



The entertainment line-up includes Christie Melvin, the Golden Girl Cloggers, Times 3, Harry Boyle and the unforgettable Bailey


Blues Brothers.



Visit Florida visits Chamber lunch

With an annual budget of about \$65 million, Visit Florida believes in spending money to make money.

The public/private venture spends that money in an effort to attract tourists to the state's theme parks, hotels and roadside attractions, said regional representative Beth Rice. Created in 1996, Visit Florida took over the responsibilities of the state's Tourism Division, becoming one of the most powerful organization of its kind in the country.

Other states have tried to copy us, but no one has made the transition from public to private," Rice said.

About one-third of their money comes from the state's car rental surcharge, although that amount has slipped by about \$3 million over the last year, she said, mainly due more people buying instead of leasing cars with the recent cheap interest rates. The rest comes from the 3,300 private entities that have signed up with the

For their contributions, those groups get a variety of services.

"Our marketing department spends \$22.5 million a year on advertising," Rice

Members also have access to information about tourism trends, visitors and competitors gathered by the research department.

Visit Florida also operates the flausa.com website, which features information about members as well as Sunny,

the on-line trip planner which lists hotels, restaurants and attractions within 50 miles of a given destination, Rice said.

The site receives 19,000 visitors a day. The company puts out multiple visitors guides and newsletters aimed at tourists, business and residents.

"We probably err on the side of too much information," Rice said.

Members even get access to the overseas market, since Visit Florida maintains offices in Canada, the United Kingdom and France.

"We are truly a global organization," Rice said.





FOR KIDS' SAKE - Get on Board the Sanibel School Campaign

When you ride by the Sanibel School, a nationally recognized Blue Ribbon School of Excellence, and one of the best in the state with 2003 test scores on the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) ranking among the top two percent in the state, you may think you can sit back and boast of your school's outstanding achievements. But all you need to do is attend a Breakfast with the Principal and

take a tour of the school, only to find that children are housed in 13 portable classrooms. Four years ago, one teacher was very excited to get a 2 by 2 foot window in her portable, and a third grader went home and exclaimed, "Guess what! I get to go to school in a trailer"

The Sanibel School is unquestionably "A Community Investment in our Islands' Future" ranking on par with the community's investment in land conservation, wildlife habitat preservation, and stringent zoning and code enforcement resulting in one of the highest standards of living in the state. That's why people drive over the Causeway, amazed to find no traffic lights at the first fourway stop, and continue on to discover more.

When Sanibel Elementary opened 40 years ago as the first integrated school in Lee County, little could the community have imagined that, by 1997, the parents and community members would be successful in lobbying and adding a middle school component in 1998, renaming it the Sanibel School in 1999 and celebrating its first eighth grade graduation in 2002. Moreover, its graduates finish in the top 1 percent of Florida's 844 public middle schools.

Principal Barbara Von Harten explains that with such high interest and commitment on the part of the parents and the school scheduled as the next in Lee County for renovation, the idea of a middle school sounded very simple but actually was very complex. It took a full year of meetings with the School Board to convince them that it was the "right thing" to do.

The idea that this plan would eliminate the need to provide bus transportation for all of the children in the South Zone, and that all children in kindergarten through grade eight could ride the same buses together as a total school unit, became significant factors in successful funding. Hence an \$8.1 million construction and renovation project, adding 25,000 square feet of new space and renovating existing buildings, was approved last spring calling for the pouring of concrete pads for new buildings in October 2003. Completion of new construction is set for March 2004, followed by renovation of existing buildings and project completion in August 2004. That's the day they'll cut the Sanibel School yellow ribbon "For Kids' Sake" as another "Community Investment in our Islands' Future"

Why get on board the Sanibel School Campaign? Doesn't state funding do it all? While state funding furnishes the bricks and mortar and the bare basics to construct the building, it doesn't offer the additional funding to provide the interior enhancements. That's where the Sanibel School Fund kicks in with President Sandy Zahorchak and Campaign Co-chairs Terry Igo and Betsy Ventura, Honorary Co-chairs Francis and Sam Bailey and an impressive group of over 50 highly energetic volunteers who are deeply concerned about the quality of education.

To remain at the top, Sanibel School must fulfill its "beyond the bare basics" needs.

The goal of the Campaign is to provide equipment for the science and home economics labs, expand the fine arts programs, enhance the band and music programs, build a new playground for school and community use and provide students with the latest in com-

puter and audio enhancement technology.

