

Don't say you weren't warned when you can't find beach parking

Sanibel's "Beach Access Parking Full' sign just east of the Causeway toll plaza was activated for the first time last Tuesday, Feb. 11. That day 8,525 cars crossed the span from the mainland.

Flashing yellow lights and orange neon flags on the sign alerted beachgoers and casual visitors that there was no place to park near the gulf beach from 1:15 to 4:15

Police Sgt. Jack Primm said there was no way of knowing whether the sign deterred any motorists from coming on the Island,

The parking information sign is being tried as an experiment in an effort to prevent visiting motorists from milling around looking for non-existent parking spaces, often parking illegally and contributing significantly to traffic congestion.

The city has also posted signs warning beachgoers that drinking alcoholic beverages on the gulf beach is prohibited from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise between Dec. 15 and June 15.

Four signs are in place along the beach in front of Sundial resort, and at the Nerita and Donax street beach accesses.

Folks on the Island apparently rushed to their thermostats and coffee makers with hopes of warming up during the early hours last Thursday morning. The sudden surge of power use around 7:30 a.m. caused an outage that affected most of the Island until 8:30. Temperatures dropped to 47 just before dawn Thursday.

Boaters take note: the Causeway drawbridge will not be opened for any boat traffic for one week beginning March 18. This is so needed repairs can be made to the power lines that supply the juice to open the bridge. Another phase of bridge repairs will necessitate the drawbridge being in the open position from midnight to 6 a.m. every day for three weeks in early April.

Greyhound story appalls dog racing enthusiasts

To the Editor

The Islander We were appalled by George Campbell's story "Going to the Dogs" (The Islander, Jan. 7, 1986). The story is unbalanced and inaccurate, and Mr. Campbell made no attempt to check his information with anyone involved in greyhound racing. We consider it irresponsible of your paper to print the story before the facts have been checked.

You are obviously not aware that from their origin in ancient Egyptian history, greyhounds were hunting dogs. Coursing, or the pursuit of hares, was started in England in the 1700s by Queen Elizabeth I. Greyhounds were originally imported to America in the 1800s to help midwestern farmers control the jack rabbit, a noted crop destroyer.

The greyhound does not have to learn how to run. It runs by instinct. It hunts by instinct. It chases by instinct. To deprive a greyhound of running is to deprive it of its instinct.

The American Greyhound Track Operators Association, which is comprised of owners and operators of 46 greyhound race tracks in 15 states, is concerned about the welfare of greyhounds and has taken significant steps to assure greyhounds are given the best possible

We also have taken the public's concern into account. While the training of greyhounds is not under our jurisdiction, we are doing everything in our power to persuade greyhound trainers to use artificial lures. In 1983 we co-sponsored a film with the National Greyhound Association to demonstrate successful training by artificial lure. We are on record that we oppose the use of live bait in training, and you may know that Florida and several other states have legislation prohibiting the use of live bait. We continue our efforts to exert pressure on greyhound trainers.

Like all athletes, greyhounds sometimes sustain injuries when competing. And like other athletes, when they do hurt themselves they receive the utmost professional care. Again, the industry is taking the lead to see that the greyhound competes under the safest possible conditions. The AGTOA has funded a training track at the University of Florida School of Veterinary Medicine to study racing conditions and make recommendations for improvement.

Every industry has isolated incidents of abuse, something which we in greyhound racing simply do not tolerate. The AGTOA has adopted a resolution stating that anyone found to have treated a greyhound inhumanely will not be allowed at any of our tracks, even as a spectator. The National Greyhound Association has a similar rule ejecting abusers from its association.

Ironically, greyhound racing faces a problem similar to that faced by humane societies and animal shelters. There are simply more greyhounds than there are homes for them. After their racing days, scane greyhounds are used for breeding purposes and others become pets. In fact, Plainfield Greyhound Track in Plainfield, Conn., has funded a kennel to hold greyhounds until an owner can be found for them.

When a greyhound is not suitable for breeding or a home cannot be found; the greyhound industry follows the policy of humane euthanasia endorsed by the Humane Society of the United States.

You are right when you say greyhound racing is big business. In 1984 the State of Florida alone received more than \$75 million from greyhound racing. In addition, the industry donates more than \$1.5 million each year to charity and employs more than 100,000 people.

We invite you to visit a greyhound race track and let us demonstrate to you the care and attention these magnificent animals are given. In the meantime, we racing. We feel that you owe it to your readers to provide the other side of the story.

Sandbag project is 'a miracle' taking place

To the Editor

The Islander A miracle is taking place on Captiva Island. Dick Holmberg's experimental sandbag project is in place

— and is working. The beach sand is accreting at a rapid rate along the 850-foot stretch of the project and for more than 1,000 feet on either side.

It is now possible to walk the beach at high tide from Jensen's southward at least 1,000 feet, a task that was impossible prior to last Thursday when the huge sandbags were installed on the beach.

Within the next few weeks the sand is expected to build up and completely cover these "protectors" of the beach.

The former Captiva Erosion Prevention District board dragged its feet for more than six years on this

project even though the money was allocated for it years ago.

It took the new CEPD board, elected Nov. 5, 1985, to finally get the project underway.

