

# News Censorship Is Way of Life at Town Hall

WAYNE — Charges of censorship and management of the news resounded through Wayne this weekend following an administrative memo to all department heads at the Municipal Building ordering them to clear all newspaper releases through the office of Purchasing Agent Jack Hulse. All information from the department and division heads as well as members of their staffs are to be routed through Hulse's office for clearance.

The memo, dated August 18 and bearing Hulse's initials was directed to Miss Dorothy McDevitt, Township Clerk; Mrs. Gloria Naughton, Court Clerk; Os-

## Buildings Are Destroyed On Route 23 Sites

WAYNE — Workmen manning heavy demolition equipment moved into the urban renewal area of Wayne last Thursday and Friday to begin razing buildings along Route 23.

The first to fall before the bulldozers were Dan Dowd's Steak House on the south side of the highway, Sun-E-Bridge Swim Club, the Texan Restaurant, and two private homes on the north side of the highway.

In the first phase of the demolition project 13 buildings will be removed. There are 60 structures in all to be removed in the urban area. Under the terms of the contract, V. Ottilio and Sons are to remove the first 13 buildings located on seven lots within 30 days of the starting date of demolition.

The urban renewal project in Wayne has come under fire from the administration on several occasions over the past several months. In May the mayor appointed a special blue ribbon panel to investigate the project. His action was immediately brought under fire by the council, which is the local public agency for the project. Councilmen pointed out that the entire project has been constantly reviewed by the appropriate state and federal agencies, and full concurrence has been obtained at every step.

The project again made the front pages of the newspapers in July when the mayor charged that the township paid \$600,000 for a parcel of land assessed at \$117,000. The statement was immediately attacked by Urban Renewal Director Charles Wallschleger as "incredible" and "erroneous". Wallschleger explained that the sum of \$117,000 named by the mayor covered only 4.01 acres of the 17 acre tract.

The council recently approved high rise luxury apartments for the urban renewal area, making it the first area of Wayne available for the purpose. Other quadrants of the project have been set aside for business and commercial use and high rise office buildings.

## \$50,000 Loan Is Approved For Sewage Treatment Plant

TRENTON — The state Department of Environmental Protection has approved a \$50,000 loan for engineering design plans for a proposed regional sewage treatment plant that will serve municipalities in three counties in the upper

Passaic Valley drainage basin.

The money is being made available to the Passaic County Sewerage Authority, Paterson, to help complete preliminary engineering work. The proposed plant is in Wayne

Township at the confluence of the Ramapo and Pequannock rivers, both major tributaries of the Passaic.

## Wayne News In Brief

A Netcong man was given a sentence of 210 days in the Passaic County jail for fourteen counts of worthless checks by Municipal Court Judge James Murner in Wednesday's session of criminal court. The man, Frank P. DeFelice, who was represented by legal counsel, asked the court for leniency in an effort to make restitution. However, the defendant has a long history of writing worthless checks both in Wayne and other municipalities.

Judge Murner, in handing out the sentence of 15 days on each of the fourteen counts, noted that he has to try to put a stop to this "paper plague" in this town. He told the defendant that he knew that he would not get the help that he needed in jail, but that he and others like him are going to have to learn that they have "to work for what they get like the rest of us." "These people think that they can live higher than they are entitled to, that they can just give bad checks to the merchants and get things that they cannot afford to pay for," said Murner.

The judge promised that, like shoplifting, he is going to start "getting tough" in an effort to put a stop to this kind of thing.

Also facing sentences in Wednesday's session were four other defendants who had previously been found guilty to various offenses.

Richard Grap of 15 Melanie Lane, Wayne, was given a 90 day suspended sentence for being under the influence of heroin. The youth, who the judge labeled "a leech, both on his family and society", was placed on probation for two years, with the specific condition to be that he receive the psychiatric help he needs at the institution known as "The Bridge."

Marion Metzger of 51 Ruff Court, North Haledon, on a charge of breaking, entering and larceny, was given a six month suspended sentence. She was placed on probation for two years and would be continued on probation as long as she continue in the D.A.R.E. program where she has been since March.

Two youths who had been found guilty of assault and battery on James Gabriel following an altercation in Mr. Gabriel's restaurant in which Mr. Gabriel sustained injuries, were also sentenced. Ronald Resing of 2 Bogart Street, Little Falls, was fined \$125 for his part in the fight. Thomas Lewis, however, was given a suspended jail sentence in addition to the \$125 fine. The youth, who has a number of other such incidents on his record, was given the 90 day suspended sentence largely due to the efforts of Police Sergeant Thomas Mullaney who came forth in his behalf. He was placed on probation for two years with the specific condition that he does not enter any bar, saloon, tavern or any other place that dispenses alcoholic beverages for the two year period.

Paying fines of \$250 for guilty pleas to the charge of shoplifting were: Patrick Silvestri of Paterson; Bernard Fangmann of West Paterson; Irwin Taylor of Morristown and Alex Edmiston of Kearney.

Billy Gross of 5 John Street, Lincoln Park, pleaded guilty of doing malicious damage to the home of William H. Sarti of Wayne, and was given a 90 day suspended sentence.

The youth, who had been under the influence of alcohol at the time of the incident, was placed on probation with the specific condition that he not consume any alcohol during the two year period.

Carmen Casentine of 26 Woodlot Road, Wayne, was found not guilty of doing malicious damage to the home of Myron Rosenthal of 48 Tall Oaks Drive, Wayne. He, however, was warned to stay away from that residence in the future.

Walter Burwan of Elizabeth, was found not guilty of issuing a worthless check as the officers from the store failed to show that he was the man who had given them the worthless checks.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of Paul Cosine of Paterson, who failed to appear to answer a charge of issuing a worthless check.

## Yoder Claims Sewage Treatment Unwanted In Tri-County District

WAYNE — Mrs. Lorraine Yoder, GOP sixth ward council candidate today issued a call for all presidents of the Township to join her in "bombarding by letter, phone, or otherwise" all County, State and Federal Officials in the area "telling them in no uncertain terms that the proposed Tri-County Sewage Treatment plant is not wanted here".

"This should be a matter of vital concern to all residents, whether or not they live near the projected site in the residential Black Oak area, as the plant would result in still one more large tract of land going off the tax rolls" Mrs. Yoder continued.

She said that it is commendable that some elected officials "talk in glowing terms about solving septic tank problems in other towns. But have they considered at all that this

proposal penalizes the taxpayers of Wayne, who have willingly assumed the burden of a self-liquidating facility?" Mrs. Yoder asked. "This whole proposal strikes me as just one more case of Wayne residents having to pick up the tab for other towns' deficiencies" she declared.

"There are already millions and millions of dollars in potential ratables lost forever" because of existing tax-free properties in the Township. She

cautioned "we still may see a gush for the County College on the property between Black Oak Ridge and Ratzter Roads on land earmarked for research and development".

"It appears" Mrs. Yoder said "that the time has most certainly come when the residents of Wayne can rise up, in all fairness, and say 'enough'. It is for this reason I am urging our townspeople to join together in protesting this raid on our future ratables".

## Sewage Treatment Unit Opposed by Feleppa

WAYNE — At a meeting with a group of his supporters, Edward E. Feleppa, Independent candidate for Councilman in Wayne's 6th Ward, noted, with growing apprehension, reports that the Passaic County Sewer Authority intends to construct a permanent sewage treatment plant in the Sixth Ward of Wayne.

Feleppa said, "I am inalterably opposed to such construction because I understand it is designed to service the up country area and not the residents in the Sixth Ward and I, frankly, am not convinced that such a facility should be constructed in Wayne at all. "I personally think this is a matter requiring our deep study and I will talk with officials in

Lincoln Park and Pequannock to see if it would be feasible to tie this system into their plan."

Continuing, he stated: "I certainly am in favor of anything that will improve the condition of our rivers and streams, but to spread money without careful planning may be doing the citizens of Wayne and particularly the Sixth Ward a disservice. I feel strongly that this entire concept deserves the most serious thought before any construction is undertaken."

Feleppa further stated that he would check all the ramifications of such a plan and the potential consequences of having a facility of this nature in the area.

## Town Bids Farewell To Fuchs

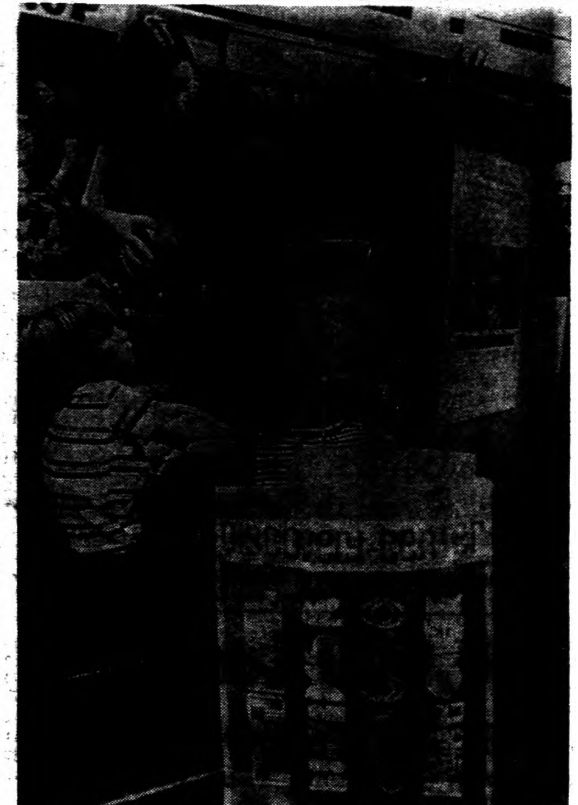

## Remains in Coma Salamansky Condition 'Serious'

NEWARK — Dr. Carl Salamansky remains in a coma at Beth Israel Hospital four weeks after a kidney transplant operation which doctors hoped would give him a normal life. Less than a week after the operation, Salamansky underwent a second operation to remove the kidney. Massive hemorrhaging coupled with a cardiac arrest and pneumonia caused doctors to abandon hope that Salamansky could live with the kidney donated by the parents of a ten year old boy who died after choking on a piece of food.

