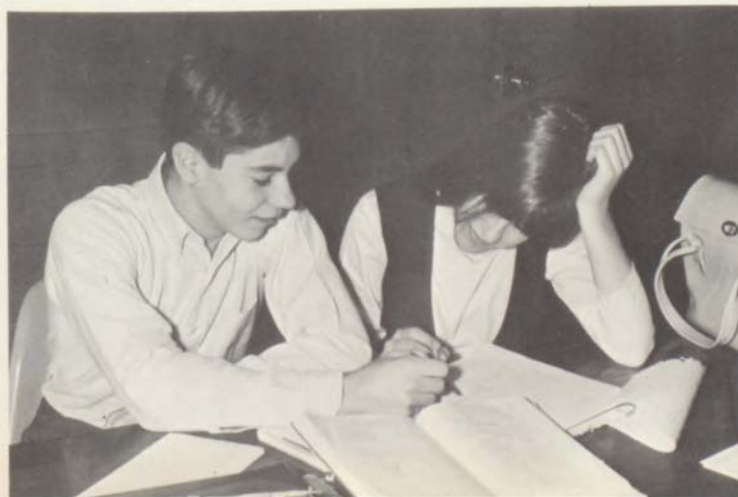

Members were elected by the faculty in June and December of 1965 on the basis of their character, service, leadership, and scholarship. 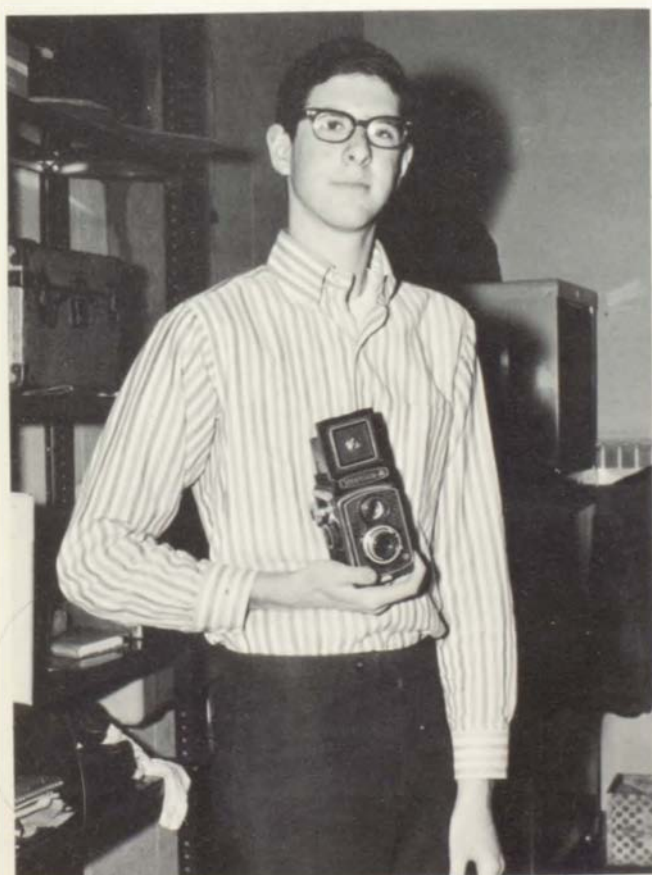

