



#### Mayor hopes letters lend to understanding of Causeway issue

The following two letters from Sanibel Mayor Louise Johnson to Lee County Commission Chairman Porter Goss and Commissioner Mary Ann Wallace were given to The Islander for publication. Johnson said she hoped the letters would be helpful in keeping Island citizens informed on a subject of much interest to

Dear Chairman Goss:

At its regular meeting of April 15 the City Council requested that we reiterate to the county our position on the various Sanibel Causeway issues as we understand the issues based upon the results of the April 10 meeting. Therefore, I will list, as follows, the points we would like included in any agreement:

• 1. A fixed span bridge with as low a profile as possible will be the first project undertaken.

•2. The flat bridge spans (spans B and C) will not be four-laned.

•3. The toll booth will remain on the Punta Rassa side

of the bridge. •4. The proceeds from the Sanibel Causeway will not

be mixed with or used for any other bridge.

• 5. The roadways across the Causeway islands will be raised to facilitate evacuation. Council also recommended that restriping be done to reduce traffic hazards along this stretch and maintain the essential two-lane nature of the road.

•6. The exposed stretch of Summerlin Road east of the toll booth will be protected from wave erosion.

•7. The toll structure will be no higher than is necessary for bonding feasibility, and increases will be proportionally equitable to our residents, commuters and visitors.

If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me. We would like to be kept informed on the details of this project. Thank you again for your presentation at the April 10 meeting.

Dear Commissioner Wallace:

I appreciate your efforts to keep us informed of developments regarding the Sanibel Causeway proposal. The issues are certainly complicated with apparent contradictions.

I know of your opposition to the project and respect your courage in expressing your convictions.

However, if the board of county commissioners proceeds to refinance the Causeway using an Enterprise Fund, which seems very likely, the City Council q Sanibel believes it is important to concentrate on obtaining a strong interlocal agreement in which its interests are protected.

There are some Sanibel residents who may prefer that nothing be done to the Causeway. I have some leanings in that direction myself. But in view of our community evacuation and traffic concerns, I, in all good conscience, do not believe that Sanibel can reject the proposed fixed span bridge and the maintenance of

Having been assured by Commissioner Porter Goss, financial consultant David Paul and County Administrator Jerry Maxwell that Sanibel Causeway tolls would have to be higher if the bridge were financed separately, and also assured that none of the bond revenue nor any of Sanibel's share of the surplus revenue will be used for any other facility, our intention is that such issues and others covered in my lette of understanding of April 16 to the commissioners wil be addressed in the County-Sanibel Interlocal Agreement.

Thank you for your honest concern for all Lee County citizens.

#### Concerned Captivans hope communications remain open

To the Editor The Islander

I wish to thank the CEPD Commissioners for a good meeting to discuss a finance plan for beach erosion control. Using the informal structure really helped communications, and the meeting was run beautifully.

After the publication of the January advertisements showing what Run Five monthly assessments would be for each property on Captiva, we talked to a large number of people about their assessments. We hope that the Concerned Citizens of Captiva ad contributed to a better understanding of Run Five: it appears to have initiated discussions on the financial issue. We found that there were several common complaints:

- •1. Commercial properties should be assessed more. •2. Everyone uses the road so everyone — or no one at
- all should be assessed for that use. •3. The square footage of the properties should be more important.
- •4. Front footage of gulf beach should be more important

•5. Revetments and other beach protection devices should be less important.

For these reasons, on behalf of the CCC Mike Cohen presented a proposed new financing plan to the CEPD. We hope this plan will be a first step towards a finance plan that is acceptable to the vast majority of Captivans.

Using the idea that the three neighborhoods on the southern two-thirds of Captiva are very different, that zones 4 and 5 (the Village) are using what is in effect a public beach, that zone 3 also has a public beach and zones 1 and 2 have what is essentially a private beach, we decided that in our plan each of these three neighborhoods would be responsible for funding erosion control on its own beach. Because of the differences mentioned, we divided the cost of the Village beach in half between gulf-front and non-gulf-fro owners, the cost of the 'Tween Waters area beach half between the county and the property owners, and the cost of the Gold Coast beach in a 10-1 split between gulf-front and non-gulf-front owners. However, different formulas could be used within these three areas depending upon the consensus of opinion in each neighborhood.

This extremely simple but essentially fair plan assesses property owners in zones 1 and 2 for the 1.8 miles of beach they use (or 33 percent of the total). those in zone 3 for the .95 mile of beach they use (20 percent of the total) those in zones 4 and 5 for the .5 mile of beach they use (11 percent of the total). Within each of the three areas, gulf-front owners are assessed on the basis of front footage and non-gulf-front owners are assessed based upon the total square footage of their property. South of South Seas Plantation, commercial properties assessments are raised to 11 percent of the total funds required. South Seas Plantation is assessed for 25 percent of the project. The county would be assessed for the square footage of all except

Karen Gudella "The information has been presented clearly. One thing that bothers me will be the increase in the tolls for those workers who have to pay their own way to cross the Causeway for work. Some businesses pay their employees' tolls. But for those businesses who don't, it will be tough on their employers.'



**Pete Rodgers** "The information has been a little confusing. I'm not sure what the whole thing could lead to. I think first a plan should be presented on what needs to be done. Then they should go after the money.'



**Betty Thompson** "The information has been presented clearly. I'm not too bothered by the proposals. I think the improvements to the Causeway are definitely necessary."

private roads on the Islands.

What all this adds up to is that:

 An average 100-foot gulf-front lot in zone 4 would be assessed approximately \$8,300; a 50-foot gulf-front lot in zone 4 would be assessed \$4,150; and an average lot in zone 5 would be assessed approximately \$700 after deduction of the road assessments.

• An average lot in zone 3 would be assessed approximately \$4,800. And where the county road runs along the beach, the county would be assessed for gulf-front footage.

• An average 100-foot gulf-front lot in zone 1 would be assessed \$15,100; an average 150-foot gulf-front lot in zone 1 would be assessed \$22,650; and an average nongulf-front lot in zone 2 would be assessed about \$1,700 after deduction of the road assessments.

• The average cost per parcel in South Seas Plantation would be about \$1,700.

We understand that a new finance plan will have to be legally defensible above all, thus we must all avoid taking a hardened posture on any of these points. Captiva needs emphasis on the factual over the emotional, and on problem solving over problem making.

We hope Captivans understand that we are making an honest and sincere attempt to move Captiva toward solution of its erosion problem. We invite the public's comments and criticisms of this plan.

Other trustees, maintenance workers and members of the environmental affairs, research, business affairs and land acquisition committees also contributed many, many hours, she said.







#### Sanibel man remains critical after tree accident

Sanibel resident Duane Gillingwater remains in critical condition this week after an accident that occurred when he was trimming an Australian pine tree last Wednesday morning, April 16.

Gillingwater, owner of Gillingwater Tree Service, was strapped into the 40-foot tall tree in Windward Way when it toppled to the ground. He was trapped under the limbs and suffered extensive internal injuries.

Gillingwater came through the first round of surgery over the weekend. Already he has received more than 80 units of blood in the intensive care unit at Lee Memorial Hospital.

The Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club, which along with other service clubs on the Islands sponsors regular bloodmobile visits to the Islands, has designated 120 units of blood to be used as Gillingwater needs it. Island residents and workers donate blood several times a year to be used as needed by other Island residents and visitors.

Gillingwater's need for blood has greatly reduced the supply on hand



Nearly two months remain until the June 1 start of the 1986 hurricane season, but it's not too early to begin planning.

