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





Contractor completes Captiva beach project

Against the apparent wishes of the Captiva Erosion Prevention District and the state of Florida, contractor Dick Holmberg finished his perpendicular stabilizer project in two days last week (Feb. 15-16).

The experimental erosion prevention project had been shut down since Monday, Feb. 3, first by the Department of Environmental Regulations and then by the Department of Natural Resources. The state agencies said the work was not being done by the letter of the approved permit.

The contractors have contested that decision, saying it was a matter of "interpretation of design" and that the agencies were focusing on technicalities.

"The CEPD said to take the steps necessary to finish the project," Holmberg said from his temporary Captiva office Monday. He stopped there briefly before leaving for Dallas to speak at an erosion control conference.

"Any dispute we may have is with the DNR, and they care nothing about the merits of the project." Holmberg said. "Our dispute with them is totally centered on technicalities.

Holmberg said in the opinion of his attorney (Joseph Cardozo of Jones and Cardozo in Sarasota), the contractors had never been officially told to stop work, therefore Holmberg decided to finish the project.

An official "cease and desist" order did arrive at the CEPD offices Tuesday, Feb. 19 - two days after Holmberg finished the project. He finished the work in a total of five working days instead of the anticipated 10 days he had projected. Yet he insisted the project is completed according to plans.



Electrical malfunction keeps drawbridge closed to boat traffic

An electrical malfunction resulted in the Causeway drawbridge being closed to all boat traffic from 1:30 to 9:15 p.m. last Thursday.

he year was 1926. Clarence Conklin was leaving Drake University to finish his legal studies at the University of Chicago, at that school's invitation. It was with a future of promise and a head full

of aspirations that the up-and-coming attorney and collegiate tennis player extraordinaire stepped out the door. Little did he know then the circumstances that would bring him back within. those hallowed halls 60 years later.

Two weeks ago Conklin returned to Drake to ac cept one of the highest honors bestowed upon alumnae of that school,

Each year Drake awards the "Double D" citation to four former lettermen whose outstanding lifetime accomplishments merit recognition. This year the 86-year-old Sanibel resident was among that exclusive group. After returning from the awards banquet in Des

Moines last week, Conklin mused over his long career and the achievements that qualified him for the coveted honor

His story begins a long time ago - in the 19th

Conklin says as a youngster growing up outside a small town in Oklahoma he was fascinated by the Horatio Alger books in the school's tiny

library. He read each one again and again, and to this day he can recall most of the titles. "They gave me an incentive," he says about the books that sparked his desire to go to college. Having no money, Conklin hoped to attend on an

athletic scholarship. "At first I intended to become a track star at some university," he says. But a sport he hadn't considered previously - tennis - was where his talent lay. He managed to get through school on his athletic prowess and a lot of hard work. His feats both on and off the collegiate tennis court and later, in and out of courts of law, have been written about ever since. In 1926 Conklin took his first year of law at

Drake. The following year he entered the Universi-ty of Chicago and graduated with a juris doctorate in 1928. That year he also was admitted to the IIlinois bar.

"I was fortunate that early in my legal career I became expert in the law of inland marine in-

surance," he says, explaining that until about 1935 that type of law was non-existent. There being only four or five other lawyers in the country with similar expertise, over the next 30 years Conklin became a noted and highly respected lawyer in the field he practically

pioneered. His legal opinions were published in newspapers and insurance trade magazines, making his the "last word" in inland marine insurance.

"First thing I knew I was in 'Who's Who in America' and then 'Who's Who in the World," he says with amusement.

Conklin has saved most of the publications in which articles about him have appeared. The huge collection of clippings is accumulated in leaning, disheveled stacks in his Sanibel home. (With a sigh he says that at his family's urging he is currently attempting to sort through the paperwork with the purpose of eventually writing his memoirs.)

Until 1970 he was a member of the firm of Heineke, Conklin and Schrader, a partnership he co-founded. By the time he retired the two-person office he helped get started had grown to a prac-

Sanibel City Council has taken a strong stand against legalizing casino gambling in Florida. The council views casino gambling as not in the best interests of this city, its tourist industry or the health, safety and welfare of its citizens.

