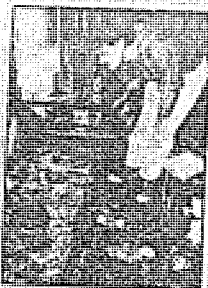

Because of them, you are safer

Jim Fahlor, Gordon Tracey, Jim Anhold, Jim Herman, Helen Thomas, Abe Lerner... who are these people and why should you know them?

Every person on Sanibel should recognize at least one of the names above. The first five are notification leaders, each in charge of one zone on the island for spreading the word when a hurricane threatens. The sixth person, Abe Lerner, should be familiar to anyone on the island who is elderly or infirm or alone or who for any other reason will need assistance getting off the island when a hurricane evacuation is ordered.

Lerner is the president of Friends in Service Here, a volunteer organization of Islanders whose concern for their neighbors in need reaches countless Islanders and visitors every year.

During hurricane season FISH needs volunteers to help in the early evacuation of elderly, infirm or otherwise incapacitated residents. If you can help — or if you need help — read this week's story on page 12A.

Lerner and the five notification leaders were among more than 100 Islanders who attended — voluntarily — a special hurricane meeting at City Hall one night last week. The attendance at the three-hour session and the spirited, serious questions and discussions that arose showed a very special side of the Islands that is often shadowed by the attractions of nature here — people.

Our beaches, sunsets and abundant wildlife constantly are touted, and rightfully so. But Islanders themselves are pretty special, too. They put the "community" in Sanibel and Captiva, and as last week's hurricane meeting proved, ours is a community of many caring, concerned, unselfish people.

These people have given their time, their money, their equipment, cars and trucks — virtually whatever they have that could help before, during and after a storm strike — to ensure that we still will have a community to come home to after a hurricane.

They do their jobs largely behind the scenes and in silence, without much expectation of public praise. Perhaps the biggest thanks they could ever hope for is the cooperation of an informed, concerned public when a hurricane threatens.

Know what you will do, where you will go in the face of a hurricane. Get to know the notification leader for the zone you live or work in. Offer your help if you are in a position to help; ask for it now if you know you will need help later.

You can make a difference for the entire community.

Alligator association chairman recommends fence guidelines to separate gators from children, dogs

A copy of the following letter addressed to City Councilman Mike Klein was given to The Islander for publication.

Dear Mike:

Given the possibility that I will not be able to attend the June 14 meeting of the Sanibel Alligator Control Committee at City Hall I wish to address by letter one subject which may be on your agenda: alligator protective financing.

For more than 10 years it has been an official policy of the Southwest Florida Regional

Alligator Association to encourage the construction of strategically placed low fencing in such a manner as to keep people and dogs separated from alligators. Although alligators can climb an eight-foot fence it is our experience that a low, three-foot fence separating a lawn or garden from a pond or canal will serve to guide alligators to one side or the other and away from the garden. Sometimes at the property margin a "return" (right angle piece of fencing that follows the property line inland a short

distance) is helpful. Such a low fence can be camouflaged with vegetation so that it can be rendered hardly noticeable.

By copy of this letter I am requesting city Planning Director Bruce Rogers to institute the necessary CLUP amendment which would not only allow, but encourage, the much more widespread use of these protective fences.

Howe expresses concerns about county's plans for Bowman's Beach park

A copy of the following letter to the Sanibel City Council was given to The Islander for publication.

To the City Council:

Newspaper reports on Lee County's improvement program for its Bowman's Beach regional park with city involvement cause me some concern, especially on the funding aspects.

Noteworthy is the restroom facilities which include drinking fountains and showers. Such facilities can be expected to place a "sizeable" demand upon the island's water supply, i.e. our privately-owned Island Water Association. Being members of that association, you are aware that the only income available to the IWA comes from Sanibel and Captiva consumers, who are also responsible for its debts and solvency.

As a taxpayer to both the city and county and a year-round

consumer-member of IWA, I expect that any city-county interlocal agreement regarding the regional park would expressly call for the county to pay IWA for all water used at the park. The maintenance and policing of it should be similarly funded and staffed from taxes paid to the county by ALL its taxpayers and augmented whenever feasible by user fees.

In summary, I strongly object to IWA and myself being bound by any interlocal agreement which requires the use of city or IWA funds for the development or operation of a facility or service which is the responsibility of the county to solely provide. To do otherwise would be condoning the practice of dual taxation to which the city has objected since its incorporation.

As to dual taxation, your attention is reinvoiced to the May 19 News-Press which reported that

the city of Fort Myers again alleges that the county has suggested its budget over the years to avoid the state-mandated sharing with its three cities of the millions of dollars it collected for road and bridge improvements.

It is indeed a fact that the county's traditional "Road and Bridge Fund" budget line item was actually obscured since 1977 by lumping it into the "General Revenue Fund" budget item. That device frustrated the state mandate to share half the tax yield for the purpose with its cities. It seems a prudent and warranted action for Sanibel to promptly resume its cooperation with its sister cities in the joint effort to recoup from the county a lawfully-due share of road and bridge money.

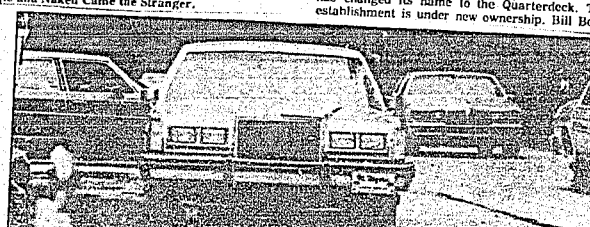

A different world, but in many ways the best of times

Former Sanibel resident Charlotte Heilmann shared with us the following look at class runlins from the viewpoint of a woman at the "You Haven't Changed" age. The column was written by Narcissa Reeder Campion of Hanover, N.H.

Reunions can be competitive sport. At early reunions classmates compete with each other about jobs and incomes; at the 25th it's spouses and children. After that they brag about their grandchildren and vacation homes, while regarding with envy and glee classmates' waistlines, hairlines and laugh lines.

