PETER APPLE



ALBERT BEVILACQUA





ANGELA CORDASCO



GEORGE FENN




ALFRED JOHNSON



We feel that we all have had the necessary training for accepting the responsibilities of Juniors.





Football



Basketball





Bowling





Tennis












