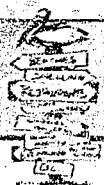

## Recounting 1983...

Each week through 1983 The Islander carried the big and small news about Sanibel and Captiva. Here reporter Barbara Bradshaw recounts the highlights of the year.

Week of Jan. 4

A record number of daytrippers traveled the Causeway during the week between Christmas and New Year's day causing traffic jams and long lines everywhere.

Week of Jan. 11

In an effort to eliminate illegal dumping that has plagued the island for years, the City Council voted to institute mandatory trash collection effective April 1.

Week of Jan. 18

Former Sanibel Mayor Porter Goss was appointed to the Lee County Commission to fill the District 1 seat vacated by Commissioner Mike Roeder, who was suspended by the governor after being charged with lying to the Lee County Grand Jury.

Week of Jan. 25

David La Croix, a Gainesville lawyer with extensive experience in zoning and land use regulation and litigation, was hired to take over as Sanibel's city attorney. He replaced Neal Bowen, who held the post for seven years.

After four months of deliberation the City Council approved rezoning the Periwinkle Way site of the Pirate Playhouse to provide for the continuance of the 19-year-old landmark as a community theater.

Week of Feb. 1

Three-year-old Nikki Amadio of Sanibel was crowned Princess of the Silver Anniversary of the Lee County American Heart Association.

Week of Feb. 8

The Captiva Post Office moved to its new home across from South Seas Marination. The new facility more than doubled the post office's capacity and raised the number of boxes available for postal customers from 645 to 1,420.

The City Council turned down an ordinance to ban live-shooting in the waters off Sanibel.

Week of Feb. 15

Visitors at the Sanibel and Captiva Community Center were accommodated a week/6243 visitors on week that deluged the island the previous weekend.

Week of Feb. 22

Ruth Hunter and Joyce, co-owner and piano accompanist of the Pirate Playhouse, which operated as Sanibel's Theater-in-the-round for almost 20 years. Hunter and the playhouse after her husband, Philip, died in December 1982.

The new gymnasium at the city's Recreation Center on Sanibel-Captiva Road opened.

Week of March 1

The Sanibel City Council, recognizing "day trippers" as the main source of winter traffic congestion, instructed planners to reevaluate ways to cut the daily influx of visitors.

Commissioner Francis Bailey, a member of the Lee County Mosquito Control Board for many years, urged the council to oppose proposed legislation that would realign the district boundaries.

Claang! Claang! Claang! The Sanibel trolley announces its arrival.

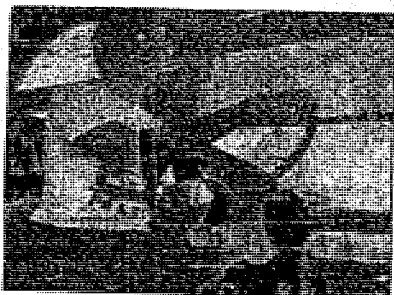
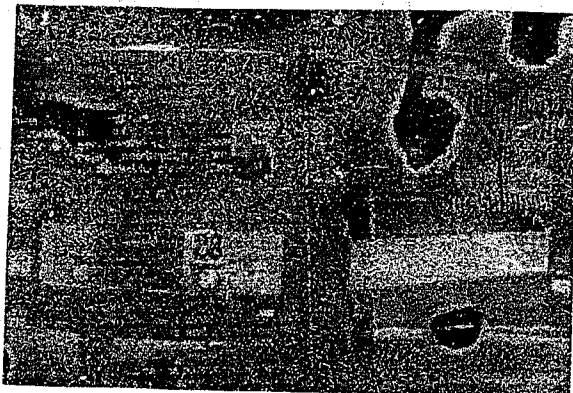
Sanibel's version of mass transit weaves its way through season traffic. With routes that cover both Sanibel and Captiva, the red and white vehicles have become an alternative to fighting traffic on the Islands — a common form of transportation for island residents and an attraction for island visitors.

"We average better than 100 riders per day (on the Sanibel trolley) during season," says trolley driver Doris Thatcher.

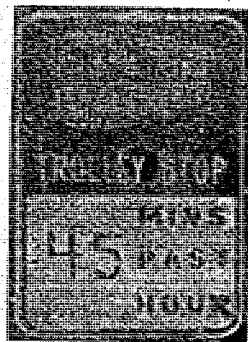
The trolleys run on a tight schedule around the Islands, with all routes starting at the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce on Causeway Road. The Sanibel trolley runs every hour from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., with stops at many resorts and shopping areas.

The Captiva trolley leaves the Chamber of Commerce at 9 and 11 a.m., and at 1 and 3 p.m. The run ends at South Seas Plantation. The trolley also provides trips through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge and to the Naples-Fort Myers Dog Track. Both trips require reservations. For more information about schedules call 472-6374.

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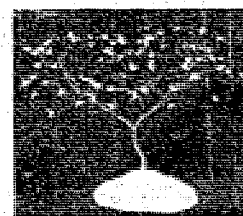
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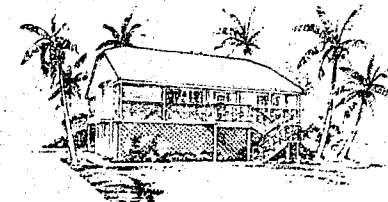


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## AN EYE FOR THE ISLANDS

It is often said that the road to hell is paved with good intentions. By now, that superhighway must be absolutely littered with New Year's resolutions that have already fallen by the wayside!

Since Islanders cannot avoid being part of the human (or the divine) comedy, we are not spared the problems inherent in adhering to noble resolves. Thus, like everyone else, we solemnly swear at the weakest possible moment (New Year's Eve) that we will henceforth amend our ways. Moreover, like everyone else, we often ask too much of our very human selves.

It is considered de rigueur to accentuate the positive in one's New Year's resolutions. Hence, we will stop smoking, we will cut down on our drinking, we will go on a starvation diet, etc.

Alas, having been so appallingly positive, the letdown is dreadfully depressing when our human wings hang down over our nobility.

