Qualifying period opens for City Council candidates

Candidates seeking to qualify for election to two City Council seats can pick up their election packets at the office of Deputy City Clerk Mildred Howze office in City Hall beginning at noon today

The nominating petition with the signatures of at least 15 registered Sanibel voters certified as valid by the Lee County Supervisor of Elections must be returned to Howze before noon on Tuesday, Sept. 14.

To qualify to run in the Nov. 2 general election for Seats 4 and 5, which are currently held by Duane White and Porter Goss, a candidate must be a resident of the city of Sanibel and a qualified registered elector of the state of Florida.

The nominating petition must specify which seat the candidate is vying for.

If no candidate receives a majority vote on Nov. 2, the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for each seat will be placed on the ballot for a runoff election on Nov. 16.

Each Friday after qualifying the candidate must submit a campaign treasurer's report listing contributions and expenditures during the previous week until Election Day Nov. 2 and, if a run-off is necessary, through Nov. 16. A notary public will be available at City Hall to notarize the treasurer's reports, Howze said.

Contributions from any person or political committee to a candidate's campaign are limited to \$1,000. Contributions in cash or by cashier's check are limited to \$100, Howze stressed.

All political advertising and campaign literature must be identified as "paid political advertising."


Shell Harbor Inn files suit

Shell Harbor Inn has filed a lawsuit in Lee County Circuit Court seeking a writ of certiorari to compell the Sanibel Planning Commission to amend a development permit issued July 28 and to allow a 200-seat restaurant at the gulfside resort.

The suit charges that the commission's action in imposing a condition on the permit limiting the capacity of the restaurant to 75 seats is "unreasonable and arbitrary."

The plaintiff, John Armenia, as trustee for the Shell Harbor Inn, is also asking the court to "command" the Planning Commission to remove 20 other conditions "not continued page 23A








Most Islanders own a television set, and most of us cannot resist the impulse to turn it on. After all, mankind has never been able to resist temptation.

Throughout history, we have eaten forbidden fruit, opened Pandora's box and coveted that which we should not covet. Thus, turning on the TV is relatively civilized child's play by comparison.

The influence of television in our Island homes may sometimes be pernicious. For the most part, however, it is just plain insipidly insidious. Gone are the days when "a child learns more at its mother's knee that at any other joint." The boob tube has replaced mother's bony joint.

Television performers have absolutely no regard for the English language, although our method of communication is what (theoretically) places homo sapiens at the very apex of the animal kingdom. On television, the language of the great bard of Avon is misused, mispronounced and grammatically massacred with gay abandon.

Thus, one Tuesday in February our favorite newscaster informs us that he is bringing us all the nooze on the chilly **Toozeday** in Febuary. After all, only the British still make a nice distinction between "new" and "noo" – although such picayune distinctions did absolutely nothing to prevent the sun from setting on the British Empire.

The British did manage to keep the Falklands, however.

That was quite a feat, for American noozemen had then fighting three enemies simultaneously: the Argenteens, the Argentynes, and the Argentinians.

My grandfather liked to joke about all the things "up with which I will not put." In his great wisdom, he realized Americans would forever end sentences with prepositions if they had a mind to (do so). I wonder, however, whether this distinguished educator would have been so indulgent had he lived to hear what TV has done to our fine, hissing "s" and our smashing "x". Whatever happened to these wonderful sounds?

Well, the hissing "s" has been abzorbed. The most abzorbant abzorber of all is something called the Quicker-Picker-Upper. It abzorbs the coffee that Karl Klutz keeps slopping all over the counter.

If one is not captivated by some program on television, the ads may succeed where the shows have failed. I suspect that I may be one of those people who is somewhat susceptible to ads -- especially those that suggest life's vale of tears is not without hope.

Three ads have recently appealed to three very different human desires: the need to be loved, the desire to dine out inexpensively and the wish to win a fortune without investing a cent.



Police chief commends Captivans for rescue efforts at Blind Pass

This letter is our departmental way of recognizing and commending your action that may have saved the lives of two men who had been body surfing in the Blind Pass current and were carried out into the Gulf of Mexico.

On Wednesday, Aug. 18, 1982 at 4 p.m. our department received a call on emergency call box 43 from a citizen requesting assistance as three persons were caught in a strong outgoing tide and could not swim back to shore.

