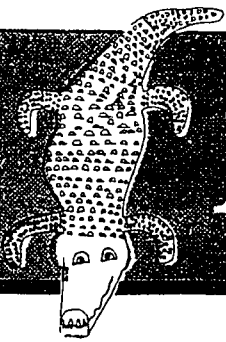

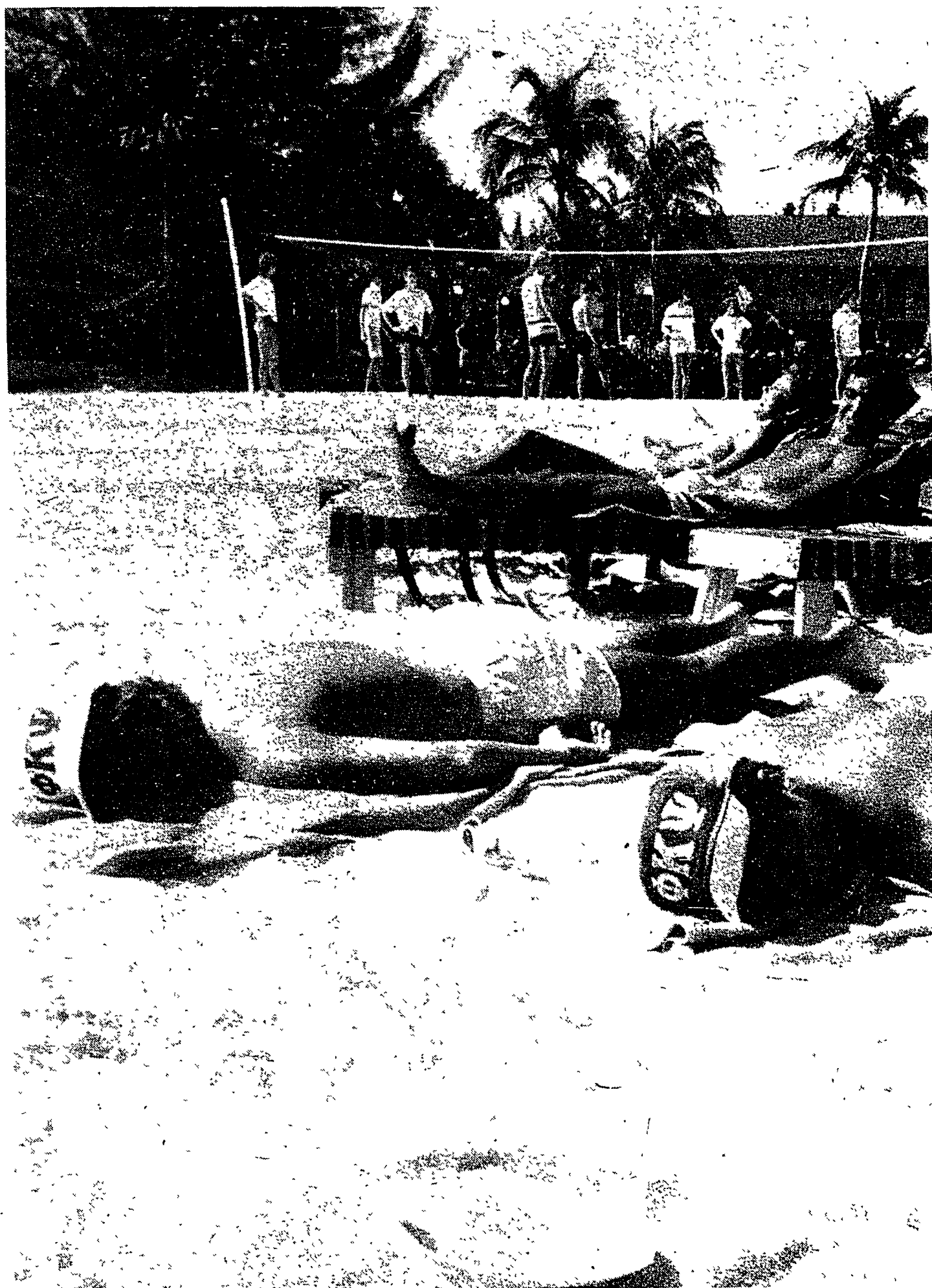
Sanibel woman dances in Fort Myers production

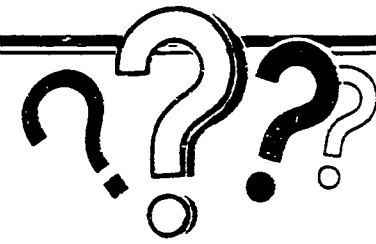
Shoaf and Yank were on the Island with about 15 of their classmates from Purdue University in Indiana.

Let's make a clean sweep of litter

The *Islander* staff will be there. How about you?
The place to be at 9 a.m. Saturday, April 12, is Sanibel Elementary School. The reason to be there is for The Great Island Pickup.
The *Islander*, the city of Sanibel, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and countless residents and visitors

have had it with litter. And April 12 is the day to make a "clean sweep" of as much of the Island as we can.
It's going to be some work. It's going to be some fun. And it's just got to be done.
This year we're adding some fun to the annual clean-up (which in past years has been under the auspices of the nationwide "Project SOAR," which Sanibel and Captiva boys scouts so ably promoted).
All participants in The Great Island Pickup will try to guess how many pounds of litter the group will accumulate during the pick-up. Whoever guesses closest to the total will win a free dinner for two at one of the Island's finest restaurants.
We'll top off the morning pickup with a picnic lunch at the elementary school. By most reports, Sanibel and Captiva are winning a few battles in the war against litter. The city has strategically placed many trash cans around the Islands, and close to 100 people have joined The *Islander's* anti-trash campaign over the past two months.
Yet almost half the people who come into our office say litter on the Island is worse than in years past. Others say it seems to go in cycles. Beach pickers-uppers say the tides bring in an enormous amount of litter dropped off the sides of boats.
But Bonnie Lohnes pretty much put a finger on the trend when she and friend Ruby Lewis showed up at our office last week with several bulging bags of litter.
"The traffic is much worse, and the litter is much worse. There are more people, so it's inevitable there's going to be more litter," Lohnes said.
Until we raise more peoples' consciousness about littering — and until we get a Florida Bottle Bill — we think this will continue to be the case.
And The Great Island Pickup is one important way we all can help win the litter battle. So we challenge our readers, Island service clubs and businesses to all join in and make this year's effort a "clean sweep."

Conservation Foundation urges Islanders to boost bottle bill

The following open letter to the public was given to The *Islander* for publication.
To Island citizens:
Tell your legislators that you want action now on Florida's proposed "Beverage Container Re-Use and Recycling Act" — the Bottle Bill. Tell them you want the simple, unadorned Bottle Bill that requires a minimum 5-cent deposit on all non-refillable glass, plastic, aluminum and other metal beverage containers; provides for the easy return of the consumer's deposit money; and would fairly compensate the retailer for expenses incurred in handling empty bottles and cans.
Amendments to this bill or substitute proposals can only delay its enactment and must not be permitted to thwart the will of Florida's voters.
Repeated opinion polls show that more than 66 percent of Floridians want the simple Bottle Bill that would:
• Reduce unsightly litter on roadsides, parks, beaches and recreation areas.
• Eliminate dangerous broken bottles and cans that

injure people and animals.
• Reduce solid waste disposal costs.
• Conserve energy and natural resources.
• Reduce air pollution
• Create jobs.
Nine states — Oregon, Massachusetts, Delaware, Connecticut, Iowa, Michigan, Maine, Vermont and New York — already have bottle bills that enjoy overwhelming public support. No state has repealed the law.
Opponents of the bill — brewers, bottlers and certain large grocery chains — are spending millions of dollars and using the same tactics in Florida as they have employed nationwide to defeat the measure. Failing to win public support, they have lobbied successfully to keep the bill submerged in a legislative committee. This must not happen again.
Write to your legislators. Write to the editor of your favorite newspaper. Demand action. Now! Only we can make it happen.

What's taking so long for CEPD to discuss apportionment plan?

To the Editor
The *Islander*
The CEPD has had Tetra-Tech's run five (economic apportionment plan) in its possession for over 100 days now and has, to date, refused to discuss it at a public meeting. Why?
Scott Martell reported (The *Islander*, Jan. 21, 1986) that (CEPD Chairman Peg) Hofschneider said the board would discuss this computer run after the new commissioners "catch up" on the issues. Nov. 5 was more than four months ago. Caught up yet, guys?
Paul Luthringer reported (The *Islander Reporter*, Feb. 6, 1986) that the CEPD voted Monday to establish a committee to develop a financial plan to fund beach and shore preservation projects. "If you don't have a group working on a financial apportionment plan soon, in two months we won't be any closer to a solution than we are now," insisted Commissioner Bob Martin, who offered the motion at the Feb. 3, 1986 meeting.
"By April," Hofschneider said, "I hope to be well into the planning stages (of nourishment)."
"The divisiveness will remain on Captiva," Martin said, "until the board can come up with an assessment plan that people can live by."
How about looking at run five, Bob? The Committee of Concerned Captivans presented it to the people of Captiva more than six weeks ago and the silence was deafening! Maybe your constituency was shocked to

find its assessments so low! Discuss it in public!
Scott Martell reported (The *Islander*, Feb. 4, 1986) that the CEPD voted 3-1 (Hans Wilson in opposition) to form a committee and give it 60 days to come up with an apportionment plan for funding any kind of beach and shore project. Martell said Hofschneider argued that she "saw only a few problems with the Tetra-Tech plan." "And if the committee could solve those problems, I can't see why we don't proceed (with the referendum)," she said. That was more than 30 days ago, Peg. Will your committee have an interim report for the March 11, 1986 CEPD meeting? Have you appointed a committee yet, or have our local newsmen misquoted you? Have you changed your (and the CEPD's) mind, again?
The CCC will be happy to help the CEPD come to grips with this dilemma. We do, however, feel that we could be of considerably more service to the CEPD and all of Captiva if the CEPD would discuss run five at its next meeting so we and all the rest of Captiva could be aware of its deficiencies. If, at this late date, the CCC will cooperate fully with this effort.
The CEPD has inferred, by its refusal to put run five on the table for discussion (ignoring its existence, if I properly interpret the quotes above), that there are serious problems with it. WHERE'S THE BEEF?

