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

### 'Bike' paths are really routes shared by many different kinds of users

A copy of the following letter to Sanibel Mayor Louise Johnson was given to The Islander for publication. Dear Mayor Johnson:

The City Council indicated at a recent meeting that the city was considering allowing competent bicyclists to use the roads on Sanibel as they do everywhere else in the state.

To make an informed decision on this issue, there are many facts you should consider. Having had extensive riding experience both on and off the Island, I feel I am somewhat qualified to speak on this issue. I have averaged bicycling more than 200 miles per week for the past couple of years from my Sanibel base in the winter and from Chattanooga, Tenn., in the summer.

The "bike" paths of Sanibel are really multi-use paths shared by all of the following:

1. Walkers and joggers. Many times these people are side by side in

groups of two to six. They might have radio earphones on and not hear the shouts for the right-of-way. If they do hear you, some move to the right, some to the left, some run into each other, and some simply "freeze."

2. Deaf people walking. 3. Blind people with seeing-eye

4. Roller skaters.

5. Kids on skate boards. 6. Three-wheel and four-wheel bicycles. These take up more than one-

half of the path.

7. Bird watchers. 8. People pushing baby carriages.

9. People walking one or more 10. Bicyclists riding on the left side of

the path instead of the right. 11. Kids learning how to ride

None of the above is compatible with bicyclists who are traveling over 15 mph. The danger is created by both the speed differential between the other users and these bicyclists and by the unpredictability of the other users. The other aspect of the bike paths

that makes them dangerous for fast bicyclists is their inherent physical characteristics. These are as follows: 1. They are relatively narrow when compared to the standards recommended by the state. Dan Burden, Florida state bicycle coordinator in

Tallahassee, will furnish desired specifications. 2. They have numerous sharp, blind curves where it is impossible to stay on your side of the path at speeds

in excess of 15 mph. 3. Vegetation regularly overhangs part of the paths and requires ducking or veering out into the middle of the

4. The paths cross innumerable driveways where motorists have the

right-ot-way and frequently pull out across the bike path before looking for bicyclists.

5. The surface is broken up by roots growing under the path, forcing bicyclists to weave on the paths trying to find the least rough places. This is of considerable importance to a bicyclist who has a \$400 to \$2,000 machine with 100 psi of air in the tires. This high pressure reduces rolling resistance and allows for higher speed but causes rough pavement to shake bicycle and bicyclist violently. This is one reason why these bicyclists seek the roads 50 diligently. The K-Mart variety of bicycle is not significantly affected by this problem.

As far as requiring bicyclists to maintain a minimum speed of 25 mph, this is probably not realistic for several reasons. First, this is the maximum

We are not a part of the Sanibel-Captiva Shell Club, although we have their blessings and support. We are a separate entity, and will soon have a non-for-profit foundation. At that time officers will have been elected.

that a moped can do. They are commonly ridden on the Island at slower speeds. Are you going to give tickets to both bicyclists and moped riders who are not traveling at 25 mph?

Secondly, head winds are an important factor for bicyclists and, to a lesser extent, moped riders. A bicyclist might be able to maintain 25 mph with a significant tail wind but only 18 to 20 mph when he turns around and heads back into the wind. There are usually breezes of varying strengths blowing

Finally, a minimum speed of 25 mph is too high. 20 mph would be a high minimum. There is probably no one on Sanibel who can maintain 25 mph into a headwind. You can be assured that whatever minimum is set will not be universally accepted

The last aspect of bicycling on the Island that needs to be addressed is how to provide for bicyclists when new roads are built such as the one under construction now on West Gulf Drive.

The question is whether to build a three- or four-foot shoulder on each side of the road or to construct a separate bike path. Because bicycling is so common on the Island, because it has good health benefits, because it has almost no adverse environmental impact, and because it is fun, it should be encouraged as much as possible. The answer then is not which one should be built. Both should be built to accom-

modate both types of bicyclists! Sanibel is known for its bike paths.