With a 45th or 50th reunion comes a new phase of competition — the one described by Woody Allen when he said, "Ninety percent of life is just showing up."

It is said that there are Three Ages of Women: Youth, Middle Age and "You Haven't Changed." But change is the name of the game. Consider that graduate of the Class of '40 were before the pill and the population explosion, which, inexplicably, went hand-in-hand, so to speak.

We were before television, before penicillin, polio shots, antibiotics and Frisbees; before frozen food, nylon, dacron, Xerox, Kinsey. We were before radar, fluorescent lights, zippers, credit cards and ballpoint pens.

For us, time-sharing meant togetherness, not computers or condominiums; a chip meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware, and software wasn't even a word.

We were before Israel and the United Nations, India, Pakistan, Indonesia, The Philippines and Iceland were independent nations. And God help us all, we were before the cataclysm of nuclear fission.

We were before pantyhose and drip-dry clothes; before ice makers and dishwashers, clothes dryers, freezers and electric blankets; before Hawaii and Alaska became states; before men

wore long hair and earrings and women wore tuxedos.

We were before Leonard Bernstein, yogurt, Ann Landers, plastics, hair dryers, the 40-hour work week and minimum wage. We got married first and then lived together. How quaint!

In our time, closets were for clothes, not for coming out of, and a book about two young women living in Europe could be called Our Hearts Were Young and Gay. We were before Grandma Moses and Frank Sinatra and cup-zipping for bras. We thought deep cleavage was something butchers did.

We were before Batman, Grapes of Wrath, Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer, Stuart Little and Snoopy; before DDT and vitamin pills, disposable diapers, QE 1, Jeeps, the Jefferson Memorial and the Jefferson nickel.

When we were in college pizzas, Cheerios, frozen orange juice, instant coffee and McDonald's were unheard of. We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent.

We were before Boy George, Citizen Kane, J.D. Salinger, the Beatles and the Chiquita banana; before FM radio, tape recorders, electric typewriters, word processors, Musak, electronic music, disco dancing — and that's not all bad.

In our day cigarette smoking was fashionable, grass was moved, Coke was something you drank and pot was something you cooked in. We were before day-care centers, house-husbands, baby-sitters, computer dating, dual cavers and computer marriages.

We were before Disney's Fantasia, coin vending machines, jet planes, helicopters and interstate highways.

In 1940 American schools were not desegregated; blacks were not allowed to play in the major leagues; and the Daughters of the American Revolution would not allow Marian Anderson to sing in Constitution Hall. "Made in

Japan" meant junk, and "making out" referred to how you did on an exam.

In our time there were 5-and-10 stores where you could buy things for 5 and 10 cents. For just one nickel you could ride the streetcar or make a phone call or buy two copies of the Tribune (and get change) or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy coupe for \$659 — but who could afford that in 1940? Nobody. A pity, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.

If anyone in those days had asked us to explain CIA, MK, NATO, UFO, NFL, SATS, JFK, BMW, ERA or IUD we would have said "alphabet soup." We were not before the sexes were discovered but we were before sex changes. We just made do with what we had. And we were just about the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby!

We had all the big bands to dance to — Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Gray, Guy Lombardo, Glen Miller. And when Ray Noble played "The Very Thought of You" on his piano we melted. Unlike the remote-control dancers of today, we knew how it felt to have your partner hold you close and double dip. We played thick 78-rpm records with cactus needles that always needed sharpening. We had saddle shoes and cars with rumble seats.

The man I live with is my husband, and after all these many years he's still the same one. How embarrassing!

Traffic concerns force continuation of consideration of Periwinkle-Lindgren comprehensive health care center

Hung up on the question of how much traffic will be generated by a 9,700-square-foot comprehensive health care center and its impact on the busy intersection of Periwinkle Way and Lindgren Boulevard, the Planning Commission last week continued discussion of Dr. John Colucci's project until June 25.

Last Tuesday at the hearing of Colucci's request for a development permit the commissioners were also concerned about the size of the project, which calls for a 6,300-square-foot addition to the existing Michigan Homes office building.

Bill LeTendre, a health care consultant employed by Colucci, said a smaller building would not accommodate the equipment for all the ancillary health services needed to provide the comprehensive health care planned.

Colucci said the complex is designed to house a maximum of five "practitioners" including physicians and technicians such as a radiologist, physical therapist and cardiac rehabilitation specialist.

He said growth of the facility would be phased and it would probably be six or seven years before it would be completely staffed.

However, Colucci said the entire facility would be built according to the plans now submitted to the city. He said he was forced to take this route since his plan to remodel the existing building and use it for his own family medical practice was denied by the city.

Architect Joe St. Cyr said revised plans now complied with all the planning staff concerns expressed since the application was first submitted in February.

St. Cyr said that to make the new addition compatible with the existing building, the height of the central tower would be reduced and the two structures blended together with hip roofs.

St. Cyr said the 67 parking spaces provided would be more than adequate. Five practitioners with three staff each and the three patients per hour each would create a need for a total of only 35 spaces, he said.

An average of 15 cars would come and go at the facility every hour, he estimated. St. Cyr agreed to a one-way driveway with ingress from Beach Road and egress on Lindgren Boulevard, eliminating curb cuts on busy Periwinkle Way.

St. Cyr said a 25-foot right-of-way on Beach Road would be dedicated to the city, and 20-foot vegetation buffers would be installed along property lines. Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the plans did not demonstrate any attempt to reduce the intensity of use by cutting down on the size of the development.

"9,700 square feet is the maximum use of the 10 percent floor area permitted on the site," he said. LeTendre said 12,000 square feet of floor area is usually the minimum for health care facilities of this type.

Under CLUP's development intensity standards no greater traffic can be generated by conditional

uses than by commercial permitted uses, Rogers said.

"About the only thing we can agree on," Rogers said, "is that a comprehensive medical facility will create more traffic than a general office building."

"If you agree that this is true in this case," he told the commissioners, "You may require the developer to reduce the size of the facility."

Colucci said cutting down on the space would diminish the number of ancillary services that could be provided. But the amount of traffic and not the size of the complex was the real stumbling block for the commission.