Salamansky's wife was said to be in constant attendance at her husband's side since he was recovered from isolation following the second operation. After the transplant was completed in a four hour operation by the

hospital's organ transplant up.

A hospital spokesman said yesterday afternoon that Salamansky remains in a very poor condition. His status has not changed in the past ten days since he lost consciousness and lapsed into a coma. Since the removal of the kidney Salamansky was put back on the dialysis machine which he swore to disconnect if a transplant organ was not made available by October.

Salamansky's condition was complicated by a heart condition; he suffered a heart attack several years ago which doctors say left him in a weakened condition. He has suffered from a progressive kidney disease since birth. Both kidneys were removed several years ago

and he was placed on a dialysis machine for treatment. While he hoped for a kidney transplant, doctors were unable to find a compatible organ. When the son of a colleague, he was placed in isolation and communicated with his wife through an intercom set. When he died unexpectedly, a kidney was made available and doctors at Beth Israel undertook the operation. For the first several days the operation appeared to be a success; then Salamansky developed pneumonia and a cardiac arrest.

Immediately following the operation, a second transplant was performed on Douglas Wain, a graduate law student, Wain of Hillside, N.J. was released by Beth Israel on Wednesday

The memo, which directs department and division heads to route all releases and statements to area newspapers through the office of Purchasing Agent Jack Hulse, was initiated not by the mayor, but by Mr. Hulse.

We ask, therefore, who is running the municipal government of the township? Is it the mayor, who seemingly permits a non-elected official to issue memos to the men who run the departments of Wayne's government? Is it the business administrator who was the mayor's own appointee? Or is it the Purchasing Agent who was appointed to his position by the mayor after the council refused to go along with naming him an administrative aide?

Is it good business management to permit a staff man to dictate to line men who are well versed into their fields? Is it good business practice for the Purchasing Agent to issue directives in the name of the mayor without so much as an initial to indicate that the mayor has even seen the memo?

An investigation into this latest memo would seem to be in order. The reasons for a news black out and the assumption of powers beyond those of the job description of the Purchasing Agent should be brought to light. Wayne citizens are entitled to know just who is running their municipal government.

## Concern for Youth

At a time when there is national concern over the availability of recreational facilities for children during the summer, the Department of Parks and Recreation in Wayne alleviated any doubt of the township's youth population not being able to experience a worthwhile vacation from school.

The recently completed contests sponsored by the Department have indeed provided an active and productive season.

Director Charles W. Kelly and his staff are to be commended for their efforts. The numerous activities that have been implemented into the summer program are representative of a child's diversified interests. Athletic events and checkers tournaments were among the various types of fields where a child could apply his capabilities.

In this issue of the paper, there is a letter from a Pompton youth who complains about the lack of activities in his area. Perhaps if he resided in Wayne, his letter would not have been necessary. Nevertheless, the typical child's preoccupation during the summer is an extensive and continual plan of recreational activity. The youth becomes easily bored with the sometimes stagnant periods throughout this season and might undertake an activity which may be ultimately detrimental.

However, with 21 available playgrounds for these nine week summer programs in the township, plus two swimming lakes and twelve tennis courts, usable by township people, the recreational situation during the summer months for the youth appears to be quite adequate and indicative of the township's concern for its youth. B.F.

## The Trenton Scene

The first blush of President Richard Nixon's boldness is gone and in its place is a noticeable sagging of the features of optimism and accord. Legislators, returning from vacations and preparing for the November election, have a second take at the public's reaction, and it has too many soft spots to be comfortable.

The 'freeze' on wages is not balanced by the same chill on rents and food prices, as far as the average wage earner is concerned. The rents and food prices were too high to start with, while the wages were not commensurate with current economic conditions.

The boldness came too late, say the Democrats, who are chortling with glee over the immediate reaction of Labor, the disgust of business, large and small, over the lack for exceptions to the surcharge.

What the legislators of New Jersey know is that the ninety day 'freeze' really isn't a ninety day wonder, to pass in the night as of the last date of that period. It is merely the beginning of a change in the economic structuring of the country. There will be either controls on wages, the cost of living, rents and overall spending, or there will be higher taxes, and economic penalties imposed upon the American people that will be intolerable.

Nothing has changed say the Democrats who will be fighting to replace the Republicans in both houses of the State Legislature. The issues remain economic: the VietNam war; the favoring of the administration of big business; the lack of determination as to transportation, and the inability of anyone to resolve the wel-

fare mess. Add to this the fact that Republicans are being investigated by the U.S. Attorney, as well as Democrats, and the candidates insist that the wheel is beginning to turn.

Republicans laugh all this off. Yes, the issues are the same, but still favoring the administration; still giving the 'ins' a firm stand, than the opponents. ## Senator Williams Speaks

WASHINGTON — U.S. Senator Harrison A. Williams, Jr., (D-N.J.), Chairman of the Senate Securities Subcommittee, asked the Justice Department today to submit, "as quickly as possible" its view on the question of fixed versus negotiated brokerage commission rates on securities transactions.

Williams, who is directing a two-year study of the securities industry by his Subcommittee, made the request in a letter to Richard W. McLaren,

Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Antitrust Division.

He pointed out that Justice has not yet submitted its view on the rate-setting question to the Securities and Exchange Commission, which is currently continuing hearing in connection with new rate structure proposed by the New York Stock Exchange. Previously, the Antitrust Division had favored a switch from fixed to negotiated rates on all orders of \$50,000 or more.

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# Cyrus Truce Is Subject for Keen Observation

NICOSIA, Cyprus — (NEA) — Almost anything could touch off civil war in Cyprus. A goat straying from Greek-Cypriot territory into one of Nicosia's Turkish enclaves could do it. So could a Cypriot of either race who was foolish enough not to halt when challenged by a sentry from the other side.

Only the presence on the island of a 3,000-strong United Nations peace-keeping force, the largest of its kind in the world today, prevents the nightmare of civil war from happening. The island's other calming influence is Archbishop Makarios, president of Cyprus, who is on the side of the doves. His Beatitude definitely pre-

fers "jaw-jaw" to "war-war." During the past two years Makarios has persuaded both sides to sit around the conference table and discuss amendments to the Cyprus constitution, which will safeguard the rights of the Turkish minority and give them representation in government. Since 1963 Turkish-Cypriots have not been represented in parliament, though they are 18 per cent of the island's population).

I suggested to the archbishop in an interview that these intercommunal talks now appear to have broken down, and that no useful purpose will be served by continuing them.

"Not at all," Makarios replies sharply. "I myself am not very happy with the progress that has been made. But the very fact that both sides have agreed to discuss their differences means that they are determined to reach a peaceful solution without resort to arms."

The archbishop is seated behind his desk in the presidential palace. He is bareheaded, and wears a cassock of a deep shade of blue. Without the black pillbox hat and black veil he appears much shorter than I had imagined him.

The hat and veil have made His Beatitude the focal point of every group photograph of

British Commonwealth prime ministers taken in the past 10 years. As a scene stealer the archbishop's only rival is the Lion of Judah, Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia.

I also asked the archbishop if he felt he was torpedoing the talks by raising in recent speeches the issue of "Enosis," the union with Greece that is the dream of every Greek-Cypriot and anathema to the Turkish population.

President Makarios denies that there is anything new in the situation. "Enosis has always been our national aspiration," he explains "but it does not depend on the will of the Greek people of Cyprus."

"It is a matter for Greece and Turkey to discuss for Enosis is unattainable without Turkey's consent."

As he talks the archbishop's eyes dart restlessly around the room. He has a way of narrowing his eyes suddenly, then opening them very wide. Rasputin had eyes like this one feels which is hardly fair to His Beatitude. There is nothing sinister about Archbishop Makarios, though he has the reputation of being cunning.

His view of himself as caretaker of the interest of Cyprus Greek majority has given rise (Continued on Page 15)

to the charge that Makarios suffers from a Messianic complex. In this respect, he resembles the late General Charles de Gaulle, who likewise believed that he had a divine mission to perform. The rise of both men from obscurity has been equally spectacular.

Archbishop Makarios was one of seven brothers whose father was a poor peasant in the region of Paphos. The future archbishop himself tended sheep until, at the age of 13, he was sent as a novice to Kykko monastery. Here his brilliance quickly singled him out for advancement, and he was sent first to school in Nicosia, then to Athens University and, finally, as a scholar of the World Council of Churches, to Boston University's School of Theology. It was while studying at Boston that he was named Bishop of Kitium.

In 1950, at the age of 37, Makarios was elected Archbishop of Cyprus, Cypriots elect their archbishops, which means that the prelates are not only ethnarchs, or heads of the church but political leaders as well. To Makarios fell the historic role of leading his people in their struggle for independence from the British, and becoming the first president of independent Cyprus in 1960.

Does he find it hard to combine the duties of both president and ethnarch? "I do my best to satisfy both masters," he says with a twinkle in his eye, but I'm afraid I don't always succeed."

Ordinarily his work day is a long one, his mornings being taken up with ecclesiastical matters at the archbishopric. His afternoons are usually spent at the presidential palace, a low, rambling, hacienda-type residence which was headquarters for the British when they ran Cyprus as a colony.

The archbishop still has many friends in Boston dating from his student days there from 1946 to 1948. "In 1962 Boston University very kindly made me an honorary Doctor of Divinity," he remarks. "As my studies were cut short when I was made bishop I never did get my degree."

When Makarios stood for reelection as president in February 1968 he received 95.45 per cent of the votes cast.

