





# **Paint-Outs in Fort Myers coming-up**


The Sanibel-Captiva Art League invites all visitors and artists to participate in the following Thursday morning offisland paint-outs, which are followed by an informal and friendly critique.



Bernard will always be remembered by his family and friends. We are all eternally grateful and blessed for the chance to live fuller lives owing to his presence.





Janet enjoyed spending time with her family, playing bridge and taking cruises. She was an award-winning artist known for her sculptures and "Sailor's Valentine's."



Funeral services will be private. The family suggests that memorial contributions be made to Hope Hospice or the American Diabetes Association.










Top: The schoolhouse moves down the road as workers move in to repair the downed lines.






# Captiva's Scotch Bonnet house to be moved

Scotch Bonnet, also known as the Dr. Hicks House on Captiva Drive, will be spared the bulldozer after all.

The historic home will soon become the property of Marvin and Helene Gralnick, owners of Chico's clothing stores. The current owners, Ralph and Mary Roberts, had been planning to relocate the house, now at 15759 Captiva Drive, to a parcel owned by the Gralnicks when Hurricane Charley hit on August 13. According to the Lee County Historic Preservation Board's staff report, the Grainicks then declined to accept the damaged house, and other attempts at finding a suitable receiving parcel, even from such interested parties as South Seas Resort and author Randy Wayne White, were unsuccessful. The Roberts filed an application for demolition with the Lee County Historic Preservation board, citing extensive damage from the hurricane.

A structural evaluation conducted by Arnold/Sanders Consulting Engineers stated "The loss of structural integrity of this building will not allow the building to be moved to another location, as has been discussed, without substantial redesigning, repair and construction of the entire building. Further, it is our opinion that required repairs would not be feasible within reasonable economic means.'

The application was met with concern from the previous owner, as well as the Captiva Civic Association, which urged the HPB "to take all necessary precautions to prevent demolition of this historically significant Captiva Island house.

County staff had also advised the HPB to continue the hearing until their December 16 meeting, while discouraging demolition.


Relief for Scotch Bonnet came on December 15, when the application for demolition was withdrawn.

We were able to strike an agreement with the Gralnicks, the initial recipients of the house," Don DeLuca, the Roberts' attorney said. "The goal is to preserve rather than demolish it.

DeLuca added that some improvements have already been made to the house, but that it is uncertain when the move will take place.

"We're trying to do it as quickly as we can. The receiving parcel needs to be permitted, a foundation put down, and a barge rented," he said.

The Roberts will also contribute funds toward repairing the structure once the move is complete. The move entails floating the house on a barge approximately 5,500 feet on the Roosevelt Channel, to

the nearby lot.

The given historic designation 1993, was built in or around 1908 by Dr. John F. Hicks, who purchased the land from his neighbor, Dr. John R. Dickey. The Hick's were so taken with the Dickey home that they had theirs built using the

same house plans. Like many structures of that era, The Hick's house incorporated Dade County pine into its construction. Dade County pine, no longer available because of over harvesting, is an unusual-

ly dense wood that is naturally termite resistant. Because of its rarity and durability, Dade County pine elements are usually harvested from structures that are scheduled for demolition.


Mr. Doerr's local banking experience stretches back to the sixties, and includes the founding of Heritage National Bank where he served as president and CEO.



# **Our New Year's Resolution**

There is a tale often told on my wife's side of the family that merits retelling. Molly's father, Art, was approached decades ago by a small group of friends to invest in a fledgling computer software company. At the time, aside from a firm called International Business Machines, there were very, very few people who knew anything about computers or what their future might hold. But for Art, the timing couldn't have been worse.

He still had young children, his wife Jean was pregnant, money was tight and the \$10,000 they were asking for him to invest was more than he could spare at the moment. He passed on their offer. The company was Control Data, Had he been able to make that investment, everyone in the family would be a multi-millionaire

many times over today.

Each of you reading this article has your own lost opportunity tale to tell. Be it a piece of acreage on the outskirts of town, a stock tip you paid no attention to, or a business venture you thought would never fly. In each and every case, you decided not to risk it. The acreage became a bank site, the stock was Microsoft and the business was Subway and you, or someone you know is still kicking themselves to this day for not taking the risk or having the initiative to commit.