Campbell's asbestos articles were a good service to Islanders

I read with interest George Campbell's report on asbestos-cement pipes in your Feb. 11 and March 4 issues. I did not feel, however, that it was "inflammatory journalism." I thought it was a responsible cogitation on asbestos ill effects on human beings if its possible presence in drinking water was overlooked.
Also it was heart-warming to learn that IWA was and is informed of the problem and that six months of tests will be conducted diligently in order to establish the safety of the water we drink. After all, we consumers like to know what ingredients are mixed with the water we drink, with the air we breathe and with the food we ingest.
Mr. Campbell does us a good service. He is an alert citizen and a responsible one. He is a scientist who

This kind of journalism is healthy because it permits communication and consideration of the problem and its solutions. Without open confidence and communications, even controversy and debate, we would become "foreigners" to each other. By the way, this is the current play ("The Foreigner") at the Pirate Playhouse, where one can pick up, along with hearty laughs, one or two pertinent lessons on these matters.

Nine college students were ordered to leave a building at Sundial resort shortly after 2:30 a.m. Saturday, March 8. None of the students was registered at the resort.

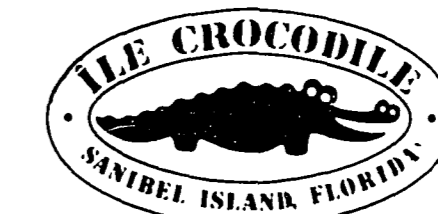

CEPD hears about possible renourishment funding sources

Captiva's perpendicular stabilizer controversy has put many erosion issues on the back burner for the Captiva Erosion Prevention District.

But with the governor and Cabinet apparently allowing the experimental "sandbag" project to remain in place unless monitoring surveys show they are adversely affecting adjacent lands, the CEPD commissioners turned up the burners on several projects during their monthly meeting last week.

The issues included the economic apportionment committee, the socio-

economic survey, and a report from Lee County Commissioner Porter Goss on potential sources for funding beach erosion prevention methods.

Goss first stressed that he wished to maintain good communications with the new CEPD board. And he added the county would help pay for the origin-and-destination survey recently completed on Captiva and the Sanibel Causeway. But Goss' main theme was to present potential funding sources to the CEPD.

He brought up the potential for receiving money from the West Coast Intercoastal Navigational District, of which Goss is a board member. This

funding source had been brought up by former beach renourishment project manager Dick Stevens several times.

"The district is currently expanding its enabling legislation ...it's very broad," Goss said. "I think beach renourishment could be a legitimate expenditure. And in my view, Lee County is owed money."

"There is currently \$2½ million in the district, a good chunk which is not earmarked for any particular project. I'm not saying you could get \$1-1½ million, but I think you could get some substantial funding for a project which could be called 'navigational,'" he told the commissioners.

In addition, Goss said it was possible that legislation for the tourist bed tax could redirect money to projects such as beach renourishment. The tax is currently used solely to promote off-season tourism.

"Sanibel and Captiva are a good product, but if they get advertised too much, they could be smothered," Goss said. "Instead, the (tourist tax) money should be used to fix up the facilities that tourists use (such as a beach). I believe this would be an excellent source for beach renourishment. And I believe you'd find others, say on Fort

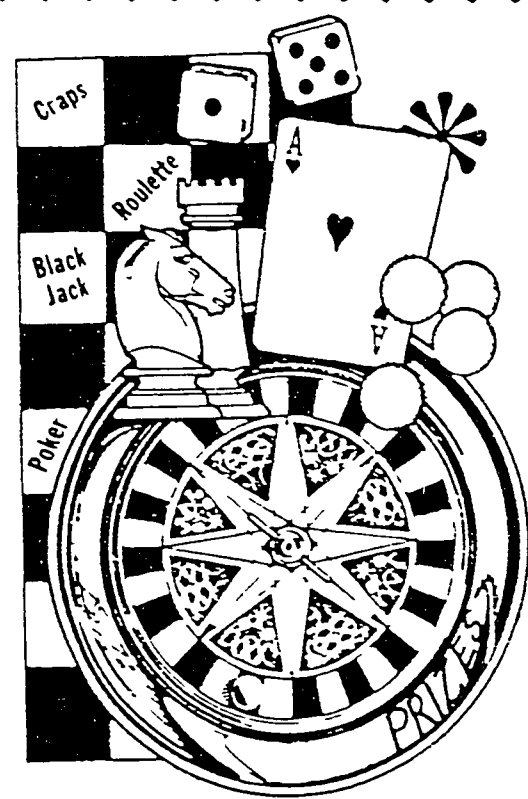

Myers Beach, who agree." But while "outside" sources are often alluring, Goss stressed that Captiva should look to its own mechanisms for raising money — ad valorem taxes and Municipal Service Benefit Unit (MSBU) petitions. He said he felt Captiva would be forced to use ad valorem revenue and income from self-imposed benefit taxes such as the MSBU when considering the potential of revenue from other sources (federal, state and county government).

"The game is up. We've got a bill of back debt to pay, much infrastructure to pay for," Goss said, adding that in order for the CEPD to get "outside" funding, Captiva would have to show "good faith money from out here." But for a county to pass an MSBU request to renourishment, Captivans would have to show more unity than in the past, Goss said. The county voted down a previous MSBU request in 1984 when 64 percent supported that apportionment plan.

"The one thing that causes the county to vote an MSBU down is when there's a large body of unhappiness out there," Goss said. "Say there are 30-35 percent of the people against an MSBU, then the board does not generally go along with it. The commissioners have done that in the past to Captiva, and that (principle) has not changed."

Goss also queried the board about

what the county's assessment would be for a beach renourishment project. He recommended that Captiva consider "horsetrading" with the county in order to take the sting out of future assessments. One chip the CEPD could barter with was Captiva's 2 percent share of the Causeway surplus, he said. That revenue could possibly help pay the county's share.

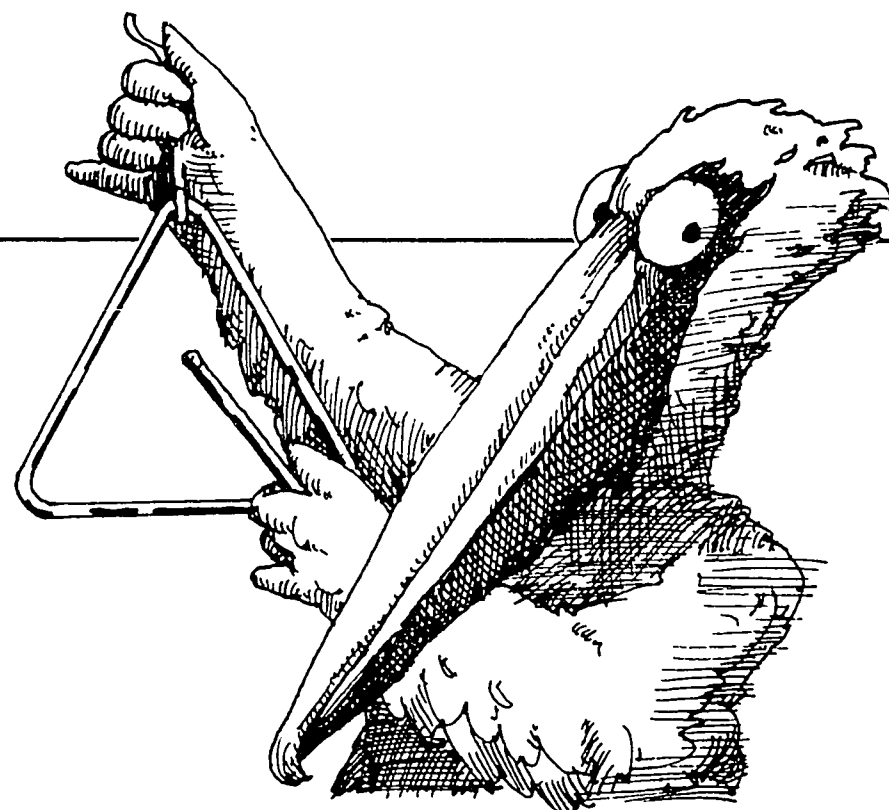
He added that if the county proceeded to refinance the Causeway, then the new finance structure might provide additional funding opportunities for Captiva.

In other CEPD business last week: • The board expressed regret that nothing has been done to date regarding a committee to study economic apportionments. At last month's meeting the commissioners gave such a committee top priority with 60 days to come up with an apportionment plan.

Vice chairman Bob Martin, running the meeting for an ill Chairman Peg Hofschneider, said the perpendicular stabilizer controversy, plus the difficulty in getting a balanced committee together, had held up formation of this committee.