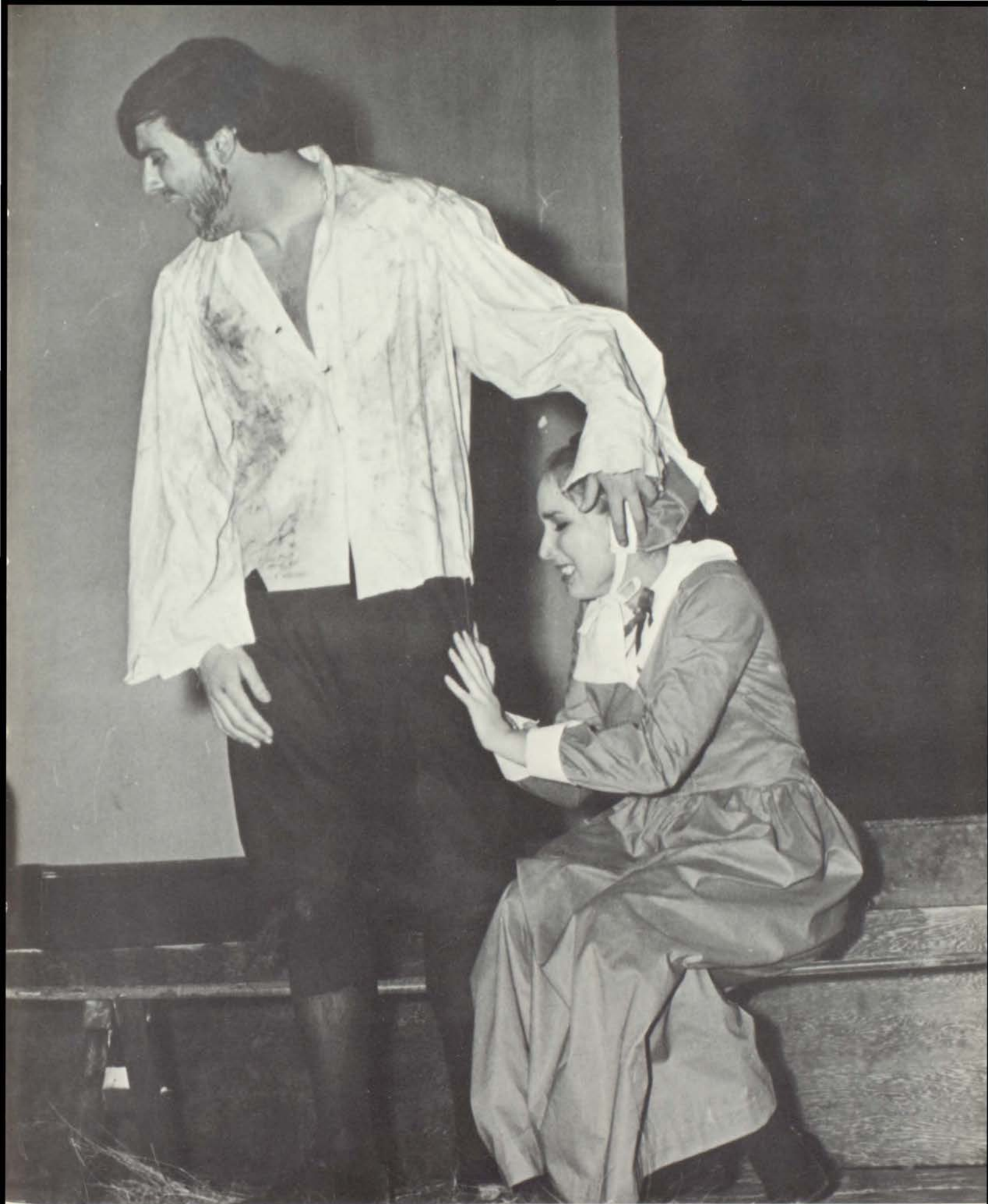

GREENHOUSE CLUB

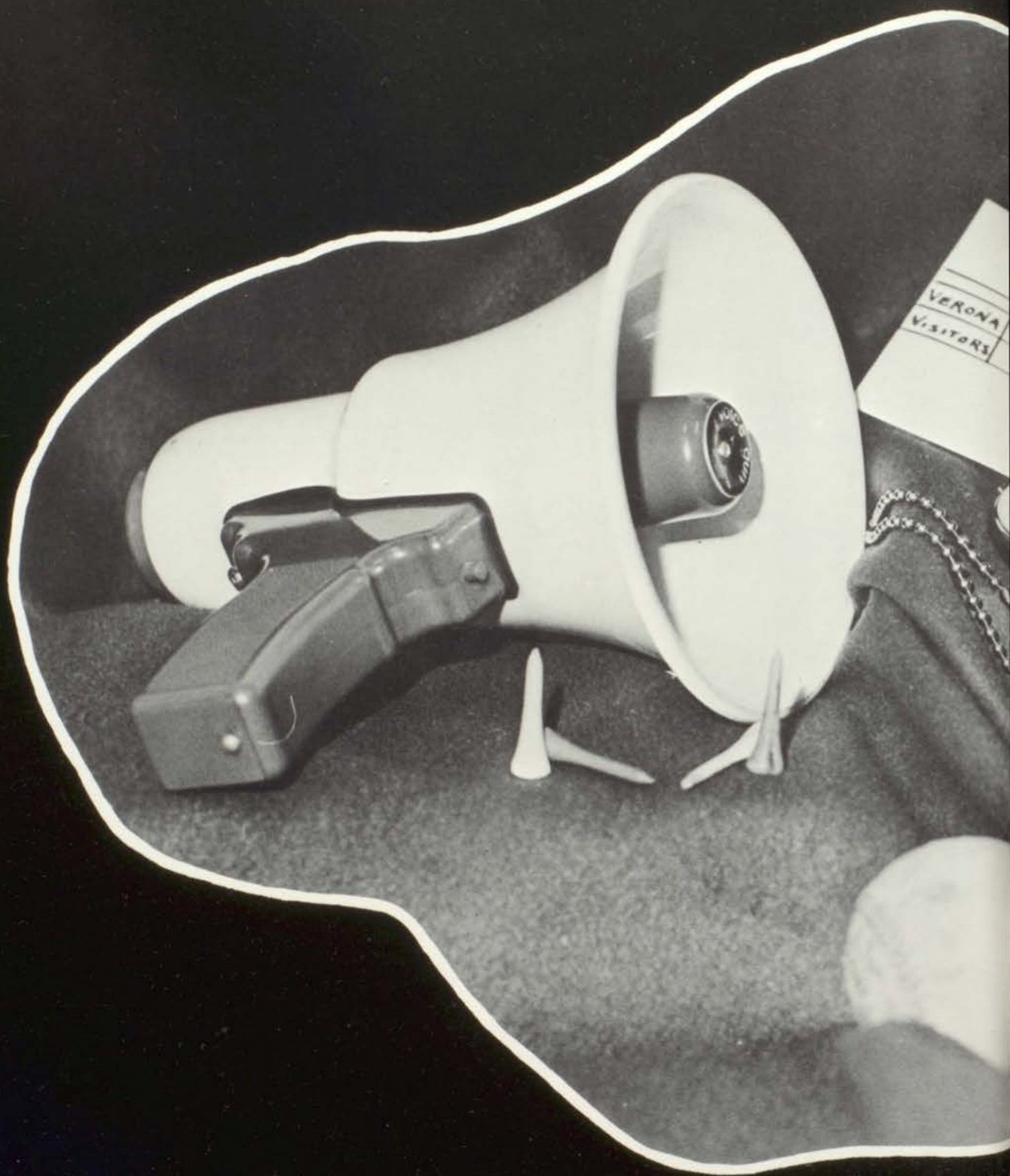

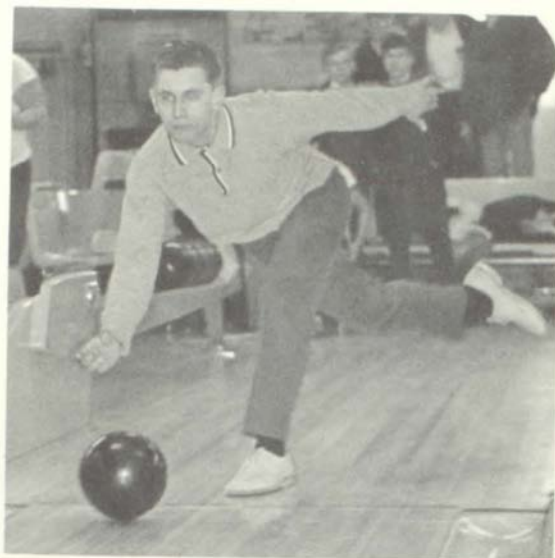

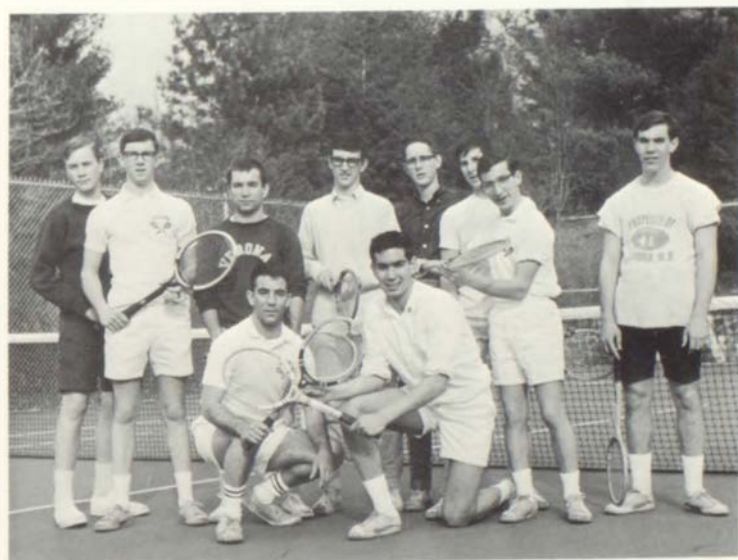

