F&B plans to relocate on Palm Ridge Road

The F & B Oyster Co. probably will move from its present location on Periwinkle Way to a new site on Palm Ridge Road when a proposed addition to the Palm Ridge Place shopping center is completed next March, Dolph Reinhardt, co-owner of the seafood restaurant, said last week.

Reinhardt disclosed his plans last week during a Planning Commission hearing of his request for a development permit for the new facility. Dr. Edward Cooke, owner of Palm Ridge Place, appeared with Reinhardt before the commission.

The new building, designed to house a 150-seat restaurant, will be located on three lots on Palm Ridge Road between the existing shopping center and Wooster Lane. Additional parking for 84 cars will be provided on the site.

Because the additional spaces will more than double the on-site parking at the center, the Planning Department has recommended the applicants provide an engineer's analysis and evaluation of the impact of the proposed development on the surrounding road system.

The commission continued the hearing until this study is completed."

The Comprehensive Land Use Plan requires a developer to pay the full cost of any off-site transportation improvements or public facilities necessitated by such proposed development.

A major portion of the expected impact on traffic would be mitigated, the planning staff suggests, by eliminating the existing direct access from Palm Ridge Road and providing an access driveway on Wooster Lane.

Both Reinhardt and Cooke objected to this proposal. "I dom't think the present tenants would appreciate this," Cooke said.


The existing septic tank at Palm Ridge Place is not adequate to service a 150-seat restaurant, the staff pointed out.

But Reinhardt said he has been assured by the Sanibel Sewer System that the shopping center could hook up to the new sewer main that will be installed along Periwinkle Way between Periwinkle Place shopping center and Tarpon Bay Road.

Bill Lee of Sanibel Sewer earlier informed the commission that businesses north of Periwinkle Way, at their request, would be connected to the new six-inch main.

He said the Florida Public Service Commission will be asked to extend Sanibel Sewer's service territory to include the area north of Periwinkle Way. The commission has approved Sanibel Sewer System's development permit for construction of a lift station at Periwinkle Place and for installation of a force main along the south side of Periwinkle Way





Crabbing the refuge





They're the crabs best adapted to swimming, the ones that are cherished by man for their especially succulent meat and, as of Jan. 1, 1983, the ones that enjoy singular legislative protection from overharvesting within the boundaries of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

They're edible blue crabs, Callinectes sapides, harvested by the millions throughout their range from the Chesapeake Bay to the Texas gulf each year and especially enjoyed by individual crabbers who visit Sanibel's refuge by day.

As of the first of the year, however, the refuge will enforce a new law handed down by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The law permits crabbing with a net only and outlaws use of monofilament line entirely. Officials hope the regulations will slow down harvesting of the crabs.

"I've seen people driving away with garbage cans filled with the crabs," refuge Manager Del Pierce says. "Some fill every available container, including the car trunk." Although it is not as yet illegal to harvest such a number of crabs, refuge personnel feel uncontrolled harvesting is at the very least unethical and that refuge visitors should take home no more blue crabs than they can use the same day.

The refuge's new protective legislation will also help minimize the tragedies that inevitably occur when monofilament line, broken off and left behind or simply forgotten, wraps itself around the innocent bystanders — green herons, fledgling pelicans, even alligators — which eventually starve to death because of their inability to disentangle themselves from the nylon filament.

The new law will also eliminate the use of hooks and bait, which often wind up embedded in the throats of the animals that share the waters of the blue crabs.

"I've never understood the need to use a line or hook or bait, anyway," refuge staffer Gina Swails, a South Carolina native who has been a successful crab hunter using just a net since her childhood, says. "They don't even have mouths, so using a hook seems foolish." Although crabbing under the new law might require crabbers to get their feet wet and spend a bit more time to catch enough for dinner, refuge management backs the new legislation wholeheartedly.

"We were beginning to have a real emergency situation on our hands," Pierce says. "So the regional office pushed the law through quickly."

The blue crab population has boomed, Pierce says, since the installation of water control structures on either side of the Wildlife Drive in 1980. "Crabs are carrion eaters and are known to sit and wait for a piece of dead fish or insect to float by. They prefer moving water, where the current carries carrion past them and they can snatch at it. That's probably why they prefer the waters near the control structures," he explains.

