

Local artist exhibits at Alliance for the Arts

Sambel artist Pam Brodersen has three pieces on display in the first local juried show to present artwork. from the digital art movement.

"Digital Imagination," at the Alliance for the Arts through June 26, demonstrates how artists can use com-



puter-based media and imagination to produce works of fine art that are outside traditional visual media. The show includes a "range of still, kinetic/animated and interactive/website art," according to the Alliance, and is presented with the support of FindWhat.com, a Lee County internet marketing company.

County internet marketing company.

Brodersen's work, "Petals and Sepals," "Vendor on McGregor," and "Orchid 2004" were created using Adobe Photoshop. Brodersen took pictures using her digital camera, then loaded the pictures onto her computer and used the Photoshop software to manipulate the images. The resulting pieces are intensely saturated and have a watercolor effect.

"It's exciting," said Brodersen, "I really like it."
"Vendor on McGregor," said Brodersen, "is about twelve different pieces put together. The head is a mahogany bust my husband bought in Haiti, the arms are my arms, the pants are my pants."



She created "Orchid 2004" using digital pictures she took of her neighbor Faye Granberry's orchid collection. "Faye is the orchid guru of Sanibel," said Brodersen, who went next door, took the pictures, and then "played with the colors" using her computer software.

Brodersen is self-taught in Photoshop, which she has had only a few months. She learned how to use the software from books and from information on the Internet.

In the Alliance gallery, tables of computer monitors present all the artwork through slide shows in which images dissolve and flow from one to the next. Prints of some of the pieces hang on the gallery walls. Viewers move from monitor to monitor to view the submissions, which came from artists all over Florida.

"There's not a lot going on in this area" in the digi-



tal art movement, said Brodersen. "When I went to the opening I wasn't sure what other people were doing." She submitted her pieces for the exhibit by email, and was accepted the same way.

She was a commercial photographer in Chicago for 25 years, producing advertising for magazines and bill-boards, among other venues.

"Chicago is a big food town," said Brodersen, "so I did a lot of tabletop still life photos" in large formats. At that time, in order to produce a special effect, the photographer had to physically rig the effect in front of the camera, then take the picture and retouch the rigging so it wouldn't be obvious.

Now, Brodersen can produce special effects with the touch of a button. "It's kind of like painting," she said, "only it's painting with pixels."

Brodersen enjoys her new medium. "I can spend hours sitting at the computer manipulating the pictures," she said.







Terry R. Lautenbach

Terry R. Lautenbach, long time Darien, Ct. resident and retired IBM senior executive died Wednesday in Bedford Hills, NY. He was 65. He died of heart failure according to his family. He was with his nephew, Marc Lautenbach, at the time of his death.

Born August 10, 1938 in Cincinnati, OH, Mr. Lautenbach was the second son of the late Frances Herbert and Robert Charles Lautenbach. Mr. Lautenbach graduated from Xavier University in Cincinnati in 1959 and joined IBM that same year.

Mr. Lautenbach and his wife, Carole, moved to Darien in 1974, where they raised their six daughters. He held a variety of senior executive positions while at IBM. When he retired in 1992, he was a senior vice president and a member of the fourperson IBM Management Committee. He oversaw a large part of IBM's operations, including its U. S. sales force and its worldwide manufacturing and development. He held a number of marketing and management posts during his rise to become the youngest president of the data processing division in 1976. Afterward, he served in a series of senior positions in the United States and internationally, including chairman IBM Americas, Far East and Group Executive Information Systems and Communication Group.

Mr.Lautenbach left a strong legacy at IBM. Retired IBM Chairman and CEO, John Opel, said of Mr. Lautenbach, "Terry had an extremely bright and quick intellect matched with his sensitive good humor and energy that gave him the ability to be excellent in everything he pursued - family, business, career and social and civic endeavors - every place he added value. We all wanted him on our team."

