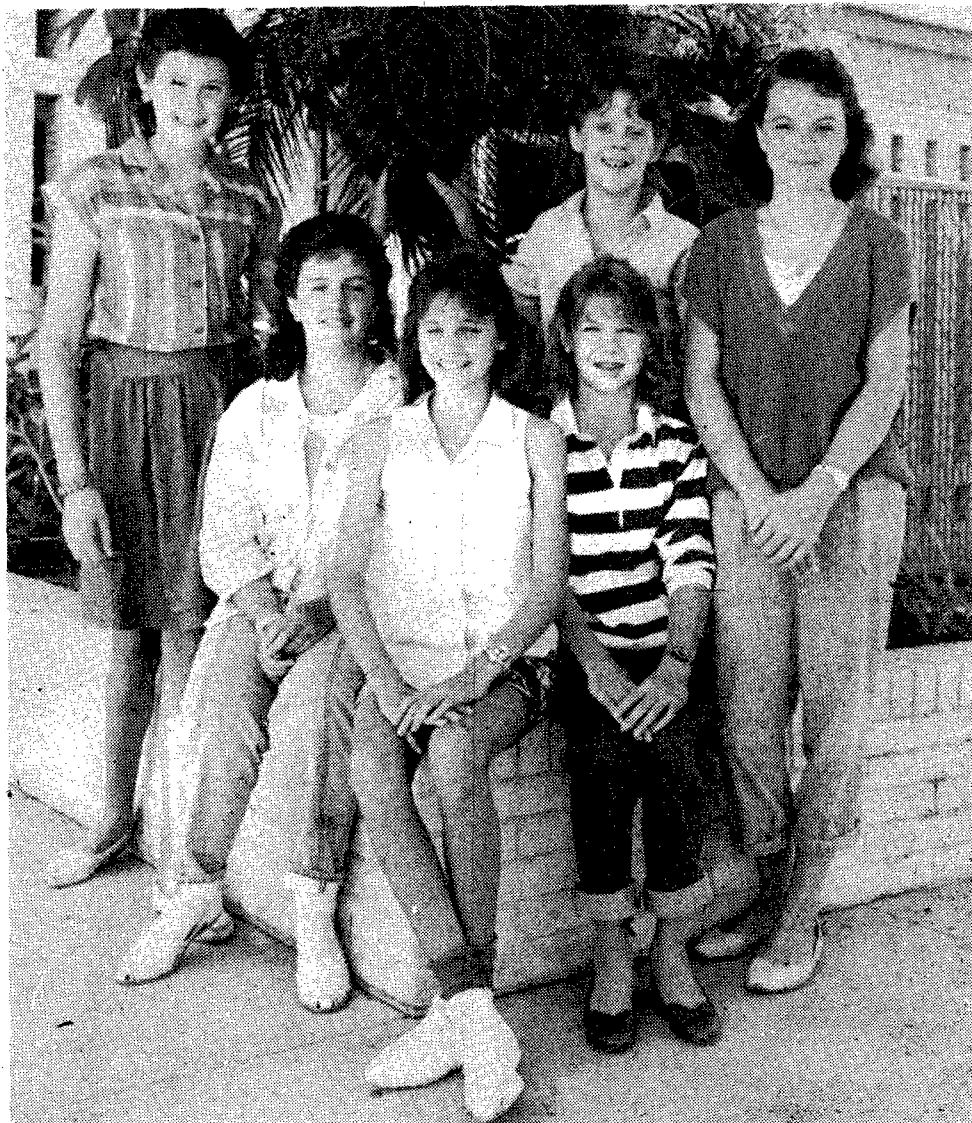

Honor society calls for more than scholastic smarts

Eight Sanibel and Captiva students at Cypress Lake Middle School were "tapped" this past Tuesday. In what is traditionally a surprise ceremony, these Island youngsters were among 47 students inducted into the National Junior Honor Society.

The Islanders were Tara Friedlund, Renee Elland, Kristi Stahnke, Susannah Stern, Carrie Weaver, Eric Rizzo and Adrian Jones. Jennifer Traucht, whose

parents both work on Sanibel and whose grandparents live on the Island, was also inducted into the society.

"There are a lot of smart kids here, but it takes much more than just scholastics," said Joan Stickles, who with Mary Lease helps guide the Junior Honor Society.

The students first need to establish a 3.5 grade point average (a 3 is equal to a B; a 4 is an A.) And once they qualify with grades, they are judged by five other factors: citizenship, scholarship,

leadership, service and character. Then they are voted on by the school faculty.

Every year on the day of the induction, eighth grade members of the honor society go to the seventh grade classrooms and "tap" the shoulders of those who will join the society. These students are then led to the cafeteria, where parents and faculty have gathered for the candlelight ceremony.

Out of a total school enrollment of about 850, 60 belong to the National Junior Honor Society.

Now that the Islands are cleaner than ever, let's all do our part to keep them that way

Island residents caught up with — even passed — the tourists last week in the effort to rid Sanibel and Captiva of litter.

Saturday morning 145 Islanders turned out to pitch in for the Great Island Pickup. Those residents, and the 20 who participated in the newspaper's weekly anti-litter campaign that started Jan. 1, join 114 visitors who participated in the weekly effort this year.

That's the kind of tourist we welcome to Sanibel and Captiva, the ones who are as filled with Island pride as are those of us who live and work here.

Of course there are "bad" tourists, just as there are "bad" residents. They both go right along with bumpy bike paths, too many bugs, too much rain, too high humidity, and indistinguishable seasons — those typical Florida targets of complaints and ridicule from all sides sooner or later. But that's not who or what we are talking about here.

We're talking about the folks from California, Minnesota, Iowa, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Tennessee, New Jersey, Missouri, Colorado, Ontario, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin,

Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Connecticut who took time from their brief Island respites to gather litter from our beaches, bike paths and roadsides.

They came on bicycles and in vans, convertibles and station wagons to unload their hauls at our office in exchange for a t-shirt or subscription.

They were young and old and in-between. They were husbands with wives, grandparents with grandchildren, brothers with sisters, mothers and fathers with sons and daughters, school friends on spring break.

"Here comes more trash" rang from the front desk in our office more often than "Who wants something from the B-Hive?" every day (and that's a bunch of times) over the past 3½ months.

We're not complaining. But with the Great Island Pickup behind us and with the Islands perhaps cleaner now than they've been all year, we are going to discontinue our weekly campaign.

Season is winding down and the crowds are going home in the same droves in which they arrived several weeks ago. We expect litter to be less apparent, but we also know it won't disappear altogether. That's why we hope the promise of a t-shirt or a subscription and a photograph in the paper was not the motivating force behind the 130-plus people who chipped in from week to week this year.

The objective of our weekly campaign was two-fold: First and most obvious, we wanted to clean up the Islands. And second, we wanted to raise everyone's awareness that litter is indeed a problem here, but that it doesn't have to be.

One of the most common refrains from participants in the weekly clean-up this year went something like this: "If only everyone did a little bit to keep the Islands clean ..." We couldn't say it any better.

We already know of many "unsung heroes" who quietly clean up their own neighborhoods and stretches of beach every week without any expectation of recognition or praise. They do their part because they love their Islands — and they do it faithfully, whether anyone sees them or

thanks them.

Please do your part, too. Don't ignore that discarded soda can, beer bottle or fast food wrapper at your feet. Pick it up. Feel sorry for the poor slob who had the mentality to leave it there in the first place. But then feel proud that you had the mind to do something about it.

There's just no easy way to eat corn on the cob

There's only one way to eat corn on the cob — in the privacy of your own home.

It's next to impossible to eat corn on the cob gracefully in public. The other day I was having lunch at a nearby eatery that specializes in homegrown vegetables. The family at the next table had fresh corn as part of its meal. What a mess. I felt sorry for the waitress who had to clean up after them.

Did you ever watch someone eat corn on the cob? Maybe I should say did you ever watch someone eat corn OFF the cob.

In the first place, corn on the cob must be steaming hot so you can slather it with butter. That means it's too hot to hold. You can try these cute little things you stick in each end, but once you get them in right the corn is cold. There just is no easy way to tackle a hot corn cob.

After a few shakes of salt and pepper, the father carefully picked up his hot cob with two fingers of each hand. I could see the steam seeping as his mouth hit the corn cob. It looked like his lips began to sizzle. After the first bite, he placed it back on the plate. It was too hot to handle. In a few seconds he gingerly picked it up again. This time he blew on it like he was playing a harmonica. Up one side and down the other. Meanwhile the two children were busy eating other things on their plates. Mom was busy buttering her

corn and that of the children's. She salted and peppered, too.

Boy of about 10 couldn't wait any longer. He picked up his ear and with cob in the immediate left position, in one swift motion, went across the entire cob without stopping. His method reminded me of a typewriter carriage. His mouth was so full, he lost some down the sides.

Mom finally decided the cob could be handled. With her left hand, she stood the cob on its end and sliced all the corn off. That's probably a very graceful and mannerly thing to do in public — but she made a mess. Twice the cob slipped on her plate and kernels went flying across the table in all directions. One kernel landed in her eye. With most of the kernels off the cob and on her plate, she then ate her vegetable with a fork. No fun in that.

The daughter, about 7, still hadn't touched hers. "Eat your corn" dad said. "I don't like corn," she said. "Eat it anyway." She grabbed it with her right hand, fingers gripping it like a baseball bat. With no pattern in mind, she sunk her teeth into the center of it and took a small bite, then moved to the left and took another. She'd had enough corn for one day.

Probably one of the most difficult things about eating corn on the cob in public is waiting until you are in private to clean your teeth. Cleaning your teeth at

Now is the time for Islanders to relearn the art of 'beaching it'

I told you we would survive. It wasn't always easy — living on the Islands in Season. Some of us lost minor parts of our sanity in the shuffle. That is why it is important to arrange some mental restoration time after the worst of Season has blown over.

The best place to look for that small change in lost perspective is on the beach. Yup, right here on the Islands. After all, people pay hundreds of dollars a day to do what we can do for free. Why travel to some far away place and risk hitting another tourist season?

The problem with vacationing here on the Islands is that Islanders — while avoiding the beach during the rape-and-plunder months — often forget how to beach it. We were at one time in our lives professional beachers. We could tell before we opened our eyes each morning whether it was a sunscreen factor six or a sunscreen factor two day. We could be ready to go to the beach in five minutes flat; our beach bag was ever-packed.

You figure you'll need some reading material: Something inspirational like Gift From The Sea, the newspaper, a shell book is a must, and something light for when you really get down to relaxing.

If you get tired of reading, you will need other diversion. Pack the Frisbee, the Hackasack, the backgammon board, a deck of cards and the cribbage board, a pencil for the crossword puzzle, a pad of paper for any earth-shattering revelations that come your way (happens all the time on the beach), a ghetto blaster with just a few favorite tapes and



some needlepoint.

Then there are the necessities: A six-pack on ice, a couple of sodas for chasers, number four sunscreen for your face, number two with oil for your legs, a lounge chair for reading, a towel, a pillow, an inflatable raft, a snorkel and a mask. Don't forget a swimsuit with matching beach cover-up, matching sandals and contrasting visor.

Two hours later, you have it all strapped on in imitation of a Jamaican beach vendor. You are ready to have a perfect day on the beach. If the sky hasn't clouded over yet.

Now let's jump ahead to day seven for a quick study on beach conditioning.

You roll out of bed. It's your last beach day. You don't even bother to look at yourself in the mirror. You are still wearing your bikini from yesterday. You grab a day pack containing a crusty towel settled in with five pounds of sand and shells. You grab one cold beer from the fridge and wrap it in a coolie cup. You are at the beach before the serious shellers are even putting on their angel treads.

What happened in the lapse of five days? What has so drastically changed your beach-going ritual? It's the beach itself. It has claimed you.

When you got to the beach on day one, you were so exhausted from playing pack animal that you stretched out on the sand with your towel as a pillow. The waves murmured rhythmically and you

remembered how soothing it is just to lie at the edge of the sea and gaze at the clouds. A flow of poetry trickled through your brain. But you could not, did not want to write it down. It would have stifled the flow, stilled the murmur, disrupted the rhythm of the sea.

The beach claimed you. It became a self-enclosed world that stretched as far as your eye could see, allowing self-scrutiny while widening your horizons. You heard music that had nothing to do with the cassettes still in their cases. You could not move, let alone throw a Frisbee. The beach claimed you and you became as pure as the white sand. Life and its properties fell in line like baby sandpipers following their mama.

Maybe you took a walk on the beach that first day. Maybe you just lay there for hours, forgetting to apply sunscreen, forgetting to turn for an all-over tan. You jotted down a few random thoughts, as difficult to corral as the breaking waves. Once home, your paper-trained words seemed as lusterless as a scallop shell abducted from its sea-licked home.

As the week passed, diversion seemed less and less necessary. The beach entertained, the beach mesmerized, the beach claimed you.

Island-long lines of traffic and high blood pressure become things of the past. By the end of the week you can re-enter the mainstream of life with a smile on your face and all parts properly adjusted. Ready to face the summer trade.

Phone book proceeds benefit museum

"Buy a Sanibel phone book, help preserve Sanibel history." Such a saying could have been a motto for the Sanibel Police Recreation Club this year.

The club puts out the directory each year. And this year, they've donated \$2,000 from book sales to the city's Historical Preservation Committee.

"They're coming to our rescue," said Sam Bailey, chairman of the committee that is funded partially by the city and partially by private donations.

Bailey said the money is earmarked for the Island Historical Museum,

where Lt. Ray Rhodes and Sgt. Jack Primm passed the \$2,000 check to Bailey last week.

"\$2,000 is obviously not enough to do what needs to be done, but it's a big step," Bailey said. "The building wasn't built yesterday."

The circa 1913 building was once the Periwinkle Way home of Sanibel pioneer Clarence Rutland. The city and private donations helped move and refurbish the home to its current City Hall site in 1983.