This year, I was determined not to suffer the pain and mental anguish that I have consistently endured at the beginning of each new year. Thus, I opted for a totally negative resolution that made no demands whatsoever upon my human frailty.

Although the resolution in question hurt my pride considerably, I finally realized that pride cometh before a collapse. Therefore, despite nearly two months of arduous training, I solemnly vowed not to run in the Miami Marathon this coming weekend.

Readers may well wonder why anyone in his (or her) right mind would even think of running a marathon (just over 26 miles). After all, look at what happened to the first marathons runner in 490 B.C. (After assuring the Athenians "Not to worry, folks, we plundered the Persians" — or Greek words to that effect — Pheidippides dropped dead in his

tracks.) Of course, I reasoned, the hapless Pheidippides did not have the benefit of Brooks running shoes, Gatorade stations en route, a paved road or a throng of thousands to cheer him on. Moreover, I had recently read Tom McNab's inspiring book, *Flanagan's Run*, in which he describes how some 50 years ago 1,000 runners crossed our entire continent at the rate of 50 miles per day!

Although only one woman survived that incredible feat of endurance (and she was less than half my age at the time), it seemed logical to assume I could do at least half of what she had done on any given day.

Thus, on the very eve of my last birthday in the 40s, I had visions of setting a splendid example for other women who face the same inexorable, over-the-hill crisis.

Since my octogenarian mother was rather concerned by my proposed flirtation with rivalry (and, quite conceivably, fatality), I consented to a complete physical examination. The subsequent battery of tests proved to be boringly normal, and the doctor agreed that I could go ahead and "give it a try."

Thus, I eagerly embarked upon a three-month marathon training program. For quite some time, the program was both exhilarating and rewarding. I enjoyed waving to friends who heaved their horns in greeting as I chugged along the bike paths, and I loved the freedom to eat like a Clydesdale horse without beginning to look like one! And when I ran those 12 miles from Lighthouse Point to Blind Pass, I finally experienced the runner's feeling of euphoria — a sensation that had previously eluded me.

Those who watched over me during the long

weekend runs (in the comfort of their cars) often had amusing encounters. One friend liked to pull well off the road and read her Sunday paper while waiting for me to make a scheduled appearance. Out of concern for her welfare, total strangers, acquaintances and members of Sanibel's Finest frequently stopped to inquire, "Is everything all right here?"

I was stopped only once, by two young men in a small truck. "Is everything O.K.?" they asked. (I assured them that everything was just fine — and hoped that they did not have tiresome flirtation in mind.) "Well, do you know that some old guy in a blue Cadillac has been following you?" (I exploded to these fine young Knights of the Round Table that the dirty old man in question was really a harmless little old lady in tennis shoes — a loyal member of my Sweatshirt Brigade bearing towels, ammonia ampules and Gatorade.)

Alas, more than half-way through the training program, I hit the wall. Now, it seems there is an invisible "wall" that many marathon runners "hit" at the 20-mile mark. My wall appeared at the 14-mile mark. Although I had frequently run 12 miles without too much difficulty, my body balked at doing more than 14. While the spirit was foolishly willing, the flesh was generally weak.

Therefore, after 12 miles, my body began to send out urgent S.O.S. signals. Invariably, the distress signals came from areas that had once been badly injured: one big toe (broken in soccer), the other big toe (broken in tennis), both ankles (severe sprains, tennis spailo), and the lower back (canoeing, for a change).

### Howe questions attorney general on Below Market Rate housing

A copy of the following letter to the Attorney General of Florida was given to The Islander for publication.

Dear Attorney General, Your attention is relayed to my Nov. 23 letter regarding the city of Sanibel's Below Market Rate Housing program with which I have sincere concern about its propriety.

Since that letter, the City Council has unanimously approved the local private and inexperienced Community Housing Resources, Inc., to administer that program — with substantial assistance from the city's treasury.

As you may know, the five City Council members of this 8-year-old municipality are unpaid, volunteer public servants. None has had previous experience in the governance of a Florida city.

The turnover of the council membership makes continuity of policy making difficult.

Noting from the enclosed current clipping from our local press the apparent failure of our City Fathers to

avoid a possible unlawful use of public funds to aid the private CHH instead of a local operative housing authority or the 1980 created Florida Housing Finance Agency in achieve the moderate cost housing program.

From the reported remarks of the councilmen, it seems they do not fully comprehend the intent of the Legislature to utilize experienced organizations to administer such programs involving the expenditure of public funds.

It occurs to me that such naivete is not exclusive to our city, and the questions raised by our City Fathers' reported remarks might have been previously raised to you by other communities.

For example: whether a specific method of implementing the housing element of the state-mandated Comprehensive Land Use Plan is required. Our plan in 1978 zoned adequate areas for single-family,

duplex, and multi-family housing without any constraints on the income of the occupants. It is my belief that such zoning action puts the city in compliance with s.163.317(6) (f) F.S. insofar as "the provision of adequate sites" for the BMR housing is concerned.

Other remarks of the councilmen reported in the clipping also indicate a lack of total understanding of the rules and functioning of housing authorities and the FHFA, which have been established by statute to achieve the goals of the city's BMR housing program.

In light of the above, I shall appreciate a copy of any pertinent advice that your office or the Department of Community Affairs may have prepared as guidance for communities with similar problems.

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## Sand Pointe files suit against city over rentals

Mayor Fred Valtis was served notice last Wednesday that the Sand Pointe Condominium Association has filed a lawsuit against the city by the Sand Pointe Condominium Association.

The suit challenges a Sanibel ordinance that restricts the right to rent condominiums for periods of less than 30 days to owners of "units of high impact."

The suit filed in Lee County Circuit Court by attorney William Haverfield seeks a declaratory judgment from the court and asks that the ordinance be invalidated because it was adopted without proper notice to all affected property owners.

To qualify for the "unit of high

impact" designation a complex must provide 7,500 square feet of open space for each unit.

The 45-unit Sand Pointe has only 7,000 square feet of open space per unit.