With those thoughts in mind, I've got a hot tip for you. In fact it's more than a tip for those of us living in Southwest Florida. I want you to make this our New Year's Resolution #1. We have to buy the Babcock Ranch, Losing it to more development is not an acceptable option.

As of Dec. 17, 2004, the State's efforts to purchase the ranch have been detailed and the family has now placed the property on the open market. Under the current zoning, only one dwelling unit is allowed per 10 acres. That's very low density, but bear in mind that Florida's developers have a history of miraculously increasing residential densities. Even at the current asking price of \$455 million, we are looking at a cost per homesite of under \$50,000 (91,361 acres divided by 10 = 9,136 lots / \$455 million divided by 9,136 = \$49,802 per lot). Phat's with every future home boasting a lavish 10-acre estate. Try

finding 10 acres anywhere in Southwest Florida for under \$50,000. Don't even dare to compare this bargain with the current cost of lots on Sanibel or Captiva because you cannot. This is our chance to own Control Data.

Our Governor, Jeb Bush, after funding two separate appraisals that came in at \$450 million and \$460 million respectively, had his hand-picked negotiator low-ball the Babcock family with an offer of \$400 million. The EPA, who spearheaded the offer, said that this was typical for the State, with the understanding that they could convey considerable tax advantages to the sellers and that their offer was cash.

Of course, the Babcock family was insulted and immediately withdrew the property from further negotiations with the State. I can't blame them. From their perspective why would the State bother to fund the two appraisals only to ignore them when it came time to make the actual offer?

Where do we go from here?

We call Jeb Bush at 850/488-4441 and tell him to resubmit the offer, splitting the difference of the two appraisals to come in at \$455,000,000. Throw in the tax benefits for good measure. This isn't a 400-acre piece of wetlands we're talking about. This is a parcel of land ten times larger than Sambel, nearly 20 times larger than the entirety of the "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

Bob Janes, our County Commissioner, has been relentless in his pursuit of this property. Adam Cummings from Charlotte County has likewise been a strong proponent of State ownership of the Babcock Ranch. Support them and the efforts of the consortium of conservation groups allied to make this acquisition a reality — SCCF, the Nature Conservancy, Audubon... the list is large and represents every conservation-minded organization in Southwest Florida.

Send money. Send five dollars, five hundred or fifty thousand if you can afford it. Mail your tax deductible donation to The Southwest Florida Community Foundation, 8260 College Parkway-Suite #101, Fort Myers 33919. In the memo of your check write "Babcock Preservation Partnership Fund," Visa and Mastercard are also

accepted by going on line to Florida Community.com or by calling the SWFL Community Foundation at 274-5900. So far, there have been donations that range from fifty cents to over \$1,000 from 1,028 individuals. A little over \$108,000 has been raised to date. Given the magnitude of this unique opportunity, we should all remember my father-in-law's Control Data mistake.

With that in mind I'm adding my \$1,000 to the fund today. Four years ago I wrote a novel about hurricanes and over-development in Southwest Florida. 1 know I got the over-development part. right, but the hurricanes caught me by surprise. When I wrote the book, promised \$1 per copy sold would to go to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and/or its projects. (Under the terms of our agreement I was able to earmark where my future installments might be dedicated.) This time, my personal New Year's Resolution is that they are going to help buy the Babcock property. Everyone reading this must add it to the top of their own list of 2005 resolutions.

I will close with an excerpt from the epilogue of that novel I wrote — Way Under Contract, a Florida Story. I think it says it best:

Way Under Contract is a work of fiction. What has occurred in Florida over the past 50 years is not. In 1950, the population of Florida was 2,771,305. The projected population based on the 2000 census is expected to exceed 15,428,000 people. On average, for every decade over the past 50 years, Florida's population has doubled.

For the wildlife of the Sunshine State, this unprecedented growth has been devastating. Golf courses, suburts, condominums, apartment buildings, shopping centers, treeways, office buildings — the immeasurable uprootings of man — all serve to displace those creatures who once called those pastures, swamps and forests home. The animals retreat in silence. Some, like the Florida panther and the manatee, retreat to the very brink of extinction. Extinction is the longest silence.