"We now have to take care of two major problems — painting and a leak in the roof," Bailey said. He added the committee will welcome new members at any time.

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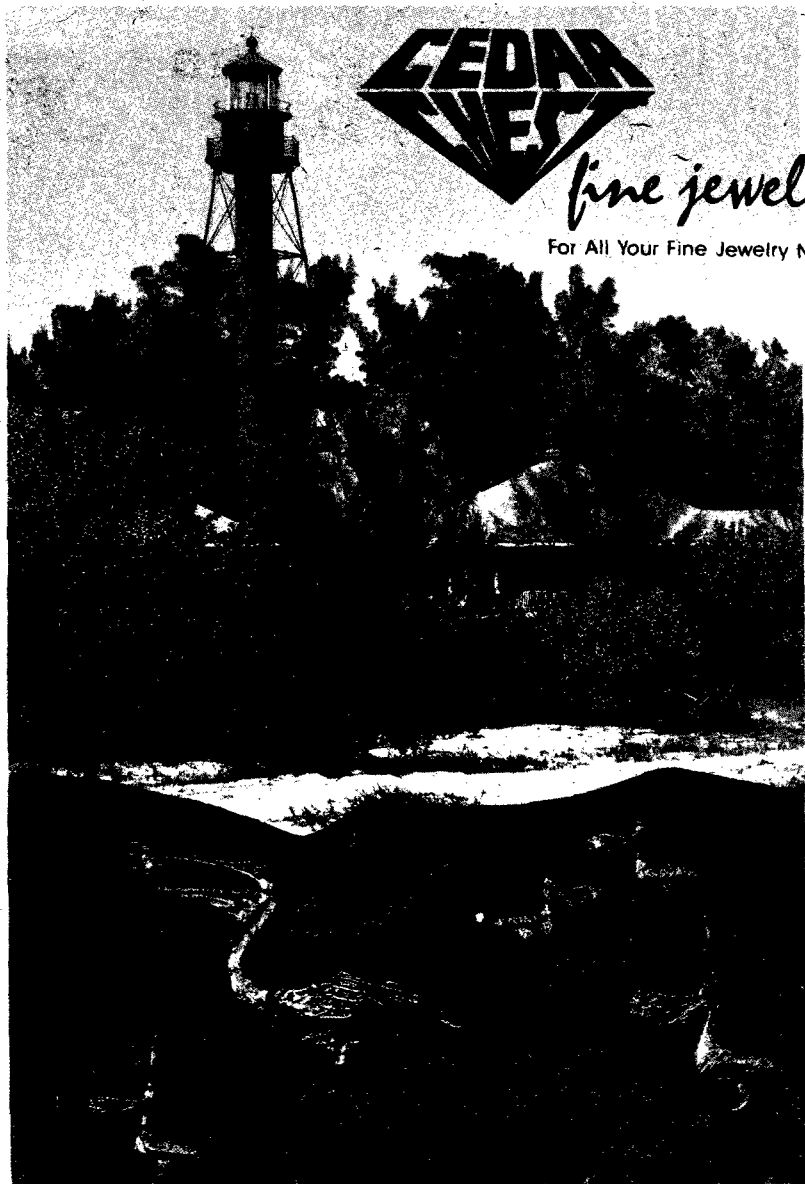

Islanders remain leery of county's \$35 million Sanibel Causeway plans

Despite repeated assurances from Lee County Commission Chairman Porter Goss that "not one nickel" of Sanibel Causeway toll revenues will be used to build new bridges for Cape Coral, many Islanders remain unconvinced.

Goss, a former Sanibel mayor, made his commitment at a special meeting of the Sanibel City Council last Thursday night. More than 450 Sanibel and Captiva residents attended the forum at the Sanibel Community Association.

Goss told the standing-room-only crowd that he would stand on his 15-year record on the Islands of not breaking promises.

But a statement by County Commissioner Mary Ann Wallace added fuel to the skepticism. "I am totally opposed to this financing proposal because it is my belief that under this plan the people of Sanibel will be financing the Cape Coral bridge," she told the packed house.

Goss, County Administrator Jerry Maxwell, county financial consultant David Paul, and bond counsel George Nickerson had been invited by the council to explain the mechanics of financing the combined bond package to fund an estimated \$35 million Sanibel Causeway improvement program and a \$35 million parallel bridge to Cape Coral.

Paul explained the county can save millions of dollars by combining the projects because the bonds will be considered less risky and therefore will carry lower interest rates.

Paul reinforced Goss' contention that Causeway tolls will be used only to repay the bond used for Causeway improvements. Money to repay bonds sold to build Cape Coral's parallel span will come from tolls that will be imposed on the existing Cape Coral bridge, he said.

The county presentation also included outlining two schedules for higher Causeway tolls that will be needed to pay off the bonds.

Councilman Fred Valtin won applause when he said his concern was not for the increase from \$3 to \$5 for the single trip toll, but for the commuter rate hikes.

Under the current set-up commuter books of 20 tickets that are valid for two months sell for \$10.

Under one of the new proposals a car decal good for unlimited trips for one year could be purchased for \$200. A decal for a second car would be available for \$100. Cars bearing such decals would use a special non-stop lane at the toll booth. A \$30 decal would provide 20 tickets good for two months, while an annual decal good for 36 trips would cost \$50.

Under a second option a decal good for six months could be purchased for \$30 plus 50-cent toll for each trip. A decal for one year would cost \$50 plus 50 cents per trip.

Valtin was also concerned that the higher tolls were to be in place by the first of the year, but the proposed improvements to the Causeway would not become a reality for four or five years. The im-

provement plans include replacing the drawbridge with a four-lane, high-rise span.

Goss had pointed out that the use of decals would cut down on the transferring of ticket books among off-island tourists, which constitutes a violation of the pledge to the current Causeway bond holders.

Islander Tim O'Brien and others in the crowd said they didn't care if the coupon books were passed around. Many said they thought the decal system was unfair.

More concern was voiced about the extent of the Causeway improvements than about the higher tolls.

Many residents said a high-rise bridge with higher approaches might solve the problem of flooding on the Punta Rassa side but would do nothing for flooding on the spoil islands.

They agreed with Andy Seipos that in an evacuation a high-rise bridge would be no help if the road off the island were flooded.

The elevation of the roads on the Causeway islands should be raised, the crowd seemed to agree. But most did not favor four-laning the two lower bridges.

In her opening statement Mayor Louise Johnson said there was informal council consensus that a high-rise bridge to replace the deteriorating drawbridge is desirable. But four-laning the entire Causeway Road and the lower bridges would put pressure on the city to four-lane Periwinkle Way, she said.

The council was also opposed, she said, to moving the toll booth to the Sanibel end of the Causeway. With free access the Causeway recreation area might turn into a Coney Island, she explained.

Goss assured the council that the commission had no intention of moving the toll plaza.

In fact, he added, the prime purpose for Thursday night's meeting was to find out what the people of Sanibel and Captiva want.

Goss said the proposed interlocal agreement between the county and the city for future Causeway management would guarantee Sanibel \$200,000 annual revenue from Causeway surplus funds.

Though Thursday night's meeting apparently did not allay all Islanders' misgivings about the county's proposed plans, Johnson called the interchange worthwhile.

"County representatives came out and tried to explain and answer questions," she said. "And the public had an opportunity to express their opinions."

There is still time for council input and negotiations for further changes, Johnson said, since final County Commission action on the Causeway toll structure and the consolidated financial plan is not scheduled until July 23.

This Wednesday the commissioners will vote on a resolution authorizing a change in the tolls, County Administrator Maxwell emphasized.

Johnson said the council was relieved to learn the morning of the meeting that tomorrow's action by the commission would not include the adoption of the new toll structure.

Need for commercial revisions questioned

Planning commissioners have been looking for input from the business community on possible changes to the city's commercial regulations.

At last Tuesday's continuation of a discussion on the city's objectives for commercial development, they were not disappointed.

Don Bissell, president of the Sanibel-Captiva

Chamber of Commerce, questioned the need for any changes. He did not agree with the planners' basic premise that Sanibel has become a destination shopping center, and he said he doubted that it ever will become such.

Bissell also was concerned whether the accepted notion that there are already "too many tourist-oriented" businesses on the Island was based on an analysis of shoppers and traffic.

He asked, too, how "tourist business" was defined. "I have a feeling there are a lot of people guessing and listening to each other when what we need are real facts," Bissell said, adding "What we need is a data base from which to operate."

Planning Director Bruce Rogers acknowledged that a professional traffic origin-destination study was desirable. He said he would be seeking City Council approval of funds for such a study in connection with investigating the feasibility of a northern by-pass to relieve traffic congestion on Periwinkle Way.

At last Tuesday's discussion Rogers asked for commission opinion on a series of issues involved in setting

policy for regulating future commercial development. The commission reached consensus on the following:

- There is no need to zone additional land for commercial use.
- Maximum floor area ratio will remain at 12 percent in the Town Center District, 10 percent along Periwinkle Way and 5 percent on properties with less than 100 feet road frontage. There should be no bonus given for pure office development.
- Developed area of 50 percent is an acceptable standard.
- Uses approved in Special Use District should not include those that are permitted in any other commercial district.
- Regulations for non-conforming uses and accessory uses in the Resort Housing District will remain the same.
- Regulations for home occupations should be reviewed, but setting up an "exclusions list" is not the proper approach.

The commissioners agreed that commercial

development that depends upon the preservation of Sanibel's natural assets is the primary attraction of the Island, not commercial recreation. They also agreed that retail development is necessary to achieve an acceptable balance between residential and resort uses on the Island.

They also were in accord that there is a need to prohibit certain commercial recreation uses (such as game rooms and video discos) but to permit others (such as golf courses) as conditional uses. There is also a need to continue to permit food and beverage establishments as conditional uses because of their special parking and waste water requirements, they said.

But there was a parting of the ways regarding the need to prohibit gift shops and boutiques in the Town Center Commercial District, which is designed to provide residential-oriented services.

Commissioner Bill Webb called it "over regulation" and opposed such limitations. "What's wrong with a t-

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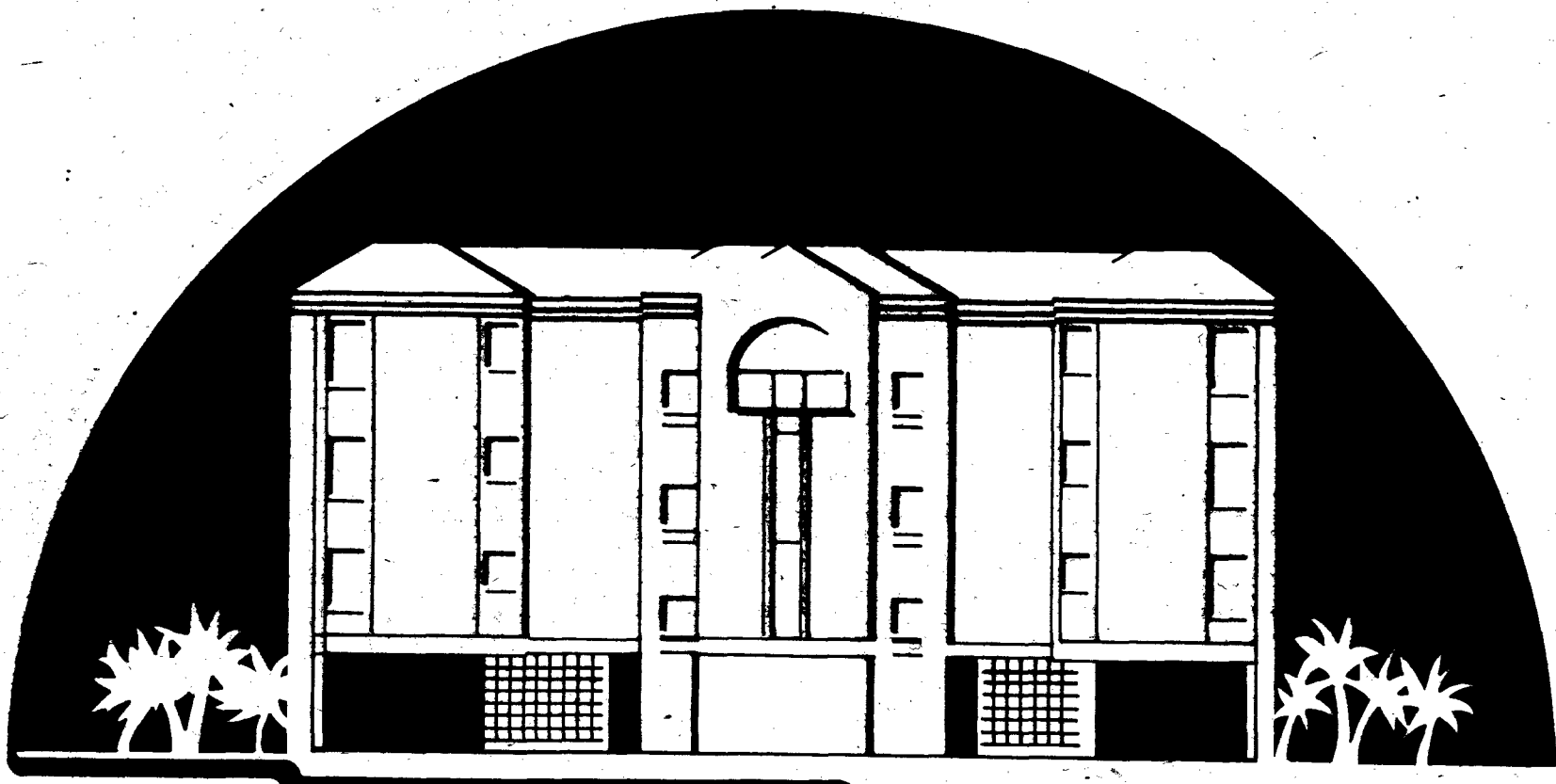
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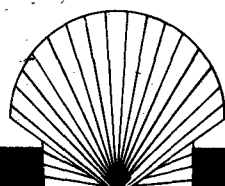

shirt shop?" he asked. "A lot of year-round residents buy t-shirts."

