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County budget increase to be 'modest' Freeholder Board sees only a 3.9 percent increase in taxes

The county Freeholder Board passed its \$488.9 million budget, calling for \$302.5 million to be raised in taxes, an increase of \$11.3 million, or a 3.9 percent increase from last year's spending plan.

Cranford, Summit, Westfield and Scotch Plains will see increases of more than a million dollars in taxes but, for the average homeowner, the increase is considerably more modest.

The county will end up collecting a total of \$30.7 million from city homeowners in 2012, more than any other municipality in Union County.

For example, in Cranford, the average homeowner with property assessed at \$181,600 will see an increase of \$124, while Summit will pay the highest tax increase of \$381 for the average homeowner with property assessed at \$410,000.

But, the county tax is just one portion of taxpayers' three-part bill, which also includes municipal and school tax. When all three are added together, taxpayers will have an accurate accounting of what their



tax bill will look like for 2012.

The board faced a \$36 million budget deficit when they began putting the spending plan together. From the beginning, officials admitted there was a likelihood that layoffs would have to take place in order to

balance the loss of \$9.2 million in revenues and increases that were almost \$26 million.

Some of the major drivers of the \$36 million deficit included state-mandated costs, contractual union salaries, pensions and health insurance, which alone increased an alarming \$17 million compared to last year. Health benefits for employees alone skyrocketed \$11 million since last year, said Union County Manager Al Faella.

Also contributing to the problem, Faella said, was a prolonged slump in the real estate market. This resulted in ratables plunging from \$78 billion to \$69 billion.

Fueling the firestorm, he said, was the reduction real estate values, which showed a 25 percent spike in tax appeals.

One of the first things the county did while working on the proposed budget was to require every department head cut 5 percent from their 2011 operating budget. Next, the county initiated a program of workforce reductions, including a proposal to lay off 280 employees.

However, that number changed by the

time the budget was adopted because several unions came back to the bargaining table in an effort to save fellow employees' jobs.

According to Communications Director Sebastian D'Elia, 148 employees were either retired, left voluntarily or were laid off, while 111 employees, the majority from Runnels Hospital, avoided the layoff until Aug. 31, when the county wraps up privatization of certain operations at this facility.

D'Elia said 26 jobs at Runnels were saved for at least another year through refinancing debt.

In April, the Freeholder Board approved a \$1.9 million, one-year contract with the Pennsylvania company Genesis ElderCare Rehabilitation Services, which will take control of occupational, physical and speech therapy at the Berkeley Heights hospital.

Other private companies are expected to take control of housekeeping and dietary operations at the facility, but it is unknown when that will occur.

"The jewelry is very unique. It's stuff you can't find in a store," she said. "We saw a bracelet made from guitar strings, which was very interesting."



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Red light cameras are suspended ... for now

Even though the red light program is suspended for now, drivers with a heavy foot can still be ticketed for zipping through a red light and fined \$85 retroactively.

Last week, when the state suspended the controversial red light camera program in order to ensure the timing of yellow signals are calibrated correctly, drivers in 85 municipalities throughout the state breathed a collective sigh of relief. Especially the ones who have been caught running a red light and had to pay the \$85 fine involved.

The New Jersey Department of Transportation has to verify that each of the 85 towns in the state, including four towns in Union County, have surveyed the actual speed 85 percent of motorists travel through any given intersection, regardless the posted speed.

For 63 of the 85 cameras in 21 towns, that speed had not been determined before municipalities received the go ahead from the Department of Transportation to install the red light cameras. The other 22 cameras have been calibrated and are in compliance.

Under national standards, yellow lights are supposed to stay on one second for every 10 miles per hour or 2.5 seconds when the speed limit is 25 mph. Now the state also wants local towns to study the speed vehicles approach an intersection before determining how long a yellow light is on.

Nationwide, motorists running red lights are responsible for about 2 percent of all fatal accidents or 676 deaths a year, according to the Federal Highway Administration.

In 2008, New Jersey created the five-year pilot program that gave the green light for 25 municipalities to install the red light cameras that many traffic experts claim reduce accidents at dangerous intersections where other measures have proved ineffective.

Local police in the five towns in the county already implementing the program say the red light cameras make busy intersections safer by deterring motorists from running lights and hitting pedestrians or other vehicles. They point to either their own statistics or one by the Insurance Institute of Highway Safety that estimates red light cameras saved 159 lives in 14 cities in the United States between 2004 and 2008.

Union, Linden, Rahway, Springfield and, as of last month, Roselle Park are the only towns in the county approved to participate in the program, although many are on the waiting list.

Roselle Park had their one camera turned on in May after spending several

years wrangling with the company that installs and operates the equipment.

Officials in Union and Linden are warning motorists that just because the New Jersey Department of Transportation suspended this program temporarily does not mean the cameras are turned off.

"Oh, they're running all right," said Union Police Director Dan Zieser, explaining township police can still continue to collect data on violators and retain the information until the state approves their calibration data and the ban is lifted.

When this occurs, a municipality can issue tickets for the time frame the program was suspended, which Zieser said he fully intends to do.

"The thing is, we have a 90-day statute of limitations with this program to issue a ticket, which means as soon as the state tells us our yellow lights are right on target, we can retroactively issue tickets for the period the cameras were suspended," the police director explained.

Zieser also is certain those tickets will be issued because they knew about the calibration problem and began testing their four red light cameras more than a week before the suspension went into effect.

"We are right where we should be with the timing of our yellow light," Zieser confirmed, noting the data his traffic officers gathered regarding the

calibration will be sent to the state immediately.

Municipalities have until Aug. 1 to turn in the data, which then will be

reviewed by the DOT and the ban lifted for those towns in compliance.

Union began participating in the pro-

out unused sections of Runnels to bring in additional revenues.

Two social worker positions were saved through labor negotiations with the Communications Worker 1080 union, representing social, case and clerical workers. D'Elia said union workers voluntarily donated 600 furlough days in order to reduce layoffs in their department.

The county also rescinded seven layoffs in social services prior to the June 1 deadline.

Three other unions voluntarily agreed to take three unpaid workdays, which were later matched by county department heads, Freeholder Board and county manager.

Even with other cuts, such as saving \$1.4 million by making changes to the prescription drug plan, deferring salary increases for 632 exclusionary employees at a savings of \$800,000 and instituting a hiring freeze for non-essential positions, these measures barely put a dent in the \$36

million deficit, said D'Elia.

At the final reading of the budget, Freeholder Dan Sullivan did not mince words about the dire state of the county finances. He mentioned the county is looking into privatizing its 900-inmate jail, which has an annual budget of \$55 million.

In April, when he presented the executive budget, the county manager pointed out that, four years ago, the jail was receiving \$4 million in revenue for keeping state prisoners in the county facility, but that revenue plunged to \$1 last year.

This year, he added, the county does not expect to receive more than \$500,000 in jail revenue, which Faella said "was a major problem."

The county is also going forward with a feasibility study to see whether privatizing the operation of the Watchung Stables, which is \$600,000 in the red, is a worthwhile venture.