In a way, Way Under Contract is not a Florida story. It is the Florida Story. It is the story of section, township and range... the tale of men who see the world, not through the childlike eyes of wonder, but through the eyes of lot and block. The eyes of money. The men who clear off the slash pines, burn the saw palmetto and lay the footings for the next


# Trekking in Madagascar: The Madagascar Lemurs

# Water Conservation

#### from the Island Water Association

Last year, IWA undertook its most extensive water conservation effort ever. Engineering Manager, Rich Calabrese developed a program partially funded by the South Florida Water Management District SFWMD), to contact our 350 highest water users and to help them conserve


We estimate that the 30% of our high users who responded to our offer to help them conserve water saved around 26,000,000 gallons of water last year, which is a lot of water! Some important lessons emerged from the effort:


- Most landscape companies are more concerned with cutting/fertilizing the grass, and pruning shrubs, than with irrigation systems or water usage. IWA members need to understand their irrigation system so they can ensure that it doesn't waste water.
- Landscaping changes over time, and the original design of the irrigation system does not always reflect the needs of the current landscaping. Irrigation systems are often designed for watering-in new shrubs and trees. Established vegetation does not require nearly as much water.
- Members should have their irrigation systems completely checked at least every six months, including operation of the rain sensor.

Irrigation times should be reset seasonally (Spring, Summer and Fall) to accommodate the changing watering requirements of landscapes.



# Governor Bush signs Bill to restore Florida's beaches

After a devastating hurricane season, Governor Bush signed SB 14A into law on December 21, appropriating supplemental emergency funding for the restoration of the state's storm-damaged beaches. Florida's appropriation provides \$68 million for rebuilding dunes and repairing miles of shoreline battered by the forces of four hurricanes.

The hurricane recovery plan, developed by the Department, identifies more than 120 local beach projects ranging from dune restoration to beach renourishment. While many impacted beach and dune systems will recover naturally with time, strategies detailed in the plan will accelerate the natural process and provide coastal communities with storm protection.

To prepare the beach recovery plan, teams of Department engineers and environmental managers assessed erosion along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts following the summer storms. Engineers completed close to 1,000 hours of aerial and ground assessments across 25 coastal counties, shooting 76 hours of video and more than 5,200 still photographs to document hurricane damage to the state's famed beaches, sandy dunes and coastal communities. To aid recovery, the federal government is providing \$116 million to repair or nourish federally-authorized shore protection projects in Florida. The \$68 million provided by the Florida Legislature for the State's beach recovery plan will complement the restoration activities and funding provided by federal agencies.

State, federal and local governments invest millions of dollars annually to restore and maintain critically eroded beaches along Florida's 1,350-mile coastline. Over the last three years, the Florida Legislature has appropriated more than \$80 million to restore Florida's shoreline. To date, more than 180 miles of

beach has been restored and maintained through the State program.

# DEP launches website providing storm impact information

Following an unprecedented hurricane season, the Department launched a website on December 22, providing coastal mapping of storm damaged counties, which can be used by disaster relief personnel, property owners, realtors, insurance agents and coastal planners to assess coastal damage to assist in the recovery process.

"The Department is using state-of-the-art e-tools to manage information, deliver services and increase government efficiency," said Secretary Castille. "This is another way the agency is stepping up to assist storm disaster relief efforts. Access to accurate, timely data is critical to recovery."

Video clips and photographs of Florida's shoreline from spring 2004 and in the aftermath of Hurricanes Frances, Ivan and Jeanne provide illustrations of beach erosion and damage caused by the four storms.

Teams of Department engineers and environmental managers assessed erosion along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts following the summer storms. Engineers completed close to 1,000 hours of aerial and ground assessments across 25 coastal counties, shooting 76 hours of video and more than 5,200 stills to document hurricane damage to the state's famed beaches, sandy dunes and coastal communities. Collected data was used to develop the State's Hurricane Recovery Plan for Florida's Beach and Dune System.

# Ellen Lai: The Banker Who Makes House Calls

Ellen Lai, born Ellen Soong, to parents of Chinese teller at the Bank of the Islands moving from teller to ancestry, grew up in Trinidad and exudes the warmth and hospitality of the Caribbean people. From the

beginning, her education was based on British standards and she was taught by English teachers in a private elementary school followed by a classical education at the private Bishop Anstey High School in Trinidad. These schools were highly disciplined, based on the standards set by the University of Cambridge in London. Ellen explains that the students had to "sit the exam" in Trinidad and the exams were sent back to the University of Cambridge for scoring and evaluation.