Commissioner Mark Westall said there had to be some form of control on the number of businesses that cater to visitors rather than residents. "Right now there's only one place on the Island that carries men's underwear," he said.

Nancy McNamara, who with her husband hopes to open a business on Florence Way in the Town Center, said her idea of the area was a "fun place" where shoppers could walk from store to store and buy an ice cream cone or a shell — "not a staid, cold district of offices and service-oriented stores."

The commissioners also agreed on the need for vegetation buffers to screen shopping centers from the street and from adjoining property. The current standards are adequate, but stricter enforcement is needed, they said.

It was commission consensus that it would be impractical to try and set architectural standards for commercial

buildings, or to try to regulate the rate of commercial growth by setting a cap on the number of new developments or certain types of commercial uses permitted annually.

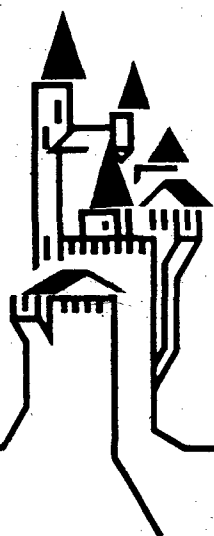
There is a need to regulate outdoor lighting at commercial establishments and to require existing lighting to conform with new Land Development Code regulations, the commissioners said.

The commissioners were open-minded about revising sign regulations. They opted to wait until details of current specifications are researched.

Input from the commission will make the staff's task of drafting an ordinance encompassing proposed changes in the current commercial regulation easier, Rogers said.

The ordinance will be ready for review by the commission at its April 22 meeting.

Representatives of the chamber of commerce and the business community are invited to participate in the discussion.



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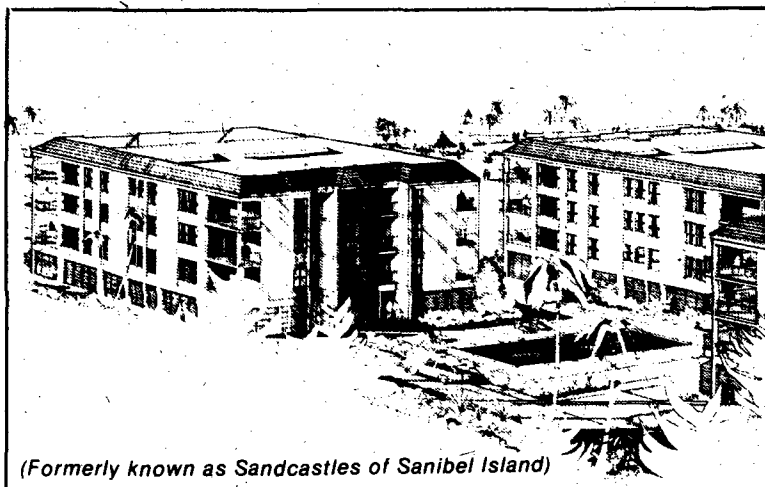

Overhanging pine hangs up insurance coverage

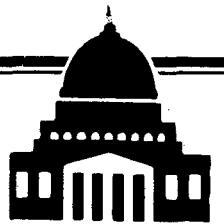
Recent EROSION ALONG THE GULF BEACH IN FRONT OF SANIBEL SUNSET CONDOMINIUM has left the root system of an Australian pine overhanging a portion of the beach used by the public.

Mark Anderson, contractor for the project now nearing completion, told the Planning Commission last week his insurance company considers the situation a hazard and a liability problem. The company has refused to underwrite insurance for the complex until the tree stump is removed.

But the city's vegetation standards prohibit removal of tree stumps forward of the Coastal Construction Control Line. On this basis the city manager denied Anderson's request for a vegetation permit.

But without insurance coverage,

Anderson said, he is stymied in completing the condominium documents the city requires before a certificate of occupancy can be issued.

Last Tuesday Anderson appealed to the commission to review the permit denial and sought guidance on how to solve the problem.

Commissioners Bill Webb and Mak Westall, the commission's vegetation experts, said there would be no negative impact on the beach by removing the stump.

"It will eventually get washed away

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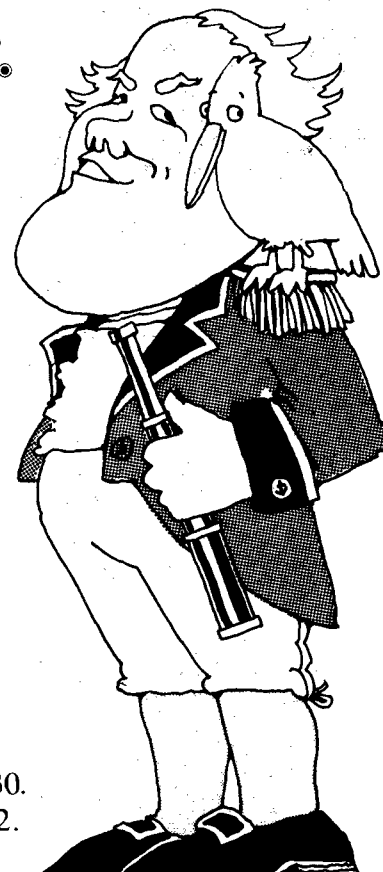

by nature anyway," Webb said.

Westall said he could see no problem in using a backhoe to pull the stump out as long as the machinery was kept off the dune itself.

Commissioner Jerry Muench reminded Anderson he would need a permit from the state Department of Natural Resources to use a backhoe.

The commission voted 7-0 to recommend that City Council approve issuance of a permit for Anderson to remove the stump with the provision that if machinery were used it would not invade the dune.

The council was scheduled to act on Anderson's appeal at today's regular meeting.

● Developer John Van Heemst will be **SIX MONTHS LATE** PROVIDING

THE FIRST BELOW MARKET RATE HOUSING UNITS for Island residents.

Last fall when he initially requested a development permit for a 14-unit multi-family complex on Wooster Lane that would include four BMRH rental units, Van Heemst expected to have the project ready for occupancy by Christmas.

Last Tuesday, nine months later, the Planning Commission approved a development permit for the construction of two five-unit condominium apartment buildings and two duplexes pledged to the BMRH rental program.

Dr. Dorothy Newman, executive director of Community Housing Resources, the foundation that administers the BMRH program, called it "an important day for the city and the community — a good beginning."

Newman pointed out that Van Heemst's four units were the first of a total of 21 in the works to be approved for construction.

The four one-bedroom, one-bath apartments will be available for rent for \$300 a month to Island residents who qualify under the BMRH criteria, she said. No subsidy from the city will be necessary, she added.

The last stumbling block to the project's complying with standards of the Land Development Code was overcome last week when Van Heemst agreed to split into two duplexes the 96-foot-long, four-unit building planners found too massive for the site.

The revised plans satisfied all Planning Department concerns.

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

Study shows half of the Island properties on the market are sold every year

• The Sanibel-Captiva real estate market is often busy and lucrative.

For instance, approximately 31 real estate offices and branches exist on the Islands. They employ 230 salesmen, most of whom work on commission.

The most recent Computerized Listing Services, Inc., market report lists 878 properties, a figure one local realtor says is about average for "season." Often in the summer months the number of listings drops to 500-600 properties.

That might sound like a lot of places for sale, but Island salesmen manage to sell about half of these per year. For instance, in the past 12 months, 459 properties have sold for a total price of \$76.1 million. This comes to an average price of \$165,961.

398 of those sales were condominiums, with by far the majority (271) being two-bedroom units. 225 residential homes were also sold, with the majority (146) being three-bedroom units. And the total number of properties sold in a year's time also includes 16 commercial establishments, 24 multi-family or duplex units, 204 vacant lots and 11 parcels of "acreage."

One interesting specific: the 98 acres of non-state or federally owned Buck Key is listed for \$2.6 million.

This information is according to a report recently submitted to the city of Sanibel by Island realtor Andy Seipos.

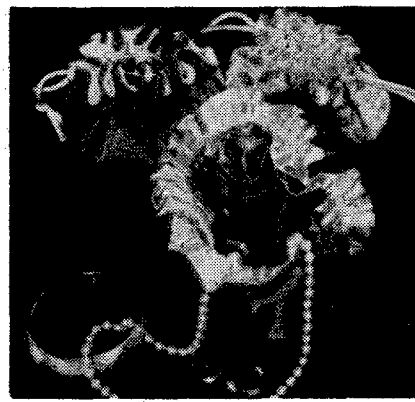

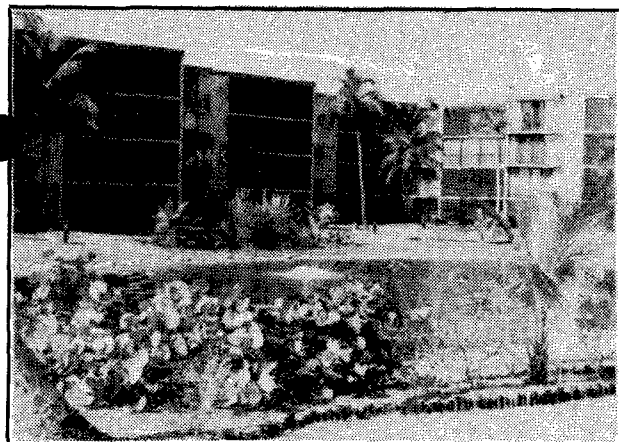

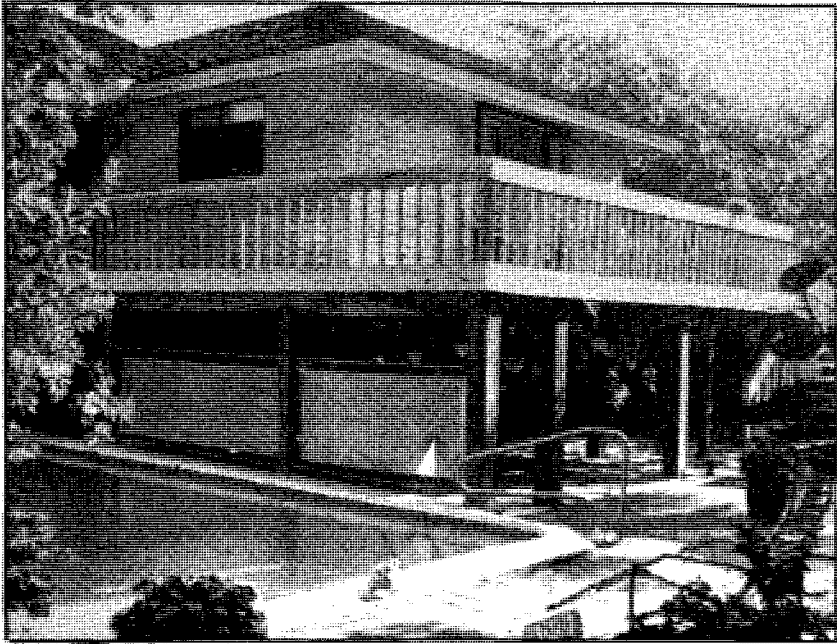

• Beaches

On Sanibel UNRESTRICTED PARKING WITH NO STICKER is permitted for everyone along the Causeway, at the Sanibel Lighthouse and Fishing Pier at the eastern tip of the island, at Gulfside City Park off Casa Ybel Road, on the east side of the Sanibel end of the Causeway, at the gulf end of Tarpon Bay Road and at the Trost property on Tarpon Bay Road.

Off-Islanders with RESTRICTED PARKING STICKERS can find beach access at Bailey Road, Beach Road, Dixie Beach Boulevard, Nerita Street, Donax Street, Fulger Street and on the Sanibel side of Turner Beach.

Island residents with RESIDENTIAL PARKING STICKERS can park on West Gulf Drive west of Rabbit Road, the bay and gulf sides of Buttonwood Lane, the bay and gulf sides of Seagrass Lane, Colony Walkway, Bay Drive and on Henderson Road at Castaways Lane.

The user fee for the COUNTY PARK AT BOWMAN'S BEACH

on the western end of Sanibel is \$1 per car.

The fine for parking in a restricted or residential area without the proper permit is \$35.

ON CAPTIVA public beach access for no charge can be found at Turner Beach or further north just past the entrance to South Seas Plantation.

State law prohibits nude sunbathing on all Florida beaches. Violators will be prosecuted.

• Biking

The extensive network of bike paths on Sanibel is clearly marked along the edge of the road. Observe caution when driving near the bike path.

A state law and city ordinance combine to prohibit parking or driving on the bike paths. Mopeds are not permitted on the bike paths.

If you plan to spend some time on a bike make sure your vehicle is equipped with a horn, good brakes and a light for night riding.

Under Florida law bicycle riders have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers.

• Camping

Camping on the beach is prohibited, as are open beach fires. Fires are permitted, however, in approved cooking containers (not to exceed 48x24x12 inches deep) with an extruded metal grill for non-commercial food preparation.

After you have your beach party please assume responsibility for cleaning up any litter or debris from the area.

Animals that are not artificially fed are less likely to become problems. A "tame" alligator becomes bold - he loses his fear of man.

An alligator has difficulty distinguishing between a piece of fish and the hand that holds it.

Because of the gator population here dogs should never be allowed to run free on the Islands. Fence your dog, walk him on a leash or, if you must free him for a walk, keep him under voice control. NEVER tie your dog in an unfenced backyard.

