




The photos in this weekly stumper can be extra close-ups or odd angles of things we all see every day around the islands. They might be upside-down, reversed or a portion of the whole.

### On Sanibel and Captiva, word travels fast through the sea-grapevine

On these Islands the only thing that moves fast is news. Make the news mis-informed or scandalous in nature, and sound barriers will be broken.

This phenomenon is owed to the mystical, magical Island sea-grapevine. The Island sea-grapevine can put to shame the most expedient office grapevine.

I first became aware of the sea-grapevine on visits to Jamaica in my pre-Florida days. I was fascinated by the unusual appearance of an oddly-shaped tree with plate-like leaves and funny antennae-like protruberances. It looked like some sort of martian communication station. (Jamaican sun will do a lot to a person's mind.)

The Jamaicans used the huge leaves for everything from plates to improvised hats to protect against the effects of the intense sunshine. So, because of his reverence for this other plant — and because of his red eyeballs — I doubted his faith in sea grape communications. That was before I witnessed how quickly news of our arrival to Jamaica had reached every fruit vendor and flour-sack dressmaker within a 20-mile radius.

In Jamaica, where the natives walk in an Island shuffle (equal parts walking, dancing and standing still), and where telephones were then rare, something was metaphysical about the way we were attracting black coral jewelry and ackee sandwiches like shoppers to an ABC Sale.

Alas, it was merely the island sea-grapevine at work. Jimmy Buffet would call it the Coconut Telegraph, but I believe he pegged the wrong tree.

I developed a reverence for the sea grape and its aura of seaside sentimentality, romance and magic. I read some cheap Caribbean romance where a paralyzed man and a heart-broken English lass both find a cure 'neath the boughs of the sea grape. I began to see the sea grape as a transmitter of healing. It had certainly healed my reality-battered soul on my annual Jamaican getaways.

Then, shortly after moving to Sanibel, I read an Associated Press story in the Fort Myers News-Press about some guy who actually claimed to have been cured of a fatal disease by the sap of the sea grape. Maybe it was health, not stomach cramps, those Jamaican kids were inviting, I began to figure.

With a little study, my convictions of the romance and powers of the sea-grapevine were confirmed. It is told that early Spaniards used the leaves for stationery, and that the sea-grapevine was already in commission during the days of conquistadors and pirates. No doubt Gasparilla penned his ransom demands on sea grape leaves. It sets the imagination fairly reeling. (Sanibel-Captiva sun will do that, too.)

In modern times on these Islands the sea grape leaves are still used as postcards and Valentines. But as a communications form, the sea grape tree's abilities do not end there.

How does a friend on Captiva find out you were stopped for speeding, even before the paper comes out? How does your neighbor know you have cockroaches? How does "everyone" know you are getting a divorce when you aren't? How does one shop owner know his competitor is planning to sell before his competitor knows? How do Islanders know when it's not safe to drive on Periwinkle Way? They heard it through the sea-grapevine.

## Perpendicular stabilizer fiasco could be money well spent

I think the decision of the governor and his Cabinet to order the removal of concrete-filled bags recently placed on Captiva's shoreline was correct, although unfortunate in view of the deteriorating condition of our beaches.

It has long been known that the replacement of objects of a more or less permanent nature perpendicular to the beach will accrete sand. This has been proven on Captiva Island. It has also long been known that such objects, as they accrete sand, do so at the expense of beaches that are down current.

Notwithstanding, the general contractor and project engineer, on their own initiative, chose to inject concrete into the sandbags in direct violation of the permits issued to the Captiva Erosion Prevention District

by the state of Florida.

The CEPD must share some of the blame for this fiasco. It bent over backwards to award the contract for the installation of the sandbags to Dick Holmberg and the supervision contract to Art Learned. In doing so it violated fundamental principles of bidding on public contracts in more than one instance. The CEPD did not even follow the advice of its own counsel.

The CEPD owes the taxpayers a public apology for this ill-fated project which has cost them tens of thousands of dollars. Perhaps, however, it is money well spent. Maybe the CEPD will now devote its full attention to the beach nourishment project which is clearly its main duty.

# An Island history lesson

The late Malcolm Beattie: The right man at the right time to keep Sanibel and Captiva from becoming another Miami Beach

Malcolm Beattie was a quiet man who would not have called himself a crusader, although he had crusading thrust upon him. A strong, brilliant leader, he was that wonderful phenomenon — the right man at the right time to keep Sanibel and Captiva from becoming another Miami Beach.

He was born in Fall River, Mass., and was only 17 when the United States entered WWI. When his own country refused his services, he went to Canada to try to enlist in the British Army. Upon learning that Beattie was underage, the recruiting officer advised him to "think about it" and then come back. Beattie did. And he declared himself 18 and joined the Canadian Black Watch, the famous Ladies from hell.

After about 1½ years in combat with nary a scratch he returned home with his well-worn tartan as a souvenir.

After earning a degree in engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Beattie entered the marine and commercial construction business. During WWII he served in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in the South Pacific, attaining the rank of lieutenant colonel. When the war ended he went to work for Allied Stores, of which Maas Brothers is one, and supervised the construction of

stores and malls all over the United States. In 1964 he took an early retirement and with his wife, Sally, moved to Sanibel.

Although Beattie continued to act as consultant to Allied Stores, on the Islands he was best known for his dedication to the preservation of natural resources.

In 1967, when he learned that a 60-acre trailer park was planned for the wetlands of San Carlos Bay, he organized the Interested Citizens Committee and in a hearing before the Lee County Zoning Board objected to the proposal point by point. When an irate

board member demanded to know why he considered himself qualified to criticize, Beattie stood up and told him — in some detail. He sat down to loud applause. And the trailer park was never built.

He continued to head the Interested Citizens Committee, which eventually became the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Inc. There were some important victories for the board in the early days before Sanibel was incorporated.

