Captivans voice their discontent with beach renourishment plan

The Capitiva Erosion Preventien District, recessed last week's public hearing until 8:10 a.m. this Wednes-day. April 24, Mt that meeting the board will decide whether or not to confirm a resolution that would send their project to Captiva voters for a June 4 referendum.

The referendum for all registered voters and a "straw vote" of all Captivus freeholders might then give the CEPD and all Captivus the most accurate picture of the concensus on beach renourishment.

A record-breaking 114,829 people visited the five Island branches of the

"J.N." Ding" Darling National Wildhic Refuge in March, The figure is more than 5,000 over the number of people who visited the popular Everglades National Park south of Naples during

National Park South of Naples during the same period.

The Everglades park had 109,385 visitors in March, Total visitation at the Sanibel refuge for 1984 was 259,000 more than at the Everglades park.

Shell Club asks city to donate museum site

The Shell Club has suggested that the city donate land next to the Island Historical Museum for the shell museum.

The Sambel-Captiva Shell Club's 40-year-old dream of having a shell museum on Sanibel took the first offical steps toward reality last Tuesday when Roland McMurphy asked the City Council to donate

land for the project.

McMurphy, chairman of the Shell Club committee
that is pursuing the museum idea, said the club
wanted to use land next to the Island Historical Museum for its project. He said it was an ideal place because the two museums could use the same parking lot and thus share patrons.

Mayor Fred Valtin seemed receptive to the plan in principle, although he did have two outstanding questions about the proposal.

Valtin wanted to know who would own the museum if it were on city property. He also wanted to know whether, if built next to City Hall, the shell museum would fit in with the Old Florida-style ar chitecture of the historical museum and City Hall

McMurphy told the council that if the museum is built on city property the shell club was receptive to city ownership and would not expect the city to have any financial obligations in the museum's construction. He also said the structure would complement existing architecture.

Councilman Louise Johnson voiced concern that the proposed City Hall site might take the land allotted for a cultural complex. City Manager Gary Price said the city could not commit to the shell seum if the property would be peeded for future

Valtin suggested the council send the plan to staff and take up the issue again when staff had comleted its report.

McMurphy seemed pleased with the council's actions. "If we can get it into the mill this is better than we have had before," he said.

Workshop will be set up to examine road situation in Sanibel Highlands

The "ideal" and the "reality" are already coming nio conflict in the application of the city's Wellands Preservation Ordinance

At last Tuesday's City Council meeting that con-flict was noted in the Sanibel Highlands area during russion of the Sanibel Highlands Drainage and Road Improvement Project.

That project has been adopted into the wetlands ordinance. The city has instructed staff not to do anything to encourage building in this low and wet

At the meeting last week City Manager Gary Price pointed out some of the problems the Public Works Department was having and the awkward osition he felt the city was being placed in

One such confusing signal from council, Price felt, is the council directive that no roads be improved if they do not serve existing developed property in the Phase I area of Sanibel Highlands. Instead, the mers have to build those roads as they

develop their property

And in the Phase II segment of Sanibel Highlands

And in the Phase II segment of saniors inginating no roads can be approved until Phase I is completed. "So the II or I2 houses now in Phase II are saying. "What about us?" Price said. "They can't even build their own roads unless Phase I is complete. So they'd have to build a road in front of somebody else's bouse before they built their own.

After the discussion Mayor Fred Vaitin admitted that city's position was "untenable "If that's what we decided I don't think any of the

Second floor approved for San Carlos Bay Drive home

Burt Binder appeared before the City Council last week with a wish list of three improvements for his San Carlos Bay Drive home. One of his wishes was granted.

The council denied Binder permission to build a swimming pool and a privacy wall he had hoped to add to the front of his house.

But Binder did win the right to add a second floor to his house that is presently a single story building, Council pointed out that Binder's house, which extends past the bay beach setback line in the rear and the road setback in the front, already violates many

Councilman Louise Johnson urged her fellow councilmen not to set a precedent by allowing ex-pansion of building that is in a restricted area Binder defended his requests

and said the swimming pool and privacy wall would not be in the sensitive bay beach area. In order to install the pool, he added, he would remove the existing concrete driveway in front of the house. And the second floor addition would allow him to move valuables to the top floor of the home away from possible flood damage, he argued.

