Every person on Sanibel should recognize at least one of the names above. The first five are notification leaders, each in charge of one zone on the Island for spreading the word when a hurricane threatens. The sixth person, Abe Lerner, should be familiar to anyone on the Island who is elderly or infirm or alone or who for any other reason will need assistance getting off the Island when a hurricane evacuation is ordered.

Lerner is the president of Friends in Service Here, a volunteer organization of Islanders whose concern for their neighbors in need reaches countless Islanders and visitors every year.

During hurricane season FISH needs volunteers to help in the early evacuation of elderly, infirm or otherwise incapacitated residents. If you can help or if you need help — read this week's story on page 12A.

leaders were among more than 100 Islanders who attended — voluntarily — a special hurricane meeting at City Hall one night last week. The attendance at the three-hour session and the spirited, serious questions and discussions that arose showed a very special side of the Islands that is often shadowed by the attractions of nature

here — people.
Our beaches, sunsets and abundant wildlife constantly are touted, and rightfully so. But Islanders themselves are pretty special, too. They put the "community" in Sanibel and Captiva, and as last week's hurricane meeting proved, ours is a community of many caring, concerned, unselfish people.

These people have given their time, their money, their equipment, cars and trucks - virtually whatever they have that could help before, during and after a storm strike - to ensure that we still will have a community to come home to after a hurricane.

They do their jobs largely behind the scenes and in silence, without much expectation of public praise. Perhaps the biggest thanks they could ever hope for is the cooperation of an informed, concerned public when a hurricane threatens.

Know what you will do, where you will go in the face of a hurricane. Get to know the notification leader for the zone you live or work in. Offer your help if you are in a position to help; ask for it now if you know you will need help later.

You can make a difference for the entire community.

To the City Council:

Newspaper reports on Lee County's improvement program for its Bowman's Beach regional park with city involvement cause me some concern, especially on the funding aspects.

Noteworthy is the restroom facilities which include drinking fountains and showers. Such facilities can be expected to place a sizable demand upon the Island's water supply, i.e. our privately-owned Island Water Association, Being members of that association, you are aware that the only income available to IWA comes from Sanibel and Captiva consumers, who are also responsible for its debts and solvency.

In summery, I strongly object to IWA and myself being bound by any interlocal agreement which requires the use of city or IWA funds for the development or operation of a facility or service which is the responsibility of the county to solely provide. 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

Traffic concerns force continuation of consideration of Periwinkle-Lindgren comprehensive health care center

Hung up on the question of how much traffic will be generated by a 9,700-square-foot comprehensive health care center and its impact on the busy intersection of Periwinkle Way and Lindgeon Boulevard, the Planning Commission last week con-tinued discussion of Dr. John Collucal's project until

Last Tuesday at the hearing of Collucci's request for a development permit the commissioners were also concerned about the size of the project, which associated moon to the size of the project, which calls for a 6,393 square-foot addition to the existing Michigan Homes office building.

Bill LeTendre, a bealth care consultant employed

by Collucci, said a smaller building would not commodate the equipment for all the ancillary health services needed to provide the comprehensive health care planned.

Collucci said the complex is designed to house a maximum of five "practitioners" including physicians and technicians such as a radiologist, physical perapist and cardiac rehabilitation specialist

He said growth of the facility would be phased and probably be six or seven years before it ould be completely staffed.

However, Collucci said the entire facility would be built according to the plans now submitted to the city. He said he was forced to take this route since his lan to remodel the existing building and use his own family medical practice was denied by the

Architect Joe St. Cyr said revised plans now complied with all the planning staff concerns expressed since the application was first submitted in

St. Cyr said that to make the new addition com potible with the existing building, the height of the central tower would be reduced and the two structures blended together with hip roofs

St. Cyr said the 67 parking spaces provided would be more than adequate. Five practitioners with three staff each and the three patients per hour each would create a need for a total of only 35 spaces, be

An average of 15 cars would come and go at the facility every hour, he estimated.