However, much more can and should be done for bicyclists. Bicycling is a sport for all ages, but different types of users have different needs. I hope the above will help you to understand more fully some of these needs and encourage you to address them.

## Yes, Islanders, there is a Gasparilla

Do you believe in Gasparilla? The question splits islands from Treasure Island to Ten Thousand

Islands. It is the Mason-Dixon line of legend loyalty. Yes, Islanders, there is a Gasparilla. That is what the promoters, dreamers, romantics and old-time yarn-spinners say.

If there is one thing I like about Florida history, it is the tendency to make it spicier than a good plate of jambalaya. It is that ability to tell a story that becomes most important. And the facts — well, they are there. They are the meat of the jambalaya. But the spice is the real character of the dish.

Probably the spiciest storyteller ever born created Gasparilla. His name was Juan Gomez, but he came to be known as Panther Key John for his home in Ten Thousand Islands. In various rum-altered and senile states (he lived to be 119) he admitted to being either Gasparilla's cabin boy, or brother-in-law, or both. He was a fisherman, and depending upon the size of the gullible fish he was pulling in, he could even produce treasure maps to sell to those believing his tales of roguery on the high seas.

One person who chose to believe that pirates made their home in Charlotte Harbor was a press agent for the old Charlotte Harbor and Northern Railroad. More than the tales of swashbuckling buccaners, he believed in Gomez's strategy of selling a good story. So the railroad officials printed Gasparilla's story in a brochure, hoping to sell their fledgling railroad to

Putting the pirate into print breathed life into Gasparilla. The legend became fact in such scholarly works as Pirate's Who's Who and Piracy in the West Indies. If Gasparilla never was, he was now. I guess people in these parts want desparately to

believe in Gasparilla, and that has kept him alive. Historians and hard-nosed reporters occasionally feel compelled to point out that there probably was no Gasparilla, and that Gasparilla Island was named for a friar, not a pirate. And that Captiva was not a holding tank for captured women; it was more likely named for a Spanish explorer held captive there by Caloosas. But even the most devoted truth-monger likes to throw in a "well, maybe..." Like "Maybe

there was a pirate who riddled the islands from Sanibel to Boca Grande, and maybe he called himself Gasparilla. If so, he took his name from the island, and not the other way around." The others, the yarn-spinners, are not so concerned with the facts. When they can't find supporting

data they make it up. Claims of possessing Gasparilla's diaries and little black treasure-map books are made shamelessly Jack Beater, a Fort Myers yarner of unparalleled imagination, desparately sought Gasparilla. In one

of the many books he authored on the subject, Pirates and Buried Treasure, he devotes the last chapter to the capture of the Mary Anders. In a forenote he says that, "This is an almost word-forword account of pirate brutality as published in the American Monthly Magazine in the February 1824 issue." The stress is on "almost" here. I sent for a copy of the original article. "Word-for-

word" take a long voyage when Beater starts unabashedly sprinkling the names Boca Grande, Gasparılla and Augustus (Black Augustus is said to have been a Gasparillan gunner) throughout the narrative. No mention of any of the three is made in the original.

Beater was not the only writer to have desperately sought Gasparilla. In Tampa, where grown men annually honor the renegade by playing pirate for a day, another writer is responsible for the shaping of Gasparilla's life. He was a newspaperman, no less.

Edwin Lambright was editorial director of the Tampa Tribune, and he used that very vessel to sail Gasparilla firmly into our shores — and into the hearts of area residents who identified anyway with the adventuresome tone of conquistadors and

Others still are desparately seeking Gasparilla, and for other reasons than what I believe is a fear of growing up and of forsaking dreams and fantasies. Like those early railroad men, tourism promoters still repeat the tales of Gasparilla's loves and triumphs, blindly leading newcomers and visitors into unquestioning faith in the man and the myth. I read recently a Florida Almanac published by The Miami Herald. It says a former state attorney general estimated Jose Gaspar's buried treasure at \$30 million. No mention of scepticism or doubt of his existence — he was accepted as fact by a government

