



kay, the island populations are diminishing once again and you can actually drive the length of Periwinkle inconsiderably less than an hour without even breaking the speed

While the commuting is much easier there are some drawbacks. First, some of our good friends are gone and we won't see them for several months; on the other hand, it's a lot easier to get a seat at the bar. You see the dilemma.

Anyway, another drawback is the reduction in the volunteer pool, and now there is a new organization on Sanibel that could really use the help.

Operation Redstart is the new program underway at the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's facility at Tarpon Bay Lab. Under the resourceful leadership of Bob Wasno from the University of Florida, a small but incredibly hardy and hard-working band of volunteers have put together the tanks and pumping equipment that have now

succeeded in bringing a few thousand redfish hatchlings from just an inch or two up to some six or eight inches.

These babies are doing very well and before long they will be tagged and returned to the part of Tampa Bay from whence they came.

Fascinating as this is

- and I assure you, it is — they could use some help. The volunteer corps for this project is some 18 to 20 people who cover a wide spectrum of experience and education. They range from salesman to medical doctor to college professor to fishing guide to chemical engineer, and more.

Some will stay, some will migrate. But even if they all stayed, now that Operation Redstart is up and running, they need help to keep it going. They are

looking to double the number of volunteers who can be available at least two days a week and hopefully a little bit more. Volunteers are needed for two shifts per day to attend to feeding, testing and maintaining water quality, and maintenance of the equipment.

If you ask the current volunteers about their involvement, they will tell you about the fun they have, the things they learn, and the rewards of doing something extremely worthwhile. Many are avid fisherfolk and they all express a strong desire to make sure their grandchildren will be able to go fishing too.

Without research programs like Operation Redstart and a commitment to ways of defeating problems of overfishing and pollution, those kids won't have much to fish for.




Red Cross offers babysitting course

Many parents believe that any young person is a good candidate for babysitting services. They need to realize that babysitting is no longer a simple matter of feeding, diapering and putting down children at bedtime. Being around babies, infants, and toddlers does not qualify kids to be good babysitters.

The Lee county Chapter of the American Red Cross can provide proper training through its six-hour babysitting course. The fun, interactive course targets youths ages 11 to 15 and provides them with the information, skills and confidence to care for infants through primary school-age children. It provides a range of injury prevention tips, first aid and basic care skills and helps develop professionalism and skills in decision-making and leadership. 

You keep me going and there are some days when that's all that keeps me going.

So, this Friday when the girls are listening to Louis Prima and Bobby Darin, and while they are watching Moonstruck and My Cousin Vinny, I will remember to make a toast to this crazy life and how incredibly blessed I have been to be on this journey with so many of you. I will toast to good health and long life and I will believe anything is possible as long as you have good friends and a sense of humor. Thank you for giving me both.

Barbara Von Harten, principal of the Sanibel School, learned Friday that the school's eighth graders ranked number one in "Florida Writes," the state's FCAT writing test. The students averaged slightly over 5.1 out of a possible six points, edging out Miami Shores/Barry University. The next highest score in the Lee County School System was the Diplomat Middle School with a 4.4 average.

The test has two versions—expository writing and persuasive writing. Students don't have a choice. When they sit for the test and open their packets, they find out which one they have been assigned. Then they have 45 minutes to respond to a prompt. Fifty-five Sanibel eighth graders sat for the test, 28 got the expository topic; 27, the persuasive one.

No Sanibel student scored less than a 4, which is categorized as "meeting standard." Approximately 27 students exceeded standards (4.5-5.5), and thirteen students scored perfect scores (6).

Von Harten also learned just recently that Sanibel School third graders scored number one in the state among regular schools on this year's FCAT reading test, averaging 3.63 out of a possible 5 points. The only other school in the state that scored higher was Pine View School for the Gifted, which averaged 3.72. The next highest school in Lee County was Celebration School, with an average score of 3.42.

The reading score, as mentioned above, is measured on a five-point scale; however, just as with the writing test, no Sanibel student scored lower than "meeting standard."

Most were "at or exceeding standard," and 10 students had perfect scores.

When asked to what she attributed such high achievement, Von Harten cited three factors: the kids, the teachers, and a school-wide philosophy that stresses reading and writing especially in the early grades. "The teachers are so focused," said Von Harten, "but they also make learning fun. If children learn to read well in the early grades, kindergarten and first grade, then they can read to learn in the later grades."

