1964

Jed Graef after graduating from Verona High School won an academic scholarship to Princeton and from there went on to win the gold medal in the 200 meter backstroke swimming event in the 1964 Olympic Games. Jed's swimming career began early, for he learned to swim at the age of three and was competing with the Montclair Y.M.C.A. team at the age of 10. Thus, Jed began his career in competitive swimming. He qualified for the Olympic team in the summer of 1964 and on October 13, 1964, in Tokyo, Japan, he led the United States team in a sweep of the 200 meter backstroke by winning the Olympic Gold Medal in a world record time of 2 minutes and 10.3 seconds. Mayor Robert Howe designated January 27 as Jed Graef Day in the borough of Verona.