Part of Mr. Lautenbach's legacy includ-

ed contributions to the advancement of women and African Americans at IBM. Ted Childs, IBM vice president, said of Mr. Lautenbach, "Terry was committed to all people and ensured that everyone had a fair chance. He hated intolerance and injustice and had a profound impact on my career and ability to do the work that I do

Mr. Lautenbach was also an active member of the Darien Community, serving as president of the board of trustees of the Darien Library, Campaign Chairman for the Darien United Way and on his church council. After retiring from IBM, Mr. Lautenbach moved to Sanibel but continued to visit Darien frequently.

While known primarily as a leader in the business world, Mr. Lautenbach was most proud of his family, both immediate and extended. He was a beloved husband, father and grandfather known to his thirteen grandchildren as Pop-pop. He was at his happiest when surrounded by as many family members as possible.

Mr. Lautenbach is survived by his wife of 44 years, Carole; his six daughters, Jennifer Streeter of Darien, Ct, Susan Bates, Julie Maxman, Martha Lautenbach, Mary Lautenbach and Anne Stern of Atlanta, GA; three brothers, Ned Lautenbach, Dan Lautenbach, Jim Lautenbach and one sister, Cynthia Chapell. Mr. Lautenbach's oldest brother, Thom, is deceased. Mr. Lautenbach is also survived by his thirteen grandchildren and four godsons.

ECOSanibel visits Solomon's Castle

Members of ECOSanibel (Earth Charter of Sanibel), the island-based organization dedicated to study of the Earth Charter, recently enjoyed a field trip to Solomon's Castle in Lily, a tiny outpost near Zolfo Springs. Solomon's Castle is a unique construction dedicated to the art of recycling and preservation.

Howard Solomon, artist and teacher, purchased a 55acre spread along Horse Creek in the 1970s and began to build his home, which evolved into an art gallery. It is constructed entirely from recycled or found materials, including discarded newspaper press plates, which pro-

vide the silvery exterior cladding.

The interior is filled with his whimsical sculptures and art objects, also fashioned from discarded materials, and there are 80 stained glass windows. Guided tours are provided by Solomon himself or a family member. A fullsize replica of a 16th century Spanish galleon sits in the moat around the castle and serves as a restaurant. The land has been preserved in its original state and provides a beautiful nature walk along the creek, through ancient oaks and many varieties of native plants and trees.

ECOSanibel is a non-profit, non-partisan, educational organization dedicated to studying and upholding principles of the Earth Charter as they relate to the island sanctuary of Sanibel and the surrounding region. 



Turtle Tracks at SCCF



S.W.A.T. - Sanibel Water Attack Team is for





On Saturday, June 5, 2004 at 2 p.m., history was taking place here on Sanibel. Friedrich N. Jaegar dedicated a small piece of land on Rabbit Road to the late Edmond and Elnora Gavin and family.

A bronze plaque was placed on a stone near the house for Sanibel residents and visitors to view. The plaque acknowledged Edmond and Elnora and their parents, Isiah and Hannah Gavin and Harry and Pearl Walker. It goes on to describe Edmond and Elnora as "one of the pioneer Negro fami-

lies that settled on Sanibel Island in 1917."

"Being a member of this family makes me proud. I take a lot of pride in the [Gavin] name and its heritage and what has developed on the island," stated Eric Gavin, a resident of Lehigh Acres and the youngest of Edmond and Elnora's 18 children.

The plaque can be viewed as you pass 716 Rabbit Road, where many struggles were overcome with the leadership and love from Edmond and Elnora. There were a lot of problems among the Gavin household, but all those conflicts were resolved by loving one another.

One lesson the 18 children learned was to always be ready and willing to help others. "My parents made me who I am — a firefighter. I rush to aid others and learned to have a love for everyone, thanks to the way my parents raised my siblings and I," Eric explains.

The entire Gavin family is very grateful for the acknowledgement of their family. "It feels good to know that Jaegar recognized my family. Many people give credit to the Gavin family, but no one has taken a stand to make a landmark out of a house that has made

Sanibel history," Eric says.

family.