A proposal to rezone Sanibel Gardens for high intensity development was rejected by county officials, as was a plan for commercial development at the entrance of the Island. The Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce was encouraged to begin a campaign to limit the number, type and size of signs of the Island. The battle was won three years later despite formidable opposition from the billboard industry.

For the planning board the real test came in 1967, when the county hired Adley Associates to prepare a new zoning code. Although Island representatives conferred with the county's consultants and made recommendations, these were ignored.

The proposed plan presented in 1968 was a real shocker. It suggested that a four-lane highway be built the length of Captiva and extend through the

J.N. "Ding" Darling refuge to the Causeway. Eastern Sanibel, all of Captiva except for Turner Beach, and Buck Key were zoned for intensive urban development, which would have permitted high-rises and a population of 95,000.

Islanders were outraged, and in the fall of 1969 the County Commission was persuaded to impose a moratorium on the construction of any building over 35 feet high.

At a later date a new classification was proposed that would have permitted any community in the county to limit building heights. This was intended not so much to protect the right of a community to impose restrictions, for few cared, but to make Sanibel and Captiva's road less rocky. Unfortunately, it had the opposite effect; the building trade roared its opposition.

In the end, at a public meeting of the County Commission Jan. 5, 1971, the Islands got their high-rise ban through a simply phone call. Commissioner Bruce Scott, who had formerly served in the state Legislature, left his seat to telephone the attorney general in Tallahassee. He returned to announce that, apparently, there would be no legal problems if only Sanibel and Captiva banned high-rises.

Acting Chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Dr. Ingalls Simmons, strode to the platform to shake Scott's hand as the audience clapped and cheered. The ordinance was drawn up the following month. Later, because ground levels differ, it was revised to ban buildings more than 43 feet above sea level.

At the time the high-rise ban was considered, the planning board requested low density development on the Islands. The board also asked that construction be set back at least 100 feet from the vegetation line on the gulf beach. But the county commissioners, by then feeling pressure from the construction industry, could not agree on many points. The request was denied.

Malcolm Beattie served as chairman of the planning board until 1971 and then continued as a director. He was replaced by another strong, dedicated leader, Vernon MacKenzie, who continued to influence in a very positive way the direction the


Islands would take.

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
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

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
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## Graham orders Captiva erosion project into compliance

Decision means contractor must remove 59 feet of concrete-filled bags

Gov. Bob Graham and his Cabinet last week voted unanimously to order Captiva's perpendicular stabilizer project to come into strict compliance with permit specifications.

The governor's order means that designer and contractor Dick Holmberg must remove 34 feet of concrete-filled bags on the two northernmost

stabilizers and 25 feet of bags on the remaining four stabilizers.

The stabilizers in their current form are 72 feet long. Only 13 feet of concrete-filled bags will be allowed close to shore. The remainder must be sand-filled bags, the state has ordered.

"I have to try hard to keep from crying," Captiva Erosion Prevention District Chairman Peg Hofschneider, long a proponent of the experimental project, said last week. "This is really rough on us. We were encouraged when we first met with the governor two weeks ago."

At that time it appeared the governor and Cabinet would play a "wait and see" game to determine whether the concrete grout bags would adversely affect adjacent shorelines. The governor at that time also enjoined the CEPD and the permitting agency, the state Department of Natural Resources, to at-

tempt negotiations to iron out the problems. "But the DNR wouldn't negotiate with us," Hofschneider lamented. "When they finally met with

on Monday evening (the night before the hearing with the governor), they were adamant about the stabilizers being removed."

The perpendicular stabilizer controversy has raged since mid-February, when the DNR placed a cease and desist order on Holmberg, charging that the contractor was not following the order of the permit application. The state officials were particularly angry that more concrete than they believed they had permitted was being used.

Holmberg maintains he did not violate the permit and says the DNR is focusing on technicalities and is not interested in seeing experimental projects work.

Holmberg completed the project despite a verbal cease and desist order. A written cease and desist order arrived on Captiva two days after the work was completed.

Holmberg is also being fined \$6,000 for violating a cease and desist order.

The CEPD is currently seeking bids to discover how much it will cost to remove the concrete section of the project that the governor has ordered removed. So far the CEPD has received two bids, but the bids are so diverse that the CEPD is seeking others. Though project engineer Art Learned once speculated that it would take dynamite to remove the concrete bags, Hofschneider said that was very unlikely.

Holmberg has in the past expressly stated that he would not remove the work he has done, saying, "I create beaches. I don't destroy them."

Nevertheless, Hofschneider said that the board, though not liable at this point, would do what it could to see that the governor's order is followed.



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
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

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## County leaders will meet with Sanibel council to discuss Causeway improvements, new toll schedule

Plans for improvements to the Sanibel Causeway and a proposed new toll schedule will be unveiled to Islanders at a special joint meeting of Lee County Commissioners and the Sanibel City Council at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 10, at the Sanibel Community Association.

The office of County Commission Chairman Porter Goss said Friday that "a bridge financing scenario, toll structures and commuter arrangements" will be among the issues up for discussion.

Late Friday, Sanibel Mayor Louise Johnson said her original concept of the meeting was that it would be a special City Council meeting with county commissioners and members of the county administration invited to participate and answer questions from council members and Island residents alike.

"I'm not sure how a joint session will work," she added.

Last July Sanibel officials were taken by surprise

Lee County Commission Chairman Porter Goss' office said Friday that bridge financing, toll structures and community arrangements will be among the issues up for discussion at a joint meeting between the County Commission and the Sanibel City Council on April 10.

when in the midst of a joint investigation of the feasibility of reopening negotiations for Sanibel's purchase of the Causeway, the county announced long-range plans for improvements.

These plans included replacing the drawbridge with a high-rise structure at an estimated cost of \$40 million, four-laning the other two bridges and replacing commuter toll books with an annual pass that would sell for \$125.