Sanibel police urge every Island resident and businessman who will be here through hurricane season to consider ordering a Sanibel ALERT radio now.

When activated, the specially adapted Radio Shack weather radios transmit information from the Sanibel Police Department about storm coordinates, road conditions, Causeway status, power outages and other facts that could be vital as a hurricane approaches and in the aftermath of a strike.

Radio Shack makes the ALERT radios available at cost through the city of Sanibel. They must be ordered early, however, to ensure their delivery in time for hurricane season this year.

To order your ALERT radio complete the accompanying form and send it with a check for \$60 payable to the city of Sanibel to P.O. Box Q, Sanibel 33957. You will be notified when your radio is ready.



hen Sanibel resident Carl Melamet quit his job at Canterbury School two years ago his intent was not to give up teaching. He only wanted to change the location of his classroom — to the great outdoors.

Last May the 30-year-old marine biologist founded the Calusa Aquatic Program, an educational (and he hopes, eventually non-profit). organization whose purpose is to promote an awareness of the Southwest Florida marine environment. It was the first program of its type in

Instead of reading about it in books, Melamet's students learn about Florida's abundant marine life by wading through seagrasses, snorkeling along coral reefs and sloshing through the Islands' mangrove forests and wetland areas

"They (kids) need to get their hands on things They need to get all their senses involved." he says.

At Canterbury, private preparatory school in Fort Myers, Melamet had become distilusioned with both the amount of administrative work involved in teaching and with the system of grading

"I don't like putting pressure on people to learn things. I don't like holding up false yardsticks. And I don't like to threaten kids with failure." he

Besides, he adds with a grin, "This whole program leis me be a kid "

The goal of his new program is to make people aware of the marine environment. "We want them to be more knowledgeable and more sensitive to it so they can make wise decisions about the future of our resources," says Melamet

Although he admits it is not easy to gauge whether that goal was reached during the program's inaugural season, he happily relates encouraging reports from parents whose children participated last year. "They say when they pick up live shells their kids make them throw them

CAP's format is at once flexible and structured because, says Melamet, "I think the outdoors is a , place, to have, fun 🖰

Morning sessions of the program involve less in recreational activities such as swimming and windsurfing. Afternoons are set aside for investigating mangrove forests or becoming acquainted with the teeming aquatic community that inhabits the gross flats of Pine Island Sound.

"Give a kid a not and he just has a ball. We used to joke that it's that hunter/gatherer instinct," Melamet says, smiling, "They just can't believe all that stuff is out there."

He laughs when he tells how sometimes the little explorers snorkeling along in nine inches of water make up soundtracks as though they were in a Jacques Cousteau movie.

But youngsters are not the only ones who find wonder in the underwater world. Melamet often takes out adults who also are amazed to discover what lies beneath the surface of the water,

CAP is a vehicle Melamet uses to impress upon others the importance of not taking live shells disting out of the

"The shallow water habitats are so accessible. People don't realize the pressure they've put on live shells. I think they (shell populations) have been decimated in the last 20 years," he says.

A member of the Sanibel Wildlife Committee, Melamet currently is working to have the state's Marine Fisheries Commission decree live shelling (more than two per day) a punishable offense. The city's resolution as it now stands would be more effective if it were enforceable, he says

But to Melamet even two shells a day are too

"It seems to me that this would be one place not to have any live shelling allowed," he says. "Sanibel has set a lot of examples that have been followed around the country. Maybe it's time we

did that with marine life, too."

Melamet's concern goes back a long way. He grew up on the banks of the Chesapeake Bay, where he says nothing escaped his curiosity. But his interest in sealife was picqued by reasons other than educational ones, "We collected things to cat them," he admits.

As far as a career for young Melamet was concerned, "It's always been biology,"

He attended St. Lawrence University in upstate New York ("It was a long way from the ocean"). And it was not until he enrolled at the University of Maine that he blended his interests — sealife. biology and education — into a degree in marine education


Eventually, Melamet moved to Sanibel where


his family had vacationed for 12 years. What better place, after all, to study marine life. He taught life sciences at Canterbury for two years before starting CAP.

The program's second season begins June 16 and continues in two-week sessions through Aug. B. Like last year, students who live off the Island (by far the majority last summer) can be transported to and from Sanibel in the CAP van.

To participate in the summer "camp" one needs only the bare necessities: snorkeling gear. sunblock and a towel, a bathing suit and flip flops.

And, of course, kids who head out on a CAP adventure can leave their books behind.





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

## Islanders voice reservations about county's Causeway package

There appears to be growing concern among Sanibel residents that Lee County's \$100 million bond package proposed to finance improvements to the Sanibel Causeway and to build a parallel span to the Cape Coral Bridge might be a "pig in a poke."

Last Wednesday county commissioners agreed to ask a judge to let them issue the \$100 million in bonds to fund \$25-\$30 million in Causeway improvements and a \$35 million parallel bridge in Cape

With Commissioner Mary Anne Wallace the only dissenter, the commission also approved an innovative and complex financing plan that paves the way for an unlimited number of toll-funded road and bridge projects in the future.

Wallace maintained that the combined bond package was merely a ploy by the county to force users of the Sanibel Causeway to pay for other transportation projects in the county.

Tne newly reactivated Sanibel Island Property Taxpayers Association, Inc., is in total agreement with Wallace.

Paulette Burton, SIPTA vice president, told The Islander last week that an analysis of various documents produced by the county's financial consultant confirms that any excess revenue from Sanibel Causeway tolls after operating and maintenance costs and the reserve for eventual replacement are paid is "committed to funding other projects and/or available for general county operations."

"This despite repeated reassurances from Commission Chairman Porter Goss that not one nickel of Sanibel Causeway revenues would be used for anything other than the Sanibel Causeway," Burton said.

She said petitions are being circulated opposing

the county's finance plan.

Jean Fletcher is president and Terry Callahan is secretary-treasurer of the taxpayers association. The organization also objects to the proposed mingling of tolls from the Causeway and those that will be imposed on the existing Cape Coral Bridge as well as the unlimited number of transportation projects that could be funded in the future.

Gainesville attorney George Nickerson, the county's bond counsel, said the county would keep separate records for the Causeway and the Cape Coral facility and both would be self-supporting.

 A fixed span bridge with as low a profile as possible will be the first project in the county's Causeway improvement program.

• The two flat bridges will not be four-laned.

• The toll booth will remain at the Punta Rassa side of the bridge.

• The proceeds from the Sanibel Causeway will not be mixed with or used for any other bridge.

• The roadways across the Causeway islands must be raised to facilitate evacuation. Also recommended is restriping of the road between the islands to retain their essentially two-lane nature and reduce

 The exposed stretch of Summerlin Road east of the toll booth must be protected from wave erosion. • The toll structure should be no higher than is necessary for bonding feasibility, and increases should be proportionately equitable to Island residents, commuters and visitors.

In addition, Johnson told the commission last Wednesday the city would like to negotiate to increase its share of Causeway surplus funds slated under the new proposal to remain at 16 percent. The county will get a 40 percent cut, which can be used for any transportation project in the county. Captiva's share will stay at 4 percent.

Under the original bond agreement Sanibel's share of the surplus was 26 percent. But when the Causeway was refinanced in 1979 the percentage was reduced to 16 percent.

"We feel the city should get a little larger slice," Johnson said,

Attorney James Humphrey, representing the Captiva Civic Association, thanked the commission for its past consideration of Captiva's interests and expressed the residents' hope for the same equitable treatment in the future.

