

Kingsolver and a Small Wonder


Barbara Kingsolver spoke at BIG Arts on February 25 to a sold-out crowd of conservatives. Sanibel is a hot bed of conservatism, according to Kingsolver's defi-

nition. We want to conserve what we have. We value our heritage and history of Sanibel. We will fight to conserve rather than to use up the wonders of Sanibel. We do not want change and we do want safeguards to be sure we don't change. We don't want high-rises and high density. At least, that's our reputation, if not our reality.

Kingsolver's talk was sponsored by Sanibel Reads and the Center for Sustainability and Environmental Education. She spent most of the time talking about her own recent experiences with calamity, a severely broken leg, and comparing it to our recent disaster, Hurricane Charley. She said there are many lessons to learn from our disasters. First, we learn that we have to accept our fates and deal with them. Second. after a disaster, we need to learn the basics again. Third, we need patience as we work toward getting back to what we have always taken for granted - like having two working legs or a house with a roof. Fourth, we learn to appreciate our friends, especially those who understand what we have learned to understand. Fifth, we learn about ourselves - our strengths and


She concluded her speech with a discussion of how and why she wrote Small Wonder, the book the Sanibel Library chose as its Sanibel Reads book. She

wrote most of the essays around September 11, 2001 as an attempt to affirm life over death. She resented the way we were submitting to the worst of ourselves and how we were intimidated and frightened and she didn't want to be that way. She feels that it is our job in life to keep asking the hard questions, to hold tight to what things real-



Her speech was followed by a question and answer session where she told the audience that she is working on a screenplay of The Poisonwood Bible, an "enormous novel," and, with her family, she is writing a natural history of food.

Kingsolver did on Sanibel what she did in Small Wonder. She took personal events and ber reaction to them to make a statement about much broader issues. One treat was her lovely sense of humor and her self-deprecation. As one of the best known and respected American writers today, it is obvious that she takes her responsibility to her art, to her message and to her audience seriously, but she does it in person with the same ease as she does in her written work. 

At the turn of the century, the plume hunting industry in Florida nearly extirpated the huge populations of wading birds associated with the Everglades, including one of Florida's most identifiable and beloved bird species, the roseate spoonbill. By 1935, it was believed that the spoonbill breeding population had been reduced to only five nests on Bottle Key in Florida Bay. At that time, the National Audubon Society took on the task of protecting these birds and Robert Porter Allen, Audubon's first research director, began Audubon's 65-year tradition of studying Florida Bay in general and speenbills in particular.

Dr. Lorenz, a trained fisheries biologist, with a BS in Biology, a Masters in Zoology and a Ph.D. in Marine Biology, is the Director of the National Audubon Society's Tavernier Science Center. In his presentation, Dr. Lorenz pulls together Audubon's 65-year record on spoonbill nesting patterns with his personal experience in studying the fish on which spoonbills feed. During the development boom, seemingly unrelated events serially reduced the spoonbill's foraging habitats in domino-like fashion, resulting in a dramatic decline in spoonbill nesting success that continues today. Dr. Lorenz demonstrates how the destruction of wetlands for



urban and agricultural use have not only endangered spoonbills, but a myriad of other creatures and entire ecosystems. Like the canary in a coal mine, roseate spoonbills are letting us know that there is something drastically wrong with our environment and that continued runaway development will not only ruin our remaining wilderness areas but our lifestyles as well. Interwoven with the scientific endeavor, Dr. Lorenz chronicles the colorful history of Audubon science in Florida while also explaining how the indomitable appeal of the flame birds won the heart of a man who made a career of studying fish.




Island gopher tortoises


Charley and "Ding" Darling

Kevin Godsea, lead ranger for the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge spoke on February 24 about the effects of Hurricane Charley on the Refuge. 
have a very shallow root system) on cars, houses, and power lines; the trees also uprooted sewer and water lines. Facilities at the Refuge were relatively imharmed: roof repair is still needed on the Visitors' Center; the doors were blown off the maintenance shop and work was needed at Tarpon Bay.

The first question asked of Refuge volunteers and rangers is "What happened to the wildlife?" In terms of injuries, there were very few, although CROW did see some patients. "The lack of a storm surge was crucial for the terrestrial species," noted Godsea.

While Refuge personnel were preparing for the storm. they noted that there was not a lot of wildlife in evidence: the birds flew away or hunkered down in the mangroves. Two days after the hurricane, a bald eagle was spotted soaring over the beach at Tarpon Bay and they saw a few pelicans, but the pelicans were not feeding in their normal areas, Fortunately, Charley came in August, before the arrival of the migratory birds. If it had come in October, "there would have been a lot more migratory birds and it would have been much more disruptive," he noted.

Sharks left Pine Island Sound seven hours before Charley arrived; Mote Marine receivers in the Sound picked up readings from tagged sharks as they left the bay waters. On August 14, there were still no sharks in Pine

Island Sound; on August 15, they started to come back. The long-term effects on wildlife are still not known.