As you know, you had just arrived at the Blind Pass area when you observed two men approximately 250 yards offshore struggling in the water. Your quick response with your surfboards enabled you to rescue the men and bring them ashore, where they were found to be completely exhausted. The third



Commission approves City Hall development permit

The Planning Commission last week property, and that a "few trees" should be approved a development permit for the city to construct a \$1.5 million municipal complex on a 22-acre site north of Periwinkle Way between Dunlop Road and Wooster Lane.

But the commissioners added as a condition of approval that the 14,000-squarefoot City Hall building be moved 30 feet to the east to leave room for future expansion on the western shore of the lake that borders the property.

Commissioner Larry Simon pointed out that the slight shift in location would "leave latitude for expansion in all directions."

In addition, the commission suggested that a 15-foot vegetation buffer be planted along the western boundary of the property as a screen for adjoining residential planted in the overflow parking area that has been cleared of vegetation.

Shifting the site of the main building will also change the location of the fuel station and service road, which some commissioners and City Council members have thought was "dangerously close" to the outdoor community events area.

Acting City Manager Gary Price said a problem spotted by Commissioner Emily Barefield has been corrected. On the original plans restrooms serving the council chambers opened only on to an outside balcony.

Price said access from inside the council chambers is now provided through a utility closet with small metal doors that will be opened only when the council chambers are being used as a "refuge of last resort." He congratulated Barefield on her"sharp eyesight.'

The Police Department and City Council chambers (MacKenzie Hall) will be in the portion of the building specially constructed to serve as a refuge during a hurricane or other disaster.

Also in the main building will be offices of the Law, Finance, Planning and Building departments, the City Council and City Manager.

The main office facility will be constructed of wood at an elevation of 17 feet Mean Sea Level around a courtyard. An elevator will make the facility accessible to the handicapped.

On-site accessory uses proposed for the complex include the Police Department's

radio dispatcher tower and evidence storage area, the city plant nursery, city vehicle fuel station, an outdoor community events area and the Rutland House Old Settlers Museum.

There will be parking spaces for 67 cars near the principal structure, and a large cleared area on the northwest corner of the site will accommodate overflow parking.

The proposed development will use 3.5 acres of the city-owned property.

Bids for construction have been advertised, Price said, and 21 contractors have already paid \$100 for copies of the plans.

The bids will be opened on Sept. 14 and will be submitted to the council for approval on Sept. 21.

Target date for completion of the facility is September 1983.

Commission says no to miniature golf proposal

An 18-hole miniature golf course in a 'Pirate Island theme'' is not an appropriate use of commercial property on Periwinkle Way, the Planning Commission agreed last week.

With that concensus, the commission unanimously turned down Dwight and Denise Johnson's plan to bring such a golfing amusement to Sanibel.

The commissioners saw eye-to-eye on the need to protect nature-oriented tourism as Sanibel's economic base and to encourage alternatives for commercial development on Periwinkle Way, both of which are objectives of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

"This puts a big burgen on Allen Nave and leaves him only 3,500 more square feet in Sanibel Square for commercial development," Johnson said.

Nave said, too, it was quite a shock to learn that 7,500 instead of 2,100 square feet would be deleted from his commercial space allotment.

Planner Ken Pfalzer explained that the 18hole golf course is more than the 0.92-acre site can suport, and the estimated 75 people who would use the golf course at one time is more activity than permitted on any other acre on Sanibel.

Johnson, a Fort Myers Beach general contractor, said he was aware of Sanibel's goals and is himself sensitive to nature.

The family-oriented project he planned would be low key and in good taste -- nothing garish, he explained.

"It would give both the tourists and residents something else to do," he pointed out

Unhappy with the commission's final decision, Johnson said the Planning Department had lead him to believe that if the project complied with all the rules and regulations of the land use plan it would be approved.

The planning staff did recommend approval of the project subject to 11 conditions, if the Planning Commmission found the proposed miniature golf course to be 'similar in character, size, intensity and impact to those uses listed for the commercial area."

Johnson found excessive the planners' estimate that the intensity of use for the 2,100 square-feet occupied by the golf course and an 100-square-foot concession building is the same as 7,500 square feet of retail space.

"This project has a Coney Island flavor," he added. "It smacks of a Sanibel Bushy Gardens. If we allow this, bumper cars will be next.'