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New ordinance would take the 'foul' out of the 'fowl'

CLARK — Some residents are crying "fowl" about a proposed ordinance allowing homeowners to raise chickens.

Back in March, when council members discussed whether or not to prohibit chickens and other farm animals in the township, the consensus was that township attorney Joseph Triarsi would look into current laws and zoning regulations and then draft an ordinance banning these animals.

In early June, everything changed. After more discussion, council decided it might be a better idea to draft an ordinance allowing residents to raise chickens and other domestic fowl, but not other farm animals, such as roosters.

The ordinance would also prohibit residents from raising chickens for commercial sale or selling any eggs produced.

Residents voiced their opinion on local township blogs, with most divided on the issue.

One woman, who left Brooklyn for the quiet suburban life in Clark, felt noise from the Parkway, landscaping equipment and gunshots at the firing range were enough without chickens being added to the mix.

Others, though, such as Heather Warszawa, felt that homeowners had the right to have whatever animals they wanted on their own property. She also pointed out that these farm animals provide great pest control because they eat mosquitoes and deter rodents.


Dexter Gelfand, a former resident who now resides in California, said there was no need to "reinvent the wheel." He pointed out that roosters are the noise-makers, not chickens.

Another longtime resident mentioned that Madison Hill Road previously was filled with farms and chicken coops and he personally would like to see some come back.

One woman, who did not use her name, had very strong feelings about residents raising chickens because she felt chicken feed attracted rodents and chicken excrement can have a overwhelming ammonia odor.

Another woman, who said she lived next to a neighbor who was raising 10 to 12 chickens five years ago, said it brought out raccoons and hawks. She also felt that odor was a problem, despite what some said.

The issue of whether residents raising chickens could be a health hazard did

come up because of the potential of rodents invading the area where the fowl are being raised, but Clark Health Officer Nancy Raymond said she has not had that experience.

"We already have people with chickens in the township and, although I have had complaints about odors and chickens running at large, none of this was ever confirmed by me," Raymond said, adding that she investigated every complaint and only found clean coops and no odor present.

Raymond surveyed surrounding towns in the county and, of the nine responding, five had ordinances prohibiting chickens. Although neighboring Cranford allows chickens, however, a property owner must have five acres to raise chickens.

It was reported in another media outlet that Raymond had a problem with an ordinance banning chickens, but she said that is incorrect.

"I've had no major issues with chickens in this community and, in fact, only two complaints over the years," she added.

Not every town is against residents raising chickens, though. In Maplewood, which is in Essex County, the governing

body approved a 12-month pilot program officials created to see how chicken-raising would work in the suburbs.

Prior to the pilot program, Maplewood did not allow raising of chickens, but last year, the governing body decided to allow as many as 15 households to participate in the program.

"This was a no harm, no foul," said Mayor Vic De Luca. "If people want to do this, we enabled them to do this under some very strict guidelines."

One of the guidelines was that residents desiring to raise chickens obtain permission from their neighbors. The hardest challenge for those interested was not getting the nod from neighbors, but rather finding chickens to buy.

Maplewood Health Officer Robert D. Roe said last week that he would be paying close attention to the three residents who opted into the program.

"I will continue to inspect on a monthly basis," the health officer said, adding that, so far, he has not found any health violations or unsanitary conditions.

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Linden budget doesn't require layoffs; is less than expected

LINDEN — The City Council last week approved a \$95.6 million budget that preserves municipal services, did not require layoffs and is almost half a million dollars lower than last year's spending plan.

The 2012 city budget included increases due to state-mandated costs, negotiated union wage increases, health insurance increases and mandatory obligations such as debt service and utility expenses. Despite these increases, the budget still came in \$429,702 less than the 2011 budget.

Taxpayers will see an annual increase of \$75.84 or \$6.32 a month for the average homeowner with property assessed at

\$138,000. This amount only represents the city portion of a property owner's tax bill. The three-part tax bill also includes the school and county portions, which are added together to reflect the total tax impact for 2012.

In a turnaround that surprised the mayor and several other other City Council members, the 2012 budget got the nod in a narrow 6 to 5 vote June 19.

Just a few short days prior to last week's meeting, it appeared that, when the second reading came around, the spending plan produced by the Personnel and Finance Committee would be rejected. But the plan to reject the budget fell flat when 5th Ward Councilwoman Rhashonna Cosby-Hurling

and 6th Ward Councilman Robert Sadowski voted for the spending plan.

Last week, 2nd Ward Councilman Rich Koziol was adamant about not voting for the budget and maintained that stance, along with 1st Ward Councilman Chris Kolibas, 3rd Ward Councilman Peter Brown and 8th Ward Councilwoman Michele Yamakaitis. But 10th Ward Councilman Adam Kucynski, who just took his seat on council in January and who was expected to approve the spending plan, opted to vote against it.

Derek Armstead, 4th Ward Councilman and chairman of the Personnel and Finance Committee, said Tuesday that the narrow passage of the budget did not come as a surprise to him at all.

"I wasn't surprised because it was a good budget, the best we could do in this economy and with the expenses we had to deal with," he said. "We managed to minimize the tax increase and not have any layoffs, so that is a major plus."

While he did attribute the majority of those voting against the city spending plan as "political posturing and grandstanding," he stressed that he felt this did not apply to Kucynski.

"I don't think he had full knowledge of the budget and couldn't during his first year on council," Armstead said, adding that he believes the new member of council was "very honest and sincere about his reasons

gram as of Jan. 2 after a one-month grace period where motorists received warning notices. Zieser estimates that, after the state and court get their cut, the township will realize \$1.2 million in revenue.

The program has been a money maker, not only for local municipalities but also the two Arizona companies that install, lease and operate the systems.

American Traffic Solutions and Red Flex are not only responsible for the equipment and operation, but also reviewing the data sent by towns and determining what actually is a violation or not.

Zieser explained that, while this data is sent back to the municipality for examination by a township police officer for verification prior to a ticket actually being issued, ATS has the technical savvy to spot violators even his police officers would not be able to detect.

"They are the experts in this area. They weed out things, for instance, like someone coming to a stop a few feet into the intersection, which is not a violation, as opposed to people who just go right through the light seconds after it turns red," Zieser explained.

The entire process, from when a town forwards the data to ATS or Red Flex, the police director said, usually takes several weeks. That explains why motorists often receive a violation notice weeks after the actual infraction took place, the police director said.

Zieser also believes any the perceived problems with the red light cameras are not in Union County but centered in Newark, whose red light cameras are overseen by Red Flex, not ATS.

"Our cameras are calibrated and operating the way they should," Zieser said, noting the township pays \$19,000 a month to lease the red light camera equipment from ATS. This is nothing compared to what it would cost if the company opted to take 10 percent of all the tickets issued.

"We have a good deal with the way things are," he said.

Another area where the red light cameras came in handy was in accident investigation. Zieser said, when an accident occurs in a red light camera intersection, drivers will often say they were doing one thing but sometimes they are wrong and film from the red light camera can prove it.

"Those cameras are the best witness we can have," said the police director.

