That was the message on Belton Johnson's birthday card signed by everyone at the morning service of the First Baptist Church last Sunday. Johnson celebrated his 90th birthday by being the guest of honor at the service under the revival tent at the corner of Tarpon Bay Road and Periwinkle Way.

Born in Lake Placid, Fla., in 1896, Johnson came to Sanibel in 1901 when his father decided to fish and farm here. In fact, Johnson eventually farmed the land on which the revival tent stands, and his house was on the corner where the Coconut Grove restaurant now sits.

Johnson's message for younger people today: "Accept the Lord Jesus Christ at an early age. I didn't do it until I was 40, and I missed a lot of good times."

Johnson also advised the congregation to "Eat a lot of fish. You know Jesus loved fish - and he loved fishermen, too."

Johnson attended the service with his wife of 44 years, Miriam (below right). For part of the service he sat in a special chair at the front of the tent and even told a joke about a preacher, much to the delight of Pastor Jamie Stilson (below left). "The Lord's not done with brother Belton yet," Stilson said with a smile when the spry 90-year-old finished his tale. Photos by David Meardon.



Causeway plans are everybody's business

Increased tolls. A high-rise bridge. A \$200 annual toll for residents: Windshield identification stickers. Moving the toll booth. Floating a new bond to help finance another Cape Coral span.

While chances are slim that all of these options regarding the Sanibel Causeway will materialize over the next few years, chances are very good that at least one will become reality. And no matter which one it is, it will affect Sanibel and Captiva residents, visitors and those who have or do their business here.

That's why the meeting at 7 p.m. this Thursday at the Sanibel Community Association should be on every calendar and datebook in town.

Lee County leaders, including Sanibel's own Commissioner Porter Goss and County Administrator Jerry Maxwell, will attend the special Sanibel City Council meeting to discuss plans for the Islands' link to the mainland.

It's the kind of issue that fuels rumors among the misinformed or uninformed

When the subject came up last fall talk ranged from fear of a \$7-plus toll for Island residents and a \$40 billion high-rise bridge to the dread of a 'Coney Island-like" atmosphere along the three-mile span if it were opened to the public by moving the toll booth closer to Sanibel.

Perhaps some of those fears were valid. And perhaps they still are. In order to be sure, however, you should attend this Thursday's meeting and hear about the Causeway plans straight from the people who made those plans.

The County Commission is scheduled to vote on the Causeway plan at its regular meeting next Wednesday, April 16. That doesn't leave much time for Islanders to organize if need be — all the more reason we should be as wellinformed as possible.

So set Thursday evening aside and be at the community association by 7 p.m. See you there.

Perpendicular stabilizer saga continues on Captiva

The feud between Captiva perpendicular stabilizer designer and contractor Dick Holmberg and the state's Department of Natural Resources continues.

At 11 a.m. Tuesday, April 8, Holmberg and members of the Captiva Erosion Prevention District board will meet in Fort Myers with the DNR. Holmberg will find out exactly what must be done, and when, to the portions of the sandbags that were judged not to be in compliance with the state's permit.

The meeting is at the request of Holmberg's attorney, Joseph Cardozo of Sarasota.

Two weeks ago Gov. Bob Graham and his Cabinet sided with the DNR and ruled the experimental project did not comform with permit specifications. They said the segments using concrete grout must be taken

"I think they were afraid of siding with me and getting fined," he said about the commissioners. "They want the project, but they have put us aside as guilty

Throughout the tribulations of the stop work order, Holmberg has maintained his innocence and accused the DNR of being in the pocket of the dredging industry and of being unwilling to allow experimental ideas to move forward.

County leaders will meet the Sanibel public to discuss \$35 million plans for Causeway

Lee County Commission Chairman Porter Goss, County Administrator Jerry Maxwell and David Paul, the county's financial consultant, will be on hand at a special meeting of the Sanibel City Council at 7 p.m. this Thursday, April 10, at the Sanibel Comunity Association.

The trio will discuss plans for improvements on the Sanibel Causeway and will present options the county is considering to finance the project, including higher tolls for crossing the

three-mile link to the mainland. City Manager Gary Price said the county has drawn up two toll structure proposals.

Under one plan a decal good for unlimited trips for one year would be available for an annual fee of \$200. A decal for a second car would cost \$100. A \$30 decal would entitle the holder to 20 round trips over two months; a \$50 decal would entitle the holder

to 36 trips over one year. The alternate plan, Price said, also provides for an annual decal good for unlimited trips for \$200 with a second car decal available for another \$100. A decal good for six months would be available for \$30 and would entitle the holder to cross the causeway for 50 cents per trip (the current commuter toll). A \$50 decal good for one year would entitle the holder to cross the causeway for 50

cents per trip. Under either plan the toll for single trips will be increased from \$3 to \$5 for automobiles and from \$2 to \$3 for motorcycles. Tolls will be raised to \$6 for dual axle vehicles, \$7.50 for three axles, \$10 for four-axles, \$12.50 for five axles and \$15 for buses.

Price said Friday he had just received the proposed new toll structure from the county and had not had time to analyze which format would be most advantageous for Sanibel resident.

"A lot depends on where you live, how often you commute, and your lifestyle," he said.

