Township's board adopts \$42M budget; \$32M to go before Berkeley Heights voters

BERKELEY HEIGHTS — The Board of Education adopted a \$41,435,533 budget for 2006-07 on March 27.

The unanimous vote came during the board's meeting at Columbia Middle School. This is a 9.4 increase over 2005-06's revised budget. The Berkeley Heights tax levy would provide \$32,330,646, or 78 percent of the budget; this is the amount on which residents will vote on April 18.

The remainder of the revenues would come from state aid and tuition from non-resident students who attend township public schools, as well as from miscellaneous sources and a free balance of \$405,855, bringing the general fund revenue total to \$39,131,506. Debt service and debt service aid account for the remaining \$2,304,027. As is legally required, the appropri-

ations would match the revenues at \$41,435,533, generating a balanced budget.

The budget includes a district-wide curricular revision for K-8 physical education and orchestra, as well as technology upgrades and resources, staff professional development, a five-year facilities plan and the implementation of parts of the strategic plan the board adopted last year in consultation with teachers, administrators, students and the public.

The board has also budgeted two additional elementary teachers, one additional elementary guidance counselor and a part-time reading specialist.

"We're asking for an elementary guidance counselor to meet the educational and emotional needs of the children," Assistant Superintendent of Schools Matthew Jennings said.

Elementary Spanish would be added to the curriculum.

"Latin is being added for grade six," Dr. Jennings said, referring to Columbia Middle School. "There's money for music equipment, allocated funds for sixth grade science and sixth grade language arts."

The board has also allocated funds for three additional academic teachers at Governor Livingston High School. In addition, said Dr. Jennings, the budget would cover curricular revisions for mathematics, social studies, family and consumer sciences, art, technology/industrial arts, English, world languages, business education and music. There would also be funds for three new one-semester courses — interior decorating and design, sports literature and information processing/keyboarding. The budget would also provide for music and science equipment.

The district's PERS (Public Employee Retirement System) contribution will increase to \$44,458.

"This is for non-certificated staff — custodians, secretaries, etc.," interim school business administrator/board secretary Michael Kistner explained.

Mr. Kistner added that \$72,549 would be appropriated for transportation, \$123,352 for energy costs, \$137,111 for a capital outlay and \$199,914 for special education tuition, for a total of \$577,414.

There are "two extra children" whom the district expects to enroll in an out-of-district private school special education program, Mr. Kistner said. The district pays approximately \$200,000 for special education in "private schools we contract with."

Under instruction, regular programs — defined as direct classroom costs, such as salaries for teacher and aides, and textbooks and other supplies — would account for \$14,562,798, with special education instruction costs totaling

\$2,636,363, bilingual education, \$48,888, school co-curricular activities, \$301,060, and school-sponsored athletics, \$791,995. The total allocation for instruction would be \$18,341,071 — 44 percent of the budget.

"The thing we're proud of is that a good portion of the budget goes directly to instruction," Superintendent Judith Rattner said.

"Next year will be the fifth year of flat state aid. We know that, when state aid stays the same, that's a cut. But we're happy to receive that and glad that it hasn't been cut in real terms," Mr. Kistner said.

Of the \$24 million bonded for school renovations after a December referendum, "part...has been spent, on architects' and attorneys' fees," he said.

Work on Morris corridor in full swing, officials say

SUMMIT — City Administrator Christopher Cotter said at the Tuesday, April 4, Common Council meeting that stations are in place at a number of intersections along the Morris Avenue corridor, a Union County project.

"Motorists will see traffic signaling at new locations, especially near Overlook Hospital," he said. Officials have said they hope the reconstructed roadway alleviates traffic congestion at one of the most problematic intersections in the city, where Glenside Avenue meets Morris Avenue at the foot of a hill.

In other Morris Avenue-related news, Councilman Michael Vernotico introduced an ordinance to restrict the speed limit on the Morris Avenue bridge between Kent Place Boule-

vard and Springfield Avenue to 25 miles per hour. A hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, April 18.

According to the councilman, the state Department of Transportation has authorized the sign and speed limit. Speed limits along Morris Avenue vary from 25 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour, extending from River Road to Springfield Avenue near Broad Street, which then connects with Route 24.

