Traffic Clogs Wayne

This 4th the Parade Was on Route 23

WAYNE — The first heavy influx of traffic on Wayne's highways took place this weekend as residents and out-of-towners made their way upcountry to the lake areas.

Wayne police report that very heavy traffic snarled movement on Route 23 and tied up Route 46 for hours on Sunday afternoon. A total of 110 radar summonses was given out by local police on Route 46 alone while scores of motorists on Route 23 trying to bypass the backup were given summonses for driving on the shoulders of the highway.

Traffic in the northbound lane of Route 23 was backed up from the junction of Routes 23, 46, and 80 to the Ratzer Road circle. Vehicles came to a standstill in the sticky heat and many of the cars overheated. On Route 46 where traffic moved freely, motorists were tagged for excessive speeding.

No serious accidents were reported over the weekend on any of the township's highways. Police said the heavy traffic of summer's first official holiday previews heavy traffic expected on all of Wayne's highways this summer. Wayne is the route used by most motorists to reach the lake country to the north and every weekend in the summer highways are jammed with motorists seeking relief from the heat of the cities. Traffic on Routes 46 and 23 is especially heavy.

Wayne officials emphasized again the need for widening and improving Route 23 through this community. Route 23 has carried the brunt of northbound traffic for many years in spite of its outmoded traffic circles. The highway has been the scene of

numerous serious accidents and several fatalities. The widening and improvement of the roadway includes plans to add several lanes for north and south bound traffic and to divide the highway with a wide median strip. A number of years ago following several fatalities on Route 23, crossovers were closed down by the late Mayor Edward Sisco. The number of serious accidents

dropped dramatically afterward.

NO PARADES

While no parades were scheduled for the holiday the local American Legion Post had a free fireworks display on Friday night behind the municipal complex. It was attended by several hundred Wayne residents. The program is held annually by the American Legion Post 174 in Wayne

Question Urban Renewal Report

WAYNE — The report of the mayor's Blue Ribbon Panel on Wayne Urban Renewal Affairs came under fire last week in a memo to Mayor Newton E. Miller submitted by the local council with five specific questions on the content of the report.

As the Local Public Agency the council is directly concerned with the urban renewal project in Wayne.

The memo from the council asks the identity of the members of the panel, the area of their expertise, the authors of the report, whether the report represents the unanimous view of the committee and if the report is not unanimous if there is a minority report, and asks why the report is unsigned. The memo also asks why the committee was reorganized in December of 1971.

The report of the Blue Ribbon Panel charges that the project in Wayne "has moved at a snail's pace" pointing out that the first

parcel of land in the project was acquired in October 1969. The urban renewal area in Wayne provides for redevelopment of approximately 95 acres. The entire project includes 1500 acres. The total assessment for the land to be acquired and resold for redevelopment is \$4,838,720 with an annual tax yield of \$159,644. It is expected to bring between \$50 to \$60 million in taxes annually after completion of the project.

Quadrants 3 and 4 have been acquired in part by the Farcal Realty Company. Several parcels are in litigation while others are still being negotiated. Several residents and businesses have been relocated by the project staff.

The project in Wayne has been unique in some respects. Unlike the typical urban renewal project, the Wayne project has sought sponsors before the entire area was assembled. The Wayne (Continued on Page 2)

Fireworks Display over Wayne

Mayer, Miller Memorial Day Decision Next Wed.

WAYNE — A decision on a civil complaint involving Mayor Newton E. Miller and Eric Mayer of the Passaic County Peace Center will be handed down by Judge Alexander Fasoli on July 12.

The judge told attorneys for both sides that he will render his decision in July following an eight hour hearing last Friday in Wayne's Municipal Court which saw a parade of witnesses testify for both Mayor Miller and Mayer. Judge Fasoli heard the case in

place of Municipal Court Judge James J. Murner who, as a Miller appointee, had disqualified himself.