The commission will go to court within a month for validation of the proposed bond issue, the largest in the county's history. Validation is followed by a 30-day period during which anyone can object to the plan.

If there are no objections on July 23 the commission will adopt the necessary resolutions determining the amount of bonds to be sold and the amount of tolls needed to pay off the bonds.

considerably" from the proposal first presented last summer for changes to the current code. At that time the staff proposal to confine so-called "touristoriented" businesses to a newly created commercial district between Perwinkle Place and Tahitian Gardens shopping centers raised a loud hue and cry from shop owners.

This would result in the creation of scores of nonconforming commercial uses.

Under time constraints to draft and adopt a new Land Development Code by Dec. 1, the council deferred action on any change in commercial regulations at that time. The existing moratorium on commercial development was extended to Dec. 6 and then extended another six months to June 6, 1986.

Last Tuesday Rogers assured the council that "Relatively few changes are being proposed now." There will continue to be only two commercial districts, he said.

tegrated residential uses offered as an alternative to commercial uses.

Town Center District is designed to provide a variety of retail, office and service uses that serve the needs of Sanibel residents along with integrated residential uses of low and moderate intensities.

The most drastic change is a new list of permitted uses that will be the same for both districts with the exception of four uses that would be prohibited in the Town Center District.

These uses, which Rogers said accounted for 75 per-

cent of new businesses in the last few years, are: apparel and accessories stores; children's and infans's wear stores; gift, novelty and souvenir shops (including shell shops); and jewelry stores.

Only minor changes are suggested for the other regulations. They include the addition of grocery stores, food markets and local trucking operations to the conditional uses in both districts and minor changes in the standards that conditional uses must meet.

Rogers said the staff will draft an ordinance incorporating input from today's discussion for the planning commissioners to consider at their May 13 meeting.

Further input from business and commercial interests will be welcomed at this hearing, he said.

Following commission recommendation two public hearings on the ordinance will be scheduled before the City Council.

Under this scenario the ordinance could be adopted just under the wire three days before the current commercial moratorium expires June 6.

#### City fathers hope wheel locks will deter parking violators

● Is the use of WHEEL LOCKS OR "POLICE BOOTS" to crack down on illegal parking TOO "URBAN" FOR SANIBEL?

Wheel locks keep a vehicle immobilized until the parking fine is paid.

Mayor Louise Johnson said she had some problem justifying the use of this modus operandi that is common in large cities. But she agreed with her colleagues that it might send a signal that the city is serious about enforcing its parking regulations.

City Manager Gary Price said ticketing illegally parked cars has been ineffectual. Violators consistently ignore tickets or flagrantly disregard no parking signs at residents-only beach accesses, Price said.

More than 700 cars were ticketed during the past tourist season, but it has been almost impossible to collect the fines, he said, adding rental cars present the biggest problem.

Price said he was somewhat at odds with the Sanibel Police Department over the use of wheel locks.

The police say the system would be too time-consuming and would not be justified by future violations.

Price suggested a team approach with Public Works employees cooperating with police to install the wheel locks and a Finance Department employee on hand to collect the fine.

Price said he believed the locks would deter parking violators. "Whether or not you drive a rental car, if you think you might find a wheel lock

on it you're going to be careful where you park," he said.

The proposal to use wheel locks is part of an ordinance revising the city's vehicle impoundment procedures. The ordinance also provides for the establishment of a rotating wrecker policy, City Attorney David La Croix said.

The council will take final action on the ordinance at its May 6 meeting.

Councilman Bill Hagerup suggested that before use of wheel locks begins rental car agencies should be alerted of the new policy and advised to warn their customers.

●The City Council has passed a resolution urging the state Legislature to AMEND FLORIDA STATUTES to prohibit counties from collecting occupational license taxes from businesses that operate wholly within a municipality

These businesses would be subject only to occupational license taxes levied by the cities in which they do business.

The council contends that the current system of dual taxation (occupational license taxes collected by both the

county and municipality) is inequitable.

The distribution of portions of the county tax to municipalities on the basis of population is inequitable to cities such as Sanibel that have a small permanent resident population, the council stressed.

City Attorney David La Croix pointed out that several bills pending before the current session of the Legislature will allow local occupational license taxes to be increased.

But La Croix said the effect of the change would be to magnify the inequities to businesses in incorporated municipalities.

The council directed Mayor Louise Johnson to send copies of the resolution to the the various legislative committees now considering the amendments.

● The City Council is expected to adopt an AMENDMENT TO THE CITY'S BICYCLE ORDINANCE at its May 6 meeting.

After that date bicyclists can legally ride on the Sanibel roads even when a

bicycle path is available.

Last Tuesday the council agreed to change the language of the ordinance's provision that cyclists "must use" to "should use" bike paths when available.

By making this modification the city has not abandoned its policy to encourage the use of bike paths rather than public streets, Mayor Louise Johnson emphasized.

The oridinance also provides that failure of a cyclist to ride on the road in a careful and prudent manner will constitute careless driving and is a violation of the Florida statutes.

A new section will be added to the ordinance prohibiting the operation of an "easy rider" supine-style bicycle or moped on either the bike paths or city streets. Because the operators of these bikes have no clear line of sight over the handlebars, they pose a hazard to other users of the path, the council agreed.

● The City Council has granted permission for THREE ADDITIONAL

SPECIAL EVENTS TO BE HELD DURING 1986 AT THE SANIBEL COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION complex on Periwinkle Way.

Five of the six special events the ordinance permits at any one site during the year have already taken place, SCA board member Urban Palmer reported to the council last week.

The cushion of three extra permits raising the total to nine should fill the anticipated need for the remainder of the year, Palmer said.

The council approved the request by a 4-0 vote on the recommendation of City Manager Gary Price. Councilman Francis Bailey was absent.

● The City Council has accepted from Developer Paul Stahlin an EASE-MENT FOR DRAINAGE TO PRESERVE WETLANDS in the portion of Belle Meade subdivision that is under development.

● Two variances to the Land Development Code, DENIED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION, received UNANIMOUS CITY COUNCIL AP-PROVAL last Tuesday.

Though unable to find grounds to approve either variance, the commission had forwarded the requests to the council with recommendations for approval.

Afer Tuesday's council action Robert and Katherine Morris will be able to construct a 5x26-foot addition on the rear of their Gulf Pines home. The house built in 1973 encroaches into the setback from the centerline of Gulf Pines Drive. But because the planned addition does not increase the nonconformity, the council approved the variance.

Restrooms at the swimming pool at the Beachcomber condominiums on East Gulf Drive can be built at ground level and will be exempt from flood proofing regulations. The council last week approved a variance for the work requested by John Naumann of BTS Development Corp.

An amendment to the Land Develop-

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

ment Code now in the works will permit all restroom facilities required for common pool areas at multi-family complexes or single-family subdivisions to be built below federal base flood elevations.

• The VARIANCE Edwin and Patricia Collins need TO CONSTRUCT A 22x33-FOOT SWIMMING POOL at their Water Shadows home was **DENIED** by the Planning Commission April 8.

The screened pool, deck and spa would exceed the impermeable coverage and developed area permitted on the lot and would encroach into the 20-foot setback from the canal.

Because the configuration of the lot was not unique and the hardship was self-imposed, the application did not comply with Land Development Code criteria and the commissioners had no basis to approve the variance.

But they did vote 7-0 to remand the request to the City Council and recommended approval.

Edwin Collins pointed out that the

proposed pool site is the only location where mature vegetation would not be disturbed.