"What I am asking is good planning and logical," he said.

But the council did not agree Johnson said she thought th

council should adhere to the land use plan except in cases of serious hardship. She made the motion to deny all three of Binder's equests.

But the rest of the council and

Binder came to a compromise The city would allow the addition of a second floor but not the pool or the privacy wall. And Binder will have to remove the concrete

driveway. Councilman Mike Klein made a motion for the council's com-promise package. It passed in a 4-1 vote with Johnson dissenting

No decision rendered on McT's parking lot

Charles and Mary Locicero have a new attorney and a new approach in their battie to continue using vacant lot they own adjacent to their restaurant -McT's Shrimp House - as a parking lot.

Attorney Beverly Myers-Brady, on the job for two weeks after replacing Heidi Wegryn-Martin who moved from the area, gave council notice that the Locicero's were withdrawing their request for a specific amendment to CLUP to allow the parking

Instead, Myers-Brady came to the council with aerial photos and other data in an attempt to prove that the parking lot has been a lawfully existing use

since 1972 and is therefore legal.

City Attorney David La Croix advised council that it would not be pertinent to discuss the issue until the Code Enforcement Board addresses the case.

The board discussed the issue Oct. 18 and concluded the Lociceros were in violation. But the board granted a continuance so the Lociceros could be represented by an attorney and also so more infor-mation could be gathered.

That meeting has not yet been held.
"It seems to me you want an endoresment from us before you go to the Code Enforcement Board," said Councilman Mike Klein, who agreed with La Croix that the council should do nothing until the issue is

City manager recommends paving for Las Tiendas Lane

To pave or not to pave - again that is the question, this time on a proposed improvement to Las

The City Council discussed the Issue last Tuesday during a first reading on a specific amendment to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan that would allow improvement of an "unimproved" sand shell road to serve six single-family residential lots fronting Las

Tiendas Lane.
The application was submitted by Douglas Spiern-Smith, trustee. The second and final reading will be held at 2:30 p.m. May 21.

"There is no question that this road should be pay-ed," said City Manager Gary Price. Not only is it currently city policy to pave new roads, but it would be much cheaper in the long run if the road were payed, be explained.

Don Schofield, the city's Public Works Director, estimated the cost of maintaining as a sand shell road the affected portion of Las Tiendas over a five-year period would be approximately \$4,600.

On the other side of the issue is the "ambiance" argument. All other roads in this area are sand shell roads, and more than 300 feet of payed road "would not be in keeping with the general casual quality of this particular segment of the community," the Planning Department staff report said.

Planners have supported the idea of vacating the road so that the roadway would be maintained by the developer and homeowners association. Spiern-Smith twice attempted to gain City Council for that action and was twice turned down.

Council hears new plans for conversion of Casa Bianca Apartments

The City Council heard a revised plan for condominium-izing the Casa Blanca Apartments on Periwinkle Way and Scagrape Lane last week. It was the first reading of the specific amendment

request.

The plans will be reviewed by the Planning Department before the scheduled second and final reading before council May 21.

City planners already have gone on record as "philosophically" opposing the resort use for the proposed nine-unit condominium. However, they did approve of the plan in general - with a certain

Roland Stout, speaking for the Damex Corpora tion which plans to develop the parcel, stressed that the condominiums would not rent for less then 30 days. He added that other recommendations made by the Planning Department staff had been followed in the revised plan.

The site is currently developed at 6.5 dwelling units per acre, which is approximately threefold the density permitted under the Comprehensive Land Use Plan

The change to divide the current buildings into condominiums would lower the density to 415 dwelling units per acre.

Two exemptions okaved. third request denied

The City Council heard three requests for exemp-

tions from the resort housing ordinance last week. Two of the three petitioners won their exemptions. James Shanel of 1142 Shell Basket Lane and Cyrus Biscardi of 1338 Jamaica Bay Drive both received exemptions to the city ordinance that states any single-family residence not in a resort housing area cannot be rented for less than 28 days at a time.

Franklin Dentz of 702 Donax Street could not convince council members to grant him the same ex emption for his single-family home.

Shanel, represented by attorney Richard Brodeur

asked the council for permission to continue renting his single-family home as he has done since he bought it in 1972.