Commissioner Bill Hagerup, who at first viewed the project as a possible asset for vacationers, said Simon persuaded him that it is not a compatible use.

"I don't think it's a recreational facility in keeping with the Island atmosphere," Hagerup conceded.

Simon's motion to deny the development passed by a 5-0 vote. Commissioners Louise Johnson and Arthur Wycoff were absent.

A disappointed Johnson, pointing out that even though he had met all the criteria. he was "shot down 100 percent." Johnson added he thought the decision was made on 'feelings.'

The commission decision is final for one year, Planning Director Bruce Rogers told Johnson.

Plan approved to streamline amendment process

A proposed general amendment to the right to appeal denial of a development procedure for specific amendments seeking Comprehensive Land Use Plan that is designed to shorten the time required for an applicant to obtain a specific amendment and streamline the procedure won Planning Commission approval last week.

the commission's role in the specific amendment decision-making process by eliminating the council's involvment in all requests for relief from CLUP development regulations except those for permitted uses, residential densities, flood and storm proofing or Coastal Construction Setback Line provisions.

The commission's decision will be final on all requests for minor deviations to CLUP, but in the event of a denial the applicant will have the right to appeal to the council. The ordinance also gives an applicant the

permit to the council. Currently the commission's decision is final.

Commissioner Bill Hagerup lauded this change.

"I've always felt an appointed body (such The proposed ordinance will strengthen as the Planning Commission) should not have the right to turn down a citizen without recourse to an elected body (the City Council)," Hagerup said.

The ordinance provides that the aggrieved party may file an appeal of any commission denial with the city manager within 10 days of the Planning Commission action.

The date, time and place of the City Council hearing on the appeal shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation at least five days prior to such hearing.

The ordinance does not change the current

major changes. One hearing before the Planning Commission and two hearings before the City Council will still be required for those cases.

The ordinance was written by City Attorney Neal Bowen. It stemmed from the council's efforts to "cut red tape and rigamarole" in the administration of city government.

Bowen suggested during a workshop on the subject giving the Planning Commission authority to act unilaterally on minor deviations from development requirements (such as encroachments on property lines and rights-of way by boat davits or roof overhangs that are inches too wide) would shorten and simplify the special amendment procedure.


Currently the process takes three to four

months.

The proposal does not change the current general amendment process, Planning Director Bruce Rogers said, except to increase from 20 to 450 the acreage that must be involved in a request before it will be considered a general rather than a specific amendment.

This provision brings Sanibel into line with state statute, Chapter 163, and will decrease the number of CLUP amendments that need state, regional and county review, Rogers said.



ON THE WATER

Probably the greatest thing I like about saltwater fishing is the variety. Using shrimp, most any time of the year it's not unusual to catch six or eight kinds of fish. You never really know what you'll pull in.

I find it interesting to talk with anglers from around the country who often are geared to look for and maybe catch only one kind of fish. That's got to be boring at times, but when it's the only game in town, you either get good at it or take up golf.

There are parts of the country where freshwater trout fishing is more like a cult than a sport. One of my favorite fishing catalogues comes from Vermont and is put out by the Orvis people. Orvis makes rods, related fishing equipment and tackle, especially fly fishing gear.

There are people who read and order stuff from this company and none other. Once I had a fellow on charter who wore all Orvis clothes, had an official Orvis fishing bag (which looked a great deal like a duffle bag to me) and of course, a graphite spinning rod with matching reel that cost close to \$200.

One thing I always say about Orvis -- you pay a lot, but you get good equipment, probably as good as any place. Either

way, no serious angler chasing trout up in those northern Vermont streams would miss out on using Orvis or that type of tackle. But still, they are basically one-fish anglers who maybe chase perch or bass chased when the trout aren't cooperating.

I find the same thing from folks who live in the New York or New Jersey areas. They are blue fish people. As far as they are concered, there is no snook in the world that will pull like a 20-pound blue. And you know, they might be right.

But you ask, "You mean you eat those blues that weigh 20 pounds?" and they usually start out with something like, ..er, well, they aren't all that bad. I heard of a guy that ate one once."

Our blues are in the two- to three-pound catagory, but even at that size they are great fun to catch and eat, too.

And you know, there are those up around Cape Cod who are nuts over striped bass. The numbers caught are much like our snook - poor and getting worse. But they think the fish will come back, based on cycles of good and bad years.