• The Planning Commission has recommended City Council approval of FOUR AMENDMENTS TO THE LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE.

At its April 8 session the commission found all four ordinances to be consistent with the Comprehensive Land Use

Last Tuesday the council considered all four on first reading and will take final action at its May 6 regular meeting.

The first ordinance amending the Special Events ordinance will require a city permit and city manager approval of activities taking place on public rights-of-way as well as those on private property. This will extend city control to cover parades, triathalons, foot races and similar one-time events that use public roads.

Island resident Dr. Calvin Brown told the council he favored the expanded control, but he said it did not go far enough.

There should be a provision in the ordinance to allow public input before the city manager can approve permits for events that might have a negative impact on residential areas, Brown said, adding the ordinance appeared to be 'rigged in favor of promotors.'

Though the promotor of a special event can appeal the city manager's denial of a permit to the City Council, the affected residents have no recourse when a permit has been approved for an event with the potential to disrupt their neighborhoods, Brown pointed

The councilmen saw some merit in Brown's suggestion, but City Attorney David La Croix advised them a separate ordinance would be required to implement the regulation.

The second of the four amendments will require an applicant to satisfy all conditions attached to a development permit within four months after the Planning Commission has approved the permit.

A third amendment will require that

notices informing property owners of Planning Commission hearings must be mailed at least 14 days but not more than 28 days prior to the hearing. Planning Director Bruce Rogers has indicated other aspects of the noticing procedure in the LDC need discussion.

The new LDC puts the burden on the applicant to furnish the Planning Department the names of adjacent property owners as shown on the public tax rolls. These must be submitted typed on gummed mailing labels, which the staff uses to mail out the public hearing notices. Rogers suggested that the cost of mailing the notices should be included as part of the fee for the development permit application.

The fourth amendment will correct an oversight when the code was originally adopted, Rogers said. It stipulates that the same procedures for commission hearings for development permits will be applicable for hearings of variances, interpretations of language, zone boundaries and conditional and temporary use permits.

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



## Is it too late to ride the market rally?

The rally in the financial markets continues to roll

The prices of long-term Treasury securities have risen nearly 10 percent the past month and 35 percent since October. Yields have come down and are now 3 percentage points lower than they were just six months ago.

Is it too late to ride the rally? No. But selection is important. Although we could see further price appreciation, it is unlikely that the frantic rally in U.S. Government Bonds can be sustained for a long

However, there is an attractive alternative for the fixed-income investor — municipal bonds.

Although yields have fallen since October, it is a fact that the rise in municipal bond prices has lagged the rise in U.S. Government Bond prices. The relative price performance of municipal bonds is a direct result of worries about the tax-exempt status of the bonds.

Especially disruptive was Sen. Robert Packwood's proposal to subject tax-exempt interest on all outstanding bonds to a 20 percent alternative minimum tax. The proposal practically closed the municipal bond market, and Packwood quickly joined his colleagues on the Finance Committee in voting to exempt from the minimum tax calculations all tax-exempt income on municipal bonds issued before Jan. 1, 1987.

The committee still must decide whether to apply a minimum tax on interest income from municipal bonds issued in 1986.

Obviously, the municipal market faces some unfriendly legislation. However, we believe that the municipal bond market already has discounted the worst, as demonstrated by the relative yields now available on tax-exempt securities.

a tax-exempt rate of 7 percent would have to get a 14 percent yield on a taxable bond to match that return. Even if a tax reform bill does materialize and the top marginal tax rate is reduced to 35 percent, the equivalent yield would still be an attractive 10.77 percent. Indeed, even an investor falling into the \$22,500-\$43,000 income bracket subject to a proposed 25 percent marginal tax rate would do better in terms of after tax return — 9.33 percent — than if funds were invested in a Treasury bond or a highgrade corporate bond.

We would not base a decision to invest in municipal bonds on the premise that tax reform will fall by the wayside. However, the yields currently available on tax-exempt securites are attractive even in the event that a tax-reform package is signed by the President.



#### Fourth grader gets a taste of engineering thanks to mentor program

Griffith Brown has always wanted to make things. Thanks to Derek Adams, he's off to an ambitious start.

Brown is now no stranger to a drill, electric saw or sander. And he knows how to make models to scale.

Brown is in the fourth grade at Sanibel Elementary School. Adams, a retired mechanical engineer, is Brown's mentor. Together they have created a scale model of the nature trail behind the school and another of a bird observation tower Brown would like to see there someday.

refuge, and all the young people could come and look out at the birds," Brown says. He already speaks in the careful, precise way of an engineer.

Brown and Adams are part of the "Senior Mentors for Creative Students" program that pairs senior citizens with students for special projects. The enrichment program is being piloted in Lee County at Sanibel

Elementary School.

The two have been working together twice a week after school for the past 10 weeks.

"Griffith has paced out every foot of the nature trail to learn how to make the scale model, and he even counted the exact number of sabal palms and where they were situated," Adams says.

After surveying the wetland area, the two drew lines to scale on a board. Then they collected moss and some large seeds to represent the trees in the area. The scale model is so specific it includes a cluster of three dead trees on the east end of the trail.

Then they started working on the


tower. Brown and Adams are both interested in ecology. As a fifth grader next year, Brown will be a nature guide on the school's own trail.

Their concern was how to build a tower without using heavy equipment.

The idea they came up with was generated from Adams' experience as an engineer in the arctic. The tower would have a flat bed that would "float" on the land, similar to buildings on the arctic permafrost. A series of tripod-like supports would hold a long, gentle ramp up to the tower.

"Everything could be taken in and built by hand," Brown says. He





Increased atmospheric carbon dioxide and other gases including methane, aerosol propellants and refrigerator gases, all, in one way or another, are the result of man's industrial and agricultural activities. Collectively they are called the greenhouse gases.

Atmospheric contaminants prevent the escape of reflected solar energy and hasten the destruction of the ozone layer. The effect of their increase probably is irreversible. Man can slow the process, but no one has found a way to halt or reverse this single-most destructive environmental phenomenon we face (excepting the ultimate one alluded to above).

In addition to the most commonly cited contaminant, carbon dioxide, you no doubt will recall the hubbub surrounding the gases used to propel certain kinds of aerosol products. These are known as chloroflurocarbons (CFCs). Efforts were made to halt the use of such products in the pharmaceutical and cosmetic industries. To some extent this was successful. Today we see consumer products delivered by pumps. Pumps are in; aerosols are, to a measurable degree, out.

But no effort has been made to control the escape of even larger

quantities of CFCs known as the freons and like products used as refrigerants in air conditioners and food cooling systems. It seems strange to make a big fuss about aerosols and to do nothing to encourage the refrigeration industry to restrain its huge pollution activities.

Next time your refrigeration maintenance man comes to check your air conditioning unit, follow him around (I have). Note how he conducts his business. I'll betdollars to donuts that if he has to clear a plugged refrigeration gas line, he will not blow it with clean, harmless, compressed air. Rather he will blow out the existing gases in the system employing new compressed freon, thereby compounding the atmospheric pollution.

You might ask the man why he does this. He'll say it's easier — and besides, the boss does not provide him with a tank of air or other harmless gas such as

nitrogen to use instead.

Refrigeration men usually carry a supply of extra refrigerant gas under pressure, but they do not carry clean air. Waste a little freon. Blow it into the air. Who cares?

I'll tell you who will care. Our descendants will, as the earth heats up.

Another major factor in the earth-warming complex is methane.