Von Harten also cited a three-year continuity of teaching, which she called "looping," that eliminates student assessment at the beginning of each year, because the teacher knows the students and their levels of accomplishment.

When the students were asked, they were less technical; they credited their teachers, especially Mrs. Cheryl Darbyshire and Mrs. Carol Smith, their language arts teachers. And according to Von Harten, they also said "we worked hard — we earned it."

Fishing & Shelling

Of ghost traps, snook and flesh-eating shells

The 15th of May officially ends stone crab season for a few months, but often what is left behind as a reminder are lost traps. These can become quite a danger to boaters and manatees.

We call them "ghost" traps because they can appear just about anywhere the tides or strong storms can place them. There is usually a long plastic line with an attached float. Boaters hate to see the ghost traps because the line can wrap around a moving propeller and potentially damage the lower unit.

Once, at Johnson Shoals when there was a deep cut from the Gulf into the inside waters, I watched as it seemed a crab float was being washed into the cut at a speed faster than the tide. It was a manatee with a crab line wrapped around one front fin and neck. It was strong enough to disappear underwater and take the float with it, so I never did find out what happened.

Most trappers are hard-working folks who keep track of expensive traps very carefully. They try and drop the traps in a line and mark them on a GPS (Global

Positioning System) so they can use the position finder to return to the traps, even in the darkness of early morning. However, storms will scatter them and bury the traps so no one can pull them up. I am always on the watch for ghost

traps on the route I run daily to the upper islands.

Anyway, trappers and volunteers are going to make an even greater effort this year to clean up the traps, which are a great curiosity to island visitors who find them washed ashore during strong winter

Snook season.

It's over until Sept. 1, so it is all catchand-release for the next few months. The summer is the best time to catch these fish, but it is also when the big females

and clusters of males show up around the passes and along the beaches — i.e., easy pickin's. Over-fishing has resulted in all the closed times for this very popular game fish as state biologists try to bring back the snook population. One way to accomplish that is to close the fishery during the months in which they are easiest to catch.

Freshly caught small fish like the pinfish, shiner and mutton minnow are very effective for bringing in strikes. Also, the same baits work well on redfish sea trout, Spanish mackerel, jacks and others so although you might be thinking snook, don't be surprised to see others chasing down your fresh, live baits. Carefully release your snook and try not to take it out of the water. Get a quick photo and let it go. Each year snook fishing gets a little stronger.

Flesh-eating shells

During the nearly three week period of red tide a month ago, hundreds of fish were killed and washed to shore, much to the delight of a beautiful shell collectors call a king's crown conch.

There always seems to be one fish which gets hit the worst and this time it was the various groupers in the Gulf which were killed in large numbers. We were finding huge goliath grouper of a hundred pounds or more washed to the beaches on North Captiva and Cayo Costa islands. While the red tide can be thought of as a massive killing machine, there is some good which comes out it. Remember in the sea world, nothing goes to waste.

I came upon the remains of a grouper of about ten pounds on the bayside waters of North Captiva island and it was covered in ravenous king's crowns. These black and white pattern conchs are about two to three inches tall and were hard at work eating as much of the fish as possible before the low tide would force them into deeper waters. Many who are new to shelling can't believe that live shells can survive out of the water, but several kinds, including this conch, can stay high and dry for several hours while they devour fish or crabs.

Good shelling this week and remember to release all snook you catch. Law enforcement people have been much more visible checking for fishing licenses and catches, particularly along the causeway islands. So get that license if you are a non-Floridian and over the age of 15.

Dead sea turtles on San-Cap total 21

The 21st dead sea turtle of the season was discovered on the beach by Sanibel Arms on Tuesday morning, May 6. Paul Andrews, a permittee in the Sea Turtle monitoring program administered by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, estimated that the female loggerhead weighed between 200 and 250 pounds and was between 20 to 50 years old.

The turtle was tangled in crab trap robes and had also sustained serious injuries to her hindquarters, including the shell. Tissue samples were taken and will be sent to the Florida Marine Research Institute, which maintains statistics on sea turtles and will also determine whether or not red tide had affected the loggerhead. The turtle may have drowned after having been caught in the ropes or paralyzed by red tide; death could have been caused by a boat collision; or the injuries from a boat could have come after she was disabled by entanglement or red tide.