SCCF's Watershed Adventure to Mound Key

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's second Watershed Adventure of the season took off for Estero Bay's Mound Key on February 23. Combining onthe-water learning about the estuary with interesting destinations, the trips to Matlacha and Estero Bay have ventured slightly out of home waters. Dee Serage explained

that the Conservation Foundation is concerned with lands "on and around Sanibel and Captiva Islands — we are now in the 'around' part of the Conservation Foundation.

While there is still ongoing land acquisition, the Foundation has continued to expand its focus. To better study the factors that affect the estuaries, the Marine Lab was started. The Greater Charlotte Harbor watershed is the largest in the state of Florida, covering 4,000 sq. miles and including three major rivers — Peace, Myakka and Caloosahatchee — eight counties and eight smaller watershed basins. "We will go through three basins today, the tidal Caloosahatchee Basin, the Pine Island Sound basin and the Estero Bay basin." explained Serage.

Before 1881 the Caloosahatchee was not connected to Lake Okeechobee but numerous revisions of the natural water system began in the 1880s as land acquisitions led to demands to drain the water. "We are dealing today with the effects of those decisions."

Water quality in the estuary is very dependent on what comes down the Caloosahatchee, both too much water and too little. Rather than the historic slow and natural culture and drinking water." This year, as part of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP) work is starting on a reserve at the north end of the Caloosahatchee to hold fresh water.


Serage pointed out Bunche Beach, explaining that in 1996 the voters of Lee County agreed to use a percentage of property tax to acquire environmentally sensitive lands; Bunche Beach was purchased with those funds and it preserves a solid mangrove fringe.

Megan Tinsley from the Marine Lab took over as the boat headed into Estero Bay. The northern half of Estero Bay was designated as an aquatic preserve in 1966; the southern half was added in the 1980s. It is a small estuary fed by smaller creeks like Hendry, Mullock and the Imperial River. The watershed basin is 300 square miles and begins in the Corkscrew marsh.

Estero Bay consistently scores lower than other local bays in terms of water quality. From 1988 - 2003, Secchi levels (a measurement of water clarity) have been below average; this impacts seagrass beds, which need light to produce oxygen needed by fish and other animals.

Estero Bay has higher turbidity (sediments and particles in the water) than any other preserve. Sediments increase water temperature. Sediments also carry nutrients. Most of the Estero Bay tributaries carry water high in fertilizers and pesticides, and Tinsley showed aerials taken in 1990 and 1999, graphically demonstrating the rapidly urbanizing watershed. Building creates impervious surfaces, with the result that rainwater runs directly into the watershed without any ground filtering.


Pet waste is also a contributor. Sarasota County did a study and found that the county was generating 13 tons of pet waste every day. Runoff water picks it up and pet waste contributes to algae blooms.



who fortunately only sports this affectation in March, predicted this year's show would be "simply mah-vey". The rest of the club will be so glad when it's over.



When the Spanish arrived in Florida in 1513, the Calusa Indians dominated south Florida. Who were they and what happened to them? Find out at the CalusaFest and Symposium on Saturday, March 12 at the Collier County Museum. From 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. there will be exhibits and demonstrations on the grounds of the museum; from 11 a.m. - 4 p.m. there will be a minisymposium featuring five leading Calusa scholars. The day-long event is free and refreshments will be available. At 4 p.m.

there will be a reception and book signing, which is open to the public.

Exhibitor highlights: Calusa tool replication, Calusa re-enactors, making fire with a bow, using hot coals to burn out a bowl, ethnobotany and Florida Native American use of plants, and atlatl throwing, Replicator Dick Workman, archaeologist John Beriault and Robin Brown, author of Florida's First People and The Crafts of Florida's First People, will be onhand. as will

replicator.David Meo, whose replica Calusa tools can be seen in museums throughout the state. There will be Calusa artifacts and replicas from the Randell Research Center and from the Shell Mound Trail Tour of the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel. The Mound House will have information on an excavation beginning mid-March to create an exhibit allowing visitors to "walk into" a Calusa shell mound. Randell Research Center will have information on their Calusa Heritage Trail, a new self-guided tour of the Pineland site. The Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum will have information on their exhibit "Calusa: The Original Shell People." Also exhibiting will be the Craighead Archaeological Laboratory, Marco Island Historical Society, Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Calusa Nature Center, Calusa Land Trust, Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve.

The mini-symposium, Florida's Fierce People: Tracing the Calusa Indians from Dominance to Demise, will begin at 11 a.m. and there will be a Q&A at the end of each session. At 4 p.m., the public is invited to a reception and book-signing.



Anne Joffe shelling in Chile

Anne Joffe, owner of She Sells Sea Shells and chairperson of the Sanibel Shell Fair & Show, took time out of her busy pre-shell fair schedule to treat Shell Club members and guests to a slide show and talk on Tuesday evening, February 22. She spoke about her most recent vacation in Chili.

On Joffe's Chilean tour, which was geared towards the avid shellseeker, she and 15 others, including several people from Sanibel and the Fort Myers area, hoped to further pursue their life passion, shelling.