Holistic Health Notebook: More on your heart

We face an energy crisis in this culture. Energy deficiency syndromes like chronic fatigue syndrome, fibromyalgia, and generalized fatigue are increasing rapidly as

With the adequate production of energy, the cell is able to "breathe," eliminate waste materials, build over 300,000 different protein bodies (including hormones, enzymes, and so on), and basically "take care of business."

When the cell cannot produce enough energy, cell function slows, then ceases.

Cells that require large amounts of cellular energy (in tissues that are metabolically active such as the heart, liver, brain, and others) contain thousands of mitochondria, the "furnace" of the cell. Coenzyme Q10, required for ATP synthesis, is highly concentrated in these metabolically active cells, acting as a coenzyme for the production of energy within the mitochondria.

The body produces its own coenzyme Q10 but the standard American diet may not provide adequate amounts of the building blocks of this important protein. Diets that are low in the amino acid tyrosine, for example, may reduce the production of this important coenzyme. Dr. Karl Folkers, one of the original COQ10 researchers, stated that "suboptimal nutrient intake in man is almost universal."

By the age of seventy we produce less than 50% of the levels needed for health and vitality, which may be a key factor in age-related fatigue and heart disease.

The Science Behind COQ10

Let's take a quick stroll through the literature to see what the scientists discovered in terms of coenzyme Q10 and your heart:

COQ10 may be recommended as an adjuvant therapy in the treatment of congestive heart failure. In one study, COQ10 therapy resulted in a significant improvement in the functional class (improved 20 percent), mean CHF (congestive heart failure) score (improved 27 percent), left ventricular ejection fraction, and other indicators of function.

Doris Colgate receives leadership award

The prestigious 2004 Leadership in Women's Sailing Award was presented to Doris Colgate, president and CEO of Offshore Sailing School on June 5 at an awards ceremony in Marblehead, Mass.

Sponsored by BoatU.S. and the National Women's Sailing Association (NWSA), the award was created in 1999 to honor an individual who has a record of achievement in inspiring, educating and enriching the lives of women though sailing.

Before joining the advertising department of Yachting Magazine in the late '60s, Doris Colgate had never been on a sailboat. After a course at Offshore Sailing School she was "hooked" and married its founder, Steve Colgate - and the school - in 1969. Doris joined Offshore Sailing School as its vice president in 1970, became president in 1978 and CEO in 2001. Together the Colgates have grown Offshore Sailing School from a one-branch, two instructor, two boat operation to ten sailing school branches and a retail sales division for their Colgate 26 training boat.

In 1990 Doris founded the National Women's Sailing Association (NWSA) to create more awareness of sailing

among women and avenues for women to build confidence and skills. That same year she spearheaded "You Can Sail Escapes" to provide all-women training programs. That program continues today in several locations.

NWSA's Take The Helm seminars held at major boat shows with the support of Cruising World magazine since the early '90s, have helped more than 2,000 women and their sailing partners gain the confidence and desire to broaden sailing horizons. In 1991, Doris helped NWSA launch AdventureSail — a sailing-mentoring program for at-risk girls. In 1997, she established the Women's Sailing Foundation (WSF) a not-for-profit organization dedicated to enhancing the lives of women and girls through education and access to the sport of sailing.

Doris is listed in Who's Who of America, Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who in the Southeast, and Who's Who of the World. In 1994 she received the Betty Cook Memorial Lifetime Achievement Award from Boating Magazine and International Women in Boating for her work in the marine industry. In 1996 she shared with Steve Colgate, the prestigious Sail Magazine Industry Award for Leadership. And in 2003, US SAILING, the national governing body of sailing in the United States, awarded Steve and Doris the Timothea Larr Trophy in recognition of their outstanding leadership and excellence in sailing education.

Doris has been on the BOATU.S. National Advisory Council since 1997 and a member of the board of directors of Sail America, the sailing industry association, since 2000.