Brodeur said the Shanels deserved the exemption

on three counts: the historical use of the property and the subdivision as resort housing; the city zon ing that locates a majority of the homes in the subdivision in the resort housing zone with only the Shanel residence and two other residences in residential zoning; and the future use of the property.

"This area (the Shell Basket subdivision) is not a typical residential area," Brodeur maintained, adding that because of split zoning in the subdivision Shanel's next door neighbor and the property across the street are in the resort bousing zone.

Brodeur argued that the subdivision should be consistant and that all property in the area should be gened for resort housing.

Councilman Francis Bailey made the motion to

grant the exemption for Shanel with the stipulation that if the property is ever transfered it can no longer be used for short-term rentals.

The council passed the motion 3-2 with Councilman Louise Johnson and Councilman Mike Klein discenting. Johnson said she could not support any motion that would put short-term rentals in a reaidentially zoned area.

Cyrus Biscardi also seeemed to have the council's ear Tuesday. He received an exemption from the or-dinance for his duplex in the Tradewinds

Biscardia produced evidence showing he has used his duplex as a rental unit for the past 25 years and he asked the council for the exemption to continue

"There is no reason to discriminate against something we have been doing for 25 years," he told the council.

While many of his rentals exceed the 28-day minimum rental for non-resort housing, Biscardi continue renting his property to a regular group of customers who stay less than the required 22 days.

Biscardi also stated that while he had rented his property for short periods of time in the past, he now

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

enuires a minimum of one week for the unit.

Klein said Biscardi's was the third request the council has received for a resort bossing exemption in the Tradewirds neighborhood. The councilman added he believed owners in the neighborhood wanted to keep its residential flavor...

Johnson agreed and said another exemption would erode the residential atmosphere of the area. Kieln motioned that the council deny the exempion. But the council voted 3-2 against the motion.

Councilman Bill Hagerup then proposed a substitute motion granting Biscardi's request with the stipulations that he could not rent the property for periods of less than seven days and that if the property ever changed hands it would revert to residential use. This passed in another 3-2 vote with

Johnson and Kiein dissenting.

The council's only denial of a resort bousing ordinance exemption came when Franklin Dentz requested permission to continue the short-term ren-tal of his home on Danax Street.

Dentz said his property is next to the Palm View Motel and added he has rented it out on a short-term hasis since 1978.

Dentz said when he purchased the property in 1960 he wanted to construct a duplex unit. He told the council his plan had been to use one side of the duplex as a retirement residence and the other for retirement income. But when he decided to build be

found he could only build one unit on the property.

After Deniz's presentation Hagerup said he believed this case was different from other cases More municipals page 24A

presented to the council and he would not support the exemption.

Dentz said he did not understand how someone next door to him could rent by the day and he had to

rent by the month.

Bailey called it a borderline case. Mayor Valtin agreed and said because of similarities in Dentz's and Shanel's requests he would support the

exemption for Dentz.

But Hagerup made a motion for denial of the exemption. The council upheld the motion 3-2 with

Bailey and Valtin dissenting.

Klein said the council needed to be firm on the resort housing ordinance to prevent the entire Island from becoming a resort area.

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

1833 maps detail original plats of 'Sanybel'

In 1977 an antique dealer in Oswego, N.Y.,
looking over some old maps to be auctioned,
spotted a familiar outline. He had found three original plats of the incorporated island of Sanybel, 1833.

The antique dealer contacted his friend on Captiva, Liz Williamson, another antique dealer. She verified the maps and bought all three

Williamson donated one of the maps to the city of Sanibel. It hangs in City Hall; a copy is displayed in the Island Historical Museum

Sanibel, along with other property, was bought in 1831 by Florida Peninsular Land Co., a group of investors who planned to establish a town in Southwest Florida. They created 50 shares of stock, each equaling about 1,800 acres of land. and put them up for sale at \$500 a share.

The investors chose Sanibel as the best place to settle, and in 1833 it was surveyed, platted and incorporated. Each shareholder was entitled to a tract of land from bay to gulf for cultivation and to a lot in the town laid out on Point Ybel.

The whole island could have been bought for \$25,000 - a lot more than the original investors

n January 1833 the schooner Olynthus out of New York arrived at Key West with about 30 would be settlers. When it left Benjamin Strobel, doctor and editor of the Key West Gazette, was with them to write a series of letters for the Charleston Evening Post that would be reprinted all over the country.