But the crab population near the first three water control structures has been hit hard and is "nearly played out," according to Pierce.

In response to the situation, the refuge advisory committee has begun to consider suggested guidelines that will eventually be posted near the crabbing areas.

Recommendations the committee is expected to make include limitation of a day's catch to 25 crabs or less (no females) with no hooks allowed.

Refuge personnel will patrol the areas for crabbers who disregard the suggested guidelines and the new net law. Litterbugs will be taken to task, as well.

Besides being an eyesore, litter left by thoughtless crabbers often winds up in the stomachs of resident alligators, says Pierce. The gators then become semitame and dependent on that litter as a source of food. "It's an entirely unacceptable situation," he says.

But those crabbers who follow the guidelines and laws set up by the refuge will be welcomed by the staff.

"We are happy to have people who enjoy catching and eating the blue crabs," says Pierce, who is quick to promise that special restrictive regulations will only be recommended as a last resort.

John Henderson

Dr. John Henderson of Princeton, N.J., retired medical director of Johnson and Johnson and the author of numerous medical books, died on Wednesday, Nov. 24, 1982, in Princeton after an extended illness. He was 76.

A long-time winter resident of Captiva, Henderson retired from Johnson and Johnson in 1971. His writings include several first aid books and many published papers in the medical field. 

Sanibel Highlands home request denied

The Planning Commission last week denied without prejudice Joseph Bohart's request for a specific amendment to permit construction of a single-family home on two lots in Sanibel Highlands subdivision that do not meet the minimum size requirement for the Uplands Wetlands Ecozone.

And for the second time the commissioners urged the City Council to "do something" about the drainage and sewage problems that have plagued the subdivision for years.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers strongly recommends that the density in the area not be increased by the amendment procedure until the septic and storm water problems are solved.

In a study for the city Dinesh Sharma points out that, "There are no viable options available to install on-site septic. systems in the wetlands conditions.

"Protection of the public health and water quality must be overriding concerns in evaluating the use of individual septic systems in the interior wetland areas," Sharma's report adds.

Realtor Joe Laenen, who represented the Boharts at the hearing, said the Boharts have owned the property since 1970. Before the city was incorporated they would have been able to build on the lots on Capital City Road, Laenen said.

Rogers acknowledged this area of Sanibel Highlands is less prone to flooding than other parts of the subdivision.

The Boharts' case, Rogers said, is almost identical with that of Matthew and Virginia Stewart.

The commission several weeks ago recommended council denial of the Stewarts' request to build on an undersized

lot on Piedmont Road. A second hearing of their petition is scheduled before the City Council Dec. 7.

There are at least 50 other unbuildable lots in Sanibel Highlands where the properties cannot meet the minimum lot size required for a single-family home, Rogers said.

The Boharts' lots contain slightly more than 10,000 square feet. The minimum area required by CLUP is 15,000.

The Boharts have been unsuccessful in their attempts to acquire additional land, Laenen told the commission.

By denving the request without prejudice the commission leaves the door open for the Boharts to apply again for a specific amendment without paying an additional fee.

Buttonwood expansion approved

A development permit to allow a 324square-foot expansion of the Butttonwood BarB-Q restaurant at Blind Pass was approved last week by the Planning Commission.

Attorney John Wilcox, representing owners Juanita and Harry Yoder and Diane and Greg Steger, said the seating capacity of the restaurant in the Santiva Plaza will not be expanded. A bar with six stools will be relocated in the area that was formerly occupied by a gift shop.

The request was approved by a 4-0 vote. Commission Chairman Ann Winterbotham, who was vacationing in Africa, and Commissioner Emily Barefield, still recuperating from a bout with pneumonia, where not present.

The commission vacancy created by the Louise Johnson's election to the City Council had not yet been filled.

Casa Ybel granted request for cabana rental

An occupational license for the Casa Ybel Resort and Club to rent cabanas to guests for use on the beach was approved last week by the Planning Commission.