Price was not surprised at the proposed toll increases. The city has already requested the county to consider lowering to \$150 the fee for the annual unlimited trip Price said Goss and the other

The old wooden Bay Drive bridge was closed March 24 when a state inspection revealed further deteroration has made it unsafe for motor vehicles.

The bridge provided access to the bayfront property to the west. Theodore Cross, owner of the property, is willing to use an alternate access from Venus Drive. Property owners in Water Shadows subdivision have granted him a temporary easement to use their

The city's plans to rebuild the wooden span have been on hold since last October.

With the possibility that Cross' easement might be permanent, the City Council is considering two options — repair the bridge for pedestrian use only or remove it completely.

It was on March 25, 1985, that Sanibel residents voted to keep the bridge in public ownership.

West Wind Inn 'sting' operation annoys council

The City Council last Tuesday declined to revoke a development permit for the operation of the Normandie restaurant as an accessory use at the West Wind

Code Enforcement Officer Dick Baker charged that the motel was in violation of a condition of the permit that limited the service of food and beverages to paying guests who identified themselves by showing their room keys.

At least one councilman was appalled at the "underhanded" way the city staff had obtained evidence that the restaurant was serving food to members of the public not registered at the inn. Councilman Francis Bailey said members of the planning staff "sneaking in" to check on the restaurant was "beneath the city's dignity."

Baker presented affadavits from the assistant code enforcement officer and two employees of the Planning Department attesting that they had been served breakfast and lunch without any questions as to their status as guests at the motel.

On the basis of this evidence City Manager Gary Price recommended to the council the strongest

The City Council took no definitive position last week on a proposal to change the procedure for City candidates more time to be known." Council elections.

Bailey objected to moving that date back to March, which would be eight months before the election. This would put an incumbent councilman in a political posi-

One is the change in the election system that picks the winners by a majority vote in individual races to the highest vote getters by a plurality vote. Despite early Easter, 'season' is still upon Southwest Florida

The jury is still out on how this year's early Easter Sunday on March 30 has affected Sanibel and Captiva's winter tourist season.

Easter, with its big rush of families with children on school vacation. traditionally signals the beginning of the end of the winter season. This is also the time when many of Southwest Florida's winter residents begin to pack up and head north.

Many Island businesses reported a busy week after Easter last week. But they also said they expected a big drop in numbers of visitors will occur this week.

The last time Easter came in March was on March 30, 1978. Last year Easter fell on April 7, and in 1984 the day was April 22. Next year Easter will be April 19.

The earliest date on which Easter can fall is March 22. It fell on that date in 1761 and 1818, but will not do so in the 20th or 21st centuries. The latest possible date for Easter is April 25. It fell on that date in 1943 and will again in 2038.

"For us, the season typically ends one week after Easter, so yes, we are affected somewhat," said Al Williams, general manager of rental division for Priscilla Murphy Realty.

"But when Easter is late in April. it doesn't necessarily mean that the season is expanded," Williams added. "We usually just see a few more 'soft' weeks without the big rush of people." Williams added that he originally thought season would die last

The giant crab spider of Sanibel is really a valuable addition to any Island household

For five decades I have observed the interesting lifestyles of the giant crab spider here on Sanibel and elsewhere in the tropical world.

After getting used to living with this rather large spider (which can measure five inches from toe tip to toe tip and can have an inch-long body), I have learned to value it because it feeds upon all manner of insects, including cockroaches of all sizes.

The proper name of the giant crab spider is Heteropoda venatoria. It is also known as the huntsman and is sometimes called the banana spider because it occasionally moves with shipments of the fruit from the tropics to places like New York or

For many years I preferred to call it the West Indian house spider because it is common and valued in households in the West Indies. I recall that at my place in Eleuthera it was very common and was considered a friendly creature with which one gladly shared his home.

However, the name "West Indian house spider" does not really wash because I have recently learned that this animal is Asian in origin, and although it is found pantropically today, it is truly native to Southeast Asia.

The giant crab spider might seem to be quite huge, but its body is actually rather slim and slight, built for speed. And it is very thin from top to

The spider's agility plus thinness enables it to hide in the tiniest cracks in a garage or tool shed. New houses on Sanibel often have large populations of

these spiders, too. They hide in electric boxes and in cracks behind the stove, in broom closets and dish cupboards, etc. But as the new house becomes "lived in." what with the use of sprays and cleaning compounds and other household chemicals, gradually the interior of the house changes into less ideal habitat for this species and the spiders disappear.

But they will persist in your garage or tool shed as long as you let them.

After reading this you should realize the giant crab spider's value and do everything you can to encourage its continued presence. In my own home I have many of all ages and sizes and of both sexes.

If you see a little newly-hatched one, you will understand its common name, crab spider, for it assumes the "arms spread" position of an alert crab stretch, hence from time to time it needs to be as it awaits its prey.

These spiders do not trap their prey in webs as do a lot of other spider species. Instead they depend on their high speed, agility and strong fangs or chelicerae to seize and suck the life juices from the insects on which they feed.

The chelicerae are hollow fangs that inject venom from glands that originate in the cephalothorax but which are attached by means of ducts. This venom is lethal to a cockroach. But it is almost entirely harmless to you or to me if we are bitten by this large spider. Some people are mildly allergic to the venom, however.

I was bitten by what I think was a giant crab spider about 12 years ago. Aside from producing the biggest hive — about 10 inches in diameter — I've ever seen on anybody, it was not painful or particularly difficult to handle. In fact, it was quite an interesting experience.