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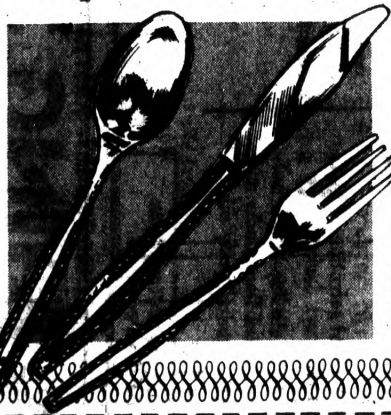
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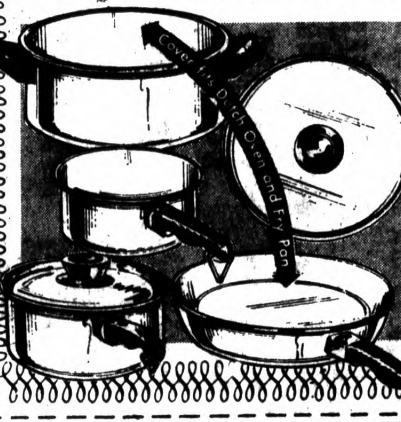
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# Cypriot President Says He's Safe - But Is He?

(First of two related articles.)

NICOSIA, Cyprus — (NEA) — "I do not think there will be a second attempt to assassinate me," Archbishop Makarios, 57, president of the Republic of Cyprus, assures me.

"If there is, it will end in failure," he adds. His Beatitude says this so emphatically that one is almost convinced. Others I have talked to in Nicosia do not, however, share his belief.

It has been a year now since the blue-and-white presidential helicopter, with the archbishop in it, came under machine gun and rifle fire as it took off from the courtyard of the archbishop's palace. The pilot, a Greek army major, was seriously wounded, but Makarios escaped without a scratch.

Four men have since been sentenced to 14 years apiece for their part in the murder plot. But no one, least of all the archbishop, believes that the convicted gunmen were more than the tip of the iceberg. The remaining nine-tenths of the conspiracy lies hidden in the murky depths of Cyprus politics, depths which foreign journalists are not encouraged to probe.

In answer to my questions, Archbishop Makarios admits that the real conspirators are still at large, free to plot and try again. "Not even all the actual executors of the plot were caught by the police," the archbishop says candidly. "I know who they are but there is nothing I can do about it. I have no proof that would stand up in court."

With so many would-be assassins at large, another head of state might be quaking in his boots, but not His Beatitude. To the despair of the men assigned to guard him, he mingles freely with crowds, whether at local churches where he says mass, or at village fairs which he officially opens.

Even the security arrangements at the presidential palace leave much to be desired, though an armed sentinel passed at regular intervals the ground-floor window of the president's office where we sat talking.

The consequences of Makarios' death would be so frightful as to deter even the most hardened terrorist. In the reasoning of those who refuse to take security precautions seriously.

The murder of the archbishop, it is argued, would plunge Cyprus into a bloodbath, with the island's 100,000 Turkish-Cypriots standing a good chance of being wiped out by the Greek-Cypriot population, which outnumbered them five to one.

Turkey would not sit idly and watch her co-religionists being slaughtered, but would start dropping bombs on Cyprus from bases 40 miles away. Inevitably, Greece would retaliate. For these reasons, not even a madman would want to touch a hair on the archbishop's head, or so the line of reasoning goes.

Yet the unthinkable came within an ace of succeeding on March 8, 1970. Four gunmen armed with a Bren gun and M-1 rifles had staked themselves out on a school rooftop over-

looking the archbishop's palace and, as his helicopter arose from the courtyard, they opened fire.

The bullets hit the pilot sitting next to Makarios and, although blood began to stream from his wounds, he managed to land the chopper in a nearby vacant lot. The pilot, clutching his abdomen, staggered out and fell. His Beatitude, unscathed, knelt beside him until help arrived.

That same morning police searched the home of Poly-

carpos Yorkadjis, until recently minister of the interior, and found two Smith and Wesson revolvers. Five days later, Yorkadjis was removed from a plane about to take off for Beirut. But he was still not arrested.

Exactly one week after the attempt on Makarios' life, the ex-minister of the interior was lured to his death on a deserted road four miles east of Nicosia. Since then, a veil of secrecy has been drawn over the conspiracy.

This has not prevented embarrassing questions from being asked. Were other government ministers involved in the plot, and if so, which ones? Or did the orders come from Athens, where the archbishop's rival, General Grivas, has been hatching anti-Makarios plots?

So fantastic have the rumors grown that I have even been told in all confidence that it was British intelligence which tried to bump off the archbishop.

In the hopes of shedding more

light on the plot, I talked to Tassos Papadopoulos, 39, former minister of labor and now a member of the Cyprus parliament, who was Yorkadjis' best friend. The two men joined the Cypriot underground movement against the British in the late 1950s, and spent 18 months in the same hideout in Nicosia while British police hunted for them.

"Yorkadjis was not the mastermind behind the plot to murder Archbishop Makarios," Papadopoulos maintains.

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Copy is the vehicle by which you communicate with your prospect. The right choice of words can encourage, stimulate, and entice a reader right on the spot. Every ad should:

- 1—Attract Attention
- 2—Arouse Interest
- 3—Create Desire
- 4—Inspire Confidence
- 5—Induce Action

Be concise—Don't waste words. Be brief and to the point in your description, but do.

Be exact—the abbreviation which may save lines and money is often unreadable and discourages your prospect before he has a chance to find out what you have to offer.

Be convincing—Your accurate and honest description, without trite cliches, goes a long way toward making the reader believe in you and in what you're trying to sell.

Tell the whole story—Give the reader as much information as possible. List the outstanding features and advantages and identify yourself. If you offer cash discounts or any other purchase terms, include such information in your ad.

In copywriting for Classified ads, choose words carefully and make each one do a selling job. One story, destined to become a legend in Classified copy writing concerns a woman whose ad for Siamese kittens ran for days on end, with no results at all. Two words brought an avalanche of calls. She simply changed her copy to read "Box Trained." That's an advantage, a selling point, the small-but-mighty difference between making a sale and not making a sale.

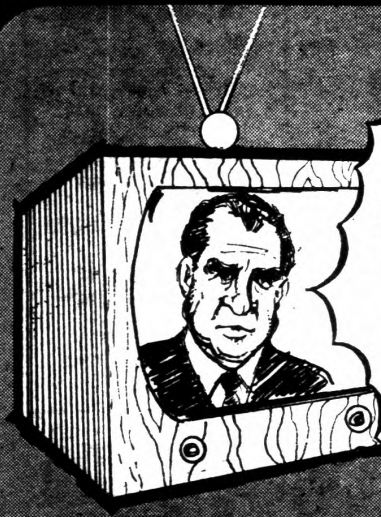
Finally, use this checklist before you release any ad.

1. Is the copy complete?  
How many benefits have you listed?  
(The one you omit might be the sales point)
2. Is the ad accurate?
3. Use as few abbreviations as possible.
4. Have you identified yourself?
5. Can your prospect get in touch with you?  
(Make appointment details clear)
6. Do you mention price, if possible?
7. Have you invited him to see and buy?

up in the air; little if anything has been done by the administration to develop plans for transportation. In fact the Democrats insist that conditions are the same, after fourteen months, as those left by the departing Governor Hughes regime.

Even if the bold strokes of the President of the United States take a firm hold on the economy of the country, the majority of legislators, both Republican and Democrat, insist it will take more than ninety days. It may benefit President

Richard Nixon who is seeking re-election in 1973, but it certainly will not help those wanting to return to public office in November of 1971.

How will the public stand up to threatened dock strikes, the adamant stand of labor against the sanctions proposed by the President's decree, and the fact that food prices are still too high.

What will be done about the inability of the unemployed to become employed. Labor insists that the unemployment problem is linked closely to the aim of big

business to become completely automated. Our lines are thinned, says Labor, because, everything possible is being done to eliminate the worker.

Of course, this is legitimate unemployment. But the other side of the coin is the unemployables. Many of these people are escapees from reality via welfare according to Labor.

These are the matters which must be knocked down and replaced by an optimistic report, if the Republican legislators are to be returned to office in November. This

they know, and this they are prepared to face, according to Republican leadership.

Governor William Cahill will lead the Republicans in the coming election campaign. He has pledged active support, but only in those areas where he has confidence in the candidates seeking re-election. This would mean if we are to interpret properly, that in some instances, the administration isn't too happy with the publicity engendered by the United States Attorney's office. Could this mean Atlantic County as well?

BE IT ORDAINED by the Municipal Council of the Township of Wayne in the County of Passaic, New Jersey, that not more than two-thirds of all the members thereof affirmative concurring) as follows:

**SECTION 1.** The improvement or purpose described in Section 3 of this Bond Ordinance is hereby authorized as a general improvement to be made or acquired by the Township of Wayne in the County of Passaic, New Jersey. For the said improvement or purpose stated in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$72,000 said sum being inclusive of all appropriations heretofore made therefor and including the sum of \$3,500 as the down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provision in a budget or budgets of the Township previously adopted.

(c) The estimated cost of said purpose is \$72,600 the excess thereof over the said estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of the said \$3,500 down payment for said purpose.

**SECTION 4.** The following matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

(a) The said purpose described in Section 3 of this Bond Ordinance is not a current expense and is a property or improvement which the Township may lawfully acquire or make as a general improvement and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.

(b) The period of usefulness of said purpose, within the limitations of said Local Bond Law and according to the reasonable life thereof, is 5 years.

(c) The supplemental debt statement required by said Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Township Clerk and a complete executed duplicate original thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Finance in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey, and such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in said Law is increased by this Bond Ordinance by \$69,100 and that the said obligations authorized by this Bond Ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Law.

(d) The aggregate amount of not exceeding \$12,000 for items of ex-

pense permitted under Section 40A:2-22 of said Law has been included in the foregoing estimate of the cost of said improvement for purpose.

**SECTION 5.** The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the said obligations authorized by this Bond Ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township and the Township shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Township for the payment of said obligations and interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

**SECTION 6.** This Bond Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final passage, as prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

A similar memo issued to department heads forbidding them to speak directly to members of the council was soundly criticized by the nine council members who said direct communications between themselves and the department heads is essential to the conduct of township business.