Larry Congress, who is in charge of the rental operation for the resort, said the lounges that will accommodate two people will remain permanently on the beach behind the Coastal Construction Setback Line.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the cabana rental is permitted as an accessory use if it is under the same ownership as the resort and if the rental procedure takes place within the resort itself.

Congress said the operation complied with these conditions. Casa Ybel has been cited in the past by Code Enforcement Officer Dick Baker for violating the Comprehensive Land Use Plan because the cabana lounges were left on the beach forward of the CCSL.

Commission votes to vacate

Woodmere Preserve driveway

Is the designation of a meandering driveway through the Woodmere Preserve as a public road another city mapping error?

Three attorneys representing seven property owners in the 40 acres that stretch from the cul-de-sac at the dead end of West Gulf Drive to the Gulf Pines subdivision maintain it is.

To remove a "cloud on the deeds" the attorneys asked the Planning Commission last week to recommend that the city vacate the 60-66 foot wide right-of-way that is improperly identified in the Comprehensive Land Use Plan as "public."

Island Attorney Reed Toomey told the commission that Dorothy Kuder, Mary Wegmuller, Martha Gessendorf, Richard Lane, Elizabeth May and Richard Brashler have signed an agreement to maintain a 12-foot wide driveway providing access to their properties. The drive winds through a heavily vegetated area that is frquently the scene of botanical tours.

The property owners maintain the 525foot long easement has always been privately owned and say they have paid taxes on the land for years.

Sanibel attorney John Wilcox explained that the confusion over the ownership stems from the time years ago when the late Willis Combs offered to dedicate the right-of-way to Lee County.

Wilcox, who researched county commission meeting minutes, said the offer was never accepted.

At one time a county bulldozer that was starting to clear the property to extend the road was stopped by Combs brandishing a shot gun, Wilcox said.

The misconception of ownership was compounded when the right-of-way through the Combs' land was desigated on city maps as the possible route of a future bicycle path.

The planning staff, on the assumption that the right-of way is public property, objected to the 12-foot driveway and maintained it does not conform to the city's 18-foot width standard for a rural road or to the the 20-foot wide access required for emergency vehicles.

The staff recommended denial of the vacation.

"Although no general public need of this right-of-way is foreseen at this time vacation of any claim to the right-of-way would effectively impair the city's ability to provide improved public access in the future," the planning report explains.

Acting Commission Chairman Larry Simon said with the potential for severe traffic problems on the Island, "We owe it to the people of Sanibel not to abandon a future escape hatch."

Simon was the only dissenter in the 3-1 vote on Commissioner Jerry Muench's motion recommending the vacation.

license for Castaways units

The Castaways at Blind Pass has always represented itself as a 20-unit motel. But in fact there are 20 units with 31 bedrooms on the site today, Lloyd Wright of Rochester Resorts, the new owner of the resort, told the Planning Commission last week.

"So I was shocked to find that the former owners had only obtained occupational licenses for 18 units," Wright said during a commission hearing of a specific amendment to permit the construction of a resident manager's quarters within the existing structure.

The commission agreed to increase the number of units on the occupational license to 20 but denied Wright permission to add the manager's quarters, which would increase the density by one dwelling unit.

Wright agreed that a single-family home on property between the resort pool and Santiva Plaza, although not in good condition, could be renovated for use by the manager without intensifying the density of property. The home is lawfully existing forward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line.

The commission also gave after-the-fact approval for the installation of rope fences that delineate a public beach access path and for replacement of a cement wall along San-Cap Road and a wire fence seaward of the Castaways' gulf front units. The staff acknowledged that this construction was very minor in nature and represented little additional impact on the gulf beach environment.

Specific amendment okayed for swimming pool

A specific amendment to permit Maureen and Holger Smitt to install a swimming pool at their home in The Rocks received Planning Commission approval last week. The pool will exceed the 30 percent impermeable surface allowed in Altered Land ecological zones.

Use of wooden decking will reduce the coverage to 33.8 percent if the garden area

of visqueen covered with rock is excluded, the planning staff reported.

The four commissioners present said they had "no problem with visqueen," which after a few years is punctured and deteriorates and is no longer really impermeable.

They voted 4-0 to approve the request.