Many anglers in the center part of the country go out for catfish, which is all that can live in some of those muddy waters. Catfish that weigh in at more than 50 pounds are caught, and one person told me the fish would serve the whole neighborhood for a meal. Good eating and a strong fighting fish, too.

But here around Sanibel and Captiva Islands, you aren't a one-fish person unless you choose to only go after tarpon, snook or cobia or whatever.

Most of us are open to suggestions, and if the trout are biting out on the flats we are after them. When October rolls around and the waters cook, it will be Spanish mackerel and blue fish time, with ladyfish, jacks, bonito and perhaps a king mackerel thrown in. And don't forget about those fall runs of the big redfish.

Grouper get going closer to shore when the water temps drop, and most anytime on the inside of the Islands you can catch a big jack that will attempt to bust your rod or steal all your line. And you will certainly catch a catfish, the saltwater variety. Put that back and do the same with lizzard fish, pin fish, sugar trout and grunts.

You've got the best choice of fish around. Sure, not all are for eating, but all are fun to catch. Good fishing this week, and please only take what you need and turn the rest back.

I saw recently where this golfer took a few minutes out of his round to rest next to a quiet pond of water and looked down to see none other than a junonia! I'm "still lookin" for mine, but the discovery shows that some very good shells turn up in strange places.

Remember that these Islands, Sanibel and Captiva, are built of sand and shell for the most part. They began as sand bars, and on those bars were shells. As the Islands grew and acquired more sand, the layering took place.

In the Wulfert Point area where I live, the top soil is nearly non-existent, and the same goes for much of the surrounding land. But it is high back here from other Island elevation standards, and nearly anywhere you dig you will find old, whitened king's crowns, whelks, tulips and many, many clams like the ponderous arks and common arks.

Our road is dirt, and on occasion the city of Sanibel sends down a road grader to smooth out the lumps and bumps. It's not unusual at all to see new shells on the side of the road that the grader has moved. Now, don't get too enthused -these aren't very good shells at all. They have been buried for years, how long we'll probably never know. The point is to look around the Island, not just along the beach, in your search for shells.

I recall some folks telling me they check over any excavation sites where workers might be digging drainage systems or doing some other construction work. Those large pieces of equipment can turn up some interesting items.

SHELLING TIPS

If you are a homeowner on the Islands, you most probably have dug up whole shells when you are gardening. In our backyard we have about 18 inches of shell, mostly arks, then we have a foot or so of pure sand. I believe that means a beach here was covered with a shell line. Below that layer of sand is another layer of shells, mostly the same kind.

You never know where shells will appear on the beaches. The obvious place to look is right at the water line, where most people walk and where many of the best shells are found.


But particularly after a big storm, no matter whether it's January or June, I check that farthest reach of the storm waves. Sometimes even heavy shells will roll way up on the beach. Coupled with high tide, shells can reach even well into the vegetation line.


While the first shellers on the beach after a storm check the water's edge, I always wander on up to that high tide line. If you are a pack rat collector who looks for driftwood, old crab traps and the like, this area always works best. Some of the lightest shells such as sea urchins and sand dollars often make that long ride to the grass line in heavy weather

Your chances of finding a really good shell are just about as good as the next person's if you put in the time to walk the beaches and patiently look for collectable specimens.

There are no secret places to go, or we would all be there right now. A junonia turns up on a water hole of a golf course and another might wash ashore to your feet down at the Lighthouse. There's no logic to it -- probably why shelling is so popular, don't you think?





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

sways easily in a seasoned wicker rocker on the screened porch of the Captiva home he built in 1945.

"I'd rather have a piece of fish and cold combread right here than go out to any fancy restaurant," he says matterof-factly.

"Right here" is Johnson's yellow frame house that sits off the Gulf of Mexico just before the curve at Jensen's. His original house on Captiva was behind the yellow house, but the hurricane in 1944 carried it away.

Never mind the threat of another hurricane or the loaded dump trucks that grind down the road or the compact rental cars that block Belton's gulf view nowadays. Johnson is on Captiva to stay -- just as he has been since he "moved up from Sanibel" in 1935.

"I've enjoyed the country," he says. "Been to a dude ranch called Dead Mule Camp in Montana and even lived on Coney Island.