The association's action came as no surprise to city officials. At a Nov. 15 City Council hearing, when it appeared Sand Pointe's request for a specific amendment to annex land "down the street" to qualify the complex as "units of high impact" would be denied, Haverfield indicated that only two options remained.

"In my view the association can either live with the regulation that restricts rentals to 30 days or more or file a lawsuit to have the units of high

impact ordinance invalidated," Haverfield said at the time.

The council honored Haverfield's request not to deny the specific amendment on first reading and withheld action until the second reading Dec. 21.

Two weeks ago Haverfield notified the council that a lawsuit would be filed and asked that Sand Pointe's request for a specific amendment be withdrawn from the agenda.

But the council opted to turn down Sand Pointe's bid for designation as "units of high impact" as the best way to clear the decks. Councilman Bill Hagerup's motion to deny passed unanimously.

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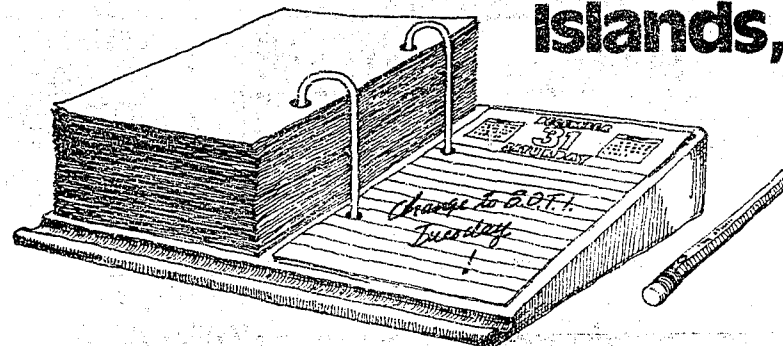

**Week of March 8**  
A 7,000-square-foot addition to Bailey's General Store opened for business.

**Week of March 15**  
Lee County Commissioner Porter Goss appointed former Sanibel City Councilman Duane White to serve on a commission to study the feasibility of charter government for Lee County.

The Lee County Electric Cooperative remained in the dark over the cause of a power outage that left 16,000 customers on Sanibel and Captiva, Pine Island and parts of Cape Coral without power for more than three hours.

**Week of March 22**  
High winds and rising seas battered the shoreline on Captiva and washed away part of the road in front of Tween Waters Inn in the heaviest weather

since the No Name storm in June 1982. Waves crashing onto a house at Allied Pass broke up the front porch.

An ordinance restricting the taking of live shells from Sanibel waters to no more than two species per day per person was put on hold by the City Council pending legislative action on a bill to create a state coastal commission with authority over shellfishing in offshore waters in Florida. City Attorney David LaCroix ruled the city had no authority to restrict shellfishing in its offshore waters.

**Week of March 29**  
Friends in Service Here (FISH of Sanibel) celebrated one year of neighbors helping neighbors.

**Week of April 5**  
A cast aluminum iron gratesmarker, found at Bowman's Beach a year and a half ago, was repaired and returned to its rightful place at the foot of Beulah Gibson's grave in the Captiva Cemetery.

**Week of April 12**  
As the first step in solving severe flooding

problems that hamper development of Sanibel Highlands subdivision off Chas. Yogi Road, the City Council appropriated \$5,900 for a drainage study.

**Week of April 19**  
Sanibel residents were jubilant that former Mayor Peter Goss will remain on the Lee County Commission until November 1984, completing former Commissioner Mike Roser's unexpired term. Gov. Bob Graham made Goss' appointment permanent after Roser pleaded no contest to charges of perjury and resigned his post.

Sanibel condominium owners protested the new garbage disposal rates that raised their yearly bills as much as 300 percent. Under the new Sanibel Disposal rate schedule effective April 1 condos paid the same fee as single-family homeowners.

**Week of April 26**  
Captiva Restaurateur Jamie Farquharson purchased the Pirate Playhouse and 2.7 acres of land on Periwinkle Way from Ruth Hunter for \$160,000.

Farquharson said he would continue to operate the playhouse in the same manner as did Philip and Ruth Hunter during the past 20 years.

The City Council approved a long range plan for the development of the Palm Ridge area as Sanibel's town center.

**Week of May 3**  
With the hurricane season approaching the Sanibel Police Department reminded islanders that special alert radios adapted to receive messages from the police dispatcher were available for \$56 from the Sanibel Police Recreation Club.

After serving nine months, Planning Commissioner Harold Schuyler resigned for "diverting personal reasons." Bill Read was appointed to fill the position.

**Week of May 10**  
The City Council voted to explore again the

feasibility of purchasing the Sanibel Causeway from Lee County after the city staff revealed the problem of traffic and congestion on the island and recommended ownership of the span as the only feasible method for Sanibel to control its own destiny.

**Week of May 17**  
More than 1,000 spectators watched 125 windsurfers perform in the golf off the Sanibel resort in the largest regional championships regatta ever held in the United States.

**Week of May 24**  
The Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce plans for an Oktoberfest to stimulate business on the island during the slowest month of the year met with negative reactions from city councilmen.

The Sanibel Causeway celebrated its 20th anniversary.

**Week of June 1**  
Islander Cal Gardener and Sanibel Police Officer Tom Applegate set sail on Gardener's 35-ft ketch — their destination Liverpool, England.





**Week of June 7**  
Twenty-five-year-old David Gelhardt died in a fire of suspicious origin on Captiva.

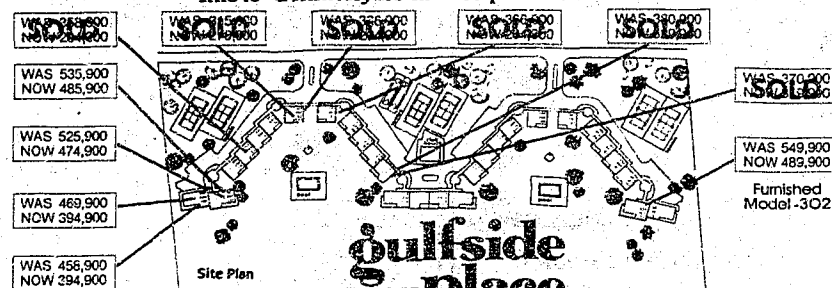

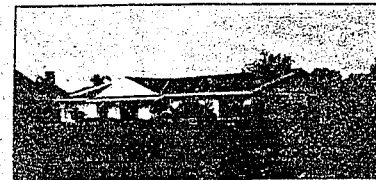

## It's not too late to sign up for boating safety course

The 1984 Safe Boating Class sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Power Squadron started Monday, Jan. 2. Those who missed the first session are encouraged to arrive a few minutes early for the Monday, Jan. 8, session for registration.