Dear Dr. Dean:

On Feb. 4, Mike Joity, your area inspector, visited the site of the Captiva experimental perpendicular stabilizer project and issued a warning notice requesting the CEPD to cease any further construction on sandbag groins that do not conform with project description or special permit conditions. Questionnaire raises many questions in itself

The following letter to the commissioners of the Captiva Erosion Prevention District was given to The Islander for publication.

As an effort to determine the will of Captivans, the recent questionnaire sent to Islanders by you is deserving. There are, however, many seemingly irrevelant, redundant, impertinent and biased questions that need explaining. To evaluate them would invite doubts the project has already been completed and is as to meaningful results. As a socio-economic study it will be interesting to read the conclusions. They are Helen Kalvin more apt to be an exposition of the character of the one Captiva who concludes.


To begin with, there is an assumption that the person questioned is familiar with Captiva, the erosion problem and the proffered solutions and that he has followed the activities of the CEPD. How can those who answer this with knowledge be sorted out from those who are unfamiliar? What weight is given each should the evaluator think he knows the difference?

In fact, some of the questions themselves were made with transparent misunderstanding. Many alternative answer questions are incomplete, with some alternates offered out of context.

My questionnaire arrived Feb 3 and was to be returned by the seventh. Thoughtful answers to some 81 questions will surely need time. For a fair sampling

Water heater blamed for fire that destroys cottage

A shorted out water heater sparked a blaze that destroyed the inside of a cottage behind Century 21 Real Estate on Periwinkle Way last Wednesday

Marian Ziegler, who lived in the cottage, said she was taking a shower when she smelled smoke and discovered her house on fire. She grabbed a robe and ran across the street to Bank of The Islands to call the Sanibel Fire Department.

Ziegler says the entire house and its contents were destroyed in the blaze.

The state fire marshall's report shows the blaze started when the cottage's electric hot water heater shorted out, sending a current along a metal rod that

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
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
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Project engineers insist perpendicular stabilizers comply with permits

Something about a certain 650-feet of at risk here. Captivans Captiva shoreline resembles a ghost town. Loud machinery that once roared with activity is silent. Men who scurried about like worker ants have drifted away. And construction, in- Here I've created a beach, complete, is being covered by sand.

The experimental perpendicular stabilizer project, which began with such hope by Captivans that it might solve the Island's severe erosion problems, has been put on indefinite hold.

The earliest the project could start back up and be completed is late March. Even that date is suspect considering potential problems that range from legalities to financial liabilities. the effect of more than a month's worth of weather on an unfinished project and the physical availability of the contractor, who bluntly says he had "other commitments" to attend to

The problems began after three days of busy construction. Officials from the state Department of Environmental Regulation found the project in violation Monday, Feb. 3. Those problems were quickly solved.

But then the Department of Natural Resources also determined the project was in violation.

Last Wednesday the DNR said even permitted work could not be completed unless one of two conditions was met



Frustrated contractor says state does not support his efforts

Dick Holmberg, designer and contractor of the illfated Captiva perpendicular stabilizer project, is a portrait in frustration.

Last week he talked to The Islander about the state's decision to stop the experimental erosion prevention project because of alleged permit violations. As he (to erosion)? spoke, his voice trembled with anger and he skipped quickly from subject to subject as he struggled to come to grips with the fact that his construction crew was forced to stop after only three days of work.

Holmberg is frustrated because he sees the state as not supporting experimental projects. He is frustrated because he is not sure if the Captiva Erosion Prevention District and Captiva residents are behind him. And he is frustrated because the stop work order has placed him under enormous financial risk.

And when he left the Island last week, a question hung in the air — would he return to complete the project, no matter how the issue is resolved?

Holmberg's response was a blunt: "I have other commitments." And, he added, "As soon as the ice melts in Michigan I plan to be working full-time up

Holmberg and project engineer Art Learned have maintained their innocence since the Department of Environmental Regulations, and then the Department of Natural Resources, determined the builders had violated their permit specifications.

Both engineers have stressed that they are following the general outline of the permit. They say the problem is a matter of design interpretation. Changes in the project have been "fundamental construction details," they say. They have, however, filed a


Casselman died Nov. 29, 1985, on Sanibel after a long illness.

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

Shuttle service could bring bicyclists across the Causeway by next October

A service to shuttle bicycles over the Sanibel Causeway might be a reality by next fall.

Gene Lent, acting director of Lee County's Department of Transportation and Engineering, thinks he has found a feasible solution for the complaints of bicyclists that the Island's network of bike paths is not accessible to mainland riders.

The Causeway is closed to bicycles because Sanibel city fathers and some county commissioners consider the bridges too narrow for safe passage.

Lent proposes to offer a twicedaily service using a pick-up truck and trailer to carry cyclists and their bikes from the toll booth to the Sanibel Chamber of Commerce and back.

A pick-up truck equipped with sideboards and fold-down seats could carry about eight passengers and haul the trailer loaded with their bikes.

The Causeway is closed to bicycles because some officials consider the bridges too narrow for safe passage.