St. Cyr agreed to a one-way driveway with ingress from Beach Road and egress on Lindgren Boulevard, eliminating curb cuts on busy Periwinkle Way.

St. Cyr said a 25-foot right-of-way on Beach Road

sold by said a 25-1001 right-dr-way on Beach Road would be dedicated to the city, and 20-1001 vegeta-tion buffers would be installed along property lines. Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the plans did not demonstrate any attempt to reduce the intensity

of use by cutting down on the size of the develop ent. "9,700 square feet is the maximum use of the 10 percent floor area permitted on the site." he said LeTendre said 12,000 square feet of floor area is usually the minimum for health care facilities of

this type.
Under CLUP's development intensity standards no greater traffic can be generated by conditional

uses than by commercial permitted uses, Rogers

"About the only thing we can agree on," Rogers "About the city thing we can agree on," Rogers, said, "is that a comprehensive medical facility will create more traffic than a general office building."
"If you agree that this is true in this case," he told the commissioners, "You may require the

Casa Ybel resort has the green light from the Planning Commis-sion to pave existing shell driveways and parking areas at the gulf-front complex.

Last week the commission voted 5-1, with Commissioner Bill Webb dissenting, to recommend council approval of a specific amendment needed because the new asphalt surface will exceed the permitted impermeable

overage at the site.
Webb based his "no" vote on his

dislike of paved parking lots.

Although it has been city policy to encourage use of shell to main tain a "natural look" in commercial parking areas, the asphalt will be visible only to owners/guests of the time share units and will not have a negative impact on the community, the planning staff conceded.

Oriental restaurant will have new pagoda roof line

Planning commissioners agreed with owner Nghia Hoong that a new pagoda roof and Chinese lanterns along the store front facade would give his Palm Ridge Place restaurant an "oriental look." But they disagreed with the planning staff's opi-nion that these modifications designed to make the

business more visible constituted a street graphic. Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the Graphies ordinance defines as a street graphic any device used for the "attraction of the public to a place of business that can be seen from a public to the public right-of-way."

A business in a shopping center is permitted only one street graphic, and Hoang's Oriental Cuisine already has a sign mounted on the wall of the storefront, Rogers said.

If the commission interpreted Hoang's proposed ndifications to the roof as a street graphic, a variance from the sign ordinance must be approved by the City Council. "But it's strictly a judgment."

His colleagues agreed with Commissioner Bill Read that the roof modifications were "an embellishment, not a sign" and voted 6-0 to advise the council that in their opinion a sign variance is

not necessary. Since the city has not adopted any standards for architectural design, the staff found no basis on which a development permit could be denied.

Action delayed on wildlife sanctuary proposal "People should be educated not to

The City Council has postponed until full further efforts to have the city of Sanibel designated a "bird sanctuary."
On June 4 the council took no

action on a resolution requesting the Florida Game and Freshwater Fish Commission to establish the entire Island as a bird sauctuary. The councilmer decided against taking any action because they learned it was too late to submit the proposal to the state commission for action at its

July meeting. The commission meets only twice a year, once in January and again in July.

Under the bird sanctuary um-

brella all Lirds and wild animals on Sanibel would be protected and the city would be responsible for enforcing the game and fish commission regulations for the pro-tection of all birds within the sanctuary area, City Attorney David La Croix said.

As of last week La Croix had not been able to verify whether these regulations apply to wildlife other than birds.

Councilman Mike Klein pointed out that if they do apply to other wildlife, a Sanibel resident no longer would be allowed to kill a poisonous coral snake in his back

Questions needing answers before the city can determine whether a bird sanctuary label is desirable include:


1. Are there specific regula tions for the city to remove sonous snakes, rats and other animals and nuisance alligators?

2. Must all control be exercis ed by the city itself, or can a private homeowner kill a nous snake in his yard or set traps for rodents?

3. What types of special per-is — for handling certain wildlife such as nuisance alligators - do the commission issue applicable in a bird sanctuary, and what authority would the city have in monitoring or en-forcing regulations relating to these activities?