Tale of woe fails to convince commission to approve house

Despite Arthur Bauman's sad tale of the frustrations of trying to build a house on Sanibel while serving with the U.S. State Department in Singapore, the Planning Commission last week turned down Bauman's bid to build a single-family home on each of two contiguous lots he owns in Belle Meade subdivision.

Bauman purchased the lots in 1975 and had started plans to build a home on one of the lots and sell the other when he was transferred to the Far East, he told the commission.

He designated a building contractor to obtain the building permits and proceed


with construction. But the process was delayed by the water moratorium in 1977, and then the contractor went out of business, Bauman said.

Before returning to Sanibel three years ago, Bauman by telephone purchased the home where he now resides and intends to stay.

His lots in Belle Meade have been on the market but have not been sold because the square footage of the two lots combined is less than half that required for a minimum single-family lot in the area that currently



has a density of one unit per acre. Planner Ken Pfalzer said Bauman does not qualify for relief under the contiguous lot ordinance adopted in 1981 because Belle Meade was not 50 percent developed by April 21 of that year.

Only 12 of a possible 45 homes have been built in Belle Meade at this time.

Even with the adoption of an amendment to increase the density to two dwelling units per acre, which is con-

tingent on developer Paul Stahlin's devising a suitable plan to upgrade the roads and drainage in Belle Meade, Bauman's property would still only support one dwelling unit, Pfalzer pointed out.

Although the commissioners were sympathetic to Bauman's plight, they were reluctant to grant a variance to the density and voted 4-0 to recommend council denial of the specific amendment request.

Commission says no to Island Pizza seat request

Fearful they would be mobbed by other restaurant owners demanding equal treatment, the Planning Commission last week turned down Roger Osborn's request to add 16 seats to his Island Pizza restaurant for use after 5 p.m. on weekdays and all day on weekends.

The amount of on-site parking available governs the number of seats permitted in Sanibel restaurants, and on this basis Osborn is legally entitled to 20 seats.

Two months after Island Pizza opened in late 1978, Osborn and his then-partner Pat Cupo added 16 seats. The city erroneously issued an occupational license the next year permitting 36 seats.

The mistake was discovered when the license came up for renewal in September 1981. At that time the City Council approved a specific amendment allowing the restaurant to use the additional 16 seats after 5 p.m. on weekdays and all day on weekends until June 1, 1982.

In the meantime, Cupo and Osborn indicated they would seek a new location for the restaurant. Cupo has since left the operation to open his own Italian restaurant in the McGregor Point shop-

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

SHELLING TIPS

"What do these shells eat, anyway?" I hear that question quite often, and it's interesting to see the menu items that everything from sand dollars to huge horse conchs likes to dine upon.

The live shells we find around Sanibel and Captiva can be divided into two types according to feeding habits.

Shells such as the clams, oysters, angel wings and coquinas are sifter type eaters that get nourishment from minute particles in the water and on the sandy bottom by sifting through a primitive set of body organs.

Incidentally, it's the sifters that most people like to eat themselves. They are also the very ones that are the most likely to make you sick if red tide organisms are in the water. We have infrequent bouts of red tide, usually in the cooler months of the year, and it's not unusual for the state agencies involved with testing water for purification to ban the taking of shells like clams and oysters until the red tide dangers pass.

On the other side of the feeding cycle coin are the aggressive univalves or mollusks, which have a solid single shell. These include the various whelks, many

conchs and other shells such as the tulips, which tend to feed off the smaller, bivalved sifter feeders.

There are exceptions to these catagories, of course, with the starfish and the sea urchins leading the list.

Life on the gulf floor is a series of survival skirmishes between the big and the little. The same food chain that exists on land extends to the oceans, too -- the largest feed on the smaller and on down the line to shells hardly large enough to see.

I came upon an usual sight the other day while walking a shallow sandbar off Captiva. A common brown Florida starfish had found a live sand dollar and was apparently trying to eat it. As a matter of fact, two other starfish of similar size came along too, and all three were feeding upon the live sand dollar.

Sea urchins like to gather many dead shells on their sticky spines and then travel ever so slowly over the sandy bottom, looking for tiny items to eat. The urchins and dollars are classified as echinoderms and are not thought of as shells like hard exterior mollusks would be by collectors.