"It's at the other end of the spectrum from what Sanibel stands for," Councilman Mike Klein said, adding "It flies in the face of the goals of any fine residential, family-oriented community."

Last Tuesday the council unanimously passed a resolution supporting Gov. Bob Graham's anti-casino gambling stance and urging all Sanibel citizens to vote against the amendment to the state Constitution that would open the door for casino gambling in the state.

The amendment will be on the ballot in next November's general election. It approved state-wide it will rescind the state's constitutional ban on casino gambling.

Individual counties then will be able to initiate a petition drive to place the issue on local ballots, which probably would not happen before the fall of 1987.

The amendment authorizes casino gambling in hotels with 500 rooms or more in counties where

electors have approved the concept. Currently there are no hotels in Southwest Florida eligible to operate casino.

Forty-eight hotels throughout the state do qualify: 25 in the Orlando-Disney World area, 14 in Dade

County (six of them on Miami Beach), five in Broward County and two each in Palm Beach County and Tampa.

Gil Bursley, chairman of the Committee of the

Islands, and Henry Shelton of the Better Government Association of the Islands and president of the local chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons, lauded the council for its early stand against casino gambling.

Bursley said COTI board members strongly support this position. He stressed that casinos would draw the wrong element, such as criminals and other undesireables, to the Island and would greatly impact traffic should one be located at the western end of Sanibel.

Mayor Louise Johnson said that to reinforce the city's opposition she will issue a proclamation before the November election urging citizens to vote "No." There could be a second gambling issue that

voters will be asked to decide next Nov. 4. A petition drive to initiate an amendment to establish a state lottery with profits earmarked for public schools appears likely to succeed. It has the backing of state Education Commissioner Ralph

Turlington and the powerful education lobby. Many opponents of casino gambling feel differently about lotteries that are not tainted by the image

of "the mob."

Owner not interested in selling acreage to city

Last Tuesday Price reported that Betts, contacted by phone in Atlanta, had been "very evasive" and did not want to negotiate over the phone. But neither would he agree to Price's offer to fly to Atlanta and discuss the matter in

person, Price said. Price said he saw "little possibility" of a change in Betts attitude.'

• In line with current policy the City Council last week granted a revocable license to THE VILLAGE SHOPPING CENTER to permit a GROUND-MOUNTED SIGN IN THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY along Periwinkle Way.

The sign will be no more than 15 feet from the property line in the additional 25 feet of right-of-way developer Richard Beyer dedicated to the city as a condition of approval of the development permit for the retail shop/office complex.

Should the city ever need the right-of-way in the future, the sign will be removed at the owner's expense.

The council renewed for another year an occupational license for the Budget-Rent-A-Car office in Gulfside Plaza

When the occupational license was first approved in January 1985, city officials were concerned that the operation might create parking problems. Code Enforcement Officer Dick Baker reported last Tuesday there had been no complaints.

Councilman Bill Hagerup's motion to approve the license subject to annual review by the council passed by a 5-0 vote.

• The ROGO CRUNCH FOR SINGLE-FAMILY HOME ALLOCATIONS is apparently over. Only 28 applications for single-family homes have been filed to date for the March ROGO period. 70 dwelling units are available for allocation by the Planning Commission on March 11.

In light of this situation the City Council last Tuesday had no problem granting four-month extensions for eight allocations that will expire Feb. 28 because building permits have not been obtained. To grant this relief would not defeat the intent or

purpose of the ROGO ordinance, the council agreed. Potential homeowners Gerald Dillon, Carl Dietz, Charles Jenks, Will Compton, Douglas Forsyth Veronica Wiss, Gary Winrow and Howard Ipel now have until June 30 to obtain building permits.