If they determine that it would be in the public interest to label the city a bird sanctuary, the councilmen intend to submit the request in time for action by the Game and Freshwater Fish Commission at its January 1986

Requests denied for additional stairway, increased density

Following Planning Commission recommendations the City Council last week denied two specific amendments

A request to add a second pair of stairs to a niling home on South Winds Drive was turned down by a unanimous vele of the council Harry Poulos submitted the re-quest for the owners.

The proposed stairway, planned for the wettest spot on the property, would have exceeded the tted coverage on the site.

The council viewed as upaccenfeet of gutter to improve the drainage problem in exchange for permission to add a record access

to the house. A circular staircase underneath the house was a viable after-native, the council agreed.

Dale Armstrong's request for a density increase to permit a single-family home on each of two contiguous lots in Shell Harbor subdivision was denied by a 3-2 vote. Mayor Fred Valtin and Councilman Francis Balley cast the dissenting votes.

Armstrong had a conditional contract to buy one of the lots from Thomas and Judith Barry Attorney James Humphrey told the council.

The 20,500 square-foot percel was held in common ownership prior to the adoption of the land use plan until 1980, when the Barrys purchased it.

At that time under CLUP rules regarding contiguous lots, only one home could be built on the

In April 1981 the council passed an ordinance exempting owners of contiguous lots from the restriction providing each lot contained a minimum of 10,000 square feet, the property was in a subdivision more than 50 percent



Commission recommends 10 dwelling units for trade-off on commercial property

Ten residential units on 3.54 acres on the north side of Wooster Lane gained Planning Commission approval last Tuesday. The units are a trade-off for the course feet of commercial source assigned to

be site by a specific amendment granted in 1983.

Developer John Van Heemst had requested 14 mits and called the Planning Department's recomunits and called the Planning Department's recom-mendation to permit only six a "good way to discourage residential development on compecial-

discourage residential development on commercial-ly zoned property."

Van Heemst argued he was entitled to at least 11 units. Using CLUP standards that permit as a condi-tional use a trade-off of 500 square feet of commerial space for each dwelling unit developed, 10 units hai space for each dwelling unit developed, to units hould be allowed, he maintained.

Van Hemst said he was also entitled to one unit as

a permitted use on the property. Eleven residential units are economically viable, he said, adding, "Ten

Planning Director Bruce Rogers pointed out that only 1.54 acres of the combined parcel are zoned for

commercial use. The remaining 80,000 square feet, under terms of the specific amendment approved for owner William Compton, were reserved as open space Regent added

Compton's Thetan Crafts Shop building is located on a portion of the property.

Rogers said the staff arrived at six units as ap-

propriate by using two formulas. Based on the 1.54 acres of commercial land and the maximum density of four units per acre permitted by the conditional trade-off, 6.2 units are permitted.

Another reasonable way by which it was deter Another reasonable way by which it was been mined six units would be appropriate. Rogers said, was considering the potential economic return from the property as commercially developed compared to its development as residential. Van Hernst protested that zoning cannot be hased

on purchase price.

Commission Bill Webb computed the density a third way using ecological zones and said seven units would be permitted. Commissioner Bill Read pointed out that if only six units are permitted under the trade off formula 2,000 square feet of commercial space would still be left for retail development. He maintained it would be better to allow 10 residential units and use up all the office/potail floor area

The other commissioners agreed with this

encept.

Read's motion to recommend that the City Council approve 10 units with the condition there would be no further commercial development on the parcel passed by a 6-9 yote. Commissioner Henry McKee

was obsent.

Dr. Dorothy Newman, director of the city's below
Market Rate Housing foundation, asked the commissioners to consider raising the number to 14 with
the four additional units committed to the Below Market Rate Housing program.

The commissioners declined however, and said

City aftorney will examine whether city can sell rather than vacate property

The Planning Commission has recommended the city vacate a 1,218-square-foot strip of land at the north end of a public canal between Lindgren

north end of a public canno between Lindgren Boulevard and Beach Road.