Il went well the first day as the sloop All went well the first day as the stoop

Associate followed the schooner up the coast.

At about 3 a.m. the following morning, however, a seaman gave a wrong sounding and caused the Olynthus to go aground just eight miles from Sanibel. There she lay helpless as the heavy surf swept across her decks and through the rear port

The Associate arrived at dawn and took aboard some of the passengers. When the Olynthus floated free with the next high tide all were reunited on Sanibel. By nightfall they were comfortably housed in thatched buts built for them.

Strobel lounged on his buffalo skin, cigar in hand, and with his companions "indulged in merriment at the day's disaster."

Suddenly a torrential rainstorm hit the island.

In moments the sand floor of their quarters was a lake of rainwater with floating baggage. The occupants dug a drainage ditch from front to back and finally, totally exhausted, they slept.

Strobel arose early to shoot ducks at Sanibel slough, but when he tried to retrieve them he stepped on the back of a submerged alligator. He scrambled ashore and after that limited his exploring to high places and to the beach with its

S trobel was an inquisitive man with a zest for life. When Indians arrived from the fishery at Punta Rassa he watched as they netted hundreds of sheepshead, drum and mullet. They brought an invitation from their captain to attend an Indian ball that night. But only Strovel would go off with them in their dugout canoes. He was welcomed by the Cuban Spaniard who was his host and enjoyed an excellent dinner after which they watched the Indians dance in the moonlight. He was awakened in the morning by the voices of the fishermen, their wives and children who were beginning their day's work of cleaning and salting

Strobel predicted that Sanibel would one day grow fine crops and would trade with cities on the gulf. He saw it, too, as a place for recreation and invisioned a convalescent hotel. He returned to Key West in March and soon after left there a few jumps ahead of the law after illegally participating in a duci and killing his opponent.

The Second Seminole War broke out in 1835, and when a customs collector from Josefa. (Useppa) Island was murdered in 1836 the settlers no longer felt safe in the area. Some went to Key West and remained there; others returned from whence they came, possibly in or near Oswego, N.Y., where the antique dealer discovered the map that is reproduced

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
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Business profile: Gladys Curtright

Stained glass artist turns hobby into profit

"You ought to be making money doing this," is a phrase people with creative hobbies often

Dyan Stuglin, owner of the Island Style shop in the Periwinkle Place expansion, is one who decided to take her friends' advice. And she's glad she did.

Stuglin's interest in creating decorative stained glass pieces has led to a successful retail business on Sanibel. And now she is much closer to fulfilling her dream of living year 'round on

Three years ago the east Detroit, Mich., native began dabbling in stained glass strictly as an artistic outlet. But before long, she says, "It got to the point where glass was a large part of my life."

At the urging of friends she decided to try to

At the urging of friends said declared to a truth a profit on her handiwork.

"Doing glass" is how she refers to the imaginative and beautiful ornate pieces she pieces. creates. Displayed throughout the shop are Tiffany style lamps, decorative mirrors and wastebaskets (which are probably never purchased with that use in mind).

She explains that she first designs an original pattern and then chooses the colors and types of glass for that particular piece. "You have to make sure the pattern is workable with the glass," she says.

Next she lays the glass on the pattern and cuts



That each piece is one-of-a-kind product of ber creative imagination is evident by the variety displayed in Stuglin's shop. "It's next for me to have whether the process of the product of the process." have what's in my head come out before me, she says with a smile.

She smiles a lot - she says it's the symptom of a bug she picked up five years ago while honeymooning on the Islands. Upon her return to Michigan after that trip, Stuglin found her home turf a little less appealing. She says she couldn't stop thinking about Sanibel.

The following year she returned to the Island with her husband, Robert, and after that the eagerly-awaited treks to Florida become more and more frequent. "I'd come down just for the weekend," she remembers.