The animal that delivered this bite was locked in an unfurnished brand new house and had few available hiding places. Consequently, it chose my clothing to hide in.

Although this animal does not trap its prey in webs, it does produce some modest amount of webbing. If you go into a garage or toolshed and look at the ceiling, you may well see suspended on two- or three-inch-long spider webs the cast skins of giant crab spiders.

This animal, in common with all, or almost all arthropods (I've learned from bitter experience not to use the word all when describing any creature) cast their exoskeletons or "skins" occasionally as they grow larger. The chitinous exoskeleton does not

So the almost perfect, dry, hollowed-out, exoskeletons can be seen hanging from the ceilings of sheds or garages very frequently here on Sanibel. The skins are almost perfect in every detail except that the abdominal casting does not maintain the shape of the original animal.

The position of these hanging exoskeletons is usually bottom-up with the eight legs and two pedipalps hanging downward, looking a bit like the skeleton of a tiny umbrella. The nature of the fangs, detail of the cephalothorax and complete understanding of the anatomy of the eight legs can be determined quite safely by examining one of these cast skins. (After all, even under the worst imagined situation, a cast skin cannot bite you.) The fangs also are shed, and their hardened casts are visible



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
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

State archaeologists turn up important finds on Buck Key

A group of University of Florida archaeologists attempted to open a "window" to the past on mysterious Buck Key last week

Dr. Bill Marquardt tossed a shovel of dirt into a mesh screen, then shifted through what remained. He found the bones of many a Calusa Indian feast and several pieces of pottery

The "window" cracked open.
Karen Walker and Cherry Fitzgerald, graduate students in zooarchaeology, carefully scratched around and removed what was to be the "find of the day." It was a smooth piece of bone, curved and twisted in an "unnatural" way.

"But what is it?" the two students pondered. The unusual find opened the "window" just a bit more. Marquardt and Sanibel's Charlie Wilson looked down into another test pit. What they had discovered appeared to be the filled-in remains of post holes. Perhaps this area would prove to have been where a Calusa's "chickee hut" home had been

Up went the "window" a hairlength And in one test pit, the archaeologists dug down through the humus layer of dirt and then all of a sudden came across an unexpected ash layer. A similar layer discovered on Josslyn Island had been hypothesized as a fire hearth.

hearth.

"The people at the University are getting pretty excited about this project," Marquardt said as he shoveled the top layer of dirt and shell from a test site onto a wire mesh sifter "This is one of the major areas we're looking at. And this is the only

ongoing dig now."
Researchers at the
University of FloridaFlorida State Museum
have focused on Pine
Island Sound shell
mounds since about

1983, when they first received a grant to map Josslyn Island. The archaeologists' major digs have included Josslyn Island in the spring of 1985 and Useppa in the fall of that year.

Now add Buck Key, the 315-acre island postled on

Now add Buck Key, the 315-acre island nestled on the east side of Captiva, to the list.

"The Buck Key work has been done because of the support of the Sanibel and Captiva area," Marquardt said. "We've collected more donated funds here than from any other community."

Support for scientific research from the federal government is diminishing every year, Marquardt added. The school applied for a federal grant to push forward with a major archaeological effort in the Pine Island Sound area last year They recently received 40 percent of what they asked for

"We're just fortunate that the sites are well preserved compared to most U S sites — and we're lucky we're getting local donations," Marquardt said

Besides money donations, the group was welcomed onto Captiva with dinners and offers of lodging. The archaelogists boarded with George and Louise Tuttle and Marie Kalman And Mike Janes chipped in to help by using his boat for an equipment ferry




There are two kinds of digging, Marquardt explained. The group on Buck Key excavated in the "quick and dirty" fashion, carefully digging and then scratching out a square meter test site. Then they tossed the material onto a 1/4-inch mesh screen and sifted to find what might be on the site.

"This way, you get a quick window of what's here — the pottery, charcoal, shells," Marquardt said. This material can be then be dated and the archaeologists can decide if it is worth proceeding with the second kind of more detailed excavation.

This detailed excavation entails "flotation," or washing all the dig material in water and using a very fine mesh screen. The archaeologists then identify and quantify each and every shell, bone, piece of pottery,

Boaters cautioned to watch for slow-moving manatees

Lee County manatees are on the move, dispersing from the warm water sanctuaries that have been their home for the winter. And, with the ideal weather we've been having, people in boats are also enjoying our waterways.

The two are on a collision course that will mean death to manatees unless boaters become more careful.

Slow speed zones in manatee sanctuaries such as the Orange River area ended March 31. Now manatees are more spread out. But they are still here in our waters, attempting to duck out of the way before they are slashed by the cutting blades of a boat propeller.

Island boaters should be particularly careful. In an aerial survey last Thurs-

day, state manatee researcher Kipp Frohlich spotted a dozen manatees in Tarpon Bay. Others are undoubtedly spread throughout other waters around Sanibel and Captiva.

"Sometimes boaters try to go fast and get up on a plane to cross over a grassbed," Frohlich said. The manatees, eating on the grass beds, try to dive, but with only three to four feet of water there is no room to escape and they are deeply cut by the boat's

"Boaters should be going slow in the shallow water," Frolich advised. "They can speed up in the deeper

The area is entering the worst season of the year for manatee mortality.