• The City Council last week was SYMPATHETIC WITH ARNOLD GOODMAN'S PLIGHT. Caught in the transition of the city's change in standards for wastewater disposal systems, Goodman must replace the existing septic system at his Casa Ybel Road home in order to add a 280-square foot office/den. There is a \$5,000 price tag for such a new

system to serve his ground level home. Last June Goodman began planning the addition so he could move his office from the bedroom of his young son. He obtained a permit from Lee County Health Department approving the continued use of the

existing septic system. But when the city's new Land Development Code was adopted last Nov. 27, Goodman had not yet obtained a development permit for the construction.

Two weeks ago the Planning Commission turned down his request that his plans be "grandfathered" in under old CLUP rules that would preclude upgrading the septic system to new standards.

The commissioners decided the additional living space provided a potential for an increase in wastewater flow. They approved a development permit for the new room with the condition that Goodman obtain a wastewater disposal permit.

Last Tuesday the council affirmed this position. pointing out that the LDC provides a variance procedure by which Goodman could receive relief from any of the new standards with which his septic system cannot comply.

Goodman told the council that if he could continue to use the existing septic system he would be willing to add a restriction to his deed that he could not make any further changes or sell the property without upgrading the system to meet the new standards,

But the council preferred that Goodman follow the variance procedure as outlined in the LDC.

heliport, the City Council has thrown in the towel. The fruitless search stemmed from complaints of residents of nearby Sanibel Bayous subdivision that the noise from the helicopters refueling at the pad was destroying the quality of life in their neighborhood. They asked the city council to find a new location for the helistop.

Last week the council decided to follow assistant to the city manager Bill Patric's recommendation to accept the Bowman's Beach helistop as an "imperfect but reasonably good location for the mosquito control operation and leave well enough alone."

Marcus Clary, who said his home is the closest of any in Sanibel Bayous to the helipad, said the noise of the copters is "not all that bad and is very infrequent.'

"You've made a mountain out of a mole hill," Clary told the council.

Patric said any alternative site for the landing pad would not solve the noise problem but would only move it to another location.

A two-part proposal to reduce the noise involved removal of a 200x800-foot swath of Australian pines along the gulf beach to provide a safer flight pattern farther from the homes along with creation of a 14-foot-high dirt berm along the northern boundary of the helistop to be vegetated with sea grapes. But the effectiveness for noise abatement of either method was questionable.

And Patric on second sight backed off on removing the trees. "It will create an unsightly mess and is not environmentally sound," he said.

Clary and Bob Thompson, two of the original complainants about the noise, both strongly opposed the tree removal. Clary pointed out that the stand of trees along the beach front protected their homes from high tides.

Thompson, however, urged the council to continue to pursue the possibility of an earthen berm. Recognizing that not much can be done to mitigate

what does not seem to be a serious noise nuisance, the council voted unanimously to drop the subject.

•Sanibel's HURRICANE RESISTANT CON-STRUCTION CODE HAS BEEN AMENDED to comply with the state's Coastal Zone Protection Act that becomes effective March 1.

The only major change required affects the use of stem wall construction.

On the recommendation of Building Official Will Hahn breakaway or frangible walls will be required on the lower floors of construction in all areas of the Island.

The state will now require on barrier islands breakaway walls below the first finished floor of construction 5,000 feet landward of the Coastal Construction Control Line.

The new state limitation will take in most of Sanibel except for a narrow strip along the bay that includes Gumbo Limbo and a part of the Dunes subdivisions.

Since so few properties will be affected the City Council opted to give everyone equal treatment and require breakaway walls in new construction Islandwide.

Breakaway walls are defined as those that are independent of supporting structural members, Hahn

Though the use of breakaway walls will not affect the appearance of a house, it will increase construction costs, Hahn admitted.

The new state law also requires structures to be designed to withstand 140-mph winds.

Sanibel's Hurricane Resistant Code requires a design to withstand 130-mph winds.

Last Tuesday the council approved by a 5-0 vote the ordinance amending the city's Hurricane Resistant Construction Code.

system be thwarted by an opponent. The main thrust of the Star Wars system is to "intercept" missiles in the "boost phase," he said. This is the initial launching phase, when multiple warheads are still together in larger ICBM-type missiles.