Scientists at a 1984 American Association for the Advancement of Science meeting in New York estimated that some 1.2 billion cattle exist in the world today. That is equal to about 20 percent of the human population. Each bovine, according to one scientist's calculation, produces about one cubic yard of methane per day. This magnificent flatulence puts into the atmosphere about 15 percent of a cubic MILE of methane each day! And this figure ignores the produc-

tion by other domestic animals, the populations of which are huge.

So every week a cubic mile of methane is put afloat into the atmosphere by cattle to add to the greenhouse phenomenon. That does not take into consideration the carbon dioxide exhaled by these 1.2 billion cattle, or for that matter, by the almost 5 billion people of the world, all of whom digest food more or less frequently and themselves contribute substantially to the methane and carbon dioxide (by respiration) that wafts up to that thermal blanket high in the sky.

Cattle are ruminants, those artiodactylid mammals that can convert low grade vegetation into high grade protein such as filet mignon, New York strip and Big Macs. They are indeed wonderful chemical factories that utilize bacterial action to digest vegetation forage. But ruminant digestion has the unfortunate side effect of producing massive flatulence. To the production of methane by cattle must be added that of goats, sheep, and the great herds of Northern Hemisphere caribou and the wildebeest, zebras and other multitudes of animals of Africa. All of these ungulates add to the insulation layer in the stratosphere through their massive collective digestive processes.

This huge production is not natural. It is influenced by mankind (except for that percentage produced by wild animals). The world's artificially inflated population of bovines is a man-induced phenomenon that adds to mankind's overwhelming negative influences working against the natural mechanisms of the biochemical cycle. We cannot divorce ourselves from responsibility.


Termites are another major gas contributor. As forests are

cut and wood scraps, stumps and underground roots lie about dead in ever-increasing quantities and as grasses spread into these wasted lands, the termite population increases exponentially. I know a place in Minas Gerais, Brazil, that used to be forested. But today as you look across the destroyed, desertified land-scape you see only thousands of termite nests. The termite population has been inflated by the man-provided factors of fallen and underground food sources and invading rough grasses.

A newly introduced termite in Florida is the Formosan termite, Coptotermes. It first came to the United States from the Orient, landed in Hawaii where it is a major (and so far unconquered) pest, then it found its way to New Orleans, where it is doing a lot of damage. Now it is in Dade and Broward counties in



# SCCF hopes controlled burn will restore healthy spartina habitat

Those people driving past the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation last Tuesday may have thought it was Chinese New Year's. The sound of hundreds of firecrackers seem to fill the air.

But instead of firecrackers, the explosive pops erupted from the hollow stems of spartina grass as they caught fire in a  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -acre controlled burn behind the Conservation Foundation building.

Helping control the fire were a crew from the state's Divison of Forestry, members of the Sanibel Fire Department, and a group of Conservation Foundation volunteers lead by Abbott Byfield, chairman of the SCCF Research Committee.

This was the first prescribed burn the SCCF has held since 1980.

"The spartina caused a high and hot flame — and a lot of it," said SCCF member Bill Webb. "It proved we left too long between burns. If it had been a wildfire, we really would have had some problems."

The potential of a wildfire caused by a tossed away cigarette or other flammable material is the primary reason the SCCF schedules a prescribed burn on these 2¼-acres behind the busy center.

But another important reason for such a controlled fire is to retain a healthy spartina marsh habitat.

"Unless there is a periodic fire, the spartina will strangle on its own detritus and also will be invaded by shrub species," Webb explained. "A fire will rejuvenate the area."

The burn in 1980 helped create a very healthy swale, Webb said. At that time the open grassy area was on the verge of becoming a Brazilian pepper wetland area. The controlled fire knocked back the invasion, and spraying garlon on what remained helped keep the Brazilian pepper from coming back.

Last week's controlled fire had its "interesting moments" despite the fact that the prescription from the state Division of Forestry was closely followed.

The Sanibel Fire Department liberally sprayed the building and the boardwalk with water to eliminate the chance of it catching fire.

And because the headfire's flame was so hot and moving so quickly, the person setting the back fire by the center road had to get out of the way quickly. Without the completed back fire, the fire jumped the road and began another small fire.

A Division of Forestry firefighter immediately jumped into a pickup truck to attack the spot fire. But the truck would not start. Others on the scene suppressed the spot fire before it could do any damage, however.

In the future, Webb said, SCCF members agree they should burn after a maximum of three years, and maybe every two years. It was their feeling that there should be only half the amount of "fuel" (spartina) in the marsh before they burn again

In addition, Webb said, the SCCF might consider future prescribed burns in other sections of its property.

#### Refuge hours will change along with animal habits

Least terns begin to nest on the beaches. Horseshoe crabs now spawn at the water's edge. And mottled duck broods can be seen along the Wildlife Drive in the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

These changes occur during the first part of May, as do the hours of operation at the refuge Visitor Center at the entrance to the refuge on Sanibel-Captiva Road.

Beginning this Sunday, April 27, the center will not be open on Sundays. Hours of operation Monday through Saturday will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The center will be closed on Memorial Day, the Fourth of July and Labor Day. All other refuge facilities are open from sunrise to sunset.



Through April several programs for the public will continue. The refuge staff shows a 15-minute slide orientation program at 10 a.m., noon and 2 p.m. daily to inform visitors about refuge facilities and self-guided activities. In addition, various films and slide presentations are shown in the Visitor Center auditorium throughout the week.

At 9:30 a.m. this Friday, April 25, a guided bird tour will leave from the flag pole in front of the

Visitor Center. "Birds of a Feather" will inform refuge visitors about what the local refuge and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is doing to ensure a continued existence of our feathered friends. Participants will also learn the identifying features of birds now on the refuge. Wear comfortable shoes and bring camera and binoculars for this 1½-hour tour.

And at 11 a.m. this Saturday, April 26, see "Designs for Living" in the Visitor Center auditorium. This 30-minute film discusses change through evolution.

All refuge facilities are free, including the exhibits and programs in the Visitor Center. For more information call 472-1100 during normal business hours.

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

# Pirate Playhouse is taking hold in the Island community

Producers Carrie Lund and Robert Toperzer say their second season here was a success in every way

Saturday night the curtain fell on the final 1985-86 production at the Pirate Playhouse. In its seven-week run, the sell-out comedy "The Foreigner" was hailed by many of those who saw it as a tremendous success.

Last week producers Carrie Lund and Robert
Toperzer used similar words
to describe the season that
just ended.

"It was certainly a financial success," Lund said.
"But more importantly, the response from the audience and volunteers was the greatest improvement (over the previous season)."

Toperzer attributed the popularity of the plays this year to a number of things, among them the fact that it was the company's second year on the Island.

"It's a gradual process, I think," he said. "It takes


a few years with a small theater. There are still many (residents) who have never been (to the playhouse), but gradually as the theater becomes more well-known more people will get there."

But "The Foreigner" did bring many to the box office window, he added. "It was helpful that it (The Foreigner) was talked about so much. One reason we decided to extend it was to bring in new patrons."

Also contributing to this year's success, Lund and Toperzer agreed, was the support they had from a group of enthusiastic residents known as the Island Theater Wing. Though no fundraisers have been held to date, the organization at least became firmly established in the community. At the start of next season members will be fully prepared to work to promote theater on the Island.

"They've done a lot and I think they can step in when we need assistance in the future," Lund said about the volunteer group. "They play a crucial part right now in keeping the playhouse running as a theater. We're depending on them to fulfill that

need. We couldn't ask for anything more."

Toperzer summed up, "We're much more secure with the wing behind us."