Now you might wonder how I know all this about our Senor Gaspar. The reason is, as you may have guessed, that I, myself, desparately seek Gasparilla. And I am here to tell you: I have found him. I have found him on the stages of last summer's Island Youth Theater presentation. I found him riding a Mercedes convertible in Tampa's Gasparilla Day parade. I have found him in Boca Grande's fabulous and exclusive inn. I found him on a trail through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge. I have found him immortalized in a statue in a Tampa Bay park. I have found him in the very soul of Sanibel and Captiva Islanders — children from age 8 to 80 who have never let go of a dream and a spirit

## City fathers hope legislative delegation will support nine issues in next session

Sanibel City Council has requested the Southwest Florida Legislative Delegation to introduce or support nine laws in the 1986 Florida Legislative session that opens in April.

Heading the wish list is a general law to authorize municipalities on barrier islands to levy a tax of up to 2 percent on real estate sales to provide revenue to purchase wetlands for preservation or for public recreation areas.

State Sen. Frank Mann filed a bill designed to do this in 1985, but it failed to get off the ground because of the lack of a cosponsor in the House of Representatives.

"We must make a major effort to find one this year," Councilman Fred Valtin stressed.

Mayor Louise Johnson said she had already contacted Rep. Fred Dudley, who declined to either sponsor or file such a bill. The measure is strongly opposed by real estate lobbyists.

But Johnson added Dudley said he would not oppose such legislation. Johnson said she would ask Rep. Keith Arnold of Fort Myers to sponsor the bill. Other legislation the council has asked the six-man delegation to support includes:

• An amendment to state statutes authorizing newspaper notices for land use plan zoning ordinances which affect more than 5 percent of the land area of a city or county. In lieu of mailed notices to every affected property owner, the proposed measure would permit publication of a quarter page newspaper advertisement to include a summary of

• An amendment to provide that a lien resulting from a code enforcement board fine attaches to all non-homestead property of a violator when the violation occurs on property which is the violator's homestead.

proposed changes.

 An amendment establishing a workable procedure for a code inspector to obtain a hearing before a local code enforcement board for a repeat violation.

• Repeal of the doctrine of joint and several liability which provides that any of several defendants, including a municipality, found guilty of a tort is responsible for the entire amount of any judgment awarded jointly and severally against

multiple defendants.

Usually the defendant with the "deepest pockets" pays — more often than not, the municipality. Municipalities should only be liable for that share of any damage award which is directly attributable to the acts and ommissions of their officers, employees and agents, City Attorney David La Croix told the council.

 Legislation to provide limitations on commercial telephone solicitations, especially random dialing which affects persons with unlisted numbers.

 Legislation to provide limitations on the size, number, location and method of construction of roadside billboards, both for esthetic and safety reasons.

• A statewide prohibition on no-deposit glass and metal beverage containers.

• A "dramshop law" to impose civil liability on tavern and bar owners for injuries caused by persons who were served alcoholic beverages after becoming obviously intoxicated.

#### City will not object to special liquor license for Sanibel Hilton

All five members of the City Council had no objection to the state Legislature passing a bill to issue a special alcoholic beverage license to the Sanibel Hilton.

But Mayor Louise Johnson was not willing to sign a letter to the hotel owners stating this position.

Johnson feared it might be construed as endorsement, which she believed would not be in the spirit of the city's intent to keep the Hilton's Brass Elephant restaurant an accessory use. Johnson's four colleagues pointed that the city had no basis to oppose the continuing sale of alcoholic beverages at the Hilton.

Liquor has been served at the Brass Elephant since it opened, and there have been no complaints about the operation, Councilman Fred Valtin

But should only one of the condominiums be removed from the rental pool, this eligibility will be lost, the resort's attorney, Richard Johnston Jr., explained last week.

To forestall such a development in the future, Johnston said, Sanibel Resort Hotel Limited Partnership and the Shell Harbor Group, Inc., the current owner, have asked State Rep. Keith Arnold to sponsor a bill authorizing the issuance of a special liquor license for the Sanibel Hilton.

A bill drafted by Johnston will be presented to the Southwest Florida Legislative Delegation at its meeting this week in Lee County.

