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DEBATING CLUB . . . This year a new club was formed in the High School whose purpose was to give the students an opportunity to express themselves on subjects which interested them and to develop expressive qualities which would give the student training in public speaking.

The year's activities included debates in the Club on subjects of varied interests, debates with teams of other schools, and sponsoring an assembly program.

Two of the members of the Club, Robert Robbins and Robert Miller entered the American Legion's Oratorical Contest, the latter representing the school in the county finals.

Miss Elisabeth Stewart was the faculty adviser and the Club owes much of its success to her conscientious work and time devoted to it.

THE SOCIAL COMMITTEE . . . The only dance which the Social Committee had full charge of this year was the annual Hallowe'en Dance, which was given by the A.A. at the end of their drive to sell A.A. tickets. At this dance the two people who had sold the most tickets were crowned King and Queen.

The other dances given this year were under the supervision of the classes but the committee gave them advice about decorations and orchestras. They also assisted in the actual work of decorating.

Miss Vera A. Michel was faculty adviser, and Jean Sigler was the chairman.



TRAFFIC COMMITTEE . . . The Traffic Committee was organized a few years ago to encourage order and swiftness in the passing of classes, and to supervise fire drills. Mr. Johnson was appointed faculty adviser.

During this year the committee sponsored two sound movies. One "The Healer," portrayed the life of a young doctor who spent his time curing paralysis. The other, "Imitation of Life," was based on the racial problem. The proceeds from these movies were used to pay for printed certificates and emblems which were presented to the students who served on the committee.

This has been one of the most successful years the committee has had, both as to business accomplishments and social activities.

FINANCE COMMITTEE . . . This year the Finance Committee was divided into two sections. One took care of the records of the finances of the school's organization. Mrs. Harriette E. Prince was the faculty adviser to this group.

The other group had charge of handling tickets and the door for dances, basketball games, baseball games, and other school activities. Clifford D. Wilkin was the faculty adviser.



THE LOST AND FOUND COMMITTEE . . . Formed again this year under the leadership of Miss Alice G. Cheney, the Lost and Found Committee has been one of the most useful committees of the school. They have returned many lost articles, several of which were quite valuable. A card-index was kept of all articles found (mainly fountain pens). Each card had on it a detailed description of the article, the finder's name and homeroom, the date and place where it was found. If no one claimed the article, at the end of two weeks it was given to the finder.

SERVICE AND PUBLICITY COMMITTEES . . . This year the Service Committee has had charge of selling tickets for several school functions. In the fall members sold an almost record breaking number of Athletic Association tickets. They also sold tickets to the A. A. Dance held in October. During the Basketball season "Fight for Verona" buttons were sold to promote school spirit. We also sold tickets for the Concert given by the combined musical departments in May.

Starting the year with advertising the annual Athletic Association Drive, the Publicity Committee has aided the School Council Social Committee and the various class social committees for the dances. Posters, some of which were made by the Art students under Miss Batchelder, blackboard drawings in home rooms and local newspaper articles have been the ways which the committee has worked.



THE ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE . . . This committee arranges the programs for assemblies, which are held once a week. An attempt is made to make the assembly appealing to a majority of the students. The committee as a whole makes requests of certain organizations to put on a program. Then that assembly is handed over to some member of the committee, who works out the specific details for that day and makes the necessary introductions before the student body.

Some of the outstanding programs of this year were: On December 7 the Dramatic Club gave previews to their annual play, "Some Call It Love"; a German boy, who had been a student in the high school for two months at the time, gave his views on the status of Europe and his conception of the United States; The New Jersey College for Women, on March 14, gave a program which was limited to girls; The Rutgers College assembly on January 18 was given to an audience of boys; for the Thanksgiving Assembly some persons from the student body were chosen to read several selections which were suitable to the occasion.

LUNCH COMMITTEE . . . For the first time, a lunch committee was formed to control the conduct of the students in the cafeteria. Certain of its members have charge of the lunch line in order to keep it running smoothly and efficiently. Other members keep the lunch room clean of papers. The committee not only has charge of the cafeteria, but it also organizes recreation and activities for the students during the lunch period. One member is in charge of the victrola which is played on the stage for dancing. Groups of boys and girls participate in games of volleyball and basketball. Two classrooms, one for girls and one for boys, are set aside for those who do not wish to eat in the cafeteria.