Mayer charged Mayor Newton E. Miller with assault and battery; disturbing and obstructing an assembly; interfering and molesting. Mayer, 5 Winona Ave., Peace Center co-chairman, was charged by Detective Johnny Liebchen of violating a township ordinance by making, aiding and assisting a disturbance. Assistant Township Attorney

Robert S. Meraff entered not-guilty pleas for the Mayor and John Fiorello representing Mayer also pleaded not-guilty.

Judge Alexander Fasoli of Midland Park who presided said he will carefully review the testimony and deliver his decisions in open court.

A letter permitting the Peace Center to parade to the Memorial Plaza with special conditions obtained after a request to a Council conference meeting was entered as evidence. The group

was to assemble at the Wayne Mall Shopping Center at Hamburg Tpke. and Valley Road and follow one-quarter to one-half mile behind the regular parade. Later a vote was taken and the group drove to the A & P Shopping Center on Valley Rd. and Preakness Ave. and reassembled. The group of some 25 persons was mostly under 18 years.

Permit

When asked by Police Lt. Donald Pavlak if he had a permit,

Mayer said he went home to get it and after he exhibited the letter to Pavlak, he was told to "march in peace."

The regular parade ceremonies had ended when Mayer and Alvin Lubin, a member of the Peace Center, led the group carrying a 12 to 14 feet banner.

When they entered the exit "Y" leg of the Municipal complex roadway the Mayor who had just left his office, snapped a picture and told them to go to the school (Continued on Page 2)

grounds as they had last year. Mayer refused and said he had no permit for that area. He testified that the Mayor pushed him back twice and he draped the banner. Mayor Miller said that Mayer had put his arm up to brush him aside and Miller said he had his hands out and Mayer brushed against his hand with his shoulder. Miller said he made a statement to no one in particular that "this man should be arrested, I think he is in violation of something." He said he was surprised later when he saw Mayer in a police car.

Apology

The permission letter which was shown to Det. Sgt. William Monzo by Lubin was given to the Mayor. After reading it, the Mayor told Monzo, "You will

have to let them go to the flag site." He told Mayer "I'll have to apologize to you. Have fun."

The group walked to the flag and Rabbi Israel Dresner of Temple Beth Tikvah, a marcher, held a brief memorial service.

After the service Mayer went to Police Headquarters and filed the complaints against the Mayor.

Det. Liebchen who placed the complaint against Mayer said he raised his hand for the marchers to stop in the driveway and told them to go to the school area. He said his directions were not heeded and when they continued to march and the banner was wrapped around him nearly encircling him, he called for assistance.

At the request of both lawyers witnesses for both parties were sequestered. Fierillo called for testimony in addition to Mayer, Rabbi Dresner, and Lubin; Frederick Demier, township clerk; Ronald Pelieri, 58 Green Knoll Drive, Wayne Board of Educ.; David Waks, 38 Knox Terrace, councilman; Jack McGough, 20 Kimberly Ave.; Ceasar Fernandez, 36 Normandy Dr.; and Neil Lampel, 98 Berkeley Court; marchers; and Robert Lanzetti, 40B Salisbury Rd; a reporter.

council has interviewed all prospective sponsors. When the parcels were assembled the project was moved with the selected sponsor. Under the contract with the sponsor the land must be developed in conformance with the plan for the area.

The report of the Blue Ribbon Panel questions the need for widening Route 23 before construction begins. The council and the Urban Renewal Director have called for the highway widening before construction begins, pointing out that the development by Farcal Realty alone will dump an estimated additional 30,000 vehicles on Route 23 every day. They also cite a 1967 agreement with the state Department of Transportation which calls for widening and improving the highway.

A suggestion in the report that the township could "quick take" the land under negotiation was

questioned since the policy of the township has been to permit owners of property in the area to avail themselves of all legal means to protect their interests.

Some speculation has also taken place on whether the report which came out under a heading of the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Panel on Wayne Urban Renewal Affairs was prepared by any or all of the members of the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Committee on Wayne Urban Renewal. The members of the Committee include Donald Vander Mark, chairman; George Lodato, co-chairman; Mrs. George Lodato, secretary; John J. 'Agnes' Losses Deductible On

Federal Tax Returns

NEWARK — New Jersey homeowners whose property was damaged by recent storms and floods may be able to deduct some of their losses on their 1972 Federal income tax return as casualty losses.

