

The High School is very proud of the orchestra, its conductor, and the very fine service it has given everyone all year.



The Verona Chapter of Junior Volunteer Nurses of America was established two years ago. Mrs. Smith is the club's advisor. Before a girl can begin her hospital work, she must attend two four-hour classes. She is then considered qualified to assist in any part of the hospital, including the operating room, surgical, and medical wards, and maternity. While working in Mountainside and Community Hospitals, the girls come in contact with many different and interesting personalities and cases. The girls doing hospital work find great satisfaction in the knowledge that they are doing their part to make the lives of others a bit more cheerful.

A person is eligible for membership in the National Honor Society if he is outstanding in character, leadership, service, and scholarship. Five percent of the Juniors are elected to the Society in the spring and are given an informal tea by current Honor Society members. The remaining ten percent are chosen from the senior class in the fall. This year's group gave a Wassail Party in December for graduates of the Class of '54 who were extending their studies in college or specialized school. In January, in conjunction with the Student Council, the Honor Society held an informal tea for Verona High School's foreign guests. The members of the Honor Society also helped in the Guidance Office, took charge of classes when a teacher was unable to be present, and served as receptionists in the main hall during the day.


PINNERS