There is no access to the landlocked parcel for public use, the planning staff reported.

Truman Wilson said Michigan Homes intends to nurchase the land from Hugh Lindgren, the original developer of Shell Harbor subdivision, and con-solidate it with the adjacent Michigan Homes office building property.

Wilson sold that when the canal was dedicated to Lee County there was a error made in drawing the property lines, and this little piece of land remained

in public ownership.

Commissioner Bill Webb objected to the city's
"giving away the land." His motion to approve the vacation suggested that the city atterney in-vestigate whether or not the city could sell the land. The motion also included the condition that any development intensity of the parcel will be nullified.

The city of Sanibel and Friends in Service Here need volunteers to help with the early evacuation of the Island's elderly or handicapped residents well in advance of a hurricane threat.

Volunteers are not obligated to change their own evacuation plans in any way, nor are they committed for any special time period. The following dures are planned:

I. Participation will be as part of a two-man team to help those in need by bringing moveable outdoor items under cover, closing storm shutters, taping windows, etc., at a single residence and by transporting the evacuee(s) to a central gathering

2. The above will be accomplished approximately three days prior to ar anticipated hurricone strike. 2. Timing of activities and iden-

lification of evacuees will be courdinated by FISH for the Sanibel Emergency Management Team. 4. Post-hurricane assistance might also be called for to re-open an evacuated residence upon the owner

5. Each volunteer should notify FISH, 472-0404, if he leaves the Island for a length of time and when he returns. This is necessary to ensure a reliable manpower count for FISH coordinators and to avoid useless telephone calls at a time when speed

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



· With an estimated 25 percent vacancy rate for Lee County office complexes, the area is following a nation-wide glut of empty offices. Houston reports the highest vacancy rate with 27.6 percent vacanies. The national average is estimated at 16 percent (from Business View of Southwest Florida).

Yes, life in the stock market can be a dream - but

only for very short periods.

Those market participants who insist on wearing rose-colored glasses and ignoring the reality that stock prices must have cycles both up and down will end up seeing dreams turn to nightmares when they are able to sleep at all.

The market is developing one of its classic and periodic catch 22's, and anyone who ignores it is

periodic cater 2s, and anyone who ignores it is headed for sleepless nights. On the happy side of the ledger, interest rates have dropped so sharply that many investors, both institutional and public, are no longer attracted to fixed income investments and are starting to buy stocks more aggressively. Of course, the 80-point jump in the DOW industrial the past five weeks attests to that.

The public is coming back to stocks as shown by ed margin debt and the broadening of in terest to lower priced and more speculative stocks. Institutions are also on the buy side, and as we see lots of stocks in bull markets, the institutional rota-

tion from stock to stock has not taken on the look of distribution and topping out action. The catch 22 is that as interest rates dron, foreign money, which has financed the bulk of our treasury offerings, will go elsewhere. This, in turn, will force the federal government to manipulate rates back up again just about the time they expect the economy to improve - which will bring in increased corporate and public demand for credit. You see, it's all very simple - there are no one

way streets. What we can rely on and expect are cycles, as trends in anything eventually lead to excesses which

are corrected either gently or severely.







Three escape injury when fire guts condo

Upstairs neighbors alerted firefighters to the blaze. The fire alarm in the unit did not have any batteries.

Three Island residents narrowly escaped injury early Saturday morn-ing June 15, when fire ripped through Lighthouse Point condominium they were staying in.

Mathew Guiggey, Randy Post and Mike Halcrow, all of Sanibel, were sleeping when a sofa in the living room

"I came out of my bedroom and saw Matt asleep on the safa with flames

right behind him," Post said. He woke Guiggey and they attempted to wake Halcrow, who was asteep in a back bedroom. Halcrow was unable to escape out the front of the apartment and had to jump from a second story balcony in the bedroom.