"Don't wait until next April to determine the amount of damage to your property by typical storm Agnes. Establish your records now." This advice is from Roland J. Nash, Jr., New Jersey District Director for the Internal Revenue Service.

Although the cost of debris removal, repairs and replacement is not an exact measure of the amount allowable as a casualty loss, it is helpful in making a final determination.

Snapshots or other photographs

of the damage as well as of the property before and after restoration will also be helpful.

Nash explained that the amount of a casualty loss for tax purposes is the difference between the fair market value of the property immediately before and immediately after the damage. The first \$100 of any loss cannot be deducted and neither can any portion of a loss which was reimbursed by insurance.

Property owners with losses caused by Agnes are advised to obtain Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Thefts," from any New Jersey IRS office. It contains complete information on determining and reporting

Edith Thomas, Wayne Aviatrix

When the annual powder puff derby takes off from California next month a Wayne businesswoman will be among the 105 women who will pit their skills against the clock in the 3,000 mile cross country race. The four day race will see flyers from all over the country competing for the honor of out flying records every popular make of airplane.

Wayne's Edith Thomas, who manages the North Jersey Meat Supply Company on Hamburg Turnpike, will leave the cares of the business world to associates when she takes off to participate in one of the most exciting races for women in the country.

Edith has been flying for the past seven years ever since the flying bug bit her after her first flight in a Piper Cub. Today she is the pilot of a Cessna 210 which she will fly in the race under the sponsorship of the Chatham Airport in Morristown.

Her interest since her first flight has increased over the years and her entry in the derby this year marks the fourth time she has pitted her skill against the top women flyers of the country.

"The first time I was invited for a ride in an airplane I made up my mind to take flying lessons," she explained. "I've been flying now for seven years and I love every minute of it."

Although many of the contestants will fly with co-

pilots, Edith prefers to fly alone. "The idea of the race," she said, "is to try to beat the time the manufacturer thinks his plane will take to fly from San Carlos Airport in San Mateo County near San Francisco to Tom's River. The first pilot to touch down is not necessarily the winner. In fact, it may take some time to decide just who the winner is."

The pilots are permitted to stop to refuel or even to rest but there are two mandatory stops along the route. "It's very exciting," she said. "Of course, I don't know whether or not I will place this year. There's a lot of skill required and a little bit of luck. Some of the finest pilots in the country take part in the race and I'm so happy to be in it."

Edith has made her home in Wayne for many years but she is a native of Germany as her very charming accent reveals. She has raised her family in Wayne and has enjoyed running her business on the Turnpike.

She is the mother of three children, Mrs. Edith Walther, Mrs. Harold Bailey and Diane at home. The family circle is completed by assorted dogs, birds and fish. All of them will be rooting for their favorite avatrix in the four day grueling race ahead. Wayne joins in wishing this petite, charming lady a very happy landing!

Agnes Floats Habitat's Ark; Landfall July 15

WEST MILFORD — "Noah may have had some bad weather, but he didn't have a full week of Agnes'" said R. Brian Hunt, President of Warner Bros. Jungle Habitat, as he announced the delay of the \$10 million drive-thru wildlife preserve's opening.

Originally scheduled to open on a 1,000 acre site in West Milford, July 1, preserve officials have now set the opening date for Saturday, July 15. "Construction was on schedule until our crews were virtually immobilized by the storm's torrential rains. Agnes was definitely an unwelcomed guest," continued Hunt. "With hundreds of animals and birds in residence, our first concern during the severe weather conditions was their welfare," Hunt said. "Fortunately, every one of them came through in good shape, thanks to dedicated employees who worked around the clock taking care of them."

Hardest hit by the killer storm were the roads winding through the preserve. "Many of them were only partially completed," stated Hunt. "By the time Agnes

decided to call it quits, you couldn't walk on the trail, much less drive heavy construction equipment on it."