Both the council and many Islanders objected to the hike in resident tolls which would have more than doubled the cost of commuting for many.

The council also objected to moving the toll plaza to the Sanibel end of the Causeway, which would have permitted free use of the spoil islands.

Neither Johnson nor City Manager Gary Price at this time knows the specifics of the county's plan. But both agree that unquestionably the tolls will be raised and that the need for a high-rise bridge has been demonstrated by the burgeoning traffic jams caused by frequent openings of the bridge for boat traffic and by mechanical malfunctions that have kept the bridge stuck in the up position.

The council has requested that any changes planned have a public airing before the county makes a final decision.

## Community organizations call for change in council election procedure

A proposal to change Sanibel's election procedure and elect city councilman by a popular vote rather than a majority vote for five designated council seats deserves a "full-blown public hearing," the city council agreed last Tuesday.

Sponsored by the Committee of the Islands and Condominium Associations of Sanibel, Inc., the change would require a revision of the City Charter approved by a referendum of Sanibel voters. The Better Government Association of the Islands also endorses the change. The Committee of Neighborhood Associations also informally backs the proposed change, but CONA President Elmer Stilbert says because a by-law provision prohibits the organization from engaging in political activities, it cannot take an official position.

Recognizing the need for public input on the measure, the City Council has scheduled a special meeting for 3 p.m. Tuesday, April 1, to discuss ramifications of the proposal.

Although this is the regular council meeting day, if the agenda has not been completed by 3 p.m. the regular session will be recessed until 9 a.m. Wednesday, April 2.

Gilbert Bursley, COTI president, put forth reasons for the procedural change that would have the highest vote-getters in the field winning the office.

"This will eliminate the necessity of new candidates running against specific incumbents and pitting friends against one another," Bursley explained.

Councilman Francis Bailey emphasized that in the city's very first council election in December 1974, the five top vote-getters in the field of 16 candidates were declared the winners. To provide for staggered terms, Bailey said, the five (and he was one of them) drew lots for the three seats with four-year terms and two seats with two-year terms.

Beginning with the 1976 council election candidates have vied for each of five seats, Bailey said.

Another disadvantage of the existing system, Bursley said, is that it allows a candidate for a specific seat to be elected with fewer votes than losers in other races on the slate.

It also promotes and fosters negative campaign activities aimed at demonstrating the attributes and attitudes of individual candidates, he pointed out.

Bursley said this resulted in fewer candidates and in both challengers and incumbents delaying declaring their intentions until the opposition is known.

The city charter currently requires a declaration of intent to run to be filed 20 days before the qualifying deadline. Bursley maintained a longer period is needed for public exposure and discussion of issues.

He said running by district works better in larger municipalities and serves no good purpose in a small and intimate community such as Sanibel. Councilman Fred Valtin acknowledged that Bursley's points made a strong argument for changing the system. He said

the whole issue is "worthy of a special meeting." Mayor Louise Johnson reminded the council that in 1982 the Charter Revision Committee had considered recommending a change in the election procedure but later rejected the idea.

Henry Shelton, chairman of the Better Government Association of the Islands, called the present election system a farce. "Actually, the candidates in each district are voted on at large," he said.

Bursley and Robert Marye, CASI president, said the directors of both COTI and CASI were requesting the council to adopt an ordinance calling for a referendum to revise the charter to permit the change in the election procedure.

City Manager Gary Price said that in order for the charter change to be placed on the ballots at either the Sept. 3 or 20 primary election or the general election on Nov. 4, the supervisor of elections must have the exact wording of the question 60 days prior to the election date.

The council is urging all interested citizens to attend next Tuesday's special meeting to make their feelings known.

Long time Islander William Compton has offered to donate his workshop on Wooster Lane to the Sanibel Recreation Department.

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

The Conservation Foundation has agreed to match the city's contribution for this purpose. The city has given the foundation financial aid in its wetlands acquisition program for the past five years.

• An ANTIQUE CLOCK from Nantucket mounted on a tower ON THE ROOF OF THE FORMER BLACK PEARL SHOP on Periwinkle Way is not a "street graphic," the City Council decided last Tuesday.

The Planning Commission had approved a development permit for new owner Gilles Pageau to make cosmetic renovations in converting the shop for use as a realty office. But Code Enforcement Officer Dick Baker said that under his interpretation of the Graphics ordinance the proposed clock tower was an "animated sign" and would not be permitted.

Since it has historically been the council's purview to grant sign variances, the commissioners left this decision to the council.

The council agreed there was a fine line between viewing the clock tower as an "attention-getting" graphic or as an architectural feature.

A motion that the clock tower did not constitute a sign as long as its color, size and configuration was harmonious and compatible with the rest of the building passed by a 4-0 vote. Councilman Mike Klein was absent.

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

### More money means consumers will spend it

Just when it looked like things were slowing down for a while, the stock market came roaring back to life again.

Fueled by institutional activity largely implementing planned buying programs, the DJIA gained 92.91 points for the week ending March 14, 1986. NYSE volume swelled to 880.8 million shares. Both are records and both will probably be broken again in short order; after all, what does 25 or 50 points mean with the Dow at present levels?

Investors have cash to spend, and as the stock market goes up and interest rates go down, the incentive to spend increases. So stocks could continue to advance for a while.

The recent weakness of the international oil market has had quite an impact on prices. For example, February Producer Prices declined by 1.6 percent, the largest monthly drop since the data was first collected in 1947. Given the behavior of the PPI, which measures prices at the wholesale level, consumer prices can be expected to be moderate for quite awhile. All in all, for investors and consumers alike inflation should be way down on any "worry" list that one has.

The position of the consumer has also improved during the past several months or so. Oil prices have declined and drivers are finally paying a lot less at the pump to fill up. In addition, mortgage rates have dropped to the point where refinancings are taking place on a wide scale.