Several councilmen complained that requests for information routed through the administrative offices have gone unanswered for several months.

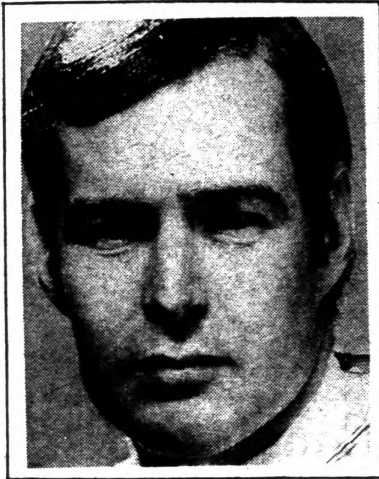

West Milford, Wanaque, Ringwood, Bloomingdale, and part of Wayne Township. Contiguous municipalities in Morris County to be served by the

plant; are Kippelon, Riverdale, and Butler, while Oakland and parts of Mahwah Township in Bergen County are included in the proposed plan.

In Wayne, Mayor Newton Miller has expressed strong opposition to the project with councilmen in parties concurring in the fight. A major battle concerning the sewage project is expected.

In several of the municipalities, the proposed regional treatment plant will solve septic tank problems and eliminate small treatment plants now serving individual housing developments.

The planning loan is made available out of a loan fund created from the \$271 million Water Conservation Bond Issue of 1969.

## ADVICE TO THE LOVE LAWN

Lawn owners rejoice! Several years ago the first great disease resistant bluegrass came on the scene. This bluegrass was given the common name, Merion. Merion Blue revolutionized the grass industry by allowing for the greatest degree of permanence ever achieved. ## Family Planning Program Funded

Family Planning Health Services that aim at the prevention of unwanted babies, teaching better and heal thier spacing of children, better contraceptive methods and other training aimed at delivery of Family Planning Health Services for the medically indigent have moved a step forward this week for the State of New Jersey.

"Through the dedication and much time and energy put forth by the Essex County Board of Freeholders in meeting a deadline of the U.S. Department HEW newly funded proposal of \$211,509 for the first eight months of the Family Planning of New Jersey and particularly through the unceasing efforts of Director - Freeholder Dr. Wynona M. Lipman and Freeholder Thomas H. Cooke, Jr., the official headquarters of the newly formed State-Wide, 21-County Family

Planning Program of New Jersey will be located at the Essex County Geriatrics Center in Belleville — a health complex" stated Dr. Sylvia Herz, Chairman of the Site Committee and member of the Family Programs Executive Committee.

Dr. Herz has been working with the Freeholders HEW regional officials and David Cohen, Acting Program Coordinator in securing and developing the Essex County site as the State headquarters for the program. Dr. Herz also stated that Dr. Watson Neiman, Assistant Commissioner of the State Department of the Health have offered office space for some personnel of the Family Program at the State Health Building in Trenton as an auxiliary office of the family project.

From its temporary quarters in Newark the core staff will officially be moving into its new

quarters in Belleville at the Essex County Geriatrics Center on Thursday, July 29th.

The program is the first coordinated State-Wide Family Planning Program in the county to be administered by an independent, non-profit corporation and will service New Jersey's 21-Counties. The Board is 51 percent consumers.

The newly funded Family Planning will provide training and technical assistance to help local committees develop new family planning health services. The program will also seek to coordinate new programs with existing ones. Continued administrative and staff training will also be provided. A state-wide computer data system will be developed to handle patient records, appointments, and statistical information.

Family Planning will also serve as the financial channel for HEW funds to several recently funded local programs. These include Hudson County Family Planning, Inc., Atlantic City Hospital, OCEAN, Inc. and the Hoboken Model Cities Administration.

The program will be governed by a 63 member Board of Trustees beside representation of consumers from all the counties. The board will represent health oriented agencies and providers of family planning services. These agencies include the State Departments of Health

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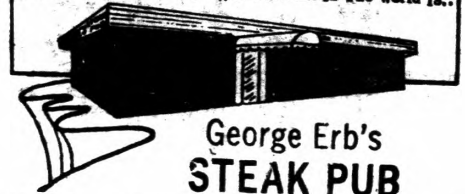

## Jones: Montclair's Big Center

UPPER MONTCLAIR — Although he rarely gets the headlines, Montclair State College's outstanding center, Ernie Jones of Newark (N. J.), is one of the keys to the Indians power packed running game.

Jones, 6-3 and 210 pounds of blocking dynamite, came to the Indians from Weequahic High School's 1967 City League championship team.

Last year, his first full season as the Indians starting center, Jones played a key role in Montclair State's fine 9-1

record and a thrilling 7-6 win in the Knute Rockne Bowl over Hampden Sydney (Va.).

Coach Clary Anderson is very high on his big pivotman. "At 6-3 and 210 pounds, Ernie leads his team out of the huddle with confidence and stability. He gets a good snap off at the precise moment to set the play off correctly", the highly successful Indians coach points out.

Last year the Indians set two all-time records in rushing — most yards rushing, (single

game) 431 against Glassboro State and most yards rushing (single season) 2330. Jones and his offensive line teammates can take great pride in statistics because they made it all possible.

Laboring in the center of an offensive line rarely draws much attention and like most centers Jones doesn't worry about it. "Nobody has to tell you when you have made a good block, you know it yourself," Jones says.

Last year the opposition got to the Montclair State quarterback only seven times in ten games, a figure that Jones and the offensive line like to point to.

Anderson believes that Jones, a durable, hustling leader, will make an outstanding teacher and coach.

Jones does all the difficult tasks of a center, snaps on punts and extra points, with the poise of a veteran. Working with guards like Jerry Caputo and Jules Gefic, Jones is an outstanding blocker on all angle, trap and roll blocks and the timing of the Indians interior lineman is a thing of beauty to watch.

Anderson, who has never had a losing season in 29 years of football coaching, knows what makes a running game go. Jones is the type of linemish

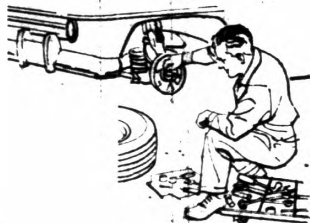
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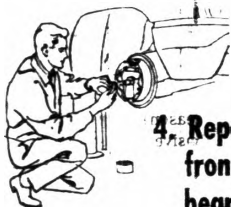

In the semi-final action held this week, Pinecliff and Lakeland defeated Shop-Rite and

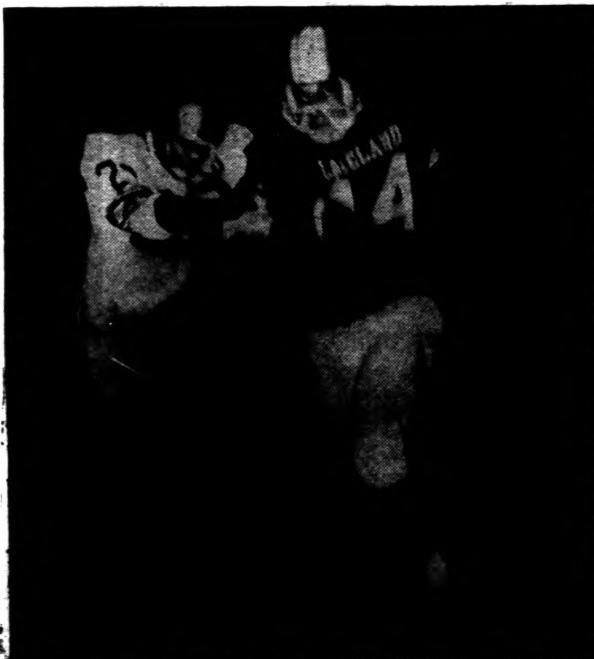
Bearfort to advance to the finals. Monday night, Lakeland defeated Bearfort 5-1 and Pinecliff downed Shop-Rite 12-4.