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

Several factors come into play that deaths, but seven came in March alone. make this "open season" on manatees Frohlich has found that May turns out — the nice weather, increasing boating to be the worst month as far as activity and the migration of the manatee mortality. manatees. Several of these factors joined to deaths are unavoidable. cause a sad death on March 31. A boat accidentally ran over a pregnant manatee, killing both mother and baby. The accident also caused significant damage to the 24-foot motorboat.

So far, 42 manatees have been killed in Florida since Jan. 1, 1986. Southwest Florida has accounted for 13 manatee

He believes that some manatee deaths can be avoided if boaters are more aware. But, he adds, with so many boaters using local waters, some

"Whenever there is an accident, boaters really should report it,' Frohlich said. He needs the information for his research, and if reported in time there is a chance that the manatee could be rescued

Former millionaire businessman works to provide housing for poor

Author, lawyer and former families. millionaire businessman Millard Fuller will speak at a public meeting at 7:30 p.m. this Friday, April 11, at the Sanibel Congregational United Church of Christ.

Fuller is founder and executive director of Habitat for Humanity, Inc., an ecumenical ministry attempting to build a better "habitat" for the economically disadvantaged. Believing that the poor "need capital, not charity; co-workers, not caseworkers," Habitat builds houses throughout the United States and in Africa, Central and South America. Asia, the Pacific Islands and the Caribbean.

Habitat dwellings are sold at no profit with a 20-year mortgage. Since-no interest is charged, the houses are within an affordable range for extremely poor

The Lee County Habitat for Humanity project is in Harlem Heights off Gladiolus Road. 14 homes are already completed, and three more are underway. There is another large Habitat project in Collier County in Immokolee. These projects and others in the United States and overseas depend upon people of goodwill to support them. Government funds are not solicited.

In Southwest Florida, Habitat is supported by a large number of churches of all denominations.

Complementing the construction program are the development of backyard industries and clinics, distribution of Bibles and introduction of agricultural and nutritional projects. Habitat for Humanity seeks to implement its mot-

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
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

to: "A decent house in a decent community for God's people in need."

Born in Alabama, Fuller now resides in Americus, Ga., where, in addition to directing the work of Habitat for Humanity, he is partner in a law firm specializing in serving low-income

Before taking on the present challenge, Fuller practiced law in Montgomery, Ala., and was co-founder of Fuller and Dees Marketing Group, Inc., a business which made him a millionaire before the age of 30. Fuller left his business endeavors and divested himself of his wealth. He then directed a \$10 million fund-

raising campaign for Tougaloo College, a black college related to the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Fuller's next change in direction came in 1968, when he and his family moved to Koinonia Farm, Americus, Ga. Here, Fuller and the late Dr. Clarence Jordan began work aimed at dealing practically with the problems of eliminating substandard housing in Sumter County, Ga. The thrust of this new venture was building homes for

the poor on a no-profit, no-interest basis. A revolving Fund for Humanity was created in order to provide money to finance the construction. The initial funds were provided by donations and

has built more than 160 homes in Sumter County for families who other wise would have been forced to remain in their miserable shacks.

The ISLANDER

In 1973 the Fuller family moved to Zaire in Central Africa. Under the sponsorship of the Disciples of Christ and the United Church of Christ, Fuller set up a community development project in the city of Mbandaka based on the Fund for Humanity concept. Later it was expanded to the village of Ntondo. These two projects have seen the construction of almost 275 homes, and the hope is to complete another 400 in the near future.

In 1976, stemming from his success in the Third World and the obvious need for the replacement of substandard housing throughout the world, Habitat for Humanity was incorporated, separate from Koinonia Partners. The projects have expanded to 22 projects in 11 foreign countries and 64 cities in the United States.

Habitat projects both in the United States and overseas depend upon people of goodwill to support them. Government funds are not solicited.

Since that time, Koinonia Partners though the program always seeks good relations with the government wherever it operates. Each project has a Fund for Humanity that receives and disburses funds on a no-profit, no-

How can such a program succeed? Fuller explains: "We rely on the 'economics of Jesus.' How did the Lord feed the multitudes with just five pieces of bread and two little fish? We rely on these miraculous economics and find that they work today."

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
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
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
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So you think the mosquitos are unbearable NOW

In March 1899 a 30-foot yawl, The Gazelle, dropped anchor off a rude landing on Captive Island, its rigging festooned with strips of salted turtle meat drying in the sun. Its skipper, Kenneth Ransome, and his friends, Arthur and Frank, had seen the island as a thin line on the horizon and decided to explore it.

According to A Year In A Yawl, the published version of their adventures (Russell Doubleday, 1921), the three had begun their cruise at St. Joseph, Mich. In the fall of 1898 they sailed, down the Mississippi River into the Gulf of Mexico. They were circling the Florida peninsula when the island we call Captiva came into view.

They had caught a turtle in the open sea, and after a supper of yet more turtle meat and turtle eggs, Frank and Arthur went ashore. They were soon back, pursued by voracious mosquitos, to report that the landing was that of a farmer who grew vegetables for northern markets. Except for the gardens, the island was a morass right down to the water's edge.

Arthur and Kenneth were all for a trek to the gulf beach, but Frank refused. So it was that he stayed with the boat as the other two hit the trail the next morning.