Of the 21 turtles washed up on Sanibel and Captiva beaches, three were Kemps-Ridleys, which are endangered. Two of the 21 were wrapped in monofilament, which may have caused them to drown: one had monofilament wrapped all around its head and one had monofilament wrapped so tightly around one flipper that the flipper was almost amputated. Manatees also lose flippers to monofilament; as the animal tries to twist itself free, it actually winds the monofilament tighter and

this week. In 2000, a new record was set when 33 sea turtles were found dead on San-Cap beaches; in 2001 there were 22 and in 2002 there were 19. With 21 to date this year, we will probably break the 2000 record. Other threats to sea turtles include long-line fishing and net fishing: some loggerheads, too large to escape through the turtle excluder device, drown.

Andrews also pointed out that the timing of the Fort Myers Beach Offshore Power Boat Races puts turtles in danger. Sea turtles mate close to shore in about 10-15 feet of water; a mating pair was recently seen off Lighthouse Beach. After mating, the male departs but the female remains close to shore until the water temperature reaches 82° and she can lay her eggs. As of this writing, there have been two sea turtle nests on Captiva and one on Sanibel's west end.

More than 1,250 dead sea turtles have been found in Florida during each of the last two years. This is the greatest number since monitoring began in 1980. The majority of the stranded turtles are loggerheads. Collisions with watercraft, disease and drowning in fish nets are the most likely causes of deaths. Even though TEDS are required in shrimp trawls to allow turtles to escape, the openings are too small for many loggerheads

On a local basis, there have been eight strandings to date; the number is not usually this high early in the sea-



A permittee with a license from the state will be sent to get information on the turtle. If the turtle is live, it will be taken to C.R.O.W.'s rehab facility. If the turtle is dead, the city Department of Public Works will be notified to dispose of the carcass.

Perhaps fear of Zontians kept our regular speaker from showing up (missed one heck of a show!), so we leaned on Dick Pyle, Al Hanser's cohort at The Sanibel-Captiva Trust Company, guest, and perspective new member. Dick used to manage about \$33,000,000,000 (yes, that's a "B") in the upper Midwest – specifically Fargo (but Hanser wasn't sure which state that was in and I don't feel like looking it up, so "upper Midwest" must suffice.) – and, since that's approximately half the net worth of the island's Lion's Club, we decided to listen.

"The glory days [of the market] have turned into a typical business slowdown" It is partially the cause and partially the result of increased productive capacity worldwide. Supply has outstripped demand. "There is too much stuff". Opined Pyle.

The result is capital cutbacks, and although consumer spending held firm for a while, that, too, is beginning to weaken. Dick feels stimulus will help, but notes that interest rates have already dropped precipitously. (The coupon-clipping crowd expressed anguish, not surprise.) And then he kicked a sacred cow: he regards a position in long-term US Treasuries as dangerous. They pay paltry rates and will drop in value as (and when) interest rates rise.

It sounds like a contradiction, he would increase portfolio safety by assuming more risk: Buy high quality corporate bonds and/or high yield stocks instead. Bright guy!

Dick expects market averages will be unimpressive over the next few years, but foresees plenty of opportunity to pick stocks. For instance, the Dow first exceeded 1,000 in 1966. It then dropped and remained below that until 1982. However, WalMart went public (1974) and a lot of other very successful companies experienced significant run-ups during that period. Many stock pickers did OK.

Dick took no stand on making dividend income tax free. It's an added bonus but nothing to base plans on. Current strategy? He was quick to hedge by citing individual investor needs and temperament, but today he would be 60% in equity and 40% in fixed income with the emphasis on quality. Bottom line: He expects it will take time before the fundamentals and the market

are again in sync, but he's optimistic.

In response to questions: He feels the various corporate scandals have shaken investor confidence. MCI's indiscretions resulted in a 10 -15% drop in the market. Investors "don't trust the numbers." He finds cash flow per share a better measure than earnings per share.