At this time the large missiles are "hot" as they shoot out through the earth's atmosphere. Sensors can therefore quickly seek out the large missiles and send laser beams on their

But, Bowman said, "It would take 50-2,000 years just to get the fuel up there for a chemical laser station." He later added that a Soviet countermeasure could be to use midgetmentype missiles that never leave the earth's atmosphere. A chemical laser station could shoot these down; a landto-relay mirror system could not. But you would have to have a

chemical laser station for each missile because the missiles would only be in the air between 40-60 seconds, he added. "And if that's the case, then the cost of Star Wars jumps from \$1-2 trillion to over \$200 trillion."

So discussion now centers on the land-to-relay mirror system, which involves shooting lasers from the earth so they reflect off mirrors in space and eventually hit the nuclear missile.

Such a system must take into consideration the atmosphere's distortion, among other things. And while that is complicated, it could be done. But it would have to be absolutely perfect, without any real testing until the moment of possible destruction, Bowman said.

"But this is only the 'fist' — the kill mechanism," Bowman said. "The whole program is a complex organism with eyes, ears, brains, a spinal cord – and each has incredible complications and vulnerabilities."

The "brain" of the system is the in-

credibly complex battle management computer, which must quickly choose a battle plan for each missile in the air. Then it has to pick a laser that has no cloud cover, and then select a series of mirrors out in space. Then it has to communicate this plan. The "brain" would need 10,000,000 lines of code in its software to handle this kind of detail Bowman said.


"All this calculation has to be done with incredible accuracy and within 1,000th of a second of firing," he said. "And the Soviets could destroy it at any time.

"If the opposition wants to destroy the system, it doesn't have to destroy all its parts," Bowman added. "All it has to do is destroy one critical part of its body. Do that, and all you have a couple of trillions of dollars worth of junk.'

Bowman also called the system of "Marginot Line in the sky," adding the Soviets could easily come up with counter-measures that would make the system useless.

Or they could carry out their nuclear attack with submarines and cruise missiles — both of which do not leave the earth's atmosphere. If nuclear weapons do not have to leave the atmosphere, they arrive at their destination quickly and are hazardous to shoot down. The detonation of nuclear





warheads in space could cause harmful radiation; should those warheads be exploded in the earth's atmosphere the radiation would be catastrophic, Bowman said. "But if this is such a dumb idea, why

aren't the Soviets laughing?" he asked. Bowman explained that many informed people know the main advantage of the system is that it aids "first strike" capabilities. The Star Wars system would make it easier for an aggressor to move ahead with a first strike. After the aggressor strikes, they expect a retalitory strike. The Star Wars system could protect the aggressor nation from the missiles that escaped the first strike. Therefore, it is unlikely the Soviets

would allow the program to reach completion. Moving forward with Star Wars ensures that there will be nuclear war, Bowman feels.


Bowman added that he feels President Ronald Reagan has been shielded from the realities of the Star Wars system. He noted that the military's joint chiefs of staff have been overruled about the system. Instead, the entire project has now been closed to the armed forces and is run by civilian bureaucrats under Defense Secretary

Caspar Weinberger.


And Bowman warned that in the nuclear age, "There is no longer such a thing as national security, only common security. It's no longer possible to guarantee the security of the United States without guaranteeing the security of the Soviets. Our survival is in their hands, like theirs is in ours. This is not a game where one side wins, the other loses."

"Together we must succeed, or together we must perish," he concluded. "Let us choose life."



been used by man and perhaps has caused serious illness for a long time. Among the uses of asbestos are for insulation, fireproof clothing and other safety apparel, firewalls, roofing, flooring, outside walls, watermains, electric heat element supports (have vou checked your hair dryer lately?), automobile brake linings, theater curtains and a host of other things - most of which result in the release of microscopic asbestos fibers into the air, especially during the manufacturing process but also during the subsequent use of the finished products.

So the people at Weston, Wis., were concerned when they were confronted with the problem of the eroded interior of the six-inch A-C pipe. They sought ways to correct the situation. They isolated three test areas in which to undertake experimentation without subjecting the whole distribution system to the possible contamination by alien substances employed in the research.