The fields they passed, green with sprouting crops, probably were those of either the Bryant or the Carter families

whose land today is South Seas Plantation.

They walked a narrow strip of high ground which became in the telling a deep morass, uncanny and fearsome: "Tall palmettos grew out of the slimy ground and vines twisted and wound in every direction like thick, green serpents; gray moss hung from the branches everywhere, like veils placed to hide some ghastly mystery."


After about an hour of trudging in the humid heat they reached the gulf beach where they cavorted and sunbathed like any tourist.

It was mid-afternoon before they decided to start back to the boat — but where was the trail? They searched one opening after another only to be barred by a fortress of trees. As night fell they realized they were marooned.

Mosquitos swarmed out of the swamp, virtually covering them and stinging painfully right through their clothes. Thirsty, hungry, itching in every pore, they gathered wood for a smudge fire and stood in the smoke as long as they could stand it. Finally, one man rested while the other waved a palm frond over him. They took turns as such throughout that miserable

As day dawned the mosquitos, like brigands, retreated into the concealment of the underbrush. After a

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

Obviously the situation called for harsh measures. When Arthur and Kenneth began yelling and pelting the dog with shells, the surprised puppy took off like a bullet. Sprinting after him, the two lost men soon found themselves in a clearing where there was a plantation house and a well with a tin cup nearby. Without so much as a "by your leave" they gulped down the cool. clear water and then looked around for the people who, by then, would have been gawking in disbelief at the two strangers clad in dirty, rumpled white ducks.

The people on the plantation would have been Bryants or Carters, either of said; it simply says Arthur and Ken- and Captiva: The Sea Shell Islands.

The men cruised through the Ten Thousand Islands, around the tip of Florida and up the east coast. They went up the Hudson River to the Erie Canal and Lake Huron. After sailing through the Strait of Mackinac they hugged the coast of Lake Michigan to St. Joseph, their starting place.






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

attached to the shed skin. Even the epidermal layers from around each hair is cast.

Except for the fact that it doesn't move and is obviously dead, the casting has all the intricate detail of a living spider except for the indefinable, crumpled, abdominal part that looks like a piece of wadded

A lot of spiders lay their eggs and wrap them in silken sacs and leave them attached to the web, which is mostly used to trap the prey.

The giant crab spiders do not have a permanent home web. Their nomadic habit has caused females of the species to evolve a different method of caring for their eggs and young. A flattened egg sac about 7/8-inch in diameter and perhaps 1/8-inch thick is woven around the eggs. The female carries this under her body. The burden slows her down somewhat during the incubation period and early growth of the spiderlings inside the egg sac. Her normal speedy ability to capture prey is sacrificed, and during the several-week period until the first little spiders emerge and depart on their own, the

mother's own ability to feed herself is somewhat restricted.

Males can be distinguished from females by their longer legs, slightly smaller overall size, and clublike pedipalps. The spider's pedipalps are the second pair of appendages after the fangs or chelicerae. They are just in front of the first of the four pairs of

Giant crab spiders have eight eyes. Most spiders have multiple eyes, some up to eight and some as few as two. I have proved by some experiments that these animals can see very well, but that story will

have to wait until a later time. This species is sometimes confused with the violin spider or the brown recluse, but it is not in any way related nor is it even a hundredth as dangerous. If you have to call it after a musical instrument, call it the "brown lute" because the musical instrument pictured on the dorsal carapace of the giant crab spider is more like a lute than a violin. (You might know that the brown recluse gets its alternative name, violin spider, because just behind its eyes is a

rather well-defined violin design.) In most parts of its United States range, which consists of the southern part of California, Texas and Florida, the giant crab spider is a "domesticated" species that lives in buildings, houses, garages, etc. This is necessitated by the fact that it cannot withs-

tand really cold weather (if it were not within a

building, it would no doubt die). There is in Florida a population of "wild" giant crab spiders that has nothing to do with human habitation. This is down in the southern part of Dade County in the region known as the Redlands. It seldom freezes in this "vegetable garden of America," which is the principal source of United

States vegetables in the coldest part of the winter In this region this introduced spider has become really wild again, occurring in the forests and on trees and in fields where it seeks its prev.

In common with the large spider group known as the wolf spiders, the eyes of the giant crab spider

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

can shine at night. If you hold your flashlight at a very acute angle close to your eye and aim it at the edge of a waterway here on Sanibel, the light will be reflected from many animals — alligators, raccoons, dogs, cats, etc. — as well as wolf spiders.

Wolf spiders' reflective eyes appear blue or more often green. They shine brilliantly, sparkling like beautiful faceted jewels. So do the eyes of the "wild" giant crab spiders of the Florida redlands.


The giant crab spider seems to be firmly established on Sanibel. It is unlikely to disappear regardless of the amounts or kinds of pesticides that are increasingly employed on our sanctuary Island. It escapes the Lee County Mosquito Control District plans because it is usually inside a building where the insecticide "bombs" cannot enter sufficiently concentrated to kill.

So it is up to you whether or not you want to keep these species around your house. I won't complain too loudly if you go about murdering them, but if you do, just remember you are giving a leg up to

cockroaches on Sanibel.

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the Island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the Island he spent 25 years establishing and working with pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and international coordinator for the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Naturalist-illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and as chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature



The cast skin of a giant crab spider looks a bit like a tiny Japanese parasol as it hangs from the ceiling on

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
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

Sailing siblings

Duncan and Channing Boswell are making their mark on the water

Skimming eight-foot sailboats over the water, Channing and Duncan Boswell find themselves literally "blowing in the wind" nearly every weekend.