The remainder has been spent in having lectures and demonstrations. The fashion show given to the girls of the school in assembly and then to the P.-T. A. in May was under the direction of the club. Members of the club feel that it has been very helpful and interesting to have the club.

JUNIOR NURSES' CORPS . . . This club, organized for the first time this year, has been ably guided by Miss Meixell. Since it is mainly composed of prospective nurses the aim of the club has been to learn as much about practical nursing as possible. The members have also visited some of the nearby hospitals in order to get a better idea of nursing. The officers for the year were: President, Jean Martin; Vice-President, Ella Ritchie; and Secretary, Margie Ward.

MOVIE CLUB . . . Another of the new clubs this year is the Movie Club which meets regularly every two weeks to discuss the movies, the stars, and movie production. Officers include: June Siris, president; and Lois Schlossberg, secretary.

SCIENCE CLUB . . . This year a new club was formed in the High School with the purpose of promoting a better understanding of General Science. The meetings are held weekly on Friday, during fifth period. Officers are as follows: President, Marion Dev-enport; Secretary, Gladys Griffin; and Program Chairman, John Danielson. The group made a trip to the Newark Museum where they studied the various science features and exhibits. The weekly meetings are consumed by making reports on scientific subjects and general discussions, as well as demonstrations, of present day science.

OPERA CLUB . . . Many music lovers attended the meetings of the Opera Club which was one of the clubs inaugurated this year to hear records of favorite and popular operas. Marie Hansberry, the acknowledged social leader of Lake Mohawk, recently returned from Europe on the new "Princess Margaret Rose."