They attempted three different methods to eliminate fibers in the water.

1. First they introduced zinc chloride into the system on the theory that it would form a protective metallic precipitate layer of zinc compounds on the interior pipe surface. This did not work: the protective layer did not materialize.

2. Then they flushed the watermain with water. This did not achieve the desired result either; it simply increased the concentration of the waterborne fibers as they were forcibly washed off the interior surface of the pipes by the rushing water.

3. Next they applied, after suitable

preparation, a cement mortar lining to the pipeline as it lay underground. Called in situ cement mortar lining, this was pumped through the system and adhered to the inner surface of the pipe.

Of the three methods tried, the third gave the most promising results for the long-term control of the release of asbestos fibers into the drinking water.


The application of the mortar lining was rather complicated and involved different kinds of treatment for the interior surface of the A-C watermain. Parallel small PVC plastic pipe was installed next to the test lines so water could be recirculated through that line and sampled at various points along its length. This closed test system prevented any escape into the main distribution system and thus protected water users from any hazards that could be enhanced or caused by the experimental work itself.

In preparation for the lining of the A-C pipe, the interiors of the pipes were first cleaned and scraped by pulling through, by a cable, a rubber disc followed by a metal scraper.

Each of the three test sections was treated. Sampling was accomplished at various places along the lines. When the test sections were flushed, trucked in well water was used because it was free of any asbestos fibers and thus could not cloud the test results.

The conclusion after all these tests was that lining A-C pipe with cement mortar was feasible and could substantially reduce or even eliminate asbestos contamination of drinking water that passes through A-C pipes.


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

My learning of this relatively new study reawakened my interest in asbestos pipe. Accordingly, I sent the following letter to Bob Hollander, manager of the Island Water Association on Sanibel-Captiva.

"Dear Mr. Hollander:

After a number of years neglecting the subject, I now return to the subject of

asbestos watermains. Some years ago, asbestos fibers were found in IWA samples. The subject was put to rest with the assertion that internal scale protected the passing product.

Asbestos was used here on Sanibel because, I was told by then-CEO of the company, it was "cheap" (see footnote).

I now have word from the EPA that asbestos pipe is indeed a problem. I am preparing an article on the subject. To that end, I seek your cooperation as follows:

1. Can you supply me with data (map) showing asbestos currently in use?

2. Can I have specimens (fragments) of all asbestos pipe that might have been removed from the ground after, say, leak repair, replacement or whatever? Can I be present the next time old pipe is dug up? 3. Can I have copies of any

reports or analyses that IWA

made when searching for asbestos fibers? 4. Anything else you feel

might be of use in my efforts. Many thanks. George Campbell''

The fact that we have become interested in asbestos again at this particular time was certainly as fortuitous as it was accidental because the subject suddenly once again achieved national media coverage.


The idea of waterborne asbestos not being of as much concern as airborne asbestos fibers was put to rest by a New York State study recently cited in the national press. It concluded that waterborne asbestos might indeed present a very real health risk.

A key finding in the study was the very high level of airborne asbestos fibers released from the water when people take showers. These microscopic fibers actually emerge from the sprayed water and become airborne and thus a threat.

Electric humidifiers also release asbestos fibers from water in much the same way. "Aerosolization" is the contrived word used to describe this process.

Another place that has had waterborne asbestos of some magnitude in Woodstock, N.Y., heretofore famous for a social phenomenon but now gaining prominence as a town where waterborne asbestos is a pretty dicey problem.

Late last year Woodstock residents observed long, fuzzy wads of bluish fibers stuck in water faucets. plugging drains and protruding from shower heads. This fuzz was asbestos that was transported to houses in Woodstock by A-C watermains whose interior walls had eroded or broken down.

Weston and Woodstock probably are not unique: they have simply been identified as problem areas. There are more than 200,000 miles of A-C pipe in place throughout the United States, and most of it is in use. It is probable that many other Woodstocks are yet to be identified.