The largest of our locally found shells are the whelks and horse conchs. These can be found in lengths exceeding 12 inches. At that size they have very few natural enemies. Therefore, they eat just about anything they want.

These large univalves prefer to feed on the large clams that dig into mud bars around the Islands. The average larger whelk or horse conch needs one or two of the big clams per month to live.

The big shells extend a muscle and surround a clam then use water pressure and the edge of their shell to open the smaller clams. It's a slow process.

Each shell looks for certain things when hungry, and in most instances, if there is a balance, many different kinds of shells can survive in the smaller, ideal habitats on the bottom without starving each other out. Good shelling this week.

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Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (North tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every high tide. Subtract two minutes for every low tide. For Captiva Island Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes for each high tide, and sub tract hour and 16 minutes for each low tide. For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and four minutes for each high tide and add 52 minutes for each low tide. In between these points, gulf or hay, guesstimate and have good fishing or shellion.

We are right in the middle of our annual fall migration of Spanish mackerel, bluefish and a very special gamester that has the strength to tear up tackle and your nerves, too!

We often call this fish the bonito. Some more experienced anglers drop the "o" at the end of the name and call them "bonita" instead. Some others around the gulf and Atlantic states refer to the same fish as a "little tunny," and they are probably the more correct.

These bullet-shaped fish are marked and colored very similar to several of the much larger tuna family found around the world. The bonito travels extensively on its own, and we have had reports of schools of these fish from less than a mile off Sanibel and Captiva Islands to way out in the middle of the gulf.

It's a rare treat to hook and land one of these marvelous fighters, as any light tackle fisherman who has had the pleasure will confirm. They are not usually taken for eating, however. The meat is very dark and bloody.

I recently talked with a man who said he had tried smoked bonito and thought they were rather tasty. But I suggest that you release any you catch. Sometimes guides keep one or two, but then they usually give them to a local stone crab trapper for bait. The crabs seem to love just what we don't like in the fish, and one bonito makes a great amount of bait, too.

ON THE WAT

Bonito average from six to 15 pounds. Some are larger, and I've hardly ever seen under five or six pounds. They have that ability to attack schools of silvery bait fish and tear into the center of these pods with energy that thrills the first-time angler.

They hunt the bait in packs, and I could only guess as to how many might be in any given school. It's not unusual to find a place outside one of the passes where three or four individual schools of bonito are working over the bait. They crash to the surface and then sound. When they won't stay on top for a few casts, the fishing gets very frustrating.

You can troll silver spoons or get close to a feeding school of bonito and cast the same spoon into them. They seem to be particularly leary of boat engine noises, and some anglers cut the engine and drift toward the feeding school, hoping they get into casting range before the school sounds.


Outboard engines seem to spook the fish more easily than inboards, so if you are circling a school and not getting any hits, you might shut down the outboard and cast instead.

One way I often get these shy fish to strike is to drift and use half-ounce yellow feathers or jigs on the bottom. Again, you have to be in the immediate area of the school.

I would not recommend using less than 20-pound fishing outfits. And don't go the other way with 50-pound either. A steel leader is a must because the bonito often travel with mackerel and blues. All can snap a light leader in seconds. Number 5 wire is good to use.

These are strange fish. At times, they are easy to hook, but other days you can see them crashing surface all around and can't get a strike no matter how you fish them or what you use. It takes patience, lots of fuel and stout backs when you finally connect.

You most likely will find bonito by accident while fishing for mackerel or blues. They are really strong fighters and worth the effort to land. Good luck.



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



The craftsmen were kept busy all day explaining their handiwork to the curious and haggling over prices with the bargain hunters.





Most librarians have an unsatiable curiosity about some specific subject, and Harriet Howe, former librarian at the Sanibel Public Library, is no exception.

"I've an idea that's been percolating around in my head for a while," she explains. "My sister has one son whom

the histories of Sanibel and Captiva, Harriet still spends at least one day each week keeping up the files she began during her tenure as Sanibel's librarian. The women who volunteer their time at the library greet her regularly, she says, with quips like, "So you're here cutting up your paper dolls again."