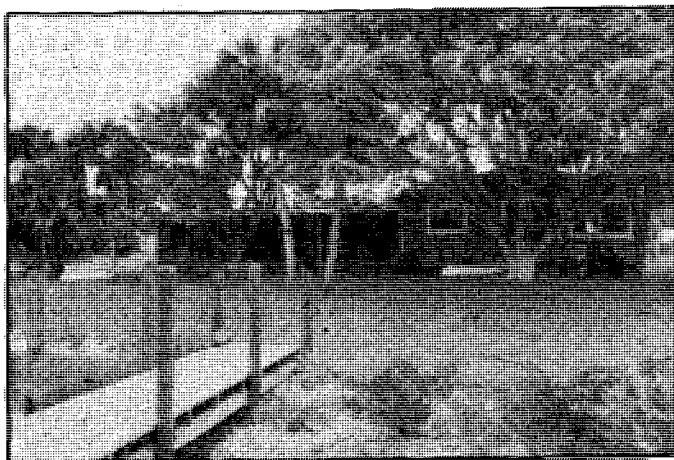

Halley's Comet

The astronomical spectacle of the year was even more spectacular in the heavens over New Zealand

Last month we journeyed 10,000 miles to what is considered one of the best spots in the world for viewing that remarkable astronomical phenomenon, Halley's Comet.

We led a party of 24 people who had flown to New Zealand for the express purpose of viewing the famous comet.

After landing at Christchurch we traveled by bus some 200 miles southward, as far south, in fact, that we felt we were close to the Antarctic at about 45 degrees south latitude. This spot, Omarama, lies about halfway between the Tropic of Capricorn and the Antarctic Circle. Aside from a few oceanic islands, there are few land masses of any significance except for the Antarctic continent that lies south of this place.

It was not easy to get to Omarama. Only days before our March 18 arrival heavy rains had flooded many parts of South Island, New Zealand. People were driven from their homes, many sheep were drowned, and many roads were washed out. Our competent driver, however, felt his way amongst these difficult conditions and carried us quite successfully to Omarama to view Halley's Comet.

We were a mixed bag, these two dozen people. Among us were teachers, scientists, a couple of pleasant AT&T employees (the kind of agreeable people Cliff Robertson is always telling us about), an intelligent and charming young Nisei psychologist, another clever young woman who is a personnel director in New York City, a retired military officer, a botanical type who deals mostly with weeds, an engineer who did pioneering work in the invention of the mammagraph, a retired architect and her retired city planner husband, several couples who for all we know never did anything, and a man who devotes his life to collecting sweaters. (Like Imelda and her shoes, he now has hundreds more sweaters than he can ever possibly wear. And what a place to collect sweaters. New Zealand, with its millions of sheep, seems to specialize in sweaters. I saw one that was knit with such thick yarn that the resultant fabric was more than an inch thick. It was such a fine warm sweater that if Scott had had it those many years ago he would have beaten Amundsen to the Pole, and history would have been different.)

Those in the group who spoke to each other were a congenial group; those who had no interest in conversation were congenial, too, because they never had anything much to say except, "Is lunch included?"

The tour was planned by a large company in the north that engaged us to lead this group of people of many interests on this long journey to the place where Halley's Comet could best be seen — Watch Site, Omarama.

It is appropriate to settle here once and for all the pronunciation of Halley's as in Halley's Comet. You hear "Hailey's"; you hear it as in "Hall"; and you hear a few other modifications of those pronunciations which I emphatically maintain are incorrect.

The way to pronounce "Halley's Comet" is "Holly's" (as in deck the halls with). I know this is true, because when I was a boy in Evanston, Ill., a noted roentgenologist at Evanston Hospital was Dr. Edmund Halley. This doctor became my good friend, and he told me in no uncertain terms that the correct pronunciation of his name was "Holly." He also said he was the

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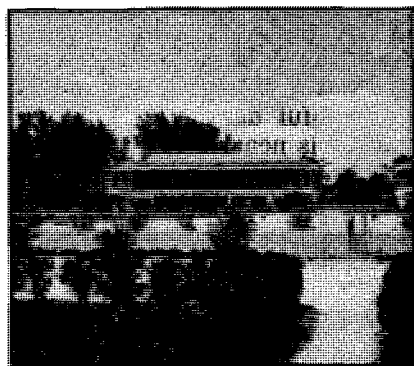
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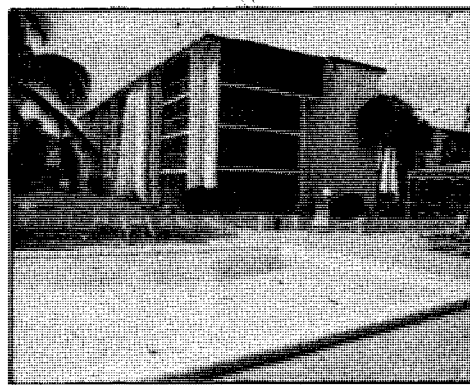

CROW reverses policy on handling raccoons

Last week Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife decided to reverse its controversial decision not to accept injured raccoons as patients.

"I guess we really stirred up a hornet's nest," said CROW Chairman Mary Wegmuller about the negative response to the action. "We made the decision after seeing the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service memo. And while of course we care about wildlife, we also care deeply about the health, safety and welfare of our staff."

The CROW board decided to stop accepted raccoons about three weeks

ago in light of a Fish and Wildlife memo warning about a type of roundworm commonly found in the feces of raccoons. The memo cited the deaths of two very young children who had died after accidentally ingesting the roundworms (by chewing on a piece of wood). The memo focused on horrifying details of the disease and how to prevent its spread.

Because these were new findings, the board decided CROW should not accept raccoons until more information was gathered about the potential problem.

CROW then wrote to the Florida Fish and Game Commission in Tallahassee and asked if turning away

raccoons were acceptable under CROW's wildlife handling permit. It was not.

"They were aware of the (Fish and Wildlife) memo and understood our concern. But they said in order for us to keep our permit we could not be selective in our acceptance of wild animals," Wegmuller said.

In the past year CROW has accepted 103 different species of wildlife. Last year 20 raccoons were treated at the facility, Wegmuller said.

She believes that board might have been "a bit hasty" in making its initial decision, but she added the measure was taken strictly out of con-

cern of CROW's wildlife handlers, many of whom are volunteers.

Wegmuller added CROW has learned that so far the roundworm (*Baylisascaris procyonis*) responsible for killing the two youngsters has not been found in Florida. A University of Florida research program conducted from 1973-85 studied the remains of 150 raccoons in 10 Florida counties and found no trace of the roundworm. The study did not include Lee County.

CROW has now formed a research committee to examine the problem further. One of the committee's first actions will likely be to run checks for the roundworm on raccoons here on the Islands.

Six more tourists make final deposits in anti-litter campaign

"It sure didn't take long to fill up a bag along Periwinkle Way," lamented Lorraine Balun last week. Balun walked along the busy thoroughfare and filled her bag with bottles, cans and discarded food wrappers.

Perhaps this week visitors will find the Islands somewhat cleaner after Saturday's successful Great Island Pickup.

The morning that drew nearly 150 Islanders out in the hot sun to poke and stretch for litter along Sanibel and Captiva's streets and beaches marks the end of our weekly anti-litter campaign.

We hope the message we've been trying to get across has been done so effectively enough to last through the summer. As we've all learned, it's everyone's duty to discourage litter — and also to pick it up when we see it.

Joining Balun in the final week of the campaign last week were J. Richard Early from Fairhaven, Mass.; Kirsten and Karlin Sander of Arlington Heights, Ill.; and John and Sue Noble of Massachusetts.

Early and the Nobles both remarked that perhaps Florida should consider a bottle bill like the one their home state has enacted. Early, however, added he is annoyed at having to pay an extra deposit on bottles "just because of a few slobs."

The Nobles have visited Captiva since 1936 and have seen the amount of litter on the Island increase dramatically along with the number of people living and visiting here. Yet they believe everyone has become more conscious of the problem over the past two years.

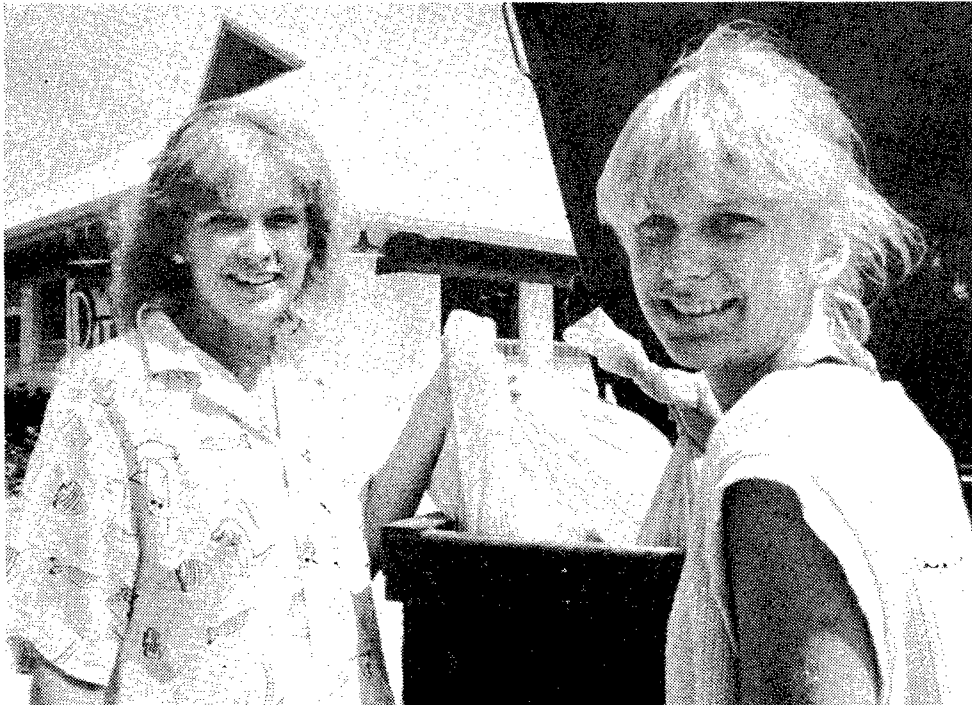
The Sander sisters found plenty of discarded cans and bottles in the sea oats near the Lighthouse beach on the eastern end of Sanibel.

They were following in their parents footsteps by participating in the anti-litter effort (last year both parents pitched in, too). Kirsten, 18, and Karlin, 13,

delivered three overflowing bags of trash, mainly bottles and cans, to our office. Unfortunately, they said, there was also a lot of paper tangled in the vegetation on the beach that they could not reach.

The Sanders have been annual visitors here for nine years.

The six visitors who pitched in last week bring to 114 the total number of tourists who did their to keep the Islands beautiful during our 3½-month campaign. That number is nearly double the number who participated last year.

Walking and driving are not the only ways to see the refuge

During 1985 more than 12,000 people canoed through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

Canoing is an excellent way to see parts of the refuge that are not accessible by car or foot. Along with the Wildlife Drive and walking trails, refuge areas also include two canoe trails and waterways along the drive.

•Commodore Creek Canoe Trail can be reached by launching at Tarpon Bay Marina on Sanibel. Canoes can be rented for this 1½-mile trail, and there is a small fee for launching personal canoes.

The well-marked trail winds through a lush mangrove forest. A variety of wildlife can be seen and

heard as you glide silently through these shaded waterways. You should plan this trip at higher tides because parts of the trail can be impassable at extreme low tide. Information and a map are available at the marina, 472-3196, or at the refuge Visitor Center off Sanibel-Captiva Road.

•The Buck Key Canoe Trail is off Captiva Island. Rental canoes and information can be obtained at 'Tween Waters Marina, 472-5161. This four-mile trail is through a red mangrove habitat. Some canoeing over

open water is required to reach the trail, so wind speed and direction should be considered.

•Those interested in canoeing along the Wildlife Drive portion of the refuge must bring their own canoe or rent one in Fort Myers. Two locations listed in the yellow pages are A to Z Rentals and Canoes and Canoeing. Both will provide a car carrier and will rent on a 24-hour basis. Neither Tarpon Bay nor 'Tween Waters marinas will allow transport of their canoes.

Canoing along the Wildlife Drive is permitted only on the right-hand side. Charts are recommended because travel through the maze of mangroves and sandbars can be confusing. It is a good idea to keep

track of landmarks such as the microwave tower that should be visible for most of the trip.

Canoeing is fun, relaxing and slightly strenuous. As with any outdoor activity, preparation is essential to a successful trip. Here is a checklist of some important considerations:

1. Determine the swimming ability of participants.
2. By law, each person is required to have a flotation device. These are usually provided with rental canoes.
3. Bring drinking water, sunscreen and insect repellent.
4. Bring a waterproof bag for your valuables, preferably one that floats.
5. Check weather forecasts.
6. Allow enough time for return to point of entry.

7. Note tides and wind direction.

8. Once on the water, watch for low branches and do not stand up in the canoe.

Additional considerations for canoeing on refuge property:

1. Collection of any kind is not allowed.
2. Alligators are not usually seen on these trails as they prefer fresher waters.
3. The average depth of the Commodore Creek trail is 2½ feet.
4. Rates vary for rentals and other charges.

Guided tours are available by reservations for those who prefer to canoe this way. Mark "Bird" Westall has a special permit to lead groups through the refuge by canoe. Canoes and equipment are provided for a

three-hour trip. Call 472-5218 for information on rates and to make reservations for morning or afternoon.

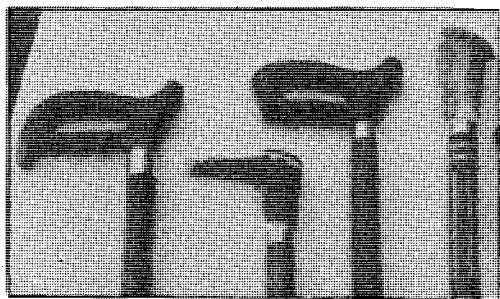
Whichever option you choose, your trip will be a unique and memorable experience. Take your time and enjoy your national wildlife refuge.