A third widely-publicized occurrence seemed further to endorse our reopening of this subject in connection with the Island drinking water supply: On Jan. 23, 1986, the EPA proposed a ban that would in 10 or 15 years eliminate all use of asbestos in the United States. Five current uses of asbestos would be banned as soon as the rules comes into force. All other uses would be permitted for 10 to 15 years.


- The five immediate uses are: 1. Asbestos roofing materials
- 2. Asbestos floor undermatting
- 3. Vinyl asbestos floor tiles
- 4. Asbestos-cement pipe and fittings

5. Asbestos clothing The new rule will not mandate the halting of the use of already existing asbestos materials (e.g., floors, roofs or pipes that are now in place could remain). However, EPA Adminstrator Lou Thomas said, "This proposal starts us down the path that eventually will rid asbestos from our environment." And he added, "There can be no debate about the health risks of asbestos." Pretty strong stuff.

Next week I will discuss our own exposure to asbestos and will attempt to arrive at some reasonable conclusions regarding the two dozen miles of asbestos pipe on Sanibel and Captiva.

Footnote: Even though the then chief executive of the water company told me the reason for using A-C pipe for our watermains was because it was 'cheap," I have since learned that the choice might well have been more difficult with little relevance to initial monetary costs. Apparently when A-C pipes were being used the choice was between A-C and iron (PVC had not come into common usage). A-C even in those days cost more per unit than iron. But because of deterioration of iron in our climate, the more costly A-C pipe might well have been less costly on a long-term basis, given its longer life in the ground compared to that of iron.

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the Island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the Island he spent 40 years establishing and servicing pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and international coordinator for the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Naturalist-Illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of


the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and as chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature preserve.

While waiting for the booths to open at 8 a.m. the early arrivals feasted on coffee and doughnuts.



Parker said, adding \$4,000 was grossed from the sale of clothing alone.





Conservation Foundation is proud to host exhibit of prints by the father of Sanibel's national wildlife refuge

ere Jay N. "Ding" Darling to drive along Sanibel-Captiva Road today, he might feel a tug of despair. He once said about Captiva, "I hope no one else ever finds it — least of all the trailer multitude. To invade this sanctuary of nature with a trailer colony would be as out of place as taking a hurdygurdy to a prayer meeting."

But chances are the ardent conservationalist would feel a ray of hope driving by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and the wildlife refuge that bears his name. The "duck's best friend" would be glad to know birds and other wildlife are safe from hunters on Sanibel and Captiva.

It seems fitting that a collection of his artwork should find a temporary home at the SCCF — an appropriate juxtaposition of conservationism and art, two things for which Darling was so well known.

Titled "The Prints of J.N. Darling," the exhibition that runs March 1-31 will feature the Pulitzer Prizewinning artist's wildlife etchings, photo-etchings, aquatints, drypoints and drawings.


The exhibit is organized and sponsored by the Brunnier Gallery and Museum, Iowa State University, and supported in part by a grant from the Iowa Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. Sanibel resident Bob Hanger,

largely responsible for handling the exhibit, stresses that the works in the show are those Darling "never had any intention of selling."

"He did these strictly for his own amusement," Hanger says, stressing that only the artist's wildlife etchings and none of his cartoons are represented in the show. 59 pieces came from the museum and two are on loan from a Sanibel couple.

Hanger explains how the show came about. "People in Ames, Iowa, where the gallery is, asked if we had an interest in displaying the collec-

Darling (whose nickname "Ding" was the contraction of his name) made his winter home on Captiva.

Built in 1942, his infamous "Fish House," a piling structure over the water in the bay, stands today and, as in Darling's day, is accessed only by a drawbridge-equipped dock. In 1934 President Franklin Roosevelt appointed Darling to head the Bureau of Biological Survey, the predecessor to the U.S. Fish and

Wildlife Service. Darling also designed the first duck stamp and later was elected the first president of the National Wildlife Federation. He exercised his conservationist views both through his capacities in these organizations as well as through his editorial cartoons that appeared in the Des Moines Register and Leader and other newspapers.