He suggests analyzing earnings and management track records for consistency, discipline, continuity and obstinance. Looks for managements whose vision constantly innovates, audits, and reinvents itself

He predicts the uproar over corporate officers' compensation and corporate scandal will bring about structural changes on boards. Traditionally the Board Chairman has represented stockholders while the CEO steers performance. Companies that have sanctioned a Chairman/CEO and then based compensation on performance may have blurred traditional protections and priorities. He feels more boards will redivide those functions. He feels a CEO that can double or triple a company's stock price (in essence, market value) should be well rewarded.

New regulations that require CEO and CFO to certify their financials and disclose potential future impacts and face criminal penalties will help restore confidence in the numbers.

What to look out for? "It all gets down to greed. [Some] corporate managements forgot whom they're serving. You don't want to own a company that acts like that."





4th Annual Realtors' Workday


SCCF's land manager, Brad Smith, welcomed about 20 Realtors to Frannie's Preserve early Saturday morning for the 4th Annual Realtors' Workday. Smith and Danny Rogers had planned a session of planting native shrubs and trees and all hands turned to in the effort to help.

"We really appreciate the Realtors turning out like this. With 20 people we can get a week's worth of planting accomplished in a matter of hours. We never plan enough work for them they're done in no time! Several years ago this group planted several hundred shrubs, trees and marsh grasses around two newly restored wetlands areas in the Preserve, which are now fully grown and providing food, shelter and habitat."

This year the two restoration special-

ists had gathered from the Foundation's native plant nursery an array of varnish leaf, coco plum, Jamaican caper, pigeon plum and a variety of other plants and had selected several areas which had previously been cleared of dense Brazilian pepper stands. After a few years of monitoring to make sure there was no exotic re-growth, it was time to help nature fill in the cleared areas.





BIRDING DIARY

Any way you look at it, the area bordering Wildlife Drive is big and often impressive, even a bit overwhelming at time. That's when it is good to look for little pockets of wildlife within the big pocket.

The nearly dead strangler fig tree close to the Cross Dike is one little pocket of wildlife. It's a beautiful old tree with a massive trunk that branches into thick limbs only a few feet above the ground. At the base, a vibrantly green Florida privet (wild olive) stands guard. One large branch that had obviously overextended its reach toward the road must have been cut off long ago. On the underside of this branch a redbellied woodpecker is raising a family.

As Clair and I approach this tree, a gray kingbird sits on a horizontal branch silhouetted against the blue sky. What a handsome bird! Its white underparts are vibrant in the warm sunlight. Its head and back are pale gray, and as it turns its head from side to side, I can clearly see the black mask over its eyes and its heavy, black bill. At nine inches, this bird is about the size of a catbird but not nearly so secretive.

The kingbird perches unmoving, appearing content to enjoy the sunlight, while Clair goes through several rolls of film. Finally the bird begins its twittering "tik-teeerr" call that eventually brings in a second bird. The newcomer perches on the same branch, just a couple feet away from the first bird. It does its twittering call and at the same time flairs its tail and flutters its wings. The first bird responds in kind. This is repeated for several minutes and then the first bird leapfrogs over the second landing a few feet away. Both birds twitter, flair, and flutter some more. The second bird leapfrogs the first, but runs out of branch and lands on the one below. Now they are quiet. We've witnessed part of their mating ritual.

Gray kingbirds arrive on Sanibel around mid-April from their wintering grounds in northern South America. For me, they signal the end of winter season and the departure of friends heading north. These kingbirds nest along the Florida and Georgia coasts and leave us again in September. They usually build their twig nests near water and, according to some reference books, prefer the horizontal branches of red mangroves when they are available. While I have seen nests in mangroves, I've seen just as many in black olive and buttonwood trees. Further north, they nest in oaks and pines. Often their nests are so flimsy, their three or four mottled, pinkish eggs can be seen through the bottom.