City Attorney David La Croix pointed out that passage of the special act by the Legislature would have no effect on any of the limitations placed on the Hilton by the city.

However "out of an abundance of caution" La Croix recommended that the city manager's letter include a condition that "the license authorized shall not exempt the licensee from compliance with all ordinances of the city of Sanibel as to matters not pre-empted by general law."

La Croix said Johnston had already agreed to add this condition to the draft of the proposed bill.

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

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

It's not too hard to understand why the newspaper which has been serving the Islands for 25 years is called The Islander. Or why John Naumann Associates or Priscilla Murphy Realty, Inc., have their names.

But there are some business names on the Islands that provoke curiosity as to where they originated.

**Coconut Grove** 

While Scotty's restaurant started up 30 years ago and has changed its name several times since, another restaurant, the Coconut Grove, also opened up around the same time and is still known by the same name.

And it's still owned and operated by the John Kontinos

If you guessed the name has something to do with a "coconut grove," you're right. Back before before Brazilian peppers and other exotics moved in on native vegetation, the Islands had a fair share of coconut palms. In fact, several farmers tried to plant and harvest the coconut palm.

One very thick grove of palms stood right near the corner of what is now Periwinkle Way and Tarpon Bay Road. The Kontinos family set up their restaurant right in the middle of the grove.





## State halts work on Captiva stabilizers

Thursday, Jan. 30, workmen from Beach and Reef Development, Inc., scurried about Captiva's beaches beginning the long-awaited experimental perpendicular stabilizer project — a project some Islanders hope will solve Captiva's erosion problem.

Monday, Feb. 10, the beaches were empty of workmen and no noise of machinery could be heard. The experimental project has been shut down by

state regulatory agencies for eight out of 11 possible work days. As of noon Monday, Feb. 10, the project was still shut down. The Captiva Erosion Prevention District waited anxiously for notice from Tallahasse on whether the project could continue.

Contractor Dick Holmberg's crew worked Jan. 30-31 and Feb. 3 before officials from the state Department

According to CEPD contract, Holmberg's company has 30 days in which to finish the project.

Holmberg said he had anticipated that the construction would take 10 working days.

## The invasion of the tree swallows

Campbell remembers the days when hundreds of thousands of these birds would swarm in the skies over the Islands

In years gone by Sanibel was visited each winter by millions of a very beautiful, colorful little bird called **Iridoprocne bicolor**, the tree swallow.

In its winter migration we see this five- or six-inch iridescent blue and black-backed, white-bellied little bird in flocks of many thousands.

Dr. Calvin Brown calls the flocks "swirls," and for good reason.

I remember an episode around noontime on April 3, 1977. In the sky behind my house the sun was actually blocked out by a swarm of hundreds of thousands, perhaps a half million or at least a quarter million of these beautifully colored little birds with a blue sheen. On that day they swirled about the nearby freshwater pond, once a real estate developer's fill source, and descended upon a nearby thicket of southern bayberry.

They were in such numbers that I can only compare their swirl with a locust swarm that I once saw in Karachi in southwest Asia. On that occasion the sun was blocked out and every green leaf in the city was consumed in a matter of two hours by the locusts.

That day in 1977 the teeming thousands of tree swallows swirled above the pond and above my house in masses so thick as to shade the sun. One crowd flew down into my back garden. As the birds descended they flew in such a way as to appear to be a circulating cyclonic cloud reaching almost to the ground.


Tens of thousands of these little birds landed on three medium-sized bayberry trees that were heavily laden with waxy, caloric fruits. There were so many of the tiny, vibrant creatures (each of which could hardly weigh an ounce) that the trees were bent down by their combined weight, which must have been hundreds of pounds. Some brittle branches actually snapped off.

A great fluttering took place among the trees for 45 seconds or so, and then the birds rose after having stripped the trees bare of the wax-laden berries.