The main road at Warner Bros. Jungle Habitat is the Safari Trail along which visitors will travel in their cars. A minimum of adjustments were made in the preserve's terrain since the site was originally chosen for its lush vegetation, and its similarity to the native homelands of many species of wildlife which will be housed on the site. Buildings on the preserve, including a 500 seat amphitheatre, restaurant facilities, and an Artifact Shop, were in various stages of completion when the rains began falling last week. In certain cases, windows had not yet been installed, leaving the interior of the buildings open for water damage.

"We're just now beginning to realize the extent of the damages, but barring a visit from one of Agnes' unruly sisters, there's no reason why we can't count on a July 15 opening," said Hunt.

LINCOLN PARK — Mrs. Marlene Alvey feels that she has a legitimate complaint against the Township, one that has been brought to a head by the recent flooding.

Mrs. Alvey, who has lived at 52 Riveredge Road for some 30 years, had no problems until the township installed a storm drain at the corner of her property. After that time, she said, the water has been washing away the front of her property with each rain, until now the house has begun to sag.

The Governor's VIEW

Just a little over a week ago I signed into law the 1972-73 budget which I have called a hold-the-line budget because it contains few new programs, and the increases in existing programs are held to an absolute minimum.

As with most things in government where strong opposing views frequently clash, the budget represents a compromise.

It contains provisions, not for all the programs I would like to see in operation in the State, but as many of them as I felt we could afford at this time.

I am sure there are some people, whose project or interest was not included, who feel it was more important than some which were included. There are bound to be such people unless every proposal and project is included and no state could afford the billions that would cost.

There are others who feel that the budget now contains too many programs and, therefore,

too much spending and that it should have been cut back. To them I can only answer that I submitted to the Legislature what I considered the bare necessities of what is required, and the Legislature added another million dollars of expenditures to it.

There are also some persons who believe that budgets can be reduced by some nebulous and unspecified economies in the operation of State Government. I can assure them that economies have been exhaustively pursued. One of my first acts after assuming office was the appointment of a management study commission whose efforts and recommendations in streamlining government operations resulted in savings of more than \$50 million to the taxpayers of this State.

Governments are no different than businesses or even households in that they have to have the necessary funds in order to

operate. First of all, there are obligations for which there are no options. These are commitments that previous governors and legislatures have made that must be met every year. It can be compared to the homeowner's mortgage payment that has to be paid every month, regardless of other demands or desires he may have. Secondly, there is the problem of inflation. The costs of the goods and services the State purchases are rising, the same as they are rising for every householder and every businessman and are beyond the control of the State.

To meet these increased costs, we have had to raise additional revenues and the primary source of State funds is, of course, taxes. We were able to reduce the amount of additional revenues required through application of

\$111,429,770 in funds raised by the State lottery. I won't go into an explanation of the specific distribution of those funds at this time, and I think there is sufficient public interest to make it the subject of a separate column.



Wallace, the Last Rebel

WITH WALLACE CAMPAIGN — There have been some changes made in Alabama Gov. George Wallace, but most of them have been on the surface.

He dresses differently, for one. He is not exactly modern. His pants have cuffs, his black shoes are standard businessman's wing-tips — but his ties are wider and more colorful than ever. His second wife, Cornelia (a one-time runnerup in the Miss Alabama contest), seems more conscious of clothes than his late first wife, Lurleen. "I help George match his shirt and tie and suit," she said. "He couldn't do that himself to save his life."

His thinning auburn hair is still combed back in neat lines and parted high and still sprouts flecks of dandruff. But the hair is a bit longer than ever and he uses Sudden Beauty hair spray to keep it in place.

And he is still one of the hand-shakingest politicians around. Once he even shook the hand of a mannequin and went right on without real-

izing it. And he will go into an office and shake the hand of a surprised secretary who is speaking on the phone.

"But I don't run across the fields to shake one farmer's hand anymore," he said. "I found that you go on TV and look unhealthy—and you lose more votes than you gained."

And to the question, "Do you still use the word 'nigger,'" he said, "I never used that word—(lower) in public."