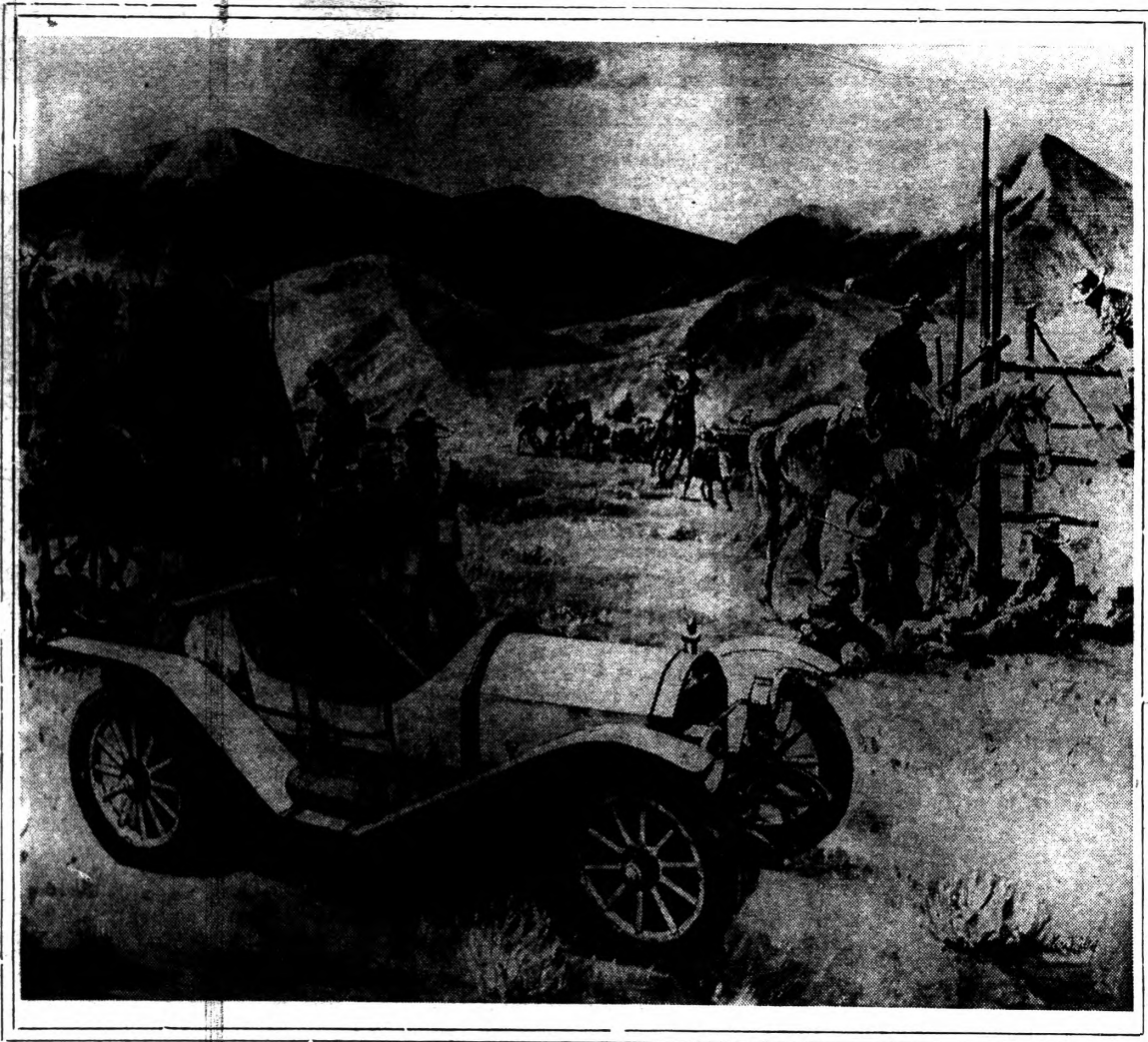

# Birthright: Pregnant Thought Bearing New Alternative

The fourth "emergency pregnancy counseling service" opened its doors on July 1 to all "distressed, pregnant women throughout the state".

Known as Birthright, the organization is headed by Mrs. Betty Yerkes of Denville. Mrs. Yerkes or Betty as she prefers to be called, originally heard about the Birthright program from Mary Lertola of Morristown, Chairman of the Morris County Right to Life Committee. She says, "After Mary explained the Birthright program to me I immediately decided to become involved. I discussed the Birthright program with my husband Joseph, a Senior Relay Technician with New Jersey Power and Light. Together we decided that I resign my job as a secretary at Bell Laboratories, Whippany, N.J. and become the unsalaried Di-

rector of the Birthright Office in this area. I contacted Mr. Ralph V. Martin of Wayne, a member of the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Right

to Life Committee and Chairman of the Tri-County Chapter Right to Life, and volunteered my services. I accepted the responsibility of setting up an office in the tri-county area covering Morris, Sussex and Passaic counties.

"We believe that with our nation's resources and medical knowledge, care can be given to all the living—the aged, the poor, the sick, and the handicapped. Our goal is to guarantee that the opportunity to life is open to all," Dr. Palmer said.

"In its simplest terms, the National Right to Life Committee is interested in supporting and protecting all human life," he added.

Utilizing education as their cornerstone, the committee states what Dr. Palmer describes as "a people-to-people approach." They reach through their Speakers' Bureau, through

from Westminster Theological Seminary and his ThD from the Free University of Amsterdam.

Aside from his instructional career, Dr. Palmer is a noted author and has served three pastorates in Michigan. He presently is the Executive Secretary of an International Bible Translation called A Contemporary Translation (ACT).

The philosophy behind both the committee the chapters, which have subsequently formed in thirty states, is that "Everyone has a right to life," according to New Jersey Chairman Dr. Edwin H. Palmer.

"We are for human life— all human life," Dr. Palmer states, "and against killing— all killing— by any means."

Dr. Palmer, of Wayne, said that the New Jersey Right to Life Committee will organize offices in every county in the state.

The state-wide organization presently numbers some 4,000 active members, who, Dr. Palmer said, represent a broad cross section of interests and backgrounds. "Our members are from all religious persuasions, political affiliations, ethnic backgrounds, and professions," the chairman stated.

Dr. Palmer, who has been an instructor in Systematic Theology at Westminster Theological Seminary, explained that the group is seeking to educate people to the fact that liberated by the Bethany Christian Home, Inc., a social service agency of various evangelical protestant churches. Betty says, "Miss Priscilla Galbraith, a caseworker with Bethany Christian Home and Mr. Harold Wiersma, a social worker with the Home are actively involved with the New Jersey Right to Life movement. Because of their interest in the preservation of the life of the unborn child, they discussed the Birthright program with Mr. Hudson J. Nyenhuis, Director of the Home and asked about the possibility of donating an office rent free to Birthright. Mr. Nyenhuis approached the Board of Directors of Bethany with this proposal. The members of the Board enthusiastically approved donating the office and also offered the servitized abortion laws are not a remedy but only an expedience. Abortion is after the fact. The same end can be achieved through family planning.

This Birthright Office, located at 475 High Mountain Road in North Haledon, is being donated of their entire staff."

The office is staffed with nine to twelve volunteers, each of whom will be trained to handle emergency calls from distressed, pregnant girls or women.

Training seminars are conducted by a doctor, attorney, clergyman, narcotics expert, social worker, psychologist and others. The volunteer staff includes housewives, teachers, and nurses, categories which proved most successful in the Canadian operation.

Betty explained. "Birthright is a telephone counseling setup for pregnant women, married as well as single, regardless of race, creed, marital, or economic standing. Medical, legal, and psychological counseling from professionals who have volunteered their services will be available. We will do anything in our power to help a distressed, pregnant woman who contacts us."

Funding of the group will be through the Committee. Betty claims monthly expenditures will run about \$50.00, the major portion of which will go for telephone and related costs. Visitors are guaranteed the utmost confidence.

"Birthright", says Betty "offers love, friendship and understanding as alternatives to abortions and there isn't any charge for our services. Few girls know all the alternatives. Abortion isn't the only one after failure of contraceptives. We will inform them of maternity homes, places where they can continue their education even while pregnant, clinics giving free medical care (including pre and post-natal care) and a multitude of available government benefits. Basically, we want to

remove the stigma and fears associated with unwanted or illegitimate pregnancies. We want to help these women remain healthy and to produce children who are sound in body and mind. We have private homes where a pregnant girl will be treated as a member of the family; some families will pay a weekly stipend for baby sitting services and light household chores. We will help girls obtain jobs if needed; we will fulfill the needs and wishes of the pregnant girl."

"We'll take care of as many women as contact us", said Betty. "We don't intend to overlap or duplicate the work of other welfare agencies. When a woman calls, we will assume she is contemplating an abortion and we will counsel her as much as possible to dissuade her from doing so. Our office will be opened Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. and Saturday from 7:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. Any girl or woman who is distressed by a pregnancy or the thought of a possible pregnancy should phone us at (201) 427-5142. Our office is easy to reach by public or private transportation and above all, we guarantee the utmost confidence. Should a girl desire to leave the area, we can provide shelter homes through other Birthright Offices which presently exist not only in New Jersey and Canada but also in 28 other states as well as Great Britain, France, Germany, and Australia."

"We believe that with our nation's resources and medical knowledge, care can be given to all the living—the aged, the poor, the sick, and the handicapped. Our goal is to guarantee that the opportunity to life is open to all," Dr. Palmer said.

# DIALOGUE: an open forum for public opinion

Each week on this page, the opinions of citizens in New Jersey are aired on various topics. Editorial space is available for responsible spokesmen of various viewpoints on national, state or local issues. This week's guest editorial is written by Walter Hoffmann, a member of the Wayne Township Council. Mr. Hoffmann's interests and activities have often caused him to speak out on some of the larger issues confronting this nation, including the war in Viet Nam, poverty, and international cooperation. Mr. Hoffmann has recently returned from a conference in Yugoslavia.

## A Time for Peace

This editorial advances the proposition that the United Nations should be strengthened.

Twenty six years ago the United Nations was created in order "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war." The United Nations, as presently constituted, lacks the power and authority to accomplish this purpose. The Viet Nam war, the Arab-Israeli conflict, and the nuclear proliferation are convincing testimony

to the fact that the UN is powerless to stop major conflagrations.

Unenforceable resolutions by the General Assembly, no matter how just or how noble, will not prevent war. Both the practical experience of the last twenty six years and our own common sense tells us that this is so.

The undersigned submits that the UN must be considerably strengthened if it is to have any chance at all of ending the scourge of war. Here is how I believe the UN should be strengthened:

First, membership in the UN should be automatic for existing governments. We cannot achieve peace if a large portion of the world has no representation.

Second, the big power veto in the Security Council should be abolished and a more equitable system of voting should be provided in its place in the General Assembly. The veto has long been a stumbling

block to peace; but you cannot expect the large powers to relinquish the veto without some increase in their representation in the General Assembly.

Third, the General Assembly should be given authority to legislate in certain areas that affect the peace of the world. Disarmament is clearly one of those areas.

Fourth, the General Assembly should be given authority to raise revenue to finance its peacekeeping operations. Without finances, no organization can be expected to operate successfully.

Fifth, the Secretary General should have a permanent mediation and conciliation service to mediate disputes as they arise. We have trained mediators in labor disputes. Why not a permanent staff of trained mediators for the UN?

Sixth, the World Court should be given compulsory jurisdiction over international legal disputes and its decrees should be enforceable upon individuals as well as nations. What a mockery of justice it would be in this country if a party to a dispute could refuse to accept the jurisdiction of a Court!

Seventh, the United Nations should be given a permanent "standby" peacekeeping force. Like a fire department, it should have the mobility and the apparatus to put out a fire quickly whenever and wherever it starts.

Eighth, the United Nations should be given the authority to effectuate gradual step by step universal disarmament of the nation states. This may take about ten years, but it is one of the essential keys to peace.