The teeming thousands of these truly beautiful tiny birds, with their lovely shining bluish backs, again rose and swirled above the pond only to descend once more on a clump of three other trees. This took place only 25 or 30 feet from me, for I was concealed behind the draperies hung on a large porch window. The rustle of wings, the liquid song like a rapidly repeated silip-silip, and the tremendous combined weight of the birds added up to an unforgettable scene that certainly rivals in interest any other ornithological episode any place in the world. To me at any rate, the sight of the more than two million flamingos that one can sometimes see at Lake Nakuru in East Africa is only on a par with, and does not exceed in interest, my own tree swallow extravanganza.

The wax of the bayberry obviously has a high caloric value, for the berries are closely related to those bay berries of an allied species, Myrica pennsylvanica, from which our ancestors made fine aromatic candles. These otherwise insectiverous birds survive in winter on this vegetarian diet because insects are scarce even here during southern winters.

multitudes in December, January and February.
They were rarely seen later in the year, as in the above described April sighting. Usually they begin to

leave for the north in February and March.


She also helped found the National Eagle Sanctuary Trust, or NEST, an organization to study and help safeguard critical eagle nest

## Retired chemical engineer's talents will benefit two popular Sanibel wildlife causes

If a picture is worth 1,000 words, then part-time Sanibel resident George Wiss has an entire vocabulary in photographs. Where most people have tucked away in a closet or drawer an album or box full of snapshots, Wiss keeps a collection of more than 40,000 slides and pictures.

It seems like a lot, but then Wiss has been taking pictures for 63 years.

Recently he decided to turn his prolific hobby into a fundraiser for one of his favorite causes — nature — in one of his favorite places — Sanibel.

First he set about the monumental task of sorting through his collection. He managed to come up with a selection of eight he thought were worthy of being made into greeting cards. Then two weeks ago he donated 250 sets each to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

"I wanted to help them out somehow," says Wiss, a chemical engineer who divides his time bet-

ween Sanibel and Illinois.

The eight scenes are sights common around the Islands, including a closeup shot of a blue heron's head, a quintet of ibises framed by a crashing wave, and seashells awash in foam.

The cards were printed by a Chicago company that did some of the work for famed photographer, the late Ansel Adams, Wiss says. Each card cost nearly \$1 to print, and they are for sale for much less than that in the gift shops at the refuge and conserva-

tion foundation. Though Wiss has always taken it seriously, he hasn't always had the time to indulge himself in

photography. A graduate of the University of Belglade in Yugoslavia, Wiss came to the United States in 1938 seeking his fortune. His first job was with a company in New Jersey that stripped silver from x-rays.

In 1941 Wiss decided to branch out on his own after feeling he wasn't fairly compensated for contributions he made to that company. Using "a few thousand dollars" he borrowed from his mother-in-law, Wiss started his own silver stripping business in Wheaton, Ill.

That company, which began in a double garage and employed three workers, has since become one of the largest operations of its kind in the world, Plastofilm Industries. In June of last year Wiss sold the company when his son, a serious photographer, declined to step into his father's business shoes. (George Wiss' daughter, Vicky Bell, is a potter who

lives on Sanibel.) "I liked my business. I hope it was a good decision," he says about giving it up after 45 years.

Wiss is thankful for the hobby that helped him through the transition. "(Photography) made it easier for the transformation from a businessman to a private person," he says.

Variety of camera techniques brings viewers close to wide range of subjects

What most artists do with paintbrushes, Maggie Foskett does with a camera. Like a painter, she takes ordinary elements of her surroundings and interprets and manipulates them to achieve the effect that expresses what she wants to say.

To accomplish this Foskett uses a variety of photographic techniques both as she takes the picture and as she processes it in the darkroom.

Through February, the striking photographs of the Sanibel resident are on exhibit at the Captiva Memorial Library. Visitors to the show will find that even ordinary subjects look extraordinary in Foskett's compositions.

She uses macro lenses to bring the viewer within an intimate distance of her subject. A photograph of a lobster tail, for instance, could be a lesson in the wet anatomy of the creature. The image is so closely examined by the camera that one is struck by the overall effect of color and texture as much as by the subject

In connection with her 1985 exhibit "What's Happening in Photography," Foskett sums up how she would like to connect with her audience: "I would like ... to suggest a kind of indefinite poetry that is personal to the viewer."