Rogers said it was up to the applicant to demonstrate that the impact of traffic on the island's busiest intersection would not have a negative impact on the whole community.

The commission turned down St. Cyr's offer to provide testimony from traffic experts and accept third party arbitration.

Chairman Lennart Lorenson suggested a continuance to give the commissioners time to study the revisions.

"It is not our purpose to stand in the way of developing a medical center," he told Colucci. "We want to approve a permit rather than deny it."

The commissioners agreed they were not ready to vote on the issue. Commissioner Bill Webb's motion to continue the discussion to the June 25 meeting passed by a 6-0 vote.

Approval of a development permit is not the only hurdle to be cleared before the project can get underway.

The City Council must grant Colucci an exemption from the commercial moratorium.

Oriental restaurant will have new pagoda roof line

Planning commissioners agreed with owner Nghia Hoang that a new pagoda roof and Chinese lanterns along the store front facade would give his Palm Ridge Place restaurant an "oriental look."

But they disagreed with the planning staff's opinion that these modifications designed to make the business more visible constituted a street graphic. Planning Director Bruce Rogers said the Graphics Ordinance defines as a street graphic any device used for the "attraction of the public to a place of business that can be seen from a public right-of-way."

A business in a shopping center is permitted only one street graphic, and Hoang's Oriental Cuisine already has a sign mounted on the wall of the storefront, Rogers said.

If the commission interpreted Hoang's proposed modifications to the roof as a street graphic, a variance from the sign ordinance must be approved by the City Council. "But it's strictly a judgment call," Rogers told the commissioners.

His colleagues agreed with Commissioner Bill Read that the roof modifications were "an embellishment, not a sign" and voted 6-0 to advise the council that in their opinion a sign variance is not necessary.

Since the city has not adopted any standards for architectural design, the staff found no basis on which a development permit could be denied. Commissioner Jerry Muench's motion to approve passed by a 6-0 vote.

Hoang appeared at the commission hearing last Tuesday accompanied by his daughter, Nghia, as his interpreter. Two other children and his wife were also present.

Action delayed on wildlife sanctuary proposal

The City Council has postponed until fall further efforts to have the city of Sanibel designated a "bird sanctuary."

On June 4 the council took no action on a resolution requesting the Florida Game and Freshwater Fish Commission to establish the entire island as a bird sanctuary. The councilmen decided against taking any action because they learned it was too late to submit the proposal to the state commission for action at its July meeting.

The commission meets only twice a year, once in January and again in July.

Under the bird sanctuary umbrella all birds and wild animals on Sanibel would be protected and the city would be responsible for enforcing the game and fish commission regulations for the protection of all birds within the sanctuary area. City Attorney David La Croix said.

As of last week La Croix had not been able to verify whether these regulations apply to wildlife other than birds.

Councilman Mike Klein pointed out that if the city do apply to other wildlife, a Sanibel resident no longer would be allowed to kill a poisonous coral snake in his back

yard or set killer traps for rodents.

"Some rats are no threat," Klein said, adding, "People should be educated not to fear every little critter out there."

Councilman Francis Bailey said for a homeowner not to be able to kill a poisonous snake was a "little too much and hard for me to swallow."

The council agreed they would like to hear public input before rendering a decision on the measure. And because the commission could not hear the city's request until next January, there was no urgency to pass a resolution.

In a letter to Robert Brantley, director of the Game and Freshwater Fish Commission, La Croix asked for answers to some of the council's concerns.

Questions needing answers before the city can determine whether a bird sanctuary label is desirable include:

1. Are there specific regulations for the city to remove poisonous snakes, rats and other rodent household pests, rabid animals and nuisance alligators?
 2. Must all control be exercised by the city itself, or can a private homeowner kill a poisonous snake in his yard or set traps for rodents?
 3. What types of special permits — for handling certain wildlife such as nuisance alligators — do the commission issue applicable in a bird sanctuary, and what authority would the city have in monitoring or enforcing regulations relating to these activities?
- If they determine that it will be in the public interest to label the city a bird sanctuary, the councilmen intend to submit the request in time for action by the Game and Freshwater Fish Commission at its January 1986 meeting.

What's good for Sanibel Hilton is good for Casa Ybel resort

Casa Ybel resort has the green light from the Planning Commission to pave existing shell driveways and parking areas at the gulf-front complex.

Last week the commission voted 5-1, with Commissioner Bill Webb dissenting, to recommend council approval of a specific amendment needed because the new asphalt surface will exceed the permitted impermeable coverage of the site.

Webb based his "no" vote on his dislike of paved parking lots.

Although it has been city policy to encourage use of shell to maintain a "natural look" in commercial parking areas, the asphalt will be visible only to owners/guests of the time share units and will not have a negative impact on the community, the planning staff conceded.

The commissioners recently recommended approval of a request from the Sanibel Hilton to pave shell driveways at that resort with bricks.

Since they had given the go-ahead for that paving, the commissioners could not in all fairness deny the Casa Ybel request, Commissioner John Seabrooke said.

But Planning Director Bruce Rogers pointed out a complicating factor.

According to the 1984 Lee County Tax Roll the Casa Ybel property has been divided into several condominium parcels with Mariner Properties Inc., the developer, still retaining ownership of a large segment, Rogers said.

"This land division will have to be approved by the city before a development permit for the paving can be issued," he said.

Another specific amendment will be required because the area retained by Mariner far exceeds

the permitted coverage and clearance, Rogers said, adding, "The property lines as established now do not meet CLUP density or setbacks."

Commissioner Bill Read's made a motion to recommend that the City Council approve the paving with the condition that the storm water retention plan satisfies the commission. The approval is contingent on Mariner resolving the land division problem.

Council will not pursue purchase of homes for top city administrators

City councilmen last week gave short shrift to a proposal to establish an Employee Housing Fund to purchase property designated as residences for future Sanibel city managers or city attorneys.

To date it has been council policy to require the two top administrative officials live in the city.

Because of the rising cost of land and homes on the island, City Manager Gary Price said he foresaw a serious problem for future city managers and city attorneys.