All kingbirds belong to the genus Tyrannus. This is an appropriate name as kingbirds have the reputation of being aggressive toward other birds. I've seen four members of this genus on Sanibel, but only the gray kingbird nests here. The eastern kingbird is seen frequently in both spring and fall migration. Western kingbirds and scissor-tailed flycatchers are a rare and

wonderful treat. Even though the kingbird is the main attraction, I am aware of the red-bellied woodpecker parents going in and out of their nest carrying insects to feed the young. The chick's muffled "cheeping" increases

when a parent arrives at the hole. A beautiful prairie warbler calls attention to itself by perching near the top of the fig and singing its up-the-scale, buzzy "zee-zee-zee-zee" song to declare territory. Periodically it drops down into the privet at the base of the tree to glean insects. Its bright yellow color, accented with black streaks on face and flanks, is a bright splash of sunshine among the fresh, green leaves. We are so lucky to have these sweet, five-inch warblers with us year-round. Soon they will build nests of grasses and plant-down in the mangroves where they will raise four or five chicks.

Within the big pocket of wildness along Wildlife Drive, this dying, weathered strangler fig provides a small pocket for wildlife - both migratory and resident.







tarium shows at 11:30 a.m. and 1 and 3 pm. Members of the public will get a chance to look at the sun through specially-filtered telescopes, weather permitting.

In addition, one of the Nature Center's telescopes will be set up with a hydrogen-alpha filter, allowing people a rare chance to see material as it is ejected from the sun — a solar prominence. With ordinary white light filters, views of sunspots are easily seen, but in hydrogen-alpha light, spectacular prominence activity can be seen at the limb, or edge, of the sun.

"We are borrowing the H-alpha filter from SWFAS especially for Astronomy Day," said Planetarium Director Carole Helper. "Normally, we only show sunspots to visitors and I am excited that we can show people solar matter as

it leaves the sun."

Besides solar observing, there will be a number of telescopes on display, and the day provides an excellent opportunity for people who are considering buying a telescope or those who already have one but want more information on how to use it, to ask questions. Information about exploring the night sky is also available.

All Astronomy Day activities, as well associated activities with International Migratory Bird Day, (which is also being held at the Nature Center on May 10), are included in the regular admission charge of \$7 for adults; \$4 for children ages 3-12.

According to the president of Sanibel Air Conditioning, Inc. Bryan Hayes, "Our goal is to build customers for life." That's what's been happening since 1989 when his father started the business. The three most important factors in the company's success continue to be quality of product, impeccable service and fast response time.

Their motto is "We do what we say we're going to do." Now they have added, "We were here before the bridge problem, we'll be here during it and we'll be here after the bridge problem has been solved."

Hayes points out that one of the immediate concerns encountered by many island businesses has been the change in bridge weight limits. However, with a crane now stationed on the island, much of the heavy equipment can be lifted without requiring the one be brought onto the island for a specific job. Most companies work multi-county but Sanibel Air Conditioning concentrates its efforts on Sanibel and Captiva.

Hayes emphasizes that, as a servicebased company, "SAC has to treat every customer as though he or she were our only customer." One of their goals is to never let air conditioning problems

remain overnight. "We provide service when you need it, not when it's convenient for us." People are excited to learn that they will receive help within an hour or two, and that promise is kept. This is true especially today when many of the off-island companies simply don't want to deal with the bridge.

Recently, Sanibel Air started offering a new product line, a germicidal ultraviolet light, which assists in preventing the growth of micro-organism contaminants like mildew and mold in the HVAC system. The UV light breaks down the cells of these micro-organisms. Hayes explains, "These mildew and mold invaders need moisture, a food source and a place to grow. What they cannot tolerate is sunlight and that's where the UV comes into play. We've had great success with these devices."

The UV light can be installed on the recommendation of your service technician during a regular check of your system. Air conditioners are, as Hayes puts it, "a mold and mildew factory." Often customers express concern about mildew and mold; they can see it on the vents or detect a musty smell. Hayes emphasizes, however, that Sanibel Air does not sell customers devices they don't need. The UV lights are not inexpensive and there's upkeep with yearly replacement of the bulbs. That's where having the experience and knowledge gained over the years makes the difference in making the most practical and best recommendations to customers.

Another source of indoor air pollu-



Do-it-yourself concrete countertops

- Secure the concrete countertops to the vanity or cabinetry using silicon sealant.




KEEPING YOUR HOUSE SAFE

A straight flush beats a full house anytime

Sherlock Holmes was a great detective. He picked up clues as he went along in order to solve the case he was working on at the time and gained experience for future cases.