And now the wind, plus much skill acquired over five years of competitive racing, has taken Channing, 14, to the National Championships for IODA sailboats at Gulfport, Miss. The national competition — six three-mile triangle races in a two-day weekend — will be held this weekend, April

national competition later this year in Rosa, Spain. The United States has approximately 1,000 registered IODA class sailors.

Channing and his brother Duncan, 12, race in about 16 regattas a year all over Florida. Channing qualified for the national championship in a recent two-weekend event in St. Petersburg. And this summer the sailing

brothers hope to compete in Maryland, Connecticut, Rhode Island and even Quebec, Canada. The travel doesn't phase the youngsters. In fact, for them it is one

youngsters. In fact, for them it is one of the best parts of the racing experience.

"I think it's neat to travel all over,"

says Duncan. "But I like the independence out on the water, too."
"I really enjoy the racing aspect—
I like to compete," adds Channing.
And competing means learning how to make a pair of hands act like several pairs as they reach to pull lines, rudders and centerboards.

lines, rudders and centerboards.

It also means having strict physical and mental discipline.

"You never can relax," Channing

believes. "If you lose your attention, you might lose the best wind in your sails and then fall back."

The sport can also be physically tiring, he believes. It can be particularly tough when a sailor has to "hike-out,"

hanging off the side of the boat.

Duncan laughs. He admits he thought sailing was "slow" when he first began learning the sport. Now he feels quite differently. Other active sports he competes in, such as

wedging his feet under a strap and

baseball, really don't compare, he

says.

"I do a little fishing, but no sport compares to sailing — I feel pretty focused on it," Channing agrees.

Sailing might seem "slow," the boys believe, because people automatically think of cruising as yachts sailing off into the sunset.

"But cruising is kind of like using a sailboat as a toy," Channing believes.
Racing both prams and IODA class sailboats is a disciplined sport. In the IODA class races, officials take measurements of at least 39 parts of

the boat, including 13 on the sail

alone, in an effort to make sure no sailor has an unfair advan tage over another.

Therefore, races are won purely by sailing skills and not by any special

technology added to a craft.

And races in each of the IODA age divisions (10 and under, 11-12, and 13-15) are run under U.S. Yacht Racing Union regulations — the same as

the bigger sailboats raced by adults.

Both Channing and Duncan plan to continue racing, travelling whenever and wherever regattas may be held—which is fine with parents William and Jaye Boswell, who have turned the boys' racing experience into a family affair.

"When you are on the road 16 weekends out of a year, it's a family commitment," William Boswell says. "And it's proved to be a tremendous thing for our family. We're together, and everyone is having a good time. While the boys are racing, we're out on other boats watching them or else helping out setting up the race."

When the Boswells travel to Biscayne Bay or St. Petersburg they run into people they have competed with in other waters all over Florida. In some towns the boys stay with sailing friends from that town. And when a race is held in Lee County, such as a pram race off Fort Myers Beach April 19-20, some competitors from the east coast will likely stay with the Boswells

The social life, the travel, the competition — all add up to a wind-filled sail full of fun for the boys.

Channing says the hardest part of sailing is at the beginning. "When you first start you just don't understand ""

But, he adds, "It's been worth every bit of it!"

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

Anything but conventional

Let's get one thing straight right away: artist Chip Hoffman's repertoire does not include painting the Sanibel Lighthouse, the Pirate Playhouse or the Chapel-by-the-Sea. You won't find a single pelican picture in this artist's portfolio. You will find art that is, by the artist's own admission, outside the

Among other things, the Captiva resident is a performance artist — something even he finds hard to put into words.

"To explain performance is like walking into an anthill," says the 26-year-old Rochester Institute of Technology graduate. "It's a cross between theater and art — and usually it turns out being bad theater or bad humor."

The only definitive thing about performance seems to be that there are no guidelines. It could be said that it is live art where the viewer takes part in the artist's actual production of a work.

Instead of channeling his creative energies into some tangible thing, the performance artist creates his idea by acting it out in some way. The audience connects directly to the artist; there is no painting or sculpture creating a barrier between.

Performance can last anywhere from a few seconds to, as in Hoffman's last work, an hour.

"Ordinary Time" was done last year by Hoffman and two other artists in Banff, Canada. Though it was not well received there ("We were raked over the coals," he says), Hoffman was among a number of artists solicited from around the world to contribute an essay for a book about the art of performance The book will be published this spring.

"Ordinary Time" was a culmination of four years' work, Hoffman says, adding that when the same performance was done in Chicago, it was much more

enthusiastically received. The artist describes how he strived to break free of the barriers imposed by "normal" media. "I had been trying to get away from making objects that people could pick up and say 'Oh, that's nice '" He

became serious about performance in 1982. Seemingly always riding on the crest — or running well ahead — of some artistic movement, one wonders at finding Hoffman seated among the lawnmowers, cribs and fishing rods that are part of the inventory of Island Equipment Rental where he has been manager/operator since January.

Actually, he says, "There is never a time when I'm not doing art."