"I tried to go out the front, but the smoke was so bad I couldn't see if there were any flames in the way, so I thought the best chance was out the window," Halcrow said. He also drop-ped his dog from the balcony because the animal refused to go through the smoke-filled apartment to the front

The fire was reported to Sanibel firefighters by Halcrow's upstairs neighbors who were awakened by the smoke. "When I walked into the apartment

all I could see was smoke. I walked right by the burning sofa," Frederick

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Sanibel: No paradise for turtles

By George Campbell illustrated by Ann Winterbotham A few years ago a law was passed on Sanibel that protects all (urities here. There are more than a dozen kinds on the Island and in the sens

around us.

Many of our forms, such as the peramether cooter, the soft shell and the chicken turtle, live in the freshwater wetlands in the center part of this Island "paradise." This unusual habitat supports about 10 different vertebrate species, excluding birds. Prominent in this freshwater fauna are the turtles.

There are of course sea turtles, too, but we won't touch on them now because they are really the subject of Carretta Research and are Charles LeBuff's province. We will hear a lot about sea turtles in coming months as we are just now entering the

nesting season. Not too many years ago all over Sanibel at this time of year we could see huge, flat "pancake" female soft-shell turtles crawling about on land seeking nesting sites. All water turtles emerge to lay their eggs on land. These big pancakes often failed to find suitable nesting sites and were squashed by cars. In the past, each-year at this time I used to warm peo-ple to watch for them and be careful not to kill them on the roads. As a measure of the futility of much conscrvation effort, it is hardly necessary to do that anymore because there aren't that many females out seeking nesting sites. Ten years ago in the course of a nesting season it was common to see 25 or 30, now it's uncommon to see more than three or four. The rest of them have been squashed under the

tires of cars of careless motorists, There are two land turtles on Sanibel. One of them, really more of a bog animal, is the Florida box turtle. It, too, is almost extinct on this Island because of the same preblem.

Of great prominence among our turtle fauna is the gopher tortoise, of which we have written many times in this series. Now a new facet has been injected into this troubled species situation that threatens its very existence on Sanibel.

In areas to be developed, either single lots or large tracts of land, it has long been our custom to try to save the gopher tartoise from pro-blems of development. For example, when Don Manchester developed Gulf Ridge he took exceptional care of the gophers, and to my knowledge none died on that site due to construction. The same thing took place recently on a lot on West Gull Drive where great care was taken to conserve the animals living on that lot. Success was the harvest.


The threats posed to the gopher tortoise during construction are many.

For one thing, their holes might be bulldozed closed and the animals die a slow death of suffocation, dessiontion and starvation underground. It is just plain cheaper and easier to obliterate a gopher tortoise hole than it is to save the animal. Consequently, this destruction takes place far

Also, off-Island workmen who sometimes are not exactly the highest minded conservationists steal the aulmals and take them away to eatelf you should see ever this happen, please call the police Gophers are eaten by Floridians and heve been since the days of the Caloosa

Another and even more sinister threat to our gopher population was alluded to in another context earlier in this series. Some developers feel that if a protected species, whether it be tree, eagle, other bird, mammal or turtle, is no longer present on land to be developed, then the protection problem evaporates to non-existence during the building phase:

Up on Burnt Store Road north of Cape Coral, this phenomenon was expressed not so long ago when a nest tree of our national bird, the bald eagle, was bashed down and destroyed well in advance of development. You can't fault the logic: if the ed animal isn't there, doesn't have to be protected. But you

sure as beek can fault the morality of the scheming perpetrator of such an action. It's pretty rollen for greedy entrepreneurs to order the destruc-

tion of legally protected natural wildlife just so that when the building please comes along, life is cheaper. impler and nothing remains to be

protected.

We see this on Sanibel with the
gopher totoles. Pictured here is an
animal that is typical of several that
have been found recently. There is a machete slash shown on the back part of the beast's carapace. This animal has lived some months with

this crippling injury. Its hind legs are completely paralyzed. It drags itself completely paratyzed. It drags total about by its front legs only, and although we had hoped that it might somehow recover, we believe it is now near death.

ground. This is not a symptom of the animal's poor condition. It is in fact the way gopher tortoises sometimes rest. However, the animal's appetite has declined in recent weeks and we fear for its future. The developer, in his greedy game of one-upmanship, is one up on the conservation ethic on Sanibel. The hole this animal called home is now obliterated, full of leaves, sticks and sand.