"It might become impossible for someone moving into the community to afford housing despite the excellent salary levels of these positions," he explained to the council.

He suggested that a "gradually accruing (fund) be started in the upcoming budget to be used for the purchase of two building lots or two existing homes. They could be used by other city employees until

needed by a future city manager or city attorney," he said.

Providing housing would be part of the future compensation package, he added.

Price and City Attorney David La Croix both own homes on Sanibel.

Mayor Fred Valtin opposed to the proposition. "There's no guarantee a house we buy would meet the family needs or preferences of future employees," he said.

"If cost of a home exceeds affordability, I would prefer to give a rent subsidy," Valtin added.

It was council consensus not to pursue the proposition.

Commission recommends approval of canoe launching ramp at Bowman's Beach

The Planning Commission has recommended council approval of a specific amendment to permit construction of a canoe launching ramp on Blind Pass bayou at Bowman's Beach county park.

Although the land use plan allows for construction of boat docks, davits and lifts at the water's edge it makes no provision for boat ramps or launches, the planning staff explained.

The staff supported approval of the launch since it will provide enjoyment for many members of the community.

Commissioner Mark Westall, who conducts guid-

ed canoe tours on the island, said opening up the bayous around Bowman's Beach for canoeing was preferable in using the Sanibel River, where native rookeries would be disturbed.

The launch, which will cost about \$1,000, will be financed with monies remaining in the original \$100,000 fund put up jointly by the county and the city for improvements at Bowman's Beach, City Parks and Recreation Director Dick Noon said. The county has added another \$25,000 to the "kitty" to complete the park improvements, he added.

Requests denied for additional stairway, increased density

Following Planning Commission recommendations the City Council last week denied two specific amendments.

A request to add a second pair of stairs to a piling home on South Winds Drive was turned down by a unanimous vote of the council.

Harry Poulos submitted the request for the owners.

The proposed stairway, planned for the wettest spot on the property, would have exceeded the permitted coverage on the site.

The council viewed as unacceptable Poulos' offer to install 300 feet of gutter to improve the drainage problem in exchange for permission to add a second access to the house.

A circular staircase underneath the house was a viable alternative, the council agreed.

Dale Armstrong's request for a density increase to permit a single-family home on each of two

contiguous lots in Shell Harbor subdivision was denied by a 3-2 vote. Mayor Fred Valtin and Councilman Francis Bailey cast the dissenting votes.

Armstrong had a conditional contract to buy one of the lots from Thomas and Judith Barry. Attorney James Humphrey told the council.

The 20,500-square-foot parcel was held in common ownership prior to the adoption of the land use plan until 1980, when the Barrys purchased it.

At that time under CLUP rules regarding contiguous lots, only one home could be built on the site.

In April 1981 the council passed an ordinance exempting owners of contiguous lots from the restriction providing each lot contained a minimum of 10,000 square feet, the property was in a subdivision more than 50 percent

built out and had been held in common ownership from July 1976 through April 1981.

Humphrey pointed out that Barry's property qualified for the first two criteria. He asked the council to consider the pattern of ownership in the neighborhood, in which all the homes are built on lots smaller than either of the two in question.

Armstrong, who has owned a condominium in Sanibel Moorings for 12 years, said it was not economically feasible to build only one home on the two oversized lots.

Councilman Louise Johnson said that since the property did not meet all conditions for relief she could not support an increase in density.

Councilman Mike Klein's motion to deny the specific amendment passed by a 3-2 vote.

Duplex denied for Vinca Way lot

Alfred Hele and John Boardman, building contractors new to Sanibel, lost their bid for a density increase to permit construction of a duplex on a lot on Vinca Way.

A single-family home is currently permitted on the .67-acre parcel.

Using the 2.2 dwelling unit per acre density allowed for residential development along Periwinkle Way, the property is permitted 1.47 units.

With another 500 square feet in area the lot would be eligible for the "rounding up" benefit which permits an additional dwelling unit when the density calculation results in a decimal fraction of .5 or more.

Hele argued that undeveloped properties to the north and east had multi-family densities and there is a real estate office on Periwinkle Way at Vinca Way. Though his lot does not actually front on Periwinkle Way, he explained, it is affected by the view of a commercial shopping center and the noise and traffic on the busy street.

Because of the predominately single-family Sanibel Pines subdivision on the west side of Vinca Way, the commission chose not to change the single-family status.

Commissioner Jerry Muench's motion to deny the density increase passed by a 6-0 vote.





Commission recommends 10 dwelling units for trade-off on commercial property

Ten residential units on 3.54 acres on the north side of Wooster Lane gained Planning Commission approval last Tuesday. The units are a trade-off for 5,000 square feet of commercial space assigned to the site by a specific amendment granted in 1983.

Developer John Van Heemst had requested 14 units and called the Planning Department's recommendation to permit only six a "good way to discourage residential development on commercially zoned property."

Van Heemst argued he was entitled to at least 11 units. Using CLUP standards that permit as a conditional use a trade-off of 500 square feet of commercial space for each dwelling unit developed, 10 units should be allowed, he maintained.

Van Heemst said he was also entitled to one unit as a permitted use on the property. Eleven residential units are economically viable, he said, adding, "Ten won't work."

Planning Director Bruce Rogers pointed out that only 1.54 acres of the combined parcel are zoned for

commercial use. The remaining 80,000 square feet, under terms of the specific amendment approved for owner William Compton, were reserved as open space, Rogers added.

Compton's Thelan Crafts Shop building is located on a portion of the property.

Rogers said the staff arrived at six units as appropriate by using two formulas. Based on the 1.54 acres of commercial land and the maximum density of four units per acre permitted by the conditional trade-off, 6.2 units are permitted.

Another reasonable way by which it was determined six units would be appropriate, Rogers said, was considering the potential economic return from the property as commercially developed compared to its development as residential.

Van Heemst protested that zoning cannot be based on purchase price.

Commission Bill Webb computed the density a third way using ecological zones and said seven units would be permitted.

Commissioner Bill Reed pointed out that if only six units are permitted under the trade-off formula, 2,000 square feet of commercial space would still be left for retail development. He maintained it would be better to allow 10 residential units and use up all the office/retail floor area.