"But we've got something right here on Captiva that's good for everybody. We have it in unlimited supply," he adds. "And you can't get it in those other places."

That special something, Johnson explains, is the salty breeze that blows off the gulf right into his frame house. "Feel it?" he asks as he cocks his head in a cue for his guests to hone their senses. "I just think that can't help but The gulf breezes have been good to both Johnson and his wife of 40 years, Miriam. "She's the best thing that ever happened to me," he says about his wife. "I didn't get married until I was too old to stop running from the women; it's lucky for me Miriam's the one who caught me."

Johnson is also grateful for Miriam's daughter and three grandchildren. "They all seem to like me," he says as though that fact surprises him. His eyes twinkle and a mischievous grin grows as he adds, "They just don't know any better."

Johnson's droll humor pervades his conversation and makes a delightful story of every account he relates.

His first job on Sanibel was picking tomatoes for Francis Bailey's father. In 1914, when he was 18, Belton started as one of Sanibel's first fishing guides. From then on he spent most of his working days on boats from pleasure crafts to harbor tugs.

"You know they say a saltwater sailor has so much salt on his back he can't pull his shirt off," he says, adding, "I don't believe it myself.

"Just like I don't believe the fog gets so thick in England the cows have to get down on their knees to feed.

"I heard that once," he adds as an afterthought. "Don't believe everything you hear."

found out I didn't know anything about it," he says. "But I do know that there's as good fishing out from Redfish Pass as any I've seen in my life. I love fish and I love to fish."

Johnson reads the Bible every day and believes the Book just as it is written. "There are so many deep things to think about," he says. "I don't look for errors in the Bible."

Miriam held Sunday School classes in the Johnson's home before the Baptist Church was built. The couple attended church services every week until Belton's hearing started to fail.

"Now I get wonderful sermons right here on television," he says. "And I can turn the sound up as loud as I want." Belton's Baptist friends are sometimes taken aback by his offer for a "Belton Johnson Highball" when they are guests at his house. "It's good for you," he promises as he makes his way to the kitchen.

Shortly after he returns with two Pepsi's on the rocks. "Straight from the bottle," he says with a smile. "We can weaken it with a little bourbon if it's too strong for you." The changes on Captiva over the years do not upset Johnson's style, perhaps because of the philosophy he adopted long ago. "I don't let anything worry me that I can't

Alert radios available now through Sanibel Police

Specially adapted alert radios that will keep Islanders advised of emergency situations are avaible now through the Sanibel Police Department.

Twenty radios are already placed around Sanibel in Neighborhood Watch leaders' and EPERT notification captains' homes. So far the system has worked without a hitch and has received an enthusiastic response from the recipients, Off. Jack Primm said this week.

"I haven't had one negative comment about the radios," Primm, who is coordinating the radio network, said. He issued radios to 16 Neighborhood Watch leaders

two weeks ago. Since then two tests have been run and two actual alerts have been issued over the frequency.

Primm said the Police Department issued a weather advisory over the radios last Thursday giving details of flooding on Island streets because of heavy rains that day. The department also used the radios to advise Islanders of a power outage last week.

Adapted with special crystals, the radios monitor only the Sanibel police frequency that broadcasts weather alerts and other local emergencies. They run on either batteries or electricity and are equipped with a siren that sounds when important information is about to be broadcast.

Primm said he hopes to issue a radio to for \$56 should fill out the order form on this every home and business on Sanibel. Captivans are also more than welcome to purchase the radios. He added, however, that some locations on Captiva might experience difficulty receiving the signal.

The radio program was initiated to facilitate the fast relay of up-to-date information in hurricane situations. But Primm said he hopes the radios will eventually be used to advise Island residents and businesses of all types of emergencies.

"The possibilities are wide," he said. "We're just going to have to see how people take to it."

"He's been coming here for quite a while to eat," Belton says about the cat that chases lizards by the front steps. "But he won't come in the house for anything else. I don't call that a pet."



Named as defendants in the suit that was filed Aug. 23 in circuit court are Planning Commission members Ann Winterbotham, Arthur Wycoff, Larry Simon, Louise Johnson, William Hagerup, Emily Barefield and Harold Schuyler.