The classes meet at the Sanibel Community Association hall on Periwinkle Way. The time for all classes is 7 to 9:30 p.m. The course will run for nine consecutive Monday evenings and end Feb. 27. The only charge is for course materials that the squadron sells at cost.

This is the second time the Sanibel-Captiva squadron has offered the nine-week version of the 15-week course. Forty-three of the 45 people who

participated in the course last year passed the final exam and received certificates.

Besides making boaters more knowledgeable and safer on the water, the class has an added attraction because many insurance companies offer discounts to those who have completed the course.

Some of the subjects that will be discussed in this session are boat handling under adverse conditions, emergency procedures, boat trailering, anchoring and running lights, compass and chart familiarization, aids to navigation, and knot tying.

It is not necessary to own a boat to take this course. Only an interest in

safe boating and the desire to add to your boating knowledge are required. Anyone 17 years of age and older is eligible to take this course and family groups are welcome. The recent fatalities in our own waters could have been avoided with just a little knowledge of safe boating procedures. No advance registration is required but a phone call to either Bob Virdal at 472-1011 or 472-1267, or Bob Mublig at 472-4340 would be appreciated so the squadron will have an idea of how many students to prepare for.

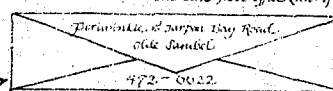

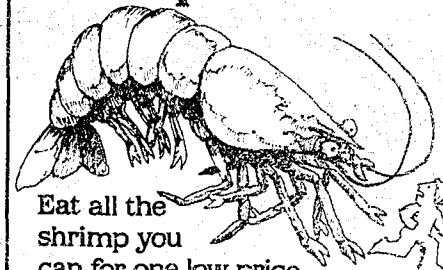

**Week of July 5**  
A Redington Beach couple died when their homemade plane crashed in the gulf off Upper Captiva Island.

The City Council invoked a six-month moratorium on development in Tarpon Bay, Sanibel Gardens and Sanibel Highlands subdivisions.

Gov. Bob Graham appointed Captivians John Burr and Charles Bruning to fill the two vacancies on the Captiva Erosion Prevention District board.

**Week of July 12**  
Construction began on Jerry's Shopping Center on Periwinkle Way.

**Week of July 19**  
Twenty-five homeowners were left out in the cold when the Planning Commission allocated dwelling units to 68 applicants who scored the highest points

in the July ROGO process.

Islander Mike Bradley, 17, won the South Florida PGA junior golf championship played in Tamiami.

**Week of July 26**  
Sanibel Police Officer Jeff Malar escaped serious injury when his patrol car was struck head-on by another car just off the Sanibel Causeway near the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce.

Longtime Sanibel businessman Jim Anhalt was granted a 15-month franchise to operate a trolley service on the island through April 1, 1984.

**Week of Aug. 2**  
The City Council had its first look at the proposed \$2.55 million budget for the 1983-84 fiscal year.

**Week of Aug. 9**  
The City Council turned down the recommendation to pave all the parking areas at the new City Hall and okayed blacktopping only the access roads and emergency entrances.

**Week of Aug. 16**  
"With strong objections," the Planning Commission followed the council directive not to award 25 ROGO allocations to the 25 single-family ap-

plicants who were left out in the cold in July.

A massive fish kill in the wake of heavy weekend rains killed a shark at Bowman's Beach.

Julie De Vere was named director of the Children's Center of the Islands to replace retiring Martha Rykman.

**Week of Aug. 23**  
Sanibel city fathers turned down Cablevision of the Islands' offer to televise City Council and Planning Commission meetings live from City Hall.

**Week of Aug. 30**  
City departments moved their offices from three separate locations on the island into spacious new quarters in the \$1.5 million City Hall complex on Dunlop Road.

**Week of Sept. 7**  
Scotty's Restaurant, an island tradition for a quarter of a century, closed with a "last blast party" thrown by owners Marian and Al Duncan.

Sanibel's plan to construct a public boat ramp on city property on the bay of Causeway Road received approval from the state Department of Natural Resources.

**Week of Sept. 13**

CEPD board. The plan called for raising \$3.8 million from an ISTU tax, \$1 million from the county's Causeway fund, \$989,440 from ad valorem taxes and \$465,000 from the state.

Attorney Jerrold Stern, a Sanibel resident for 2½ years, was hired as assistant to City Attorney David La Croix on a one-year trial basis. Stern will work part time averaging 20 hours a week.

Mariner Properties, Inc., dropped plans to develop Kinzie Island as an 18-unit single-family development.

**Week of Oct. 4**  
John Goode, trustee for Spira Inc., owners of Kinzie Island, filed a new plan with the city to develop Kinzie Island with 13 single-family homes and a common recreation area.

Palm Ridge Road businesses said "no" to the possibility of a one-way traffic system on the Periwinkle-Palm Ridge-Tarpon Bay Road triangle as an answer to the growing traffic congestion in

that area.

**Week of Oct. 11**  
City Council adopted a revised Rate of Growth ordinance that guaranteed applicants who fail to receive an allocation in one ROGO period will receive first priority in the next.

City councilmen reneged on an earlier decision and vote 3-2 to pave all parking areas at the new City Hall complex.