Note the resting head on the


It is easy to tell a good gopher tor-toise burrow from an abandoned one. This one was definitely abandoned. and of course when the buildozers come there will be no point in bothering to try to save this destroyed site. Such was the developer's strategy. It is an ongoing strategy that happens frequently here and checkmates the

principles of the Sanibei ethic.

The purpose of exposing this beinous attitude is to alert citizens of good conscience to the existence of this threat to our wildlife and to ask that if any activities that reflect such actions are observed, do please call me and I'll take the necessary steps to see that appropriate action is

a wildlife sanctuary. She will be in good company if her efforts are suc cessful because Harry Truman did just that for the migratory birds of Sanibel Island several decades ago. Louise's idea is to expand the concept into all native animals.

one story that won't help Louise's quest appeared in the media recently. It fatuously suggested that rats and mice could not be killed if this law were to pass. This is complete nonsense, because the contemplated protection of wildlife on Sanibel as conceived by Louise Johnson is to include only indigenous forms - not exotic rats and mice that are real pests. We do have such exotic pest rats and mice here and they would not be protected under the contemplated law. Also, no game wards or authority is going to come banging on your door if you squash a cockroach. Let's hope that the reporting on this issue will be reasonable and that people can support the fine idea Louise Johnson has conceived. And let's hope that we can, with com bined citizen effort thwart those who would destroy our wildlife because of

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Some like it hot-but dogs and cats don't

Summer is finally here. But that might not be such good news for our pets, advises the Humane Society of the United States. Those long, hot days can be killers – literally – for dogs and cats. Phyllis Wright, vice president for companion

animals at the HSUS, explains that the reason such weather is a problem for these animals is that they

have very inefficient cooling systems.

Dogs and cals don't perspire, Wright says, adding,

"They lose body heat only through panting, and
when they can't breathe in cool fresh air, they quickity overheat."

Cats generally have it easier because they tend to find a quiet, dark place to spend the day. But dogs are more often part of outdoor activities that make them vulnerable to the effects of heat and humidity.

Pet owners can protect their animals by taking a few basic precautions:

*NEVER leave a pet in a parked car during the

nummer, even with the windows partially open. The inside of the car can reach temperatures in excess of 120 degrees in just minutes, and pets can suffer heatstroke, brain damage and death.

• ALWAYS be sure that dogs have constant ac-

cess to shade and shelter when out of the house. Cats should be kept inside year 'round. And all pets

should have clean water available at all times.

• NEVER subject a dog to rigorous exercise during the hottest times of the day. Restrict walks or runs to early morning or evening. Be sure, too, that your dog is in proper physical condition for whatever activity you have planned.

Very young or very old animals, those with heart or weight problems and dogs with short noses, such as boxers and Pekingese, all might have more difficulty in the heat and could require special care.

If your pet does become overheated, it is vital to

act immediately. Signs of trouble are excessive pan-

ting, labored breathing, rapid pulse, glazed eyes, tremors, comiting or a deep red or purple tongue. If your pet is unconscious, you have very little time to lose. The first thing to do is to try to lower the animal's body temperature by getting him into a cool, shady place and applying cool water, especial-ly around the head and tail areas. Don't allow the animal to drink too much water, no more than a cup every 30 minutes. You can also give him ice cubes to lick. Then get him to your veterinarian as soon as

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Contest opens July 1 for Duck Stamp design

July I marks a double barreled day for waterfowl artists, hunters and conservationists. That is the day the apmust Duck Stamp contest opens and the 1985-86 Dock Stamp goes on sale in post offices and other locations across the country.