Joffe began her presentation with a map of Chile, and pointed out the areas she visited. Chile is a very long narrow country with extensive coastline, almost all of which the tour covered.

Beginning in Santiago, Joffe's group traveled to the northernmost waterfront Chilean shelling spot at Iquique, in the Norto Grande region, then did an about face, and traveled most of the length of the country down to coastal towns in the south. Finally, they visited two islands off the coast, again leaving from Santiago.

Joffe described Chile as a wealthy,

modern country, with cities that embrace European style.

She showed slides of the various hotels and cityscapes the group visited and also slides of Chile's mountains, lakes, and forests. Joffe was extremely conscious of the natural beauty of Chile and the many wildflowers.

Chile's climate and terrain are extreme, running from the lush fertile seaside of Puerto Montt and the mountainous beachless coastline of Isla Grande de Chiloe, near the center of the 2700-mile-long country, to the extreme conditions of the Atacama Desert in the north, and almost to Tierra del Fuego in the south.

Joffe featured slides of the Magellanic penguins of Isla Grande during the evening, and highlighted that area's unusual architectural styles. Not only did those islanders build hundreds of churches, all of which have shingles resembling scallop shells or fish scales; they also erected narrow waterfront cottages, built up on stilts, similar to Sanibel's own early fish shacks.

Joffe illustrated the commerce, industry, and agriculture of various regions,

showing slides of mussel banks, which feed all of south America, and salmon farms, which extend for miles along the coast, and have become a huge international business. She even showed a few pictures of inland farms and forests.

Chile's coastline is not its wealthiest area, and unlike the United States, real estate is not highly valued simply because it is waterfront. Along much of the extensive coast, the towns are small, the surrounding areas very rural. Thousands of Chilean residents and tourists spend entire summers camped right on the beach in primitive tents, camper vans, or other homemade camping arrangements, and according to Joffe, nobody seems to care. Although there are waterfront hotels, and tourist gift and shell shops, there are also stretches of empty beach that seem to go on for miles, and in most cases, access appears to be open to everyone.

In the north, where the desert meets the beach in a long line of sand dunes, Joffe's slides of the beach dwellers appear like a camp of nomadic gypsies just arrived at the oasis

And everywhere there are shells. Each stretch of beach, each section of rocky coastline has its own special finds, and according to Joffe, everything is free for the taking. Several places offered mountains of unusual species of mussel shells, and even the rare sunflower starfish could be found..

The group spent many days undergoing hazardous and painful rock climbing conditions over wet, slimy stones covered in barnacles and algae, because underneath almost every rock was a treasure from the deep.

When they had undergone almost more than they could bear, with group members

falling out of boats, and walking down miles of sandy mountainside, they discovered an actual shell dumping ground, where fisherman leave the waste of each day's catch, and mountains of shells could be chosen like candy in a candy store, with almost no work at all.

A four hour flight out over the Pacific brought the group to the Juan Fernandez islands, an archipelago of four major islands which are very remote, with only 550 residents, probably 1% of whom collect shells.

Joffe recommended the trip for any serious shellseekers hoping to totally immerse themselves in shelling. Her breezy and occasionally humorous style made the evening entertaining as well as educational.

Holistic Health Notebook: Kids and sugar

Consider these facts: the incidence of obesity is increasing rapidly, especially among children. The incidence of adult-onset diabetes is simultaneously increasing, particularly among children. Did you read that sentence thoroughly? I said, "adult-onset diabetes is increasing in

children." Type I diabetes is also on the rise. That is not good news.

According to a Consensus Report writthe American Diabetes Association, "If the incidence and prevalence of type 2 diabetes in children are increasing and if this increase cannot be reversed, our society will face major challenges. That is, the burden of diabetes and its complications will affect many more individuals than currently anticipated, and the cost of diabetes to our society will cause us to consume enormous resources. Also, many more Americans will be taking potent medications, which have attendant risks, for most of their lives.

We are, as a culture, getting heavier, and the increasing weight is leading to greater increases in both type 1 and type 2 diabetes in children.

The diabetes is bad enough. The prognosis is tough, including increased risk of cardiovascular disease, vascular disease, loss of visual acuity, and so on, but diabetes becomes a problem of co-morbidity, affecting the thyroid, adrenals, and other organ systems.

It is best to prevent diabetes from ever happening in the first place.

According to a press release by Nutrition 21, the Children's Hospital in Los Angeles will conduct the first doubleblind, randomized, placebo-controlled clinical trial to study the effects of chromium picolinate supplementation in overweight pediatric patients with poorlycontrolled type 1 diabetes. The protocol includes adding 600 mcg of chromium as picolinate to the daily diet of patients from 12 to 18 years of age, hoping to improve blood glucose and body weight.

I personally think this is a fine study, and badly needed in this population. More than 15 scientific studies already support the safety and role of chromium in improving insulin function and glucose metabolism in people with type 2 diabetes. However, we can't isolate nutrients from a healthy diet. Chromium cannot work without cofactors of vitamin B complex, for example.