The trips could be scheduled to leave the toll booth for Sanibel at 9 a.m. and return to the toll booth at 9:30 a.m. An afternoon run would leave the toll booth at 3 p.m. and return from Sanibel at 3:30 p.m.

To purchase and modify a pickup truck and trailer for shuttle service would cost about \$11,500, Lent estimated. The truck could be financed with Sanibel Toll Facility funds and the trailer from the county's Bicycle Facilities budget, he said. Ed Mason, Causeway manager,

has recommended a fee of \$2 per biker for the round trip, payable at the toll booth. This would be consistent with the \$2 toll charged for motorcycles.

Lent suggested that shuttle service allowing bicycle traffic to the Islands on a limited basis could get underway about Oct. 1. County Administrator Jerry Maxwell has presented the plan to county commissioners for

Final approval of the county attorney and the Causeway bonding agent will be needed for the county staff to initiate the program for an Oct. 1 start, Lent added.

Sanibel City Manager Gary Price said the proposal is a good compromise that will give serious off-Island cyclists an opportunity to tour the Island on their own

On two occasions in the past Sanibel City Council has voted against permitting bicycle traffic on the Causeway on the basis that it is unsafe for cyclists to cross the narrow bridges.

After 26 years catering to shell crafters, the Black Pearl closes its doors

One of the Island's longest operating businesses closed its doors for the last time Thursday.

Feb. 13. The Black Pearl, a craft store with an emphasis on shells, had been an Island institution since it opened in 1964. For the past 12 years the shop was owned by Margaret Thorson and Peggy Bennett. The two recently sold the Periwinkle Way building to Edison Properties, a real estate

and development firm. Thorson has mixed emotions about the sale.

"I don't know if I've ever worked harder — six days a week, hardly a vacation," she said last week. "But how many people get a chance to have fun like we have had at work? We've made more

unbelievable friends ... " Thorson and Bennett purchased

the Black Pearl from Bette Park and Betty Puff in 1974. Parke and Puff opened the store in 1964 as a general gift shop.

"But we soon discovered the need on the Island was for a craft shop," Park said. "We were regularly making shell gifts, so we added supplies for sale. Soon others were buying supplies to make their own crafts.

"It was pretty much the only complete craft shop on the Island, and it has remained so," Park added. Park and Puff began the B-Hive in 1962. They later developed Baywind Plaza and moved there after they sold the Black Pearl to Thorson and

Park and Puff met Thorson and Bennett through Edie Mugridge. Now Thorson and Bennett will

contribute some of their own crafts for sale through Mugridge's Glory of the Sea

Thorson has become known for her lucite work, and Bennett, who had a wall full of ribbon awards at the Black Pearl, is known for all kinds of shell work.

Thorson said there is more competition on the Islands for shell-related businesses, but she sees that as a healthy situation.

"After all, shells are what many people come here for," she said. "For us it has been particularly nice when you can get someone to try to do the crafts themselves. There will always be shell crafts. Some think they've seen everything you can make out of shells, but that's not true."

CAT CLAW Pithecellobium unguis-cati

The cat claw is a shrub or smal tree named for slender sharp spines that catch the clothes or skin of a passerby with much the same effect as the claws of a cat. The thorns are a quarter to a half-inch long and grow in pairs at nodes of the shrub's zig-zag branches. New leaves have a reddish cast that gives the shrub a

distinctive look in the spring.

Typical habitat for this shrub is sandy shores and dry coastal areas. In such areas, it grows with numerous trunks forming thickets that seldom reach more than 25 feet in height. The cat claw is known to grow to tree size in good soil. In spite of its "claws," cat claw is a most desirable landscape plant. It is quite attractive as a medium-sized shrub or small tree and takes well to pruning and shaping. As a hedge or border planting it is very effective and with its spines directs traffic

around not through it. Growth is relatively slow at first, but once established seedlings quickly become a nice shurb. Supplemental care and water are unnecessary to raise an attractive specimen, since it is well adapted to local soils and environmental conditions.

Happy Birthday, Everglades Wonder Gardens

Over 50 years this botanical and animal garden in Bonita Springs has become home for many of the wild things that roam the Everglades

ester and Bill Piper came to Southwest Florida 50 years ago from Wyandotte, Mich. They settled at the small village of Bonita Springs on the banks of the Imperial River at a time when this part of the world was still pretty much wilderness. There they established the Everglades Wonder Gardens on a small part of a huge tract of land they had acquired.

Lester Piper, the brother who was most interested in wild animals and plants, devoted all of his time for almost 50 years to managing, building and rebuilding the garden, working 14-hour days, often seven days a week.

The establishment on four acres is planted as a botanical garden and arboretum with a few hundred wild animals attractively housed among the trees.

Now 83, Lester Piper has today largely turned the management over to his two grandsons, Bucky and David, both capable and energetic young men who are keenly interested in perpetuating the family institution and who show great promise in their urge to carry on the tradition of their grandfather. Lester Piper has taught these young men to respect nature, to love animals and to understand the wild things that roam the Everglades.

he greatest concentration of botanical specimens can be found at the south end of the garden. There are huge, colorful crotons and large philodendrons that climb high into the trees.