Commissioner Orville Schaeffer stressed that the board needed a professional cost apportionment study. He said he had approached three companies with that in mind.

Discussion then focused on whether or not the board should "write off" the Tetra-Tech computerized apportionment plan and start fresh. The Tetra-Tech plan had cost Captivans \$54,614 as of Oct. 1, 1986. The fifth computer run, which has yet to be formally discussed at a CEPD meeting, has cost approximately an additional \$10,000.

The pro-renourishment Concerned Citizens of Captiva was again heavily represented at the board meeting. They stressed that they wanted to know the specific problems associated with the Tetra-Tech plan so they could work on solutions.

Martin stressed that all discussion on apportionment should wait until a special apportionment committee meeting. He added that talk about other experts or other plans would be fruitless at this time, because the CEPD has not yet developed the community involvement that he sees as being so necessary for developing such a plan.

"That lack of community involvement might have been the problem with this past (Tetra-Tech) plan," Martin added.

The board then passed a motion 3-1 to hold a special apportionment meeting at 6 p.m. next Tuesday, March 25, at the Captiva Civic Association.

Schaeffer was the dissenting voice, saying he likely would not have responses to his queries to other experts by that date. He added that he hated to set a meeting time and date just because the public (certain members of the CCC) had requested it.

City Council will consider five development code amendments

All five have been recommended for approval by the Planning Commission

The City Council will consider on first reading today five amendments to the new Land Development Code. The Planning Commission last Tuesday discussed the proposed ordinances and voted to recommend council approval of all five.

Most significant of the five was a proposal to delete for certain resort housing units the requirement for 7,500 square feet of recreational open space in order to rent the units for periods of less than 28 days. This change will apply only to resort housing units in areas where resort housing is permitted under the new LDC. If adopted it will permit any dwelling unit inside the resort housing zone in a complex without the required recreational open space but constructed or legally used for short-term rentals prior to April 10, 1979, to continue the practice.

The ordinance will have no effect on dwelling units outside the resort housing zone, Planning Director Bruce Rogers pointed out to the commissioners last week.

For example, if the ordinance is adopted, any of the dwelling units at Loggerhead Cay or Pointe Santo could be used for resort housing (rented for short terms) regardless of the units' prior use.

At Sanibel Arms or Sanibel Moorings any dwelling unit in buildings on the gulf side of East Gulf Drive could be rented for periods of less than 28 days. However, units on the north side of East Gulf Drive are outside the resort housing zone and will have to comply with the 28-day rental restriction.

Will Plateau, active in Condominium Associations of Sanibel, Inc., viewed this provision as unfair. "The units are all part of the same complex. The owners belong to the same condominium association and should be treated alike," he said.

Currently owners of units in resort housing without

the open space requirement must prove their units were rented for short-term periods before April 1979 in order to continue renting for less than 28 days.

"Only honest people, who refuse to lie about the prior use of their units, are penalized by this requirement," City Attorney David La Croix pointed out. The amendment will provide more equitable treatment by folding in all units in the complex, La Croix said.

The commissioners turned thumbs down on Rogers' suggestion to do away with the 7,500 square feet of open space requirement altogether.

Nor were they willing to recommend rezoning areas outside the resort housing zone that have had a history of that use.

To make resort housing a permitted use on the east side of Donax Street, the north side of East Gulf Drive, Seagrape and Buttonwood lanes on the east end of the Island, Sanibel Shores and Trade Winds subdivisions, and the Blind Pass area, is the council's purview.

Another amendment will exempt accessory commercial use of resort housing from the 300-square-foot minimum size required by the LDC for "enclosed commercial floor area."

Currently commercial retail space in resort complexes can not exceed 200 square feet.

A third amendment will clarify existing language in the LDC for the approval of subdivisions.

Another amendment addresses the problem of off-street parking requirements for commercial uses. It will provide that when a structure is divided into condominium units, the uses for the individual units will be controlled by the number of parking spaces allotted to the units.

The fifth proposed amendment addresses a specific setback problem that is fairly common in dealing with boat docks and davits, Rogers stressed.

When side property lines meet the water line of a canal at an angle less than 90 degrees, the lines will be extended into the water and the dock or davit must be set back 10 feet from these imaginary lines.

This amended definition will prevent construction of a boat dock so that it meets the 10-foot setback from a property line but encroaches into the adjoining property owner's space.

The Planning Department has recommended approval of all five amendments.

•The Planning Commission agreed that Dr. G.L. O'Neal was entitled to have a BOAT DOCK ON A CANAL at his home IN SANIBEL ESTATES.

But with only 26 feet of frontage on the water, the 20-foot long dock O'Neal constructed without city permits was not acceptable because it encroaches into the required 10-foot setbacks from the side property lines.

Last Tuesday the commissioners approved a variance to permit a 12x5-foot dock with a minimum setback of seven feet from the side property lines. The dock cannot extend more than 10 feet into the canal. And removal of the mangroves from the canal bank must be approved by the Vegetation Committee.

•Last Tuesday the Planning Department was still not sure that DEVELOPER JOHN VAN HEEMST'S PLANS FOR A 14-UNIT MULTI-FAMILY COMPLEX ON WOOSTER LANE comply with all regulations of the Land Development Code.

Planning Director Bruce Rogers told the Planning Commission the staff had not yet reviewed Van Heemst's revised plans that had been submitted only the day before.

Van Heemst said he had addressed the three issues identified by the commissioners at the Feb. 25 meeting

and insisted that the amended application is in full compliance with the new code.

But the commissioners agreed they did not have the authority to approve a development permit without staff assurance that all was in order.

The commission voted 6-0 to continue the hearing to the March 25 meeting. Commissioner Penny Rogers was absent.

Van Heemst's complex includes four one-bedroom apartments pledged to the city's Below Market Rate Housing rental program. The other 10 units will have two bedrooms and will be sold as condominiums.

Developer Bob Horak has taken exception to the claim that Van Heemst's multi-family project is the first such project not on the gulf-front to be built with city permits. "Yacht Haven, my five-unit condominium development on the bay on Sextant Drive, is under construction and nearing completion," Horak told *The Islander* last week.

•Patty Taylor of Greenwich, Conn., owner of a Sandpiper West condominium, complained to the City Council March 4 that the NEW PEAKED TIN ROOFS AT SHALIMAR COTTAGES NEXT DOOR BLOCKED THE VIEW OF THE GULF for some of the Sandpiper units.

Taylor said that had she been notified of Shalimar's plans to replace the original flat roofs she would have attended the city's public hearings to object.

City Attorney David La Croix said property owners within 300 feet of the Shalimar complex should have been notified about the hearing for the variance to the Land Development Code required for the remodeling.

The condominium association at Sandpiper West

should have received the notice, he said.
But Taylor said apparently the owners of individual units were not informed.
La Croix said the practice has been to notify condominium associations when only the common area of a complex involved were within 300 feet of one another. But, he added, owners of individual units that were within the distance boundary should also be notified separately.
Councilman Mike Klein said he might have voted differently had he heard objections to the project. "It was sad that no one was here (for the hearing)," he said.
Taylor, who said she spent only a few weeks a year

on Sanibel, was also concerned about cars parking on the beach at Shalimar forward of the Coastal Construction Control Line.
In response to a question from another Sandpiper West owner, Attorney Sally Hanley of Chicago, La Croix said that insufficient or improper notice of variance hearings is grounds for challenge.
• There were 79 DWELLING UNITS AVAILABLE FOR ALLOCATION IN THE MARCH RATE OF GROWTH PERIOD, but fewer than half were applied for.
A total of 38 dwelling units allocated by the Planning Commission last Tuesday satisfied the demand from

both single-family and multi-family applicants.
Planner Jean Isley said she could not recall an allocation period since ROGO was instituted when there were so few applications. "I really don't know what it means," she added.
Only 25 of the 58 single-family reserve units that were available were taken. The 33 remaining allocations in that category will be carried over to the July period, Isley said.
The commissioners allocated the 12 dwelling units in the multi-family reserve among four current multi-family projects.

Commerce and conquest in the modern world

The Rise of the Trading State: Commerce and Conquest in the Modern World; by Richard Rosecrance; 268 pages; New York, Basic Books

The author postulates two basic systems for nations in international world politics: the territorial system or the trading system. Under the traditional territorial (military-political) system, more land meant more food and population means more power to get more and keep it. Acquisition was by war, which was cheap - essentially the cost of feeding and clothing mercenary soldiers; civilians were little affected, and there was no significant industry to be wrecked or disrupted. The small states of the time formed alliances to balance power and were frequently absorbed. Territorial policy sought complete national self-reliance independent of imports or foreign markets. No modern state ever achieved this goal though Napoleon and Hitler tried hard to do so.

For 150 years the United States was not concerned with either choice. It had huge undeveloped lands, resources and markets within its own borders. And it was safe across 3,000 miles of ocean.

Today a territorial policy presents huge costs of war and the prospect of inheriting a ruined economy and sullen population even if victorious. Nevertheless, if an aggressor thinks he will get an easy victory over a timid opponent, he will attack.

The development of the trading system had territorial roots: Venice and Amsterdam sought a monopoly of spices to be the only market city. Spain had a monopoly on gold and silver by reason of territorial conquest in Mexico and Peru. Portugal, outflanked Venice by sea routes to India, England broke up the Dutch sugar monopoly in the Caribbean with island occupations of its own.