It was largely through his efforts that the Islands' wildlife refuge became a reality by a special act of the Florida Legislature in 1939.

Darling was awarded the Audubon Medal for his conservation efforts. He left behind more than 15,000 cartoons (only 200 of which deal with wildlife), and more than 84 wildlife

etchings. Hanger feels events such as the upcoming exhibit can only help improve relations between local conser vation groups, specifically the SCCF and the wildlife refuge. "I think this is in part a conscious effort to stir up a little more (cooperation). Two organizations could be scrubbing each other's backs and in turn multiplying each other's efforts," he says.







You have plenty of time to make a child happy this Easter by knitting him or her this "bunny sweater." The pullover displays three bunnies with their faces Row 1 - Cast on two stitches, k 42. on the front of the yoke and their cottontails knitted on Row 2 - Cast on two stitches, k 4, p 36, k 4. the back of the sweater. It takes only six hours to Row 3 - k7, p 8, k 3, p 8, k 3, p 8, k 7. make and requires one skein (good quality) of Row 4 - k 4, p 4, k 6, p 5, k 6, p 5, k 6, p 4, k 4. 100-gram worsted weight yarn.

justments in the length. The guage is 3½ stitches to an inch. If you want a radical size change, use different needle and yarn requirements. Other materials needed are six buttons (1/2-inch),



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



Assume a singleton when partner leads a short suit against a contract

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

Your partner leads a short suit against a suit contract, and you must decide whether he has led a singleton or the top card of a doubleton. How do you tackle the problem?

Assume that partner has led a singleton. See what effect that has on declarer's hand. Would his bidding be different? If necessary, follow the same procedure on the assumption that partner started with a doubleton. In today's hand East assumed that

West had led a singleton. If so, South

had started with four hearts to the king.

But then South's second bid would have

been two hearts rather than two notrump. Since South didn't bid two hearts, he



couldn't have started with four hearts and West couldn't have started with a singleton.

East therefore played the encouraging six of hearts at the first trick instead of taking the ace. West won an early trump trick with the king, led his remaining heart to the ace and ruffed the third round of hearts. West later took the setting trick with a club.


one diamond and he then bids on spade. The opponents pass. What do you say?

ANSWER

Bid 3NT, promising balanced distribtuion, at least one stopper in the unbid suit and about 12 to 16 high-card points. With more than 16 points you would bid the fourth suit and make a slam suggestion at your next turn. WIth only 11 points you would bid only 2NT (invitational but not forcing).







For big game fish, head to east coast offshore waters

I imagine that every fishing guide around the Islands has been asked at one time or another how the sailfish or marlin are biting.

Southeast Florida has a great reputation for these billfish, but it is most rare that any such game fish are caught in our waters.

I recall several years ago that an angler on a head boat out of Fort Myers Beach landed a small sailfish. But we generally just don't have that type of fishing around our Island waters.

The Florida Keys still have a good supply of these fish that are called "billfish" because of the long bills they use to kill bait fish.

And to our north, in the Florida Panhandle, these big fish are caught as easily as they are in the Keys and off Miami.


So what's the difference between Southwest

Florida and those other parts of the state? For one thing, those big game fish are deepwater roamers. Off the southeastern shores, the Gulfstream cuts close to shore. Anglers fishing out

of West Palm Beach can catch sailfish hardly more than a mile off the beach. The elegant old Breakers Hotel is a reference point for many sailfish anglers. It's the same in the Keys, where the famous

Gulfstream comes close enough to the islands that anglers can reach it in just a few minutes.

Incidentally, it's not the depths of this northmoving river of saltwater that produce the most



fish. You find most fish along the edge, where the deep blue water touches the shallow reefs just at the edge of the drop-off.

When I was a college student in Miami I went out with a couple of friends to troll off Key Largo. We found that precious edge of the stream with little trouble. We zig-zagged the boat over the green reefs to the deep blue of the drop in the stream and back again. We caught barracuda three and four feet long. We tried a half mile inside the line and caught nothing but small snapper. Out in the stream itself we couldn't get a bite.