The other commissioners agreed with this concept.

Reed's motion to recommend that the City Council approve 10 units with the condition there would be no further commercial development on the parcel passed by a 6-0 vote. Commissioner Henry McKee was absent.

Dr. Dorothy Newman, director of the city's Below Market Rate Housing foundation, asked the commissioners to consider raising the number to 14 with the four additional units committed to the Below Market Rate Housing program.

The commissioners declined, however, and said that decision must come from the City Council.

City attorney will examine whether city can sell rather than vacate property

The Planning Commission has recommended the city vacate a 1,218-square-foot strip of land at the north end of a public canal between Lindgren Boulevard and Beach Road.

There is no access to the landlocked parcel for public use, the planning staff reported.

Truman Wilson said Michigan Homes intends to purchase the land from Hugh Lindgren, the original developer of Shell Harbor subdivision, and consolidate it with the adjacent Michigan Homes office building property.

Wilson said that when the canal was dedicated to Lee County there was an error made in drawing the property lines, and this little piece of land remained in public ownership.

Commissioner Bill Webb objected to the city's "giving away the land." His motion to approve the vacation suggested that the city attorney investigate whether or not the city could sell the land.

The motion also included the condition that any development intensity of the parcel will be nullified.

Volunteers needed to help with early evacuation of residents before hurricane strike

The city of Sanibel and Friends in Service Here need volunteers to help with the early evacuation of the island's elderly or handicapped residents well in advance of a hurricane threat.

Volunteers are not obligated to change their own evacuation plans in any way, nor are they committed for any special time period. The following procedures are planned:

1. Participation will be as part of a two-man team to help those in need by bringing moveable outdoor items under cover, closing storm shutters, taping windows, etc., at a single residence and by transporting the evacuee(s) to a central gathering point on Sanibel.

2. The above will be accomplished approximately three days prior to an anticipated hurricane strike.

3. Timing of activities and identification of evacuees will be coordinated by FISH for the Sanibel Emergency Management Team.

4. Post-hurricane assistance might also be called for to re-open an evacuated residence upon the owner's return.

5. Each volunteer should notify FISH, 472-0404, if he leaves the island for a length of time and when he returns. This is necessary to ensure a reliable manpower count for FISH coordinators and to avoid useless telephone calls at a time when speed will be most important.

POLICE BEAT

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Three escape injury when fire guts condo

Upstairs neighbors alerted firefighters to the blaze. The fire alarm in the unit did not have any batteries.

Three Island residents narrowly escaped injury early Saturday morning June 15, when fire ripped through the Lighthouse Point condominium they were staying in.

Mathew Guigey, Randy Post and Mike Halcrow, all of Sanibel, were sleeping when a sofa in the living room caught fire.

"I came out of my bedroom and saw Matt asleep on the sofa with flames right behind him," Post said. He woke Guigey and they attempted to wake Halcrow, who was asleep in a back bedroom. Halcrow was unable to escape out the front of the apartment and had to jump from a second story balcony in the bedroom.

"I tried to go out the front, but the smoke was so bad I couldn't see if there were any flames in the way, so I thought the best chance was out the window," Halcrow said. He also dropped his dog from the balcony because the animal refused to go through the smoke-filled apartment to the front door.

The fire was reported to Sanibel firefighters by Halcrow's upstairs neighbors, who were awakened by the smoke.

"When I walked into the apartment all I could see was smoke. I walked right by the burning sofa," Frederick said.

"We came tightly close to having a

fatality or at least a serious burn in this fire," he said. The last apartment fire on the island was more than a year ago, he added. "We have been lucky."

Frederick said he was not positive, but he thought the fire was started by a smoldering cigarette in the sofa. The fire, which reached temperatures in excess of 600 degrees Fahrenheit, caused an estimated \$50,000 to \$60,000 in damage to the

apartment and its contents. The heat turned a television set and a video tape recorder into lumps of melted plastic and metal.

An investigation showed that the fire was not detected early because the apartment's smoke detector did not have any batteries.

The condominium is owned by Dr. and Mrs. A.F. North of Bethesda, Md., and is being leased by Halcrow's mother, Jeanette Halcrow of Sanibel.



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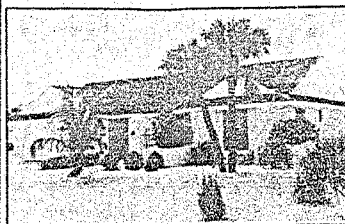
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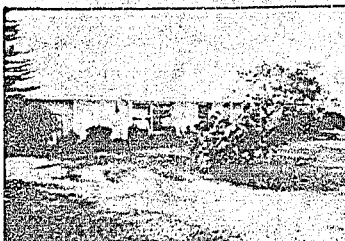

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Sanibel: No paradise for turtles

A few years ago a law was passed on Sanibel that protects all turtles here. There are more than a dozen kinds on the island and in the seas around us.

Many of our forms, such as the peninsular cooter, the soft shell and the chicken turtle, live in the freshwater wetlands in the center part of this island "paradise." This unusual habitat supports about 40 different vertebrate species, excluding birds. Prominent in this freshwater fauna are the turtles.

There are of course sea turtles, too, but we won't touch on them now because they are really the subject of Carretta Research and are Charles LeBuff's province. We will hear a lot about sea turtles in coming months as we are just now entering the nesting season.

Not too many years ago all over Sanibel at this time of year we could see huge, flat "pancake" female soft-shell turtles crawling about on land seeking nesting sites. All water turtles emerge to lay their eggs on land. These big pancakes often failed to find suitable nesting sites and were squashed by cars. In the past, each year at this time I used to warn people to watch for them and be careful not to kill them on the roads. As a measure of the futility of much conservation effort, it is hardly necessary to do that anymore because there aren't that many females out seeking nesting sites.

Ten years ago in the course of a nesting season it was common to see 25 or 30, now it's uncommon to see more than three or four. The rest of them have been squashed under the tires of cars of careless motorists. There are two land turtles on Sanibel. One of them, really more of a bog animal, is the Florida box turtle. It, too, is almost extinct on this island because of the same problem. Of great prominence among our turtle fauna is the gopher tortoise, of which we have written many times in this series. Now a new facet has been

injected into this troubled species situation that threatens its very existence on Sanibel.