Great impetus was given to the trading system when England adopted it in the mid-1800s. This was done to give access to food and raw materials and to enable long, economical and profitable production runs of the English manufacturing of textiles and machinery. In effect, England went into "trade" which was not an aristocratic vocation.

By contrast, territorial acquisitions and wars were the "sport of kings." Only in the 1890s did England revert to a territorial policy and they did so with some reluctance as France, Germany and Belgium began to carve up colonial Africa.

But the other nations of Europe continued the territorial policy, coupled in Russia, Germany and Austria with ultra-conservation imperial governments.

Here and elsewhere the author refers to the impact of social education on events and policy. The rise of Bolshevism in Russia frightened the middle classes and pushed them to the right. The economic consequences of Versailles burdened international trade to

Sanibel and Captiva can now be taken to the four corners of the earth - as long as that particular locale has a video cassette recorder.

What started for Jim Hermes as a simple 8-mm filming project with his son, Greg, has exploded into a stunning new video cassette edited and directed by "Long John" Biffar. The slick production presents both the mood of the Islands and much information for visitors.

The 20-minute color VCR tape serves up several photographic impressions that are hard to forget:

- One aerial scene follows a flock of birds as they fly over the J.N. "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge.
● An underwater shot shows a windsurfer cutting through the waves and right over the camera.
● And another underwater segment shows a group of huge manatees lumbering in a river.

The stunning visuals, which also include numerous sunsets, sailing and canoeing shots, as well as scenes from the Lions Arts and Crafts Fair and a Pirate Playhouse production, are accompanied by familiar music - often songs by Island songwriter Danny

death. The recourse for Germany was Fascism and for Russia, isolation. Each followed a "leader on horseback" with more or less voluntary popular support.

After World War II, it was very different. Only Russia and the United States could play the territorial game, which they did at the margin: Russia in Eastern Europe, the United States in the Middle

East.

Also, people everywhere were wholly opposed to war. In Russia, perhaps by control of news and frequent glorification of the "great patriotic war," support of a territorial policy could be maintained. But elsewhere, certainly in the United States, the Vietnam experience illustrates the massive lack of Western support for ter-

ritorial policy.

After World War II the emerging great dependence of industrial economies on each other became conspicuous. Japan, a shining example, had made its territorial move at Pearl Harbor and after defeat became dedicated to trade.

Third World countries recognized the urgent need to develop products for trade, being much too weak and

small to pursue territory. A major export from many Third World countries has been low-cost labor, from Mexico to the United States and from the Middle and Far East to OPEC countries.

Even so, the USSR and the United States remain committed to large military budgets as a credible

deterent to the territorial policy. These expenses divert huge sums from industrial and trade development and absorb capital that might otherwise be invested in the development of Third World industry.

As a consequence, world trade has not achieved its potential, and standards of living are lower than they might be otherwise.

Further, with respect to the Third World, there continues in some nations a deep concern for territory often deeply rooted in culture. Bitter fighting continues at great expense not only to the nations showing the flags but expense to patron nations as well. Examples are Iraq, Lebanon, and perhaps largest of all, the Israel-Arab World. These wars are about turf, not trade.

Related in type is the Russian invasion of Afghanistan, from which it cannot hope to gain economic benefits in proportion to costs. But it does underscore the USSR territorial anxiety as does the concept of the Iron Curtain and responses in Poland.

A country entering the world trading arena must give up some control over what happens internal-

ly as free competition for markets and capital operates. Many believe that the communist establishment in Russia could never accept such a threat to its control and that the Russian economy could not deliver products into world trade without a great reduction in its military production. The question is raised how



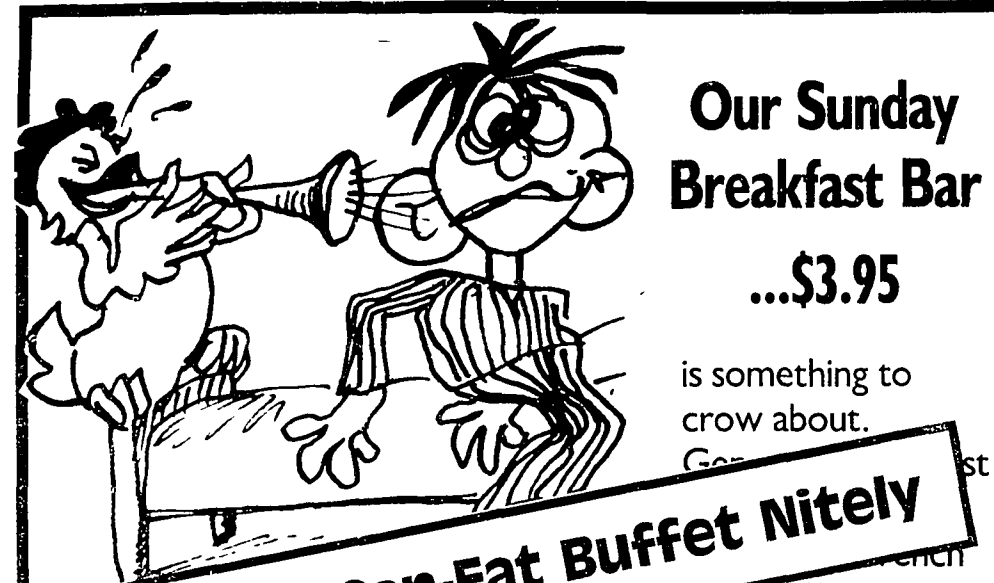

the USSR will maintain even its present standard of living as the population expands and energy reserves decline.

The United States does not have a dominant level of territorial anxiety and appears willing to develop a trade strategy even with the large military budget that has been necessary to balance the USSR's. The large U.S. trade deficit speaks to a limited success so far.

The fate of the Third World in the international trading community is not clear. Many small nations war on each other for social reasons; many have nothing of much value to export; many with valuable exports (oil) spend the proceeds on consumption or by subsidizing warring client nations; many are deeply in debt. One clear need is the better use of capital for economic development rather than consumption, the author believes.

The author concludes that a trade policy will ultimately be superior to a territorial policy. Even if nations try to control the flow of goods and people over their borders, they can-

not control the flow of money. Nations will increasingly negotiate matters involving both external and internal affairs (for example, agriculture in Western Europe).

The author implies some concern that President Ronald Reagan responds chiefly to the electorate's need for reassurance about government, economics and foreign policy in patriotic terms of territory, space and power, neglecting economic development.

The author's thesis includes the proposition that in free trade there are fewer guarantees of employment or purchasing power or interest rates. There is greater need for political leadership through frankness and full disclosure, and less reliance on unquestioning emotional acceptance.

Finally, it is suggested that just as the all-powerful monarchs of the past are now ceremonial figureheads — so like the scepter and crown — the "bomb" might become a symbol of power no

longer used or usable for any rational or efficient political end.

I now see that while the United States and the USSR have been having an arms race, a hallmark of territorial policy, much of the rest of the world has been learning and doing economic development and trade to the material benefit of their populations.

Some of the rest of the world, where social and cultural considerations dominate, has been consuming and wasting itself in what are the equivalent to tribal wars — some of which have been continuous since before recorded history and may well continue

beyond.

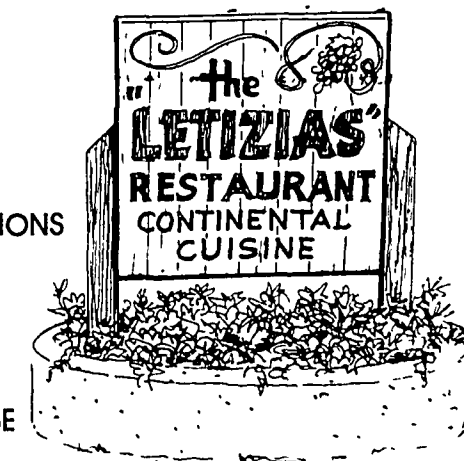

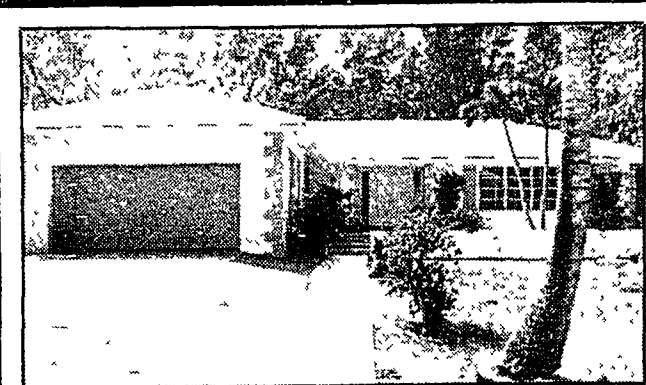

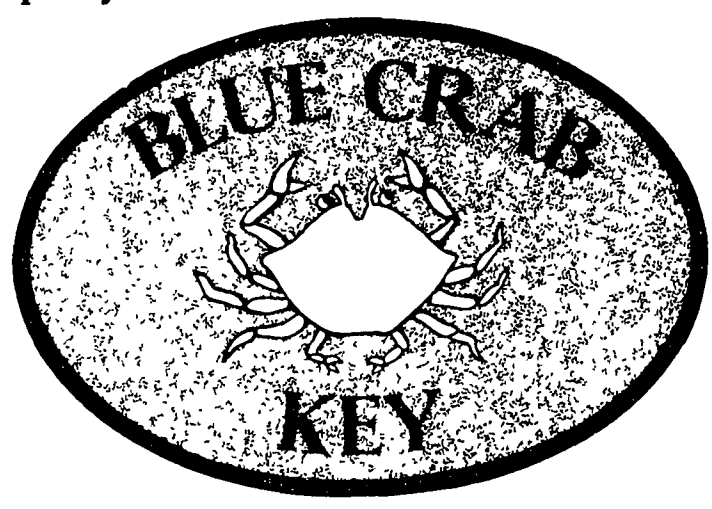

• Beaches

On Sanibel UNRESTRICTED PARKING WITH NO STICKER is permitted for everyone along the Causeway, at the Sanibel Lighthouse and Fishing Pier at the eastern tip of the island, at Gulfside City Park off Casa Ybel Road, on the east side of the Sanibel end of the Causeway, at the gulf end of Tarpon Bay Road and at the Trost property on Tarpon Bay Road.