**Week of Oct. 18**  
A 3,595-square-foot addition to the Bank of the Islands gained Planning Commission approval.

**Week of Oct. 25**  
Melaleuca lovers united and collected more than 200 signatures on a petition asking the City Council to reconsider its plan for removal of all melaleuca on the island by 1988.

**Week of Nov. 1**  
The Sanibel Police Department began a family identification program that entailed fingerprinting

Whenever I ignored such urgent messages, my body would deliver the coup de grace. THE STITCH. THE STITCH was a sharp, knife-like pain below the ribs. ## Council repeals 'noxious' melaleuca designation

In a surprise move Tuesday the City Council called a truce in its war to eradicate melaleuca trees from the island in five years.

By a 3-2 vote the council backed off from its previous strong position and agreed to repeal a resolution designating melaleuca quinquangula a "noxious" plant. The resolution was adopted last July.

Councilmen Mike Klein and Louise Johnson cast the dissenting votes Tuesday.

The action came during a discussion of the wording of a petition submitted by five Sanibel voters that asked the council to consider adopting an ordinance removing the noxious label from melaleuca.

That label makes the fast growing trees a target for mandatory eradication under an existing ordinance that regulates dangerous buildings and hazardous lands on the Sanibel. The ordinance

prohibits the planting of and requires removal of all plants designated as noxious.

In mid-November the council acknowledged the public outcry from melaleuca lovers who opposed the city's plan to eradicate the tree. The plan gave islanders five years in which to voluntarily allow city crews to remove the trees at no cost to the property owners. By 1988, however, removal would be mandatory.

In the face of a petition signed by 272 residents, however, the council reaffirmed its resolve to eradicate the trees considered by some experts as extremely detrimental to native vegetation and a threat to public health and safety.

On Dec. 20 the petitioners filed an affidavit announcing their intention to circulate an initiative petition to force the council to put an ordinance repealing the noxious plant label to a referendum of Sanibel voters.

The simplest way to settle the question is to repeal the resolution now, Councilman Bill Hagerup suggested. The move will have no effect on the city's program for voluntary removal of melaleucas, he said, and the council can address the issue of mandatory removal "after we have a little history under our belt."

Johnson called the action a change in the direction of the eradication plan that "implies a bowing down to pressure and special interest groups."

Klein agreed that the council should "bite the bullet and let the controversy take its course."

But the other three councilmen prevailed in the view that it was a good idea to wait and see how the voluntary program works.

The council voted 3-2 to direct City Attorney David La Croix to prepare a resolution repealing the noxious resolution. That resolution will be ready for council action at the Jan. 17 council meeting.

receive books should call the library by 5 p.m. Thursday with their requests and leave their name, address and phone number.

Requests can be made for specific titles, for books by a particular author or for books and materials on specific subjects. The library staff checks to make sure the requested material is available and tries to borrow from another library via inter-library loan any requested materials that are not in the Sanibel collection.

Every Friday a FISH volunteer gathers all the materials to be delivered and notifies shut-ins about the approximate time to expect pick-ups and deliveries.

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

## A new lease on life

Papaya is one of the wild plants of Sanibel that grows rather commonly here. On our island in the sun it does not produce much in the way of quality fruit because of insect parasitism and blights, especially woodpeckers.

However, elsewhere throughout the tropical world the papaya is widely used as a breakfast or dessert fruit, and many people including this writer love the musky, sweet, juicy flavor.

Papaya products have received a new lease on life from the United States Food and Drug Administration. Back in the mid-50s Dr. Lyman Smith, an Illinois physician, became interested in a paper by famed Lewis Thomas (Lives of A Cell).

Thomas had been seeking enzymes to alter concentrations of protein in the blood. One day he injected a bunny with papain, a protease or protein-digesting enzyme found in the fruit, leaves and herbaceous stems of the papaya plant. The rabbit's ears, normally held erect by gelatinous cartilage, were floppy by the next day. Their cartilaginous support had been "digested" by the papain that had been distributed through the rabbit's body by its circulatory system.

This experiment intrigued orthopaedic surgeon Smith, who conceived the idea of employing papain to dissolve herniated spinal discs, i.e., the discs of cartilaginous material that separate the vertebrae of the human. These sometimes herniate in the lumbar region due to strain. Or they "slip," to use the vernacular term. (See illustration.)

This disc slippage is very, very painful, as some quarter of a million people in this country discover every year. The protruding hernia presses against spinal nerves, causing this very unpleasant condition.

Smith reasoned that papain or its close relative chymopapain might digest the cartilaginous-like disc and relieve pressure against nerves, thereby avoiding a painful and expensive surgical procedure that required a long convalescence.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration allowed the drug to be used experimentally from the mid-60s to the mid-70s. But the agency cancelled this partial approval in spite of the fact that about 70 percent of the patients improved with chymopapain therapy.

In the meantime, Canada, Britain, Australia and some other countries certified the treatment, and hundreds of Americans who would have fished to go to Illinois to Dr. Lyman Smith trekked instead to Canada, where a clinic in Toronto was established to administer chymopapain therapy.

After a series of new trials and a reassessment of all data, the FDA finally certified the procedure for the United States.

The injection technique of chymopapain cooks a lot less than the surgical procedure known as laminectomy which it replaces, and is as successful. Like most - parental

drugs, however, this substance can, on rare occasions, trigger anaphylactic shock, an allergic response that can be fatal. The mortality rate is minute - less than a quarter of one percent - about the same as that for laminectomy. This risk factor seems acceptable to the FDA.

Another use of papaya extracts is as an agent to tenderize tough meat. Adolph gets his active ingredient for his tenderizer from the papaya, and he has made rather a success of it. His product was inspired by a primitive Amerindian folk custom for tenderizing meat. Meat can be wrapped in Papaya leaves, either in or out of cold storage, and in hours - or overnight - the tenderizing effect will be manifested.

Karen Lovell, ethnobotanist of the University of Chicago, has conducted extensive trials on this tenderizing process. She swears it works. This skilled ethnobotanist, who is also a gourmet cook, employs green papaya chunks in marinades. She also puts chunks in stew that is made from poor-quality tough meat. The results are excellent.