In 1945 we gave to the United Nations the task of preserving world peace. But I submit that we failed to give the UN the tools with which to do that job. Luckily we have survived through a quarter century of crises and wars. Before it is too late, the UN should be given the authority and the power to effectuate peace.

Do you believe that the United Nations is capable of establishing world peace, as it was intended to?

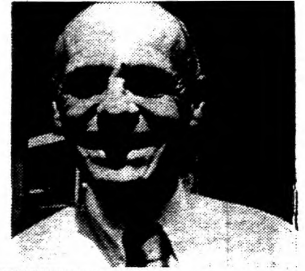

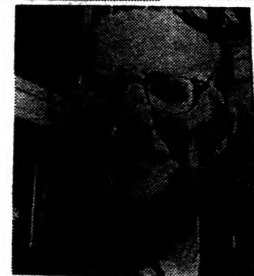

Each week, we see the problem of worthless checks increase.

We see more and more people who knowingly give merchants checks that they know are not any good in exchange for merchandise. These are the people, according to Municipal Judge James Murner, who do not feel that they have to work for a living. They feel that they are not like the rest of us that have to live within our means — they can live well above their means by simply defrauding others.

The judge has stated that he intends to put a dent in this "paper plague" that is costing us all money. These people along with the shoplifters are making the rest of us pay more for our goods. The merchants have to employ an entire army of security people for which we are all paying. Plus, we are paying more due to the losses suffered by the

merchants in goods offered for sale. The merchant will not stay in business if he does not make a profit, and if he has to increase his costs due to the extra employees and the loss of goods — we will all pay more.

Not only does it cost us all money in the increased cost of goods, but it is costing us, the taxpayers money in that our police and courts are kept busy taking care of all the cases that come from there.

We congratulate our municipal judge, James Murner, for being the toughest judge in the state on shoplifters. Where other judges give fines of \$25 or \$50, Judge Murner does not think in terms of less than \$250 for the first offense. After that it is \$500 and/or jail. And, he is now starting to get tough on the bad check writers. This week, he sent a man to jail for issuing a series of bad checks given to Wayne merchants.

We are, like the judge, hoping that when the people realize that they are up against a tough judge, it will help to contain the problem.

On Wednesday, Judge Murner commented that he is also an addict . . . he is addicted to sweets. The attorney thereupon answered, with a laugh, that if he had known, he would have brought the judge a chocolate bar.

"Counsellor, you are a piece of work," answered the judge. (The lawyer had previously told the judge that he had spent three hours in the cathedral while his Volkswagon was being fixed.)

"That sneeze is the greatest defense in the history of the law," said Judge James Murner to a lawyer defending a youth charged with malicious damage. The youth was charged as he had allegedly gone to a man's home to borrow records from the daughter known to him. The youth unable to get a response banked on the door and somehow managed to kick a hole in the front door.

The lawyer for the defense argued that the youth had not deliberately done this — rather he was in the process of knocking on the door when he had a sneezing attack. Travel Across

After crossing this magnificent country I was at a loss for words. For these years I had somehow believed that one state was just like another, that if you saw New Jersey, you saw the country. I was wrong. New Jersey is not the United States. It does not contain the wonders of the Grand Canyon, or the bigness of the Boulder Dam, or the wide open spaces of Wyoming.

In fact, New Jersey does not really rate on the list of the most beautiful and desirable states in the union. When I was growing up, no one had a real desire to see the United States. The boys and girls of the 50's

went to school, got their college degrees, went into service, came out and made a mad dash to get going in their favorite careers. When marriage came, the place to honeymoon was in the Caribbean and from that time on, one vacation after another was spent, leaving the United States.

I consider that a real mistake. There can be no country in the world as beautiful, as diversified, or as magnificent, as the United States. When you

travel, you see young boys and girls, with packs on their backs, hitch-hiking across this great nation. They are out there to see their country and they travel as cheaply as possible. I think it is wonderful that they will grow up appreciating the wonders of this country.

SPIRIT OF AMERICA

No words better express the spirit of America than the song "America the Beautiful." "For spacious skies, for amber waves of grain, for purple mountains majesty, above the fruited plain." Yes, God did shed his grace on thee. I can think of no more rewarding way of restoring faith in this nation, than to travel it absorbing its magnificent wonders.

It took us about a week to make it to California. Traveling thru Pennsylvania on Route 80, was tiresome. The country is boring as you pass thru the Allegheny Mountains. We skirted the cities of Youngstown and Scranton.

Ohio was the same kind of country, flat with gently rolling farmlands. Then we came into South Bend, Indiana with its fertile flat farm lands and mile upon mile of open country, clear and alive. Next we skirted Chicago on our way to Iowa. Illinois is rich with farmlands of grain and corn. For the first time we saw cattle grazing in large numbers and industrial sights, as we passed thru many towns of different sizes. In Des Moines, Iowa, we found a liberal daily newspaper which actually criticized Chief Justice Warren Burger's statements on the New York Times release of the Pentagon Papers.

STIRRING SIGHTS

One of the first stirring sights of the trip was the approach to Denver, Colorado. It is here that the great plains and the towering Rocky Mountains come together. After hours and hours of miles and miles of flat land, the Rocky Mountains spring into sight right at the entrance to Denver. This city in Colorado is an exciting, cosmopolitan community of 520,000 people, with fine restaurants, excellent hotels and motels. It is the home of universities and is clean and attractive in every way.

We visited the beautiful Rocky Mountain National Park, with its roaring rapids and it's magnificent mountain peaks rising against the clearest, blue skies. Estes Park is the center of activity in the Rockies, teaming with young people and tourists. This thriving community, located right in the Rocky Mountains, had snow capped mountains during a Hot July day.

From there it was on to Cheyenne, Wyoming. This city known for its frontier days, is the most western town we visited. The old Union and Pacific Railroad Depot, built in the late 1800's, stands as a monument to the days of Cowboys and Indians. With a population of only 48,000 Cheyenne still appears as the last outpost in a desolate non-habitable area. There are only about 200,000 people in all of Wyoming.

But, despite its small population, Wyoming is an incredibly beautiful state. Its mountains are multi-colored and shaped by nature with chisel-like precision. There are numerous canyons and crevices formed by gushing rivers and windstorms making Wyoming one of the most scenic states we encountered. We visited a ghost town with a cemetery dating back to the frontier days when Indians and the wild west must have taken its toll of the pioneers.

In Utah, where the mountains towered above us and the topography changed drastically. It must have been here that the great Cowboy and Indian pictures were filmed. Utah resembles all of those mountain ranges in the Hopalong Cassidy, Gene Autry and Roy Rogers films. The pass where the Indians ambushed the Cavalry is right there in Utah along with the steep cliffs where the stagecoach goes flying off into the canyon below. It is here that the author of "Don't Fence Me In" must have written his song.

SONG OF THE LAND

"Oh give me land, lot's of land, under starry skies above,  
Don't fence me in. Let me ride thru the wide open country that I love, don't fence me in.

Let me be by myself in the evening breeze and listen to the murmur of the cotton wood trees.

Send me off forever, but I ask you please, Don't fence me in."

Driving thru Wyoming and Utah can only conjure up memories of that song. This is wide open country, sparsely populated and wild as the wind. No city slicker could stand the

From there we journeyed down scenic 101, past the Big Sur, Carmel, Monterey and into Los Angeles where we stopped at Disneyland. Ricky and Leslie were enthralled by the park, but the lines resembled the Chow Hall at Fort Dix.

is nothing about Missouri that stands out. We traveled through St. Louis, a big city with a population of 720,000. Then on thru Terre Haute, Indiana, noted for its coal mining. Originally inhabited by the French, this state is composed of big towns, small towns, industrial centers and rich agricultural communities. It reminds me of Illinois, insofar as its extremes. Then on through Ohio, Wheeling, West Virginia, Pennsyl-

But when we stopped at camp sites Ricky hooked up the electricity and the water, Leslie helped make the chow and set the table. It was a good trip and we're looking forward to more of the same after 26 days of living in a "Mini-Home."

loneliness and the silence of this country. But what beauty, what open skies and what good, clean mountain air. And it's in the same country as New Jersey, but it's the United States in it's most natural form.

Up the steep mountain side we climb and just as it looks as if the ride will never end, and the ascent becomes a chore for the camper, "what to our wondering eyes should appear?" but Salt Lake City right in the middle of Nomad country. This city, founded by Brigham Young, retains all of the flavor and tradition of the Mormons. A statue of the great leader stands in the center of town and the biggest, most beautiful buildings are those of the Mormon Church. We spoke with the Mormon as he changed the oil in our vehicle and were impressed by his courtesy and his crusading conviction in his religion.

Less than 30-minutes away from these great mountains is one of the hottest, driest places in this country — the Great Salt Lake Desert. A few minutes out of Salt Lake City we visited the saltiest body of water on earth, walking in the salty lake where cuts stung and Leslie fell down after tripping on the salt base. We drove thru the desert seeing nothing; not even cactus, nothing but barren, hot, steaming land.

### UNLIMITED SPEED

The speed limit on Route 80, in the west is anywhere from 70 to unlimited. The police do not bother speeders, but are there to help motorists in trouble instead. In states like Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and Nevada, tickets are not given out to speeding highway drivers, rather you are encouraged to travel as fast as you can. And of all the campers on the road, Jerry Atkins will be delighted to know, that his Open Road Chevie, performed best. We passed Campers everywhere, up hills and mountains, never having any problems with the gushing wind, or the steep grades.

As far as we are concerned, there is only one way to travel and that is by camper. Just as Jerry said, we saved a lot of

money by cooking in the camper. The refrigerator allowed us to buy in supermarkets and stock up for days. My kids were saved by the JON, which meant no stopping at gas stations and restaurants to rest up. With beds, comfortable for four, we were able to find camp sites all over the west. It was not necessary to plan ahead for sleeping facilities, the camps were everywhere along the highway, at a cost of between \$2.00 and \$3.50 a night.

