strength to his healing bones.

Pastorius has no medical coverage, and since the accident there has been an outpouring of support, both emotional and financial, from friends and relatives. A benefit concert in his home town of Fort Lauderdale raised over \$2,000, drawing hundreds of people to hear the jazz sounds of many local musicians, including his brother, renowned bass player Jaco Pastorius.

On Sanibel, Wings Wildlife T-Shirt Shop is turning over profits from the sale of Greg's dolphin designs to help Pastorius with rent and expenses.

"We care very much about Greg. It gives us a good feeling to know we can help out." said Gail Boggs of Wings. Thus far, more than \$200 has been raised from the sale of his

The shop, which carries silkscreened wildlife t-shirts, is donating between three and five dollars per shirt for Pastorius' two dolphin designs, which are pictured here. The short sleeve sells for \$9.50, and the longsleeve is priced at \$12.95.

Sales have been brisk, Boggs said, even though most customers are not aware of the situation.



Pastorius, who designed and silkscreened shirts for Wings at LeeCo Industries in South Fort Myers, also creates artwork in many mediums, including painting, free-standing clay sculpture, pencil drawings and film. He had been working on the organization for the recent CROW benefit when, coming home to complete the publicity artwork, his motorcycle crossed the road on Lindgren Boulevard, hit the wall of the canal and threw him to the other embankment.

Pastorius suffered serious injuries, including a punctured lung, broken ribs; wrist, and legs. Saved by the quick work of Sanibel's medics, he was in intensive care for 12 days at Lee Memorial Hospital, where he is now beginning therapy. He will continue therapy at Shell Point Village after his expected release and return to Sanibel in about three weeks.

"People have just been fantastic," Noon said of the community response to the new complex.

Donations for the Weymouth print will be used to purchase a set of AMF free weights and possibly a Computrim exercycle, which measures a person's heart rate and body tolerance level.

The complex is open daily from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 5 p.m., and weekends from 1 to 5 p.m. For further information call 472-0345

#### CAMPING, BEACH FIRES

Camping on the beach is prohibited, as are open beach

An exemption to the beach fire ordinance is a fire in an ap-proved cooking container (not to exceed 48" x 24" x 12" deep) with an extruded metal grill for non-commercial food preparation. This type of container will be allowed on the beach without a permit.

After you have had your beach party, it is rcommended that you assume the responsibility for cleaning up any debris or litter in your area.

#### BICYCLING

If you aren't used to a lot of bicycle traffic, watch out on Sanibel. The extensive network of bike paths on the Island is clearly marked along the edge

Observe caution when driving near the bike path. A state law and city ordinance combine to prohibit parking or driving on the bike path. Mopeds are not permitted on the bike paths.

Planning on spending some time on a bike to enjoy the Island sun and sights! Make sure your vehicle is equipped with a bike flag, horn, good brakes and a light for night riding.