Co-Chair Terry Igo, Vice President of the Sanibel Captiva Trust Company, is excited about the Sanibel School Campaign and emphasizes that this is a unique opportunity for potential donors to make a long-term impact on the islands "We have never had a major capital campaign like this at the Sanibel School and the goal here is to finish off the interior enhancements for the new construction and renovations."

The current campaign was initially started by the Sanibel School and the P.T.A. to educate the whole community about school needs. The first phase was a year-long series of weekly tours and slide show presentations given by the principal to explain why the renovations and additional school space were needed. Igo is pleased to announce, "As of September 2003 we had received some very supportive initial gifts from the community totalling \$310,000 and now we must continue to climb toward the million dollar goal. Some of the initial gifts were from the teachers with their 100% participation in the campaign and now the parents are beginning to invest and make their commitment."





Byron Stout, the speaker, delivered a lesson on freshwater flow in Southwest Florida. The trick is to keep water in Lake Okeechobee during the dry season but draw it down prior to the rainy season. He feels the South Florida Water Management District keeps it too high most years to provide backup for "big sugar" and risks getting caught if there is either drought like last year or lots of rain like this year.

The dikes around Lake O were breached by hurricane rains in 1926, killing about 400 people, and again in 1928 when "thousands" died in the flooding. Yet, water put the releases have "really Caloosahatchee under duress" and "affect the ecology of the estuary all the way to Sanibel." Stout's "Quick Solution: Lower the lake in the spring." For Stout, the "Magic Number" is 10 feet.

A visit to London's Bramah Museum of Tea and Coffee

On a recent trip to visit our daughter, who lives in London, England, I made sure to go to the world-renowned Bramah Museum of Tea and Coffee. The museum is located near London Bridge in the busy area of Bankside. Walking across London Bridge is certainly detrimental to your feet. So, if you try it, bring lots of Band-Aids and comfortable walking shoes.

The Bramah Museum, named after its owner, Edward Bramah, is also a wonderful teahouse and I certainly took advantage of that. In addition, I got a two-for one deal, learning more about the history of coffee as well as tea. Since it was 3 p.m., almost tea-time, I was thinking about enjoying the treats as well. (Jenny Craig could wait until I returned home.) Beautiful tablecloths were placed on tables throughout the dining area and after indulging in a variety of high calorie scones, I entered the museum.

As I was taking pictures next to the "no photographs" sign, I was approached by the owner, Edward Bramah. Instead of a reprimand, I was greeted cordially. As we discovered mutual interests, we became fast friends and he agreed to an interview, beginning with his background. He told me about the books he has written, Tea and Coffee, Novelty Teapots and Goffee Makers.

Edward worked on a tea plantation in Africa during the 1950s. He furthered his education by training as a tea taster in London. Tea tasting is similar to wine tasting, as you never actually swallow the stuff. I leave it to your imagination to guess what is done with it.

I learned that England was the country that popularized coffee, and that tea came later. Today, 90 percent of the tea consumed comes from teabags, not tea

I also found out how tea is produced and marketed. In the 1950s, tea began to compete with instant coffee by way of the

teabag. For over 300 years prior to that, the prime consumer's source for tea was directly from the leaves of the various plants.


The museum featured many displays, including a colorful Russian exhibit of teacups and accessories. Edward explained that

the Dutch and Portuguese brought tea to England over 400 years ago. There was ceramics, graphics and even a sign over a display, reading "Hi Tea." One interesting teacup was a "mustache cup."

This large cup featured a ceramic bar across its diameter, to prevent a mustache from getting wet.

A tour of the Bramah Museum would not be complete without a stop in the retail store. Here, boxes of teas from around the world were offered for sale. There were also delicate teacups, tea infusers, accessories and more.



Mooin' & Brewin' at Island Cow

Starbucks Coffee is now being brewed on Sanibel at the Island Cow. Starbucks has "gone heavy" on the Florida East Coast, explained Island Cow Owner Rob DeGennaro, even experimenting with "drive through" outlets in Miami's South Beach and Deerfield Beach. However, in less-populated Southwest Florida, Starbucks has been working with local restaurants rather than establishing stand-alone units. It was Starbucks that approached DeGennaro.