The bottom line is that consumers will have more money to either spend or save and, if the past is any guide to the future, it will be spent. Sure, there will be some trading up to more expensive homes as housing activity increases, but with improved household balance sheets and lower borrowing costs, consumer spending on a wide range of items can be expected to pick up significantly.

In spite of record stock index highs, the environment remains favorable for the equity investor. The economy continues to gain strength, but not rapidly enough to cause the Fed to tighten money. Indeed, one of the most pleasant developments of the present rally is that investors have not been inundated with money supply figures.

The fundamental position of American business continues to improve as high coupon debt is refunded. Corporate cash flow is good and profits should pick up significantly as the recovery continues.

## There when you need it

Complete hurricane survival kit will help Islanders be prepared when it's important

Tropical Storm Bob, Hurricane Elena, Hurricane Juan — like three feints and then light jabs to the chin, these three storms threatened Sanibel and Captiva last year.

Were you prepared then? Will you be prepared if even more serious storms hit the Islands during the 1986 hurricane season?

Last year's storms sent four local businessmen into a brainstorming session. The result is the marketing of a "Hurricane Emergency Life Protecting Kit."

"We felt there should be a kit available so people could enjoy the good life now but be prepared when there is an emergency," says John Hill, president of HELP, Inc. (Hurricane Emergency Life Protection). Hill, a semi-retired real estate investor, is joined in the venture by Don Abbott, president of AVP; Dick Meyers, a local CPA; and David Hunt of Gator Investors Group.

The kit will sell for \$88.50 and consists of a bag literally stuffed with "survival" material. Among the items are a mountain climber's stove, a cooking and dining kit, knife with tools, AM-FM radio with batteries, first aid kit, tarpaulin, 2.5-gallon water container, survival candles and food rations.

The kit even includes informa-

tion about what to do and where to go during a hurricane.

All these items and others weigh a total of only nine pounds and fit into a relatively small handbag. "It's perfect for a car trunk or closet," Hill says. "You won't use it until you really need it."

Hill believes it would take someone about a week to gather everything for a similar kit. "So we're hoping to save people time. And we hope people will think about buying a kit before the hurricane season," he adds. "It seems like every time we have a warning in hurricane season, you go by Bailey's and see people lined up to buy all sorts of things at the

last minute — things they might not even need."

Hill has an idea of what is necessary in such a kit. The Lee County native has been through 11 hurricanes, including the infamous Donna.

Workers from the Red Cross assisted HELP, Inc., in putting the kit together. HELP, Inc., will soon print hurricane information pamphlets for distribution by the Red Cross. And \$1 from the sale of each hurricane kit will be donated to the Red Cross.

The kits will be available within six weeks and will be marketed by mail. For more information call Hill, 472-4012.



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

Animals that are not artificially fed are less likely to become problems. A "lame" alligator becomes bold - he loses his fear of man.

An alligator has difficulty distinguishing between a piece of fish and the hand that holds it.

Because of the gator population here dogs should never be allowed to run free on the islands. Fence your dog, walk him on a leash or, if you must free him for a walk, keep him under voice control. NEVER tie your dog in an unfenced backyard.

## New developments at Octagon

Feral burros are the latest residents at wildlife sanctuary

Often in this series we have mentioned the fine work that is being done at Octagon by Peter Octave Caron. The name of this sanctuary is derived from Caron's middle name, which in turn came from his ancestral Indian background and refers to eight ceremonial fires of the Algonquin.

Octagon is a many-acre place where all animals find welcome aid. Caron's special expertise deals with the big cats. Among them are cougars, better known here in Florida as panthers.

I suppose Caron has a dozen wonderful panthers at Octagon, all of which he has rescued from serious threat of death.

Sometimes he gets a desperate call from a misguided citizen who has a panther that he perhaps bought in a pet store when it was a cute little cuddly baby. But now it has grown to 100 or 130 pounds and is no longer that cute baby; it is in fact a powerful adult mountain lion or cougar. Such an owner telephones Caron and says something like, "Come quickly and get this animal or I'll make a rug out of him for my living room floor!" So Caron rushes out to pick up the animal, usually one that has been badly mistreated, underfed or poorly fed, and brings it back to Octagon, where he nurses it back to health with the aid of two very fine veterinarians who work closely with him. The animal soon becomes integrated into the wildlife population at Octagon.

A wild creature that has good reason to, and often does, hate mankind soon comes under the spell of this skilled and loving animal handler and nearly always winds up as a tame, friendly creature that permits Caron to treat it as intimately as you might your own poodle or house cat.


One exception to this is Kalib, the 1,000-pound, truly immense Siberian tiger that has lived at Octagon for as long as I have known the place.

For some mysterious reason, Kalib does not like Caron. But he likes me. I can scratch him behind his ears, talk to him, reach my fingers through the wire of his cage, and enjoy a friendly relationship with this huge, beautiful cat. He purrs so loudly in his contentment that he sounds like a Black and Decker power wood rasp.

I think the reason Kalib does not deal well with Caron is because he perceives Caron be the top dog, excuse me, the top cat, around the place. Kalib competes with Caron for the alpha position. Somebody has got to occupy that slot, and Caron does it very effectively insofar as all the other animals are concerned — but Kalib does not like that second position.

Not long ago a woman took to Octagon a rather sorry young African lioness. The beast has bone structure problems and obviously was poorly reared, but Caron is doing everything he can to bring her around. She is now happily ensconced in a cage with fellow members of her own species, and for the first time in her relatively short life she is finding a bit of contentment.

Not long ago somewhere in Florida a mother black Indian leopard, a/k/a black panther, decided she did not want to take care of her two little kittens. They are out at Octagon now. They weigh maybe 10

pounds each at this point and are as prickly as a cactus, but they are still amenable.

I have enjoyed the pleasure of watching these animals grow from sickly infants to robust young creatures that can still be held in your arms without many very serious problems.