The Morris Avenue bridge, which crosses over NJ Transit lines between Springfield Avenue and Kent Place Boulevard, has been the subject of discussion at previous council meetings. Another railroad bridge that crosses Springfield Avenue near City Hall also needs replacing. Mr. Cotter said he understands the cost savings and convenience to the state by working on both bridges at the

same time, but that would cause major problems for residents and commuters alike. In addition, he said, the condition of the Morris Avenue bridge is "far worse" than the other bridge.

The corridor project consists of the replacement of traffic signals at eight intersections from River Road to Orchard Street and new signal installations at three locations: Morris/Mountain, Morris/Glenside and Glenside/Baltusrol. The project includes the milling and resurfacing of the entire length of Morris Avenue in Summit.

Once completed, the coordinated system will be capable of moving traffic along the corridor in a smooth, efficient manner and provide traffic safety measures at key intersections along Morris Avenue, according to county officials.

'Forest' will grow at SHS gallery

SUMMIT — Flora and fauna will transform the Summit High School art gallery into an enchanted forest.

"When a Tree Falls in Summit," an installation by artists Borsi Rasin and Kenny Komer, will have its official opening on Thursday, April 20.

The two New York City artists have assembled the makings for a woodland retreat: trees, trails, twigs, rocks, forest creatures and more. The artists had designed a similar project for a Chelsea art gallery, with a forest/garden, 30-foot trees and a gazebo.

Dr. Harry Wilson, director of the Visual Arts Department at the high school, said he took his students to Chelsea this fall, where they saw a show in a semi-industrial area.

"The building was gutted and it was really a neat thing, creating a forest in that space," he said. "It's that old first impression thing." He added, "It's all about the environment and how it affects you. It brings the outside inside. I worked with Michael Tcheyan to spearhead the project, and it all kind of came together."

With the project at Summit High School, students will participate in setting up the display. Plastic tarps will protect the floor when earth and sod are brought in.

Lending another artistic element, a ceramics class at the Visual Arts Center of New Jersey is participating, with youngsters sculpting squirrels, chipmunks and birds. There may even be a live pheasant at the

opening ceremonies.

Dr. Wilson said of the high school art gallery, which hosts shows all year, "It speaks highly of the community. Students can appreciate art and respect it." He added,

"We've become a nation that doesn't make much," so the opportunity to take a class in sculpture or ceramics is an especially valuable outlet.

All of this ties in with an initiative of the PTA, the instructor said, that has developed a courtyard for a retreat between the guidance offices and art department.

The artists recently talked to Dr. Wilson, along with key supporters Nancy Brown, Roy and Marie Cohen, Debbie Schwartzman, Brian Sunshine and Michael and Isa Tcheyan.

Mr. Rasin and Mr. Komer have said, "The town of Summit is like a blank canvas to us. People here seem genuinely interested in culture and public art. We are getting the red carpet treatment." Mr. Rasin was born in Ukraine and Mr. Komer in Brooklyn.

The two artists studied at Cooper Union, an art school in Lower Manhattan "that is extremely hard to get into and extremely selective about the students it accepts," they said. Dr. Wilson said, "Cooper Union is a very fine art school and you can only go there on scholarship. We have sent several students."

Both visiting artists say they are not concerned that the project will be vandalized. "We encourage students to carve their initials in the trees," they said.

Temporary art: alive, well on public properties in city

SUMMIT — The Mayor's Partnership for the Arts continues to find ways to bring temporary art to Summit.

Proposals for two new art works came before Common Council at the Tuesday, April 4, meeting.

A resolution to install "Dorothy was Here" by Elizabeth McCue at the Recreation Center on Morris Avenue was adopted. The giant pair of red shoes, made of carpet, wood, wire and foam, is valued at \$3,500.

Another piece, a sign that reads "The Most Important Things Are

Not Things," is by Ester Partegas. The neon sculpture is valued at \$12,000 and will be installed outside City Hall.

According to art committee minutes included in the council packet, several other initiatives are being considered. Briant Park is a possible location for temporary art, once refurbishing work there has been completed by Union County. The barricades that will be installed along the Summit Avenue railroad bridge near the parking garage could become "aesthetically pleasing" with art displays. Also in the works is a "Summit Arts" brochure.

