
SENIOR CLASS OFFICERS




HELEN HESS




ROBERT CALLAHAN


KAREN CARLSON

"Sure!"







JERRY CESTONE




MARK CHAZIN




RICHARD CONGDON




CATHRYN DI DOMENICO




PATRICIA EAGER

The question arises, how long will this remarkable team continue to win State Championships? The most probable answer is, as long as we have the consummate coaching of George Stiefbold.








This year Coach "Bucky" Hatchett led a successful team. Although the team lost six seniors from last year, seven lettermen have returned.








GOLF



GIRLS' SPORTS