Sleek and beautiful, the black leopard, a melanistic form of the spotted leopard, is in fact spotted, too. At first glance this creature looks almost all black, but get him in bright sunshine and you'll see shining through from the dark background the vestiges of the leopard's spots. I guess this kind of disproves the old adage that the leopard doesn't change its spots.

Let me say a word about the correct use of the term panther. Here in Florida we tend to call our race of cougar the Florida panther. This is wrong in several respects. First: That particular race of cougar was not confined to Florida but ranged over eight southeastern states. Second: The term panther is not really applicable to all cats. The cougar, *Felis concolor*, is the largest of all members of genus *Felis*. The house cat, the bobcat, the ocelot and many other small cat species belong to this genus, and they are not properly called panthers.

The panthers really are the leopard, tiger, lion and the jaguar. All of them belong to genus *Panthera*. You probably don't want to start calling lions and

tigers by the general name panther, but if you did it would be more correct than to call the cougar a

**24 bird nesting boxes await tenants in the Ridge subdivision**

The SCCF built four different kinds of nesting boxes to fill the order and to attract screech owls, red-bellied woodpeckers, flickers and great-crested fly catchers to the subdivision.

**Prescribed burns will blaze on 51 wildlife refuge acres**

Fires will be seen burning during late March or early April on lands of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel. Prescribed burns will be set on 51 acres of the 5,022-acre refuge.

Ralph Lloyd, assistant refuge manager, says, "We are attempting to restore these 51 acres to their historical vegetative condition — that of a spartina marsh." The tool used to accomplish this restoration, fire, is one of nature's most efficient.

Much of Sanibel was once covered with the three- to four-foot-tall, coarse, dense grasses that normally grow along the East Coast. The spartina grasses grow in moist soil areas referred to as spartina marshes.

**REFUGE REPORT**

Lloyd explains. Spartina marshes are valuable to many animals, including Florida mottled ducks, wading birds, rails and the Sanibel rice rat. The Sanibel rice rat is a species

under review for listing as endangered or threatened. Fire lines have been cut to confine the prescribed burns; pumpers and heavy equipment are ready. "We are just waiting for suitable weather condition to begin the burns," Lloyd says.

It will take about eight hours to burn the five-acre and 13-acre sections on the Bailey Tract along Tarpon Bay Road. The tract will be closed to the public during that time. Another day will be used to burn 33 acres west of the American Legion hall along Saibel-Captiva Road.

The burns will be set during the early morning hours. Lloyd explains that the fires will be set at this time because they are easier to keep under control

before temperatures rise and humidity levels lower and, subsequently, vegetation fuel moisture levels go down.

This will be the second year the refuge has used prescribed fire to restore and manage spartina marshlands. Thirty-four acres were burned last year, and marsh plant regrowth and wildlife use in the burn areas has been excellent.

Within the past 25 years biologists and land managers have gained a better understanding of the natural role of fire. Historically, fires occurred on Sanibel probably every few years. Started by lightning and Indians, these fires were nature's way of eliminating dry vegetative litter and preventing hot-

ter, faster, roaring wildfires. But when man came on the scene these historic wildfires ceased to burn.

Fire is also one of nature's ways of returning nutrients back to the soil in a form easily used by plants.

In the end, it seems we are finding that as poet Heinrich Heine once said: "Like a poet, nature knows how to produce the greatest effects with the most limited means."

### Heart Answers



**Arrhythmia**  
Arrhythmia is any irregularity or abnormality in the rhythm of the heartbeat. An abnormal rhythm, or arrhythmia, usually starts somewhere other than the normal pacemaker cells in the heart. Arrhythmias may be caused by disease or injury to the heart or elsewhere in the body, by drugs such as caffeine and by anxiety or nervousness. Arrhythmias may occur without any sensation at all and usually must be identified by recording the heart's activity on an electrocardiogram. Often, no special treatment is necessary to treat or prevent arrhythmia.

**Fibrillation**  
Fibrillation is unsynchronized contractions of heart muscle cells in different parts of the heart which prevents it from pumping effectively. Fibrillation usually starts when cells other than the natural pacemaker cells contract prematurely or out of timing with other cells in other parts of the heart muscle. Fibrillation in the heart's upper chambers may occur with only a 25 percent reduction in the blood pumped, while fibrillation in the lower chambers is far more important because the heart pumps little or no blood. Fibrillation can be treated with drugs and electrical shock. In emergencies the heart can be helped to continue pumping blood by cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) until medical assistance is available.

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
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
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

### HELP FOR HOOKED BIRDS!

Among the most common injuries to birds received at C.R.O.W. are those caused by their entanglement in fishing line. If a pelican grabs your bait when you are fishing and gets hooked, you can help! Please follow the steps outlined here:

1. Reel bird in slowly.
2. If in a boat, use a landing net and boat the pelican.
3. If on a pier, walk the pelican to shore gently.
4. Cover bird's head with shirt or towel to calm it.
5. Hold middle of bill with one hand and place your other arm over bird's back and around wings.
6. Carry bird to get help.
7. Cut line close to hook and get all monofilament off wings, legs and body.
8. If possible, cut barb from hook and back hook out.
9. If not possible to remove hook, place bird in large box or wrap in towel and bring to C.R.O.W.
10. Call C.R.O.W. at 472-3644.



panther  
I think all this misuse of the terms gives us license to call them anything we want. So if you prefer to call our Florida animal a panther, then feel free to do so. Soon in this series I will produce an update on the Florida subspecies, because a lot has happened since our four-part series of last year.

All of Caron's hectic activity was interrupted recently by a new phase in his life when my boss, Cleveland Amory, president of the Fund for Animals, showed up with nearly 200 burros. Two double-deck trucks pulled into Octagon and unloaded this huge herd of horses. (Don't be too quick to criticize my use of the term horses. Burros are members of genus Equus, as is the commonly known horse, and it is perfectly correct to call them horses if you want to. Of course, if you do, you run the risk of yourself being called a monkey.)