From now on, when you walk through your home or business think of it as a possible crime scene and you as the great Sherlock Holmes looking for clues. The crimes I speak of are any potential plumbing problems that can rob you of your hard-earned money due to costly repair bills. Undetected plumbing leaks can cause ceilings to fall in, hardwood floors to buckle and mold in walls just to name a few. You can avoid being a potential crime victim by using your Sherlock Holmes detective skills every day as you walk through your home or business.

You can lose the magnifying glass. You won't need it at all. The only thing you will need is to pay a little closer attention to the plumbing fixtures in your home. They are always trying to give you clues. You just have to pay attention.

For instance, the next time you are putting groceries away and have to put items under the kitchen sink cabinet, take a look at the shut off valves, supply lines and drains. If you notice any drips on any plumbing or corrosion on any

pipes or stops, that's your clue that a possible crime is in progress. You'll need to do more investigating or call for back up — ie, your local plumber.

You should also note where your

water heater is located because, if something goes wrong, you could have a major crime scene on your hands. The heater could be in several different places, the most critical being the attic. This could present a major assault on

your wallet should you have a leak and the safety pan failed. Once you find the water heater, you want to check it for possible leaks. The first place to look the safety pan — look for damp or wet spots on the bottom. This is your first clue. This pan will also have a drain line that goes to the outside of the building; make a note in your crime-stopper notebook to keep an eye on that drain. If you ever see water dripping from it, you have a leak at the water heater. That's elementary, my dear Watson... or it could be the element. (So much for comic relief.) Valves which could also be the source of the leak.

At this point it may be necessary to call in the crime scene experts, a.k.a. a plumber.

Before we wrap up this investigation, we want to clue you in on a few more tips. Remember that every plumbing fixture is a potential crime, so let's not forget to periodically check all plumbing — washing machine hoses, bathroom sink faucets, stops, drains, main shut-off valves, sprinkler systems, etc.

If detective work isn't your cup of tea, you can always call your local plumber and ask for an in-home plumbing inspection of all your fixtures and your pipes in the attic.

Good luck, you Junior Detectives, and remember dear Watson, a straight flush beats a full house any time.


FISHWORKS, an exhibit of 350 pieces of artwork by our islands' youngest artists, is sure to catch your eye and your heart. BIG ARTS' Phillips Gallery has been transformed into a delightful display of drawings, paintings, mosaics, prints and sculptures by the students of The Sanibel School under the guidance of their teacher, Suzanne Skinner. This incredibly huge exhibit mixes interesting and expressive art with lesson plans that teach students skills they can use in other areas of their lives as they mature. The public is welcome at the May 15 reception from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. and another on May 16 from 5:30 to 7:30. The gallery is open weekdays from 1 to 4 p.m. through May 21.

Many of the projects proceeded in stages and required careful planning and visualization. The mosaic fish were made independently by each artist on backgrounds that required both work and disciplined energy. Although they are made from inexpensive materials, they are exhibited together as an eleven-foot long fish that looks like a beautiful glass mosaic wall. Because of much of the artwork was damaged when the classroom flooded, many of the completed hanging fish had to be recreated. All of these projects express ideas in a variety of materials and give students the opportunity to learn new skills while in an academic and disciplined setting. Skinner has included informative lesson plans that describe materials, objectives and procedures.

This is an exhibit that will leave your face smiling and your head swimming with youthful ideas. Included in it are fish that are exciting, elaborate, natural, thoughtful, representational, imaginary, comical and colorful — each one with a personality of its own, no two alike. Symphony shines... or is it Scheins?

A small but highly appreciative audience filled Schein Hall last Saturday for Classic Sanibel — A Concert & Conversation Program, an excellent finale to the Gulf Coast Symphony's 2002/2003 season. This group of some 50 musicians is a non-professional community orchestra, made up of volunteers of all ages. Its mission "... is primarily one of education. The orchestra encourages the growth of symphonic

music in the greater community by performing a variety of concerts each year, including classical, pops and family education concerts." Eight years ago, Dr. Andrew Kurtz founded Gulf Coast Symphony and acts as its music director as well as its conductor/narrator.

Last Saturday's program featured Reiko Miiya, concertmaster of the Southwest Florida Symphony, performing *Concerto for Violin No. 3 in b minor* by Camille Saint-Saëns. The program also included Tchaikovsky's triumphant *Symphony No. 4* in f minor. The highly interesting conversation part of the evening was designed in such a way as to allow the audience to become more actively involved as well as more appreciative of the music being performed.