Author of SAILING: A Woman's Guide (January 1999, International Marine/McGraw Hill), Doris received the 2000 Southam Award in the book category for this informative aid for women. The Colgates' new book – Fast Track to Cruising – will be published by International Marine/ McGraw-Hill in late 2004.

Chamber speaker on identity theft

At the Sanibel Captiva Islands Chamber of Commerce Box Lunch on June 8, Pablo Trejo from the Florida Department of Financial Services spoke on the subject of identity theft.

Identity theft

Trejo is the outreach coordinator for the Bureau of Consumer Outreach and Education of the Florida Department of Financial Services, Division of Insurance Consumer Services.

The statistics are chilling: there were 10 million victims of identity theft in 2003, with a loss of \$53 billion. The cost for the victim to correct and clear their credit records averages \$1,000 and - until the matter is cleared up - most people find that their credit has been stopped. With identity theft, "you as the victim are believed to be guilty before you are found to be innocent," noted Trejo.

Successful identity thieves can even "sell your house out from under your feet," or obtain a home equity loan that you won't know about until you get your loan coupon book in the mail 30-40 days later.

Trejo showed the audience a skimming machine and demonstrated how quickly a credit card can be swiped; the machine itself is little larger than a small cell phone.

You can help protect yourself by checking with the Credit Reporting Bureaus for any new credit issued in your name; check with the Social Security Administration to see if your number is or has been used for a job you don't have. Invest in, and use, a shredder; analyze

your monthly financial statements; do not give personal information to someone you do not know and be cognizant of your incoming and outgoing mail.

One interesting bit of information: crooks using stolen credit cards check at gas station pumps to see if the card is still good. After checking whether or not they get an approval, they go to one store and shop. Before proceeding to the next store, they stop by a gas station to recheck the card.

If you become a victim of identity theft, Trejo notes that it is essential to have a paper trail. Report the crime to your local law enforcement agency and get a paper report; report it to the credit bureaus; report it to the U.S. Postal Service; report it to the Federal Trade Commission; report it to your bank, credit card companies, utilities, insurance, all other financial institutions where you do business. Follow up your phone contacts with a letter, noting the name and case number (where applicable) of the person you spoke with by phone. Wait a week and then call and make sure that your letter was received.


In over 90% of identity theft cases, the perpetrators are never found. If they are working as ring, the chances of catching them are better because investigators can look for common denominators.


Digital Imagination



New name for Edison College Gallery




It was a gala evening for Southwest Florida, as more than 500 art lovers filled Edison College. The occasion was the official renaming of Edison College's Gallery of Fine Art to the Bob Rauschenberg Gallery.

"This goes beyond Edison College in particular," said Ron Bishop, gallery director. "He's been a friend of everyone in the community, and a number of organizations. This is a gesture for Southwest Florida.'

Rauschenberg has been a supporter of







the gallery since 1980, when he opened his first of 11 exhibitions there. Proceeds from the sale of his posters and prints led to the formation of an endowment in 2000, with all funds going to the gallery.

Born in Port Arthur, Texas in 1925, he attended Kansas City Art Institute after serving in the Navy during World War II. In 1948, he enrolled at Black Mountain College in North Carolina, studying under former Bauhaus instructor Josef Albers. It was at Black Mountain that Rauschenberg's art began to take form, leading to collaborative pieces with musician John Cage and dancer/choreographer Merce Cunningham. One of these collaborations, Theatre Piece #1, is now regarded as one of the first 'Happenings,' a form of performance art that grew in influence throughout the 1950s and '60s.

> Rauschenberg went on to create costumes and sets for Cunningham and other choreographers, while redefining modern art with his 'combine' paintings. 'Combines' are three dimensional works that combine painting, sculpture, and found objects objects such as roosters, goats, old tires, or bits of machinery.

> The Guggenheim hosted a major retrospective, which toured from 1997 to 1999, "Scenarios," now on display at the Bob display Rauschenberg Gallery, is an exhibition of his most recent work.