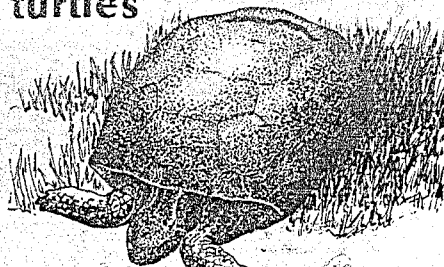
In areas to be developed, either single lots or large tracts of land, it has long been our custom to try to save the gopher tortoise from problems of development. For example, when Don Manchester developed Gulf Ridge he took exceptional care of the gophers, and to my knowledge none died or had sites due to construction. The same thing took place recently on a lot on West Gulf Drive where great care was taken to conserve the animals living on that lot. Success was the harvest.

The threats posed to the gopher tortoise during construction are many. For one thing, their holes might be bulldozed closed and the animals die a slow death of suffocation, desiccation and starvation underground. It is just plain cheaper and easier to obliterate a gopher tortoise hole than it is to save the animal. Consequently, this destruction takes place far too often.

Also, off-island workmen who sometimes are not exactly the highest minded conservationists steal the animals and take them away to eat. If you should see ever this happen, please call the police. Gophers are eaten by Floridians and have been since the days of the Calous Indians.

Another and even more sinister threat to our gopher population was alluded to in another context earlier in this series. Some developers feel that if a protected species, whether it be tree, eagle, other bird, mammal or turtle, is no longer present on land to be developed, then the protection problem evaporates to non-existence during the building phase.

Up on Rusty Steer Road north of Cape Coral, this phenomenon was expressed not so long ago when a nest tree of our national bird, the bald eagle, was bashed down and destroyed well in advance of development. You can't fault the logic: if the treasured animal isn't there, it doesn't have to be protected. But you

sure as heck can fault the morality of the scheming perpetrator of such an action. It's pretty rotten for greedy entrepreneurs to order the destruction of legally protected natural wildlife just so that when the building phase comes along, life is cheaper, simpler and nothing remains to be protected.

We see this on Sanibel with the gopher tortoise. Pictured here is an animal that is typical of several that have been found recently. There is a machete slash shown on the back part of the beast's carapace. This animal has lived some months with this crippling injury. Its hind legs are completely paralyzed. It drags itself about by its front legs only, and although we had hoped that it might somehow recover, we believe it is now near death.

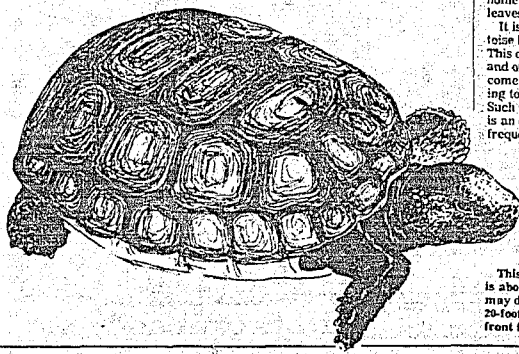
Note the resting head on the ground. This is not a symptom of the animal's poor condition. It is in fact the way gopher tortoises sometimes rest. However, the animal's appetite has declined in recent weeks and we fear for its future. The developer, in his greedy game of one-upmanship, is one up on the conservation ethic on Sanibel. The hole this animal called home is now obliterated, full of leaves, sticks and sand.

It is easy to tell a good gopher tortoise burrow from an abandoned one. This one was definitely abandoned, and of course when the bulldozers come there will be no point in bothering to try to save this destroyed site. Such was the developer's strategy. It is an ongoing strategy that happens frequently here and checkmates the

principles of the Sanibel ethic. The purpose of exposing this heinous attitude is to alert citizens of good conscience to the existence of this threat to our wildlife and to ask that if any activities that reflect such actions are observed, do please call me and I'll take the necessary steps to see that appropriate action is taken.

Conservationist Louise Johnson seeks to have the whole of Sanibel declared a wildlife sanctuary. She will be in good company if her efforts are successful because Harry Truman did just that for the migratory birds of Sanibel Island several decades ago. Louise's idea is to expand the concept into all native animals.

One story that won't help Louise's quest appeared in the media recently. It fatuously suggested that rats and mice could not be killed if this law were to pass. This is complete nonsense, because the contemplated protection of wildlife on Sanibel as conceived by Louise Johnson is to include only indigenous forms — not exotic rats and mice that are real pests. We do have such exotic pest rats and mice here and they would not be protected under the contemplated law. Also, no game warden or authority is going to come banging on your door if you squash a cockroach. Let's hope that the reporting on this issue will be reasonable and that people can support the fine idea Louise Johnson has conceived. And let's hope that we can, with combined citizen effort, thwart those who would destroy our wildlife because of greed.

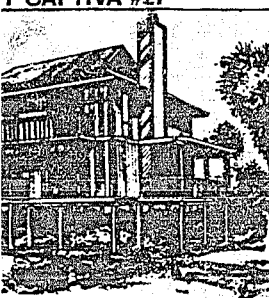
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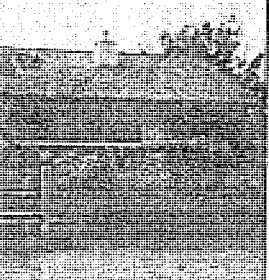

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Some like it hot—but dogs and cats don't

Summer is finally here. But that might not be such good news for our pets, advises the Humane Society of the United States. Those long, hot days can be killers — literally — for animals.

Phyllis Wright, vice president for companion animals at the HSUS, explains that the reason such weather is a problem for these animals is that they have very inefficient cooling systems.

Dogs and cats don't perspire, Wright says, adding, "They lose body heat only through panting, and when they can't breathe in cool fresh air, they quickly overheat."