Zieser also felt that calibrating the cameras to allow for the "actual speed" 85 percent of drivers travel is laughable.

"This is a joke. What are they trying to do, reward speeders for not

following the law?" he asked.

Over in Linden, where the city has five cameras located at intersections that have had numerous fatalities, Mayor Rich Gerbounka, a retired police officer, was not mincing any words about the red light program or speeders.

"What happened is some lawyer representing a violator read the law and found the part that said you have to test for the speed 85 percent of drivers are actually going and he made a big thing out of it," the mayor said, adding, "Does that make sense? He is just looking for a loophole and he found it."

Gerbounka said the ATS, the city traffic division and municipal engineer met after being notified that the timing of the yellow light would need to be certified. After that, the traffic division took over, he added.

"The NJDOT directive was discussed and a plan to document the certification at our intersections was formulated and will be completed shortly," said Linden Police Department Traffic Commander Sgt. Michael Babulski.

The traffic commander also pointed out that, since the city began participating in the red light program in 2010,

"We have taken great strides to ensure the integrity of the officers administering it."

"We have confirmed all aspects of our hardware and software related to our program. Our officers have been trained and given specific guidelines on the administration and integrity necessary to maintain the public trust," added Babulski.

Currently, the Linden Police Department is in the process of reviewing violations that occurred during in May, but the NJDOT advised they not review any that occurred from June 19 on, until they receive certification that their yellow light calibration is on target.

"I have total confidence that we will be fully certified prior to the date required by the NJDOT, which is Aug. 1," the commander said.

The mayor agreed not only with his traffic commander, but also with Zieser about retroactively ticketing violators who go through red lights during the suspension period.

"The law gives us three months and we will go back and ticket any violators," Gerbounka said, adding the city of Linden "is not going to make it any easier for drivers to violate the law."

"The entire premise of the cameras was to raise awareness," he added.

"The intersections where we have the red light cameras have an extremely high rate of death and injuries from motor vehicle accidents. The red light cameras have reduced accidents and have changed driver behavior, including mine," Gerbounka said.

The mayor explained that motorists are "trying to beat the light" at these intersections, which is a dangerous risk.

"They are making right turns at a high rate of speed, without even attempting to slow down, let alone stop," he added, but mentioned that it is not a city police department policy to issue summonses to people who come to a "slow roll" when making a right turn on red.

The red light cameras, Gerbounka said, have made a difference.

"There has been a reduction in T-bone accidents, which cause the most serious injuries," the mayor said, but added, "All you have to do is obey the traffic laws and you won't get a ticket and Linden will have safer streets."

In the meantime, questions of whether red light cameras violate a motorist's right to privacy continue to surface, especially from violators.

Both Zieser and Gerbounka agreed that this bears little weight because there is advanced warning clearly posted 100 feet before a intersection.

for turning down the budget."

Armstead said there is a "block" of council members that vote the same, but that did not hold true this time.

As for Koziol's comments that more could be cut from the budget, Armstead felt every council member could have participated in the budget process.

"Anyone on council who felt the budget was too high should have put their ideas for cuts on the table," he said, mentioning that he would have been receptive to any suggestions that would reduce spending.

Mayor Rich Gerbounka said he was very shocked the budget was approved, considering how much objection was expressed when

the spending plan was introduced in May and again last week in an article in *Local-Source*.

"Some of the council members who I expected would turn down this budget voted for it," the mayor said, adding that two members, Cosby-Hurling and Sadowski, said it was too late in the process to start working on this year and preferred getting an early start on the 2013 spending plan.

Council President Jim Moore, Gerbounka said, is going to select a council member to be in charge of this pre-planning.

"This person will look at all the numbers and begin to get all our ducks in order," the mayor said. "This way, we will know if there will be furloughs next year in order

to put together a budget that works."

Gerbounka predicted that, in 2013, the city spending plan will look much better because the city will have additional revenues coming in that were not in place this year.

For one, he said, Spectra Energy will be putting a new gas line through, which should bring in "a sizable revenue of about \$1 million."

At the former General Motors plant, the mayor expects Legacy Square to finally begin taking off after a legal snafu brought on by ShopRite in Aviation Plaza opposing the redevelopment project.

Also on the front burner will be a project involving an entire city block around the

train station that the city owns. The mayor said the city is interviewing developers now to see who can put up high-density apartments and condominiums for young professionals.

"That will be the spark that ignites the explosion of development around the train station," Gerbounka said, mentioning that, because of the transit system adjacent to this development, he expects more businesses will want to be involved in this venture to reap the expected profits.

Rich Koziol, 2nd Ward Councilman, did not return calls by presstime.

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Officers sworn in as Summit police undergo reorganization

SUMMIT — The times, they are a-changing at the Summit Police Department. Retirements, promotions and a tweaked table of organization have signalled a new chapter in the department.

Police Chief Robert Weck noted the officers who filled the department's top three slots this time last year are now gone. The department has hired two new officers and promoted nine existing members.

"You get that domino effect when people leave," he explained.

The changes began last year when police Chief Robert Lucid retired after a long career with the department and took a job as director of public safety for Drew University. Deputy Chief Paul Kelley retired shortly thereafter. Weck said he understands Kelley is now be working a government job in Homeland Security. Capt. John Dougherty also retired and is now working security for Trinitas Hospital.

City Administrator Chris Cotter said all three former officers are collecting their state pensions, for which they were eligible for some time before retiring.

Weck said he could not say whether New Jersey law allowing public service employees to collect their pension, while working a private sector job may have contributed to the string of recent retirements.

"Some individuals retire and go fishing and others like to keep working," Weck said. "It depends on the individual."

The Police Department has since been restructured to utilize three lieutenants rather than four and two captains instead of one deputy chief. The department had no captains prior to Dougherty being promoted. The restructuring was designed to provide broader supervision and new assignments, such as the community policing unit without increasing costs. The change did not alter the overall number of officers employed by the department.

"The salary was structured in a way so there was no net increase overall," Cotter said.

City officials indicated there was even some cash savings associated with the retirements and restructuring, but no specific figures were available by press time.

The most recent promotions have been that of Lt. Andrew Bartolotti to the rank of Capt. and Officer Elizabeth Rice to the rank of detective. Rice is the Summit Police Department's first female detective. Since joining the department in 2006, Rice has worked numerous different assignments and has been honored for making several notable arrests.

Councilman Patrick Hurley, who serves as public safety chairman, said these changes to the department have brought some corresponding changes to policing strategies.

Hurley said Weck has worked to pro-

mote "community policing," with a heavier emphasis on police visibility and availability, including foot patrols in the downtown.

The response from residents has been positive, Hurley said.

"The feedback we've gotten from residents is good because they like seeing the

foot patrols out and about in the downtown," Hurley said. "The merchants like it as well."

Hurley said the city's new officers are eager to get "out and about."

"It's a great opportunity for them to make their careers in the community."

Council President Richard Madden said

he is pleased with the department's performance.

"I think the Police Department is being very well run by the chief and I support his actions," Madden said.