Hoffman's artistic interests go beyond doing performance. As he puts it, "I haven't stopped making stuff you can hold onto." One such thing is paper. The other, while seemingly more tangible than

performance, is not much more permanent as an art form, and no less startling in its effect. Hoffman's "installations" are made with "whatever is at hand to work with" and have been erected everywhere from art galleries to hair salons to a big, new city

He insists his art is not full of heavy messages, but that does not mean he isn't trying to affect his

"Marcel Duchamp said if art doesn't move you it's not effective. There are so many paintings that we walk by and they don't move us or shake us." he

A person would have to be blindfolded not to notice one of Hoffman's installations. They are elaborate affairs built with everything from black plastic to handmade paper. They are seen by relatively few people — indeed, sometimes Hoffman himself is the only viewer of the work. And though their lifespans vary, the installations are usually dismantled after a very short time.

One of his favorites was built in the backyard of a friend's house in California. Hoffman hung several large pieces of handmade paper from trees. Then, from the hills behind the house, he aimed down three slide projectors that contained pictures from the family photo album. He describes the scene of suspended images, which was intended for night viewing, as magical.

The enchanting moment was fleeting and enjoyed by only a handful of viewers, he says. Works such as these do not lend themselves to recording with a camera, and pictures of other installations in his portfolio verify that the two dimensions of a photograph simply cannot do the work justice.

Hoffman says it was just this desire to break out of the conventional boundaries of a photograph that prompted him to pursue a course off the beaten path in the first place.

While still in art school, he tried hanging the huge orints he had done from fishing wire. "But you'd ook at the back and it said Kodak Kodak Kodak." He tried to paint the blank side. But that didn't work

A friend suggested that he try projecting images onto the handmade paper Hoffman was making at the time. The result was better than he hoped. "I said, 'Uh oh, I'm onto something,'" he remembers

Hoffman has been successful at developing his new-found art form. He has been guest artist at a number of schools and has had more one-man shows than he can recall. But he insists that selling is not a function of his art. "I want it to retain its integrity," he says. "I don't swerve for fame or money."

If he did, he probably wouldn't have moved to Captiva. The climate for artwork such as his is generally better in places like Chicago where he came from, or New York City.

But it was the tropical climate that brought him and his artist wife, Beatrice Covne, to Captiva last

Hoffman says he would like to have a local show. And if he does, Islanders who view it can expect to find anything but local scenes. As Hoffman says, there's just no getting around his urge to create unconventional art.

"There is this inert bug in me that, everytime I try to do something straightforward, always screws me up."

Do it 'your way' with the help of a good, basic cookbook

Anyone who can read can cook, but you also have to have a certain amount of imagination and creativity. The fun for me is in planning menus and carrying them through.

The first time I try a recipe I follow it word by word. Then I try it out on the most severe critic in the world, my husband Tom. He is not reticent. If I am not thoroughly crushed by his analysis I will try the recipe again, but this time I do it Our Way. The trial run gives me a sense of timing and how many it will serve. Then I adapt it to our needs, write it up and place it in my

There are literally thousands of cookbooks, but I think very few are worth investing in. To some one just starting out I suggest Rombauers' The Joy of Cooking, one of the best books of this type ever part of it as it freezes beautifully. It makes an ex-serve. This soup will serve about six people. printed. It is clear and concise and full of excellent information.

The others I use frequently are written by the best teacher I ever had, Julie Dannenbaum. Her two most 4 large peeled baking potatoes important books are Julie Dannenbaum's Creative 2 large yellow onions Cooking School and Menus for all Occasions. My 2 small carrots copies are well thumbed. Another two I suggest are 4 ribs of celery Craig Clairborne's The New York Times Cookbook 2 leeks or scallions, white part only and Favorites from the New York Times. He is a 2 tomatoes, stem end removed superb cook and one of the best writers on food in this 4 large mushrooms

If you have any of the above in your book collection 1 medium clove garlic peeled it is an excellent start. I also subscribe to Gourmet and 1 bay leaf to Cooks: the Magazine of Cooking in America. Both 1 TBS salt are full of ideas and fun to read.







While the composition of the mangrove community is radically different from that of a cypress pond, some plant species having a wide range of tolerances can occasionally be seen in both. One such plant is Annona glabra, known commonly as pond apple or corkwood and im-properly as custard apple.

The usual habitat of this small tree is in the fresh water wetlands of the mainland. It has an affinity for soils rich in organic matter such as are found in cypress ponds. Many years before the ravages of the sugar cane industry, the pond apple was so abundant in areas of the Everglades adjacent to lake Okeechobee that these spots were known as custard apple land. The rich mucklands, having a high value for agricultural purposes, were soon cleared of the pond apple stands and drained. Only a few of


the large old trees remain.

The pond apple is commonly a small tree but grows to about 50-or 60-feet tall under optimal conditions. As the tree matures, the trunk becomes swollen at the base and sometimes develops buttresses. A spreading crown casts shade in the summer but the tree is deciduous and loses its leaves during the dry winter Leaves are bright green and leathery and ap

pear alternately on the branch. They are ellip-tical or oval in shape.

Pond apple flowers are very interesting. They open from a triangular bud on a stout drooping stalk. There are six fleshy petals in two series of three each of a pale yellowish white. The three outer petals are marked with a red spot near the base.

The fruit is smooth, shaped like a deformed apple and yellow when ripe. A tasteless, slightly aromatic pulp makes up the bulk of the multicelled fruit. Though the fruit is edible, it is not particularly tasty.