And chromium alone, regardless of how effective it may be in helping normalize blood sugar or potentiating the effects of natural insulin, cannot significantly reduce body fat that is a natural consequence of poor dietary choices. How about starting with a really good diet, and adding the nutrients to help compensate for years of malnutrition?

If diabetes or other blood sugar disorders runs in your family, protect both yourself and your children by getting the processed sugars out of your diet, including lots of fresh vegetables and healthy proteins, and supplementing with the full spectrum of nutrients, including magnesium, zinc, and chromium, all three of which are important to the maintenance of blood sugar and the metabolization of sugars.

If you need help putting this type of diet into practice, talk to me and we'll work on it together. A healthy diet could be the most important gift you give to your family.

"Lost" is currently on display at Bank of the Islands, located on Sanibel and will be at the bank until the day of the auction March 14, 2005.



Twenty non-profit agencies with direct ties to the islands have received grant funding from the Community Foundation of Sanibel-Captiva.

Foundation Chairwoman Ginny Fleming announced the disbursement of \$84,300 during a cocktail mixer and awards ceremony held Feb. 23 at the Sanibel Community House. Donations ranged from the \$8,000 awarded to the Sanibel Community Association for a new air conditioning unit to the \$1,000 given to the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon

Society for a digital projector.

The sizable grant award was made possible largely due to the Sanctuary Golf Club, which raised \$43,750 during a golf tournament recently.

"This year, we're giving out more grants than ever before due to the generosity of the Sanctuary Golf Club," Fleming said.

Also of help was the Southwest Florida Community Foundation, which contributed \$50,000, she continued.

"Ginny was the first one to really react as a leader," Paul Flynn, foundation president



José Leal at Audubon

Dr. José H. Leal, executive director of the Bailey-Matthews Shell Museum, graciously agreed to pinch-hit for the February 24 Audubon presentation with schedule speaker Charles LeBuff was forced to cancel.

Leaf opened by noted that he would get the audience "away from a bird and vertebrate perspective" as he spoke about the "Seashells of Southwest Florida," a project of the museum which now includes 260 species.

Leal noted that "Sanibel as the perfect place for a shell museum - it is surrounded by multiple environments and habitats." The main focus for the museum is education and that is multidimensional, with more than 30 thematic exhibits. The museum also has a web site (www.shellmuseum.org) (with 700 pages) which is updated daily by Tima Yorgev; the web site gets 10 times more visitors than the museum.

The "Seashells of Southwest Florida" is a "bird field guide" to shells except you "can't say it's a field guide unless you can take your laptop to the beach," quipped. However, the museum has plans to publish the collection, like a Peterson guide. The project began "for the casual visitor to the island who wants to know the name of the shell... Not a single day goes by that someone doesn't walk in with something they found or a pic-ture of something they saw." He showed a picture of a quallog valve that someone brought in: it had a pearl, not very smooth but about a half-inch big.

Every shell is photographed from two or three different views with a Nikon D100 digital reflex camera and a 60 mm or 150 mm lens; tungsten lights were used for larger shells while Leal used a bellows he has had for 27 years for the small shells. A recent donation of a phototube and eyepiece for a Leica microscope gives the ability to photograph micromollusks.

Leal encouraged audience members to pick up a handful of sand and look at it with magnifying lens to find the micromollusks, shells up to 13 mm (1/2 inch). Volunteers say "it's addicting, sorting through them, very relaxing,"
"This area famous for wentel traps," he noted.
"Mollusk shells grow by accretion. The old shell never

goes away, it's always there, you have a record of growth." He showed a juvenile lace murex, which looks very different from the "lacy" adult shell: it is red and without the "lace." However, the tip of the adult is pink-ish red, which is the juvenile shell.

The mantle of the animal, the skin, makes the shell. The shell itself is dead and it is a combination of layers of calcium carbonate crystals and protein in an organic matrix. Specific regions on the mantle make each element and species can be identified by the protein in the shell. He added that shells in deep sea trenches - where the water is more acidic — have almost no calcium carbonate and as a result, they're soft. The color in shells comes from the protein; ultraviolet light fades shell color.

Mollusks can also mend their shells. Lip damage can be easily mended; cowries and bivalves can mend the entire shell. Most mollusks, however, cannot mend a break at the top of a long coil.

When asked if there has been a decrease in shells, he said there is "no scientific data to back that up," and added that there are a lot more people on the beach now. "I know people who are out there at 3:30 in the morning if there's a low tide. You wake up at 7 a.m. — that shell is already on someone's shelf in their living room." However, he acknowledged that there are species in the museum's collection that are now very difficult to find.

primarily because the impact of Hurricane Charley on Refuge vegetation was enormous. Much of the red mangrove canopy is gone. "We are just now into the nesting season. The rookery islands were hit hard and the canopy is gone. Pelicans, cormorants and great blue herons are nesting now; the egrets and spoonbills will begin in April and May." Without the protective canopy, the chicks are vulnerable to predators (someone reported seeing a crow carry off a great blue chick) and the eggs and chicks also have no shade to protect them from the sun. Pelicans, cormorants and great blues nest on top of the canopy.

while the snowy egrets nest in the mangrove. It is still unknown whether they will be able to nest here, or if they will have to go elsewhere.