After graduation, a career in the field of bank-

ing was one of the better choices for a girl. Starting as a teller with the Royal Bank of Canada in Trinidad, Ellen spent five years in banking before she married Stephen Lai. When their only son John was born, Ellen wanted to care for John and left the banking business. Meanwhile she was invited by the British West Indies Airways in Trinidad to become their Special Services Reservationist giving special attention to their VIP clients. In this idyllic job Ellen met royalty and celebrities from many different countries including Princess Margaret, Tom

Selleck, Diana Ross and The Supremes and — as part of her assignment — gave special care to children travelling alone. She explains, "Trinidad was a tourist island in many ways resembling Sanibel Island and I loved working with the B.W.I.A.

In 1983 the Granada Coup was bringing unrest to the neighboring island of Trinidad and in 1984, the Lai family migrated to America. Ellen returned to the banking business and started as a supervisor to branch manager in 1993. As a supervisor Ellen still remembers the day a teller cashed a Florida Power and Light bill for a

customer. When Ellen asked the teller why she cashed the bill like a check, the teller answered, "It says, Pay this amount!" same error was never repeated again.

Another cash-checking incident of a very different nature occurred on a cold January morning in Sanibel. A man came into the bank and told Ellen that he wanted to cash a check. When Ellen asked him for I.D., he unzipped his jeans, saw the look on Ellen's face and said, "It's okay, lady, it was so cold this morning I

had to put on two pair of jeans and my I.D. is in the pocket of my inner jeans?

With her diversified banking experience Ellen joined Sun Trust as a branch manager in 1995, then five years later became part of Colonial Bank as assistant vice president and, in 2003, vice president/business development. She now spends much of her time on Sanibel Island in Colonial Wealth Management as a Private Client Banker who makes house calls.

When Ellen talks about her first job in banking, she explains that there were no computers and everything was done manually. The work was very time-consuming and, at the end of the day, a teller supervisor had to check and prove the day's work. At that time no one had imagined how different the job would be in less than

However, one of the best parts of her job was the intimacy of a closely knit community where people knew one another and watched children grow up and return as adults, only to ask, "Do you remember me?" Ellen has always believed that making an impact on someone's life is what matters the most. "I really enjoy filling people's needs and making meaningful relationships

# Holistic Health Notebook: And I thought I'd heard it all

Over the course of the years, I have worked with a number of people with Crohn's disease and other conditions of the gut. I find that simple dietary changes make huge differences, almost immediately.

So when I recently read of a new way

of treating this chronic inflammatory bowel disease, I was really surprised.

According Reuter's, According to Reuter's, "Patients with Crohn's disease...who do not respond to conventional treatment, may get symptom relief by swallowing parasite eggs.

What??

No, this study was not conducted in a Third World country

with a sanitation problem. Researchers at the University of Iowa did the work. For three weeks, patients consumed a commercial drink containing 2500 ova of the parasite, helminth Trichuris suis. The parasite primarily affects pigs.

Compliance was good, and at the end of the 24-week study period, 80% showed benefits. Only a few people withdrew prematurely from the study, and not for rea-

sons of squeamishness.

Since a number of people have recently inquired about inflammatory bowel disease, may I present a protocol that will relieve many symptoms of the disease, including reducing the inflammation, that will not send shudders down your spine?

I generally find that food allergies are at the heart of most bowel conditions. The most common

offenders are grains with gluten (wheat, oats, etc.) and dairy products. Other foods can produce intestinal inflammation, though, including red meat, sugar, soft

drinks, and corn. I recommend that you eliminate all grains, except rice and millet, along with all dairy products for at least six weeks. Symptoms generally improve dramatically.

Meanwhile, some wonderful nutrients and herbs can help relieve the unpleasant symptoms. Enteric coated peppermint, for example, helps reduce intestinal spasms and gas production. The amino acid l-glutamine is well-known for repairing and replacing the cells lining the intestinal tract wall (1000 mg, twice per day on an empty stomach), and aloe vera (one or two tablespoons per day) provides additional healing. Take 1000 mg of l-glutamine on an empty stomach, twice per day. Take one or two tablespoons of aloe vera iuice each day.

If, at the end of the six week period, you are still experiencing symptoms, we take it to the next level by recommending

allergy testing, to test for IgE and IgG immunoglobulins (it's a blood test). You may be reacting to other foods not mentioned above.