Kurtz not only discussed the musical selections, he had the orchestra and the soloist demonstrate excerpts and the various elements that made these particular selections and their

composers so unique.

At the outset of the evening Miiya was presented a certificate honoring her dedication to music and music education. Kurtz then went on to explain the dual function of a concerto—(a) feature a solo instrument, (b) illustrate how the composer has the solo instrument influence the orchestra and vice versa. In the opening piece, the Saint-Saëns, the violinist's four-note variant was played against the orchestra, which served as background, the orchestra then played a melody, which in turn was picked up by the soloist. Phrases of music became the sentences of a conversation between the violin and the full orchestra. Miiya—diminutive in stature but certainly not in talent—gave the piece an intelligent, sensitive.

clear and concise, though emotional, reading.

Kurtz had pointed out a rather difficult harmonic passage between the violin and the clarinet, which was played beautifully and was enjoyed even more since the audience had been made aware of it ahead of time. The detailed descriptions preceding the playing of this familiar concerto doubled my enjoyment, and allowed me to pay attention to the com-

poser's emotional intentions and the colors he wished to express. Meanwhile, the orchestra did their very best to fill Schein Hall with lovely lush sounds. As the final notes faded away, the enthralled audience rose as one to its feet with applause, bravos and a well-deserved standing ovation.

Tchaikovsky's Fourth came after the intermission. Kurtz discussed the power and passion the composer intended with this rather challenging symphony, pointing out that Tchaikovsky defines sexuality, depression and the role of fate in our lives, all within this one piece. The conductor demonstrated musically the themes of fate, lamentation, and depression — evolving into despair, escaping into dreams, emerging into hope. The composer's final symphonic comment is "that life is possible."

Both Kurtz and The Gulf Coast Symphony proved their mettle with their skillful rendering of this really difficult piece. I was particularly impressed since Kurtz had said that the orchestra had a mere 15 hours and five rehearsals to learn this formidable symphony. Kurtz has gained much knowledge and assuredness over the past few years. His touch is strong, sure, precise, yet filled with passion and a joy of performing that is positively winning.

All in all, it was a most enjoyable — as well as educational — evening at BIG ARTS. The last time I heard Gulf Coast Symphony was about four years ago, and I can assure you it will be on my regular schedule next season. If you're wise, you'll be sure to include it on your next season's concert schedule as well.

Mound House competitions and tours

Mound House is the oldest home on Estero Island, and is built on a Calusa Mound which was excavated last year by FGCU archaeologists.

Florida Gulf Coast University archaeology professors Theresa Schobe and her husband Corbett Torrence have been confirmed for a second year as directors by the Fort Myers Beach Town Council.

During the past year, the Mound House property has undergone an archaeological dig which revealed fish and cattle bones, shards of pottery (attributed to the ancient Calusa Indians which once inhabited the shell mound) and even decorative beads (which could only have come from European settlers.)

Since January, volunteers have virtually completed reassembling a clay pot which was found in over 300 pieces. The pot was a puzzle, Schober said, "because people don't throw away a perfectly good pot. It was unusual to find a complete pot, even though it was in 300 pieces.'

Plans call to eventually have Calusa as well as modern day exhibits of life at the site. "We are hoping for help from people in the community with the construction of these exhibits," Schober said.

"Programs are being put into place, and now Mound House is open 12 hours a week instead of four," Schober said, "It is a way to grow, and we average 42 volunteers every week." The dock has been refurbished, and since the property is now on the Great Calusa Blueway Trail, Schober said they are applying for the permits to construct a landing area for canoes and kayaks.

The directors are also looking into making the current swimming pool into a walkin area where visitors would be able to see into the ancient Calusa mound. "Osprey [Florida] has something like that that is very popular and informative." Schober explained.

The ideal logo should appeal to a variety of visitors by touching on major aspects of The Mound House's mission to inform and educate Florida residents and visitors about Florida pre-history, the Calusas, early pioneer settlement, and life on Estero Island as it relates to the William H. Case House. The logo may also incorporate design elements that emphasize the sensitive marine/estuarine environment in which the site is situated.