I have long been skeptical of the meat-tenderizing abilities of this plant, but in face of this young scientist's evidence I must bow to her experience and knowledge.

Adolph's Meat Tenderizer has another use around these parts: a treatment for insect bites - especially the bite of the no-see-um, which is so annoying in warm weather. Many insects cause their itching bites by injecting alien proteins in you. If you rub a weak solution of Adolph's on your insect bites, it (theoretically, at least) digests that alien protein and relieves the symptoms. A lot of people around here swear by this practice.

The use of papaya for other and more controversial purposes has been undertaken, including one as a bovine contraceptive, and another as an "on the hoof" bovine meat tenderizer.

It has been alleged that when fed large quantities of Papaya leaves or other herbaceous parts (the stem is not very woody), cows fail to conceive. There is no proof of this, to my knowledge.

Until it was disallowed by our Department of Agriculture, large doses of papain were injected into the veins of tough old retired dairy cows. After the enzyme had circulated in the bloodstream to all parts of the animal, the beast was butchered and the resulting dressed-out meat was supposed to be tenderized.

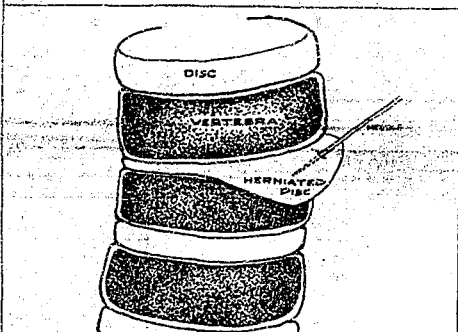
Tenderizing meat on the hoof doesn't seem to be a very humane activity, so I think the discontinuance of this practice ordered by our Department of Agriculture was justified.

The very best use of the Papaya (which, incidentally, is called Carica papaya and belongs to the family Caricaceae) is the consumption of its tremendously delicious fruit. In many parts of the world varieties that are especially delectable have been developed through selection. Most are orange-colored, rather soapy, melon-

textured, but some of the better varieties are big as watermelons and have pink flesh. The seeds are peppery in flavor and are inside the huge fruits which are true berries.

When a papaya is dressed for eating, if a few of these peppery seeds are left to be eaten with the fruit the entire flavor is enhanced.

Once a good variety is obtained, it is easy to maintain that same genetic strain. If you top a papaya tree, many new shoots will develop at the old leaf scars and along the top part of the amputated trunk. Wait until these are about a quarter-inch in diameter, cut off and sharpen the cut end and wedge it into a slit cut in a strong young seedling of undesirable fruit quality but with root strength.

This rootstock plant also has to be decapitated and new shoots of its genetic strain broken away while the scion from the good producer is taking over. It may be necessary, initially, to reduce the leaf area of the scion.

Other people grow papaya from seed, which is the common way to propagate around here. However, the

above grafting method is probably the best. In any case, it was developed at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Plant Introduction Station when it was headed by David Fairchild many years ago.

About 50 years ago there was a fine papaya industry in Florida, and large football-size papayas were available in many food shops. Today, local production is rare except when undertaken by caring home-owners or skilled horticulturists.

One friend muslin to prevent bird damage and parasitizing by insects. Another ties paper bags around each fruit. Recently, at Englewood, we saw some fine fruits that didn't seem to have any protection at all. Perhaps it was a resistant strain?

Medical and bizarre uses as described above are interesting enough, but just as a wonderful food source this species is very useful. This writer, at least, would like to see a revival of the papaya industry here in Florida.



## Florida panther returns to Sanibel for recuperation

Young Vente, the rare Florida panther raised by Sanibel residents Nora and Don Dietlein, simply wasn't ready to be "born free."

After just two weeks away from Sanibel at Robert Baudy's Rare Feline Breeding Compound, Vente lost 10 pounds and was rushed back home to "mumpty" last week.

According to Nora Dietlein, Vente moved in with his sister at the compound. For the first week he ate fairly well, she says. But then a cold spell hit the area and Vente fell ill and "really began to miss all the attention he was used to on Sanibel," she adds.

His body weight fell from 32 to 22 pounds. Baudy called the Dietleins and rushed Vente back to Sanibel for a dose of TLC.

As soon as Vente came out of his box at the Dietlein's home, he started purring, Nora says. The Dietlein's two standard poodles quickly greeted the endangered panther with loving licks. Then Vente ran right for the refrigerator, Nora says.

"So right then we knew Vente was just depressed and not very sick," Don says.

Nora mixed up a pound of appetizing fare, which Vente wolfed down. As of last week Vente had gained six of the 10 pounds he lost. He now weighs 28 pounds toward the 140 pounds he will weigh as an adult.

He was five days old and weighed only three pounds when the Dietleins adopted the rare Florida panther.

Nora admits she's grown more attached to Vente than other animals she's raised, which includes everything from servals to raccoons to leopards.

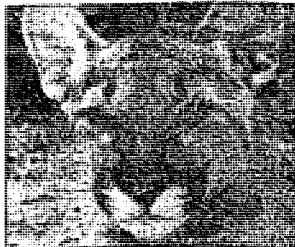
"We knew Vente's purpose was to be around people (as an educational animal) so we could handle him more," Nora says.

Yet she knows Vente eventually will have to return to the breeding compound — not to breed, but for advanced training.

And Vente already has a date this spring to meet the governor of Florida in connection with Baudy and the rest of the Florida Panther Recovery Team, an advisory group that is studying the future of the Florida panther — if there is any future for the endangered species, Don says.

Recent checking indicates there might be as few as 20-25 Florida panthers left in the dwindling wilds of the state.

"So Vente is going to be a big boy and go back to Baudy," Nora says, adding his purpose in educating Floridians about the endangered species is too vital to continue his vacation on Sanibel.

### Lee County students erect tripod osprey platform

The cry of ospreys pierced Sanibel's bright blue sky last week as a group of Lee County high school students built a new osprey nest for the beautiful raptors.