Simon says... Don't miss this one!

Simon says, "Make 'em laugh!" And Director Robert Cacioppo and his talented Florida Rep cast willingly oblige without ever asking, "May I?" ... Resulting in a solid, satisfying performance of Neil Simon's Pulitzer Prize—winning, seriocomedy, Lost In Yonkers, which opened the summer season at the Arcade Theatre.

This play, set in the first year of World War II, has all the ingredients for an entertaining evening as it shows a laughably dysfunctional family, still struggling with Depression hardships and immigrant

memories, through the eyes of 15-year-old Jay (Daniel Benzing) and 12-year-old Arty (Jake Johnson). Because of the magnificent language, simple story, fine direction and acting our attention is glued to the stage for the entire evening. You might just recognize some familiar traits from your own family in most of the characters. If you grew up during the Depression you're bound to recognize the constant need and quest for money. But, even more than that, you'll become acutely aware that love is what drives each and every

character on stage as it does in real life.

Betty Madonna plays this basically simple tale of a domineering matriarch Grandma Kurnitz, with a steely backbone. Grandma is a stingy, self-reliant menace to her grandchildren and grown children alike, none of whom can

live up to her pitiless rules. She melts only late in the play, and never completely or for long. The strengths that have allowed her to survive also made her suspicious and alone. Grandma rules her domain — the apartment in Yonkers and the ice cream parlor below it — with her daughter and mainstay, Aunt Bella (Stephanie

Probably the best way to describe Bella is to say that she's a few brick short of a load. Add to

that, she is under her mother's thumb and has never left home. Davis plays her as a yearning, grown woman with a volatile, willful, loving child's mind. She is touching as well as funny and Davis' transition scene is well thought out.

Illuminating a different aspect of Grandma's withering love is Aunt Gert, whose showstopping asthmatic wheezes get

worse around her mother. Kelly Legarreta, as Gert, uses this golden opportunity to put this small support-role at center stage.

Dropping in or hid-ing out is Uncle Louie, a small time bag man, played to absolute perfection by Clif Morts. Morts gives a polished,

nuanced, generous performance. He acts WITH others, making us long for an uncle just like him — a slightly gray sheep

that no home should be without, adding spice and humor to the household.

During the course of the play, Grandma's older son, Eddie (John Lombardi) asks his mother to take in and care for his two young sons so he can go back on the road buying and selling scrap metal to pay off the debts incurred by his late wife's illness and funeral expenses. Lombardi invests the boys' father with lovingness, as well as a nervousness, and adds just the right touch of impassioned defense to maintain his dignity.

Benzing and Johnson as the young sons, Jay and Arty, tackle their roles with boyish confidence. They are never rude or smart-alecky, simply assured and honest. These two turn in outstanding performances for actors of such tender years, but then good acting needs no age to be good. Daniel, whose entire family has a theatrical bent, played Arty in a previous production of Lost in Yonkers and has appeared with the Rep several times; he recently graduated from Cypress Lake High School and was named an Outstanding Actor. Jake's interest in the

theatre began at age six with several theatre camps and has continued with appearances at the Broadway Palm Dinner Theatre. He has been a part of Kids Conspiracy, Kidz Act and Young

to eat at Perkins (the official hot dog provider for Hammond Stadium and a kind of Sardi's South) where the elite meet to eat and discuss the game they've just watched.



Shell Museum receives federal grant

The increasingly regional nature of the collection has attracted a large number of national and international students and scientists who visit The Shell Museum to examine specimens in their fields of expertise. Records of its holdings are managed through a database management system. Searches of the collection may be performed online at www.shell museum.org.

After her visit, Ms. Hawks will write a comprehensive report identifying conservation priorities. Her on-site consultation

will enable The Shell Museum to evaluate its current collection care policies, procedures, and environmental conditions.