In a related action Armenia's attorney, William Haverfield, has filed a motion asking the court to enforce the final judgment, handed down in June 1980 by Circuit Judge Thomas Reese, of a settlement stipulation between the city of Sanibel and David and Rudolfine Holtzman, former owners of Shell Harbor Inn.

Under terms of that settlement the Holtzmans were granted an increase in density to permit construction of 29 additional motel units at Shell Harbor Inn resort, and their right to operate a restaurant as a resort accessory use of the property was recognized.

Haverfield's complaint charges that the city has failed and refused to comply with the terms of that settlement by limiting the size of the restaurant to 75 seats, "approximately one-third the size of the restaurant originally contemplated."

The motion also charges that 20 additional conditions placed on the development permit for the Shell Harbor Inn restaurant, issued July 28, "place such unwarranted restrictions (on the restauarant) so as to frustrate the intent and benefit granted (to the Holtzmans)."

The motion asks the court to require the city of Sanibel to

unreasonable and arbitrary restrictions.'

Last February the Holtzmans first applied for a development permit to build a 3,836-square foot, 200-seat restaurant at the inn.

At a first hearing before the Planning Commission on April 26, Armenia, representing owner David Holtzman. submitted a report from a hotel-restaurant consultant justifying the need for a 200-seat restaurant based on a study of the Shell Harbor Inn operation.

Based on Armenia's estimated occupancy of 300 guests, the planning staff found that 50 seats would be sufficient to fill the dining needs of the resort's guests.

The hearing was continued to May 24, when hotel consultant Joseph Gregg's reams of statistics failed to convince planning commissioners that the inn could support a restaurant of 200 seats.

The commission voted to permit a 75-seat restaurant at Shell Harbor Inn, the same size the City Council had approved for a small deli-style restaurant in Jerry Paulsen's proposed shopping center.

In May Armenia and the Shell Harbor Group, Inc. purchased the resort from Holtzman.

On June 28 Duke Schneider, vice president of the group, apeared before the commission seeking a clarification of why the Planning Department had refused to issue a development permit for the 3,836-square-foot restaurant.

The commissioners agreed that their May 24 action was only an affirmation of the 75-seat limitation and they had not

intended it as approval of the development permit for the restaurant.

Finally on July 12 the commission voted to approve the development permit subject to 21 conditions recommended by the Planning Department.

Failure to issue a development permit within 30 days after the conclusion of the hearing is in conflict with a CLUI proviosion, the suit charges. Armenia asserts that the 30 day limitation date expired on June 23 and that addition of 20 additional conditions to the permit on July 12 was "an after-the-fact revision."

The suit further charges that the Planning Commission "attempted to exercise powers far in excess of those granted to it by the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.'

Limiting the restaurant to 75 seats was one of the 21 conditions imposed on the July 28 development permit to construct the restaurant.

But the suit claims this is an invalid condition because there is "nothing in the Comprehensive Land Use Plan that allows the Planning Commission to limit the scating capacity to 75."


The suit objects to the remaining 20 conditions because they were not imposed on the development permit when it was originally granted May 24.

City Attorney Neal Bowen, authorized by the City Council to defend the suit, has 20 days to answer the complaint.

The suit has been assigned to an appelate bank of three Lee County Circuit judges with Circuit Judge Charles Carlton scheduled to bring in the first opinion. Also involved will be circuit Judges William Nelson and Ted Brousseau.

The popular and beautiful Daturas

On Sanibel we have several species of Datura that are grown for the beauty of their showy, large (sometimes very large), often heavily scented flower.

For hundreds, maybe thousands of years Daturas have been grown for many other and sometimes less savory urposes. Some have been used in crime, others in folk medicine and others in ritualistic hallucinogenic primitive tribal rites.

The origins of some popular Datura species are obscure. The word itself goes back to early Sanscrit "dhustra." By the time Avicenna, the great, and perhaps first, real scientist came along in the 11th century, he used the word "Datora;" an Arabic designation.

Datura belongs to the Nightshade family. So do tomatocs, potatoes and egg plants. This family, Solanaceae, is the source of many very poisonous substances that generically are called the solanaceous akaloids.

Some of the solanaceous akaloids are destroyed by cooking. For example, "new potatoes" eaten raw are vcry poisonous; properly cooked they are, of course, delicious and nutritious.