One of these philodendron-like vining aeroids that we commonly but erroneously call pothos, is of interest. This is the green, white and yellow heart-shaped leafed vine that commonly climbs palm trees in many places in South Florida. At the **Everglades Wonder Gardens this** species displays an unusual and hardto-explain growth habit. If you look at the specimens that cover the ground, you will see that their leaves are small, seldom longer than four or six inches. But as soon as this plant climbs up a tree and its stem assumes a vertical position, the leaves grow immense — sometimes up to 24 inches long and 18 inches wide — quite large enough to use as a makeshift umbrella in a rainstorm!

Why it is that a vertical stem has big leaves and a horizontal stem produces little leaves is beyond my powers of explaining. Somebody out there who knows the answer to this riddle, please help!


mong the other plants in this beautiful botanical garden is a large stand of Philodendron senoum, the cut-leafed or lobed-leafed self-healing philodendron so popular all over Florida.

This plant has been a favorite of Florida plantsmen for a few decades, ever since I sent the first few thousand seeds to the United States from the plant's native Brazil. At that time I was in the tropical seed business in Rio de Janeiro.

Arthur Vining Davis (Arvida, get it?) ordered many thousands of seeds from my partner and me. We operated Tropical Collectors, Ltd. Our warehouse and stock consisted of all of the plant specimens of the world-famous Rio Botanical Garden — but all that is quite another story to be told someday later on in this series.

The Pipers have an unusual monkey puzzle Araucarian. This unfriendly tree has sharp needles that can cut you if you touch it carelessly. It is related to the popular Norfolk Island star pine which is quite widely planted on Sanibel. My readers will recall my discussion of this ancient Southern Hemisphere conifer group that persists today and can be found in Australia and across the Pacific to Chile and Brazil. Araucarians at one time lived in North America. Our **Petrified Forest National Monument** contains the trunks of North American Auricarians now long extinct.

At the Wonder Gardens is a beautiful, huge, really immense Cuban laurel (Ficus nitida). It has the complex aerial root system of the other banyans. "Banyan" is a term from India that describes the manytrunked growth habit of some fig trees. The one at the Wonder Gardens has perhaps six or eight trunks and many smaller complex adventitious hanging roots. This immense tree throws a circle of shade perhaps 80 feet in diameter.



At only eight feet, this is the smallest crocodile at the Everglades Wonder Gardens. The others are so BIG you won't believe your eyes.

The tiny figs of the Cuban laurel are somewhat bitter, but they are edible. Their flavor is not nearly as good as the fruits of our native strangler fig, which I highly recommend.

Also at Lester Piper's gardens is the Hong Kong orchid (Bauhinia pupurea). This purple-flowered legume tree has flowers that are reminiscent of the true orchids, but of course they are not orchids at all.

Twin brothers Caspar and John Bauhin were French herbalists of the 16th century. The compound leaf of Bauhinia when folded longitudinally in the center shows twin leaflets. The compound leaf itself is heart-shaped, which inspired Linnaeus to name this genus Bauhinia, after the twin Frenchmen.

Attractive and popular, Bauhinias are found in many parts of the tropical world. Most are trees, but I know of one small vining species which is most interesting.

At the Wonder Gardens there are beautiful cycads, representatives of that ancient group of plants known as Cycadaceae. They look like ferns or palms but are really related to pine



SCCF manager accepts Gainesville post

Steve Phillips, popular eight-year veteran of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, will assume his new responsibilities early next month

E ight years ago Steve Phillips was "adopted" by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation "family." March 7, the director of environmental programs will leave "home" to advance his career with the city of Gainesville, Fla. Phillips has been hired as Gainesville's nature

The past eight years at the SCCF have presented Phillips his share of problems to overcome, accomplishments of which he is rightly proud, and memories he'll never forget.

Always a reptile and amphibian afficionado, Phillips knew he had found the right job back in 1978 when his first assignment was to capture a 10-foot long boa constrictor that had been determined a "nuisance" snake.

Later, he would associate with such luminaries as weatherman Willard Scott, who borrowed Phillips' famed alligator hat, to the wife of former West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt.

Phillips took Mrs. Schmidt on a tour along the SCCF trails. Not far behind as they walked were the omnipresent bodyguards.

"I'd show her the plants that were edible and she'd immediately pop them in her mouth," Phillips remembers. "The bodyguards would stare at me. I felt obligated to show them the plants were harmless, so I ate them, too. At the end of the tour Mrs. Schmidt smiled and thanked me, and in between her teeth were hanging bits of vegetation."

ut Phillips has had his dangerous moments on the job as well. He is proud of his efforts to educate people about alligators. But this is an ongoing task, as he discovered recently Phillips is one of only three Islanders licensed to move "nuisance" alligators. One Saturday morning he received a call about an 11-foot gator at the city park on Periwinkle Way. The alligator was injured, and more than 100 people had gathered and sur-


rounded the big beast. "I drew closer to rope him, and the people circled me as if I was in a boxing ring," he remembers. "They kept getting closer, shouting advice, and I was letting myself get mad. I got between the gator's tail and head, and before I knew it the gator's tail had knocked me down. I fell right in front of his head. I've never crawled so fast. If he'd

pursued me, he would have had me. "Then when I got up I saw that several people had jumped on top of my brand new car to get away from the gator."