The contest will select the design to be used on the 1988-87 Duck Stamp tformally known as the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp). An announcement published in the March 7, 1983, Federal Register outlines the procedures and specifications artists should follow in entering the annual competition,

Also on July 1, the 1285-86 Duck Stamp featuring the cinnamon teal design by Gerald Mobley from Broken Arrow, Okla., will go on sale.

Duck Stamps are a required purchase for anyone 16 years or older who hosts waterfowl, But they are not the only ones who contribute to wetlands conservation through purchase of the stamp. An ever-increasing number of birdwatchers, anglers, nature photographers and others who enjoy the outdoors also contribute to the cause by purchasing Duck Starons, it

During the 50 years since the pro-gram began, nearly 90 million Duck Stamps have been sold, providing \$285 million for the conservation of 3.5 million acces as part of the national wildlife refuge system. While most refuge lands are vitally important to waterfowl, these areas also provide habitat for a number of other species such as deer, songbirds and many endangered species.

The Duck Stamp contest is the only art competition regularly sponsorous by the federal government. Each year

the contest attracts thousands of entries depicting North American ducks, geese or swans in their natural habitat.

In general, the contest rules remain much the same as in previous years, but this year the entry fee has been in-creased to \$35 to help cover costs of administering the contest.

The dominant feature of the design must be the portrayal of live, nonextinct, North American migratory ducks, geese or swans of the family Anatidae. Beginning this year a listing of all eligible species will be included in the rules. Species featured on the Duck Stamp during the previous five years are prohibited. For this year's contest prohibited species include the American wigeon, platail, cinnamon teal, canvasback and ruddy duck.

These stamps must be purchased yearly by all waterfowl hunters 16 years of age or older.



Bob Copper dangles his legs over the edge of the deck that bisects one side of his soon-to-be-completed, multi-story Sanibel home and says matter-of-factly that he makes his living selling

his artwork. Wait a minute. Aren't good artists supposed to be starving ar-tists? "Bull," says Copper, who gladly reveals the "secret" to his success. It's having a

positive attitude.
"I never bought that package that said you can't make money being an artist." he says, "Look at the garbage that's out there and sells

Copper's art — making and casting paper - is created with process that goes something paper and that drawing is then placed under plexiglass. Clay is applied to the glass within the outline of the drawing below it and then built up into a relief

The scored plexiglass is then folded into a box shape into which is poured plaster. When the plaster hardens, Copper has

a reverse of the original form.

Paper, which at this point is not much more than cotton fibers suspended in liquid, is packed into the indented form and the water is

squeezed out. The dried embossed paper is the finished product. In addition to being "the perfect medium,

Copper says, casting paper "is a lot of fun.
"Wood carving is so tedious and bronze casting is so expensive," he says. In contrast, a sculpture in paper takes about two weeks to finish and it costs a fraction of a metal

Less than a year ago Copper was making his living airbrushing tee shirts. Though that line of work was somewhat more of a comline of work was somewhat more of a com-mercial venture, Copper, even then, subscribed to his buck-the-system philosophy. In fact, that's likely when he developed it. "I never listened to things they said we

weren't supposed to be able to do with it," he says about the airbursh. With his skill he

says about the arbutsh, with its school.

He first became interested in paper after seeing work in a gallery in California. A fron-lai of an Indian in full headdress that he found "really impressive" prompted him to give

cast paper a try.
"I found I'm probably more of a natural sculptor than a painter. I probably should have been doing this all along," he says,

smiling.

He pauses a moment to think, readjusting his position on the damp planks. "I'm not a known some natural artists and usually they disappoint me because they go into something

"I know 100 artists who are more talented than I am, I always try to push people. I'm evangelical about it. Once you believe it's possible then it happens. The opportunities are there all the time, it's just a matter of opening your eyes to the possibilities and not limiting yourself to what you will do."

SHELLINGTIPS

By Captain Mike Fuery

With all the new shore that open each year on the Island, I'm surprised no one has come out with a shelling apparel store. Such a store could stock a lew items that could help shelling enthusiasts find better specimens.