Additional information is available at the refuge Visitor Center, which is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekends. Beginning April 27 the center will be closed on Sunday. Our telephone number is 472-1100 during normal business hours.

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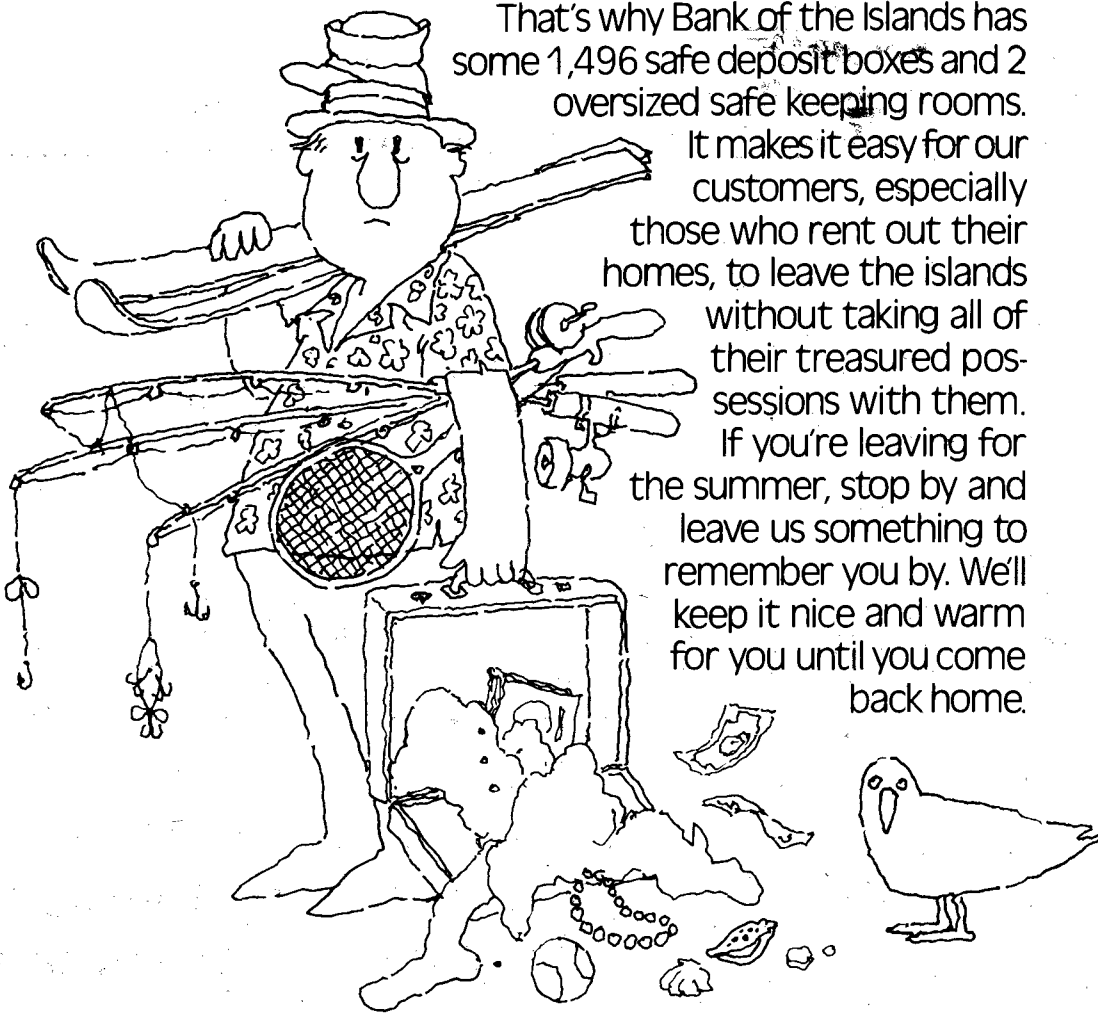

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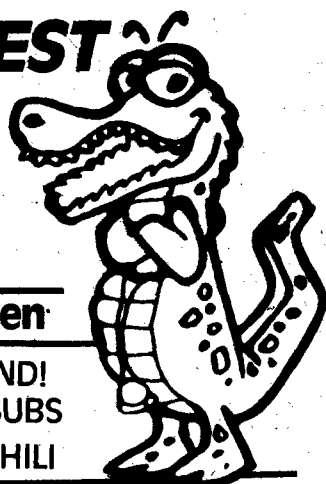

In the photo on the opposite page Klein and CROW volunteer Wally Kain watch proudly as the bird flies away.

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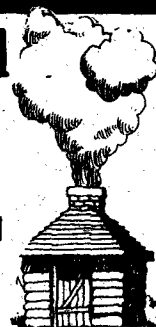
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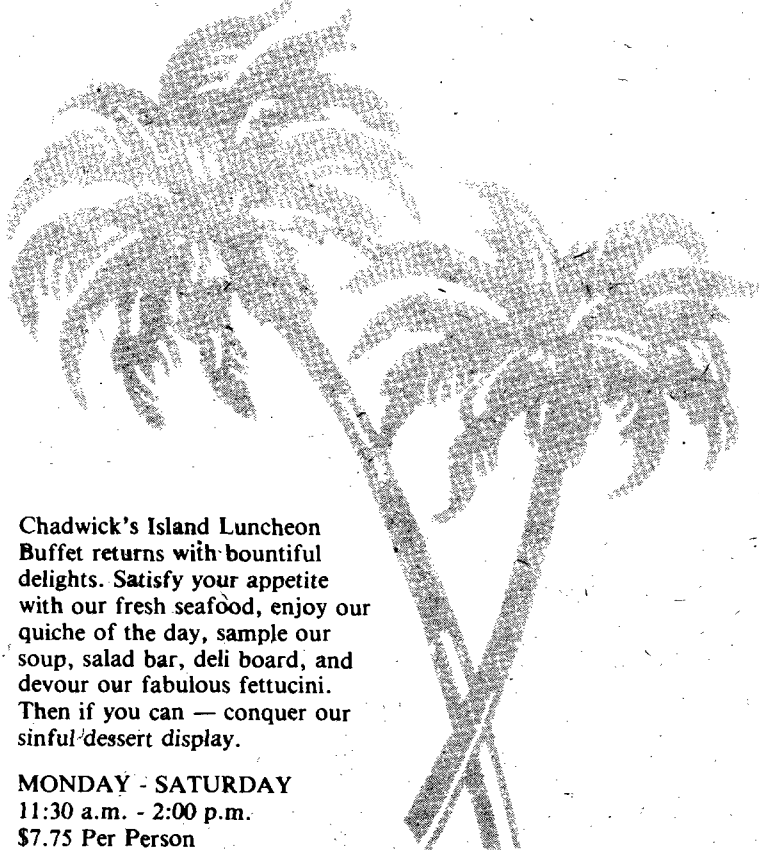
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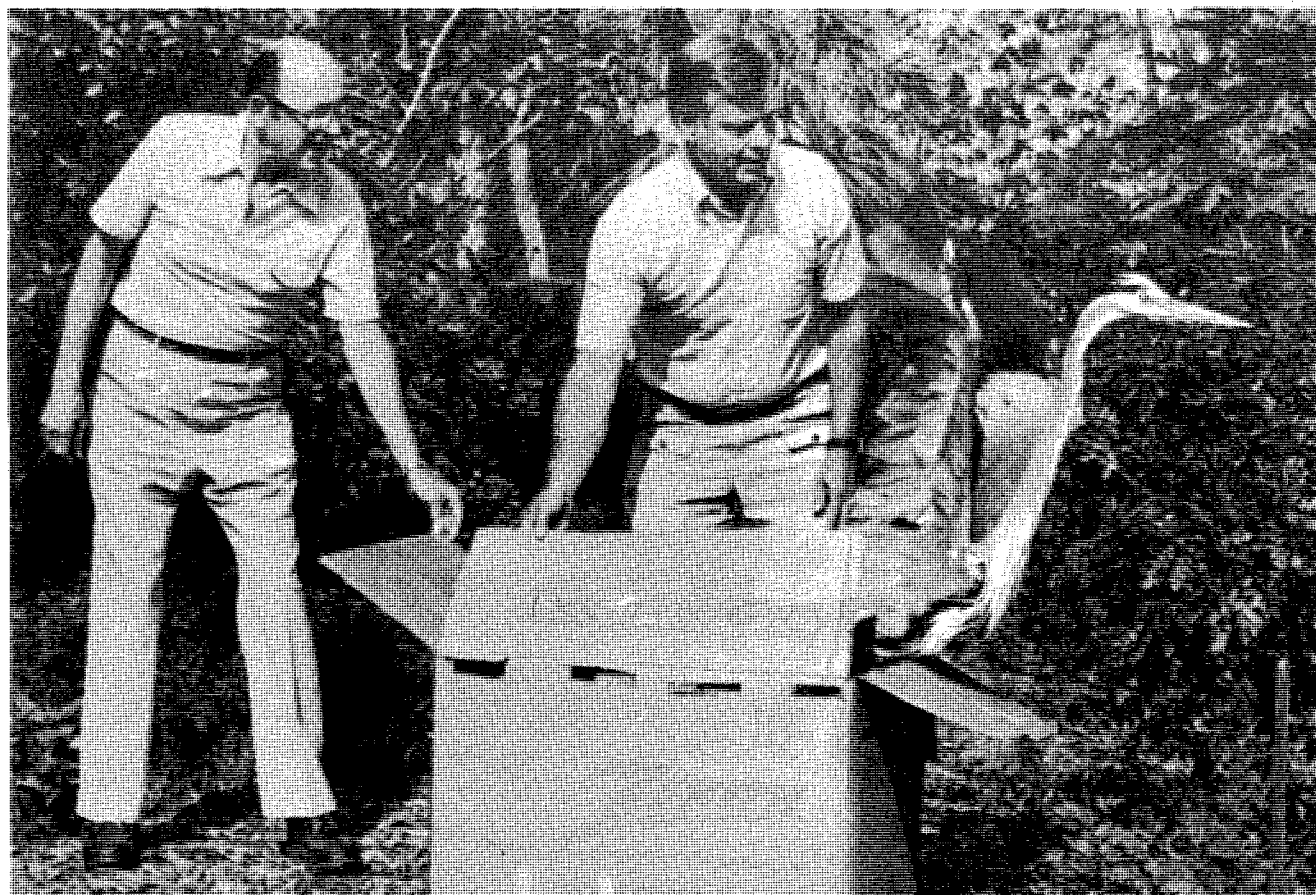
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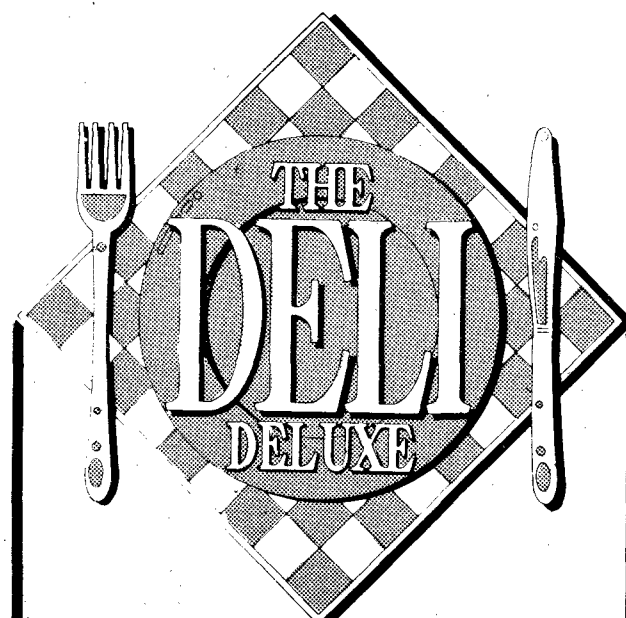

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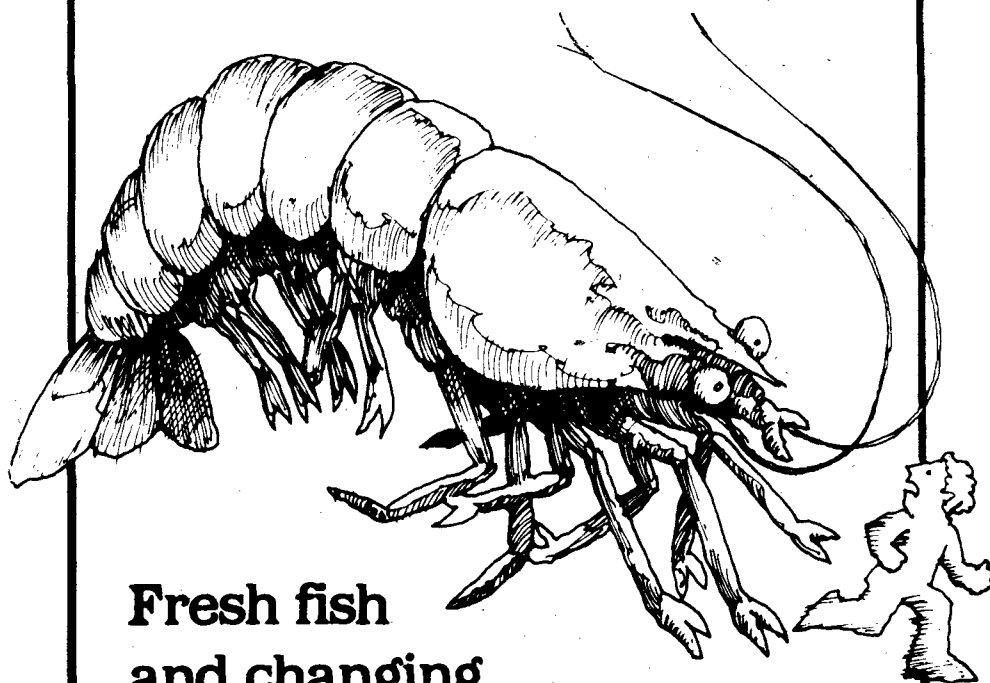
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Questions surround 4½-hour CEPD meeting

Should the Captiva Erosion Prevention District board be dictatorial or democratic? Should it be involved with administration, or should it simply set policy? Should the commissioners follow strict procedure to cover themselves in case of potential abuses? Or should they be flexible, laid back and trusting?