Red-light cameras: good and bad

Motorists who are opposed to the state's controversial, five-year pilot program, which has placed cameras at 85 intersections throughout the state to capture drivers running red lights, have just been given another reason to be angry. Last week the state suspended the use of the cameras at 63 of the 85 sites, saying the towns had not properly calibrated the length of the amber portion of the traffic light. In short, motorists might unfairly have been given an \$85 ticket when they did not run a red light.

This news caused many drivers, including a Warren County state senator and Bergen County assembly woman, to call for an immediate shutdown of the entire program forever. That seems an over-reaction, but it does suggest that possibly the five-year pilot program, signed into law January 2008, may have been too long for some people. It also indicates a statewide debate is coming when the pilot program ends.

The most recent controversy involves a clause in the original law which states the amber lights at intersections must be calibrated not to the normal one second for every 10 miles per hour of the speed limit, but instead they should be calibrated one second for every 10 miles per hour of the speed of at least 85 percent of the drivers passing through that intersection, which probably is a little faster than the posted speed limit. This quirk in the law came to light when a motorist contested their ticket and the state realized that most towns had not conducted the required traffic studies and subsequent recalibration. That's all being done now during this current shutdown.

Red-light cameras involve so many conflicting points of view that it's no wonder they have become a hot-button issue.

People who run red lights are a menace to other motorists and pedestrians, many people say, and the practice should be stopped. And red-light cameras seem to be effective in achieving this goal. In Newark, where 19 intersections have cameras, crashes have dropped considerably. According to the state Department of Transportation, in the first year the cameras were installed in that city, at Broad Street and Raymond Boulevard crashes decreased by 74 percent and at Broad and Market streets crashes were down 25 percent. And a poll by the National Coalition for Safer Roads states that of 600 New Jersey registered voters questioned, 77 percent favored the cameras and 69 percent said they did so because they made the roads safer.

But we hear from other motorists who say the cameras are too unforgiving, and that drivers are being issued tickets unfairly when a traffic officer would never have issued them a ticket. And still others are saying that towns are installing the cameras not to promote safety but to gain the fines. We can believe municipalities might take such steps because the money to be realized is substantial—towns such as Newark and Jersey City are receiving about \$1 million per year from the fines—but we are uncertain what is the extent of any municipal greed.

A public debate on the cameras is in order when all data is examined at the end of the pilot program. For now, the cameras should be reinstated after being properly calibrated and the final months of the program should be allowed to continue. And during that debate, we hope those who propose an elimination of the cameras will also put forth their solution as to how we can improve safety at dangerous intersections as effectively as do the cameras.

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Defining terms

The Trenton establishment was throwing political definitions at Union Assemblyman Joe Cryan with the spin of a R.A. Dickey Knuckleball. After a brief respite from some nasty infighting with his parties' power establishment, Cryan and a group of supporters were up at the plate again last week.

The skirmish started with a letter from Cryan and eight fellow Democratic Assembly people threatening to withhold their vote for the state budget due June 30, unless there was a delay in the expected approval of a higher education merger of Rutgers and the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Rutgers Camden with Rowan University. The predicted firestorm from the letter actually happened. The merger is a pet project of South Jersey political powerbroker George Norcross, who has the support of Democratic bosses and Gov. Chris Christie.

Cryan had crossed swords last year with the group, the result being he lost a bid for assembly speaker and his own position as majority leader, ending up in Trenton parlance a "backbencher," when Sheila Oliver took over the speakership.

By week's end, the definitions of Cryan were spinning. The term the "Cryan 9" had some life until two short-term allies from the Bergen County delegation bailed out reducing his number to seven. The seven

Republican Assemblywoman Caroline Casgrande from Monmouth chimed in, "It's clear the Corzine Democrats never actually left Trenton." That's one of the troubles with defining terms. A few years ago, before his downfall, a "Corzine Democrat" may have been seen as positive reference.

Nick Acocella, the loveable editor of Politifax, defines Cryan as "the leader of the Democratic wing of the Democratic Party." That refers to the alliance between Christie and the Camden and Essex power groups that has left Cryan and his band the odd players out in the Trenton power game. Michael Aaron, the dean of the Trenton Press Corps, defined Cryan and supporters as "renegade democrats."

Cryan had his own definition. He said,

"Our decision was based on principle. The realities don't change, there is not enough information available for anyone to be able to vote yes on the merger proposal." Missing in Cryan's position is the question of whether there is enough courage to vote against the combined might of Norcross and Christie.

One of the problems with frisky definitions is to see if they actually have some sticking power. Only the most inside of insiders has more than a passing recollection of past down-to-the-wire budge deliberations. Usually, legislators vote, governors wield their powerful line item veto pen, legislators complain and everybody moves on.

For Cryan, the more long-term bad news may have come from *LocalSource* reporter Cheryl Hehl. Her interview with 80-year-old Sheriff Ralph Froehlich revealed he is considering yet another three-year term.

Insiders have speculated that Froehlich's narrow win last time where he lost Linden and Elizabeth in the primary may have opened the door for a "Cryan for Sheriff" candidacy. As the undersheriff, Cryan has long been considered the likely successor. Still, Hehl's description of Froehlich as "friendly to a fault" may have just given Cryan a definition he finds more suitable to utilize.

There's a lot to talk about

Looks like it's time to check out what is going on and let readers in on those more recent IRS returns I have been squirming away for just the right moment. Stay tuned in the coming weeks because the heat could really turn up again on this one.

Meanwhile, I found it interesting that some county officials seem to think I'm out to get them because they are Democrats.

Let's get something straight: if the Republicans were running things I would be watching them just as closely and writing about everything they do, right or wrong. But the truth is, the Republicans are not in control, the Democrats are and that makes them the receiver of the media heat.

Which is not to say there is a need for a county police department. The jury is still out on that one. I think there is duplication here and that, my friends, is not something us taxpayers can afford.

I was surprised Sheriff Ralph Froehlich suggested back in 1991 that a study be done to see if there was any duplication of serv-

ices between the county police and his department. Too bad it fell on deaf ears. Now, to be fair, that was before the Democrats had complete control of the freeholder board and county government. But, when I interviewed this dedicated professional, I was pleased to hear he still believes this study should be done. Good for him.

Froehlich's position is an elected one and although he has been supported by the Democrats the last 34 years, he does speak his mind even if his opinion differs from those in his political party. Not sure how the Democratic powers that be feel about that, but it was refreshing.

With Bergen County being the only other county in the state supporting both a Sheriff's office and county police department, it begs the question whether there is a genuine need for a county police department. Since the Sheriff's department is mandated by the state, why can't they assume the duties of the county police?

Looking at things strictly from a financial standpoint, if the county could save some of the \$6.4 million they spend on county police by eliminating the county police budget, it would go a long way towards satisfying the debt they are wrestling with every year. But, on the other hand, there are duties the county police provide that are invaluable to the public safety of residents living in this area, especially when it comes to terrorism. The real question is, can the sheriff's department assume those duties without it costing a mint?