In his highly visible position, Phillips has also dealt frequently with the press. The Wall Street Journal once quoted him on the exotic Brazilian pepper problem — right on the front page.

And the local Fort Myers News-Press appeared to take the joking Phillips a little too literally in one story about "Why fish jump." Phillips told the

Wheeler said he saw the Kissimmee as a keystone to Lake Okeechobee and the Everglades, and therefore as an important contributor to the Biscayne Aquifer (east coast drinking water).

Another panel discussed the regional land acquisition of more than 380,000 acres in several areas.

The fourth panel, moderated by Dr. Elton Gissendanner, executive director of Florida Department of Natural Resources, discussed future initiatives. Of course that has been outlawed. But certainly egret plumes equaling gold is a quantitative figure. Certainly someone can estimate the number of egrets per acre of marsh, their life span, and the weight of an individual's plumes per year and thus arrive at a figure of "X" ounces of plumes per bird or per acre, and multiply it out times the current price of gold.

I suspect that with that analysis, interior marshland would be infinitely more valuable than coastal acreage. Certainly the plumes being illegal to possess would not affect the value — cocaine is illegal too. Likewise, that unavailability would not affect the fixing of its value — we cannot utilize the minerals and elements on the other planets or the sun directly, but we can estimate their amounts and value.

Wouldn't it be marvelous to save those marshes and birds by the same mechanism that they were nearly ruined?



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
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Walking trails show visitors another side of the wildlife refuge

The J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel offers three walking trails in addition to the popular Wildlife Drive.

The four-mile South Dike Trail and 1/3-mile Gasparilla Trail both are along the Wildlife Drive adjacent to Sanibel-Captiva Road.

Two miles of walking trails are found in the Bailey Tract of the refuge off Tarpon Bay Road. All trails are open from sunrise to sunset every day of the year

These trails offer a unique opportunity to explore the native flora and fauna of Sanibel. Mangrove and marsh environments can be seen on-the South Dike and Bailey Tract trails. Calusa Indian shell mounds are found among tropical hardwoods on the Gasparilla Trail. Careful lookers can spot alligators, raccoons and many species of birds.

The best time to walk the trails is during the earling morning and early evening hours.

The refuge staff recommends closed, comfortable shoes for walking the trails because sandspurs can be a problem. During the summer months insect repellent is a good idea. It is also a good idea to carry drinking water on any extended walks.

Additional information is available at the Visitor Center at the head of the Wildlife Drive off Sanibel-Captiva Road. The center itself is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday




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
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
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
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'Jews for Jesus' will present musical program for the public at Sanibel Community Church

trees, being true gymnosperms. One exotic commonly grown on Sanibel is the "sago palm." In some parts of the world people consume the root of the sago palm because it is easy to make a rich and tasty flour out of it.

Florida has a native cycad called coontie, Zamia floridana. This plant was the basis of early Indian and early settler agricultural economics because flour was made from it. The Indians called the resultant bread coonti hateka.

There are huge live oak trees, Quer-

cus virginiana, in the Wonder
Gardens. They are native to this part
of Florida and throughout the South.
There are also many vining cacti such
as the beautiful night-blooming
Epiphyllum. On one of the oak trees is
a huge staghorn fern. Nearby is the

a huge staghorn fern. Nearby is the huge so-called Peruvian cereus, which is not native to Peru, but is found on the coast of southeast Brazil. This great tree cactus towers up to 40 feet and is as big as our famous tree cacti of Arizona.

Many bromeliads, some exotic and others native, grow in the Wonder Gardens. The pineapple belongs to the Bromeliad family. Most bromeliads consist of little rosettes (sometimes very large rosettes) that cling to the bark of trees. They do not parasitize the tree at all, but only seek support up high enough to maximize sunlight. There is in the Wonder Gardens a

huge silk cotton tree (Ceiba petrandra). This tree has an immense trunk. It is exploited by a number of bromeliads and other epiphytes such as ferns and orchids. The ceiba tree produces that flotation material known as kapok. Before the age of plastic foams a lot of this material was stuffed into old-fashioned life preservers that also made do as pillows

The flamingo flock at the Wonder Gardens is very beautiful and colorful. The two or three dozen birds are "color fed," which is to say their diet

is enhanced with vitamin K. This is done with many captive birds, including canaries and others. It makes them quite orange in color. We are very familiar with wild flamingos at Nakuru in Africa where we visit the largest single flock in the world — 2 million birds! In the wild, flamingos are not nearly as colorful as they are at the Wonder Gardens because they do not get the same vitamin supplement in high concentrations. These are West Indian flamingos, one of the

six world species.

The ISLANDER

In the flamingo enclosure is an unusual example of our state tree, the cabbage palm (Sabal palmetto). Years ago this 20-foot-tall tree was blown over in a hurricane and its crown landed in the flamingo pond. Rather than try to repair the damages of nature, Lester Piper left the tree to its own natural mending devices. It eventually grew a right angle turn and started to grow straight to the sky. Now, many years after the

storm, it has grown another 20 feet straight up, so this tree has a long trunk (or caudex, palms don't really have trunks) that bridges half of the pond about two feet above the water and then abruptly turns straight up. It is attractive, and it also provides a perch for wild herons in the pond.