Everywhere we traveled campers dominated the road. There were all kinds and shapes and styles of campers. Americans are on the move, following the European tradition of seeing as much as possible, for as little as possible. When we reached Nevada, it was funny to see "One-Arm Bandits" in the restaurants. Reno is a honky, tonk; bright lights and gambling town. It has an exciting flavor which is unlike anything here in the east. We dropped a few dollars in the "Bandits" early one morning. The Casinos never close.

Finally, out to California through Lake Tahoe and some of the most beautiful sights of the trip. The splendor of the Donner Pass simply awed us. We descended into the fertile Sacramento Valley while getting a number of scares as we wound around some of the sharpest turns, upon some of the sheerest cliffs of the journey.

California strikes out with its contrasting brown grass and green trees and rolling mountains. It is a beautiful state, bright and clear, with smog in the northern part, just plenty of fog. San Francisco is the smallest, large city in the United States. With a population of 750,000 it is possible to walk from one end of the city to the other. Restaurants abound in the center of the city. It is the tourist mecca of the west with crowds of people gaping in downtown San Francisco during the weekends. But it's alive and vibrant and young and on the move.

at the Grand Canyon. There is no way to describe this sight.

It is just unbelievable. We traveled through the Navajo Nation and saw Indian Reservations, where real poverty abounds. Many Indians live today as they did centuries ago in one-room mud-huts while others live in apparent comfort. My children looked in awe at the great Meteorite Canyon in Arizona, where a falling star dug out a tremendous hole in the ground, the size of three football fields. We also saw the Petrified Forest, with its trees turned to stone, the Painted Desert of multi colored mountains and trees, and the majesty of Zion National Park. There is no way of recounting the beauty of these sights, one more beautiful than the other.

### ALBUQUERQUE MUD

From Arizona to New Mexico, and on into Albuquerque, where believe it or, not we got stuck in mud, as I tried to make a U-turn. The Automobile Club membership helped here as a Gas Station responded to my urgent pleas, towed me out and charged nothing. There we were, up to our knees in Albuquerque mud. The "Old City is a square of the most charming, exquisite shops we visited on the trip, gas lights and all. We washed clothes in Amarillo, Texas, that is Ellen did, while Ricky and I went looking for a toy. The cashier said "thank you-all" to Ricky. He got a kick out of that, could not understand the accent and wondered how he, an 8-year old, could be mistaken for "all."

Oklahoma City is the huge bustling, bustling and cosmopolitan capital of Oklahoma with a population of 435,000. Ellen sang Oklahoma as we came into the city and we lunched at an interesting "Steak Restaurant" where my children stocked up with FREE after dinner mints, hand full after hand full, with Leslie getting the lions share. Tulsa did not have the oil derricks we looked for, though it is known as the "Oil Capital of the World. The derricks are outside the city.

From Oklahoma we went on to Missouri. Somehow, there

## Spotlighting Edward Likman, Speech Pathologist

His shingle reads, "Edward Likman, Speech Pathologist," which is a puzzle to most uninformed people but in reality, he is a Myo-functional Therapist, which is guaranteed to confuse anyone passing his office. For the average person who does not have need for his services, Edward Likman remains puzzle but for those people who go to him for treatment he is a skilled practitioner.

The patients who pass through his door range in age from 4 to 68 years. He is also a staff member of several nursing homes in the area. Some of his patients are tongue thrusters who have forced their teeth out of line and in some cases find it impossible to swallow without exerting pressure against the teeth. Those of more advanced age have lost their natural teeth and cannot use their dentures with comfort because of weak oral facial muscles. These are the people who seek help from him, help that is available only through the referral by the patient's dentist, orthodontist or medical doctor.

"I don't take patients in off the street," he explained. "They must be referred by a professional person because we must work in close cooperation in order to correct the condition of the patient. There is one other requirement, also. The patient must have the will to correct whatever fault he has."

Of the younger patients who come to him for treatment can correct their problems through his therapy alone; others need the help of orthodontists or

other professionals. A scrapbook in his office shows the dramatic results of his treatment. Youngsters with protruding teeth, faulty bites, and other problems show reasonably normal appearances, as a result of his work alone but most of them with the help of their orthodontists.

"The structure of the mouth is a complicated one," he said, "and the most versatile muscle on the body, the tongue, is located there. An understanding of the function and the working of the tongue demonstrates why so many children today have problems with their mouths."

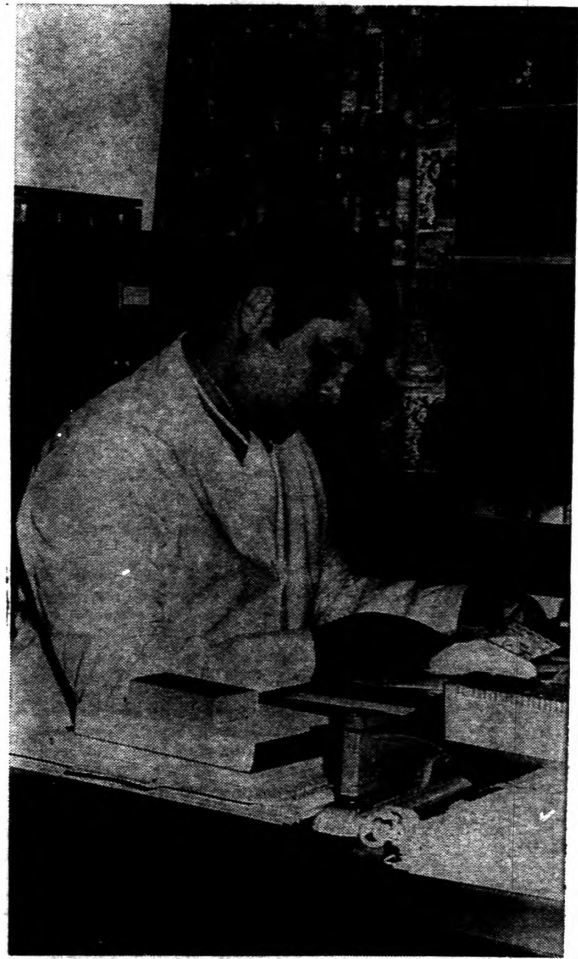
Studies show that children who are bottle fed are more prone to mouth problems. "I have never yet had a child who was breast fed walk through my office door," Ed stated. "Let me demonstrate why." Taking a nursing nipple manufactured by a well-known American company, he held it next to an "exerciser" made by a German company. To the average person, the "exerciser" appears to be nothing more than a pacifier. It is, on closer examination, quite different. While the pacifier has a hard rubber nipple that is more than an inch long, the exerciser is made of a thinner material, is flatter in appearance and aids the child in a sucking action, closer to the type of sucking a child would do at his mother's breast.

"The sucking action teaches the child correct swallowing," Ed said. "The milk comes into the mouth only if the child works for it; it does not come out in spurts as it does with a

hard rubber nipple. The tongue is in the correct position, pushing against the hard bony palate. The hard rubber nipple causes the child to push his tongue forward. The middle of his tongue collapses and the back of the tongue rises to the roof of the mouth. The result is a slingshot effect. The milk shoots into the infant's throat, giving him a faulty swallowing action. All of this incorrect swallowing is the forerunner of mouth problems. You swallow on an average of 2,000 times each day. If you swallow incorrectly, you are bringing as much as 12,000 pounds of pressure to bear on those front teeth and young adults have these problems."

Treatment in Ed's skilled hands does not involve the use of any appliances. The therapy consists of special exercises designed to strengthen the facial muscles and enable them to withstand the pressure of the tongue, while at the same time, correcting the pressure caused by tongue thrust. The treatment enables the dental practitioner to work on a muscularly balanced mouth.

"I want to make it clear that my treatment is not a panacea. It is one small way of treating only one type of problem. My treatment will not take the place of orthodontia if such work is needed. My treatment will, however, make the work of the dental practitioner a little bit easier in many cases. That is the reason why I work on referrals and with the full cooperation and knowledge of the patient's dental practitioner."