Visitors: Watch for detour signs when at Overlook

SUMMIT — Temporary patient and visitor traffic patterns have been developed at Overlook Hospital due to construction of a new outpatient Neuroscience Center, expanded Cancer Center and a new entrance to the hospital. The main hospital and Center for Community Health entrances on the entry level — the hospital's fifth floor — will be closed from April 4 until approximately Oct. 1. "As a community hospital, we want to be sure residents and patients in the area know about our ongoing enhancements to the facility and understand the long-term goal of our short-term inconveniences," said Alan Lieber, chief operating officer at Overlook Hospital.

Traumatic Brain Injury Program. The Cancer Center's 5,400-square-foot addition will house the New Jersey Brain Tumor Program, gynecological and thoracic oncology programs, and the new Cancer Research Center. These renovations will bring all of Overlook's cancer programs together under one roof. The hospital lobby will be expanded 5,000 square feet, with a two-story glass atrium that will include a new main entrance, enlarged patient waiting room, reception area, community room with a resource center, information desk, indoor and outdoor dining area, gift shop, flower shop and a valet station. The hospital's goal is to offer a more soothing and calmer environment to its visitors, officials said.

During the reconstruction, those using the front entrances will be directed to temporary points of entrance to the hospital and Mr. Lieber said care has been taken to ensure inconvenience is kept to a minimum.

Additionally, the improvement of traffic flow will be developed outside the hospital, consisting of new traffic patterns, wider roadways for cars to pull up under a new covered drop-off and pick-up area, and a traffic circle to help cars navigate the campus.

Some of the steps taken include construction of a temporary covered front entrance accessible from the walkway near the garage; designation of a patient drop-off and pick-up area at the emergency department; increased parking attendant presence to assist with traffic flow; increased use of concierges at entrances to assist with patient directions; new internal signs to direct patients and visitors; and special parking for chemotherapy, endoscopy and same-day surgery patients.

New pedestrian crosswalks will also be implemented to enable patients and visitors to cross the road and enter Overlook's new Centennial Life Garden.

The new outpatient Neuroscience Center will be home to the new memory disorders program; stroke, epilepsy, neuromuscular and motor disorder programs; and the Mild

The hospital is also in the process of building its second Medical Arts building, which will consist of new programs ranging from women's health services and pain management to private physicians' office space.

"This relatively short period of inconvenience is necessary for Overlook Hospital to construct facilities that will meet the needs of our patients and visitors over the next several decades," said Mr. Lieber.

except two percent, the interim school business administrator explained. This year, that amounts to \$405,000. "Last year, the districts really had to dig into their pockets," the schools official said. Districts will not have to give back nearly as much this year.

"The state is giving us \$703,894, and they will continue to do that over 20 years. That's their obligation," Mr. Kistner said, referring to the fact that the board arranged debt service aid on a 20-year bond for the district.

The tax calculations for the calendar year 2006 are based on "two different school years," he said. The school operates July to June. The Township Committee operates January to December." The calendar year tax burden represents half the taxes from one school year and half from the next, Mr. Kistner said. As an average assessed value for a township home is \$299,000, the school tax is approximately \$1.65 per \$100 and is elevated due to the additional cost taxpayers have in-

"One kid could trigger a dollar amount change," he added, noting, "There are less ratables in the area to support the tax levy." External concerns will also shape the district's fiscal considerations throughout the 2006-07 school year. School board member John Sincaglia cautioned that the financial picture could easily change dramatically.

"The school budget will be on the ballot at all polling stations on Tuesday, April 18, from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Also on the ballot will be board members Geoffrey Lisk and Doug Reinstein, who are seeking three-year terms without opposition.

Evan O'Neill Kane, 81, physicist and pioneer in physics at Bell Labs

Evan O'Neill Kane, Ph.D., a physicist and pioneer in establishing the fundamental understanding of solid state physics the basis of modern electronics, died on Thursday, March 23, 2006, at Overlook Hospital in Summit due to complications secondary to myeloproliferative disease and myelodysplasia. He was 81. A memorial service was held on Saturday, April 1, at Christ Church in Summit. Arrangements were by the Bradley-Brough Funeral Home, also in Summit.

Dr. Kane was born on Dec. 23, 1924, in Kane, Pa., a town founded by his great-grandfather. He was raised there and subsequently in Daytona Beach, Fla.