There is a large pony-tail palm (Nolina) in the Wonder Gardens. In spite of its common name, it is not really a palm, but is related to the lillies. And there is a fish-tail palm (Caryota urens), the kind with only one trunk. The ones we see on Sanibel are Caryota mitis, the multi-trunked

In December there was a huge powder puff tree in full bloom in the Wonder Gardens. This magnificent 30-foot tree had more than 200 blossoms

A number of royal palms are present. These are native Florida royals,


As in the past, Island residents and businesses have purchased sponsorship of the drawings and are

One of the things that brought Boney back to the Islands (she'd visited here with her parents years ago) was the love she has long harbored for the place. "I always wanted to come back. There are so many neat retired people here," she says. And perhaps most important of all — she wanted to leave the rat race behind.

In addition to the Sanibel wildlife refuge project, Boney is in the throes of illustrating a series of six children's books titled "How and Why." She explains that the educational books are actually updated versions of books that were popular with children many years ago.

The project, which she started before Christmas, is due for production next month. Her illustrations for focused on completing the two projects that are due the books consist mostly of line and stipple drawings of everything from dinosaurs to the newly discovered rings around Uranus.

"I've always wanted to do this," she says about the children's books. "But it's hard to get your foot in the door." She hopes this project will lead to further work opportunities in that area. And she's glad she was in the position of having her "finger in the pie" of the book's design.

"You don't want somebody in an art department somewhere just plopping things down anywhere"

Boney's previous employment includes everything from designing exhibit preparations for the Olympic Arts Festival exhibit to designing and producing an nual reports and corporate logos.

Her repertoire of commercial artistic skills is wide and varied, but amazingly enough she still manages to find time to produce art for her own pleasure. One such endeavor is a series of colorful tropical fish greeting cards. Another, which she'd like to explore more deeply, is painting on fabric.

During what little free time she has, Boney enjoys shelling and riding her bike.

When you run a long suit the opponents often must guess what to do, as we see in this week's hand played during the recent North American Championships in Winnipeg.

East took the first trick with the king of diamonds and returned a trump. New York expert Roger Bates prompt ly ran off six trumps, discarding three diamonds and a heart from dummy. West discarded a heart and two clubs without much pain but then had to part with a diamond.

Reading the situation, Bates led a low heart. West agonized and then played low, fearing that East had the unguarded ace. Bates put up dummy's queen of hearts and ruffed a diamond to remove the last diamond from West's hand. Then he led the ace and another heart to put West in.

Meanwhile East, also experiencing problems, had discarded two diamonds, keeping two clubs instead of his two aces. When West had to lead a club at the 12th trick, South played low from the dummy and got the king of clubs as his 10th trick.




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
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

Acronyms, Initialisms and Abbreviations Dictionary, 1985-86 — Published in two parts by Gale Research, Co., edited by Ellen Crowley and Helen Sheppard (R421.03 ACR) — To clarify the meaning of this title, a few definitions are in order.

An acronym is composed of the initial letters or parts of a compound term. It is usually read or spoken as a single word, such as RADAR (Radio Detection And Ranging) or LASER ***************************** (Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation). An initialism is also composed of in-

itial letters, but the letter generally are spoken letter-by-letter, such as PO (Post Office) and RPM (Revolutions Per Minute). An abbreviation is a shortened form of a work that does not follow the for-

mation of either of the above, such as APR (April) and DR (doctor). This voluminous publication consists of more than 300,000 entries in this ninth edition. Whenever one opens a scientific, economic or technical

volume — or even the daily newspaper - one finds innumerable letter combinations that are sometimes meaningless to the uninitiated. This is the reason for this publication, and it behooves us to be aware of it in the

Reverse Acronyms, Initialisms and Abbreviations Dictionary, 1985-86 — In two volumes published by Gale the world of lions, tigers, cheetahs, Research Co., edited by Ellen Crowley jaguars, cougars, leopards, bobcats, and Helen Sheppard (R421.03 ACR) -The companion to the above-mentioned work contains essentially the same terms, but they are arranged alphabetically by meaning rather than by the acronym or initialism. This volume enables one to find the accepted short form for organization names and technical terms. While

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

Q. How do you block a sweater?

A. In the past, blocking a sweater meant steaming it into the proper shape with an iron and damp cloth. This technique still works well with wool, but not with other fibers.

If your yarn is machine washable, using the gentle cycle and

low temperature in the dryer will make dle and slip the stitch off the needle. your sweater look professional. For cottons and other natural fibers, hand wash and lay flat. Or simply roll the hour, unroll and dry.

Q. How can I match the correct yarn to the project?

A. This is a big problem because there are thousands of varns on the market. When you find a pattern you like, work with the required gauge. Knit up a practice piece using the yarn of your choice. The piece should be 4x4 inches and stitched in the pattern used for the project. If the required gauge is five stitches and seven rows equal one inch, cast on 20 stitches and knit 28 rows. Pull the needle out and measure. If the square is smaller than 4x4 inches. use larger needles. If larger, use smaller needles.