Another concern is the secretive mangrove cuckoo, which needs large tracts of unfragmented mangrove and canopy. They have had more sightings this year than in years past, but that may just be because there is no canopy to hide them. It is not known whether they will be able to nest; on the other hand, will the downed vegetation mean

and CEO, said of Fleming's activities following Hurricane Charley. "She's a very caring person and she feels very deeply for the islands and their people.'

Not all of the foundation's activities have been a success, however. Fleming said the \$84,300 in awards was only a portion of the total requests for funding that had poured in — \$156,000 in total. Most

requests were in some way linked to Hurricane Charley, she said.

"So many people still need help with hurricane relief," she said, mentioning resorts such as South Seas and the Sundial that remain closed for repairs. "The single mom who waits tables that hasn't worked since the resorts were open, for example."

Community Foundation member Vern

Frankwich said the organization grew from a small group of dedicated individuals to the large entity that it is today.

"They're dedicated to making this become so beneficial to the island," he said. Among the recipients of grant awards are the J.N. "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society, Sanibel Community Church, CROW, and the Children's Center of the Islands.




that there are more insects to feed on?


Nesting birds have been monitored for some time, so there is a baseline, but previous data was collected by viewing only. Most likely, those counts are low because of the inability to see into the canopy. Scientists from the University of Florida were out at the Refuge two weeks ago, working with Biologist Kendra Willett to develop new methods of collecting data.

Alligator curve was hit hard and the canopy was completely destroyed. Including the Shell Mound Trail area, this

section had mangroves that were over 250 years old. There are mangrove seedlings in other areas of the Refuge but not here. Since the impoundment and building of Wildlife Drive, the water has become less saline and tidal flow may need to be restored to the area. Without restoration, this section — covering several hundred agencies - could turn into an open water system, which would have a serious impact on the Refuge overall. They are currently doing some hydrology studies of the area.

The Calusa summoned a force of 80 war canoes and at least 800 men in less than a day and met the Spanish with force.

The incident is important because of the insight it gives into the Calusa, who vanished from history in 1760. The Calusa had the organization and the resources to summon a considerable fighting force; they had already decided that they would resist the Spanish and they also shouted obscenities (in Spanish) at the Spaniards, meaning that they were familiar with the language.

As our boat neared Mound Key, Torrence directed the captain a little out of the way to point out the original entrance to Mound Key, a stately passage through mangrove islands that would have led to the impressive main canal. The two largest shell complexes in the region are at Mound Key and Pineland on Pine Island; both are over 400,000 cubic meters. The Wightman site on Sanibel was about 12,000 cubic meters; the site at Useppa

was about 14,000. Both Mound Key and Pineland were important Calusa centers.

The Spanish returned in 1567 and set up a fort at Mound Key, which lasted for a couple of years before the Spanish abandoned it. Fortunately for history, there are Spanish records that give a fair amount of insight into the Calusa culture and religion.

Their diet was primarily fish, along with shellfish, some mammals and birds, fruit and plants.

The "rivers were highways and the estuaries were their supermarkets, where they got the bulk of their subsistence." As the salinity varies, so do the shells available. Torrence noted that, just as we "target the resources in the supermarket," the Calusa "got into their canoes and targeted the 'isle' that had the resource they wanted." Barrier islands sites have higher salinity shells, while the back bay is lower salinity.

His point was to make an argument against viewing the mounds as primary garbage dumps, where the Calusa "ate and threw their garbage over their shoulder" and into their living area. Rather, the jumbled nature of the shells in the mounds seems to indicate that the shells were first

tossed as garbage in one location and then later moved for episodes of mound-building. In refuting what he calls the "sanitationally challenged Calusa" model, he emphatically argues that "they didn't live on their garbage,"


n't live on their garbage."

Torrence worked on Mound Key in 1994 with Sam Chapman, mapping, conducting some excavations and surface collecting. He paused where he believes the Spanish fort stood as the group made its way to the top of one of the two large mounds that dominate the site. Intrepid trekkers followed him down the mound, past some beautiful old gumbo limbo trees, to what is called the water court. The large canal that bisects the front of the island originally terminated in the water court but the open area is now host, to an old stand of black mangroves. The canopy has been trimmed a bit by Hurricane Charley but it is still a magical place.

After reboarding and heading north, the boat stopped of at Mound House in Fort Myers Beach, which sits atop a Calusa mound. Work on a "walk-in" shell mound exhibit is beginning this month at Mound House.

Mound House has an interesting history, including rum runners and a think tank responsible for the invention of frozen concentrate orange juice and fireresistant building materials, among others. Codirectors Torrence and his wife, Theresa Schober, are overseeing restoration of the house.