One of the best known of these substances is Belladonna or atropine, extracted from Atropa belladonna of Europe. This

kaloid is widely used in modern medicine as an antispasmodic, a secretion inhibitor and, in ophthapmology, is used to dilate the pupil and enable the practitioner to examine the interior of the eye.

An allied substance, scopolamine, has a new usc. Applied to a small waterproof bandage affixed behind the ear, enough chemical passes into the system to calm the inner balancing mechanism so as to prevent mal-de-mer in susceptible ocean travelers.

So you see, enough good things derive from solanaceous plants to perhaps counter-balance the bad things that follow.

A few years ago, while in Central Africa with a group of Sanibel naturalists, we stumbled upon beautiful flowering shrubs with large, six- to eight-inch long flowers with reddish lavender double trumpet shaped corollas and light, white interiors with a vague lavender cast. It was a

beautiful species, and we wanted some for our Sanibel gardens. Fortunately (or unfortunately?), we brought back ripe seeds through U.S. Customs (legally, I might add, with a USDA permit) a few weeks later.

We thought we had found a harmless new beauty. But no, Datura metel, the Devils' Trumpet, has been planted in Florida for decades -- and for that matter, circum-tropically for hundreds of years. Even our double corolla wasn't new. We have since seen triple flowers of startling beauty.

The great beauty of this very vigorous annual cannot be disputed, but this plant and its ally, Datura candida, the Angel's Trumpet, both pictured here, have been used for many nefarious purposes by criminals -- even murderers -in many countries for a long, long time.

Both Angel's and Devil's Trumpet are favorite sources of deadly chemicals employed in a variety of crimes. The knock-out drops of the twenties and thirties (remember The Thin Man?) were simply concentrations of naturally occuring Datura alkaloids. Bogey, Robinson and Raft used them in popular films of yesteryear, too, as did real life gangsters of the Prohibition era.

Dried petals and pollen of these lovely flowers have been pulverized and wafted through air conditioning systems in

more modern times. This can cause deep, sometimes permanent sleep, thus preparing a household for a hit by a skilled modern day cat burglar.

The seeds of Datura have been ground with black pepper. Sometimes death results.

Some Sunbelt youngsters have intentionally munched **Datura** or smoked it for its hallucigenic effects. Seeking new "highs" in this way has led to new "lows" -- as youngsters have died. Even if they recover, awful memories remain sometimes for weeks, kind of like the D.T.'s, including the typical crawling horrors and terrifying menaces of the drug damaged imagination.

Daturas were used in ancient China for pustules, swellings, colds and cholera in medicine and in religion too. It is thought that some of Buddha's laws were conceived while he was under the influence of Datura.

Shakespeare, of course, employed Datura. I don't mean to suggest that he ate the stuff, but he did write about it. So did Virgil and Pliny.

In more recent times two novelists became intrigued with Daturas and others of the legion of Sanibel's toxic plants. They are the distinguished modern day American mystery

writer, Lucille Kallen, (C.B. Greenfield series including the intriguing Tanglewood Murder) and the noted British author P.D. James, the Agatha Christie of our day.

Both visited Sanibel recently but separately, and both may be working on Sanibel-based gory and hallucinogenic murder stories. I shall send this piece to each of them -- it will be fun to see which one wins the race to press. (I wonder how come the most successful mystery-murder writers today seem to be women? The gentler sex? Funny, isn't it?) There is another very well known Datura, this one

definitely on American native, Jimson Weed, Datura stramonium. The word Jimson is a contraction as well as a corruption of James Town, which refers to that early British colony in Virginia.

It seems the Brits had a spot of trouble back in 1676 -- the redskins were acting up or maybe it was a small insurrection. In any case the British soldiers, who should have been fighting, "tripped out" on Datura, became stupefied and failed in their military goal. It is a good thing the idea of hallucinating on Datura did not spread widely in the British

Army else there might never have been a British Empire. There is a sad, really tragic, but intriguing story about Jimson Weed. It seems that about two decades ago, two farm families in West Virginia got together one Sunday to "raise" the barn of one family. As was the custom throughout our history, the visiting barn raisers were served a bountiful lunch.

The hostess served apple pie, sliced tomatoes, potato salad and cold meats, not necessarily in that order. Soon members of both families began to pass out.