Dr. Kane hailed from a long line of pioneering Kanes. His great-great-uncle, Elisha Kent Kane, was both a famous Arctic explorer and renowned author in the 1850s. His great-grandfather, Thomas Leiper Kane, had a significant impact on American history, not only as a Civil War General but also by assisting with the Underground Railroad and by intervening to prevent the Buchanan administration from going to war with the Mormons in Salt Lake City. His grandfather, also named Evan O'Neill Kane, was a maverick physician so determined to establish the effectiveness of local anesthesia that he surgically removed his own appendix, thereby becoming the first person ever to perform an operation on himself.

En route to a career in physics, Dr. Kane served in the Army during World War II, graduated from Princeton in 1948 and was married to Anne Bassler in 1950. They resided in New Providence for most of their married life, where they raised three children.

After receiving his Ph.D. in physics from Cornell University in 1953, Dr. Kane joined the General Electric Research Laboratory in Schenectady, N.Y., where he conducted theoretical physics studies of the fundamental electronic properties of semiconductors, the materials that are now widely used in numerous electronic devices. A prolific contributor to scientific journals, he published a seminal paper in 1957 on a technique to calculate and characterize basic electronic properties

of solids. This classic, lasting contribution, referred to as the k-p method for band structure calculations, continues to be widely used by theoretical and experimental solid state research scientists to explain fundamental phenomena in solids. This publication continues to be referred to in scientific literature and textbooks almost 50 years after its discovery. He joined the Theoretical Physics Department in Bell Laboratories in Murray Hill in 1961, where he continued to make contributions to the understanding of the electronic properties of semiconductors.

In addition to distinction as a physicist, Dr. Kane was known by family and friends for his vital involvement and devotion as father, grandfather, long distance runner, linguist, naturalist, canoeist and caregiver for young children. All who knew him well were aware that despite a quiet unassuming demeanor, he brought extraordinary intensity to his engagement with the people and endeavors that he loved.

Not merely a casual jogger, he became ranked second in the country in the 50-and-over marathon category. He was also a self-taught student of French and Italian, and fluent in both. His most recent field of study was molecular cell biology. In the area of childcare, while he began by volunteering at the Summit Day Care and in his church nursery, he went on to devote his post-retirement years to the caregiving of two of his grandchildren. Finding a passion for this important work, throughout his late 60s and 70s he then ran a daycare center in his home.

Dr. Kane is survived by his wife of 55 years, Anne Bassler Kane; a sister, Sister Aletheia Kane, a Carmelite nun in Covington, La.; a half-sister, Michelle Farnam of Marlton, Md.; three children, Ruth Kane-Levit of Amherst, Mass., Daniel Kane of Florham Park and Martha Savage of Wellington, New Zealand; and six grandchildren.

Hella Bailin, 90, prominent artist

Hella Bailin, one of New Jersey's most prominent and gifted artists, died on April 1, 2006. She was 90. No memorial service is scheduled, but a retrospective exhibit of her artwork will be planned as a celebration of her life and work. Funeral arrangements were by the Craft Givnish Funeral Home in Abington, Pa.

Born Hella Loewenstein in Dusseldorf, Germany on Oct. 17, 1915, she arrived in the U.S. as a German refugee from World War II. She married Jack Bailin and resided in Elizabeth until 1954 when the couple moved to Union with their two children. After the death of her husband in 1989, she continued to live in Union until this past winter when she moved to Willow Grove, Pa., where she died peacefully in her new home.

In Germany, she attended the Berlin Art Academy and the Reiman School of Art from 1933 to 1936. After coming to the United States, she continued her art education at the Newark School of Fine and Industrial Art under the tutelage of several renowned artists, among whom were John R. Grabach, L. Matzal and Stanley Turnbull.

Mrs. Bailin trained in many art media, but is best known for her pen and ink sketches, watercolor, casein and oil paintings for which she had received much acclaim. She was the recipient of more than 75 national and regional awards from such organizations as the American Watercolor Society, the New Jersey Watercolor Society, Allied Artists of America and the National Society of Painters in Casein and Acrylic.

Her works have been shown in major New Jersey museums and the State Museum of Fine Arts. They have been exhibited at the National Academy of Design in New York, and in many galleries, venues and traveling shows throughout the United States and abroad. Her watercolors were purchased for the 2003 dedication of the Kean Hall Conference Center of Kean University, and her paintings hang in many public and private collections around the state and country. Mrs. Bailin's works have also been published in six volumes of "Best in Watercolor."