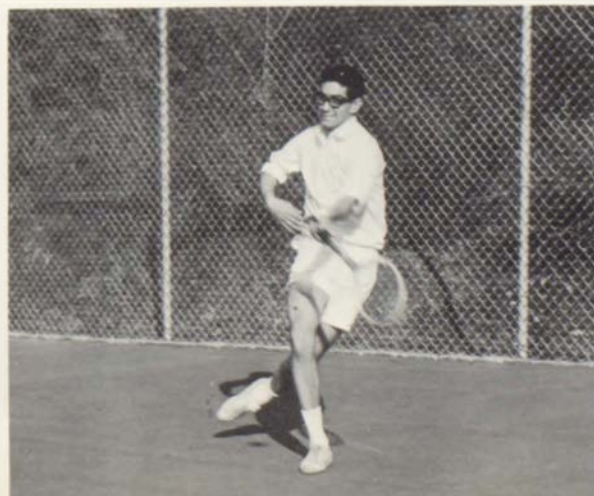

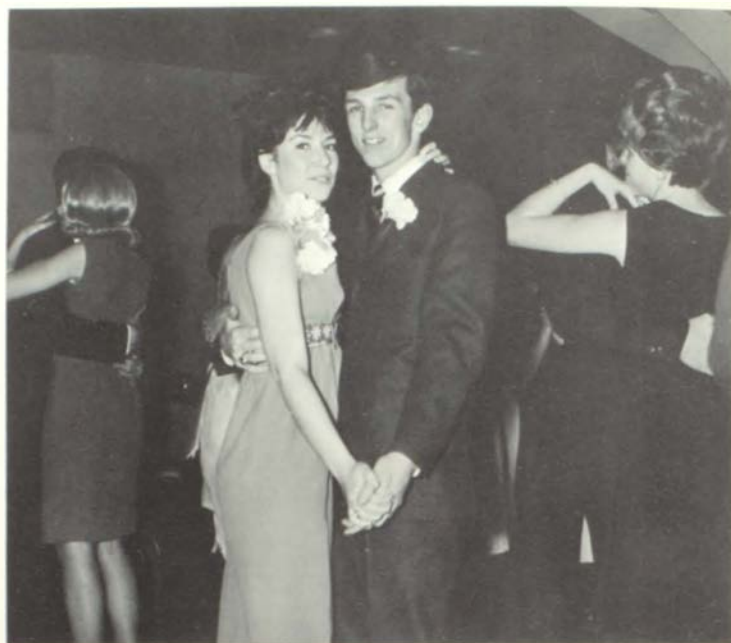
the middle of the passageway to "ease" traffic, and then having to report to the office for a