Since her retirement one year ago, however, Harriet has found time to delve into another kind of history -- her own.

The newly found free time that inevitably comes with retirement has been invested, in Harriet's cast, in delving into her past -- "digging at my roots," she calls it -- and unearthing some extraordinary facts about her lamily.

"It's the kind of thing your family told you, but you weren't interested as a kid," says Harriet, who has managed to trace her family tree back five generations, past her great grandfather, who was a clipper ship captain in the China trade and who served as a master's mate on a flagship blockade fleet during the Civil War.

"It's a real chore, and very hit and miss," Harriet says about the research. "But it's very worthwhile," she adds. "I'm the 'old aunt' now, and if I don't do it, it will all be lost."

Although the temptation has been strong to hire someone else to do the legwork, the cost of such a transfer

One thing Harriet says she's learned is, "You've got to do it yourself if you want to find out."

Family is extremely important to the woman who took over at the Sanibel Library when she and her husband Paul took up residency on the Island in 1970.

Harriet's family memories are strong and clear. Her penchant for gardening sparks remembrances of her father and grandfather who, during World War I, kept the family fed with parsnips when their potato reserves ran out. "To this day I can't look a parsnip in the face," she laughs.

Her grandfather grew plenty of other vegetables for the family dinner table, says Harriet, who recalls "Grampa's" inclination to harvest his vegetables "when they were old enough to plant. My grandmother used to say they (the vegetables) were old enough to vote," she remembers with a chuckle.

Harriet doesn't garden these days, but she looks back fondly at working her flower beds in Pennsylvania, where she couldn't wait to get her hands into some good, black soil. Her favorite blossoms were the named irises and day lillies she grew in abundance.

Her first visit "home" since she and Paul moved south was last June, and she would like to repeat the trip. But I've never met and another son whom I haven't seen in six or seven years, and my brother's daughter in Sacramento has a family that's grown up since I last saw them."

Such a trip would also give Harriet an opportunity to visit some of the historical societies that are so prolific in the New England area -- a good source of information about her family heritage, she's sure.

"I'm torn in three different directions," she says. "I would love to return to England -- my trip to London was just wonderful. But I'd also like to go north and west."


Retired officers plan patriotism award for Sanibel students

Installation ceremony planned for the Rev. Richard Stein


The Rev. Richard Stein will be officially installed at the Sanibel Congregational United Church of Christ this Sunday, Dec. 5.

A reception will be held following the cermony in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone is cordially invited to attend.







ping center at Miner's Corners.

When Osborn sought to renew his occupational license this fall the city would authorize only 20 seats, explaining that the specific amendment granting the additional number had expired in June.

Osborn maintains there are 37 parking spaces available at the Sanibel Plaza evenings and weekends, enough to support a 36 seat restaurant.

He said currently he uses only 31 seats. "I'm not asking for anything additional, just to maintain what we've had since day one," he told the commission. "We are offering the Island a service with less expensive meals and good food," he argued. "And all I want is to continue to do that."



Restroom approved for trailer park continued

voted "yes" on the motion for approval. Planning Director Bruce Rogers told the commissioners that permitting the restroom would violate the condition of the specific amendment that, "No structures are to be located on any of the 49 campsites except when campers are occupying the sites."

Architect Ray Fenton argued that the intent of the restriction was to prohibit permanent installation of campers as has happened in the original trailer park.

Commissioner Lennart Lorenson questioned what has changed since the original plans for the expansion were submitted to make the restroom necessary now

Fenton explained that there was no history of use for the new sites at that time and the use by self-contained motor homes was over estimated.

The existing restroom in the original part of the park is too far from the new campsites, he added.

Rogers said he was confident that if the restroom facility had been asked for originally it would have been approved.

Fenton said the restroom was exclusively for use of the campers and was in no way a "commercial use" as interpreted by the planning staff.

Dick Muench explained that the coinoperated showers are a water conservation measure. "For 10 cents they get five minutes of water," he said.

The restroom will be built on one of the campsites, cutting the capacity to 48 campers and reducing the intensity of use, Fenton pointed out.