On April 23, as part of the Trail of the Lost Tribes celebration, there will be talks at Mound House as well as pontoon boat trips to Mound Key. For more information on April 23 events, call the Mound House at 765-0865.

Tappin' at BIG ARTS

My ears are still resonating with the rhythms of last Saturday's SRO concert of *Tap City* at BIG ARTS. Joy Schein once again has brought to this Island's audience cutting-edge tap dance entertainment, which left last week's audience both flabbergasted and smiling. Tap — once con-

sidered an endangered species or nostalgic kitsch by some — was proven to be alive, well and even thriving, thanks to two master tap dancers, devotees and teachers. Tony Waag and Brenda Bufalino and their latest endeavor *Tap City Tap City* came to Sanibel direct from NYC (where it will perform again later this spring at the famed Joyce Theater). This NYC Tap Festival Company featured dynamic performances by the two legendary tap masters Tony Waag and Brenda Bufalino with contemporary soloists, up and coming performers Kendrick Jones, Max Pollak and Karen Callaway Williams. And if

that weren't enough Tap City is backed by a trio of great jazz musicians Larry Ham (piano), Bernice Brooks (drums) and Lee Hudson (bass). The Village Voice stated that: "Tap City delighted some of the warmest dance crowds I've ever seen. These performances reflected racial, cultural, generations, physical and stylistic diversity that much of the dance world would do well to emulate. The show celebrates tap's history, its worldwide reach, and the influence on choreographic fancy of everything from post-modernism and social satire to classical music and Latin jazz."

The jazz trio opened with a cool version of "My Romance," featuring some of the hottest tap seen and heard at Schein Hall. Three improvisations introduced up and coming young artists: Max Pollak .performed "Body Percussion," lighting up the evening with a scintillating Afro Cuban choreographic hybrid, a sort of Rumba tap. Karen Callaway Williams improvised "Swing" showing off her mastery of her tap shoes as musical instruments as well as a fresh-faced delight in performing. Kendrick Jones blew the audience away with his improvisation "Swing". The

improvisation proved Jones to be an innovator, bridging the gap between two styles of dance: Broadway's show tap, which emphasis visual presentation, and hoofing or jazz style, which emphasizes the music rhythm. The result is awesome cool and hot at the same time, "Crazy Rhythm"

> brought out master dancer Tony Waag looking very straight and preppy in tux and homed rimmed glasses. In this number he blew us away with a blend of complete technical mastery and a relaxed easy style.

> As the evening's MC he punctuated his intricate rhythms with comments and jokes to the audience. Waag explained the goals for creating Tap City: to introduce the great variety of tap that is happening here and now, linking jazz to Latino and Afro Cuban and mixing it with whatever it takes for each dancer to express their authentic

selves. A tall order, but if last Saturday's performance is any example, one that is not only enjoyable but the key to keeping tap alive and viable for many generations of dancers and audiences alike.




Kendrick Jones, a spittire performer, attacked the surface of the stage, treating the rhythm of "On a Clear Day" as if it were something he was driven to both conquer and create. Man, oh man, can this dude dance, in a word WOW! Karen Williams appeared to shine with light and brightness in her delightful rendition of "On the Street Where You Live." You just know this girl loves to dance. Max Pollak's "Invitation" filled the Hall with complex driving, layered rhythms. It was as if rhythm consumed not only him but the entire audience, we were compelled to be completely engaged and absorbed by sound. Amazing is the only word available to describe this fireworks display of sound and rhythm.

They saved the best for last as Brenda Bufalino proved once again why she is considered by her peers to be "the greatest female tap dancer that ever lived." This consummate artist and teacher, has gone deep inside to find her real voice. It isn't just masterful technique; Bufalino has musicality that tells stories with her tap shoes. Her smoky singing voice can really torch a lyric as she did in her "Mingus Medley," a splendid tribute in story, song and dance to Charles Mingus. This dancer/singer is also a born story teller with a fine sense of humor, a fantastic musician whose instrument just happens to be her tap shoes.

Act II was a series of tributes starting with Bufalino in "Sweet Sue" a pure rhythm tap tribute to her teacher and mentor Honi Coles, Austrian born drummer, dancer Max Pollak took stage in "Rumba Tap" a dance number that inspires me to write the following adjectives to describe the piece: Afro Cuban sensual, hot, passionate, primitive and absolutely exciting. Kendrick Jones' performed a mesmerizing tribute to the late Gregory Hines in "A Capella." He laid down a tower of sound unlike anything I've ever heard before. A right-on, eccentric-styled dance tribute to Donald O'Connor's famed "Make 'Em Laugh" followed, by funny man Tony Waag. Karen Callaway gave an on-target, bright tribute to Ann Miller in "Shaking the Blues Away." The ensemble's tribute to the late Honi Coles and the Copasetics featured the famous "The New Low Down" and the Copasetics Chair Dance, which brought down the house. The surprise ending of this fantastic evening of tap dancing brought up on stage all the tap dancers sitting in the audience, including BIG ARTS tap teachers: Joy Schein, Vanessa Stocker and Lee Scholl in a full out, knock 'em dead, version of "Shim Sham Shimmy."