Also vital to the theater's continued existence were the volunteers whose time and energy helped make the season a success, Lund emphasized. "I want to thank all the people who walked through our door or called. I want them to know how much we appreciate their help," she said.

Nevertheless, they agreed, there were times when they were short manpower in the box office. They hope next year to almost completely relinquish ticket duties to volunteers.

Lund and Toperzer have not selected plays for next season yet, but they have narrowed the field considerably. They plan to do a "heartwarming" comedy over the holiday season, and the rest of the season will likely be comedies as well. But Toperzer stressed that the plays will be varied.

"It might be more profitable to do three plays like 'The Foreigner,' but in the long run it's not healthy," he said.

Many factors are involved in selecting a play, he added A lot depends on finding the right cast and directors (and housing for them), as well as finding a script that is right for the Sanibel audience.

Admittedly, he said, it's nearly impossible to judge how the audience will react to any show. The producers had a few misgivings about "The Foreigner," and it proved to be the most successful of all. On the other hand, last year's "Barefoot in the Park," Neil Simon's popular comedy, was the least well-received of any of the Lund-Toperzer productions.

"The audience definitely plays a major character in the play," Lund said.
Toperzer added, "It makes a big difference in the way the actors respond. The key is if you have two or three good laughers. That's kind of an aid to the rest of the audience — it says to them it's okay to laugh."

That positive reaction by the audience is good for business in many respects, Lund said. "The directors and actors who've come down (to Sanibel for the playhouse season) want to come back. You can start building a future season when you can depend on those actors and directors."

They are optimistic about Yale professor Leon Katz (who directed this season's "Private Lives") returning next year. He apparently already has voiced his hope to do a George Bernard Shaw play on Sanibel stage.

And it's Katz they have in mind when talking about starting a "director's forum" next year. Lund says the medium would allow the director to "express his views about the play to the audience."

"Leon is the prime example of that sort of thing," she said. "He'll excite you about your work, and he could do the same for an audience."

Until they return in the fall, Lund and Toperzer will be in Vermont producing theater for the Green Mountain Guild.

# Fledgling support group will spend the summer working to promote high-caliber theater

Saturday marked the end of the 1985-86 season at the Pirate Playhouse. But that doesn't mean members of the theater support group, the Island Theater Wing, will be idle until the curtain rises again next fall.

The off-season means membership drives and time to formulate some long-range plans, according to chairman Walter Klie.

"What we're basically trying to do is protect the Pirate Playhouse as a historical institution and landmark on the Island. We're trying to acquire it for preservation — and that will take some funding. We're developing a game plan right now."

Whatever the strategy is, it's going to take some money.

Though the ITW has been incorporated just since January, it has already established itself as a viable cultural organization in our community with

more than 100 members.

The organization was the brainchild of a group of culturally-minded residents who wanted to lend support to any Island theater group that might be deserving of their help. But at present, the ITW is focusing its attention in one direction. Klie does not hesitate to admit that, "Our pet project is the Pirate Playhouse."

ITW members hope to see the caliber of theater such as that produced at the playhouse in the last two years continue. And while Klie acknowledges it will be no small task to acquire the historic landmark on Periwinkle Way, he is optimistic that it can be done.

Another problem the ITW eventually will face involves getting the playhouse property properly zoned. Although it had been designated a permitted use, the theater reverted to residential when the permit expired in January.

Klie is hopeful that the city will cooperate with the ITW if and when the group acquires the theater.

In the meantime, Klie says, the group is concentrating on encouraging membership, which in turn helps raise money for the cause. Even though membership seems high, he says emphatically, "We need more." An intensive membership drive will be undertaken this summer. And he says members are already planning a season opening party in the fall.

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# Any finesse worth taking is worth taking properly

If a finesse is worth taking at all, as in this week's trump suit, it is worth taking properly.

East took his top diamonds and shifted to the 10 of hearts. South, Pakistani expert Masood Selim, won the heart shift with the ace and planned to lead a trump to dummy's king and then finesse through East.

To guard against a 4-1 trump break, South led a high spade to dummy's king. This refinement paid off when West had to play the nine on the first round of spades.

Masood next led dummy's six of spades and let it ride for a finesse, **POINT** COUNT



stayng in the dummy as a result of saving the five. When West showed out, declarer ruffed a diamond, took the top clubs and ruffed a club.

South finally cashed the king of hearts and gave up a heart, after which he was sure to win the last two tricks with the A-10 of trumps. If South failed to ruff twice, he would eventually have

to lead trumps from his hand, and East would take the setting trick with the queen of spades.

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
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
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
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# Parsley or cream can cover almost any cooking goof

Every cook I have ever studied with has made an occasional error. Either the souffle falls or the vegetables overcook. But they seldom panic, and neither should you.

The most famous case of a chef panicking involved Vatel, who was chef for the Prince de Conde in 1671. When the fish did not arrive in time for dinner Vatel killed himself. This is what I call over-reacting.

People nowadays do not take cooking that seriously. If my souffle falls I call it "a la Maison" or "a la Bobbie." So far my guests have been polite. If my popovers do not pop I call them Croatian Crullers. Who's to argue?

Don's fuss over your mistakes, it just calls attention to them. If there is too much salt in a soup or ragout, put in a raw potato and cook for about five minutes to

soak up the excess salt. (Remember to remove the potato before serving.) Another good cover-up is chopped parsley. This takes care of a multitude of

sins, from overcooked meat and eggs to overdone lima beans. (Puree the limas and cover with chopped parsley. The parsley at least diverts the eye if not the palate.)

When your dessert does not turn out right, sift confectionary sugar over it or use whipped cream with brandy. It's hard to lose with the latter.

As a safety measure before entertaining always have parsley on hand and whipped cream. Act casual. One error I could not cover up with either parsley or cream was the time a small green frog jumped out of the centerpiece. All I could say was "Oh there you are!" as if it were a long-lost friend who arrived very late.

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
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
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## Cooking Continued

The following recipes are hard to make mistakes with, but remember nothing is foolproof.

### Sesame Chicken Wings

1/4 cup soy sauce

2 tbs. honey

2 tbs. cider vinegar

1 tbs. peeled and grated fresh ginger root

1 tbs. sesame seed oil

2 medium garlic cloves, minced

1/4 tsp. cayenne or tabasco sauce

3 pounds of chicken wings (take wing tips off and save for stock

3 tbs. sesame seeds

In a large glass or pottery bowl combine the soy sauce, honey, vinegar, ginger root, sesame oil and ayenne or tabasco. Then put in the chicken wings and coat well. Cover and chill overnight. Stir once or twice before cooking to recoat the wings. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Place wings on rack and cover with the sesame seeds. Bake for 30 minutes. If you want them crispier run under a broiler for a few minutes. You can do all this ahead of time, but only cook the wings for 20 minutes and then finish off right before you serve

If you are looking for a slightly different vegetable - and we all do become a bit weary of string beans, green peas, etc. — try this:

### **Blue Cheese Baked Mushrooms**

2 pounds of large mushrooms

1 cup fine bread crumbs

1/4 tsp. minced chives tbs. butter

cup crumbled blue cheese

1/4 cup sherry or brandy

1/2 cup heavy cream

Wash mushrooms and dry, remove stems (save for soup stock or omelet). Divide crumbled cheese in half and put some in mushroom cavities. Layer mushrooms in the bottom of a casserole with a lid (make sure the cavity side is up). Set rest of mushrooms aside. Cook chives and bread crumbs in butter just enough to coat the crumbs. Toss crumbs with the rest of the blue cheese. Now put a layer of the crumbs on top of the mushrooms and then the next layer of the mushrooms, then put what remains of the crumbs on top. Drizzle the sherry or brandy on top and then pour the cream carefully over the mushrooms. Cover with lid and cook 25 minutes in 375 oven.