They were "looking for a well-rounded restaurant — one with high volume — serving breakfast, lunch and dinner, to experiment with," explained DeGennero. "They are also doing the same thing in Key West, Sarasota, Naples and Bonita."


İsland Cow began serving Starbucks about three weeks ago and they are getting a nice response. DeGennaro noted that people walk in, their eyes light up and they exclaim, "Oh, my God, I can't believe it, it's here... Sanibel is coming into the modern age." Some folks who relocated from the Pacific Northwest stop by every morning for their Starbucks Coffee as a reminder of "back home."

Aside from choosing the right kind of restaurant, Starbucks is "very,

very specific on water quality, said DeGennaro. When Island Cow closed for two weeks this past June, they replaced everything in the kitchen and put in a water filtration system to take the chlorine residual out of the water. But when Starbucks came to test the water, they brought in their own water for a taste comparison and

the difference was clearly noticeable. DeGennaro added a second filter plus a water softener to achieve the required water quality at Island Cow. (Which means that you also get a great glass of water because it's all coming through the same filtration systems.)

Starbucks' concern about chlorine stems from the fact that chlorine in brewed coffee begins to break down the coffee (especially decaf), giving it a bitter taste. Chlorine also attacks the

sweeteners in diet drinks. While regular water is 4 - 6 ppm (parts chlorine per million parts water), Island Cow's treated water is .1 ppm.

The Island Cow staff went through extensive quality control training and in the first two weeks, Starbucks sent six different testers to the restaurant, trying all the different products "to make sure we're doing it right."

The brewed coffee is sealed in an insulated vaccuum container so it pours out steaming hot (and there's no water evaporation). After half an hour, if there

is still coffee left (which rarely happens at Island Cow!), a new pot must be brewed.

Tazo teas (hot and iced) and Chai are also now available, and to complement the Starbucks coffee, Island Cow has added a special Coffee menu with new homebaked pies and cakes.

"People can come in and just have coffee and dessert. We also have fresh-baked

muffins — hot out of the oven — all day. We bake over 2,500 muffins a day, so they're always fresh.

"People are welcome to sit and read the newspaper and have a nice cup of coffee. We provide newspapers, too."

DeGennaro has been very pleased with the response. And many on Sanibel are delighted to now have Starbucks here on the islands...at the Island Cow on Periwinkle.

Water level lowered during migration

Thousands of shorebirds such as red knots, dunlins, and western sandpipers have begun their annual migration south. Many of these birds travel from above the Arctic Circle to the southern tip of South America. Along their journey, they use wildlife refuges as rest stops to feed and replenish fat reserves which give them energy for the long flight. The J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge is one of the last rest stops before birds fly over the Caribbean and, therefore, is an important resting and feeding site.

Wildlife Drive, originally constructed in the early 1960s as a mosquito control dike, surrounds the two impoundments in the refuge. Managers kept the water levels high during the summer in order to cover the mud flats so the salt marsh mosquito couldn't lay its eggs in the mud. However, keeping the water levels high compromised the health of the refuge in that water quality was diminished and birds were unable to feed in the higher waters. Today, staff keep the impoundments open to tidal influence to mimic the natural tidal estuary for much of the year. This benefits many native plants and animals which are dependant upon the tidal cycle and allows fish and other aquatic species to use the mangrove rimmed impoundments as a breeding ground and

In late September, the refuge lowered water levels in the two impoundments to periodically expose the mud flats, thereby providing a place for short-legged shorebirds to feed. The impoundments, covering 800 acres, are controlled by seven water control structures. These structures are left open to tidal influence for the majority of the year but, during peak migration, will be closed (with the exception of one structure in each impoundment) to simulate a low tide and still allow for minimal tidal flow. During this closure, refuge biologists will monitor the salinity and dissolved oxygen levels in the impoundments to assure the drawdown does not adversely impact fish and other marine life.

This common wildlife management practice will not compromise the health of the fisheries or mosquito control objectives because peak mosquito breeding and fish spawning take place at different times of the year. The refuge experimented with the new water control structures during last spring's shorebird migration. Drawdown of water levels allowed birds to feed and rest on the mudflats. The experiment was deemed a success based on the tremendous increase in shorebird use, and this practice will likely become a permanent part of the refuge's water management plan.