Tap City proved to be not only a wonderful evening of experimentation, improvisation and education, it also confirmed the fact that tap can be wildly entertaining. The ovation at the end of this exciting evening of dance really drove home the point — tap is alive and well and, thanks to Joy Schein, has found a fantastic following and home here on Samibel.

Tap City-Music and Dance At Schein Hall

On Saturday, February 26, Tony Waag's, Tap City, The sounds by slapping his hands on various parts of his New York City Tap Festival, drew a sellout crowd to Schein body. Distinct pitches were created depending upon Hall. Sponsored by The Ferguson Foundation and in part

by the State of Florida Department of State, Division of Cultural Affairs and the Florida Arts Council, as well as the National Endowment for the Arts, a gala evening of tap dance, vocal, body percussion and instrumental music was warmly received by the appreciative audience

Instrumental music was provided by pianist, Larry Ham, bassist, Lee Hudson and drummer, Bernice Brooks. As a mood-setting overture, the trio opened the show with a tasteful version of Rogers and Hart's, "My Romance." Pianist Ham's improvisation was well crafted and nice-

ly articulated with fine jazz movement. Acoustic bassist, Hudson did not overwhelm the trio's sound but tastefully played and supported the members with an "impliedtime" and contrapuntal approach, similar to the late bassist, Scott LaFaro. Drummer Brooks also played with sensitivity and tastefully added to the group's tonal color with just the right percussive touch.

Another and most unusual sound source was provided by dancer and vocalist, Max Pollak. While singing, what sounded like an African song, he created percussive

which body part he slapped. What was amazing was that

while singing, slapping and tap dancing, his sense of time and rhythm was so steady that he resembled a human metronome. He also performed an unusual version of, Bronislau Kaper's, "Invitation." The trio's arrangement was in a very brisk tempo in a meter of 6/8. Impressive was Pollak's dexterity in clapping and superimposing a 4/4 rhythm against the trio's 6/8 rhythm thus producing a complex polyrhythm. Pianist Ham's "Bill Evans" type of introspective interludes were also quite effective.

As a tribute to the late Ann Miller, vivacious dancer and vocalist Karen Callaway Williams performed Irving Berlin's, "Shaking The Blues Away." Couched in a moderate tempo, her pleasant voice and gorgeous stage presence added greatly to the number. Also, her version of Lerner and Loewe's, "On The Street Where You Live" was most impressive with her ballet type movements and tap dancing so one could hear the song's melody emanating from her taps.

Master of Ceremonies, dancer and vocalist Tony Waag danced and sang, "Crazy Rhythm," "Just In Time" and as

a tribute to the late dancer, Donald O'Conner, "Make Em Laugh." With the aid of a simple prop hat, his choreography and vocal rendition was most effective. His mobile facial expressions range from a sad/happy clown to a striking resemblance of Yankees' owner, George Steinbrener.

Introduced as, "The Red Hot Momma" of tap dance, Brenda Bufalino danced to three Charles Mingus' compositions, "Pithecanthropus Erectus," "Reincarnation Of A Lovebird," and "Free Cell Block F." Typical of the composer's compositions, frequent tempo changes and odd meters of 6/8 and 4/4 were masterly executed by the trio and Bufalino. She also danced and sang an uptempo version of, "Sweet Sue." Like a "hip" Ella Fitzgerald, she sang a chorus and then segued into a scat version displaying a good sense of rhythm and time.

Dancer Kendrick Jones II added his vocal efforts by effectively rapping to a stop-time version of Fields and McHugh's, "The New Low Down." The show's conclusion was a glorious sight to see and hear with so many happy people on stage, including Schein Hall's namesake, Joy Schein, as they tap danced intricate and well rehearsed steps. It was visually and musically a most professional production and was rewarded by thunderous

applause from a most appreciative audience.



MUSIC NOTES

The return of a master cellist

Thanks to the generosity of the Ferguson Foundation and BIG ARTS Angels, cellist, Laszlo Varga and pianist, Lise Frank presented a cello and piano recital at Schein Hall on Tuesday, February 22. Mr. Varga, who retired from an illustrious career as a performer serving

as Principal Cellist of the New York Philharmonic for eleven years, continues to exalt his mature musicianship and knowledge by performing with chamber ensembles, as a cello soloist and master teacher, Lise Frank holds degrees in piano performance from prestigious institutions and has recently returned to the United States from Colombia, South America where she


appeared as a piano soloist, teacher and chamber ensemble musician.

While a student at Juilliard in the late 1950s, I still remember hearing Laszlo Varga performing with the New York Philharmonic and also have a vivid remembrance of Mr. Varga's premier performance of Prokofiev's, Cello Concerto. It was with great reverence and awe that I saw and heard this distinguished artist once again. For over fifty years, his name and reputation have been synonymous with greatness.