One young man was able to load all the dead and dying bodies on to his truck and drive to the nearest doctor. The young doctor, of course, thought of food poisoning and considered spoiled meat, potato salad (which has a bad but probably undeserved reputation, anyway) and could not firmly pin down any cause for the tragedy that was taking place among all the members of both families (well, all but one, the driver of the truck!).

This smart young doctor then concentrated on the one healthy member of the party. What had he caten? Well he had eaten the apple pie, the cold meat, the potato salad (not necessarily in that order) but he didn't like tomatoes, so he ate no tomatoes.


The young man was able to tell the doctor the that farmer had raised the tomatoes in a very special way. Tomato shoots had been grafted on Jimson Weed root stocks to encourage vigorous and faster growth of big tomatoes.

Well, the tomatoes grew all right, but the Jimson Weed contributed quantities of solanaceous alkaloids to the ripe fruit - enough to kill most of the members of two farm families.







Mayor Porter Goss initiated a resolution that passed unanimously requesting County Attorney James Humphreys to reconsider his recent decision to resign his post.











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
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



'Scourge of beach walkers,' sand spurs can be valuable

Sand spurs, scourge of the bare foot beach any erosion or other deterioration due walker, can be as valuable as the legally protected sea oats in helping make and hold the upper beaches and dunes along Florida's coast.

Those beaches represent extremely valuable natural assets that over the years have become prime areas for recreation, homes and various commercial activities. Cities have developed along many stretches of these beaches, and they now represent some of the most valuable real estate in Florida

Until recently the beaches and dunes had retained most of their natural condition with

mainly to storm activity. But within the past few years significant stretches of beaches and dunes have been severely altered by structures and activities that have increased erosion. This has led to considerable concern as to how to retain these valuable assets.

The state mandated Coastal Construction Control Line, which requires that all future construction be placed behind that line, has been established in most counties with sand beaches and is one example of action being taken to protect the beaches.

One of the best methods of beach and dune preservation is through the use of vegetation - keeping natural vegetation intact and enhancing or replacing the natural vegetation in areas of recreational use and where construction occurs.

The beaches have been partly built up and even extended seaward by the natural growth of plants such as grasses, sedges and other herbs; woody and fibrous shrubs; and wood and fibrous trees. These natural plants help to form dunes by stopping and holding sand and other materials brought in by waves, tides and winds.


Depleted beach and dune areas can also be replenished by installing wind-retarding sand fences of wood soats or brush. While

prevailing winds and some high waves deposit sand in front and behind such fences. the rate of accumulation depends much more on the fence position and the amount of sand available.

Try seaweed in your diet

baked potato and -- seaweed?

This is not a helath food fad. Seaweed has been used as a direct source of nourishment since ancient times and is a staple today in the diets of people in China, Japan and the Philipines.

Ocean seaweed, for example, has many uses in processed foods. Algin, a derivative of a brown alga called kelp, is widely used to stabilize the foam in brewing beer. And agar and carrageenan, extracts or red algae, are added to many prepared foods such as ice cream, puddings, salad dressings and cheese.

Many seaweed derivatives form a gel that

For dinner tonight, how about steak, keep some foods such as toppings from mariculture, at least from a biological weeping, and others, such as salad standpoint, is feasible. dressings, from separating. As a thickener, agar gives body or viscous consistency to soups and hot milk drinks.

Although it is widely used in food, cosmetics and pharmaceuticals, seaweed stocks are depleting. But Florida may offer one solution to the problem.

Clinton Dawes, a University of South Florida biology professor, has examined the possibility of growing the Florida seaweed Eucheuma Isiforme in this state, whether in tanks or in natural habitat such as the Florida Keys.

Although the natural seaweed populations are diminishing, this rich source of niacin, vitamin C, folic acid and vitamin B can still be purchased. Most seaweed is sold in health food stores in prepackaged dry, granular, powder or leaf forms. Some types are sold in bulk.


The cost of one ounce of dry seaweed ranges from about 50 cents to \$2.50.

What can you do with seaweed once you get it home? Remember that seaweed is a marine vegetable and can be prepared in many raw or cooked dishes. Some seaweeds, for instance, make tasty salad accents, especially when mixed with cucumber and radishes.


If you're feeling more adventurous, try some seaweed bread. Just use your favorite simple bread recipe, substitute water for milk, add an extra tablespoon of butter and omit salt.

Grind the dried seaweed into a flour and substitute seaweed flour for half of the flour called for in the recipe.