These particular burros that Cleveland Amory brought to Octagon all came originally from Death Valley. In that infernal place, their ancestors had been used as pack animals by prospectors during the days of the developing West. But they have gone feral in that region, and various governmental bodies now consider them objectionable and have sought to have them wiped out. Various feral equines as well as goats have been under pressure

from several governmental agencies, the National Park Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Bureau of Land Management.

All kinds of persecution has been the lot of these animals over the recent past. A number of people have been concerned enough to make massive efforts to save these animals from death dictated by the bureaucracy. No one has been of greater influence or has been more caring than Cleveland Amory.

In recent years Amory has taken extraordinary steps to save goats, burros and wild mustangs from slaughter in the several locations where they exist — San Clemente Island, Death Valley and the Grand Canyon. About 12,000 animals have been captured, some of them airlifted out of places like Grand Canyon, and shipped to the Fund for Animals' own Black Beauty Ranch at Ben Wheeler, Texas. There the animals are treated, inoculated and acclimated to a degree. Each is marked with a numbered collar, and from there they are trucked to various adoption centers throughout the country.

For a reasonable adoption fee, one can get his very own pet burro. If you don't happen to have horses or other large domestic animals, you must adopt two of them so that no burro will be without companionship.

Amory tells me that these burros, which represent a living heritage of our Old West, make fine and caring pets. Perhaps they have been netted, roped, driven or trapped or otherwise stressed on their former home on the range, but after a stay at the Black Beauty Ranch under the expert care of manager Billy Jack Saxon, they soon calm down and become used to people, as were their ancestors.

Of course the truck ride from Texas to the adoption station again is stressful, but all of the animals seemed quite all right upon arrival. They settled down in a matter of a few days.

While most of the animals will be gone shortly, adopted as pets into various rural families around Southwest Florida, several will remain at Octagon as permanent guests. Certainly the little one, "Cleveland's Freedom," that was born at Octagon Jan. 27, only five days after his mother walked down the ramp out of the truck, will become a much loved and cherished mascot at Octagon.

Although the burros provide interest for the big cats that watch them expectantly, they have become quite accustomed to the roar of the lion or the cry of the panther, and they hardly look up when an ear piercing panther scream occurs. Even when the

great Kalib grows all is tranquil.  
It is interesting how Caron is able to integrate widely different animal personalities into a group. Though they might be natural enemies (or predator and prey) in the wild, at Octagon all become close and tolerant without any real friction or animosity.

To illustrate this tolerance, even sometimes friendship, that exists among animals of all kinds, let us consider Yoda and her kitten friends. Yoda is a large monkey, a pig-tailed macaque, *Macaca nemestrina*. She lives all alone in a roomy personal "condominium," the mesh floor of which is 1 1/2 feet or so above the ground. At one point in the floor there is a hole, perhaps eight inches square — far too small for Yoda to pass through, but not too big for her to "kitnap" a wandering kitten for her to cuddle and mother. I suppose the first time a kitten is snatched by this powerful monkey it might be traumatic, but subsequent snatches are quite accepted by the kittens and soon, except for feeding time, such kittens remain as the surrogate offspring of Yoda. She mothers them extensively and jumps around the far reaches of her condo as a cat would never leap. Altogether it is a happy relationship for both. One thing you can be sure of — Yoda's foster feline friends never have fleas, which are so common in many cats around these parts. Yoda sees to

that with meticulous care and grooming.  
So with this vast array of carefully tended animals of all kinds, wild and tame, one cannot help but compare Peter Caron with Hugh Lofting's hero, Dr. Doolittle, who spoke so well to all of the animals. Caron, too, communicates extensively with his animals, and to watch him and his friends is a rare privilege.

If you haven't been out to Octagon to see for yourself, I suggest you don't let much more time pass before you give yourself that pleasure. It is best to call first.

Although Octagon is just across the line in Charlotte County, it is on the Fort Myers telephone exchange and can be reached at 656-0579. Or on most Sundays after 11 a.m. try a visit.

Octagon is just a few hundred feet west of Highway 31 on Horseshoe Road. Go out and have a look at the burros and my friend Kalib, and at all the cougars and leopards and the simians. Don't forget to become acquainted with the arctic foxes, those beautiful, fuzzy, white, smiling little creatures with the wonderful dispositions. Some of our own CROW's pelicans can be seen recovering their flight ability as they sail around a pond that Peter created especially for them.

As might be expected, Octagon, an organization

whose arms are always wide open to receive animals in distress, is sometimes in distress itself for lack of funding. So if you think this is a worthy organization, why not consider a donation that would be most welcome and appreciated. A special account called Octagon Trust is set up at Florida First Bank, P.O. Box 711, Fort Myers, FL 33902.

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the island he spent 25 years establishing and working with pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and international coordinator for the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Naturalist-illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and as chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature preserve.

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
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


Though it wasn't the Tropicana or the Golden Nugget, the Sanibel Community Association did its best last week to keep up with the tradition of

## The chamber ensemble goes to school

Discordant notes filled the room as the musicians tuned their instruments. Polite coughs and occasional whispers were heard as the five members of the Chicago Lyric Chamber Ensemble readied themselves for their next performance. But when they began to play, everyone in the audience sat quietly and attentively.

Everyone, that is, except the boys in the back row who were having a perfectly jolly time squeaking their sneakers on the floor.

Last Thursday the five members of the ensemble loaded up their instruments (and in the case of harpist Elizabeth Cinfani, that was no small task) and took them to the Sanibel Elementary School.

The students not only got to listen to some beautiful music, but they learned something about how such sounds are made.