This can be set up in the morning and refrigerated until ready to cook.

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
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

# New reference additions can help organize your complex world

The Sanibel Public Library has recently acquired a unique and useful reference work called Personal Forms on File and Business Forms on File.

Have you ever wished you had a way of systematically collecting, recording, reporting and keeping the mass of data necessary to get along in this complex world today? Do you wish you could find personal information easily and promptly?

Personal Forms on File is a large, loose-leaf collection of more than 150 forms for organizing personal records. There is an inventory of household goods, a yearly account of expenses, automobile maintenance schedule, a record of net worth, forms pertaining to military and veterans affairs, education and real estate, wills, a power of attorney, a prenuptial agreement. The list is endless.

Each form is clearly printed on heavy stock suitable for reproduction on the copier available in the library.

Business Forms on File is similar in format and offers more than 150 forms to make the task of organizing business information easier. It includes forms most often requested from such agencies as the Internal Revenue Service, Small Business Administration, Department of Labor and other government bodies. Areas covered include accounting and finance, government programs, the legal field, real estate, taxes and miscellaneous related sub-

jects. These forms are free of copyright restrictions and can be easily reproduced for personal use.



Similar in format is the two-volume set of Maps on File. This is a loose-leaf collection of about 400 maps designed explicitly for copying by students, teachers, business people, travel agents, newspaper editors - anyone who needs to copy a map. It covers every country in the world, every U.S. State and Canadian province, all oceans, continents and major economic and political issues. It is made even more useful by an index of more than 5,000 entries of cities and geographic

Each loose-leaf map is printed on extra heavy stock and can be readily reproduced on the copier in the library. They are free of copyright restriction

All of these loose-leaf volumes ar published by Facts on File Publications, New York. They can be found in the Reference Department of the Sanibel Public Library.



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



# Captiva Island Yacht Club members seek fun more than serious sailing

If you think you've seen an unusual armada boating up and down Pine Island Sound, rest assured. You haven't seen a mirage from the past.

Instead of a waving Spanish flag or a threatening skull and crossbones flag, this armada flies a "burgee" decorated with a large pelican and a capital "C."

The armada hails from Captiva and represents the Captiva Island Yacht Club. The group is in its second year of operation and is beginning to cut a big wake in the local boating and social scene.

But one thing the yacht club does not want to be is pretentious. Members own everything from 58-foot sailing yachts to Hobie Cats. Many own small motorboats, and some own no boat at all. About 40 percent come from Sanibel, with the rest residing on Captiva.

The club has taken some major strides since its inception in January 1985. In the past year the group has grown to 95 members. Some of those members got together and converted an older duplex that once housed musicians who played at 'Tween Waters Inn into a temporary clubhouse.

"We're not a yacht club where we all get together to race boats," says member Mike Cohen. "For the most part, we're powerboaters. And this is primarily a social club."

Members get together for dinner at the 45-seat club which faces Roosevelt Channel. A deck outside holds an additional 20 seats. The view includes the dock at 'Tween Waters, plus Buck Key, where several palm trees jut out of the surrounding mangroves.

"This is a place where we can get away from the crowds and be around people we know," Cohen says. "We drive up and down Captiva Road and see people's names on mailboxes, but there's not much chance to meet those people. This club has brought some of us together."

Members plan several luncheon cruises each month to places

such as Useppa, Cabbage Key, Island Harbor and Boca Grande. In April the club also sponsored an overnight trip down to Port of the Islands outside Everglades City

But despite the strides made in the past year, the club is not ready to rest. Members are seeking a permit for a dock and are looking for a more permanent facility where they could build amenities ranging from a pool to tennis courts to a bigger and better clubhouse.

Nor is the club standing still with membership. The CIYC initially planned to limit membership to 100 people but is now in the midst of a membership drive to encourage more people to join. The ambitious crew hopes the club will rival the better-known yacht clubs — some of whose flags grace the walls of the Captiva clubhouse.

Now the company has come out with a variation that some snook casters think is going to replace the old standard. What the MirroLure folks have done is make the old design slimmer and added a silver spinner to the tail just ahead of the last treble hook.

They have attached a lip to the front of the plug, even on the shallow running lures. This gives the lure durability and helps give more "action" as it is retrieved.

And they have also put in a rattle. Several companies have tried this in the past few years, and some anglers believe it draws fish. MirroLure apparently felt strongly enough to add it to its new series.

There is a wide range of colors besides the redhead, white-body with lip, rattle and spinner. One friend of mine who always does well late at night casting for snook thinks the Mirro-Lure is one of the best he has ever used.

Incidentally, I get a lot of questions from anglers wondering about colors for jigs. Some think that

when the water is clean and clear the light-colored or white tails work best. They also say yellow should be used when the water is murky.

That's probably a good general rule. But I still suggest you take a variety of colors when fishing with Trout Touts or other lead-head, plastic-body jigs. I like pink with a sparkle in it; some trout casters prefer green or clear, trying to stay as close as possible to the natural color of shrimp.

As you will read here often, your odds of catching fish are much greater if you have a small piece of real shrimp on the hook of that jig. I usually think of these lures as basically bottom-type offerings, so that means they work best on hard sand bottom.

The presence of thick grass tends to hang up the lure and steal the shrimp from the hook. Patches of

clean bottom near large grass beds are ideal spots for this type of artificial lure.

Fish imitator lures such as the reds and white mentioned above are usually medium to surface type lures. So, in order to cover top to bottom, you will need at least two kinds of lures.


I've tried trolling for Spanish mackerel and a scattering of bluefish in the past couple of weeks, but these late season cold fronts tend to make life difficult for trollers.

Outside of the major passes such as Redfish, Captiva and Boca Grande and then south of the Lighthouse are prime places to look for mackerel and bluefish. Pick a spot without too much wind or wave action. Trolling in two- or three-foot seas gets sloppy and is not as productive as trolling on mild days with calm seas.

The old stand-bys of number 1/0 or 2/0 silver spoons with five or six feet of fine coffee-colored wire leader will bring strikes when the fish are in the area. Some of the largest ladyfish I've seen since last summer have moved into the waters, too.

Ladyfish and tarpon are in the same family, and they appear around the same time every spring. Ladyfish, by the way, make great bottom bait for the big silver kinds.


Good fishing this week. And if you are one of those who cannot pass up a new lure, try one of the rattling wigglers.


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

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


# A loaf of bread could solve your shell transporting problems

I've been thinking back over the past few months of busy shelling charters. This week I want to share a few insights some other collectors have passed on.

We had a fairly good year for sand dollars, which are a big favorite of nearly every collector who comes to the Islands.

Everyone can recognize the round, sand-colored sand dollar. So finding them, although not easy, was



not the problem. What causes collectors to throw up their hands in frustration is the challenge of getting their finds home in one piece.

I cannot count the number of times someone in my group has tucked away a couple of sand dollars in a pocket and then casually bumped into something, only to break the sand dollar into many pieces. There has to be a million ways to destroy them. A man once carefully stacked all his sand dollars on the deck of my boat and then innocently turned around and stepped right on the pile.

Anyway, not long ago I had a couple out who had come up with a tip you might want to try to remember the next time you find a few sand dollars. Until last year these folks, too, had suffered through many broken sand dollars in their luggage.