Q. What can I do with my leftover

A. If you are a saver, store them together in a plastic bag. They come in tions and needlepoint projects. When you have too much accumulated, make a striped afghan mixed with a neutral shade worsted yarn using large needles for knitting or a large hook for crocheting.

Q. How do I stop my knitting from

A. The stockinette stitch of knit a row, purl a row, always curls inward on the sides and outward on the top and bottom. To make a flat-edged scarf, afghan or placemat, always knit, even on the purl side, a determined number of stitches on the edges. The seed stitch or ribbing could also be used for the

Q. What is the best way to sew a sweater together?

A. It depends on the stitch pattern and the yarn. Most seams look great when backstitched with matching yarn on the inside close to the edge. Shoulders can sometimes be overcast stitched together.





> Q. Why does my needlepoint canvas get out of shape?

A. Needlepoint stitches are slanted and when pulled too tight, the canvas threads become distorted. Try using a square frame, loosen up on your stitch, or work the stab method of stitching. Pull the needle and thread all the way through to the back, then push it up and all the way through to the front.

When cold weather strikes, try soup to warm you up

Teorial Address

The ISLANDER

I am a "soup freak," and in cool weather I serve a Pennsylvania Dutch dish called Honey's Chicken Corn Soup. This is not only hearty but very economical. When you serve this as a main course with hot biscuits, a tossed green salad and fruit and cheese for dessert, you have it made.

> Honey's Chicken Corn Soup

- 1 3-pound chicken cut in quarters
- 3 quarts of water 1 tablespoon salt
- Pepper to taste
- ¼ cup flour 6 ears of fresh corn kernels cut from cob
- 3 hard-boiled eggs, chopped coarsely
- 1 small green pepper, chopped fine 1 tablespoon fresh parsley, chopped fine for garnish

Place chicken in pot with water and salt and pepper. Bring to boil, put lid on and turn to simmer. Cook until

tender. When done remove chicken and strain broth. When the chicken is cool enough to handle, cut meat from bones (I do this the day before so the fat can be skimmed off the stock). Make a paste of the flour and ½ cup of the stock. Heat stock and whisk in the flour

paste. Keep whisking until it thickens. Bring to boil. Add the green pepper and corn, simmer 10 minutes and add the chicken pieces. Bring back to a boil, add the chopped eggs. Pour into a tureen and garnish with



If you have enough of the chicken stock left over you can freeze it and use it for the following cool

Velvet Soup

1½ cups chicken stock 1 large ripe avocado, peeled, pitted and cubed Salt and pepper to taste 1 teaspoon lime or lemon juice

½ cup light cream Chopped fresh dill for garnish

refreshing soup.

Put all the ingredients except dill in blender. Blend thoroughly. Pour in chilled soup cups and garnish with the dill. This can be done an hour ahead.

And with fresh tomatoes so excellent most of the year here, I make and freeze my own soup. Here it is.


- Tomato and Herb Soup 5 medium tomatoes, chopped
- 1 small onion, chopped 3 ribs celery, chopped
- ½ teaspoon sugar 2 teaspoons fresh basil or 1 dried
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 stick of cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 bay leaf

2 tablespoons butter 3 cups chicken stock

Melt the butter in a heavy saucepan. Add the tomatoes, onion and celery and cook covered for 10 minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients. Bring to boil, turn to simmer and cook covered for 20 minutes. Remove bay leaf and stick cinnamon. Run the rest thru the medium blade of a food mill.

Now you can freeze this soup and when you are ready to serve add 1/2 cup of light cream. This makes for a smoother richer soup. This soup is marvelous




By then, South Seas I, playing their second game in a row, appeared worn out and Timbers began to build their lead, finally winning, 64-47.

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

This Thursday evening, Feb. 20, Island Tennis Services will continue its series of free tennis lessons with a focus on the backhand stroke.

The free lessons are being offered to residents and visitors at 7 p.m. every Thursday at the Sanibel Recreation Center courts. Next Thursday's session will concentrate on the serve.

Here are some pointers to get players thinking about the backhand stroke before this week's lesson.

There are two types of backhand groundstroke: the one-handed and the two-handed backhand. If you haven't decided which one you prefer, try them both and decide for yourself.

The one-handed stroke begins with the left hand on the throat of the racket. Once the player sees the ball coming to the backhand side, he makes a grip change to the eastern backhand grip (i.e. index knuckle on the top bevel of the grip) and turns the right shoulder to

The racquet is now prepared back. The left hand is still on the throat of the racquet for stability. The racquet is also below the intended point of impact.


The player then steps toward the ball with the right foot and swings forward and up through the ball. The moment the racket begins to come forward, the left hand is released and moves to point toward the back fence. The follow-through should continue until the racket head is approximately in front of the right eye.

The two-handed stroke is very similar to the

forehand groundstroke. It does not require a grip change. With the simple addition of the left hand to the grip, above and adjacent to the right hand in the ready position, you are now ready to rotate to the left side of your body. As with the forehand, the shoulders, arms hips and torso rotate together as a singular unit. The rotation ends with the right shoulder pointing to the net and the racquet pointing to the fence behind you, lower than the on-coming ball.