Tie vote means Jenks cannot use storage space for conference room

A request from Bert Jenks to use storage space on the second floor of the Sanibel Realty office building as a staff conference room drew a 2-2 vote from the Planning Commission last week.

Acting Commission Chairman Larry Simon and Commissioner Lennart Lorenson agreed with the planning staff report that interpreted Jenks' proposal as a "new" commercial use that would add

1.4 percent additional floor area to an already overdeveloped site.

Simon and Lorenson both voted "no" on Commissioner Harold Schuyler's motion to grant the specific amendment with the stipulation that the area would be used exclusively for "in-house staff meetings."

They also dissented on a subsequent motion by newly-seated Planning Commissioner Jerry Muench to stipulate that a deed restriction run with the land and apply to all future owners of the property. Both votes ended in a tie, which is tantamount to denial.

An earlier motion by Lorenson to deny the request on the basis that the intensity of use would be increased died for lack of a second.

Restricting for storage use only 520 square feet of space on the second floor was a condition of the August 1980 commission approval of a development permit to modify the roof line of the Sanibel Realty office building. The office was formerly occupied by the Weeds 'N Things florist shop. Earlier this year the Planning Commission and the City Council turned down Jenks' request that the condition be deleted. Both bodies suggested that filing for a specific amendent would be the appropriate route to follow.

Since only four commissioners were present last week, Jenks was offered the option of continuing the hearing until a full commission was on hand. But he said he would take his chances with the City Council.

Fact or myth?

Sea serpents...

Throughout the Indo-Pacific region from the tip of Africa to the Persian Gulf to Oceania and beyond the Panama and Central America, true Sea Snakes can be found -- reptiles with scales, lungs, nostrils on top of the head and flattened tails used for skulling.

Not to be confused with the non-venomous eel-like fish often found in our gulf waters, the true Sea Serpents are all equipped with deadly venom and efficient hollow-fang delivery systems. But many are so inoffensive in temperament that it is difficult to induce them to bite.

Of course, there are no Giant Sea Serpents -- the huge fire-breathing kind of song and story. Those legendary creatures are truly mythological. But the True Sea Snakes of the Indo-Pacific regions are real and quite interesting enough.

The only true Sea Serpent I ever had personal experience with was in the Bombay Aquarium on Marine Drive. I was "behind the scenes" with the curator. We approached a tank containing a writhing, seething mass of Beaked Sea Snakes, Enhydrina schistosa, tangled like spaghetti at the surface. They seemed intent upon their interaction; perhaps they were in a breeding state of , mind.

Anyway, I felt myself in no danger when I plucked a four-foot specimen from the water. Anxious only to return to the tank, it made no attempt to bite. Good thing, too, for the bite of the Sea Snakes can be deadly, what with their copious supply of neurotoxic venom and the proper equipment to deliver it.

From its vertically-flattened tail, perhaps two inches top to bottom, the beast narrows appreciably anteriorly to a tiny head. This microcephalic beast has a very narrow "chin" -- almost a splinter. This is an adaptation to permit a wide gape so the small-headed animal can stretch to swallow -- whole, of course -- fairly large fish.


In recent years we have heard a lot of ruckus (I guess nowadays you're supposed to call it "rhetoric") about our giving away "our" Panama Canal.

An awful lot of retired people around Southwest Florida, often colonels, have crucified Jimmy Carter for "his" giveaway. Well, he can't get all the blame or all the credit, because wise presidents of both parties before him realized the inevitability of the move if we were to remain on speaking terms with Latin America.


What does this have to do with Sea Serpents? I'll tell you. The apologists and eager planners have promised a Sea Level Canal -- more efficient, easier to handle, wide enough to take big ships that might get stuck in the Panama Canal -- a bigger and better shipping link connecting the Atlantic and the Pacific.

A great tome was written, "The Ecological Effects of a

Pelamis Platurus, a venomous sea serpent that frequents the Pacific side of Central America, would come to our water, i.e., Gulf of Mexico and Florida waters, if the Sea Level Canal is ever built.