OTI is a code with RESTRICTED PARKING STICKERS can find beach access at Balloy Road, Beach Road, Dixie Beach Boulevard, Nerita Street, Donax Street, Fulger Street and on the Sanibel side of Turner Beach.

Island residents with RESIDENTIAL PARKING STICKERS can park on West Gulf Drive west of Rabbit Road, the bay and gulf sides of Buttonwood Lane, the bay and gulf sides of Seagrape Lane, Colony Walkway, Bay Drive and on Henderson Road at Castaways Lane.

The user fee for the COUNTY PARK AT BOWMAN'S BEACH on the western end of Sanibel is \$1 per car.

The fine for parking in a restricted or residential area without the proper permit is \$35.

ON CAPTIVA public beach access for no charge can be found at Turner Beach or further north just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.

State law prohibits nude sunbathing on all Florida beaches. Violators will be prosecuted.

• Biking

The extensive network of bike paths on Sanibel is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path.

A state law and city ordinance combine to prohibit parking or driving on the bike paths. Motorists are not permitted on the bike paths.

If you plan to spend some time on a bike make sure your vehicle is equipped with a horn, good brakes and a light for night riding.

Under Florida law bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers.

• Camping

Camping on the beach is prohibited, as are open beach fires. Fires are permitted, however, in approved cooking containers (not to exceed 48-24-12 inches deep) with an extruded metal grill for non-commercial food preparation.

After you have your beach party please assume responsibility for cleaning up any litter or debris from the area.

One dead tern does not deserve another

Reverting to a 20-mph speed limit on the Causeway might be a good place to start if we are to save our precious wildlife

During the final weeks of 1985 and all during January and February of this year I was appalled at the number of dead royal terns on our Causeway. They were smashed by speeding traffic, mostly on the bridges.

It seems that every so often — and lately with ever greater frequency — I find myself writing of the deplorable slaughter on Sanibel, our beautiful and unspoiled sanctuary Island that is becoming less a sanctuary for wild animals and more a sanctuary for fast buck seekers whose activities are too often at the expense of our wild animals and other natural resources.

The shocking sight of five, six and one day, eight, beautiful, elegant and graceful royal terns smashed into the cement of the Causeway bridges makes me want to weep, move away, throw in the towel. But on reflection I find I must still make an effort to combat the forces of destruction that are raping our Island, and as far as that goes, are causing similar problems throughout the world.

A few months ago I cited the plight of the nesting skimmers on the Causeway islands, tortured by visiting urchins who threw baby skimmers into the water and who forced the young birds across the four lanes of the heavily-trafficked road.

The skimmers were really stressed. At that time we learned that Ron Hight, manager of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge, was negotiating for a nearby spoil island to be an alternate skimmer nesting site. I applaud his efforts. But because of the careless treatment of those who drive fast on the Causeway islands, other people who like to see nesting skimmers will be deprived of that pleasure if the alternate site works out.

It doesn't have to be this way. A little less speed, a little more caring, and the birds could nest safely on

the Causeway islands. Proper fencing of the skimmer site and appropriate signs warning people to stay away so as to lessen human disturbance would do the trick. One barrier that would be most effective would be double-stacked bales of hay around the perimeter of the nesting site. This is not costly or unsightly — and it is a tried and true method.

The loss to the bird-watching public (of whom there are many) of the viewing of a colony of nesting skimmers is the price we shall have to pay along with a lot of other costs necessary to maintain the big buck

economy on beautiful, unspoiled Sanibel.

Lee County Commissioner Porter Goss has a role in all of this. On Dec. 2, 1985, he wrote to Jan Tanner of Fort Myers in reponse to her letter of Nov. 20, 1985, in which she inquired about the speed limit changes on the Causeway.

Goss told Tanner that, yes, it was he who had

suggested the limit be raised from 20 to 35 mph because enforcement of the 20-mph limit was "a joke." He further expressed hope that the higher limit would "allow for meaningful enforcement" and said officers "don't routinely stop speeders unless they are five or 10 miles over the speed limit."

Goss originally supported the 20-mph limit. If 20 mph was right to preserve the Causeway spans in 1983, how come the same does not apply now? Why should "five or 10 or more miles over the speed limit" be needed to trigger enforcement?

I agree with Tanner: "Don't make a law you can't enforce."

Keeping to the legal speed limit is very unpopular. It seems to me that only the police can change that attitude.

Goss says Causeway traffic moves at about 40 mph most of the time. It is a lot faster than that, Porter. And wildlife suffers as a consequence.

Given the above comments on law enforcement, I think extant rules have

Threat of fatal worm infestation should be taken most seriously

Because of the danger CROW will no longer accept raccoons as patients

Raccoons might look like cute, cuddly animals, but in fact they can be quite vicious. And, according to very recent findings, a majority of raccoons are infected with a species of "worms" that can be easily transferred to humans and can quickly kill people. These new findings have caused Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife to adopt a new policy. The animal hospital can no longer accept raccoon patients. The regional office of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has sent a memo to all its facilities warning in no uncertain terms about the dangers connected with handling raccoons.

"We don't want to endanger our staff members," said CROW board member K.C. Emerson last week. "These are very recent findings, and in view of the

details in the Fish and Wildlife Service memo, we won't accept raccoons until the problem is resolved."

The memo gives details about two young boys who were infected by a nematode (class of worms) of the genus baylisascaris. This is a common parasite found in raccoons. Studies have shown its presence in 50-80 percent of all raccoons.

One 18-month-old boy died three weeks after he developed what was thought to be a mild respiratory infection. During autopsy, larvae of the genus baylisascaris were found in sections of the brain and spinal cord. From one section of the brain tissue weighing only 60 grams, 185 larvae were recovered.

Investigation found that the larvae apparently came from pieces of bark that the child had chewed on while at his uncle's farm. Raccoons had apparently defecated on or around the wood. A 10-month-old child was infected in a similar manner.

This is a particularly severe form of "visceral larva migrans" (infestation of human body organs by larvae of animal worms) because of its tendency to invade the central nervous system.

The Fish and Wildlife memo gives several important tips to prevent the spread of the disease:

- "Infected raccoons might shed up to 250,000 eggs of the parasite per gram of feces, so permitting raccoons

to share the same grounds with resident families, especially those with children, should be prevented. Nor should any raccoon be kept as a pet or passively accepted in any operational areas."

- "Then, too, based on the unfortunate case histories cited, it should be apparent to those with children that fire wood, depending on its origin, can be the bearer of fatal parasitic infection."

- "Lastly, but very important to those on our projects who are handling raccoons, please remember that apparently the majority of raccoons are infected, so don't make any gestures that would invite ingestion of the baylisascaris procyonis eggs, such as wiping your face, pulling your glove off with your teeth, or anything ... that would permit the entry of the parasite into the blood stream," the memo read.

- "There's no need to invite trouble," Emerson warned. He recommended that people avoid trying to pick up raccoons, particularly the baby raccoons that usually are born in the spring.

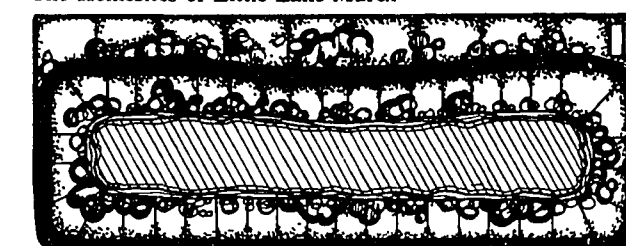
And, he added, besides these new findings on baylisascaris, the rate of rabies in the southeast United States has gone up 150 percent.

"The staff at CROW has been vaccinated for rabies, but the average citizen is not," Emerson said.

Phone company representative explains new emergency number to power squadron

The Sanibel-Captiva Power Squadron heard an explanation of the Enhanced 911 Emergency Calling System for Lee County during its regular March meeting last Wednesday night at the Sanibel Community Association.

Caroline Stimens of United Telephone Company of Florida presented details of the system that is expected to be in full operation by Spring 1987.

The enhanced system incorporates sophisticated computer equipment in such a manner that the calling number, its location, whether it is a single- or multiple-family dwelling and the appropriate

emergency service unit to be called are all displayed on the screen for the emergency operator and subsequently printed for a permanent record.

Four primary answering stations are planned for Lee County, and one of these will be at the Sanibel Police Department. By dialing the single number 911, fire, police and emergency medical services will be available. At present 25 numbers exist for calling such units in Lee County.

Cost of the system will be covered by a 50-cent monthly addition to phone bills during the first 18 months.