Cats generally have it easier because they tend to find a quiet, dark place to spend the day. But dogs are more often part of outdoor activities that make them vulnerable to the effects of heat and humidity. Pet owners can protect their animals by taking a few basic precautions:

•NEVER leave a pet in a parked car during the

summer, even with the windows partially open. The inside of the car can reach temperatures in excess of 120 degrees in just minutes, and pets can suffer heatstroke, brain damage and death.

•ALWAYS be sure that dogs have constant access to shade and shelter when out of the house. Cats should be kept inside year 'round. And all pets should have clean water available at all times.

•NEVER subject a dog to rigorous exercise during the hottest times of the day. Restrict walks or runs to early morning or evening. Be sure, too, that your dog is in proper physical condition for whatever activity you have planned.

Very young or very old animals, those with heart or weight problems and dogs with short noses, such as boxers and Pekingese, all might have more difficulty in the heat and could require special care.

If your pet does become overheated, it is vital to act immediately. Signs of trouble are excessive pan-

ing, labored breathing, rapid pulse, glazed eyes, tremors, vomiting or a deep red or purple tongue.

If your pet is unconscious, you have very little time to lose. The first thing to do is to try to lower the animal's body temperature by getting him into a cool, shady place and applying cool water, especially around the head and tail areas. Don't allow the animal to drink too much water, no more than a cup every 30 minutes. You can also give him ice cubes to lick. Then get him to your veterinarian as soon as possible.

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Contest opens July 1 for Duck Stamp design

July 1 marks a double-barreled day for waterfowl artists, hunters and conservationists. That is the day the annual Duck Stamp contest opens and the 1985-86 Duck Stamp goes on sale in post offices and other locations across the country.

The contest will select the design to be used on the 1985-86 Duck Stamp (formally known as the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp). An announcement published in the March 7, 1985, Federal Register outlines the procedures and specifications artists should follow in entering the annual competition.

Also on July 1, the 1985-86 Duck Stamp featuring the cinnamon teal design by Gerald Mobley from Broken Arrow, Okla., will go on sale.

Duck Stamps are a required purchase for anyone 16 years or older who

hunts waterfowl. But they are not the only ones who contribute to wetlands conservation through purchase of the stamp. An ever-increasing number of bird watchers, anglers, nature photographers and others who enjoy the outdoors also contribute to the cause by purchasing Duck Stamps.

During the 50 years since the program began, nearly 90 million Duck Stamps have been sold, providing \$225 million for the conservation of 3.5 million acres as part of the national wildlife refuge system. While most refuge lands are vitally important to waterfowl, these areas also provide habitat for a number of other species, such as deer, songbirds and many endangered species.

The Duck Stamp contest is the only art competition regularly sponsored by the federal government. Each year

the contest attracts thousands of entries depicting North American ducks, geese or swans in their natural habitat.

In general, the contest rules remain much the same as in previous years, but this year the entry fee has been increased to \$35 to help cover costs of administering the contest.

The dominant feature of the design must be the portrayal of live, non-extinct, North American migratory ducks, geese or swans of the family Anatidae. Beginning this year a listing of all eligible species will be included in the rules. Species featured on the Duck Stamp during the previous five years are prohibited. For this year's contest prohibited species include the American wigeon, pintail, cinnamon teal, canvasback and ruddy duck.

Entries for the contest will be ac-

cepted beginning July 1 and must be postmarked no later than Oct. 1. The judging will take place Nov. 3-6.

Copies of the complete rules and regulations for the 1985 Duck Stamp contest and the reproduction rights agreement (which must be signed by the entering artist) are available from: Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp Contest, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240.

This year's Duck Stamp can be purchased for \$7.50 at most post offices and a number of national wildlife refuges, or ordered by mail for \$8 (includes 50 cents for postage and handling) from the U.S. Postal Service, Philatelic Sales Division, Washington, D.C. 20265-9997.

Fish and wildlife service encourages Duck Stamp purchases

An Oklahoma artist's watercolor design of a lone male cinnamon teal won the prestigious 1985-86 Federal Duck Stamp Contest.

The painting by Gerald Mobley of Broken Arrow, Okla., will serve as the design for the 1985-86 Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp. Mobley's design was selected from more than 1,500 entries during a two-day judging event held at the Department of the Interior in Washington, D.C.

The duck stamp contest has been sponsored annually since 1939 by the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to choose the design for the annual Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp, popularly known as the Duck Stamp. These stamps must be purchased yearly by all waterfowl hunters 16 years of age or older.

Funds from stamp sales are used by the Fish and

Wildlife Service to acquire wetlands and other wildlife habitats for the national wildlife refuge system.

Before 1949, wildlife artists were commissioned to produce a design for the annual stamp. Since then the design has been chosen through a contest open to all artists who are residents or citizens of the United States.

The federal government offers no prize or award to the winner other than a sheet of the following year's Duck Stamp autographed by the Secretary of the Interior.

The Interior Department encourages everyone who enjoys wildlife and the outdoors to help preserve wildlife habitat by purchasing the annual Duck Stamp, which can be obtained at most post offices and many national wildlife refuges for \$7.50.

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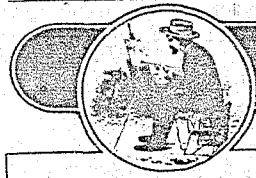
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ARTS ON THE ISLANDS

"Summer theater" is what the Pelican Players are calling their July performances of three new one-act plays about Island life.

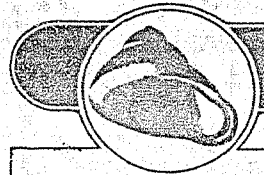
"This is community theater using only original works. And all the Pelican Players are Island residents," says playwright Mike Fuery. Rehearsals for the plays begin this week.

SHELLING TIPS

With all the new shops that open each year on the island, I'm surprised no one has come out with a shelling apparel store. Such a store could stock a few items that could help shelling enthusiasts find better specimens.

I never thought much of those who toled along a bait net to find shells. These short-handled nets sold at bait and tackle shops help anglers dip out shrimp or small fish. They also, however, make handy gauges for reaching down for shells.