She traveled the world extensively

ly and drew artistic inspiration from the many diverse landscapes and cultures she visited. Mrs. Bailin's paintings portray the everyday life of working people and convey the many moods and expressions of the human struggle. In some of her works one can feel the hardship and suffering from lingering painful memories as a Holocaust survivor. Other pieces record the beauty of the world she saw. Her painting style was distinctive and unique, and her technique masterful. For almost 50 years, she worked diligently to instruct many art students, children and adults, in her Union home and at local art centers in Millburn, South Orange, Cranford, Newark, Summit, Westfield and Hillside. She also taught at Kean College in Union, where she was honored as an artist and Holocaust survivor, and she traveled giving lectures, demonstrations and slide shows.

As a foremost expressionist painter, Mrs. Bailin is listed in "Who's Who in American Art" and was recently honored as a member of the New Jersey Watercolor Society. She has also been a long-time member of such organizations as the American Watercolor Society, the National Association of Women Artists, Audubon Artists, Allied Artists of America and Associated Artists of New Jersey, among others.

Mrs. Bailin is survived by her two children, Michael and Barbara Bailin; four grandchildren; and one great-grand daughter.

The State We're In

Wildlife management lands are N.J.'s best kept secret

"Take time to smell the roses." We've all heard this bit of ancient wisdom. In New Jersey — famous for less pleasant smells and honking car horns — it may seem trite. But we would all do well to take advantage of our state's wildlife management areas for a little de-stressing.

As of January 2006, New Jersey's 121 wildlife management areas totaled more than 44 percent of our state-owned preserved lands. They're a diverse network of almost 305,000 acres spread across 19 counties.

It's one of the largest such networks in the Northeast United States, which is a remarkable accomplishment, given New Jersey's relatively small land area.

The state's first wildlife management area was established in 1932 in Walpack, Sussex County. Back then, land purchases were funded solely through hunting and fishing license fees. With the start of the Green Acres program in the 1960s, the public at-large gained a stake in the system.

As the funding evolved, so did the wildlife management areas' mission. Designed primarily as hunting and fishing grounds, they fill a variety

of important roles today — from providing wildlife habitat and protecting drinking water supplies to providing us with a place to get outdoors.

Though not usually improved, or as "flashy" as our state parks, wildlife management areas are home to outstanding recreational opportunities such as hiking, fishing, birding, wildlife viewing and photography, cross country skiing and (in designated areas) mountain biking.

A 2001 survey by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service found that 806,000 people fished in New Jersey and more than 2.3 million took part in some other wildlife-oriented recreational activity.

But even with increasing demand for recreation, land availability is decreasing. New Jersey loses roughly 45 square miles of wildlife habitat to development every year. That's 28,800 acres every year, or approximately 79 acres per day!

Preserving and enhancing New Jersey's important and unique wildlife habitats are an equally important part of the wildlife management areas mission. After all, what is a quality of life issue for us can be life and death for our state's wildlife. Per square mile, no other state has greater wildlife diversity than New

Jersey, which hosts more than 400 fish, 325 bird, 90 mammal and 79 reptile and amphibian species.

Stop by Wildcat Ridge Wildlife Management Area in Morris County to photograph migrating hawks against the majestic background of the Highlands. Trout Unlimited and Ramsey Outdoor Stores have partnered with the state to build fishing sites in the Flatbrook-Roy and Pequest wildlife management areas accessible to those with disabilities.

Visit a New Jersey wildlife management area and "smell the roses" this spring. Just pull off a road like Route 31 into the state's Amwell Lake Wildlife Management Area. Watch the setting sun paint the surface of the lake in brilliant color. Listen to the early sounds of spring peepers in that annual spring mating ritual. This is New Jersey!



Indeed, this was a much more competitive game than when Oak Knoll played Holy Family last season.

The following afternoon matched the Royals against Brearley, the defending Union County champion. Rego, who took over the head coaching reins late during the 2004 season, is a teacher at Elizabeth High School. He's a man with a more pronounced background in baseball, a sport Rego coached at Kean University. He'd also been a pretty good player who extended his college career to the semi-pro level.

The Oak Knoll softball team is off to a good start and there's a general belief things will only get better. Yet no matter what happens, Coach Day is already proud: "Every day, we've been a little better than we were the day before," he said.