To help resolve the inflammation, use ginger or curcumin (tumeric), or bromelain, an enzyme from the green stem of a pineapple that works very well as an antiinflammatory. Two capsules three times per day on an empty stomach does the

The nice thing about this protocol is that it is simple, inexpensive, and does not involve swallowing parasite eggs.

I am extremely curious about the name of this "commercial drink containing 2500 ova" but am afraid to ask. I wonder if the producers of Fear Factor produces



# The future of Australian pines...

Hurricane Charley's wrath was sufficient to bring down the lion's share of Australian pines that once held sway on Sanibel, but the city has no plan to indiscrimi-

nately finish the job.

Islanders were left without power and unable to return to their homes for over a week following Charley's visit Aug. 13, largely due to the signature canopy of pines that adorned Periwinkle Way before the storm and came crashing down upon it during its fury. The invasive exotic is considered to be the primary culprit for much of the inconvenience that residents were forced to deal with.

"After working on the property damage assessment team with the Building Department it was obvious to all team members that the most significant structural damage to non-Gulf front homes and the single biggest cause of blockage of roadways and loss of electric power on Sanibel was the result of toppled and broken Australian pines," City Manager Judie Zimomra said in a written

But some, such as Sanibel resident Mary Cutaiar, feel the city acted overzealously in the weeks following the storm, removing pines wherever they found them. The notion of taking down seemingly healthy trees because they might eventually topple over did not sit well with all islanders, she said.

"If a storm takes something down you can accept that, but I think they took advantage of the opportunity and I think it's a crime," Cutaiar said.

Zimomra said the city was merely acting in the best interests of its residents when trees that were still standing following Charley were removed from public rightof-ways. The shallow, brittle root system of the pines, coupled with moist soil from rain and the three hurricane threats that followed Charley made the action necessary, she said.

But using the storms as an excuse to remove all Australian pines from Sanibel is not the case, Zimomra said. "At this point, there is no proposal on the table to eliminate them," she said.

Going onto private property to remove them, Zimomra added, is also not a consideration. "It is a program that would require significant funding," she said.

State law closely regulates Australian pines, Zimomra pointed out, noting it is illegal to sell them in Florida or replant them after a storm event. Piles of pines, stacked like cordwood, still can be found in various portions of the island, including the parking area of the Sanibel boatramp. Piles of mulch ground from them are available, free of charge, to anyone willing to cart them off.

Damage to Bowman's Beach — the city's popular tourist destination which re-opened last week for the first time since Charley — was caused primarily by falling pines. A \$150,000 grant secured from the Tourist Development Council covered most of the clean-up.

Cutaiar said she was also concerned about comments relayed to her by a subcontractor conducting clean-up work for the Lee County Electric Cooperative shortly after the storm. The worker told her they were "under orders" to remove all Australian pines from the island,

But Karen Ryan, spokeswoman for the Co-op, said that no such orders have ever been issued. Tree-trim-

ming, she said, is done only to insure safety and reliabil-

"We worked closely with the City of Sanibel during restoration and I think that coordination and cooperation was incredible," she said. "They did not instruct us to remove specific vegetation but were instrumental in assisting us with maintaining safety and rebuilding the system.

The Co-op is responsible for tree-trimming when the limbs are in contact with primary electrical lines or lines located in utility easements, Ryan said. Workers will occasionally trim outside of an easement if a tree is between the lines and there is high potential for an outage, she added.

But to Cutaiar, its just another reason why the island will never look the same.

Those Australian pines were part of the character of the islands, and Periwinkle Way looks terrible now," she said. "In summertime it gave you shade and the birds roosted in them.

"It was part of living on Sanibel."

He's found that his business knowledge applies well to store operations, although, he said, "the retail part is new to me. But I





They painted realistic marble columns and arches, with distant gardens in paint, on plain walls, thereby giving the average home the appearance of a villa. The murals were considered status symbols, almost the way real palaces with columns and arches would be.

Faux techniques are imitative of nature. Sanibel's decorative painters use faux techniques often, to incorporate the island's beautiful and exotic trees, flowers, wildlife, and sea creatures into wall murals and painted furniture; and also to paint in details of stone or wooden indoor and outdoor architecture, and features such as ponds, waterfalls, and beach scenes.