12-mile walkathon will raise funds for March of Dimes

City Hall mascots

City Hall employees cheered last week when Islander photographer David Dugatkin climbed a 35-foot ladder and found three recently hatched osprey chicks in a nest on a towering platform at the rear of City Hall. Despite an attack by the upset female osprey, Dugatkin managed to photograph the new arrivals. More than a year ago the parent birds moved into their custom-made home after their nest was blown out of a tree on the opposite side of the lake. The remnants of the nest were resurrected and placed on the platform built by Sanibel's osprey man, Mark "Bird" Westall, to lure the birds to the new site. The play worked and the ospreys took up residence. Since the first signs that the ospreys were incubating in late January, City Hall secretaries Toni Perry and Jeannie Schmuz have watched the birds' activities through binoculars. Two weeks ago the ospreys stopped sitting on the nest, and Perry and Schmuz were hopeful the eggs had hatched.

proved false because we witness the slaughter of many royal terns. I don't really agree with the principle that laws, in this case speed limit laws, can be broken within a tolerance limit. Better to increase the legal limit, adhere to the law and enforce it without any added cushion for the lawbreaker. After all, you don't permit pilfering of petty cash in banks. Bank robbery is bank robbery is bank robbery.

Sanibel is frequented by a number of tern species. In addition to my favorite species, the royal tern, we see sandwich, black, sometimes Caspian, the common and the Forster's, and the smallest of them all, the least

or little tern. Sometimes noody and sooty terns blow in here. One other species might pass near here, but high in the sky and probably far out to sea on its great migration, the longest of any bird. This is the arctic tern, which travels from the arctic to the antarctic and back each year.

Terns are related to the gulls and are classified in the same family but separate subfamily, the Sterninae. They are slender, have long narrow wings, forked tails and pointed beaks. When they fly they do so with a kind of eager exuberance and grace, the bill pointed downward. Although gull

cousins, they are much more elegant than any gull except for the beautiful swallow-tailed gulls, the only nocturnal species.

If any of you out there agree with me that it would be sensible to revert to the 20-mph speed limit on the Causeway, please let your thoughts be known. Write the Lee County commissioners. Tell them how you feel about the slaughter. We have simply got to get back some of the old standards of Island life that were here 10 years ago when the city of Sanibel was born. We have got to divorce ourselves, somehow, from the fast buck tribe

and think once again of serious preservation of our natural resources. A low, strictly enforced speed limit on the Causeway is a good place to start.

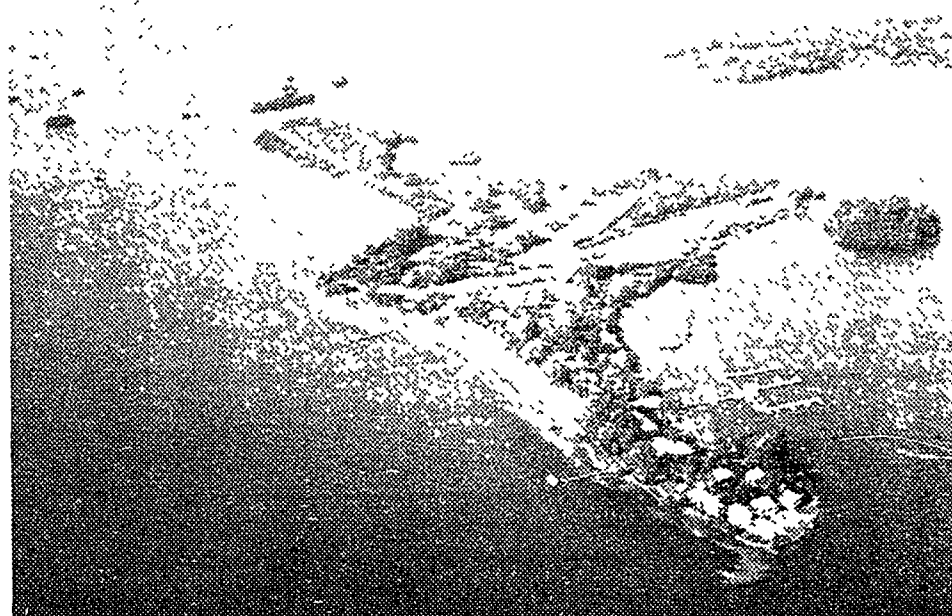

In the first grade art contest, Tara Nachtsheim won first place, followed by Ryan Archibald and Mabel Beerman.

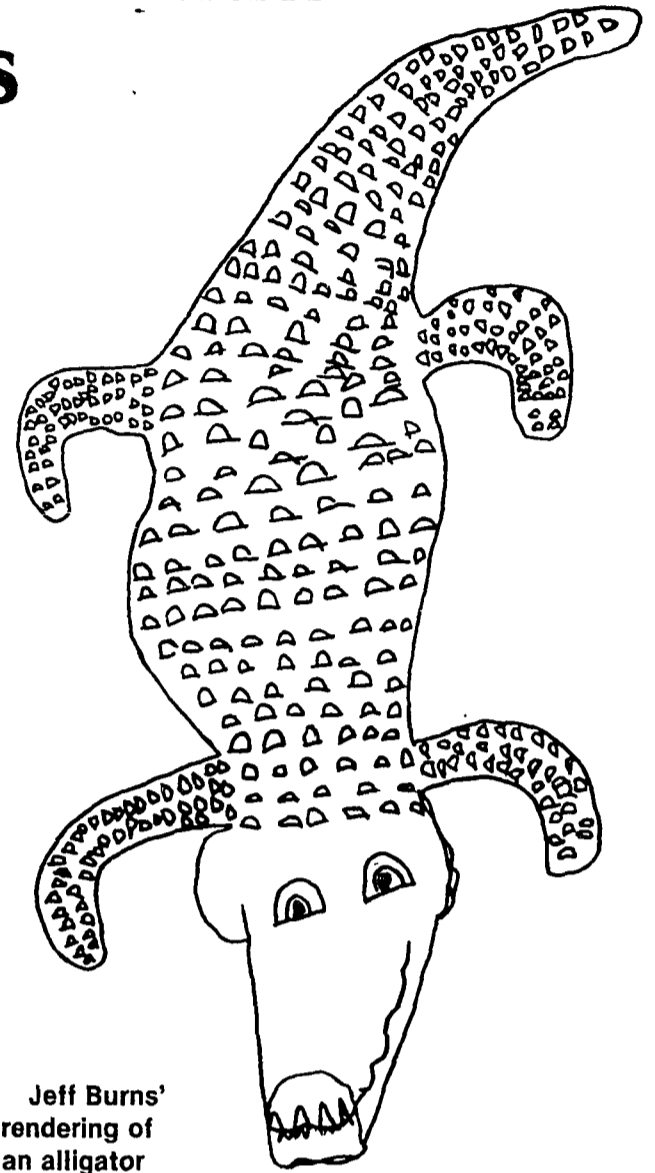

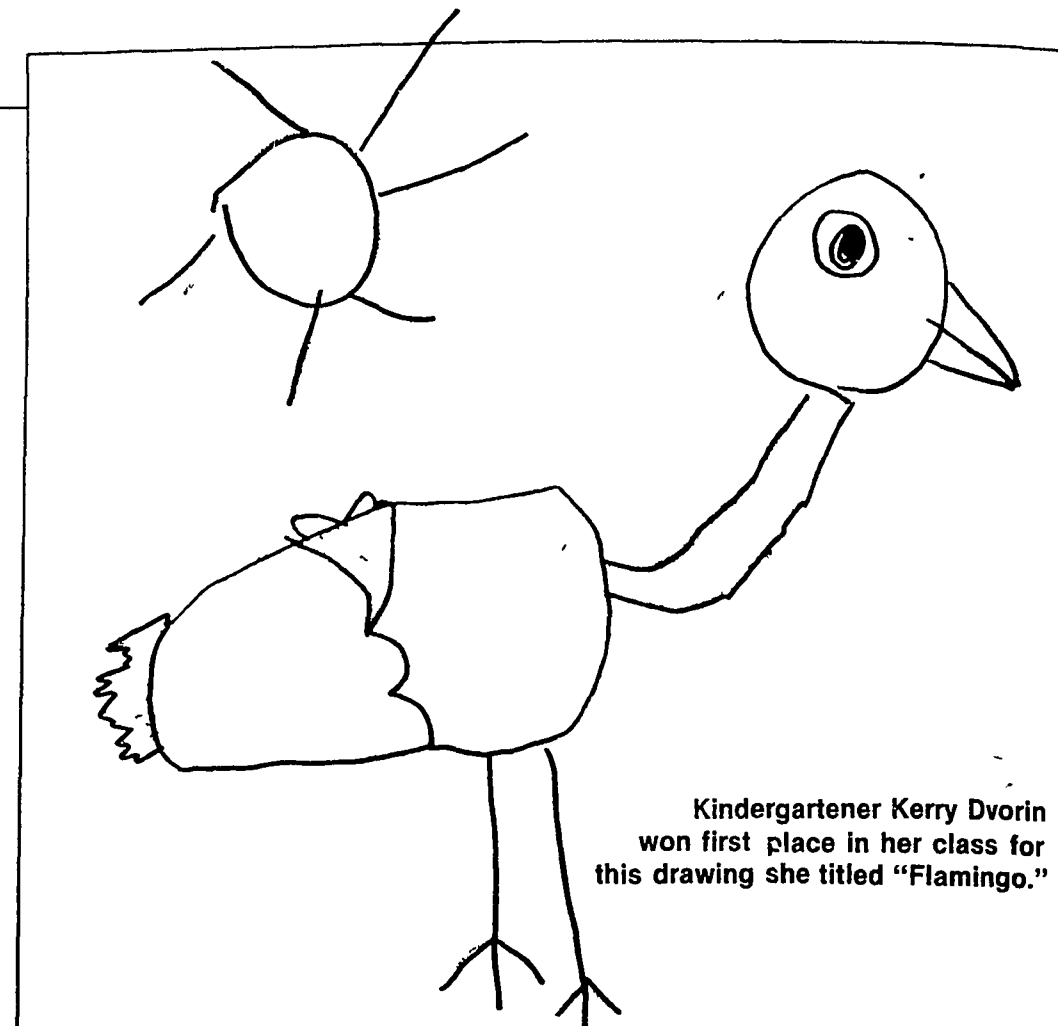
Then all the racoons come out and cheered, "Hurrah, hurrah, hurrah!" and kept cheering.