Offshore anglers up in north Florida have a long run to reach that deep water. Twenty or 30 miles is not unusual, but the big fish are out there. Our gently sloping gulf floor waters off Sanibel

and Captiva make for great shelling — but not that great offshore fishing. We don't have any natural reef systems to attract fish. A few manmade reefs do produce well, however.

A few years ago a group of interested local anglers, lead by Mike Yakubik of Fort Myers Beach. organized materials and boats to start reefs. The best producing is the MAY reef off Fort Myers Beach. It produces everything from big tarpon to sea trout and sharks.

Unfortunately, an artificial reef off Redfish Pass was covered with shifting sand not long after it was put in place. I went over it with my recorder not long ago and could hardly find a trace of the rubble dropped there.

There has been very little action in building more reefs. I think that is unfortunate because with so many more anglers coming to the area, we need new resources to attract fish.

The Lee County Marine Advisory Board has nearly \$200,000 from boating improvement fees that could be used to build reefs.

But the board needs to know whether there is any interest in the community for more of these reefs. I urge you to call Max Puckett, Lee County's Marine Advisory Cooperative Extension Service agent. 335-2202, to indicate your support for reefs that are very important to our fishing future.

Shore birds find as many shells as the best collectors

Who are the greatest shellers on the Islands? It's probably our shore birds, who find as many mollusks as the best of us.

I always tell people to do their shelling at a very low tide. That's because more of the beach is exposed and, therefore, so are more shells.

Shore birds are very attentive to tidal cycles, too. So if you are interested in both shells and birds, you should time your shelling with the lower tides. One of my favorite shore birds has to be the

American oystercatcher. We don't see many of these shy water birds, but often one or two can be seen along the tiny sandbars off North Captiva and Cayo Costa islands. They are sometimes misktaken for skimmers, but the oystercatcher has two distinguishing marks: a long red bill and pink legs.

And oystercatchers stand taller than the skimmers. Both birds rest together during the day.

The oystercatcher lives up to its name. It works the shallow mud flats and shorelines looking for clumps of oysters. The oysters these birds seek are not the kind we find in local restaurants, but they are edible.

Most of the local oysters are smaller than the restaurant ones, but none is so small as to escape the sharp eye of the oystercatcher.

The bird wades among clumps of oysters and quickly inserts its sharp bill into a half-opened oyster. It then cuts the oyster's muscle and eats the tender meat.

I believe the most destructive sea bird we have

probably have seen these birds all over the coastal regions of the country. They are the ones who like to feed in city dumps when fishing is too tough.

The herring gull is sometimes twice as large as other gulls or terns on our beaches. They are the chief consumers of sea urchins that wash ashore during storms. When they do this they also do a very good service for shellers. When they flip over the urchin to get at the meat inside, they usually do not damage the "shell." That leaves a perfect addition for any shell collection.

The gulls sometimes break into the top of the urchin, however, and ruin the shell from the collector's viewpoint.

The herring gull opens sunray venus clams, picks out the meat of stranded whelks and conchs and in general tries to eat just about any mollusk stranded on the beach at low tide.

The tiny little coquinas that live in vast colonies right at the surf line of most of our beaches are a favorite food of many small shore birds. The various sandpipers search the beaches in flocks, dredging for coquinas.

These small shells attract dozens of birds, much to the delight of beach walkers this time of the year. After catching a half-opened coquina, the birds quickly remove the inside meat and drop the shell. Usually both sides of the shell remain attached, so shellers find perfect pairs of these colorful shells.

Many birds look for small sand crabs called mole when it comes to shells is the large herring gull. You crabs or sand fleas. They can be used for fishing bait, so man and bird are always looking for colonies of these crabs. I once watched a sandpiper pull out a particularly large sand flea that it could not swallow - but it would not let it go, either. Once dropped the flea made tracks for the water, but the bird would catch it and bring it back. This went on for several round-trips before the bird decided to look for a more cooperative meal.

Good shelling this week. Don't overlook our beautiful bird population as you search for shells along our beaches.