There is no doubt a study is warranted at this point in time. Froehlich said he believes such a study could be done in house, but I don't think that is such a good idea. In-house studies are notoriously one-sided and with an all Democratic freeholder board, I would be very concerned this wouldn't provide an accurate picture of the situation.

Although a study would cost taxpayer dollars, it's not like the county hasn't spent money on studies in the past. Last year they spent close to \$20,000 to find out if it's worth putting a new ice skating facility at the defunct golf club in Clark. This issue is certainly more important than that. Bergen county spent over a half million for a similar report, but I'm sure it could be done for less.

But, there is absolutely no sense in doing any kind of a study, in-house or otherwise, if the freeholders are not on board with the idea of cutting costs in this area. I would think if the Sheriff's office could assume some of the more critical duties the county police are doing, then it is incumbent upon the freeholder board to give this very serious consideration.

We are going through difficult economic times and with the possible loss of close

to 300 jobs at the county level in order to meet the budget, it's time to bite the bullet and start making some hard choices. I mean, isn't that what the freeholders are there to do besides smiling for all those photos we see them in all the time?

A good start would be to disband the Union County Alliance and use that money for this study. Brilliant idea, huh? In fact, that \$290,000 might be enough to pay for the study. Wonder why no one thought of that one.

On to Linden. For the record, elected officials need to seriously consider changing their form of government. It is crystal

clear the Wildwood Act form of government is archaic and not working. I think some serious consideration has to be given to a form of government that allows the entire governing body to participate in drafting an annual spending plan. Not a committee of four.

I know this may not sit well with some folks, but in towns where the finance officer puts together the budget and the entire governing body goes over it line by line, it actually works. That way everyone gets a say and suggestions for cuts can be brought up, debated and decided on by all, not just a select few. Plus, it would eliminate all the controversy, animosity

This could radically change things as far as ward representation, but it would go far towards resolving the ongoing issues that have crippled this municipality when it comes to just about any decision on the table. It's also time the city considers hiring a full time administrator. The majority of towns in this county and others couldn't do without an administrator and Linden is no different. In fact, if anyone needs someone to run things, it's this town.

It's time to set aside egos and start doing what elected officials should be doing: making decisions that are in the best

interest of residents. After all, they are paying the tab and deserve more than they have been getting. By changing the form of government to one that allows input from all elected officials, it would go a long way to bridging the cavernous gap that exists.

I'm not sure the Faulkner Act form of government is the way to go, though. All forms of government should be investigated to see what fits the city's needs at this juncture. It's clear a change is desperately needed, and the choice has to solve the problems that continue to surface. Unless a change occurs soon, expect to see the same old problems continue to fester and erupt for years to come.

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

The play's the thing for critic who reads his own creation

Criticizing a theater critic's play is not the easiest thing to do — by another critic, of course.

It's quite different, however, and rather fascinating, particularly if the play is exceptionally good and the playwright is Peter Filichia, who writes for the *Newark Star-Ledger*.

The man, who has admittedly reviewed more than 9,000 plays in his lifetime in New Jersey, appeared by way of the American Theater Group, the newest professional theater company, in residence at the still-being completed Hamilton Stage for the Performing Arts in Rahway.

His stage creation, "Adam's Gifts," a updated variation on the theme of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," had an impressive reading Saturday evening at the Hamilton theater. And the audience loved every minute of it.

Prior to the performance, however, visitors to the large and promising cultural facility were given a lengthy tour by the house manager, Karin Napier. While one can hear an echo in some of the rehearsal rooms, the dressing rooms and large and small music stages and auditoriums, the finishing touches are just around the corner. Throughout a full year, Hamilton Stage will offer more than 100 performances by the principal artistic affiliate, the American Theater Group; the artistic engagement partner, Nai-Ni Theater Company; ballets with a twist and StageDog Theater Company. It also was pointed out that it was built by the city of Rahway Redevelopment Agency and that it is being operated "under the governance of the Union County Performing Arts Center, a 501(C)3 non-profit arts organization with a volunteer board of directors. Planning and management for the Hamilton Stage is provided by Front of House Services."

Before the stage reading of "Adam's Gifts," local dignitaries appeared in front of the audience to discuss the changes and growing culture of Rahway. After the read-

ing, Filichia made himself available to talk about his career and his reason for writing a play of this nature. He mentioned that, throughout the years, during the Christmas holidays, he had attended so many different performances of "A Christmas Carol" that he felt he would like to create a different version using a similar theme.

And so, three years later, a large audience in Rahway was able to witness the fruits of his accomplishments.

Tightly and emotionally directed by the theater's co-founder, Joseph Mancuso, five actors, with scripts in hand, sit up on that stage and present an enthusiastic reading of a well-written play. Shelly De Luca-Caravello sits at a table reading the stage directions

and prompting the actors. Jim Brochu starkly performs the role of Pront, a selfish businessman, whose only joy in life is to make and have money. He never even took the time for an education and cannot read or write.

Pront has already fired his right-hand man, Jason, well-performed by David Schmittou, then rehires him when he discovers that Jason, and his lovely wife, Lisa, beautifully played by Stacie Lents, have a young son, Adam, portrayed by Ethan Haberfield, an exceptionally talented young boy who performs the role of a child, crippled with a terminal disease. Adam, an avid reader of classical novels, despite his bouts with exhaustion, actually offers to teach

Pront how to read and write — and to become a real human being with feelings of laughter and sorrow.

And in the meantime, there is The Ghost, convincingly played by Maureen Silliman. Basically, she appears to be Pront's subconscious — showing him what a disaster his selfishness can cause — and that there are more important aspects to life than money.

"Adam's Gifts" is a fine piece of work and Filichia is to be congratulated. He may not have the character of Ebenezer Scrooge to contend with, but he has the marvelous cast. All he needs now are a full fledged set, a curtain, costumes, a left and right stage and an appreciative audience.

Oh. And a critic or two.

Royal roses are not just for Anglophiles anymore

buying a rose. He is wrong; I am much more selective than that. However, there are times when only a rose will do, and the Diamond Jubilee is one of those times. Besides, I was walking through the garden center, minding my own business, when one of David Austin's Jubilee Celebration roses almost reached out and grabbed me. I had no choice but to grab it first.

Jubilee Celebration was actually created in 2002 to mark the queen's 50th anniversary on the throne; it is in the garden centers this year to help rose lovers like me celebrate the Diamond Jubilee. It is a beautiful shrub with glossy, dark-

green foliage and salmon-pink blooms with touches of yellow. Each of the flowers on the plant I bought shows several shades of salmon. Jubilee Celebration, which can mature into a shrub that is 4 feet tall and wide, has a pronounced fruity fragrance. It looks to be an eminently worthy garden rose, even without the aristocratic connection.

The garden at our summer cottage is also home to another great royal rose, Queen Elizabeth, a floribunda bred by the American Dr. Walter Lammerts, and introduced in 1954, just two years after

My grandparents' house was like a small English island in the middle of a vast American sea. They went back and forth to regularly to visit English relatives who, in turn, sent gifts of impenetrable, black fruitcakes every Christmas.