Answer your investment and tax questions at the Sanibel Public Library

The Sanibel Public Library now stocks several publications about money and investments.

The Outlook is issued weekly by Standard and Poors. It gives helpful advice about areas such as foundation stocks for long-term gain, stocks with promising growth prospects, cyclical or speculative stocks and income with inflation protection. Periodically it also covers such subjects as economic and business trends, stocks to avoid, "flashes" on "hot" issues, new issues, market-influencing news and much more.

The library also subscribes to The Value Line Investment Survey. This weekly advisory service is designed to guide and inform the private investor, the professional analyst and corporate executives, directors, purchasing agents and sales managers. Besides its complete financial and background data on 1,700 stocks, a unique feature of this service is the two ranks, i.e. The Timeliness Rank, and the Safety Rank.

In addition to the material in the Reference Department of the library, be sure to consult the card catalog

under Investments for books that can be borrowed for home use and more leisurely reading.

For those who are working on their federal income taxes, it might be helpful to know that many tax forms are available at the library. In addition to the usual forms such as 1040 and the 1040EZ, the library has a loose-leaf book with more than 100 less-used but important forms that can be copied on the library copier. The loose-leaf book is carefully indexed by title, number and the subject of the form. Ask at the desk for help.

Besides the instructions issued by IRS, a helpful guide is the 1986 U.S. Master Tax Guide (R336.2 MAS) published by the Commerce Clearing House. This detailed guide reflects all the income tax law changes through the date of publication.

For those concerned with Florida

taxes, the 1986 Guidebook to Florida Taxes (R336.2 GUI) is helpful. This covers various taxes such as corporation income tax, sales and use tax, estate tax and others. Right now, however, the section on Intangible Personal Property tax is especially pertinent. Information on the imposition of the tax, persons subject to tax, property taxed, basis and rate, trusts and estates and exemptions is included.

Another related handbook (although not directly concerned with income tax) is the Social Security Handbook (R368.4 SOC). This book provides a detailed explanation of retirement, survivors, disability, and black lung benefits, supplemental security income programs, health insurance and public assistance. It details how these programs operate, who is entitled to benefits and how these benefits may be obtained. For the final decision on any of these subjects, however, one should consult the local Social Security office directly.

Your 1985-86 Guide to Social Security Benefits (R344.73 RUB) is another helpful handbook on this subject. It includes answers to more than 500 questions about your rights under Social


Security. Written in question-and-answer form, it is informal, down-to-earth and very informative.

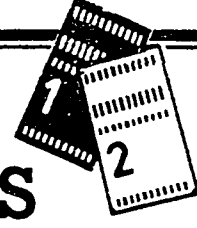

Matsumoto was born in 1935 in Tokyo, Japan. As a youngster he

was inspired and trained by his father, Katsuji Matsumoto, a well-known illustrator of children's books. Private tutoring followed, then study at the Tama Institute in Tokyo.

When he was 20 Matsumoto came to the United States, where he received scholarships from the John Herron School of Art and the Art Academy of Cincinnati. At the academy he studied under renowned artist Charles Harper.

After finishing his formal training, Matsumoto began a notable career as a commercial illustrator and a graphic designer. During this period he designed children's books and text books and illustrated *The Joy of Cooking*.

In 1975 he left the advertising world and moved with his family to Sanibel to establish an independent and creative career as a painter and printmaker. A few years ago he and his family moved to Fort Myers.

Says Matsumoto about his art, "There are no heavy messages in my work. I simply wish to delight."

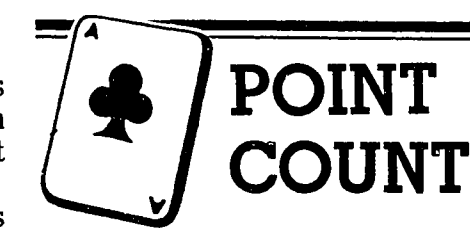

Put yourself in South's place this week. You need two club tricks and can surely win them even if one opponent has four or even five clubs.

The position shown this week beats you if you start with a club from South for a finesse with dummy's 10 or with a club from dummy to the queen.

The safety play is to start with a club from South to dummy's king. If East wins with the ace, win any return in dummy and lead a club, planning to finesse with the eight if East plays low.

If West can beat the eight, only one club will be left out — and you can pick that up with the queen. Then dummy's 10 will be good.

WEEKLY QUESTION
You hold: ♦ K 5 2 ♥ K 7 4 ♠ A 5 2 ♣ K 10 3 2. Partner bids one club and the next player passes. What do you say?

ANSWER
Bid 2NT, promising 13 to 15 high-card points, balanced distribution and strength in each of the unbid suits. This game-forcing response describes your hand far more accurately than a jump to three clubs.

If East puts in the nine or jack when you return a club from dummy, you win with the queen and can easily set up another club trick.

If West has the four clubs, dummy's king wins the first club trick. You then return a club toward the queen. When East shows out, you play the queen to force out the ace and can later lead a

Don't let your 'loving hands' go to waste

Years ago, most of our clothes were hand made. But as the ready-to-wear market grew, hand made garments were not such a necessity. This was the time when homemade was often considered inferior and the imperfections of a hand-knit sweater were excused because they were created by "loving hands." Today the "loving hands" of my customers are itching to make someone happy, but they don't know how to succeed.

The time and money spent to knit an average sweater is greater than the cost of one in a department store. For example, my husband, well aware of my vocation, recently returned from a shopping trip with two sweaters that fit him well, were on sale, and he liked. If I had tried to make him a sweater, it wouldn't have fit as well and it would have been a dull project - his tastes are too conservative for me!

Even baby clothes are not worth the trouble when compared to what is available in the market place. But let's not allow those "loving hands" go to waste. We just have to be a little more creative and choose projects that take less time. They can be just as challenging to satisfy our needs.

Baby and children's blankets using favorite colors and soft yarns cannot be beat. Quick-to-knit sweaters with machine washable yarns for kids are always winners.

Ladies' and some men's novelty sweaters are where "loving hands" can excel. Today's styles are big and loose, so there's no worry about fit.

Using large needle projects speeds completion and also uses less yarn - less cost! Adding a stripe or a few blobs or streaks of contrasting yarns makes the sweater an original creation.

There are some very happy customers who choose a project because they think the yarn would be fun to knit. They worry about what will get it after the project is completed.

I have great difficulty trying to please a customer who is trying to please someone else who has requested a certain sweater they saw in a store or

magazine. Duplicating a ready-made sweater is next to impossible unless the exact yarn is available. And this is usually not the case. If we can come close, the knitter worries through the whole project whether the sweater will fit and whether its recipient will be pleased.

I know it seems best to ask a person what they would

like. But keep in mind that this person probably does not know what is available, nor does he know the difficulty of a project.

A copy can never be as good as the original. When you receive a hand-made sweater there are responsibilities attached. Handle it with care. Ask if it should be dry cleaned or hand washed. Make certain to wear it in the presence of the creator. If you are far away, send a picture. By following these simple instructions, you can make someone very happy and confident with her "loving hands."