Fresco paintings — painted into wet plaste on walls and ceilings so that the paint bonds with the plaster as it dries — turned the ceilings of Renaissance cathedrals into a fabulous patchwork of architectural details, with areas of open, light-filled sky, and huge figures in allegorical scenes.

Some of today's on island painters capture something of the style of fresco painting, but without wet plaster. They use classical motifs, with large areas of open sky, and cherubs trailing garlands of flowers, yet seeming to fly to the four corners, probably symbolic of four winds, four seasons, or four classical arts.

As the courts of Europe became more wealthy and powerful, it was no longer only for the glory of God that decorative paintings were done, but also for the glory of the royal houses in power. One of the simplest ways of achieving the appear-

ance of wealth was to faux paint the details. Marble architectural details were painted on whatever stone or other building material lay affordably to hand. Walls were painted to resemble elegant stone, or fine wood paneling. Images of flowerfilled urns, birds, fountains, gods and goddesses, all became painted decorative elements. The techniques even spread to furniture and small decorative objects, which were marbleized, ebonized, Japaned, burled, grain-painted, tortoiseshelled, or otherwise painted to resemble various ancient or precious materials, including gemstones like malachite and lapus lazuli. Techniques like glazing were used, in which many very thin layers of paint were built up to achieve depth of color and other effects.

Today's island faux painters employ all of these techniques, painting urns of flowers on cupboard doors, turning steel walls into aged stone blocks, and letting twodimensional birds fly over a wall.

In the nineteenth century, aniline dyes were introduced, which made vibrant new pigments available and affordable to many more people, though the techniques were still executed by master craftsmen.

When printed wallpaper began to be mass produced, decorative painting fell out of favor except as a treatment for furniture, but it was again taken up during the art deco era in the 1920s-1930s, the designs having become more graphic and stylized, the colors predominantly white, and black, with metallics.

Both World War II and the advent of plastics conspired to almost eliminate most traditional decorative arts in this

country, for at least two decades. It was not until the mid-1960s that a new wave of artists and musicians began to embrace historic "folk" arts.

As history was progressing, a second tradition of decorative painting quietly grew alongside the frescoes, trompe l'oeil and faux techniques that were found in the homes and public places built by and for an elite upper class. In charming cottages and lowly huts, people decorated their walls and furnishings in a more simple fashion, using primitive symbols, and interpreting with an untrained eye, and limited supplies and techniques, the natural flora and fauna that grew around them. Stories were told in paint, and if someone in a village happened to see a piece that had been grain-painted, they tried to copy that effect. Sometimes the results were so good, that the important craft guild painters would borrow an idea from the peasants. Simple and useful peasant furniture, including wardrobes, cupboards, blanket chests, tables, chairs and benches, primitively built, and decorated with beautiful folk paintings, was built in every part of the world, at all points in history, including the early 20th

century. Today, pieces in this genre are considered folk art treasures and bring thousands of dollars at top notch auctions and antique shops around the world.

Decorative painters who design pieces for Sanibel homes and galleries today use not only the historically fine craft guild techniques of trompe l'oeil and faux finishing, but are also proficient at bright colorful painting using graphic symbols and floral motifs to create one of a kind furnishings that look as light and bright as an island sunrise.

#### Meet the Artists Heather Slabosz

A Fort Myers artist, specializing in murals, faux finishing, and trompe l'oeil, Heather has decoratively painted theme rooms, niches, floor cloths, children's rooms, elevators, garage doors, and lanais.

In a recent commission, a residential elevator in a Gulf Ridge home off San-Cap Road, was given a treatment reminiscent of an English garden, to satisfy the homeowner's wishes. The walls were painted in faux stone, with small plants growing between cracks, which were



painted in for extra character.

There is a fountain on the back wall, with cascading water down to the koi pond, which is painted on a removable floorcloth. The ceiling has paim-winged cherubs, with added birds and other touches of nature. The homeowner was so pleased, she is having the mural continued in the entry room off the elevator, with canvas drapes in a tropical motif, which will be painted using a trompe l'oeil technique. "I enjoy this type of work because I never get bored," said Heather. "Each job is as different as each individual homeowner."

Many times Heather does the preliminary sketches thru the mail, especially when working on murals for a client's home in another state. When the work is complete, she simply takes the canvas off the stretchers and ships it wherever it needs to go.