Finally they decided they would be better off financially if she just stayed here. She is now staying with her parents in Cape Coral while

Now, with the tide of the tourist season ebbing, she says somewhat remorsefully, she plans to cut back on hours at the store - it will be closed on Sundays


The shop is an interesting, colorful hodgepodge of artwork, all with a distinct Island flavor. The collection represents the work of craftsmen and artisans from around the world and close to home. Lisa Remeny, well-known Florida artist and

painter of Jamaican scenes (she's known there as the Banana Girl) is well represented in the shop. Silk scarves by Ann Babineau, president of the Southwest Florida Art League, are there along with works in photography, pottery and basketry by numerous area artists. Stuglin also has a collection of Sanibel's Sue Stephens' distinctive shell paintings. One spectacular piece in the shop is a seven-

foot-tall carved wooden fig tree that stands gracefully against one wall. The work was done by the Italian artist, Matista, an employee of the Vatican and well-known throughout his country. As impressive as its appearance is its price tag - \$8,000 - but Stuglin says she really doesn't mind if nobody buys the tree. "In fact if somebody did, I'd cry," she says.

It's obvious she loves her work, her store and her new home. "If I had to work 16 hours a day I would," she says. "Even when I'm not here I'm thinking about it. Our ultimate goal is to have our own home here. And if I can have the dream, it's all worth it.

"People say it doesn't change," she says about her infatuation with the Island. "I hope I feel this way forever!



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
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

• The principle of a referendum versus a vote by Captiva freeholders.

A fear was raised that the CEPD was ramrodding (the vote) of transien employees down the neck of Captiva property owners)."

Only registered voters - which includes resort employees - can take part in the official referendum vote.

The question of how seriously the separate "straw vote" of Captiva freeholders would be considered when eighed with the official referendum

of registered voters.

much or not enough:

•The general question about
whether or not renourishment is in
fact a viable solution to the erosion moblem on Captiva

The possibility that the cost of renourishment would force some proerty owners to sell their land. And if this would in fact change the nature of the Island by opening it up to more resorts that could pay the required price - both of property and

Whether the CEPD commissioners have a conflict of interest since they can be perceived as "judge, jury and advocate", for the plan they

supported.

And the final issue discussed
Wednesday night concerned the
possibility that as soon as the commissioners confirmed the resolution which they might do tomorrow - a lien would immediately be placed on all Captiva property until the project was either disbanded or completely

paid for, CEPD attorney James Hum-phrey confirmed this indeed would be This raised several questions — one of which regarded what would happen if someone tried to sell his property during the eight-year period when the

assessments would be levied. While this has not been definitively answered, it appears that the assessments would not be assumable and would have to be completely paid off before a sale could be closed.

Many, many other issues were raisdebated concerning both generalities and specifics about the Current assessment plan.
One woman, Elizabeth Friedmann,

did rise to speak in favor of renourish-ment and received a faint smattering of applause. She argued that while most of the 60 or more people at the public hearing were obviously anti-renourishment or anti-assessment plan, they should not forget that about a 64 percent majority (314 people) had approved last year's Municipal Ser vice Taxing Unit petition with similar assessments

Lee County officials refused to establish the taxing district without a 65 percent majority.

This action resulted in attorney

Humphrey's strong recommendation that the commissioners must take matters into their own hands and use the power of their Enabling Act. That act sets guidelines for special assessments for beach erosion pro-jects. The assessments are then voted on by referendum — the process the CEPD has followed up to this point.

For each of the arguments cited above, strong objections and defenses were presented by both sides.

Commissioner John Burr strongly defended the charge that the hoard members want to renourish the beaches so badly that they would ignore the "straw vote" if the referen-

dum proved favorable.
"We're desperately trying to find out what the Island wants," Burr said. That comment stirred a ripple of laughter from the emotionally charged and unbelieving crowd.

We keep getting mixed signals The first referendum (in 1981) missed by only four votes: the first MSTII had a plus 58 vote; and the last MSTU received 64 percent approval." Burr said. "Most people seem to want renourishment, but there are strong feelings against it too

"We all feel that a referendum is not the way to go - we know that - but it is the only legal way," he added. That same point has been stressed time and time again by Humphrey.

But we can use a straw vole - and each of us will give at least equal weight to that vote," Burr pledged.
Commissioner Dewitt Jones, who

had allegedly made an unpolitic comment at a prior board meeting to the effect that the heard would on with the referendum results, clarified his position for the record

"I want to clearly state we will consider the straw vote and will not ignore

it," Jones emphasized.
The conflict of interest argument brought to a head by Robert Meyner also drew much discussion, Meyner, a former governor of New Jersey, said he had more than 50 years experience in the legal profession.
"There's a vital question here — can

you be judge, jury and then decide on your own property and others, 'Meyner said, "Even in the Supreme Court, if a wife or another member of the family has a certain investment the judge must step out of the case."