Free taxi service offered

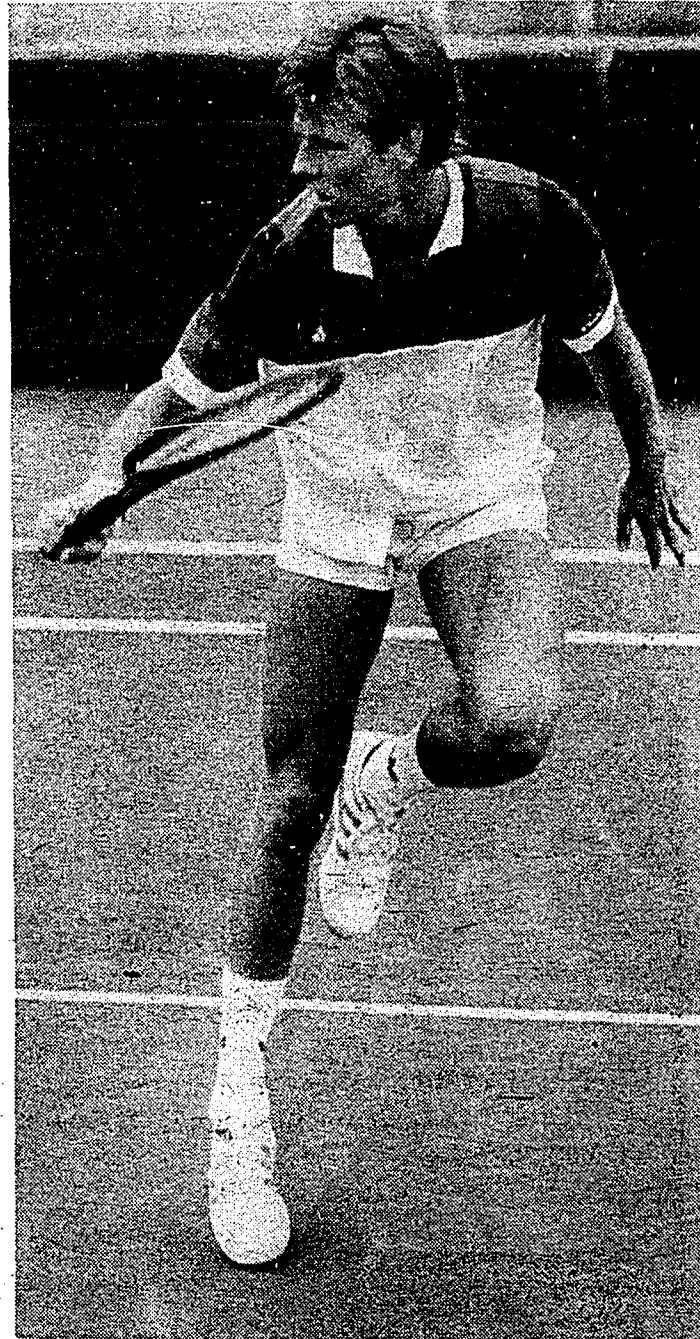
The Sanibel Taxi Service will offer free taxi service to the PaineWebber Classic for Sanibel and Captiva residents this week.

Krickstein and Davis: Two outstanding juniors are in this year's 32-man PaineWebber field

Aaron Krickstein and Scott Davis are two top junior players who have lived up to expectations. Both are part of the 32-man field for the 1986 PaineWebber Classic presented by Volvo Tennis.

While he was a junior, Krickstein never lost to a player younger than he was. The Grosse Point, Mich., man became the youngest player ever to win a Grand Prix singles title in 1983 when he captured the Israel Tennis Center Classic at the age of 16. In that same year he reached the round of 16 at the U.S. Open. For his impressive showing, Tennis magazine regarded the righthander by naming him 1983 Rookie of the Year.

Krickstein continued his success in 1984 by winning singles titles at Boston, Geneva and Tel Aviv, in addition to reaching the finals at Rome and Washington D.C.

The 19-year-old's forehand is regarded as one of the most lethal in men's tennis. A strong baseliner, Krickstein is working to improve his serve and volley game. While he did not win a singles title in 1985, he

reached the semi-finals at Monte Carlo and WCT/Forest Hills. For the third consecutive year, Krickstein, currently ranked number 30, has been selected to represent the United States in Davis Cup competition.

Davis, currently ranked number 34, demonstrated early in his junior career that he was a player to be reckoned with. By the time he turned professional he possessed a record 24 national junior titles.

1985 was a breakthrough year for this California native as he reached the quarterfinal round or better in nine tournaments, earned his second Grand Prix singles title at the Japan and Asian Open, won three doubles titles and earned his first ever Nabisco Masters berth.

At the 1985 PaineWebber Classic, Davis reached the quarterfinals. He and partner David Pate, (also in this year's PaineWebber Classic field) form one of the top doubles teams on the tour. He and his wife, the former Suzy Jaeger, now reside in Bardmoor, Fla.

Marine catalogues offer some unusual, some useful items for boaters

Well, it's not entirely new. Men who have been hospitalized have used what this one catalogue calls a "urinal." But when it's a boating item it's different. For instance, you can get it in colors. And it has a screw-on cap. But the part I liked best was in the fine print of the advertising, which said the urinal can also be used for storing hot drinks, like coffee or soup! Can you imagine getting your containers mixed up?!

If you have ever had to use an electric drill around water, you know that in the back of your mind you keep thinking as you work that any second you, the drill and water are going to connect. And the next thing you know you will be the star attraction in a burial at sea.

This problem can be solved with a new battery-powered electric drill. These things have been on the market for a few years, but they are getting more "marine-ized" to take the corrosion. I think they make a wonderful gift for a boater. Of course it can be used on shore, too. Figure about \$60 for the drill. The peace of mind alone is worth that when you have to use a drill on the water.

If you are anything like I am, when it comes time to fix something, you can't find your tools on the boat. Well, a canvas tool bucket can be of great help. Keeping tools from touching each other is a major concern in boating, because they touch and they rust. Isolated tools rust fast enough, but a pile of wrenches can fuse in a matter of days. This canvas bag keeps all handy, visible and separate. They make a thoughtful gift and sell for about \$5.50. The really fancy model goes for \$10.

Ladies, are you tired of always having to open the old man a new beer because he is forever knocking over his on the boat? To the rescue comes an

around-the-neck can holder called "Can-Ga-Roo Cooler." It is suspended from the neck by a cord, leaving both hands free to do whatever the captain is supposed to do. These sell for a paltry \$4.

Have you ever wanted your very own cannon to do things like liven up a party, chase college kids from your condo pool or start a boat race? Fear not, captain. Winchester Model 1898 is what you need. The shotgun people thought you might like this little beauty around the house or boat, so they offer it for sale as a "working collector's item" used to start the America's Cup races. You can surprise your skipper with his very own cannon for only \$545. You fire 10-gauge blanks in your cannon. Carry this baby into a convenience store about 10 at night and you could probably get all the credit you wanted.

Not to leave the women out, one bass fishing catalogue is big on dressing correctly for a day on the water. For instance, the gals can buy French-cut panties that say "Kiss my bass," and you guys can get a shirt that says "A bad day of fishing is still better than a good day at work." Just suggestions.

And lastly, for those who eat a big breakfast just before going out fishing and then spend the rest of the morning throwing it over the side in frantic runs to the railing, there is a new product that purports to stop "heave chumming." The acupressure folks have something called a "seaband" that straps to your left wrist and puts pressure on a certain point. They maintain this stops you from tossing your cookies.

March winds send strange things to the Islands' shores

It's that time of the year when all sorts of funny-looking things wash ashore along Sanibel and Captiva Islands. Some of it is harmless, some collectible and some worth avoiding.

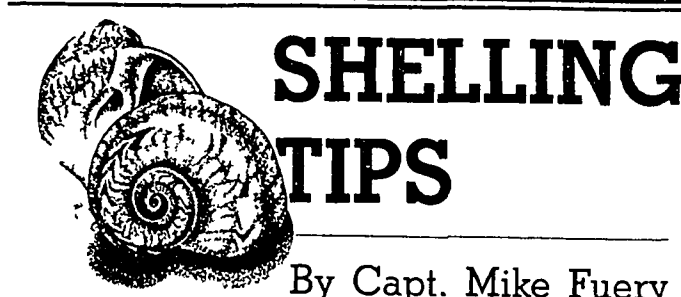
With the March winds upon us, you no doubt will see literally hundreds of foot-long, sand-colored tubular things that look like they are made of paper. These are the casings from what used to be parchment worms. They live offshore, but when storms dislodge them from the bottom, they wash to the beach in large numbers.

The good news is that these casings pose no danger to you as you look for shells on the beaches. The bad news is that they can become so thick that they cover up the better shells. And searching through the piles of shells and parchment can take time.

There are several kinds of sea worms along the shores. Most leave a powerful smell on your hands if you touch a live one.

Those who walk the back bay flats will probably see many worms sticking about two to three inches above the sand. They attract hundreds of tiny shell bits to their stalks. This is primarily for protection from predators, but it also gives them some stability on the sand. I've seen people dig these up and use them for fishing bait. But frankly, they smell terrible and are not of any value to the collector. Best to leave them alone.

We are just ahead of the time when the stingrays check their bio-clocks and see it's time to fall in love. They tend to gather in small schools along the

beaches. You've probably heard about them and what they can do to an unsuspecting wader.

Stingrays have a very sharp barb on a long, whip-like tail. They like to work the shallows looking for mollusks, shrimp and crabs. They are not particularly afraid of humans, and the problem arises when folks wading in the shallows step on the rays. The resulting wound can be very painful and can require a doctor's attention.

As I said, it is still a little early for the rays, but some will show up. It's best to wear sneakers and shuffle your feet instead of taking regular steps. Sounds crazy, I know, but shuffling gives the rays time to get out of your way.

You are going to see some very large, clear jellyfish in our waters during the next few weeks. Southwest winds will blow these creatures into shore. Once washed up on the beach, they are relatively harmless. The problem of getting stung

comes from floating jellyfish whose tentacles come in contact with the skin. The pain from these is much less than the puncture wound of the ray, but still it hurts and it can be avoided. As far as I can determine, the best treatment for a jellyfish sting is still Adolph's meat tenderizer.

If the beach you are on seems to have a lot of jellyfish, move down a couple of hundred yards and check again.

Occasionally I hear from my charter people that they have read "somewhere" that certain shells can be dangerous to the collector. Most notable is the "dreaded" murex shells, which many people think can emit a deadly sting. This is true — if you are a half-inch long fish and if you can find a live murex shell. Chances are you don't fit into either category. Don't worry. If there was any danger from any shells, you would see signs about it at every shelling area.

Unfortunately, your biggest fear should be from the trash left on the beaches by other shellers and anglers. If you see bottles or torn aluminum cans, please pick them up and take them back to your trash dumpster. Isn't it ironic that the biggest potential danger on our Islands is not from the sea, but from what we've left on the beach?