Murals can be done on thinner canvas and applied to a wall just the way wallpaper is, allowing endless possibilities.

#### Laura Ball

A Sanibel artist who is really beginning to make a name for herself designing and executing decorative painting projects on the islands, Laura Ball has done work for several private island homes. She is a master faux painter, accomplished in many techniques including marbleizing, tortoise shell, and old leather. She excels at beach and underwater effects, and has recently completed a huge wrap-around mural at the Hungry Heron that showcases species of island sealife, birds, and other wild critters as they would appear in their natural habitat.


Laura is a Sanibel Island Post Office employee who worked nights and weekends to complete the large murals. The base coats were applied by her husband, Charley Ball, better known as Barefoot Charley, housepainter, on the islands. The two have been teaming up on several projects lately.

"When I was almost finished at the Heron," Laura said, "the owner of the new needlepoint shop at the Village, called Jeez Louise, came in for a meal, saw the murals, and hired me on the spot to do the interior of her store. It's nice when your work does the promotion for you," she added.

## Penny Pritt

Penny is unique among decorative painters who display their work on the islands. A resident of Bonita Springs, Penny's only painting jobs for the last 18 years have been decorative paintings on furniture, fabrics, and

through Sanibel's Norfleet Interiors, Inc. at 1554 Periwinkle Way. It is a great symbiotic relationship. She is Norfleet's only decorative painter; they are her only creative income.

As a result, there are monumental amounts of Penny's work all over the islands. Enough, in fact, to fill two fat portfolios with completed designs for everything from armoires to throw pillows

She has painted cabinets with species of island birds, flowers, beach grasses, underwater scenes, and even one in French cafe style. Three barstools with three different fishes, cedar chests with palm trees, floral mirror frames, vines twining up chair legs, and a series of comical frog pillows offer additional creative example.


Penny is also good at restoring paint-

ings, and has had many commissions for that type of work.

Penny said about her work after all this time, "My painting passion is flowers. I love the intricacy of their petals and colors. Also, I enjoy it when I can successfully repair a piece of artwork that has been damaged. If I can recapture its previous look, then the owner can once again treasure it."

Obviously, decorative painting has been embraced on Sanibel and Captiva for at least the last two decades. There are many other painters, living on and off island who exhibit their work here. Linda Boltrek, at her Seaweed Galleries on both islands has always promoted decorative painting particularly on furniture, and regularly shows the work of Christina Wyatt, Sissi Janku, Jennelle Randell, Kassia Strauss, Linda Ashton-Travis, Teri Causey and others. These artists are featured in the January edition of the Captiva Chronicle.

Several other decorative painters are listed with BIG ARTS, including Lisa Lawlor Williams, Laura Conway, Lisa Gould, JoAnn Marriot, Joyce Curvin, and Lois Ferguson.

given at Big Arts, where we were treated to a very special performance by the fabulous American tenor, William Burden, a Metropolitan Opera Principal, and his equally talented wife — Met prize winning soprano, Carol Chickering. Burden's parents Annie and John have kept me apprised of son Bill's career for the past 20 years. What an auspicious climb that has been. from Seattle Opera to the Lyric in Chicago to Santa Fe Opera, on to Glimmerglass then Paris, NYC Opera and, now, to the Met where, later this season, Bill will be starring as Pelleas in Pelleas and Melisande. Burden has a tenor voice that is pure honey; his seamless technique allows him to stretch difficult notes effortlessly with color and brilliance. He is eloquent elegance personified, with handsome good looks; it's easy to understand why he has won such an outstanding reputation throughout Europe and America with his wide-ranging repertoire.

We got a fine sampling of that repertoire in the varied program which ranged from Italian and French operas to Viennese operetta. Burden further demonstrated his versatility by successfully performing selections from American musicals. Carol. a Juilliard graduate, also projected the great possibilities for her fulure opera career. She has a delicate lyricism, and performed the effortless scaling of high notes with a witty, coquettish charm. What makes these two talented artists unique is that they act the emotions embedded in the lyrics; that makes for even greater enjoyment when listening to opera.

Now I ask you, what could be a nicer holiday gift than having the Metropolitan Opera come right here to us? Thank you Burdens, thank you BIG ARTS, BIG ARTS Angels and Sambel Captiva Trust Company for sponsoring this special treat.