Foskett has been taking pictures for many years, but says she didn't get serious about it until fairly recently. "I guess you could say I've been in the darkroom for about eight years."

Ten years ago her husband, John, first afforded her the opportunity to do her own developing and processing when he built a darkroom in their Sanibel home.

Since then she has attended numerous seminars (including ones with Ansel Adams and Jerry Uelsmann), held a number of onewoman shows and has entered several juried exhibitions from New York City to Chicago.

She once took a seminar in Rockport, Me., with noted photographer Olivia Parker. "I was so pleased and so delighted to learn her interests were the same as mine," Foskett says, explaining that her reasons for getting into photography were that her children were grown and she felt

"housebound." "It keeps you interested and active and it makes you grow," she says about attending the seminars.

"Besides, it's fun." One of the best things about seminars is being with others who share her interest in taking pictures. "Pretty soon everybody's talking

lenses and f-stops.' Foskett says she differs from many photographers in that she truly enjoys darkroom work. Most, she says, prefer to be "in the field."

"I like carrying (the photograph) through from the moment I see it all the way to the end."

She doesn't necessarily plan the photograph she's about to take, but says, "It's a gut reaction."

Besides her "seafood" series that includes the lobster tail and other ocean inhabitants, Foskett's works include subjects of a more controversial nature. Her collection titled "Ground Zero" for instance, is an anti-nuclear

"Doing anything in the political area is very tricky," she says, adding that viewers often find such themes "unpalatable."

"If (the composition) is too strong people are repelled. If it's too blatant they're also turned off. Finding an image that will express (what you want to say) in a way that will make the viewer agree is a very difficult thing to do," she says.

The anti-nuclear series goes on exhibit at the end of the month in Portland, Me., in conjunction with the production of "Curse of the Starving Class," by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Sam Shepard. Most of the 27 pieces that make up her Captiva exhibit are of a tamer nature.

Foskett challenges those who say photography is not fine art. "It's because of that darn negative.

#### Forehand is subject of first session

The forehand stroke is the focus of the first free lesson offered by Island Tennis Services this Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Sanibel Recreation Complex,

There are two basic stroking patterns for the forehand groundstroke. The first and most simple is the straight back forehand. The second is the loop or "C" forehand. There are pros and cons to each, and you will see the top pros using both (or a combination of the two).

straight back forehand. Ivan Lendl uses a loop forehand. The straight back forehand requires the player to take the racquet back on a decline, so that when the racquet is back it is approx-

Jimmy Connors uses a

imately at knee level. The loop forehand begins with taking the racquet back about eye level and waiting for the approaching ball.

Then, in a continuous motion, drop the racquet and your hitting hand approximately 12 inches below the intended point of impact, and come forward and up through the ball.

The difference in the two stroking patterns lies only in the way in which the racquet is prepared.

The important similarities of the two forehands (and any variation or combination of the two) are these: (1) You want your racquet back at least by the time the ball is bouncing on your side of the net. 2) You must watch the ball ... all the way, until impact. (3) You need a firm wrist at impact. (4) You should make contact slightly in front of the left foot. And (5) You should make a long finish or follow through - at least finish in front of your

## Make sure you're up-to-date on changes in seatrout laws

There seems to be some confusion over the laws governing the taking of seatrout. The problem comes from tournaments which only allow fish of 14 inches or more to be entered.

After checking with the Florida Marine Patrol and the state Marine Fisheries Commission, I have learned that a proposed change from the present 12 inches up to 14 has not been put into effect — and it might not ever be.

Still, area fishing contests involving trout, a favorite game fish for Florida, often use the 14-inch

Many visiting anglers are unaware of the other changes. Just to keep the records up to date before going on to other things: redfish must measure 18 inches, with only one allowed over 32 inches. The various grouper found around the Islands also must be 18 inches to keep.

The FMP works the big passes where most grouper and many reds are caught. Don't keep undersized fish.