And does the board actually have an official plan for fighting beach erosion?

These questions and others appeared to be the underlying themes last week as the CEPD board waded through more than 31 agenda items at its 4½-hour monthly meeting.

At one point, one commissioner muttered that a discussion on a specific issue (on accessibility of public records) was "as productive as counting angels on the head of a pin."

Among the agenda items discussed were:

- Whether to hire a risk management officer to handle the CEPD's insurance affairs;
- The new public records policy;
- How to seek proposals from economic firms (for an apportionment plan);
- How to seek proposals from attorneys who wish to replace former CEPD counsel Humphrey, Jones and Meyers, who have resigned the CEPD account;
- How to hire a new administrator and agent;
- And whether the CEPD should seek funds from the West Coast Intercoastal Navigational District for beach renourishment. This issue naturally led to the question of whether the CEPD is formally following a general beach renourishment plan.

The meeting was the second meeting of the day for some of the commissioners. Earlier in the day the CEPD, along with perpendicular stabilizer designer Dick Holmberg, met with officials from the state's Department of Natural Resources and Department of Environmental Regulation. The Governor and Cabinet, on the advice of the DNR, stopped work on the experimental stabilizer project and then had ordered the non-permitted segments removed.

Tuesday's meeting was expected to be a clarification of what would have to be done to bring the project into compliance with the permit. But it appears state officials do not know exactly what they want. They have asked contractor and designer Holmberg and project engineer Art Learned to give them specifics as to how they would remove the concrete sections.

Holmberg has agreed to submit a "reasonable plan" to the state within the next two weeks.

Meanwhile, the formal order for removal from the Governor has not been received. "And it is really late for that kind of thing," said CEPD special counsel Nancy Stroud.

"Why rush them? (The delay) is to our benefit," said Captiva resident Gene Peck. "The stabilizers should not be taken out anyway."

Former CEPD Commissioner Chuck Bruning, who worked on obtaining the original permits for the experimental project, expressed concern about the state's attitude.

"The purpose of this experimental project was so that if and when we had beach renourishment, we would be able to protect the hot spots," Bruning said. "Are we going to end up spending \$7 million for beach renourishment and then have the state deny us the right to protect the beach?"

"We should be guaranteed that we can protect a renourished beach. If not, there shouldn't be renourishment."

Chairman Peg Hofschneider said she was fairly sure the state would not allow a situation such as occurred with the current stabilizer project to happen again. "They seem to think it should never have been permitted in the first place. They have said they hate the project," she added.

However, Commissioner Hans Wilson said the state took issue with the way the project was done, not with the project itself.

The board debated long and hard about whether chairman Hofschneider was correct in independently deciding to have the CEPD office reading file available to the public only between 8 and 10 a.m. on Tuesdays and by special appointment. Hofschneider said the action is only temporary until a CEPD administrator can be hired.

Wilson contended that the temporary office employee should be able to handle such a chore. And he voiced concern that it was not a board decision, but an independent action by the chairman. "I find this a very tenuous posture for this board," he said. "And it hasn't been determined to be policy of the board."

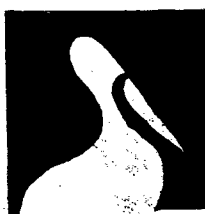
Hofschneider said her decision was based on several concerns. First, she was worried about comments that kept cropping up on public documents. And second, one file is apparently missing — whether just mislaid or taken out of the office she didn't know.

The board will seek the Florida attorney general's opinion on the action. But until then the hours for reading the office files will remain from 8 to 10 a.m. Tuesdays and by appointment.

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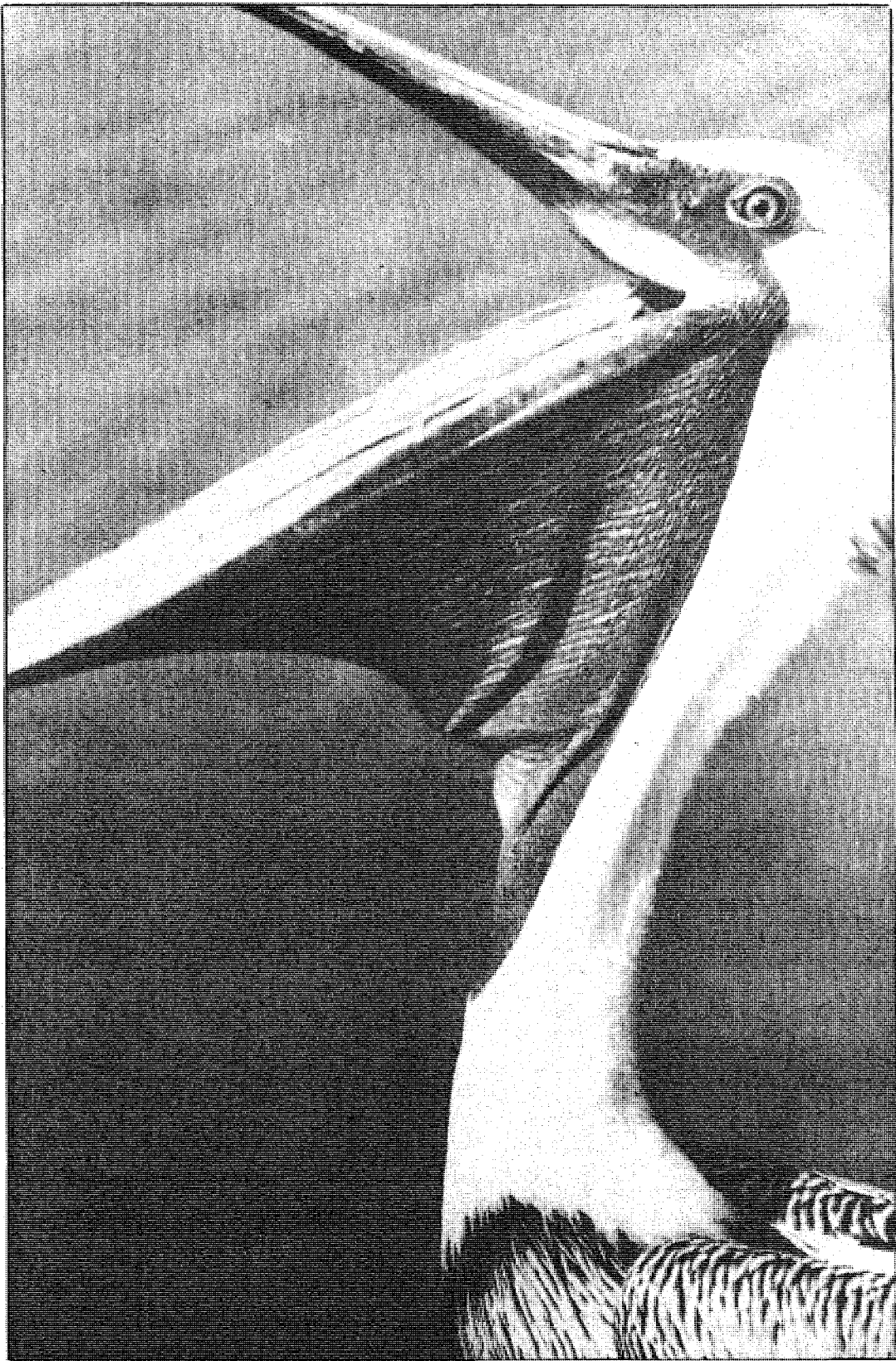
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New titles added to Captiva library video cassette collection

direct descendant of Edmund Halley of comet fame, and, damn it all, he knew how to pronounce his own name. Halley's Comet was pronounced Holly's Comet and not "Hailey's," "Hawley's" or anything else, he insisted.

An authority in linguistics has pointed out that my argument is flawed, however, because Dr. Halley of Evanston did not know, could not know, how his famous ancestor pronounced his name. But I shall stick with Holly anyway.

Early in the morning of March 18 we aroused our two dozen fellow viewers, piled into a bus and drove a few miles out of Omarama into a shallow, depressed, quiet area far from any light pollution or any human habitation. Actually it was an old sheep station, the shearing shed of which had been converted for the few comet viewing months into an astronomical institution.

Skilled and dedicated astronomers staffed the place. They had contrived and built a most interesting setup. There were four stations outside the sheep shearing building, all demarcated with soft fencing of strong plastic mesh material very much like the Saran mesh employed here in Florida in the building of greenhouses. It was soft because, as you assembled in the almost complete darkness only dimly lighted by the rays of the incredible multitude of stars above, if you stumbled or fell, you would fall into a soft fence or onto the thick turf of the sheep pasture beneath.

Two of the four stations were equipped with all manner of instruments from 7x50 binoculars, 11x80 telescopes, 8- and 13-inch telescopes. Each of these stations had an abundance of what proved to be the most useful instruments, binoculars. Of course, many of the visitors brought their own special equipment, too.

The third station was the photographic one. Here skilled astronomers would take your camera and mount it using the regular screw thread employed for mounting cameras on a tripod. But in this case the mount was an ordinary aluminum ladder about four feet long. It had many screw bolt mountings, so that one such "ladder" could handle perhaps 10 cameras.

The entire ladder with its cameras was then mounted on a clock device that followed the movement of the stars in the heavens to enable time exposures to be made of the magnificent sights to be seen above on that clear, cold night. The astronomers would mount the camera, aim it, open it to the appropriate exposure and shoot the picture from their cleverly contrived motor driven device.

The fourth station was simply an area where the independent photographer-viewer who had all his own equipment would set up. It was called the private equipment station.

For the impatient photographer, a darkroom was provided at the site so that one could immediately develop his film and check how well he was doing. This sheep shearing shed was most appropriately situated for the comet viewing station. In the first place it was far from any source of light pollution. It had an expansive outlook eastward, which was necessary because at those extreme southern latitudes, east is whence the comet rises. Westward and northward lie the Southern Alps, providing a dark backdrop.

Inside the sheep shearing shed visitors are welcomed, given introductory lectures on the comet, shown displays, sold photographic supplies and even refreshments and souvenirs.

All of the activities undertaken by these devoted amateur astronomers will benefit Omarama. Theirs is a charitable outfit, and the monies generated will be applied to rebuilding a local school.

After an initial lecture, we groped our way out to viewing stations. After five minutes we could see. There were the telescopes and the stands on which binoculars were stacked. And we could see them — by starlight! One of the astronomers explained that the very dim light we were employing to find our way about the site had been coming toward us for incredible lengths of time — light years (in some cases, thousands and thousands of light years, some since the beginning of time).

As we looked and listened to our guide that memorable night, we began to understand the incredible size of the universe. We were groping about and seeing with dim light that had taken eons to get there — at 686,000 miles per second. Astronomy deals with large numbers that often seem meaningless, but that night we felt we began to comprehend.

Almost overhead and a bit to the south was the Southern Cross; and to the left, approximately 20 degrees and 25 degrees, lay the two Magellanic clouds, isolated parts of the Milky Way. Then farther left still, at about 20 degrees above the eastern horizon, was Halley's Comet.

What an impressive sight was this small head with its 12.5-million-mile-long tail or coma, right now the largest thing in our solar system.

Viewing it from that magnificent spot in the foothills of the Southern Alps was very impressive. It belied Steven J. Gould's recent comment that Halley's Comet is somewhat exaggerated in its significance. It was truly magnificent and worth every mile of our painfully long journey from the north to the extreme southern Pacific.

The local astronomers told us that on our night of March 18, Halley's Comet demonstrated its most magnificent tail this year.

We had seen the comet in November from Sanibel's beach. It was not very exciting. It was round, smudged, showed no tail, and could be seen

above the horizon to the south in close association with the Pleiades. Not long after that it disappeared behind the sun, only to reappear early in February. Soon it will overcome the sun's gravity and be flung out into the farthest reaches of the solar system for another 76 years.


April 11 was the best date of all to view the comet, for on that date it was closest to earth. But April 15, the day this paper comes out, is still a good viewing date. And there are excellent facilities for viewing the comet from Southwest Florida.

Everyone is invited to visit the Kulakowski Astronomical Observatory of Edison Community College for Halley's Comet watch sessions. By the time this issue of *The Islander* appears, six of the nine scheduled sessions will have passed, but you still have April 15, 16 and 17.

Starting at 10:30 p.m. and continuing to 1:30 a.m. this Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, you can go to the observatory in Building B at the Fort Myers campus. It is readily identified by the silver-colored dome roof. All kinds of instruments are available, from a 12-inch reflecting telescope down to a lot of smaller ones.

Be sure to take your binoculars, however, because you will probably have a better view with them than you will with any telescope.

Of course, none of the terrestrial viewing, whether it be from Omarama or Edison Community College, can hold a candle to the extra-terrestrial viewing accomplished recently by some remarkable feats of our space age. The first episode was a fortunate accident. Our Venus probe, Pioneer, is orbiting the Planet Venus. By good luck only, Pioneer was in an appropriate spot to photograph Halley's when the comet was closest to the sun (55 million miles). As the comet was directly on the other side of the sun from the earth, this cleverly contrived "dog-leg" view was accomplished by Pioneer photographing the comet from its Venus orbit and transmitting that image past the sun to earth.

The United States did not join other nations in sophisticated comet viewing due to a shortage of funds in the Reagan budget. After all, scientific advancement is of no consequence when compared with the arms buildup. (How much did those Pentagon toilet seats cost?)

The Soviet Union had two probes, Vega I and Vega II, that approached quite close to the comet (5,300 miles on March 6 and 5,000 miles on March 9).