After parking my car at the Sports Complex's Park & Fly, Jet Blue flew me away for more holiday festivities with family and friends in the Big Apple. Fortunately, the trip was simple and with-out all those horrendous security checks and endless waits that the news media had predicted. 


# Christmas on Sanibel: Yule Love It at the Schoolhouse







# MUSICAL NOTES

# A Magical Evening Of Song

On Tuesday, Dec. 21, the BIG ART's Angels and the Sanibel Captiva Trust Company sponsored a special, highly musical, holiday treat to an ecstatic and most appreciative audience. Lyric tenor William Burden and coloratura Carol Chickering Burden, accompanied by pianist J.J. Penna, presented a potpourri of selections drawn from Italian, French and Viennese opera, operetta and the American musical theater.

Burden, a graduate of Indiana University, has performed with prestigious opera companies in the United States and Europe, including the Met and the Paris Operas. He has also sung with leading orchestras such as the Philadelphia, Minnesota and the BBC. Chickering graduated from Juilliard and has performed in both opera and concerts throughout the United States and Europe, including with the Philadelphia Orchestra and solo performances at New York's Carnegie Hall and Lincoln

Bill and Carol, husband and wife, met 12 years ago while appearing together in Leonard Bernstein's Candide at the Skylight Opera Company in Milwaukee. They have a five-year-old daughter, Claire, and an 11-month-old son, Jackson, and would have appeared as part of the Great Performers Series last year had not Carol been pregnant. They are an elegant and talented couple whose consummate musicality was communicated to all in attendance.

The program was divided into four sections. The first consisted of excerpts from Italian opera and included Verdi's "Libiamo" from La Traviata, Donizetti's "Una Furtive Lagrima" from L'Elisir d'Amore, and two Puccini arias — one from from La Boheme and the other from La Rondine. The Verdi featured both vocalists in duet form while the Donizetti was performed by Burden; Puccini's familiar melody, "Quando me'n vo." (from Boheme) was sung by Chickering. The Italian opera segment concluded with a four-de-force for both artists as they sang Puccini's "Chi il bel Sogno di Doretta." Wearing a beautiful turquoise silk dress, Chickering was

visually sturning to look at and most convincing as an actress. Her voice is wonderfully centered with vibrant overtones and she can execute technical Lily Pons-type runs with dazzling effect. Her intonation, phrasing and control is of the highest level. Burden, formally dressed in a tuxedo, was equally appealing. His resonant, well-placed tone was impressive throughout and his expressive movements and stage presence added breadth to the fine interpretation of his selec-

The second segment consisted of French opera selections and allowed Burden to sing the melancholy aria, "Pourquoi me reveiller, by Jules Massenet. His soulful rendition beautifully captured the sorrow of the poet. Werther, as he larmented his abandonment by his love, Charlotte. The second Massenet aria, "Ah! Douce enfant!" containing numerous rubatos, permitted Chickering to expose

her effortless control and her lyrical, rich, broad-toned bel canto style of vocalization. The last selection before intermission, "C'est toil" from Leo Delibes' Lakme, featured both artists ending with a passionate and persuasive

kiss as only a couple in love can display.

The third section of the program focused on one of the most famous composers of operettas of the 1900s, Franz Lehar. Although born in Hungary, Lehar spent most of his career in Vienna, and Burden, singing in German, warmly delivered one of his familiar and great love songs, "Dein ist mein Ganzes Herz." Next, Chickering sang his "Meine Lippen sie Kuben so Heib" — complete with Gypsy coquetry -- who tries to project her many charms to an admiring crowd. The last Lehar aria, "Born of April," from the most popular operatta in music history, The Merry Widow, Was delivered in English by the Burdens and closed the third segment with another lingenne kiss

The final and fourth portion of the night's program featured music drawn from popular American musical theater. The first selection — Chickering's — was "Soon It's Gonna Rain" from the Off Broadway musical The

Fantasticks. This was followed by "Soliloquy" from Carousel, sung with great feeling by Burden. Both performers sang "People Will Say We're In Love" from Oklahoma, then a poignant rendition by Chickering of "This Is My Beloved" from Kismet. The last two numbers, by George and Ira Gershwin, were written for Fred Astaire movies — Burden sang "Nice Work If You Can Get It from Danisel in Distress and the husband and wife duet concluded the concert with "Let's Call The Whole Thing Off" from Shall We Dance.