Humphrey countered that the

CEPD's Special Act took that issue in-

"They have a responsibility to come up with a program, and it is envisioned that of course they are property owners and electors," Humphrey said. "They have a responsibility to act. They own property, and it has to be considered by them, but it is not a conflict of interest "

The conflict of interest discussion also spurred a full disclosure of how would be assessed in the program they

have helped create. Chairman Peg Hoischneider would be assessed \$1,675; and commis-sioners John Burr, \$20,700; Dewitt Jones about \$7,000 Lloyd Wright. \$27,500 for his home and \$235,000 for his husiness ('Tween Waters Inn); and Chuck Bruning, \$1,628.

While many other issues were argued back and forth, raw emotion still ruled the public hearing.

"Putting aside the legal and technical differences, what you pro-pose is in fact imposing confiscatory assessments on property owners, said attorney Richard Roosa, attorney for Captivan Marie Kalman and the Natural Beaches Committee.

'You have assessed more than \$50,000 on my client - and that would be mind-boggling to most Americans," Ross said. "My client might have a \$1 million piece of property, but she is using it as a home

just as I would use my home.
"What you are doing is imposing on others a choice — (one of which is) forcing them to cash in their land in order to raise funds to pay your assessments," Roosa said. "The cure (renourishment and its cost) is far worse than the illness (the erosion problem.) We do have a problem with ero-

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

The Bailey Tract on Tarpon Bay The Perry Tract along the Gulf

of Mexico beach near Sanibel's Gulfside City Park March is always the busiest month at the "Ding" Darling refuge, Visitors

this March numbered more than 3,100 over the March 1984 figure. The increase in visitation adds to staff responsibilities and necessitates

increased law enforcement patrols to monitor visitor activities. A refuge Visitor Center record was broken Tuesday, April 16, when 1,403 poeple came through the center in eight hours. But the refuge staff has found that only one out of every four

head of the five-mile Wildlife Drive. While more than 74,000 people used the drive in March, only 21,397 stopped at the center for information.

A possible reason why some people do not stop at the center is that many are repeat visitors. Yet staffers who talked to people along the drive found

this is not always the case.

Visitor Center exhibits and programs do assist first-time and repeat visitors. A 15-minute audio-visual orientation program is a must for all first-time visitors. Exhibit dioramas show visitors reseate spoonbills, blue crabs, gopher tortoises, indigo snakes and alligators, all of which can be seen in the refuge. A small shop in the center offers numerous publications that contain further information about nature in Southwest Florida.

During March two new publications became available. The new, free general leaflet includes a good map

and other information to assist the visitor who wants to know what to do and when to do it. The new "Drive Guide" corresponds to numbered stops along the Wildlife Drive and addresses wildlife management activities that keep the refuse staff busy. It represents a vast improvement over the previous guide and costs only 50

Recent wildlife management activities included filling one of the refuge pools with tidal waters so that the roseate spoonbills, ducks and other birds can survive during the current dry spell. Preparations for and ac-tivating a controlled burn of 36 acres also recently took place. Firelines

were widened and advanced studies were made. The controlled burn will help restore marsh grass areas so necessary for wading birds, shorbirds and other wildlife.

Some refuge water levels soon will be lowered by removing culvert control boards. This management activity will provide suitable conditions for the shore birds that migrate through or spend the summer on the refuge. Visitation in April should decrease,

but beneficial management activities will continue. Visitors are encouraged to come to the refuge and learn more about these management activities and also enjoy the walking trails, canoe trails or Wildlife Drive - all of which are free and offer unique wildlife viewing opportunities





Have you ever heard a person who is just about to make a major boat purchase justify the cost of the vessel by telling someone, usually his wife, that a boat is "a good investment"

I myself used this reasoning in the purchase of a couple of boats. It helps convince a doubting spouse that contrary to logic, buying a fancy ishing boat with many options is downright smart, ct alone good business sense.

I recently saw a list of some of the best pur-

chases a boat owner could have made over the past 10 years. I'll give you the list in a moment, and if you have a loat more than 25 feet long yo will be able to see whether you own a financial

turkey or a goldmine.
But before we get into that let's talk briefly about buying boats and what kind of money you an expect to make or lose.
First of all, off-brand boats or those that are new

to the market are nearly always poor investments. I once bought a brand new 26-foot sailboat for a most attractive price. It was new on the market and also was a new venture for the powerboat company that made it.