I never thought much of those who toted along a bait net to find shells. These short handled nets sold at buit and tackie shops help anglers dip out shrimp or small fish. They also, however, make handy undeets for reaching down for shells.

Balt nets can be useful for finding shells that don't wash up on the hearh, but rather get trapped in that sluice just at the water's edge. On Sanibel this depression is not so evident, but on the Island from Captiva on north this is a good place to look

A bait net extends your arm about three feet and lets you dredge up shells without having to get too wet to find them. This time of the year that's not

in the warm, shallow waters on both the gulf and sound sides of the Islands

I've walked around rays for years while looking for shells and have never been stung by any ray, but I've seen what a painful wound that barb on the tall of the ray can inflict. This usually happens when a careless sheller steps down on a ray that has settled on the sandy bottom. Uzually, rays will feel the vibrations from your steps and quickly move away, but sometimes they stay and whip that tail with the barb to strike the intruder's foot

Many Island shops sell what has become known as "shelling shoes." These have a mesh side and top with a light protective bottom. You can wear these airy shoes to walk over broken shells or

along rough paths to get to the beaches.

But the best thing about shelling shoes is that they offer the bottom of your foot some protection from possible ray stings. A ray can still thrash that tail around and get the shoe wearer in the

One of the handiest things you can have is a chean pair of polarized sun glasses. They cut the glare from the water surface and allow you to see icto the water without distortion. You can get a pair of non-prescription for under \$10, and you'll be amazed at how the entire beach scene changes with these glasses. Good shelling this week.

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
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SHELLINGTIPS

With all the new shops that open each year on the Island, I'm surprised no one has come out with a shelling annuarel store. Such a store could stock a few items that could help shelling enthusiasts find better specimens.

I never thought much of those who toted along a bait net to find shells. These short-handled nets sold at hait and tackle shops beln angless din out shrimp or small fish. They also, however, make

sacting or small isn. They also, nowever, mase heardy gadgets for reaching down for shells.

Built nets can be useful for finding shells that don't wash up on the beach, but rather get trapped in that shuice just at the water's edge. On Sanibel this depression is not so evident, but on the islands from Captiva on north this is a good place to look for shells.

A bait net extends your arm about three feet and

lets you dredge up shells without having to get too wet to find them. This time of the year that's not wet to find them. This time of the year that's not such a major factor, but in the winter when the water and air are cold, it helps to have such a net.

The netz sell for sbout \$5 or less, and you only

need one per family. So if you are shelling where that depression lines the beach, you might give that net trick a try,

It is just about time for the annual migration of

the stringrays to our beaches. They gather to mate

in the warm, shallow waters on both the gulf and sound sides of the Islands.
I've walked around rays for years while looking

for shells and have never been stong by any ray. but I've seen what a painful wound that barb on the tail of the ray cap inflict. This usually happens when a carcless sheller steps down on a ray that has settled on the sandy bottom. Usually, rays will nas sened on the sandy bottom. Usuary, rays war-feel the vibrations from your steps and quickly move away, but sometimes they stay and whip that tail with the barb to strike the intruder's foot.

Many Island shops sell what has become known as "shelling shoes." These have a mesh side and top with a light protective bottom. You can wear these airy shoes to walk over broken shells or


along rough paths to get to the beaches.

But the best thing about shelling shoes is that they offer the bottom of your foot some protection from possible ray stings. A ray can still thrash that tail around and get the shoe wearer in the side or top of the foot, but the shoes have helped decrease the incidents of ray stings.

With the warmer months of the year here, the waters usually are calm, especially during the ear-ly morning hours, so collectors can wade out into the challows to look for shells rather than wait for the waves to toss up a few specimens.

One of the handiest things you can have is a cheap pair of polarized sun glasses. They cut the glare from the water surface and allow you to see into the water without distortion. You can get a pair of non-prescription for under \$10, and you'll be amazed at how the entire beach scene changes with these glasses. Good shelling this week.