This week's slam is easy if the diamond finesse works, but it looks impossible if West has the king.

In a tournament last year most experts relied on the finesse and lost the slam. Can you find a better plan before you read on?



Night fishing has distinct advantages — and drawbacks, too

Occasionally I get someone who wants to fish at night. There are some distinct advantages and a few drawbacks to this.

Many old-time Floridians who come to the Islands during the summer like night fishing for several reasons. One is that there are fewer people, and more importantly, fewer boats. Commercial fishermen I've talked to say that an outboard running up and down shore or over the flats frightens the fish away. So it makes sense that when there is less boat traffic it should be a little easier to catch fish.

Secondly, the sun plays an important role in fishing. Sun-sensitive people (and you'll be one after a few years down here) try to avoid that intensive time of the day from 9 a.m. to about 4 p.m. It can be brutal fishing from a bright sand beach or in a lightcolored boat.

So many anglers, Floridians and others alike, like to get out after the sun sets. But are there certain fish that feed better at night?

You don't have to look too far for the answer to that during the full moons of April, May and June, when the big tarpon gather at Captiva and Boca Grande passes to gulp crabs and fish.

I have a very good snook fishing friend who is gradually getting away from day fishing in favor of evening or late-night angling. He's done quite well on snook, getting nearly one per day on average all the way through March. He is convinced that snook are less cautious and more inclined to charge lures and



plugs when the sun is down. This time of the year is a good time for shorebound anglers to get into the night fishing scene. because there are very few biting bugs. That's a major consideration during the summer.

So fishing at night can be easier, less crowded, more peaceful and more productive. How about the other side of the coin?

Have you ever tried to hold a flashlight in your mouth while you tied a knot in a clear line? Usually, you nearly swallow the light and then go back to your car to tie the leader while sitting in the driver's

Night fishing presents lots of visual problems. If you fish around a lantern you destroy your night vision, so the only thing you can see is the light. Casting to any specific spot in the dark also

presents a challenge. Three people fishing from a boat in the dark is about as dangerous a situation as you want to get into. If one of them doesn't step on

you, then he will do doubt hook you with a cast. Getting out on a boat at night requires two important elements. One is a thorough knowledge of the waters and the other is very good night vision. About 2 percent of all anglers have both these assets; the rest end up on sandbars for the night, ram docks or other boats, or just plain get lost until daylight.

But one easy way to fish at night is from landlocked structures such as bridges or piers. We have both around Sanibel and Captiva. One is the public fishing pier at the Lighthouse end of Sanibel; the other is at the Blind Pass Bridge between the two Islands.

You can carry lights to help you see, and when the weather is less than great you don't have to worry about getting home in a boat. And neither the Lighthouse pier nor the Blind Pass Bridge is very far from any spot on either Islands.

Many anglers lower a lantern to water level to draw bait and then hope a snook, trout or who knows what will swoop in and grab a baited hook. I like live bait, particularly pinfish. They are a little hard to get, but I think the Bait Box on Periwinkle Way near Causeway Road has them now. Expect to pay about \$3 a dozen. Work them on the bottom and hang on. And remember: don't swallow the flashlight.

Don't expect miracles if you decide to try nighttime shelling



In "On the Water" this week I talk about the perils and advantages of fishing at night. But did you ever wonder if you could do better at finding shells at

One summer several years ago South Seas Plantation on Captiva Island was in the middle of a beach renourishment project. There we saw one of the strangest sights I can recall in shelling.

I had a fishing party out for an early morning trip. Around 5 a.m. we came out Redfish Pass and headed south in the Gulf of Mexico. Down the beach 1/2-mile or so was what looked like a tiny city of

The dredge was pumping sand in from a bar a couple of hundred yards offshore and spewing that sand and shell on the beach along the South Seas golf course. There had to be 100 lights — flashlights, lanterns, who knows, probably candles, too — all in the hands of people looking for shells.

You have to remember that at that time of the morning you don't see too many people, let alone

lights. It went on like that for most of the summer, until the dredging was over.

Lots of people who live on the south side of Sanibel tell me they get up for a glass of water or whatever in the middle of the night and see people passing their condos at any hour of the night holding lights and looking for shells.

But do these nocturnal shellers find anything you and I might not find when we work the beaches during the day?

And in connection with that thought, do certain kinds of shells appear at night and not in the day? The major advantage of shelling at night is that you might have first chance at shells just being washed up or uncovered during the darkness. Obviously, winds and waves work at night, too, so yes, you can make a few good finds - if you work at it.

In the days of live shelling these people would work the Causeway islands with lights, looking for lettered olives, king's crowns, sunray venus and whelks. It appears that some shells are not tolerant of the sun and only feed and move at night. These were the targets of the live shellers, and thanks to their efforts you'll find fewer and fewer of these shells on the Causeway islands and flats.

I know a lot of you are very serious about finding better shells, but I hesitate to send you out at 2 a.m., light in hand, expecting to find miracles.


If you want to get out for a walk to try and work off that large dinner, or if you want to gaze at the moon, then that's a different reason for shelling and you have my best wishes. Otherwise, I suggest getting up just ahead of

sunrise and being out on the beaches by that time.

Right now, you should be working the beaches by 6:30 a.m. if you're that serious about it. If not, get