Before getting started, spokesman for the ensemble, Marilyn Lauriente, introduced the eager youngsters to the instruments. Though it was a first-time meeting for some, the group overall seemed to know its winds and strings. For instance, when Lauriente asked what the reed in her clarinet was made of, hands shot up all through the audience. Though the first response — "horsehair" — was incorrect, the answer was quickly revealed to all by an astute student. He knew that not only is the reed made from bamboo, but that the plant grows right here on Sanibel.

The ensemble played a "happy/sad" piece by Anton Dvorak and the children listened for the changes in mood in the music. Next, puppeteer and storyteller and Island resident Bert MacCarry narrated the story "Where the Wild Things Are" to a piece by Prokofiev called "Overture on Hebrew Themes."

Though the music was not written for the story — as in the case of Prokofiev's other more famous work, "Peter and the Wolf" — the wild music kept pace with the action of the story. At the end of the 25-minute program the children were brimming with questions about the musicians and their instruments. They wanted to know, for instance, how much the harp weighed (78 pounds) and how much it cost. Several exclamations were heard when Cinfani answered "\$12,000."

## 'Waste not want not' philosophy leads to creative ways to use leftovers

I believe in "waste not want not." So leftovers at my house are always used; nothing goes to waste. I make a soup or a ragout or even a pate. Sometimes I turn leftovers into appetizers or salads.

One of my favorites I learned from Chef Tell, an ingenious and inspiring chef and teacher.

This is how I stretch my leftover cold lamb, pork or beef:

- Chef Tell's Meat Salad**
- 1 cup cooked meat cut julienne
  - 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
  - 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
  - 1/2 cup cooked green beans or green peas
  - 3 drops of tabasco
  - Salt and pepper to taste

- 1/2 cup diced tomato
- 1/4 cup finely chopped dill pickle
- 1/4 cup tomato catsup
- 1 TBS red wine vinegar
- 1 hard-boiled egg, sliced
- 1 bunch of watercress
- Chopped parsley for garnish

Place the first 10 ingredients in a bowl, mix well. Cover and place in refrigerator for at least two hours so the flavors will blend.

When ready to serve place watercress around platter, put the meat salad mix on the watercress and garnish with the egg slices and the chopped parsley

Another excellent way to use left over beef or lamb is to make a pate:

- Beef or Lamb Pate**
- 1 cup leftover meat, cubed
  - 2 TBS cold butter
  - 2 TBS brandy
  - 3 drops of tabasco
- Put all these in your food processor and blend thoroughly. Pack in a crock, cover and refrigerate. Let sit two days before serving with a melba toast.

I always seems to end up with 3/4-cup leftover spinach or broccoli. With this I make a cream soup:

- Cream Vegetable Soup**
- 2 TSP flour
  - 2 TSP butter
  - 1 cup chicken stock
  - Salt and pepper
  - Fresh nutmeg to taste
  - 1 green onion diced
  - 1 cup light cream
  - Spinach or broccoli
- Make a roux with the flour and butter. Stir until foamy. Add the chicken stock, salt and pepper, chopped onion and nutmeg, stir. Add the spinach or broccoli and stir until it comes to a simmer. Pour into a

blender and add the light cream, blend well. Pour back in pan and bring to a boil and cook five minutes. This can be done ahead and heated up in a double boiler before serving.



## Sometimes what didn't happen is more interesting than what did

This week's hand, played last November in the North American Championships in Winnipeg, Manitoba, is of greater interest for bidding than for play and for what should have happened rather than for what did.

West's odd jump to three notrump was intended to promise a freakish two-suiter in diamonds and clubs without great high-card strength. If West had unusual high-card strength, he would have doubled one spade first and jumped to three notrump later. (Or

so he said.) If he understood his partner, East should bid five clubs instead of doubling four spades. South would double five clubs, and North should run to five hearts.


At five hearts, West took a diamond and then led a club to the ace. South ruffed a diamond in dummy, ruffed a club in his hand, ruffed his last diamond in dummy and then led a heart to the ace, declining to finesse.

Finally, South gave up a heart, and West's return let dummy discard a spade. South then had no further problem.




3. Partner bids one spade, and the next player passes. What do you say?

### ANSWER

Bid two clubs, planning to raise spades vigorously at your next turn. An immediate jump to four spades, the alternative, would promise at least four spades, a maximum of nine high-card points, and almost invariably a singleton or void suit. But it would urge partner not to consider a slam. Since you have an ace, a king and a singleton in the side suits, you don't want to discourage a slam so flatly.

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
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
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

## Lendl makes it two in a row with 1986 PaineWebber title

Ivan Lendl has proven he's king in the Jimmy Connors Tennis Center for the second year in a row.

On Sunday afternoon Lendl rolled over Jimmy Connors in the final of the PaineWebber Classic, 6-2, 6-0. Last year he beat Connors in the finals, 6-3, 6-2. Both years Lendl battered his way through the tournament without losing a single set.

And this year he capped his title by coming on the court 20 minutes after his singles victory and winning the doubles competition with teammate Andres Gomez. Lendl and Gomez defeated Peter Dooohan and Paul McNamee, 7-5, 6-4.

For the day's work Lendl pocketed \$50,000 for the singles win and \$12,500 for the doubles win. Not bad considering the brevity of each match. Lendl needed only one hour and 12 minutes to finish off Connors. And the doubles match lasted only 59 minutes.

"This is an enjoyable position to be in, playing in my own stadium," he said after the match. "I think we saw some great tennis this week, though the final results were wrong. Lendl played well all week.

"But every week is a new week, and maybe I'll get another shot at him next week."

### Shell oddities in color and shape ensure the future of the Sanibel Stoop

The vast spectrum of colors found in our local sea shells attracts many new people each year to walk the beaches looking for shells. But it's often the oddly-shaped shells that keep collectors hunched over in the Sanibel Stoop.

If you are looking strictly for an array of color, one of our most commonly found shells, the coquina, comes in just about as many solids, rays, streaks and odd patterns that you'll ever find.

If you are looking for oddly-shaped shells, there are a few favorites of mine that you might want to add to your collection.