The forward swing is once again a unit rotation towards the net. The racquet path is forward and up through impact point, finishing high and in front of the

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

Spotted sea trout are not the only fun fish in the sea

While our popular spotted sea trout gets much attention from Island anglers, two other kinds of trout in our waters this time of the year are fun to catch and eat, too.

These two lesser known members of the trout family have a bit of an idenity problem, however. Both have at least two names, which seems to be a common thing throughout the drum family of fish.

While the spotted sea trout can grow to nine pounds or more, its close cousin the sand seatrout usually averages just a pound or slightly more. A big sand trout might be 15 inches. But don't let that bother you much. The average spotted seatrout is 11-15 inches, too. But the sand trout is a better fighter, and some say it is better for the table, too.

The spotted sea trout has a colorful green back with black dots on white sides. The sand trout is mostly silver-grey and has no spots.

You might know the sand trout by other names if you fish along the gulf or Atlantic coasts. It is sometimes called a white trout in Texas, and we often hear it called a silver trout around Sanibel and Captiva. The sand trout is primarily a Gulf of Mexico dweller.

Another trout, the weakfish, looks much like the sand trout. Weakfish dont usually appear south of Cape Kennedy on Florida's eastern shore. The sand trout doesn't reach up very far on the eastern shore, even a small meal. I don't recall ever keeping one.

We tend to think of the spotted trout as a major commercial fish in our area, but in other parts of the gulf the sand trout — not the spotted trout — makes up the catches.

The other sea trout in our waters this time of year is the sugar sea trout. But it, too, has another name. More properly called the silver sea trout, these fish hardly ever reach more than six to eight inches or

They are called "sugar" trout because some anglers feel they have a mild, sweet flavor. The problem is they are so small that it takes many to make

Most guides feel the same way, so there are still plenty of silvers around. As a matter of fact, we think they are bait stealers that can clean out your shrimp supply in short order. I usually move the boat if I come under a silver trout attack.

The sand trout is often caught along the gulf beaches. We got into a few last week when we noticed birds diving around Redfish Pass. We hoped for a few Spanish mackerel but caught the sand trout instead. They tend to be school feeders, so if you catch one it's likely there are more around.

They take anything that a spotted trout will take. I fish mostly with artificial trout imitator lures such as the Trout Tout tipped with shrimp. The sand trout will come in and hit the lure just as other trout might. The most popular bait is still a live shrimp on

a 2/0 hook. If you can find a place to fish from the shore on Captiva or at Blind Pass Bridge, you have a chance at not only the sand trout but also at whiting and perhaps some pompano or sheepshead.

Good angling this week. As long as the winds don't top 15 mph and the temperatures don't go down into the 50s, the fishing should remain rewarding. And it sure beats being pulled around by a snow blower in

The warm weather indicator is starting to show up on Island shores

The cold days of last week wouldn't make a isiting shell collector think spring has arrived, but our early warm weather indicator, the whelk egg case, is starting to show up along the beaches. This concerns many shellers.

The appearance of the snake-like brown egg cases s not what worries many people; it's the ignorance of novice shellers who pull these cases out and in the processes kill hundreds of tiny left-handed lightning

The egg cases are strange looking, to say the east. The large female whelks deposit small strips of eggs encapsulated in nearly clear disks. These disks are connected by a rope-like membrane that keeps them anchored where the mother knows they will hatch and prosper.

The cases grow as the small whelks inside mature. Remember they all start as tiny cases, an inch or so in length. They grow to two or three feet or more f they aren't disturbed by man or nature.

The egg cases are a masterpiece of engineering. The anchored end is planted strongly enough to hold two or three feet of cases, which could weight a couple of pounds. The whole thing is very flexible, twisting and rolling with currents.

The female whelk deposits her egg case in a shallow, sunny area where the emerging whelks will be able to find food and be protected from most



natural enemies.

I've found washed up cases with whelks hardly larger than a BB pellet. Under natural circumstances in March or April, depending on when the warmer weather comes to stay, the egg cases open and the tiny whelks are released to fend for themselves.

Normally a small percentage of the tiny whelks survive. This is in keeping with the pattern of most fish and mollusks — hundreds or thousands of eggs are deposited, but only the strongest survive.

Many shell collectors coming to Sanibel or Captiva after some years of absence find it hard to believe that the once fairly common whelk is becoming a rarity on our beaches. There has to be two reasons.

The first is the ever-changing beaches. Captiva is experiencing much erosion. Moving sand can sweep those planted egg cases onto the beaches, killing the whelks in the process.

Strong winds on shore will turn up the bottom and also send the cases to the beaches. Any collector who has spent time on the beaches this time of year has seen dozens of large egg cases washed ashore. This is a natural way of losing the valuable cases, but unfortunately, many visiting collectors do not realize that pulling out these cases causes the death of so many young whelks.


I've seen people yank up the living cases just to see what they are. If you want one of these interesting cases for your display, please look for some washed to shore by the waves. Don't pull up the anchored, living cases. Once dried in the sun, the cases add a great deal to your display.

Good shelling this week. As usual, your best bet is to be on the beach at dawn when there is a low tide. Please remember to limit yourself to two live shells per species per day. Better yet, study the live shells and then put them back.