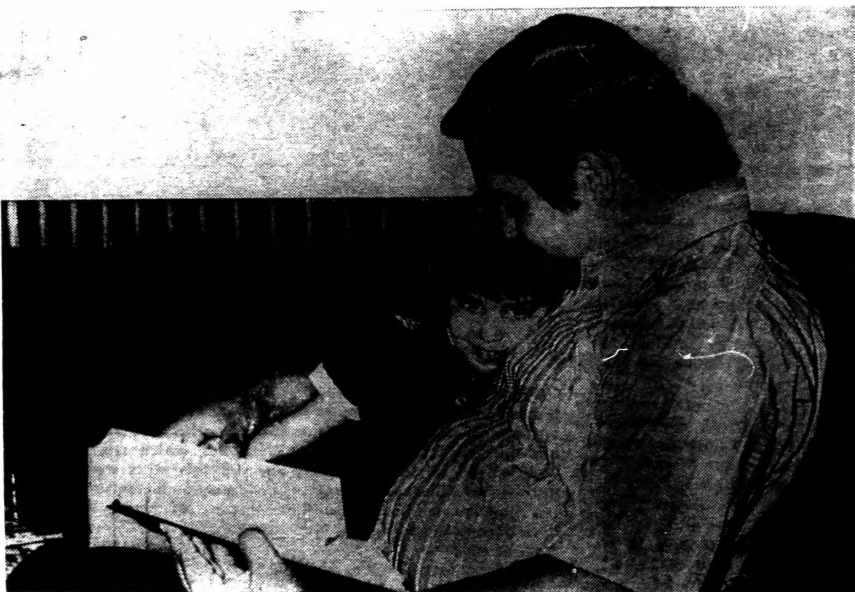
### Background on Edward Likman

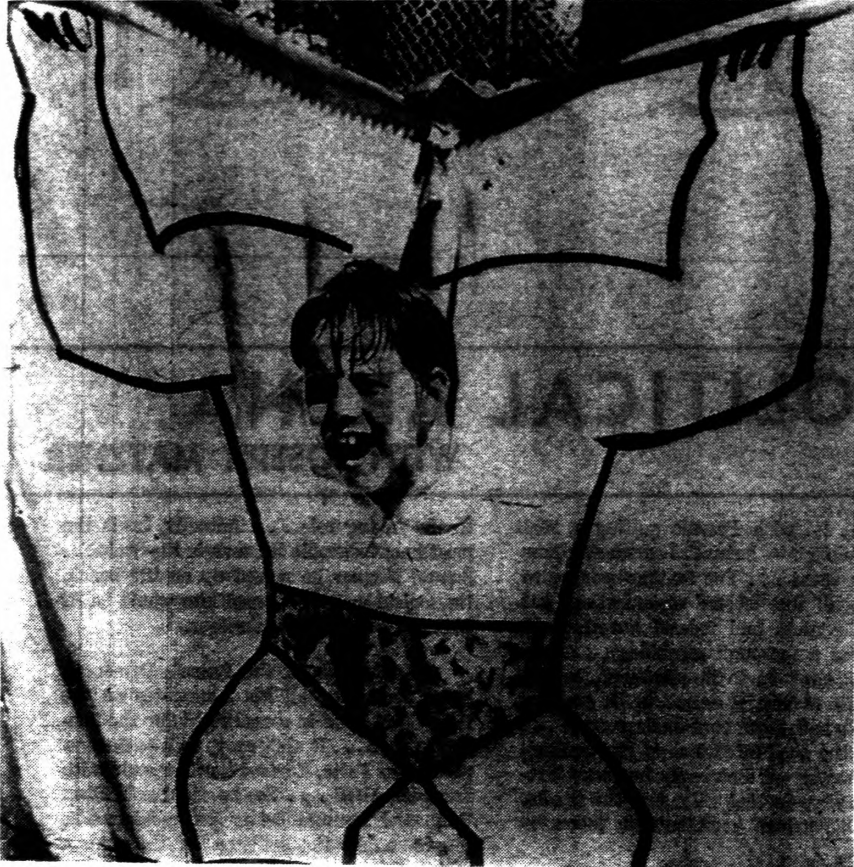

## Man - In - Moon Marigolds In Magnetic Play

Paul Zindel whose 'And Miss Reardon Drinks A Little' we enjoyed so much with Sandy Dennis at Playhouse on the Mall wrote a much more magnetic play—'The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds'. 'Marigolds' is currently running at the New Theatre on East 45th Street in New York, and was recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for drama 1971. The evidence is right in the script for being honored with such a prize. The play is a piece of poetry that moves with grace, beauty, style and ultra-realism.

'Man-in-the Moon Marigolds' tell the story of a family ill-treated by life. Beatrice, the mother, is harsh, caustic, and

unsympathetic in her views of family rearing. Her husband ran out and died leaving her with two children to support. One psychotic daughter suffers from convulsions while the other appears to be more or less a genius. The conflict of how such an adult with mental problems must take in the aged to earn a meager living could produce such children at opposite poles of stability is author Zindel's emotional juxtaposition. Just as Tille watches marigolds grow and produce mutant variety of offspring so does an audience watch the effects brought on the daughters by this over-bearing, demanding mother.

'Marigolds' is a memory play like 'Glass Menagerie' and a family trilogy like 'Subject Was

Roses', but goes beyond them in its compelling search for identity, truth, and sincerity of life, and its purpose. The play has theatrical style and stark realism and is one of the most

magnetic, melodic, and terse plays written for influencing future generations just as O'Neill influenced present dramatic theatre.

One can see many striking similarities between 'Marigolds' and 'Miss Reardon' such as the

parental influence, the chemistry teacher, the struggle for social status, and the effect of psychological problems on normal adult behavior. Where sage, 'Marigolds' puts its energy into the dramatic force of naturalism.

## Another Opening

The New York Shakespeare Festival throughout the course of years offers many new and interesting plays at any of its three theatres. Shows like 'Hair' and 'No Place To Be Somebody' had their origins at the Shakespeare Festival theatres. Such is the case with the recent production of David Rabe's first play 'The Basic Training of Pavlo Hummel'.

Rabe garnered his experience for this show by writing features for a newspaper and by spending eleven months service of duty in Viet Nam. His first-hand experience has served him well in this unpretentious little play.

'Pavlo Hummel' recounts the trials and tribulations of a young soldier beginning with the death in Viet Nam and reliving his basic training. Pavlo is a nut, a loner, a storyteller, and a millstone around his companions' necks. They love to tease him, to beat up on him, to accuse him of theft, and to ignore him when he tries to commit suicide by sniffing glue and swallowing a whole bottle of aspirins.

Yet Pavlo desires to be a good soldier knowing all his duties and responsibilities on the training field and battle field. He goes along with the whims of soldier life bedding down with Vietnamese whores even though he knew his mother would object. Pavlo's biggest feelings were for his mother—what would she think?

Rabe tells it the way it is—coarse, masculine, rough, and blue yet never losing touch of theatrical style—dramatic, succinct, and compelling. 'Pavlo' is indeed one of the best plays about war and its holocaustic qualities, since the touching and satirical 'Viet Rock'.

Jeff Bleckner has directed the ensemble with attention to space and character relationships, swift and deft timing, and an awareness of the theatrical and naturalistic elements in the play. He has done this on a nicely designed set by David Mitchell which was played superbly against a brown marbled background. This was brilliantly lit by Martin Aronstein.

The cast worked well together and was headed by William Atherton in the role of Pavlo. Atherton was properly naive, jocular, and masculine. Most of all he sincerely felt his role.

'Basic Training of Pavlo Hummel' is a compelling evening in the theatre.

## Walter Pilcer of Awosting Is Sailing, Ice Boat Buff

"I like competition; and I find sailing a terrific outlet for my satisfaction of competition. The classes I sail in are a challenge. The Star boat class is not easy to sail. It's an accomplishment to win with it. Ice boating is the same thing; a challenge."

These words express the feelings of Walter Pilcer as he describes what thrills him about a sport he has been involved in for thirty years. One of the charter members of the Awosting fleet, Pilcer has seen this group grow since its beginning in 1933.

Pilcer has grown along with the Star class boats through the years and has seen the changes in the crafts and competition. He is proud to say that the Star class boat is probably one of the greatest small keel sail boats of all times. "It's a very sensitive machine," he adds. "It performs with a great deal of responsiveness if you have the ability to get the responsiveness from the boat. You can't abuse it. There's nothing like a Star". Pilcer emphasizes that the major changes have been in the building of the masts and the booms. The lighter masts, made from wood and especially from aluminum, have contributed greatly to the development of the Star boat.

He said that some of the equipment has become more sophisticated, although much of it comes and goes. Some of the supposedly new equipment had already been used when he first started sailing in the 30's. Many of the things are just being re-newed.

Pilcer started sailing after an accident prevented him from racing speed boats. He notes the major differences between speed and sailboating in this manner: "In sailboating, the sailor must use the elements to the maximum and related it to his equipment. His ability to do this makes the boat go. In a power boat, the one who can afford to spend the most for a mechanic to build the fastest motor will have the advantage. A degree of skill is needed, but you need the guts to ride it." In my opinion," he continues, because of my participation in both over the years, a greater skill is needed in operating a sailboat over a speedboat. Speedboating requires strength and guts, while the sailboat requires finesse."

Pilcer has been racing for years and has his conception of the perfect sailing conditions. "I like the bigger lakes where proper courses can be set. A proper course is one where the sailboats always start to the windward side and line up 90 degrees to the wind. In this case, there is no advantage. Everyone starts in the same relative plane. The land masses must be

sufficiently low so as not to disturb the winds in the race."

His most memorable moments in sailboating have been sailing with the American team that defeated the British in the International Star Class Team Race in 1935 at Bermuda and winning the West Milford Centennial Regatta in 1934.

He has participated in many of the District Regattas, but numerous misfortunes have seemed to keep him from the championship.

Pilcer likes to admit that he has had better degrees of success in ice boating than he has had in sailboating. He is a member of the Hudson Highland Ice Boat Club and has been the club champion for many years. In 1958, he won Interstate Ice Yacht and no one from the club has defeated him since to take the pennant away from him. He last successfully defended two years ago.

He also has been the ice boating Eastern Champ and has taken many second place finishes in this event.

The speed and the thrill are Pilcer's biggest reasons for his ice boating competition. "70-80 miles per hour is an average speed," he states. "It's nothing to go four times the speed of the wind. It takes a great degree of skill to handle an ice boat effectively since the time for decisions are very limited."

Pilcer has held the President position of the Eastern Ice Yachting Association and the International "Sketter" Association along with having held Commodore positions with the Awosting Yacht Club.

## Charter Member Of Fleet

Recently at Greenwood Lake, the District 12 Star Class Regatta was held with the Awosting fleet participating and winning the trophies in both classes for being the leading fleets during the event. From a small group under ten, the star class boats from Awosting have grown into one of the largest fleets in the world with over 20 boats. Way back in 1933, two men decided to start this fleet and charter it with the parent organization in New York. One of the men is Walter Pilcer.

Pilcer, who resides in Awosting, has been sailing star class boats since the early 1930's. Strangely enough, his interest in sail boating came as a result of an accident to him in a speed boat race. He had started as a successful power boat operator who had won numerous trophies and awards for speed boating. One day, during the De-

coration Day race in May 30, 1932, Pilcer's speed boat was cut in two by another boat and another craft ran over him in the water. He suffered numerous wounds about the legs and was laid up for quite some time. He couldn't race speed boats any more, so he turned to another form of boating to keep pace with his thrill for competition. He chose the Star class of sailing boat and has been sailing them ever since.

In 1933, he and Clarence A. Bidulph applied for a charter for the Awosting fleet. Pilcer says that he did this so as to insure the proper handling of the organization and to give it appropriate recognition. The charter was granted.

Pilcer, who has been in the insurance business all his life, is also fond of ice boating and skeet shooting. To a point, he has been more successful in ice boating than in soft water sailing.