But last year, as they were packing to go home, the wife went out and bought the cheapest loaf of bread she could get. She placed a sand dollar between each slice in the loaf. They all arrived home in perfect shape.

Several weeks ago a couple of staffers from Southern Living magazine came down to do a story about shelling. We did a story with them 1½ years ago, too. This time they asked if they could share a shelling trip with another couple so they could get candid shots and a different angle for their story.

A very nice young couple joined us that morning, and they related a rather amusing story I have since thought about quite often as I walk the beach for shells.

It seems that the guy was not having too much luck finding shells in front of their rented condo on Sanibel. So even though the water was chilly, he




waded out to shoulder depth and started finding shells. His wife waited on shore as he tossed in the better whelks, fighting conchs, tulips and so on:

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

million individuals.

This is a far higher population figure than our native termite species reach (and all 3 million produce greenhouse gases). It is said that termites, after cattle, produce more of these gases than any other source except those directly attributable to man, i.e., fossil fuel consumption and refrigeration gases.

I recall once standing by a chimney created by termites on a lake shore in East Africa. This dark chimney was the size of an old-fashioned stovepipe. When I put my arm down inside, the air was so hot that it was very uncomfortable and I had to withdraw immediately to keep from being seriously burned. (I estimated the temperature to be 170-190 degrees Farenheit.) The hot gases, of course, were rising fast, contributing carbon dioxide and methane to the thermal blanket high in the atmosphere. Someone close to the specialist who is studying this termite species told me the exhaust from the stack was very, very rich in carbon dioxide and methane, an observation I did not find at all hard to believe.

Deforestation, especially of the super-vital rain forests such as those of Amazonia, the Philippines, the Congo Basin and Indonesia, drastically slows down the ability of earth's biological forms to absorb carbon dioxide. As everyone knows, plants consume — they need — carbon dioxide. So we must add the negative

Florida, where I understand a single nest can hold 3 factor of destroyed rain forests being unable to continue their normal performance as carbon dioxide 'absorbers" or, more properly, sinks.

Plankton also comprise a carbon dioxide sink. This sink function of plankton (and also planktonic contribution of oxygen) is negatively affected by ocean pollution.


But the above-cited exotic sources, cattle, termites and deforestation, are not the biggest problems, only the most interesting ones.

The BIG problem is the burning of fossil fuels by mankind. We are hurling billions of tons of carbon dioxide into the air as we rapidly deplete our oil, gas


Termites, whose numbers are so great that they reduce to small change the numbers that express our national debt, feed on cellulose: wood, roots and grass. They emit unbelievably huge quantities of methane and carbon dioxide that rise to join other greenhouse gases in the thermal blanket high in the sky.

The termite nests shown are on the plains of Africa. The heat generated by the physiological processes of these small insects is sufficient to burn your arm if you thrust it down into a termite nest chimney.

and coal supply. Of significant importance, but often overlooked, is the firewood and charcoal used throughout the Third World for cooking the food that feeds most of our 5 billion fellow human beings.

Industrialization — manufacturing — the smokestack society — started in Europe at the time of the industrial revolution and spread in a big way to America, and later to Japan and now the world. It provides by far the largest volume of greenhouse gases (mostly carbon dioxide, but also some oxides of nitrogen and even water vapor).

Of carbon dioxide alone, industry (and home heating and automobiles) sends some 5 billion tons wafting up to the stratosphere each year, where it stays — forever — to add to the thermal blanket.

Let us now examine how the greenhouse effect

The complete spectrum of sunshine — solar energy — strikes the earth's atmosphere, penetrates it selectively and warms the earth's atmosphere and surface. Normally much of the ultraviolet light is absorbed by the ozone layer, which effectively "strains" many of these dangerous rays to safer levels.

Greenhouse gases compromise the effectiveness of the ozone layer and allow increased UV and visible wave lengths to pass through the atmosphere and ab-

normally heat the earth's surface. The heated earth's surface — especially rock — then radiates infrared or heat energy back into the sky, where much of this energy is trapped by the thermal blanket of greenhouse gases. Its escape blocked by the greenhouse gases, the whole earth's temperature must increase — and increase it does!

EPA's Stephen Seidel summarizes: "The greenhouse theory assumes that, holding everything else constant, altering the composition of the atmosphere by adding large quantities of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases will warm the earth."

The National Academy of Sciences convened a study panel in 1979 whose conclusion was that a doubling of pre-industrial carbon dioxide would cause a global temperature increase of 3 degrees Centigrade. The panel recognized that these findings would be "comforting to scientists but disturbing to policymakers."

The panel further commented: "We have tried but have been unable to find any overlooked or underestimated physical effects that could reduce the current estimated global warming."

This disturbing information triggered the convening of another NAS group in 1982 to re-examine the above conclusions in view of recent research. Conclusion: "The present study has not found any new results that necessitate substantial revision of the conclusions of the (1979) report."

Based on (a) pre-industrial revolution calculations of carbon dioxide atmospheric content, (b) present day levels, and (c) the rate of carbon dioxide emissions of today and projected, it is estimated that carbon dioxide levels will double pre-industrial levels by

Pre-industrial levels were +- 300 parts of carbon dioxide per million. 2050 AD levels will be +- 600 parts of carbon dioxide per million. This would produce a significant warming of +-3 degrees Centigrade by micentury. By 2100 AD we would be talking about 5 to 6 degrees Centigrade. Add the effects of other greenhouse gases (the above only considers carbon dioxide) and the crucial dates of 3 degrees Centigrade and 6 degrees Centigrade increases would move measurably closer to the present.

Seemingly insignificant, +-3 and +-6 degrees Centigrade increases are of great importance to our industry, agriculture, climate, seaports and a whole host of other things we take for granted.



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# **MASTIC TREE** <u>Mastichodendron</u> foetidissimum

No finer shade tree exists in the tropics than the mastic or jungle-plum known to taxonomists as Mastichodendron foetidissimum. The mastic is a large valuable timber tree found along the coast of Florida from Lee County south.

The mastic grows to heights of 50 feet with a large straight trunk ranging to three or four feet in diameter. Stout branches with reddish brown branchlets sup-

port an irregular crown.

Leaves on mature trees have characteristic wavy margins and are oval to oblong. They are bright green and shiny on their upper surface and yellow green

Some people relish the fruits pleasant flavor. It is olive-shaped with a firm yellow skin and thick sticky flesh that glues your lips together after eating one or two. Most of the fruit ripens in March or April and remains on the tree for several weeks

Though very beautiful and an exceptional shade tree, the mastic is not adapted for the impatient gardener of toady. Those residents who have a mastic in their yard should consider themselves fortunate indeed and builders should go to whatever lengths necessary to protect these trees where they occur on property being developed.



country as a whole.

# **HELP FOR HOOKED BIRDS!**

Among the most common injuries to birds received at C.R.O.W. are those caused by their entanglement in fishing line. If a pelican grabs your bait when you are fishing and gets hooked, you can help! Please follow the steps outlined here:

- 1. Reel bird in slowly.
- 2. If in a boat, use a landing net and boat the pelican.
- 3. If on a pier, walk the pelican to shore
- 4. Cover bird's head with shirt or towel to
- 5. Hold middle of bill with one hand and place your other arm over bird's back and around wings.
- 6. Carry bird to get help.
- 7. Cut line close to hook and get all monofilament off wings, legs and body.
- 8. If possible, cut barb from hook and back hook out.
- 9. If not possible to remove hook, place bird in large box or wrap in towel and bring to C.R.O.W.