The closest probe of all was Giotto, which was only 300 miles from the comet. This remarkable probe produced amazing pictures of the comet on March 13. It was the joint effort of several nations of the European Economic Community.

The Japanese funded two probes, Suisei and Saki Gake. The first was 100,000 miles away from the comet on March 8, and the last at 4,400,000 miles on March 10. Suisei was designed to sample the huge cloud of hydrogen gas that surrounds the comet. Saki Gake's result will shed light on solar winds.

Some data from these remarkable probes have already been made public in the form of computer-enhanced color photographs, but it is understood that many months will pass before all data are analyzed and their significance known and completely interpreted.

Among the viewers on that memorable night at Omarama was a gnarled old shepherd who was led from the sheep shearing shed out to a viewing station. He was helped to view the Comet — for the second time in his long life. In 1910, when he was just a boy, the shepherd's father had taken him to about the

same place for his first viewing of the comet. The image of that old shepherd remains a highlight of our experience with Halley's Comet at Omarama.

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the Island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the Island he spent 25 years establishing and working with pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and international coordinator for the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Naturalist-illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature preserve.

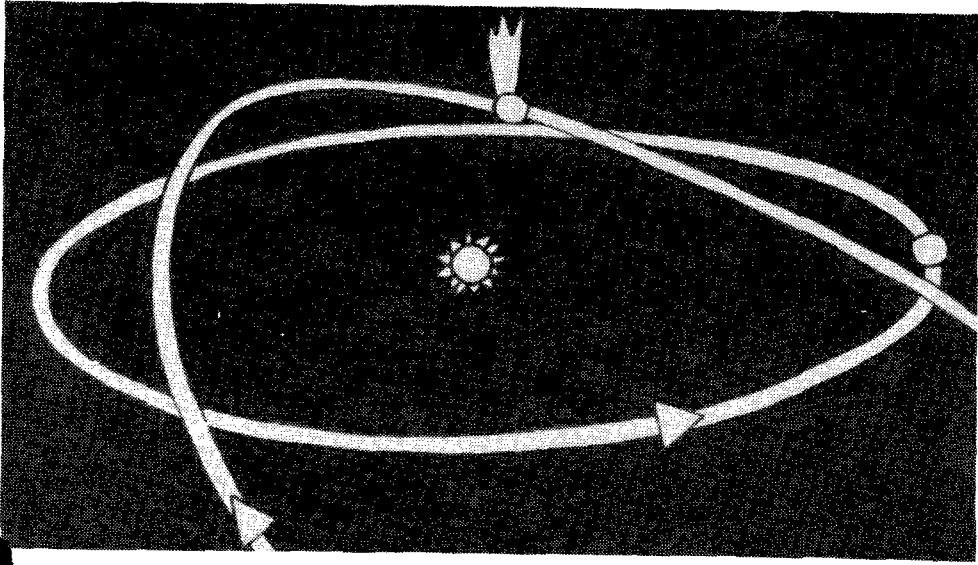

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Mastichodendron foetidissimum

No finer shade tree exists in the tropics than the mastic or jungle-plum known to taxonomists as *Mastichodendron foetidissimum*. The mastic is a large valuable timber tree found along the coast of Florida from Lee County south.

The mastic grows to heights of 50 feet with a large straight trunk ranging to three or four feet in diameter. Stout branches with reddish brown branchlets support an irregular crown.

Leaves on mature trees have characteristic wavy margins and are oval to oblong. They are bright green and shiny on their upper surface and yellow green beneath.

Some people relish the fruits pleasant flavor. It is olive-shaped with a firm yellow skin and thick sticky flesh that glues your lips together after eating one or two. Most of the fruit ripens in March or April and remains on the tree for several weeks.

Though very beautiful and an exceptional shade tree, the mastic is not adapted for the impatient gardener of today. Those residents who have a mastic in their yard should consider themselves fortunate indeed and builders should go to whatever lengths necessary to protect these trees where they occur on property being developed.

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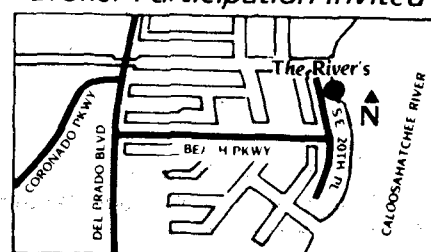
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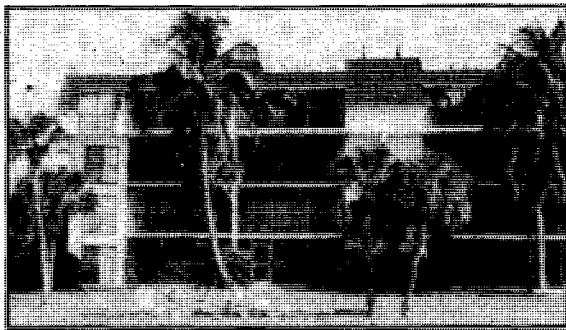

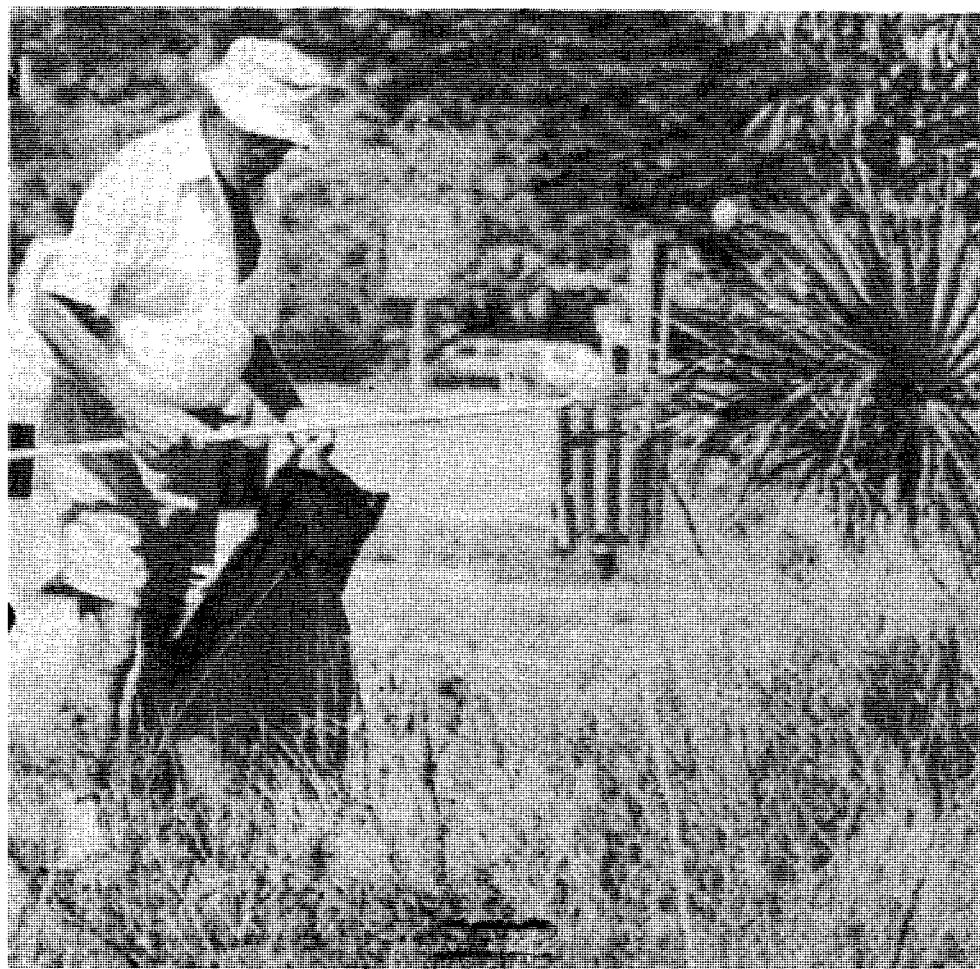

145 volunteers pitch in to make a clean sweep of 3,000 pounds of litter

It really was a "Great Island Pickup."

Nearly 150 people showed up Saturday morning to participate in an all-out effort to clean up 75 miles of Sanibel and Captiva roads and six public beach accesses.

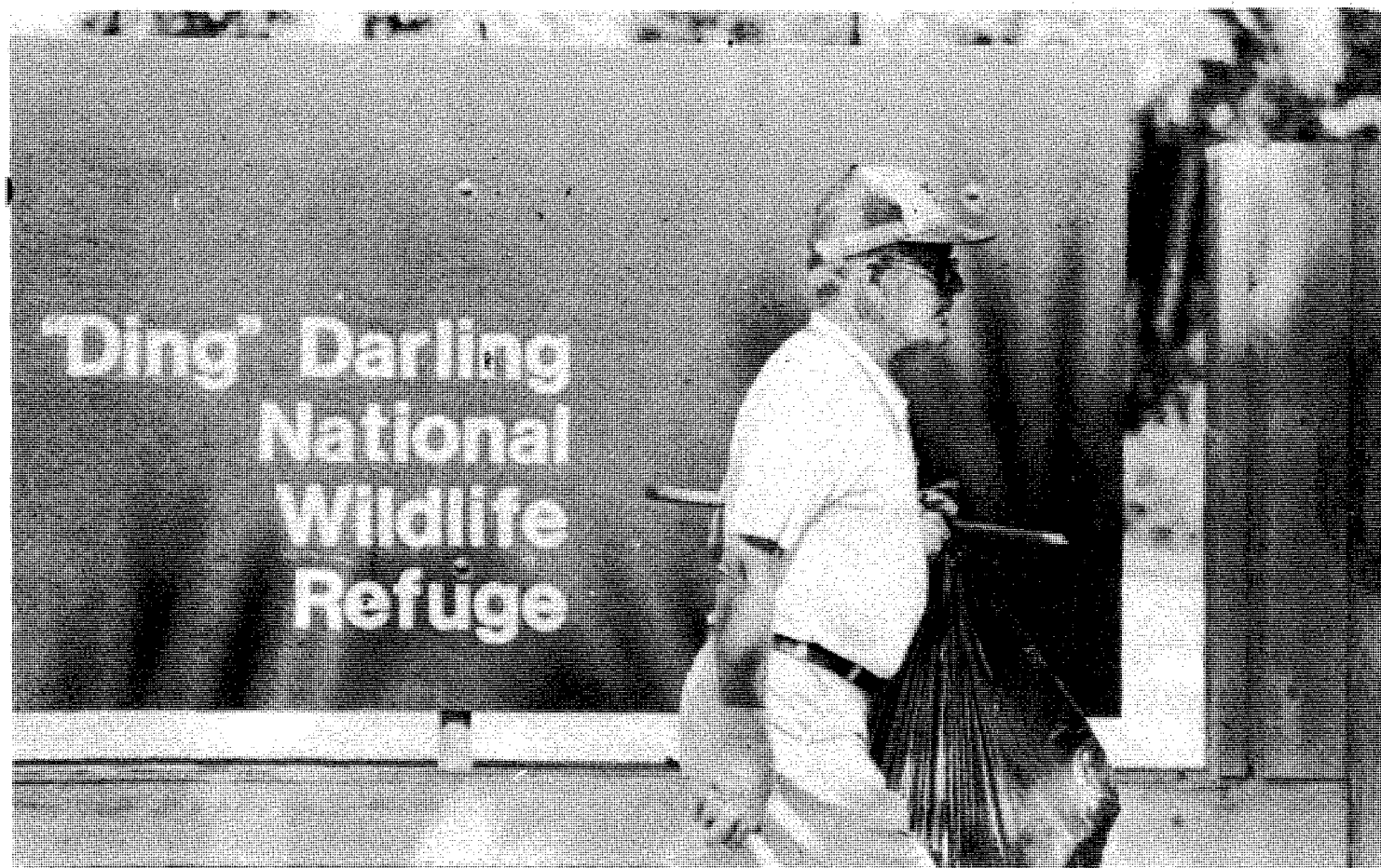
"We've never been able to cover all these routes before," said Ron Sebald, who with the Island scouting organizations originated the Island-wide clean-up day eight years ago. This year sponsorship of the effort was turned over to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and *The Islander* newspaper (with a lot of help from the city of Sanibel).

This year, for the first time, every

piece of litter brought to Sanibel Elementary School was weighed. Before going out on their designated routes, everyone who signed up the effort submitted a guess of how many pounds would be collected before noon.

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

lamented.

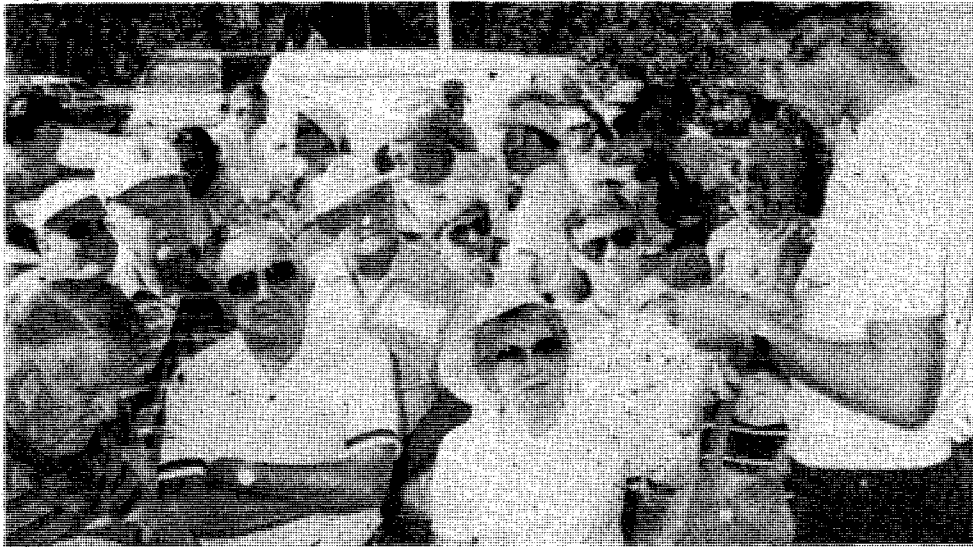

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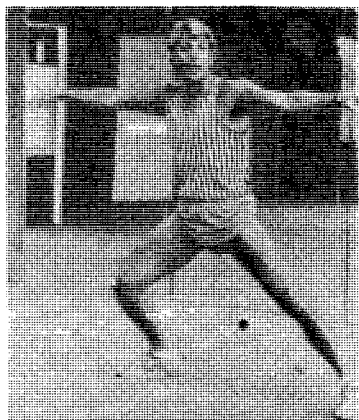

Five clubs was a bit wild in this instance

East took the ace of hearts and the king of diamonds and shifted back to hearts.