A biscuit tin bearing the likenesses of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth sat on the cookbook shelf, the complete works of Robert Browning had pride of place in the living room, and a recording of Winston Churchill's wartime speeches, read by the man himself, was played frequently. I never asked my grandmother, but I am sure that wherever they were on the day of

Queen Elizabeth II's coronation, they participated in the festivities via radio or television.

Now the queen's Diamond Jubilee has taken place, marking her 60th anniversary on the throne. Many American Anglophiles have found ways to mark the occasion. I did it by buying a rose.

My husband will tell you that, if I could, I would mark every occasion, from April Fools Day to National Pickle Week, by

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Queen Elizabeth's coronation. Most sources agree that the rose is named in honor of the current queen, but at least one gives the distinction to Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother. The plant is truly regal — statuesque with big, full, pink blooms. Mine can easily reach 6 feet when it is happy, which is most of the time. The thorns are few, and the leaves are glossy and almost leathery. If Queen Elizabeth has a flaw, it is the flowers' light fragrance. However the plant is beautiful and, in my occasionally tended garden, a very strong grower.

Queen Elizabeth — the sovereign — is well known for her ability to stand for hours in all kinds of weather; her namesake rose has equal stamina. Over the last few years mine has survived a couple of hard central New York winters without protection and soldiered on through periods of drought as well. It does not get black spot disease during sticky summers. When I am on vacation I try to douse it with soapy dishwater every few days to keep bugs off the leaves, but the plant shrugs off most pests without my help. The long-stemmed flowers are also excellent for cutting. Every serious rose grower should have Queen Elizabeth in the garden.

Peter Beales, an English rose authority and breeder, introduced The Queen's Jubilee Rose at the recent 2012 Chelsea Flower Show. The result of 10 years of breeding effort, the sturdy rose is too new to be available here. It was officially presented to the queen when she made her annual visit to the Chelsea show, and features peach-flushed, white petals clustered into double flowers that are described in one article as "goblet-shaped." As befits a celebratory rose, it is also fragrant.

The Beales firm's exhibit at the Chelsea show won a gold medal and also featured two other new, non-royal introductions. I hope that The Queen's Jubilee Rose will make its U.S. debut soon. It will look lovely in my garden alongside Jubilee Celebration.

Whether you love or hate the British monarchy, the roses dedicated to the current queen are eminently worthy in their own right. Try at least one — they are all easy to care for. You never know, the fragrance of Jubilee Celebration might give even the most zealous Anglophobe a craving for tea and shortbread.

Premiere Stages to present 'Handicapped People in Their Formal Attire' in July

Premiere Stages, the professional theater in residence at Kean University, presents Kathryn Grant's "Handicapped People in Their Formal Attire" from July 12 to 29. This provocative new play takes place in 1968 at a black-tie fundraiser for people with disabilities. The honoree is Agnes Sheean, a quadriplegic, who is escorted by her able-bodied sister, Theresa. The siblings make the most of the celebration until unforeseen events force them to examine how fragile the bond is between them.

"The title dates the play to a specific time — the 1960s, when the term 'handicapped people' was politically correct," said John Wooten, Premiere Stages' producing artistic director. "But the theme of the play is timeless, a testament to those who refuse to yield to labels or limitations. The playwright has infused a great deal of humor into this moving story about the true meaning of sacrifice."

The cast of "Handicapped People in

Their Formal Attire" features Rachel Pickup as Agnes and Lori Hammel as Theresa. Pickup is a British theater, film and television actress who performed off-Broadway last season in "Dancing at Lughnasa" at Irish Repertory Theatre. Hammel has appeared on television's "30 Rock," "As the World Turns" and the "Today Show" and in the Coen brother's feature film "Burn After Reading."

A diverse group of actors, those with disabilities and those without, comprise the rest of the company, including David Harrell, Ed Setrakian, John McGinty and Roland Sands. Harrell, an actor who uses a prosthetic device, was nominated for a New York Innovative Theatre Award for Outstanding Solo Performance for his play "A Little Potato and Hard to Peel."

Ed Setrakian appeared on Broadway in "Salome" with Al Pacino, "Almost an Eagle," "Days in the Trees" and "Saint Joan." John McGinty, an actor who is deaf,

performed in "Robin Hood" with Cleveland Sign Stage Theatre and "Pippin" with Mark Taper Forum/Deaf West. A recent graduate from Northeastern University, he's performed with National Theatre of the Deaf, in film and on television. Roland Sands is a veteran actor seen on Broadway, off-Broadway, regionally, on television and in films that include "Ghost," "Cotton Club" and "Do the Right Thing."

Wooten directs "Handicapped People in Their Formal Attire," the winner of Premiere Stages 2012 Play Festival, a regional competition for new scripts.

In 2010, Premiere produced the first professional production of Grant's "The Good Counselor," after the script won the festival. The play was subsequently awarded the runner-up for the Steinberg/American Theatre Critics Association Best New Play Award and is being distributed by Samuel French, a national publisher of plays and musicals.

Union County man admits to robbing seven banks

Currie immediately stopped and offered assistance to the man, attempting to lead him across the street. Diaz was charged with driving while intoxicated, failure to yield to a pedestrian in a crosswalk, failure to report an accident and reckless driving. Today, Casiere was charged with second-degree vehicular homicide and assault by auto. Union County Superior Court Judge Scott J. Moynihan set Casiere's bail at \$50,000, with a condition of bail that he have interlock on any car he drives. Diaz was charged with second-degree leaving the scene of a fatal accident. Judge Moynihan set his bail at \$25,000, with a condition of bail that he have interlock on any car he drives. Both men surrendered to the Westfield Police Station earlier today and posted bail. These criminal charges are mere accusations. The defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Curried Lentil Salad

Need a recipe that feeds a crowd? This curried lentil salad may become your go-to potluck contribution. Since it calls for a lot of spices, I recommend making little packets of the spice mixture for future use as a timesaver.

Salad ingredients

1 lb. dry green lentils, boiled until tender, not mushy
 1 c. red onion, finely chopped
 2 c. cooked orzo pasta or cooked rice
 1 c. pecans or other nuts, chopped
 1 c. currants or golden raisins
 optional: sugar snap peas, thawed frozen peas, edamame, cooked string beans cut into 1-inch pieces, or another green vegetable or legume.

Dressing ingredients

1/2 c. canola oil
 1/2 c. red wine vinegar
 1 tsp dijon mustard
 3-4 tbsp. sugar
 2 tsp. salt

2 tsp. ground pepper
 1 tsp. ground cumin
 1/2 tsp. turmeric
 1/2 tsp. mace
 1/2 tsp. coriander
 1/2 tsp. cardamom
 1/4 tsp. ground cloves
 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
 1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Method

In a large bowl, combine all salad ingredients. In a small bowl, whisk all the dressing ingredients and spices together until combined. Stir into salad until fully combined. Serve warm or cold.