late slip and 7:30 detention.

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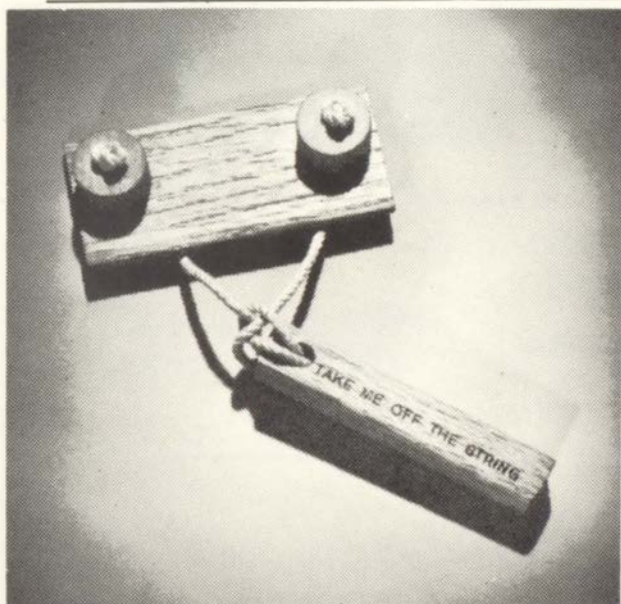


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
