Activities: Dramatics 4; Prom Decorations 3; Prom Publicity 3, 4; Senior Executive Committee Alternate 4.


RONNIE BROTMAN






LOIS DONIELLA BROWN "What fools these mortals be."

This year the Student Council under the direction of Miss Anna V. Howell, has been the scene of several innovations. The Council started a Student Loan Service, carried out a "Get Out the Vote" campaign which advocated town voters to "exercise their franchise" in the November elections, and revised its constitution by debating and rephrasing obsolete measures and by entering the newly accepted Election Procedure revisions. Also the Council published a VHS handbook—the first of its kind in the school. This government contributed to a state-wide fund to help build a school in Upper Volta, and worked in accordance with the P.T.A. in sponsoring

both a VHS Theatre trip group and a summer employment program. In addition, student participation in the Council this year came to light significantly when three amendments to the Constitution were proposed, but later defeated by a referendum vote.

In addition to these new activities, the Council maintained traditional projects and policies by sponsoring a "Kick-Off Canteen," participating in the Suburban Conference and New Jersey Association of High School Councils, and by sustaining change and apple machines. This year's officers were: Norm Lowenthal, President; Ruth Seagull, Vice-President; and Carol Ustin, Secretary.





CONCESSIONS