The recital began with "Toccata" by the great Italian Baroque organist and composer, Girolamo Frescobaldi. The slowness of tempo and minor tonality

allowed Varga to display warm and expressive cello passages. This mood however, quickly segued into a fast, contrapuntal texture highlighting the technical prowess of both cellist and pianists. The second work, "Ciaccona" or "Chacone" by the Italian Baroque com-

poser, Tomaso Vitali, allowed Varga to exhibit his mature and sensitive phrasing. I am not positive but I feel that the work was originally written for violin and continuo as Tomasco Vitali was a violinist. The cellist's exquisite use of proper embellishments and vibrato together with the great balance between piano and cello was a pleasure to hear.

The last work before intermission was the very romantic, Fantasy Pieces, Opus 73, by Robert Schumann, All movements, including the catchy triplet figures between the cello and piano in the second movement, were played with

assurance and sensibility.

Throughout the concert, Varga's demeanor showed a love of performing which he subtly communicated to the audience. After intermission, he announced that his instrument is a French cello made in 1846. It certainly was well suited for the next work by French composer, Claude Debussy. His Sonata pour violoncello et piano brought forth the cello's mesmenizing, liquid movement framed in Debussy's chromatic impressionism. Surprisingly, the cello's pizzicato passages were strikingly similar to passages in Leonard Bernstein's. West Side Story.

Adagio con variazioni by Ottorino Respighi sounded modal in tonality with melodies that were not only romantic but given the harmonic background impressionistic. Varga was most adept and facile in covering the composer's wide range of themes, frequent double stops and rapid jumps from the upper register theme to the lower register arpeggios.

Intermezzo from Goyescas by Enrique Granados, a Spanish planist and composer, was inspired by the famous painter, Gova. He composed this Spanish-flavored work with typical adornments and embellishments performed most convincingly by both artists. The last of the program was Requiebros by Gaspar Cassado. The composer was a cellist and contemporary of the famed cellist, Pablo Casals. Before playing. Varga surprised the audience as he got into the spirit of the piece by shouting the Spanish expression, "ole!"

It was an emotional experience for me to once again hear an artist that I revered during my impressionable school days. Perhaps at eighty years of age, Varga's sound is not as vibrant and powerful as I once had heard forty seven years ago, but his musicianship, phrasing, intonation and technique remain as masterful as ever.

Jean Grastorf at the Sanibel-Captiva Art League

BIG ARTS is about to host the 29th Annual Juried Art Exhibit of the Sanibel-Captiva Art League. This year's guest juror is noted watercolorist Jean Grastorf, a member of the National Watercolor Society, the American Watercolor Society, and the Florida Watercolor Society, to name just a few of her achievements. She is the author of several books on that medium, including the upcoming Layering Light: Pouring Transparent Washes, to be published this year by North Light press. While on the island, Grastorf will be teaching two watercolor workshops.

In addition to selecting 80 paintings out of 138 entries for the show, Grastorf also addressed the artists, giving an overview of what she looks for in a successful work of art. Beginning with rhythm and movement, cool and warm

palettes, she selected pieces from the show to illustrate these qualities.
"Warm or cool?" she quizzed the audi-

"Warm or cool?" she quizzed the audience, while holding up a small land-scape. She pointed out the rhythmic quality of the line of trees, and how the unified color scheme worked to make the painting successful.

Moving to a portrait of a young woman, Grastorf explained how the use of color and light drew the eye along the subject's blue shirt and up to her face.

The use of shape is another element important to a good painting. "What intrigues me is how a group of flowers becomes a shape," she said, of a picture of a house with a front garden. "She didn't try to do tiny little blossoms— and all the shapes relate to each other."

Moving on to a square canvas filled with numerous figure drawings and sketches, Grastorf congratulated the artist on her

skill. "To take so many different things and place them in one format— you've done that extremely well," she said.

The next piece, a colored pencil drawing of a woman in a kimono, contemplating a nautilus shell, garnered first place. Pointing out that it was drawn on tinted paper, Grastorf encouraged the other artists to try beginning with a colored, rather than pure white surface.

"This one is a little bit different," she said, bring out an abstract collage. "I have a weakness for abstract. Not too many get submitted, so when I see one that works, I get really excited."

Grastorf first placed the picture right side up, then turned it on its side to demonstrate how looking at an image from a different angle gives the artist an insight into the images strengths and weaknesses.

Composition was the next subject, as illustrated by a pastel drawing of potted


geraniums. "Always be aware of that underlying skeleton, the bare bones," Grastorf said.

A painting of palm fronds served to illustrate light, use of transparent water-color, and presentation. She pointed out the use of light and shadow, as rendered in classic watercolor technique, contained in a plain mat and frame.

"A simple mat in a simple frame — its beautiful. This is a very successful presentation," she said.

Grastorf held up a small rice-paper collage of three boats that incorporated texture, color and a flattened perspective to bring out the use of shape in an image's composition.

Last, a large still life of a teapot and flowers demonstrated the use of a full value range, or the range of light to dark. "It's the full value range that makes for an extremely strong painting," she said.