After a few years I found my "investment" was not holding its own. It was depreciating in value riends and boat dealers had told us sailboats would hold their own, but in reality only four or five models have ever held their value - and

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those half dozen or so actually made their owners

Based on a computer survey conducted by Motor Basting and Salling magazine and published in their April edition, here's a list of the saliboats that if purchased 10 years ago would turn a very nice profit for you today; The Tartan 34 — Original cost, \$27,000; to-

day's value, \$45,000.

The Hinkley Bermuda 40 - \$28,000 then;

• The Cape Cory 25 - \$22,000 then; \$30,000

today. • The Person 30 - \$18,000 then; \$26,000 today. Incidentally, Capt. Roger Nordulf of Captiva told me he has had enough dealings with the Cape Dory line of boats to feel that many of the boats this company makes will become classic in-

vestments over the years.

If you are more into powerboats and big ticket boats, these are the ones that will make you

• The Bertram 46 - \$151,000 in 1975; \$190,000 today. How would you like to tell your wife that by purchasing a boat you could make \$4,000 a year? Brand name boats like Hatteras are always good bets. If you had bought a 53-foot motoryac \$205,000 in 1975 you would have made \$90,000 by

The Viking 41.

e The Egg Harbor 36. Sailboats that are doing great outside of those above include the Sabre 28 (made \$12,000 in 10 years) the Swan 65 (Increased a whopping \$125,007 in 10 years) and the Valiant 40 (\$73,000 in 1975: \$110,000 today - if you can find one on the

The people who researched the boating article said that nearly any boat under 25 feet long is a financial loser, no matter how much we all want believe otherwise. The primary reason is that there are so many of them. The lone exception is the 25-foot Make lishing boat. The hull sold for \$7,000 to years ago and today is worth the same. It's the only boat in that league that did not lose

Dealers for brand boats like Whaler, Aquasport, Robalo, See Craft and so on will all imply that their hulls hold value, but only the Make 25 is doing it at the moment.

If you have an off-the-wall brand of boat, power or sail expect it to denreciate much as an

You have to remember, however, that most host owners are not in it to make money. We know

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SHELLINGTIPS

By Captain Mike Fuery

Only a handful of shells chance color and body form as they mature. A young angel wing is the the Florida lighting conch makes an interesting

change as it grows.

Color variations seem to be the most common differences between young and adult shells. Few shells undergo radical changes in their form, as loes the fighting conch.

Many new shellers do not realize that the small white or light brown shell they find will one day be a three-to four-inch tall fighting conch with a bstantially different shell.

The fact that the shell does change, especially during its first few years, makes for a larger display because you can show specimens of each stage of growth.

There is even a teenage stage for the fighting concb in which the adult brown colors are just starting to appear but the juvenile colors have not

We don't know exactly why a few shells change color like this, but we do know few things in the underwater world are by accident. Perhaps the young fighting conchs need to blend in with surrounding sand to escape other univalves.

Many shells do lose their color to some extent as

they reach old age. Yes, there is an old age stage for shells, too. The left-handed lightning whelk is particularly colorful until it is a year or two old.

Those young whelks can be brown, green, blue and can even have yellow or gold stripes. But by the time the shell is six or seven years old it begins to lose that vivid color.

Many new shellers are always on the lookout for that one big shell. Unfortunately, when they see a really large whelk they are often disappointed because it is light tan or almost white and the bright colors of its younger days are gone.

origin colors of its younger anys are gone.

The tiny horse conchs are another great example of the younger ones being the best specimens.

Horse conchs of only an inch or two are a vivid gold, but as they mature they, too, fade and the shells takes on a dark, hair-like covering. That covering can be removed, but the striking color is

gone forever.
Young lettered olives seem to evolve differently. They are often born nearly white or devoid of colorful markings that develop as they mature. The young olive might be highly polished and have a sharp point, as a good adult would have, but

without color.

When the olive dies the shell again loses most of its color because of fading from the sun and sand.

So the olive's middle years are the most colorful Good shelling this week. Try to collect a number of shells of the same species that show the range of growth pattern. The fighting conch is a good one for this purpose.