Under the direction of Mark "Bird" Westall, the students erected a tripod nest on an island between the Sanibel Elementary School and the J.N. "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge.

The students came from all six area high schools and are part of Lee County's environmental education construction class.

Earlier this year, the students constructed the nature boardwalk behind the Sanibel Elementary School.

"They spend a full day every other Monday working on a project like this," instructor Keith Hansen said. "Then they have to do make-up work at school."

So far, five tripod nests exist on the island. The other four are on Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation property along Glade Beach Boulevard.

The newest tripod is special because it replaces an existing platform on a nearby telephone pole where nests have not been successful. The platform will be removed soon.

"The telephone pole nest is highly visible for people along a moderately used path in the refuge," Westall said. "In all the five years I've been

monitoring it, we've never had any young leave the nest."

Eggs have been laid, Westall added, so the ospreys that have set aside this area as their territory are not sterile. But the chicks are not surviving. One factor might be human disturbance, Westall said.

Some species have less tolerance than others for human disturbance, Westall explained, adding that young ospreys would be threatened if the weather were unusually hot or cold and people stood away from the adult ospreys who were caring for their young.

"When they are a week old the chicks have no feathers and no ability to maintain their body temperature," Westall said. "The parents must be brooding with the chicks at this time."

"People can't mean to cause any harm to the ospreys," he said, adding they usually have no idea they are affecting the chicks' survival.

Now that the tripod nest is on an island, however, Westall hopes the ospreys will move to the new nest and not be bothered.

"When we remove the telephone platform, this nest will be the best site around in the immediate territory," Westall said. Ospreys are generally territorial in nature, he added.

The osprey tripod was designed by Al Lloyd and funded through the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.



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## ON THE WATER

I write a great deal about how to catch various kinds of fish, but to start the New Year off I think I'll tell you some of the best ways to lose fish for a change.

Sure, you all know how to lose them, too. As a matter of fact, some of us are better at catching "self-releasing" fish than anything else. Just ask a tarpon fisherman who has jumped dozens but has yet to get one back to the boat.

It's one thing to hook a fish, but some of the most comical antics I've seen on the water involve anglers trying to get their hooked fish into the fish box.

The average landing net can work against you as often as not. Once this summer we were fishing for small black tip sharks. These fish are reasonably good to eat and are excellent light tackle fish, too. We got one on the line that was about 30 inches long — average for summer black tip. I casually reached over the side of the boat and netted it, but the shark had other ideas about seeing the inside of my boat.

In one second it ate through my net, landed heavily on the deck and forced my anglers to stand

on my fishing chairs! The shark was still hooked, but it had gone right through the net and did not see any harm in the situation at all. I had to cut the leader and renet the fish on the bottom of my boat. I don't know how many snook I've seen get away from the side of the boat when the angler spooks the fish by trying to net it while the snook is still "green" and has plenty of fight left.

Redfish are also good at throwing that hook right past to the boat when an excited fisherman tries to net the fish too soon.

If you think some people are dangerous with a net, you should see them with a gaff. The gaff looks like a long fish hook, but without a barb in most cases. A one- to six-foot handle is usually attached, and in the hands of a rookie there is no telling who will get gaffed.

While tarpon fishing during the summer we latched onto a large lemon shark that a fellow on board wanted to mount. From experience, I can tell you that any shark takes a dim view of having someone put a gaff in its side as a prelude to being stuffed.

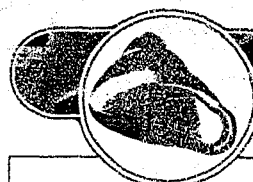
After we tired out this particular fish I planned to use my six-foot stainless steel gaff to pull it to the

boat. As the fish thrashed about, I gave a mighty heave and caught it near its tail. It took off under the boat, bent my expensive, never-fall gaff into a "U" and was just seen going over the horizon. I still haven't completely straightened out that gaff, but I have given up on aggravating large sharks.

But anglers who try to bring a fish in without a net by far lose the most fish at boatside, from docks and on the beach. Sea trout seem to get off the most after the angler fights the fish and then lifts it unsupported out of the water with the fish's entire body weight hanging on that hole in its jaw where the hook dug in. As the fish struggles it tears a larger and larger opening, and that instant you try to lift it is usually the same one where the fish drops back into the water.

A "gaff" hooked fish is no problem, but most fish are lip hooked and have a good chance of getting away if no net or gaff is used.

We've all lost some dandies, but keep that landing net handy and ease it under the fish at surface to increase your catch and reduce the number of stories about the one that got away.



## SHELLING TIPS

Finding a junonia is still the most important thing to many shell collectors, but a couple of other local shells also rate high on the list.

The other day we had a really close call that involved a junonia. A young lady on my charter found a half buried portion of a junonia. The cream colored shell with dark dots was under other broken shells, and when we examined it we could see it was a part of what once was a large specimen.

The girl was pleased to find just a part of this rare shell and added it to her bag of shells, but we went on to find another rare shell that you, too, have a chance of spotting on our beaches.

We found a perfect Scotch bonnet shell that was about two inches tall and without a blemish or mark on it. These rounded shells usually have a light yellow or tan background and display some dots on ribs that run around the shell.

As with many of the more uncommon shells, we don't know a lot about the living habits of the bonnet. This shell, incidentally, is in the same family with the helmet shell that collectors of larger specimens

value so.

There are perhaps three kinds of bonnets that we could see here, but the Scotch bonnet is the only one I've been able to identify. The smooth Scotch bonnet, the royal bonnet and a cross between a bonnet and a helmet — the reticulated cowrie-helmet — are possible finds for this area, but they are rarely seen.

There are two things I've always found interesting about this family of shells. One is that they are some of the few shells that eat sand dollars and sea urchins. The other is that the female bonnet lays eggs to form a tower on the bottom of the gulf.

Urchins and dollars are echinoderms with very few natural enemies in the underwater world. I've never seen a live bonnet and don't know of anyone who has found a live one. This leads me to believe they live in deep waters in the gulf and wash ashore after the animal dies from one cause or another.