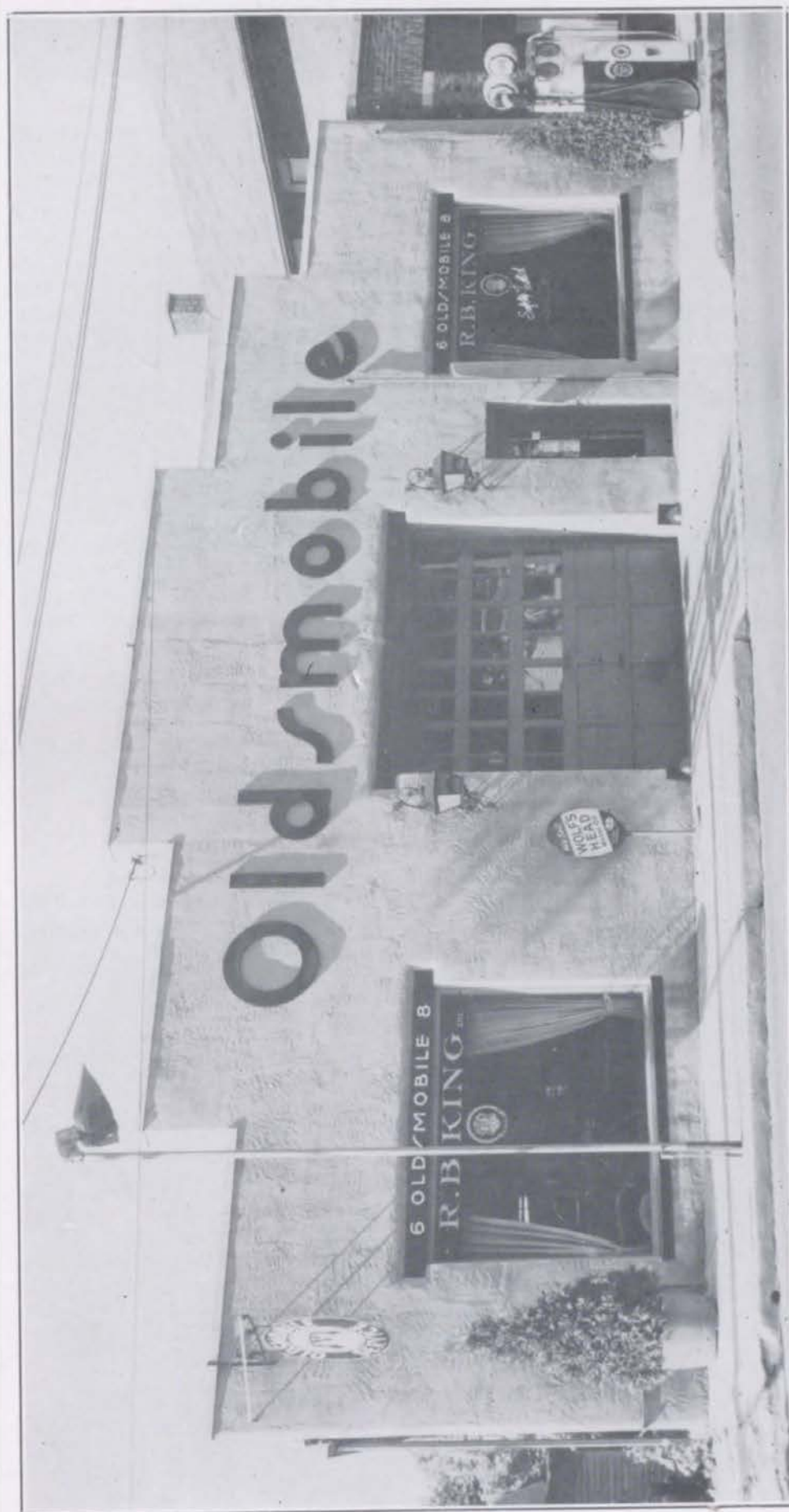

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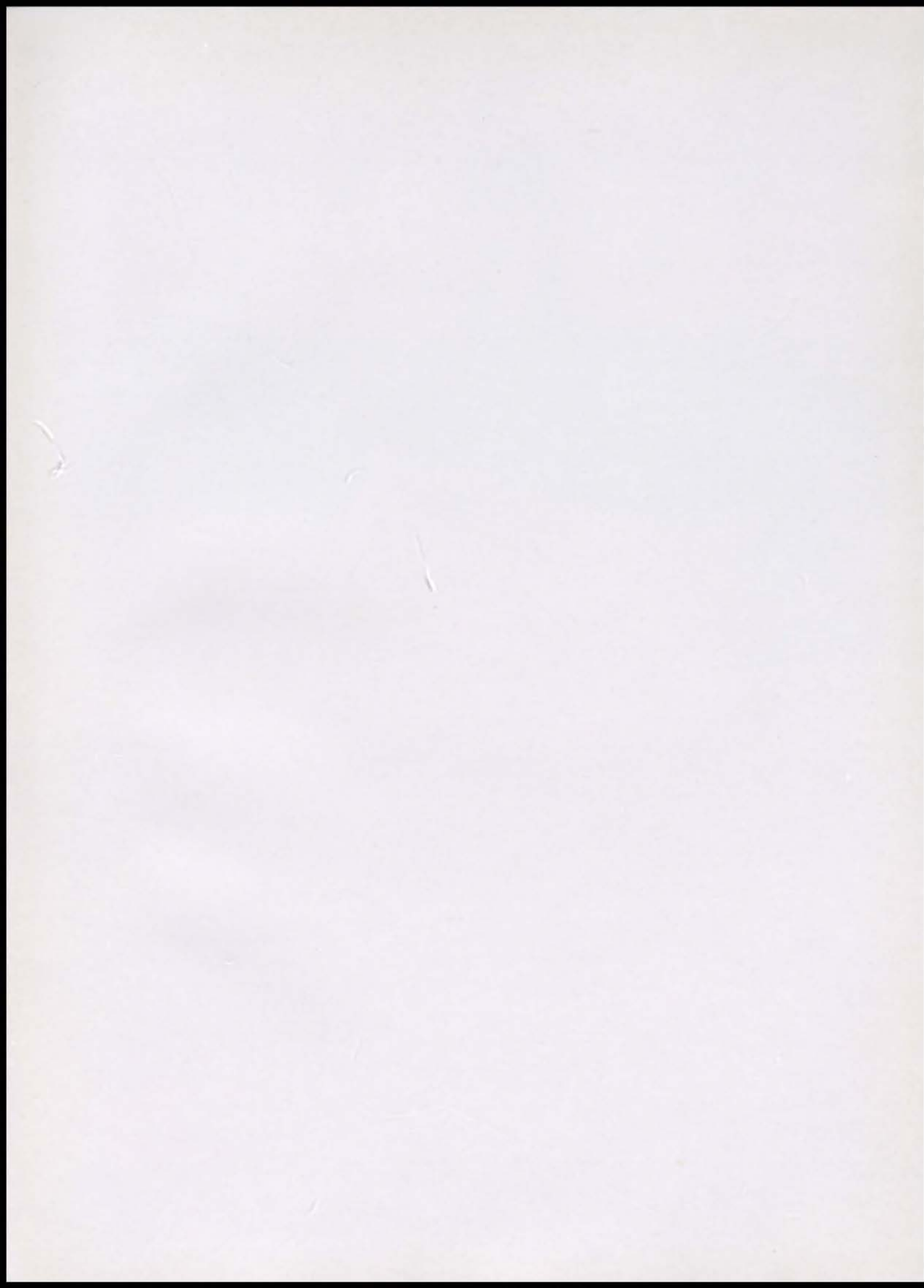