South led a spade, and West took the king. South ruffed the diamond return, led a spade to the queen and returned a trump to the king. South then ruffed a spade in dummy to lead another trump.

East had to play the ace, and South won the rest.

"Five clubs was a pretty wild bid," North grumbled.

"Minus 300 is better than losing a vulnerable game," South argued.

"What game?" North asked. "We get two spades, a trump and a club."

POINT COUNT



Who was right?

Their guru's verdict: Five clubs was indeed a bit wild. South needed better spades or clubs or an 11th black card.

Still, the sacrifice was successful. South would surely lead the king of clubs against four hearts. East takes the ace and returns a club, and later discards a spade on the jack of clubs.

Bold sacrifice bids are recommended if you have good distribution, strong nerves and a tolerant partner.

WEEKLY QUESTION

You hold: ♠ A 7 6 4 2 ♥ K 8 7 ♦ K Q 9 6
3. Partner bids one heart, you respond one spade, and he then bids 1NT. The opponents pass. What do you say?

ANSWER

Bid three clubs. Since you have 12 high-card points and good distribution opposite an opening bid, you want to get to a game contract. A rebid of two clubs wouldn't be forcing; you must make a jump bid to show your strength.

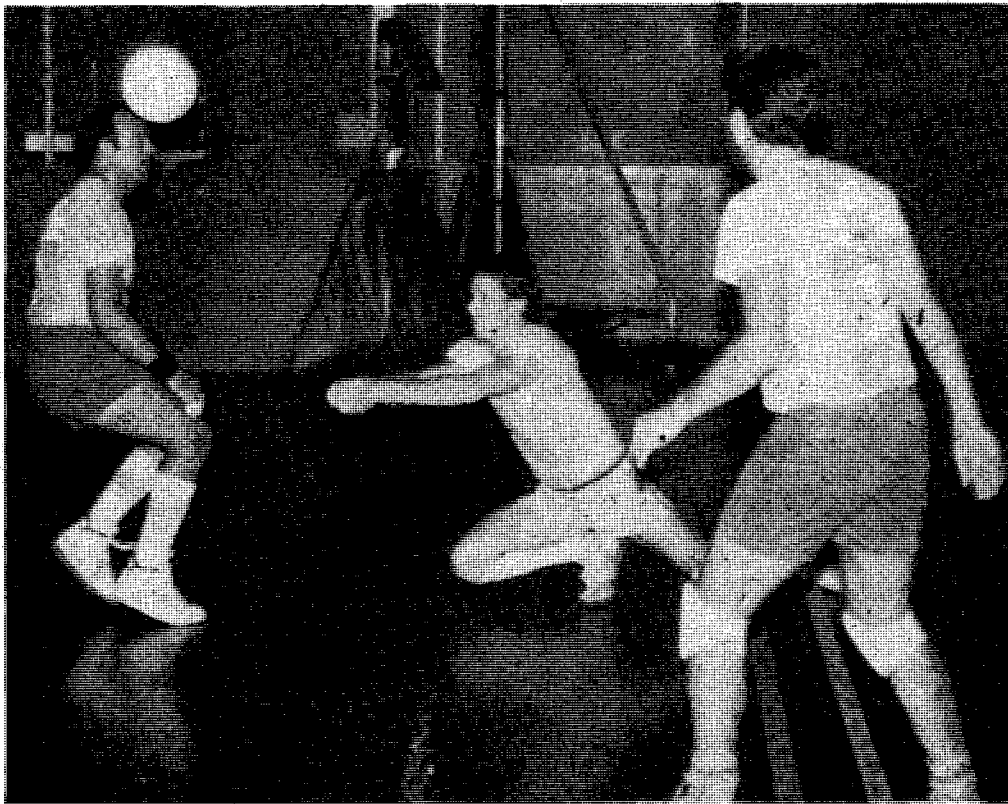

Roz Wegryn shows her excitement over her first hole-in-one.



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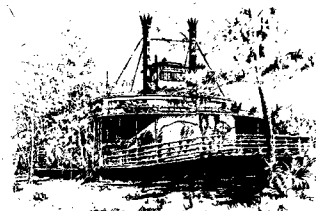

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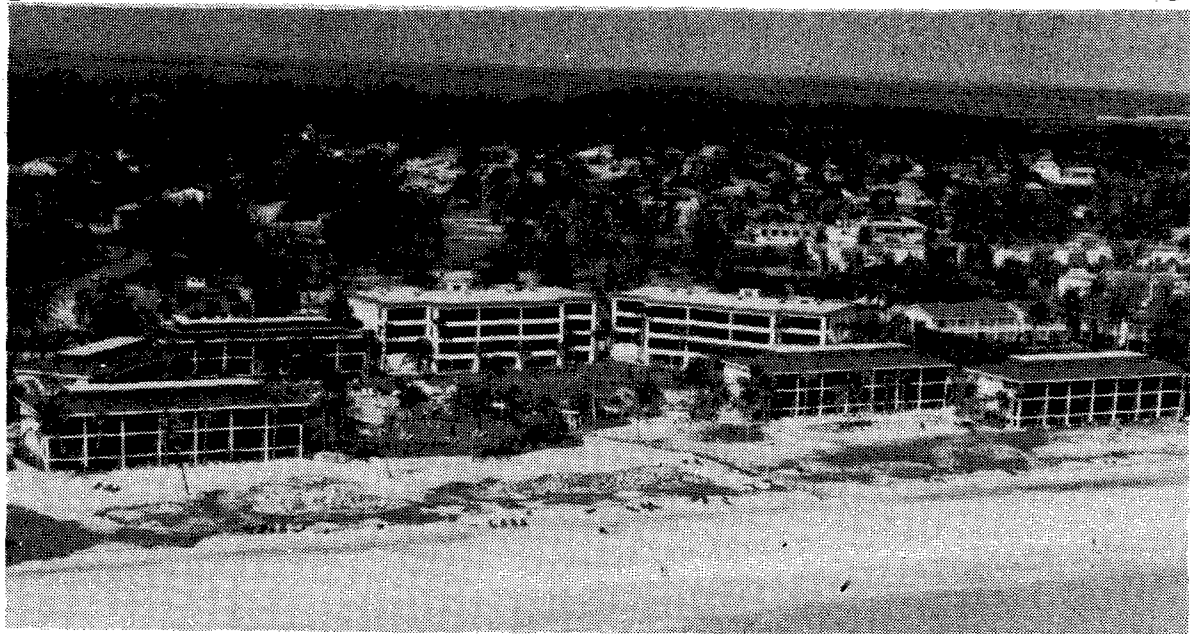
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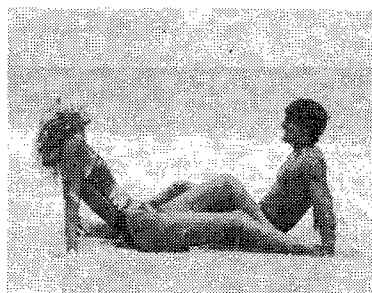

Catch-and-release tournaments are gaining popularity

The days of holding tournaments that require the killing of large fish such as marlin and sailfish to win money or prizes are all but gone. And those who want to continue fishing our prized tarpon probably are wondering what lies ahead for these gamefish.

One of the state's most prestigious tournaments, The Greater Miami Billfish Tournament, recently yielded a very positive approach. For the first time it was held on a catch-and-release basis.

Organizers were afraid that fishermen would drop the tournament. They hoped to get 200 anglers in the contest; they got 223. The first day of the tournament 17 sailfish and one blue marlin were released alive. At the end of opening day a year ago, 45 sailfish were stacked up at the docks for the judges to count. That all adds up to a big difference in the billfish population.

And the best part is that catch-and-release tournaments are becoming more acceptable. With the increase in more anglers who have better fishing equipment, faster boats and more sophisticated electronics, killing fish for ego purposes simply must end. Otherwise, there won't be any tournaments because there won't be any fish.

Which brings me to tarpon in Boca Grande Pass. It's the same story as with billfish — too many are killed that are not in contention for prizes. Or they are killed, dragged home for pictures and then dumped into the nearest garbage container.

Last fall I wrote a story about the concern of

guides from Boca Grande who derive the majority of their yearly living catching fish from April to July.

They mount their share of fish, but the conservative approach has developed where fewer and fewer fish are killed. All was going well until contestants in tournaments north of Gasparilla Island decided they could catch more fish in the big pass. Weekends saw the invasion of many anglers taking and killing all sizes of tarpon in hopes of winning tournament money and prizes.

The situation lead to several uncomfortable exchanges between guides and contestants. We are all waiting to see if kill contests will again enter into the Boca Grande Pass fishing picture this year.

In the meantime, some tarpon have shown up around the islands and there are reports of a few being caught. Capt. Randy White told me a couple of

days ago that he got one that went over 140 pounds on pinfish. That's a big fish by tarpon standards (the average ranges from 60 to 110 pounds).

So the tarpon are starting to show. This time of the year is a favorite of mine because the official "season" is over and we have a couple of months before the summer season hits, so it allows time to explore new places to fish.

One of the better places to fish for tarpon, as it turned out last year, was on the MAY reef off Fort Myers Beach. The artificial reef lures many kinds of fish. Anglers used to work Knapp's Point off the southern side of Sanibel for big tarpon early in the season, but MAY just might replace it as a tarpon spot.

My favorite place to fish tarpon is in the Pine Island Sound flats. Early morning draws the fish in from the gulf to dine on pinfish, pilchards, mullet and a host of other baitfish. Your best bet is to get into the sound a little before dawn, anchor over clean bottom adjacent to large grassy flats, and wait to see if the fish are there.

Tarpon breathe air, so they roll at the surface to gulp air. That's how you know you are in an area good for fishing. More about tarpon as they appear in larger numbers. In the meantime, the increasing popularity of catch-and-release tournaments will mean better fishing for all of us in years to come. Good fishing this week.

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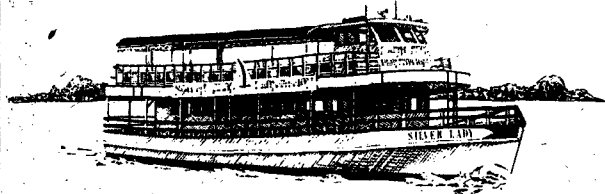
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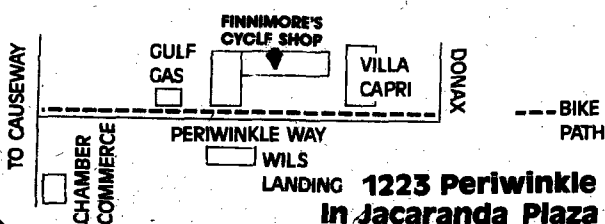

Even pieces of shells can be valuable additions to a collection

As you walk the shores of Sanibel and Captiva you might think you'll never ever find a large shell in once piece. Many shellers see that as the main goal of shelling. They don't realize that some of the large, broken, old shells have a real history to them.

Back in March someone on one of my charters found a left-handed lightning whelk along North Captiva Island. But the shell had a hole in it. Of course many big shells are washed to the beaches with bits and chunks missing. Tumbling around on the ocean floor takes its toll. So just when you think you've found a perfect specimen, you turn it over or brush the sand away and discover a big break.

On occasion, however, you'll find a reasonably good shell with a round hole near the top of the shell. These shells could be 50, 100 or 150 years old. That small, round hole is the tell-tale mark of a hammer or other stout blunt instrument early settlers used to remove the meat from the living whelks.

Even further back than that, early Indian tribes used the Islands as the base of their nation. These were mostly the Calusa Indians. The center of their nation was probably where Pineland on Pine Island is today. Mound Key near Estero Island, south of us, was another well-known Calusa center.

These earliest settlers gathered fish and shells. Shells were used as a system of exchange, they were

gathered primarily for the food they provided.

Shell mounds are being explored on Useppa Island and on Buck Key just east of Captiva. Many shell tools have been found. On some of the more remote islands, it's not at all hard to find shells with that particular hole.

However, it's still possible to come up with shells with two or three holes, too. These were most likely used for digging, smoothing or decorative purposes. Some shells were also used to drink from or hold water for later use.

So while it might be frustrating to walk for hours and find only broken shells, examine those big old whelks, broken or not, to see if they might be relics

from many years ago.

If you shell on the Islands over several different times of the year, eventually you will notice that there are distinct "seasons" for the hobby.

Spring is hatching season for shells, so watch for whelk egg cases that have washed ashore after periods of windy weather. These look sort of like accordion snakes. Each pouch in the chain could have a couple of dozen tiny, tiny left-handed whelks.

Please don't disturb any living anchored egg case of any kind. But if you should find a casing high and dry on the beach, go ahead and check the pouches for the little whelks.

With a little luck you might find some of the smallest, most perfectly formed shells the eye can see. With patience you could fill a small display jar with a dead egg case. Just seeing how many whelks die when the casing comes loose from the bottom is a lesson itself in wanting to preserve living shells.

Good shelling this week, and remember to check those old whelks for that peculiar hole. There's no telling how old the shell is.