The warmer weather at the first of the month has started the larger seatrout feeding a little bit better. Some over three pounds are showing up. These fish are 18-20 inches or slightly more. The average fish is from 12 to 15 inches, and many guides are complaining about 10- to 11-inchers that have to be released.

Cooler weather keeps the fish in deeper water, so anglers are casting plastic tail jigs with shrimp tips. ON THE WATER

It's important to find sandy bottom, preferably close to large grass flats. The trout like to drop back from the shallow flats into the holes that have more stable temperatures.

When the sun goes down shallow water quickly cools, but the deeper waters remain more stable. As the sun rises fish will venture out on the flats. That's the time to switch to a popping cork and shrimp rig and drift those flats. You will notice that later in the afternoon this cork method will not be as productive because the fish are moving off the flats. That's the time to get back to bottom jigging with the artificials.

In the past few days some small Spanish mackerel have been showing up in the trout fishing areas.

Most have to be put back, but any over 12 inches are great eating. I hope this is just the start of a good spring mackerel run.

We have had a poor year for pompano to date, but the flounder have been easier to catch. These are not large fish. A big flounder is 15 inches or so, but they make a lovely fillet that most anglers won't give up to their closest friends.

There are two ways to fillet these flat fish. When I get a fairly large fish, say 18 inches or so, then I run the knife right down the middle of the back and fillet each side to get two bone-free, clear fillets. Capt. Doug Fischer of South Seas Plantation taught me that one after he watched me butcher a fine fish.

I use a different method for filleting smaller flounder. I just fillet the whole back of the fish, letting the knife come down to hit the ribs. Then I run the blade on the ribs all the way to the tail, then flop the fish over and take off the skin.

Northern anglers know how good baked flounder can be, but I think broiling or pan frying are better for our smaller, thinner fish,

I tend to go in fads when cooking fish. My latest is to sprinkle the fish with flavored bread crumbs before frying or baking. It's not new, but it's a nice

Good fishing this week — and keep in mind the changes in the laws about reds and grouper.

## Cold snap along with low tide takes its toll on sunray venus clams

Have you ever wondered if there is a connection etween periods of very cold weather and dying hells.? Do they have a built-in heater to last through freezing nights? Apparently not, as we saw

In the last part of January we had three very cold days. In Fort Myers the temperatures dropped in the low 30s. On the Islands they were around 35-38 degrees. That might not seem too cold to some folks. but you must remember that mollusks are coldblooded. Can a shell caught on the top of the sand literally freeze to death? I'm beginning to think so A few days after the cold snap I had a party of shellers up on Cayo Costa Island. It became apparent to us that a large kill of small, immature sunray venus clams had recently occurred.

Sunrays are a favorite of collectors for a couple of reasons. First, they have a slippery, shiney outer surface that makes them popular for displays. And second, unlike many other bivalve shells, both sides of this special clam tend to stay together much to the delight of collectors.

There seems to be a pattern developing with shells around the Islands. I might be talking more theory than anything else, but I think the coldest fronts tend to come either at times of a full moon or on a new



These lunar times also tend to coincide with very low tides, especially in the early mornings. So, we have three factors at work. First, the cold front, then the full moon, which then brings the very low tide. The three combine to form exposed bars where many shells live. But the shells can die when they are exposed to the cold.

That's what I suspect caused the deaths of dozens of small sunrays during the most recent cold front. In a way this is great for collectors. The dead sunray is usually picked clean for us by shore birds. The result is a perfect new shell, worthy of any

But there is the other side of the coin. What happens down the road? Take out the younger, potenially breeding sunrays and you will have very few new sunrays in the tuture. So for a time it was great shelling — but will there be any sunrays in a year or so? We'll see, but it does appear that very cold weather kills shells in a very short period.

The coldest time of the day is generally at sunrise. That's another factor to add into the very low tide, full moon and cold fronts.

Fortunately, most shells can bury themselves in the sand to escape the effects of the weather. I imagine that with the use of natural barometric sensors they can dig in just before a hurricane or tropical storm, too.