In his speeches, though, he talks about "welfare chiselers" and the audience knows who the man from the Deep South is talking about. He talks about not givin' foreign aid to every "hottentot country" and the audience understands the thinly coded reference, and he talks about being against busin', and all listeners understand who he doesn't want bused where and why.

He is the Last Rebel. He is never far from fighting the White Southerner's hundred-years-old fight. And he says he has been making the same speech ever since he first ran for governor in 1958.

He says he is not trying to say a harm word against any race, but he is for a segregated society, still. He says he has no apologies for the time he stood in front of the door at a University of Alabama building and refused in front of federal authorities to permit black students.

"The blacks wanted separation, too," said Wallace.

Then why, he was asked, are they working so hard for integration now?

"They changed," he said. Then his face scrunched up around the cigar in his mouth. "Why you wanna talk about something that happened 10 years ago? Why you wanna talk about that? Let's talk about the issues. Let's talk about all those millionaires who don't pay taxes because of loopholes. Let's talk about them false liberals."

He was asked what a false liberal is. He said, "A man who wants to give everyone freedom to do anything he damn pleases."

Does that make you a true liberal?

"Well, no," he said. "I mean, a liberal is just a word that the news media made up."

But you use it. He thought for a moment.

"I reckon I'm bein' inconsistent," he said shyly.

There are three views of George Wallace. One is that he is a racist demagogue who would like to subvert human rights. Another is that he is simply a typical politician who will do anything to be elected. A third is that he is some kind of saint sent to cure the ills of "the average working man" (his oft-used phrase) against the all-pervasive tentacles of big government.

George Mangum, a Baptist pastor from Selma who is Wallace's chief factotum and master of ceremonies of his rallies, holds the latter view.

"He's like Jeremiah in the Bible," said the burly Mangum, who had on his hip a pistol and on his left wrist a George Wallace watch (with red band and a Wallace caricature wearing boxing gloves — Wallace was once an Alabama state bantamweight champion).

"The Guvnuh is tellin' people that if big government keeps pokin' in our lives, they gonna be a mess uh trouble," said Mangum. "Like Jeremiah said. Do you ever talk to God?" asked Mangum. "We all should. I do. The Guvnuh does. He's a strict Methodist from the old-time religion, not the modern days. He don't drink and he don't inhale them cee-gars."

(Mangum is glib — important for a preacher and an insurance salesman, as it turns out. He handed a reporter a small leaflet that urges various health and life insurance policies — and has a quote from the Bible backing them up.)

As a politician, Wallace has not been a total failure, obviously. He has built hospitals and junior colleges and trade schools in Ala-

bama. "That's what I'm most proud of," he says. And his appeal to populism has not been hurt by his selling of all the state's official Cadillacs and buying Fords, instead.

But the cloud of racism remains over his head. Not long ago, he made a speech at liberal Lawrence University in Appleton, Wis. It was a cold, snowy night. The chapel was filled with some 1,500 persons, mostly young people. He stood on stage behind a bulletproof podium and gave much the same speech he had given to crowds of farmers and workers, and to the joint legislative assembly at Nashville, Tenn., and, presumably, before a few people in front of a Clio barbershop and a courthouse in Selma. Now, the klieg lights from the television cameras lit up the stage and cast his shadow against the gray drapes behind him.

When he got to the part about law and order, about 50 students stood up in the front row and walked out. He stopped his speech and watched. Most of the other people stood up and applauded the departing students.

Wallace walked back to George Mangum. Was Wallace going to leave in a huff? No. He said to Mangum, "Tell them folks standin' out in the cold to come in."

Then Gov. George Wallace went on with his speech. The great arm-waving shadow looked ominous.

Q—Which European country has no formal coronation ceremony?

A—Denmark. The queen does not wear a crown and her husband has no constitutional role to play.

America Just Loves America

America is sweeping the country.

"America," the LP, is No. 28 on the best-selling charts of March 11 and climbing. America, the three-man group whose first LP it is, has been surrounded with a bit of confusion as well as sudden popularity.