One is the worm shell. I'm not talking about soft, squirming, slippery worms. These are real shells with a hard exterior body. Just like any other true mollusk found around our shores.

Pieces of worm shells look like hollow straws bent into rolling curves. They are reddish to brown when living in the sandy flats of the inside bay waters.

I've never found a living worm shell. The ones we find are washed high on the shell line and have been dead for some time. They are mostly white from aging in the sun or from having been buried in the sand for years.

Recently I found one of the largest I can recall. Even in its bent, twisted form it measured about seven inches.

The most common worm shell around here is the Fargo's worm. You will find an occasional Knorr's worm and one very similar to the Fargo's, called the West Indian worm.

You will also see clumps of worm shells formed into rock-like structures. This is sometimes called

worm coral. These reddish clumps make fine paper weights.

My wife, Carol, looks for broken large worm shells because she can use the one- or two-inch pieces to string together with an inexpensive chain to form a necklace.

Another unusually-formed shell much more commonly found on all our beaches is the pen shell. These look sort of like ice cream cones and can be



six or eight inches tall. Some have smooth sides; others are rough. They are usually amber colored and live with the pointed end in muddy areas of Pine Island Sound.

The real beauty of the pen shell is its pearized interior. Many collectors new to Florida shells say it reminds them of the abalone shells popular on the west coast of the United States.

Pens are easily dislodged from their buried positions along the gulf beaches when large storms sweep into the area. I've seen some beaches on Sanibel so strewn with dead pens that you have to walk carefully to avoid stepping on them. Pens also dig in and live along the beaches.

When you find them whole, pen shells make an interesting addition to any collection. The meat inside pen shells looks a lot like the large scallops that early settlers often ate.

There are flat shells, round shells, spiral shells and just about anything but square ones. That's what makes shelling so interesting.

As you shell this week please observe the suggested limit of two live specimens per person per day. And if you have a little extra room in that shell bag, why not pick up any discarded cans or bottles that less caring people have left on the beaches? Thanks.

## Zen-like meditations secure another title for Ivan Lendl

Ivan Lendl is well on his way to becoming a monk — a high practitioner of Zen Lendlism.

His remarkable calmness, tunnel vision and fluidity as he easily disposed of Jimmy Connors, 6-2, 6-0, show Lendl has come a long way in controlling his emotions. With his emotions in control, he now lets his instincts and incredible athletic power take over. That combination has helped guide him to 25 straight match victories.

If you watch Lendl closely, you can pick up some of "meditations" of Zen Lendlism.

He is very consistent in his serving mannerisms. Dr. Jim Loehr, who might be the high priest of "Zen" tennis, calls this the "ritual."

First, Lendl assumes the serving position. He bounces the ball exactly four times. Then he spins the racquet twice in his right (serving) hand. With his muscles now loose and his attention focused, he smoothly throws the ball high and in front of him before hitting it solidly.

The linesman for the serve, meanwhile, is on his knees like a Moslem on his prayer rug — praying the serve won't be close to the line. Because at this speed, the linesman really hasn't a prayer in paradise of really knowing exactly where the ball has landed.

When the point is complete, whether a winner or

an error, Lendl turns again to his racquet. His attention focuses on his racquet as if it were an incense stick or a laughing Buddha. His fingers the strings, putting them in perfect order.

(This attention to the strings is quite the opposite in the amateur player, who often strums the racquet as if it were a guitar. In that case the focus is outward — looking around, not thinking of tennis. Lendl, meanwhile, is tunnel-visioned. He is a tennis player, not a frustrated rock and roll singer.)

In the PaineWebber, Lendl seemed to achieve Zen Lendlism better in the final than in earlier matches. In a first round match with John Sadri, Lendl was

not quite at peace with himself. Consequently, Sadri appeared Lendl's equal in the first set, which Lendl won, but only 7-5.

In this match, Lendl continually talked to himself — and it was always critical. He once yelled sarcastically at himself after a bad serve: "You're serving like a genius!"

Loehr, who is in fact a well-known sports psychologist, says talking to oneself is most undisciplined.


Loehr has said the more a player talks to himself and the more thinking he does, the worse he will play. The key is to learn how to do things instinctively, Loehr believes.

And that's pretty much how Lendl won this past Sunday afternoon. He turned out the capacity crowd of more than 5,000 people at the Sonesta Sanibel Harbour's center court. He tuned in for his match against the fourth best player in the world, Jimmy Connors.

And the results, for Lendl, equalled near-perfection. For one match at least, he reached the state of "tennis nirvana."

## Take note of these tips for an effective volley

At 7 p.m. this Thursday, March 27, Molly Beardsworth and Paula Scheb of Island Tennis Services will continue their series of free tennis lessons at the Sanibel Recreation Complex courts. People are welcome to come out and learn the stroke of the day.

This week the free lesson will focus on the overhead. And the following weeks lessons will focus on singles and doubles strategy. This week's tip describes the volley.

The volley is any ball you hit in the air before it touches the ground. Although you can volley near the baseline, you will generally volley in the vicinity of the net.

Where you choose to position yourself on the court depends on a number of factors. But generally speaking, halfway between the net and the service line is where most people prefer to volley. You will use the

same grip you use for your groundstrokes. And if you have the time you will cross-over and step with the same foot as you would for your groundstrokes (for a right-handed player, left foot for forehand, right foot for backhand.)

Not only does the cross-over step increase your reach for the volley, it also automatically turns the shoulders slightly. If you do not have time to step, do make sure you have turned your shoulders slightly.

The volley is only a six- to 10-inch stroke. It is a short, compact, punching motion, unlike the groundstroke. For an effective volley, make contact with the ball in front of the body at eye level. This requires bending the knees (for a low ball) and using a firm wrist. The racket head should be above the wrist at all times.

There is no real follow through. All that is required after contact with the ball is a short finish toward your initial target.