Good shelling this week. Please observe the limit of only two live shells per species per person. Those of us interested in the future of shelling on the Islands urge you not to take any living shells at all.

A problem that plagues bridge players is that we know so many things that aren't true. Moreover, some of our opponents go to great lengths to add to the number of our false beliefs.

You might think French expert Christian Desrousseaux was too ambitious when he bid a grand slam in this week's hand. But you won't complain about his play of the cards.

Desrousseaux put up dummy's jack of diamonds at the first trick and captured East's queen with the ace. His



next step was to lead the jack of clubs, capturing West's queen with dummy's

After two rounds of trumps

Desrousseaux ran the three hearts, discarding the 10 (!) of diamonds from his hand. Then he ran the rest of his trumps, keeping the A-6 of clubs as dummy's last two cards.

Both defenders "knew" that South had no more diamonds, and East discarded the king of diamonds in the attempt to keep his clubs.

Desrousseaux thereupon won the last two tricks with the eight and deuce of

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
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

I find it interesting that this bird, which disperses in its northern breeding range into small groups of one or three pairs to consume a diet of protein-rich insects, becomes a vegetarian in winter. In summer its diet consists mostly of beetles, ants and flies, but it includes bees, wasps and grasshoppers. Come autumn it gathers in huge throngs such as the one just described, flies down to southern climes and almost completely switches its diet from insects to plants. Here it depends to a very great extent on the southern bayberry.

I am told by naturalists at a New York wildlife refuge that when these birds gather to fly south in the fall they will, even then, switch from insects to the bayberry fruit of the northern region.

It is not too difficult to understand this dietary habit when you realize that the birds require a highly nutritious protein diet on which to raise their young during the warm northern season, but they can survive in the winter on a high caloric diet of bayberry.

Of course insects do not fly in such great abundance in the winter, and this limits the birds' dietary opportunities even down here. But insects sure are abundant in the northern summer. No doubt tree swallows supplement their vegetarian diet on warm winter days here in Florida when there are some insects flying, but they depend mainly on the bayberry for their diet during the winter months here in South

So one would think Sanibel, being a place where birds are highly regarded, would take measures to protect the southern bayberry tree.


This tree used to be very abundant here, but hundreds have been destroyed as Sanibel develops. And with their destruction, the swallow flocks seem to me to be much, much smaller.

The Christmas bird count of 1984 showed only 14 birds, while that of 1985 turned up a mere 17. The hundreds of thousands of yesteryear were absent. Only in mid-January did I learn of any large swirls. My next door neighbor saw some at Porter Goss's house, and Dr. Calvin Brown saw large numbers on West Rocks pond in mid-January. Dr. K.C. Emerson has also reported large numbers. No observer, however, reports the sun-darkening numbers of the

Yet this same bird species is still abundant in millions elsewhere in Florida. I saw a sky-darkening cloud of them in December in the Everglades, where they were happily feeding on yet undisturbed southern bayberry trees.

Should bayberry not be rigidly protected by the city of Sanibel? It is not now, and some of the remaining trees are being destroyed daily.

Bayberry trees can be quite attractive, but they do have a rather unfortunate habit of dving back very readily for no apparent reason. This detracts from their popularity in gardens planted with native plants. Lower branches are often dead, and the whole tree sometimes looses its leaves and dies. Young plants grow fast, but impatient homeowners

tend to destory them and plant something else. These growth habits detract from the desirability of bayberry trees, but given their great importance to this marvelous bird species, I think they should be at the top of the list of those native plants that are completely protected on Sanibel.

Of course, development is not the only influence working against the bayberry tree. As Brazilian pepper becomes an ever-growing threat, many thousands of bayberry trees are squeezed out of the habitat. This might be at least as important a factor as direct destruction of Myrica by man.

I believe that destruction of the southern bayberry tree is largely responsible for the decline in numbers of the tree swallow on Sanibel. Sanibel should protect a great ornithological phenomenon. This can be done by nurturing our remaining southern baybery trees and by encouraging the planting with new