Providing habitat for migratory birds is one of the main responsibilities of the National Wildlife Refuge System and the primary reason the "Ding" Darling NWR was established. It is accomplished by ecosystem management — the provision and enhancement of the wildlife habitat for the greatest good of the greatest number of wildlife species. The refuge's water management plan reflects this ecosystem approach by providing shorebird habitat during peak migration, allowing fish access to the impoundments to use as nursery and breeding grounds, and maintaining water quality for all species.


Sic tibi bonus ex tua pons libidine fiat ... (I hope you acquire the bridge you long for)

Premiere at Theatre Conspiracy

How good it is to be back in my island paradise and catching up on what's happening theaterwise, both here and in Fort Myers. The new BIG Arts brochures proclaim a fabulous season with an exciting new drama wing named "On Stage." At The Old Schoolhouse, JT's feeling better and getting it together for that sounds like another giddy, gaudy, glamorous, glowing season. Meanwhile Theater Conspiracy kicked off its season last week with a brand new play, Exiting Happy, which I caught this week (read on down for the review). Broadway Palm announced its celebration of 10 years of fabulous shows, and their 11th season looks to keep their promise of "the

best is yet to come." Florida Rep's sixth season kicks off tonight with another coup — the theatre obtained the rights to Sly Fox before it's even hit the Broadway stage. As Producing Artistic Director Robert Cacioppo says... "Why go to Broadway, when you can see Broadway actors on a Broadway set in a Broadway play before it even gets to Broadway?!" The rest of his season reads like who's who in what's new, or best of the past in drama. The Barbara Mann has a line-up that sure to please every taste. It really sounds like we are in for one helluva, swelluva 2003/2004 Theater Season, so start marking your calendars today. Remember, y'snooze y'lose!

P'nenah Goldstein's comedy Exiting Happy is at the Foulds Theatre, and features actors from The Theatre Conspiracy. The production centers on a Southern woman and former Radio City Rockette, Happy Tredmont (artfully played by Diandre McGee). Happy is living in NYC and trying to cope with the changes in her life post 9/11; she must also deal with the death of her beloved maid and the arrival of a young man who is currently subletting her World War II eight-room apartment.

The actors in this play are well cast, especially Diandre McGee. Her portrayal of a Southern belle transplanted to the Big Apple was totally convincing. Josh Chapman as Randy gave it his best shot with his rather vaguely written, inconsistent character. In fact, all of the actors - and the director, Karen Goldberg, and the set designer, David

Utz — did their best with what they were given by playwright.

Exiting Happy is, in my estimation, a work-in-progress and not yet ready for a full production. The playwright has drafted a disjointed, fragmented plot line, with underdeveloped characters, unclear motivations, set for an unrevealed purpose in the aftermath of 9/11 in a World

War II NYC apartment. Having written all those negatives, let me focus on the positives... there are some clever bits of dialogue that the actors play to the hilt, rightfully getting laughs from the audience. Nevertheless, for this play to fly, it desperately needs pruning, tightening, clearer motivations and, above all, character development.

Hats off and hip, hip hurray! to actors McGee, Chapman and Madison Mitchell for learning reams of dialogue, to Goldberg for keeping the action (what there is) from bogging down, to Utz for a classy workable set and, especially, to Theatre Conspiracy founder, Bill Taylor, for his vision and endeavors to develop and pre-

Photo+graph: Writing wildlife with light

... A morning at the Refuge with John Carney

Over 20 students—some from as far as Naples—gathered at "Ding" Darling on Tuesday, Oct. 14, for a 4½-hour Basics of Wildlife Photography class with John Carney.

Covering photography basics as well as tips particular to photographing wildlife, the following is some of the wit and wisdom dispensed by Carney.

On judging the 2003 "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society Photo Contest," he noted that on the first pass, "the first 80 got out easy but the remaining 51 were tough choices."

What Not To Do

 The biggest problem is the background not being controlled by selective use of depth of field.

• Focus is paramount and if the subject's eyes are not in focus, it almost always kills the picture.

• The exposure must be set for full definition: there shouldn't be over-exposed, bleached-out shoulder feathers on a white egret or underexposed underwing or underbody areas on a darker-colored bird.

1. Know your equipment inside and out. You've gotta know what you're capable of, what you can do and not do. Always have your camera manual with you and read it over and over again.

2. Know your location and your subject, become very familiar with them. The first time he took a tram ride through Ding,

he learned more on one tram ride than in two years on his own.