(Sanitary sewerage system improvements)**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUMMIT, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY (not less than two thirds of all the members thereof affirmatively concurring), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The improvement described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is hereby authorized as a general improvement to be made or acquired by The City of Summit, New Jersey. For the said improvement or purpose stated in said Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$850,000, said sum being inclusive of all appropriations heretofore made therefor and including the sum of \$41,000 as the down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provision in a previously adopted budget or budgets of the City for down payment or for capital improvement purposes.

Section 2. For the financing of said improvement or purpose and to meet the part of said \$850,000 appropriation not provided for by application hereunder of said down payment, negotiable bonds of the City are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$809,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey. In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvement or purpose, negotiable notes of the City in a principal amount not exceeding \$809,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 3. (a) The improvement hereby authorized and purpose for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued is the improvement of the sanitary sewerage system in and by the City, including the upgrade of the pumping stations and sewer pipes and facilities in and along various streets and locations, together with all structures, appurtenances, equipment, site work, work and materials necessary thereto or incidental thereto, all as shown on and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor on file or to be filed in the office of the City Engineer and hereby approved.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for said purpose is \$809,000.

(c) The estimated cost of said purpose is \$850,000, the excess thereof over the said estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of the said \$41,000 down payment for said purpose.

Section 4. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

(a) The said purpose described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is not a current expense and is a property or improvement which the City may lawfully acquire or make as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.

(b) The period of usefulness of said purpose within the limitations of said Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the said bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is forty (40) years.

(c) The supplemental debt statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the City Clerk and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey, and such statement shows that, while the net debt of the City determined as provided in said Local Bond Law is not increased by this bond ordinance, the gross debt of the City as defined in said Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided for in this bond ordinance by \$809,000, and the said obligations authorized by this bond ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

(d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$80,000 for interest on said

obligations, costs of issuing said obligations, engineering costs and other items of expense listed in and permitted under section 40A:2-20 of said Local Bond Law may be included as part of the cost of said improvement and is included in the foregoing estimate thereof.

(e) This bond ordinance authorizes obligations of the City solely for a purpose described in subsection (h) of section 40A:2-7 of said Local Bond Law, and the said obligations authorized by this bond ordinance are to be issued for a purpose which is "self-liquidating" within the meaning and limitations of section 40A:2-45 of said Local Bond Law and are deductible, pursuant to subsection (c) of section 40A:2-44 of said Local Bond Law, from gross debt of the City.

Section 5. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer, provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer shall determine all matters in connection with the notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8. The Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the dates of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body of the City at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the principal amount, interest rate and maturities of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchasers.

Section 6. The full faith and credit of the City are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the said obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the City, and, unless paid from the revenues of the sanitary sewerage system of the City, the City shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the City for the payment of said obligations and interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 7. The capital budget or temporary capital budget of the City is hereby amended to conform with the extent of any inconsistency herewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing all detail of the amended capital budget or temporary capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, are on file with the City Clerk and are available for public inspection.

Section 8. This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by said Local Bond Law.

Cranford's Klimek sparks North All-Stars to victory

Won his final 2 high school games at Kean

UNION — All the North had to do was take care of its own business.

"We had to cut out our mistakes and go play North ball," said North wide receiver Elijah Hughes of Elizabeth.

The 34th annual North-South All-Star Football Classic at Kean University's Alumni Stadium turned on its head completely Monday night when North linebacker Tyler Condit of Caldwell produced the ultimate game-changing play by running back an interception from his own 40 to the South 17 with just over nine minutes remaining.

"I was in the right place at the right time," said Condit, who also had a key tackle late in the game, which should have clinched his team's defensive MVP honors.

Condit's interception — the second in the game by the North, with the first one by free safety Steven Le of Union City in the second quarter — led to Hughes' game-winning touchdown, which came two plays later.

The North squad was also sparked by the outstanding defensive play of linebacker Michael Klimek of Cranford and end Chadno Lewis of Plainfield.

In addition was the move-the-chains running of backs Matt DelMauro of Nutley and Najee Williams of East Orange.

Those standout players from Union and Essex counties sparked the North squad to a come-from-behind 14-7 triumph over the South, with the North now trailing the South in the series 16-15-2.

The North will attempt to tie the series once again next year and if it does so will have a chance to take its first lead in the series in the 2014 game.

With the game tied 7-7 and just under four minutes remaining in the third quarter, Klimek came up with a fumble recovery at the South 25 that stood for about 10 minutes. After a long conference with coaches from both teams, the officials gave the ball back to the South, penalizing the North for an illegal all-star game blitz.

"I saw the ball come loose and was able to pick it up," Klimek said.

Klimek ended up playing his final two high school games at Kean, winning both. Back in December he helped lead Cranford to its first playoff championship in its first championship game appearance when the Cougars blanked Parsippany Hills 27-0 in the North 2, Group 3 final.

"It was great, I was in the same lockerroom," said Klimek, who will continue playing at Montclair State. "If college is like this I can't wait."

After a scoreless first quarter, the South got on the board first when running back Greg Jones of Colonia, who will continue at East Stroudsburg, scored up the middle on a one-yard run on fourth and goal with 7:24 to go before intermission.

Klimek and his Cranford teammates totally shut down Jones when the Cougars defeated the Patriots 34-7 in Colonia in the North 2, Group 3 semifinals.

"We had to step up our play defensively and that's what we did in the second half," said Klimek, who was the first Cranford player in the North-South game in six years.

After being limited to just over 100 yards of total offense in a first half that saw it plagued by penalties, the North finally got on the scoreboard in the third quarter. Ironically it was immediately after a holding penalty that nullified a first down run to the left side of the field by Hughes.

Now on second and 22 from the South 27, North quarterback Spencer Perez of Hoboken moved to his left and threw a perfect pass that led 6-5 wide receiver Jason Fuehring of Lakeland right into the left corner of the end zone. Fuerhring, who will play at Moravian, beat double coverage as he was able to come down with the ball against South defensive backs Ryan Zuczek of Robbinsville and Jevon Tyree of South Brunswick. Diamo Steaser's first of two extra point kicks followed to tie the score at 7-7 with 4:54 left in the third.

DelMauro had two first down runs on the scoring drive, while Williams had a key seven-yard run up the middle.

"We were killing ourselves with mistakes in the first half and then on our first touchdown drive we started clicking," said DelMauro, who is headed to Bucknell. "To be able to play with so much talent here and to practice three times a day just makes me look forward to playing at Bucknell even more."

The South had a first-and-10 at the North 31 very early in the fourth quarter, but the drive was halted after Jones was stopped for just a six-yard gain on fourth-and-10.

After the North punted the ball back, the South had a first down at the North 46. Condit came up with his interception two plays later.

Condit had clear field ahead of him after he caught the ball with ball hands.

"I heard my teammates yelling, 'keep going, keep going,'" Condit said.

On first down from the South 17, Williams was stopped for no gain. On second down, Hughes received the pitch to his left and sprinted around end down the sideline for the game-winning points.

It was an electric run by a back who helped lead Elizabeth to last year's North 2, Group 4 final.

"I knew I was going to outrun them," said Hughes, who will continue in the Southeastern Conference at Mississippi State.

"They were too damn slow."