Bonnets can be found on any beach around these barrier islands, but because of the volume of water rushing through passes and around points of the islands, your chances of finding one around Blind

Pass, Redfish Pass or Captiva Pass are greater.

There is not one single beach on Sanibel or Captiva where more bonnets, junonias or other valued shells can be found more so than on any other island beach.

Bonnets are found more frequently than junonias, but I know of many collectors who have been hunting for years and still haven't found one.

There is one other shell many consider a great find on our local beaches. This is the lion's paw shell. This scallop is larger than most and has definite ridges down the back of the paw. They make great jewelry. There are two sides to the lion's paw, but very rarely are both sides found on the beach.

Good shelling this week, and as far as I'm concerned even a piece of a junonia is a great find!

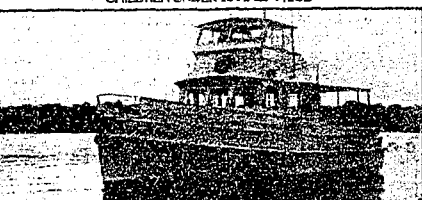

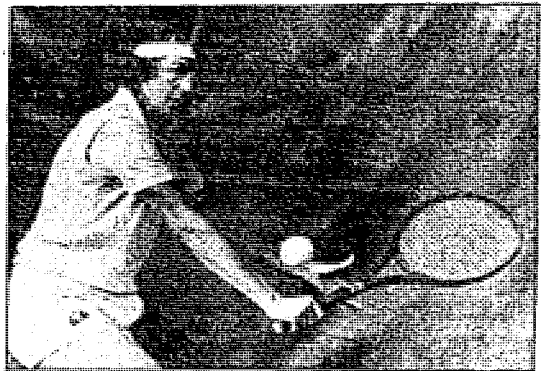
## Virginia Wade takes on area pros

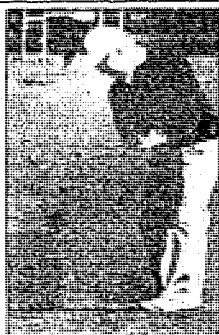


## Hangover or not, golfers spend New Year's Day at the Dunes

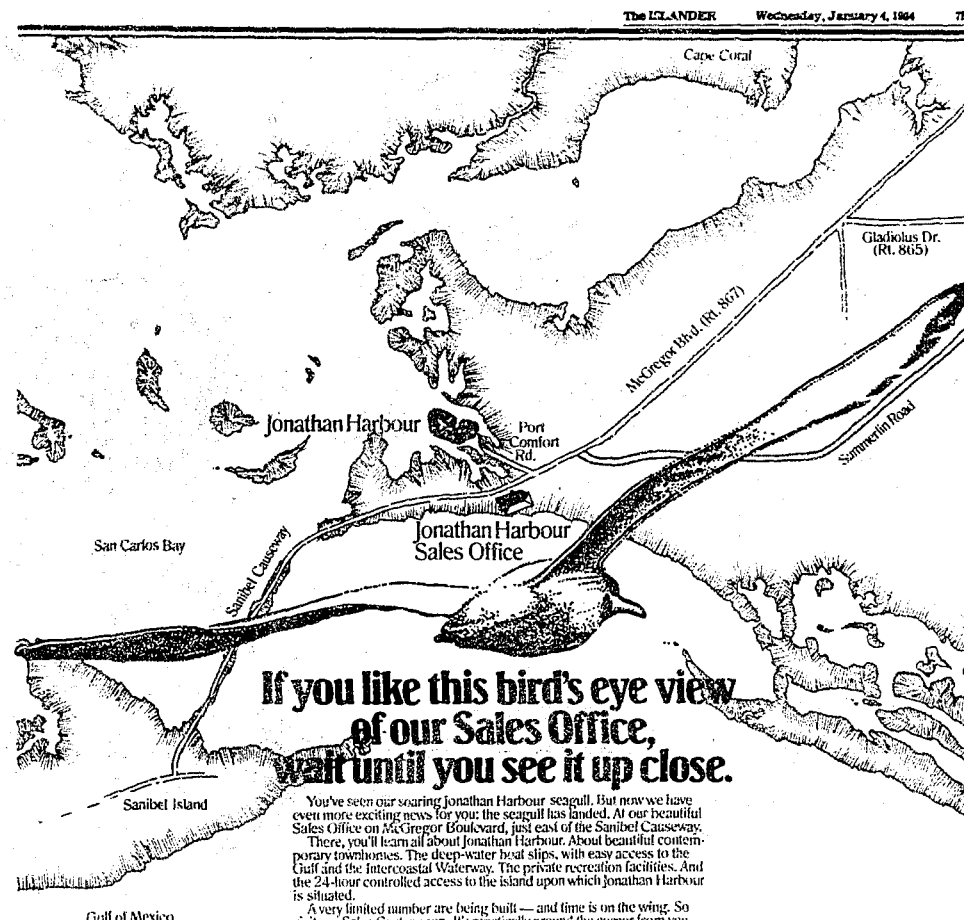

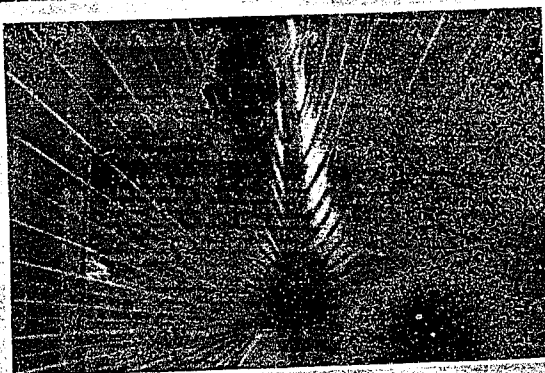

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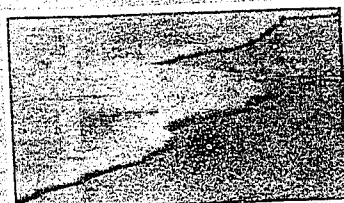
# Nature's art gallery