Bait nets can be useful for finding shells that don't wash up on the beach, but rather get trapped in that sludge just at the water's edge. On Sanibel this depression is not so evident, but on the islands from Captiva on north this is a good place to look for shells.

A bait net extends your arm about three feet and lets you dredge up shells without having to get too wet to find them. This time of the year that's not such a major factor, but in the winter when the water and air are cold, it helps to have such a net.

The nets sell for about \$5 or less, and you only need one per family. So if you are shelling where that depression lines the beach, you might give that net a try.

It is just about time for the annual migration of the stringrays to our beaches. They gather to mate

in the warm, shallow waters on both the gulf and sound sides of the Islands.

I've walked around rays for years while looking for shells and have never been stung by any ray, but I've seen what a painful wound that barb on the tail of the ray can inflict. This usually happens when a careless sheller steps down on a ray that has settled on the sandy bottom. Usually, rays will feel the vibrations from your steps and quickly move away, but sometimes they stay and whip that tail with the barb to strike the intruder's foot.

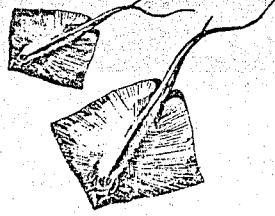
Many island shops sell what has become known as "shelling shoes." These have a mesh side and top with a light protective bottom. You can wear these airy shoes to walk over broken shells or along rough paths to get to the beaches.

But the best thing about shelling shoes is that they offer the bottom of your foot some protection from possible ray stings. A ray can still thrash that tail around and get the shoe wearer in the side or top of the foot, but the shoes have helped decrease the incidents of ray stings.

With the warmer months of the year here, the waters usually are calm, especially during the early morning hours, so collectors can wade out into the shallows to look for shells rather than wait for the waves to toss up a few specimens.

One of the handiest things you can have is a cheap pair of polarized ray glasses. They cut the glare from the water surface and allow you to see into the water without distortion. You can get a pair of non-prescription for under \$10, and you'll be amazed at how the entire beach scene changes with these glasses. Good shelling this week.

Thompson and Pfahler came out to win the final match and the "A" division on Sunday.

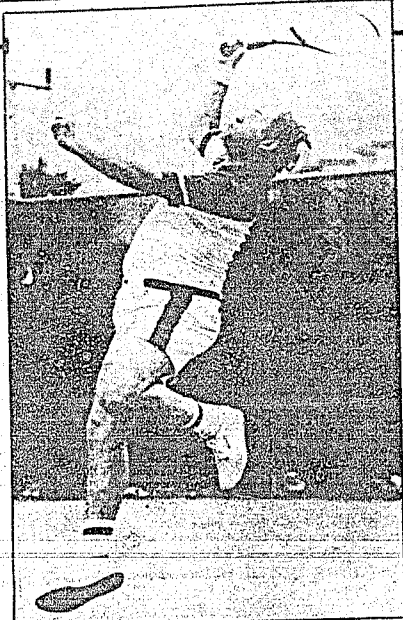

In women's "C" competition, a Fort Myers team — Braid and Short — grabbed the title from the Cape Coral's Amy Gravina and Fran Clendenin.



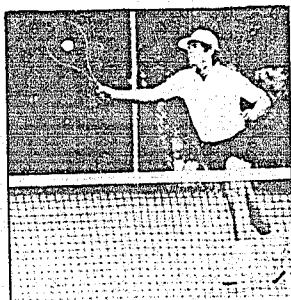
Above: Cape Coral's Peter Olseo goes up for a high lob.

In the mixed novice division, a pair of former Islanders, Linda Bragg and Chris Larkin, grabbed the first place trophy.

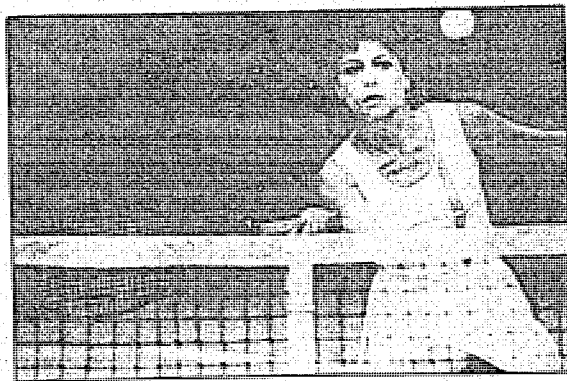
And in the Michelob flight, the Sundial's Tony Halski teamed with one Presley sister to combat Lawver and the other Presley sister in a hard-fought final match.

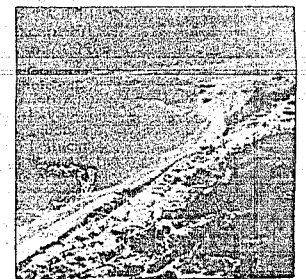

Sanibel Harbour Resort selected for ITCA conventions

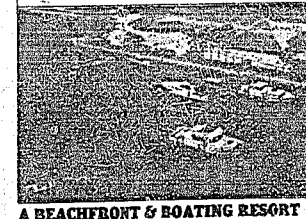

East covered with the queen, and Miles played the West returned the ace, and Miles could get nine tricks by cashing the 10 of diamonds and ruffing a diamond in dummy. But then Miles would have to ruff a club, and his whole hand would be known.
Instead, Miles didn't cash the 10 of diamonds or ruff a diamond; he just ran all of his trumps.
Each defender felt sure that Miles had no low diamonds since he hadn't ruffed a diamond in dummy. Hence

East discarded his diamonds in order to save his clubs. Miles thereupon took the last three tricks with the 10-5-3 of diamonds.
It's good business to risk one trick in order to win two.

WEEKLY QUESTION
You hold: ♠ J 7 3 ♥ 8 6 4 3 2 ♠ J 9 8 4. Partner bids one diamond, and the next player doubles. What do you say?

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Bid three diamonds if you're conservative, four diamonds if you feel frisky. Your jump says your hand is useful at diamonds but worthless for defense. You want to make it difficult for the opponents to reach their best contract. Some partners occasionally open in a three-card diamond suit, but this is a slight risk compared to what you're likely to gain.