Kitchen Inspiration: Ernie Gunther

Giggles traveling from table to table, "Turkey Gloop" being gobbled by hungry children, and the occasional tears after someone spills their lemonade, all of

this sets the stage for Wednesday night's Logos program. Noise and chaos envelop the room, then, as if by magic, a wistful hush falls over Fellowship Hall, as it is time to thank the cooks. A microphone passes down a line of small children and worn out adults smelling of hard work, allegiance, and canned corn. The hesitant children pass the microphone down the line introducing the cooks that they are representing.

Wednesday Every evening the microphone took this path, and it was not

uncommon to come across some familiar faces, but no face in the line was able to catch my eye as engrossingly as that of a faithful man named Ernie Gunther. Ernie's face was worn and leathery, and his hair as gray as a mysterious fog lifting off the Pine island Sound in the early hours of dawn. His smile though, was most intriguing and as bright as the Sanibel sun. It gave the distinct impression that he was flying as high as a flag on the 4th of July His infectious rays of joy and sunshine spread throughout our church and community transforming our souls and leaving a memory of ardor, compassion, and zest.

Ernie was an honorable man for countless reasons. All the people who knew him refer to him as a man endeavored with faith in the Lord, a vast affection for children, and a yearning to help others. Ernie truly appreciated his time on earth before he died. If there was ever a man so deserving of the title honorable it was Ernie Gunther.


According to many people in our church family, Ernie had a very obvious love for the Lord. Ernie lived a life that reflected God's will almost completely. He attended the Sanibel Community Church with an open heart and burning desire to help children have a personal relationship with God. One of Ernie's most vital gifts to the community was his devotion and unique way of glorifying the Lord. He taught us all to praise God according to our own personalities, and taught us about the immense power of God's love. Ernie's adoration for the Lord was stimulating to all those around him and watching his walk with Jesus inspired others to have a relationship with the Lord that mirrored Ernie's.

Ernie's relish for love, life, and children was undeniable. In the 1970's a retired Ernie came to Sanibel with intentions of relaxation. He experienced a calling, though, to be one of the first to help in the Community Church's Logos program for vouth. Ernie was first called as a volunteer, but little did we know that his first experi-

ence scraping applesauce off the plates in the kitchen was part of the master plan. Ernie came to Logos every Wednesday for more than 10 years to help prepare food and then wash dishes. He considered Logos his own special gift, and he was wholeheartedly dedicated to the children there. One of his favorite parts about getting to work there was the time at which we would thank

the cooks. Children raced in the kitchen to grab their parent, or in Ernie's case a volunteer. Once, a small five-yearold led Ernie to the stage and when the microphone was passed to him the boy said, "This is my gwand-pa gwand-pa Ewnie!" It was little things such as being referred to as someone's grandfather that lit up Ernie's life.

There was not one Logos that Ernie ever missed throughout his years there. Even when Ernie was struggling with cancer chemotherapy treatments he still turned up sick or not sick.

According to one of Ernie's oldest friends there was one time when Ernie did question getting up to attend. In the story Ernie said he missed his wife who had died a few vears earlier, he longed to see his children. and he was involved in his continuous fight with cancer. He said he looked to the sky and said, "Lord, why don't you just take me now?" Then the Lord came down to Ernie and replied, "Well, who would wash the dishes for the children?" When Ernie heard these words he said he sprang out of bed and went on with ever more appreciation for his life. Ernie not only had a passion for living his own life, but he also cherished improving the lives of others.

He always put other people's problems in front of his own and if there was anything that Ernie could do to lend a hand to someone he was the first to do it. Ernie treated people the same way that he treated his work. He worked as mightily as he could to the point where he was proud to sign his own name upon it. His humanity lives on still today.

I often question whether Ernie knew how grand an effect he had on so many lives. Did Ernie realize how exceptional and loved he was? Today, Ernie is in the place he so long wished to go, Heaven. But more clearly than my visual memoir is the sound of his voice as he answered a child or an adult when they told him "thank you."

Ernie would look up to the sky, point his index finger to the high heavens and say as if he were speaking to God, "I'm not done