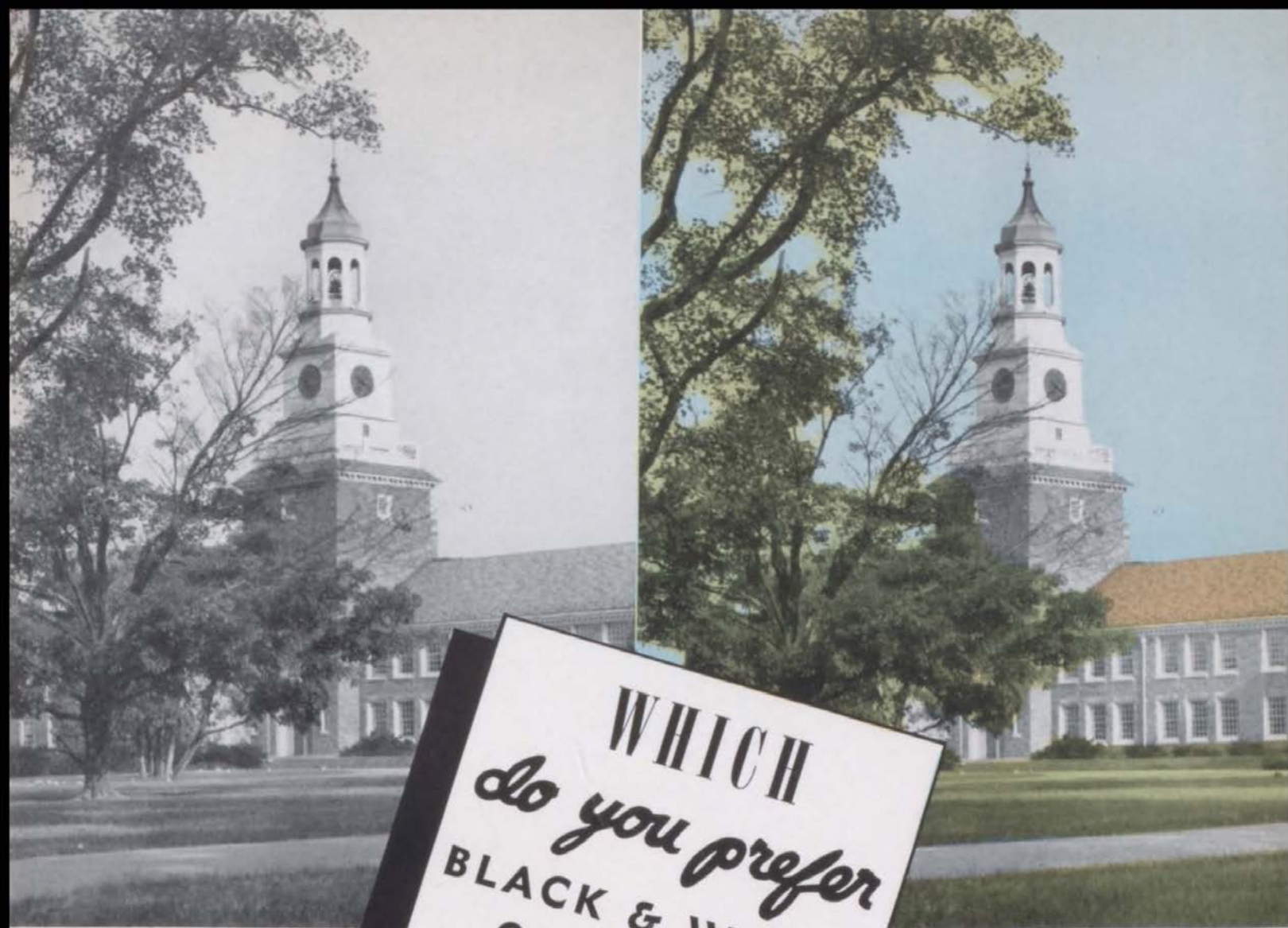