At the Bombay Aquarium I met my first Sea Serpent, Enhydrina Schistosa. Intrigued, I plucked the dangerously venomous if mild tempered beast from its tank and lived to tell the tale.



Our harmless little Mangrove Water Snake could by stretching the imagination be called a sea serpent, for it

Sea Level Canal" -- a study we paid dearly for with our taxes.

Well, the ecological effects of a Sea Level Canal would be numerous and immense. There would be a huge interchange of flora and fauna -- Pacific to Atlantic and vice versa. Not the least interesting new inhabitant of our Atlantic-Caribbean side (and that includes the Gulf of Mexico, too) would be Pelamis platurus, the venomous Pelagic Sea Snake.

This most seagoing of the Sea Serpents is found in the Arabian Sea, African Coast, all over the rest of the Indian Ocean, China Sea, Yellow Sea, the Central Pacific including Hawaii and in seething thousands in the Bay of Panama and northward to the Mexican coast. A Sea Level Canal would give this beast ample opportunity to widen its range to the Atlantic, Caribbean and the Gulf of Mexico.

What keeps it out of those seas now? Simple. The oldfashioned design of the Panama Canal. The principal functional part of the canal is the high freshwater central rain-fed lake, Gatun Lake.

This lake provides the water that enables the locks to function in both directions. It acts as a biological barrier to Pacific marine organisms entering the Atlantic and the does live in the salty waters of the Mangrove Forest.

reverse. A biological barrier, that is, to most marine organisms.

Those that tolerate fresh as well as sea water have moved, alive, in both directions. If you want to know what they are, you have to read "The Ecological Effects of A Sea Level Canal." But the Pelagic Sea Snake is not one of them. It has not locked successfully through the Panama Canal.

There is little likelihood of our ever getting a Sea Level Canal since our influence has waned and Central America is in turmoil. The possible sites were Nicaragua and Tuantupec, both geologically feasible, but both politically mixed, at least for the foreseeable future.

So when somebody tells you he caught a Sea Serpent in the gulf while fishing, you can tell him, "No Way!" The animal of the gulf most often called Sea Serpent is a fish of the family **Ophichthideae**, the Snake Eels -- a common name that is almost a direct translation of the Latin name. Sometimes -- just sometimes -- a rattlesnake will drift down a Florida river on a piece of debris and be found swimming as far as five miles out in the gulf. Also, we do have our harmless little Mangrove Water Snake or Flattailed Water Snake, Natrix fasciata compressicauda, which lives naturally in the saltwater environment and could by a stretch of imagination be called a Sea Serpent.

Scientists make dumb mistakes too, just like politicians. Compressicauda means flat-tailed. The type specimen did have a flat tail -- flattened by a car on Route 41. That is the only one described that had a flat tail, although its brothers and sisters don't, but by all the rules of taxonomy this snake must forever bear the false name compressicauda.

So we really need not be concerned about the many venomous Sea Serpents of the Indo-Pacific world. At least not until Sea Level Canal is built. And like the Cape Coral Bridge, that project is likely to be studied and discussed from here to eternity.



Refuge initiates plan to eradicate wild yams

By Carol Kranichfeld The J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge's battle to remove the prolific Brazilian pepper from refuge property will soon be joined by a campaign to eradicate the refuge's wild yams.

The wild yams, refuge management recently learned, are a widespread problem on Florida's east coast around Miami and are making their debut on Florida's western coast as well.

The yams, though unrelated to Georgia's kudzoo vines, exhibit qualities similar to the kudzoo in their extraordinarily fast growth that smothers hosts and nearby ' vegetation.

"They're very dificult to control," refuge technician Charles LeBuff says. "The yams grow a huge tuber in the ground and develop a potato-like propagil on the vine that drops off and begins a new plant," he explains.

The Miami area has yet to effect legislation to control the plant, but Island refuge management have decided to "nip the yam in the bud" by starting its own control program before the end of the year.

The only known patch of wild yams within refuge boundaries grows at the entrance of the Gasparilla Trail and is as yet fairly small. But it will still require a fair amount of time to remove.

The big, starchy roots will have to be dug up manually to avoid damaging their host trees, which are usually Gumbo Limbos, refuge Manager Del Pierce says.