The South's final chance was thwarted when on fourth-and-two from the North nine-yard line Condit tackled Jones, who tried to get outside to the left, but was stopped for a one-yard loss.

"I had a feeling he was going to go that way," Condit said.

North defensive MVP Jeron Addison of Paterson Eastside put an exclamation point on the victory by coming up with a sack on the game's third-to-last play. By doing so the lineman made up for being off sides on a play earlier in the second half.

NOTES: North lineman Gordy Dufresne of Hillside - who will play at American International College - produced a third down quarterback sack in the first quarter that forced the South team to punt.

North defensive starters from Union County included linebacker Dave Barletta of New Providence, Klimek, tackle Scott Wiggins of Roselle and Lewis.

Barletta won a state championship his junior year when the Pioneers captured North 2, Group 1 for the first time since 1989.

South placekicker Mike Burke of Williamstown, missed a 40-yard field goal with three minutes left in the second quarter that would have given the South a 10-0 lead.

The snap and his kick were both low.

Condit had two interceptions in his varsity career at Caldwell, the first coming in his junior year, which was returned for a touchdown, and the second his senior season in his team's 34-20 loss at Summit in last year's North 2, Group 2 semifinals.

Condit will continue playing in college at the University of New Haven.



Roselle's James followed track success with speech

Was salutatorian at her commencement

Kaprice James has faced and met many challenges head on as a track and field standout at Roselle the past four years.

Last Thursday night she was presented with another opportunity to excel, although it had nothing to do with the sport she has dominated since her freshman season.

This year's salutatorian at Abraham Clark High School for ranking second academically in her senior class, James had her speech already set to go for when she delivered it at graduation.

Two weeks ago, James competed in the 2012 New Balance Nationals Outdoor Track and Field competition at North Carolina A & T. While earning All-America honors for placing fourth in the 100-meter hurdles, James also began to think about the message she was to express to her fellow graduates, parents and school administrators.

"I began to work on my speech at nationals," James said. "I completed it there."

James developed a formula that fit her schedule quite nicely, obviously paying off big dividends.

"Every day after practice I would take a nap and then do my homework and eat," James said. "That worked for me from the beginning."

It all added up to James earning a track scholarship. She will compete the next four years in the Big East Conference as a member of the Rutgers Scarlet Knights.

James could have gone anywhere, but decided to stay close to home, although she will still get to travel often as a member of the track and field squad.

Soon there will be plenty of new challenges, both athletically and academically.

"At Rutgers the competition will be a lot tougher," James said.

"I'll be looking to excel in the Big East and nationals and try to better my personal record."

When James finished second in the annual Meet of Champions that was finally contested June 11 at Lombardi Field in Old Bridge, her time of 14.05 in the 100-meter hurdles was a personal-best.

"I was very happy with that time," James said. "I knew I ran fast."

Irvington senior Dashana Ransome won the event in 13.89, although in the preliminaries James ran a 14.15 for second and Ransome a 14.23 for third.

"The girl from Irvington was pretty good," James said. "I don't get out too fast."

James, who turned 18 on March 9, also has an impressive winter track resume.

There's not much that James - the New Jersey state and also a Union County Scholar-Athlete - didn't accomplish in a high school career that concluded Thursday night when she threw her cap up in the air in celebration.

With a background as the offensive coordinator for one of top programs in Essex County, first-year Dayton football coach Steve Trivino is thrilled to have a player like senior Anthony Cioffi behind center.

"Anthony is, obviously, very talented," said Trivino, who was hired by the Springfield Board of Education June 4.

Trivino will begin to implement what he calls his, "run and gun, spread out offense."

"I've been doing it since 1999 and 2000," Trivino said. "I've gone to Northwestern and Nebraska to learn how they ran it so I can instill it here."

"We'll also dabble a little bit with the Wing-T to give my kids the advantage of counters."

Dayton originally hired West Orange offensive coordinator Joe Chango in mid May to succeed Joe Goerge, who stepped down in December.

Two weeks later, Chango decided to resign from the position.

"The administration and I shared a different vision when it came to assembling a staff," Chango said.

When Chango stepped down, Dayton Athletic Director Lance Jacobs called Trivino back. Chango ended up going back to West Orange to resume his duties as offensive coordinator on head coach John Jacobs' staff.

"When I didn't get the job Lance and I both parted ways in a pleasant manner at the time," Trivino said. "We said that hopefully we'll run into each other in the future."

"Little did I realize I would get an e-mail from him such a short time after that. The future didn't turn out to be that far away."

After getting turned down by Dayton, Trivino took the offensive coordinator position at Passaic Valley, which he held on to for just two weeks.

"I didn't say yes at PV until I was turned down at Dayton," Trivino said.

"I wanted the Dayton job. I saw the team on film and when I didn't get the job I was disappointed. I thought the interview process went great."

"When Jacobs called me back I was torn, but I had to hear what he had to say. I was also excited. This is definitely the type of landing spot I was looking for."

Goerge and defensive coordinator Bob Martin, who coached together for almost 30 years, rebuilt the Dayton Bulldogs and – most importantly – brought coaching stability to a program that had none in the past.

Goerge was just hired as the new head coach at South Brunswick and will have his sons Michael and Jason on his staff.

However, Martin will remain at Dayton and will now be on Trivino's staff. Also the head boys' basketball coach at Dayton, Martin has twin sons that will be enrolling as freshmen at Dayton this fall.

"I come from a very senior staff at Caldwell," Trivino said. "I knew Bobby Martin. I didn't want to shake the boat. Joe (Goerge) and Bobby did a great job at Dayton. Joe moved on and I inherited a very talented team."

Trivino's teams at Newark Academy finished 3-7 in 2010 and 2-8 last year, including two forfeit losses. His 2010 squad consisted of 21 kids and last year's team 20, including four freshmen.

"The numbers were simply trending down," Trivino said. "For this year there were only 11 returning players and six freshmen. I went to Newark Academy with great expectations and to start a football family and I thought I could get it going."

"My first year we were 3-3 and then we stumbled a bit, but we did the best we could. Only two players came in after I was hired, but we kept on working and graduated a talented class."

"Last year only four came in and just two stayed with the program. The numbers just continued to be a real problem, trending down and not up."

"I was there for all the open houses and fundraising to attract athletes and the school did everything. With only 400 people in the building and just 17 players, when push comes to shove you don't know where you're going."

At his new Group 1 school the numbers are much better. Trivino reported that Dayton has 42 players on varsity and 22 on freshmen.

"I wanted to establish something at Newark Academy, but it wasn't meant to be," Trivino said. "I wish them all the best. The seniors were hard workers and the last of a big football class."

In addition to getting to know his Dayton players, Trivino will continue to get acclimated to the competition, including the likes of fellow Group 1 Union County foes Bear Creek, New Providence and Roselle Park.

"At 52, I was looking at a landing spot and to continue the community atmosphere," Trivino said.

"I'm looking forward to also working with the Junior Bulldogs."

"I moved into a place that I'm very happy with. Bobby (Martin) and I get along real well. I think we'll have a nice mix with my offense and his defense."

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