For shooting in the Refuge:

• Know the tides (you can call the Refuge). Go at low tide: "It's like a bathtub full of water and a million fish. At low tide, you have 2" of water and a million fish." (Carney's bathtub theory)

• Know when there is good sum and where. The best times are sunrise (from a half hour before to one hour after) and sunset (the last hour before to a half-hour after). Even on a bad day, you can still learn: get to know the area, learn how high and low tides affect different areas and where the birds congregate.

3. Practice. Keep notes with location, subject, lighting, equipment and settings. "It's a drag doing it but it pays off later." If it's easier, use a hand-held recorder (but make sure you write it down later).

... "Animals are creatures of habit. Know what those habits are, eating habits, nesting habits. The more you know, the easier it is to take pictures."

... "Light is the key to everything. There are two things required for a great picture: great light and a great subject, and if I had to choose, I'd choose great light. Color, tone, texture, mood — they're all affected by light."

...The **Viewpoint** should be fresh and unusual and a "zoom lens is the worst enemy for viewpoint: 'I'm here and I didn't change my viewpoint at all.'" Instead, move around, try taking a 50mm lens and

pretend it's a zoom. Never base your view-point on your first impression.

As an illustration of viewpoint, he told of Clyde Butcher leading a group of students through the Refuge and pointing out a two-foot-tall red mangrove, saying it would make an interesting picture. A battery of students took pictures of the tree. Then Butcher took his picture. He got down on the ground and took the picture while lying on his side, with the camera at ground level. The finished photo shows a red mangrove towering in the foreground while the distracting mangrove islands in the background have receded to just above the horizon level. By shooting so low, he removed all the distractions from the background.

Control the exposure to get the effect you want. Use a light meter but remember that meters believe that everything in the world is middle grade. If your subject is at either extreme, you need to compensate for that. There are basically five tones:

• absolute white, no shadows, no detail – light meter doesn't catch it

- light grey
- middle grey
- dark grey

• black, no shadows, no detail — light meter doesn't read it

If you don't have a grey card for meter reading, the palm of your hand is a workable substitute but test it first; the palm is generally one stop lighter than a grey card.

Bracket your exposures. "If you've

spent all that time and all that money and you're not going to see it again, now's the time to waste film."

Don't use the automatic settings on your camera, "Leave them for the average person. If you want average pictures, use them."

When considering depth of field, use the one-third/two-thirds theory: in most pictures, within the depth of field, one-third of the picture is in front of the subject (the thing you're focusing on) and two-thirds is behind it. Never focus on infinity because the picture will be flat, and you lose that back two-thirds. For example, if your depth of field is six feet, two feet will be in front of the subject and four feet will be behind.

If you are hand-holding the camera, never use a shutter speed slower than the focal length of your lens. If you're using a 50mm lens, the shutter speed can't be less than 1/60; for a 210mm lens, no less than 1/250.

When considering composition, the difference between a snapshot and a photograph is "what goes on in here" (tapping his head) "before you push the button; what goes in and not, the lighting."

Simplicity is a virtue. "Don't have distractions, don't have too much information. Fill the frame, change the viewpoint,

look at depth of field. The subject should be the first place the eye looks. Pick your subject and make it as simple as possible"

Avoid "the target shooting school of photography," Carney advised, whereupon he raised his hand, trigger finger ready and fired: "Bull's eye!" Instead, follow the rule of thirds for subject placement, also taking into account implied motion (where the subject is looking). Do follow the target shooting school in extreme closeups and reflections.

Be careful of lines, shapes and patterns. Lines can draw attention to the subject or lead it away. Diagonal lines are very powerful and converging diagonals give the illusion of motion. There are "s" curves and "c" curves in nature and if you have a triangle composition, make sure the base of the triangle is on the bottom.

Be aware of the balance between light and dark, full and empty. The visual weight is the perceived heaviness or lightness. Darkness, muted colors and solid masses are perceived as heavy; open space and sky are perceived as light. To achieve balance, place equal weights at an equal distance from the center; with unequal weights, balance the heavy with the light but use distance to add weight to the light.

Be careful of the unintended merging of the subject with other things in the photo or with the borders of the photo. We are often so focused on the subject that we don't see the tree in the background that — in the finished photo — appears to be growing out of the subject's head. Carney's Mergers checklist: Check 1. the subject; 2. in front of the subject; 3. behind the subject; 4. the four edges of the picture frame; and 5. the four corners of the picture frame.






Photo Contest complete