They're just finishing a six-week tour of America where they were booked last December when they were unknown here, as an English group, under the theory that unknown groups go over better in America if

they're English. The group is American but was afraid to tour in America because of all that crime and violence one hears about in England.

A single, "A Horse with No Name," is No. 9 on the chart and climbing.

To clear the confusion, America consists of Dan Peck, age 20, born in Florida; Gerry Beckley, 19, born in Texas, and Dewey Bunnell, 18, born in Yorkshire, England. Beckley's and Bunnell's mothers are British; Peck's mother is American. They all three are sons of American Air Force

men and met in 1968 in a high school for Air Force dependents in England.

They aren't strongly opinionated about the military, pro or con, and aren't into politics, though they think most people their age are. They are strongly into music.

Bunnell says, "We didn't record or anything in high school. We played high school dances. We graduated from high school in 1969 and Dan went to college for a year and Gerry and I worked in a warehouse. Then Gerry joined a group that was recording and I

went to drama school. Dan and I both got discouraged by college and drama school and started washing dishes. Gerry didn't like who he was recording with. We got together.

"In the meantime, we were writing songs, writing separately. In fact that is the way it still works. One of us brings a skeleton song to the rest of the guys and we kick it around and stuff and see what happens. Finally we thought we were somewhere near ready to meet a guy Gerry had met."

This was Jeff Dexter, age 25, who became America's

manager. Beckley calls him "the key figure in exposing us to the world."

Bunnell says, "He put on a lot of shows at the Roundhouse in London. He put us on his Christmas show in 1970 with Elton John and the Who. We played with Pink Floyd three times. In the London area we were always on the bottom of the bill, with T. Rex, Traffic—a lot of people."

Beckley says, "A girl told me if she went to see a good act we were always supporting them."

"I don't know how influential that was as far as contacting the public," Bunnell says, "but it was important as far as our attitudes to the big business."

The breakthrough came with the record. The group cut it last April and May and it was released in September. Then, they also cut four more songs so that Warner Brothers could put out a single. In England, America says, a single and an album almost never happen together, so putting out a single was an afterthought.

Warner Brothers chose "A Horse with No Name" as the single and when America got back from a tour in Holland with Cat Stevens, it was on the charts.

Later pressings of the album in England have included "A Horse with No Name" and it's on the album here.

Bunnell says, "In England we've never been questioned about what 'A Horse with No Name' means. Over here everybody is picking our brains for what the lyrics mean. It's hard to cope. We try not to make

it explainable. It's hard to write a poem and tell people what it means. We just say it's a trip through a desert on a horse."

The name America, Bunnell says, was chosen primarily for impact. "It was a little bit of nostalgia too. We took the name off a juke box where we were washing dishes, an Americana Deluxe Nickel Machine."

Peek says, about their fear to come to America, "We pictured everybody carrying around shotguns and it's not that bad. People come over to England and paint a bad picture of things here. It's not nearly as tense as we thought."

However, he says, the fact that the group was booked as an English act in order to get more bookings is adding up to too many. "It's rubbing us the wrong way now. We were really scraping to get the tour together and giving promoters their own way. Now that we're here we're doing three shows a day most days. We did 65 shows in our first four weeks and that's not including live radio and TV."


Peek says, "We think about having a percussionist, but America will always be just the three of us. Anybody else will be accessory. We've been playing together a year and a half constantly. It's hard to work in with somebody else. We're too rooted into what we're doing."

Each person does lead vocals on the songs he writes, so that's Dewey Bunnell on "A Horse with No Name."

ON THE HOUSE

By ANDY LANG

If there is one frequently asked question which defies a specific answer, it is this:

Which is the best kind of floor?

There just isn't any such animal. Each type of floor has its own characteristics. If you know what they are, you can make a good choice, depending on whether you are looking for anything in particular or whether you aren't interested in practicality but merely want what suits your fancy.

Although resilient floors—sheets and tiles—are enjoying a great wave of popularity in recent years, there are those who insist on nothing but wood, maintaining that it has a feeling of warmth unmatched by any other material.

Hardwood floors are the ultimate, among them oak, birch, maple, beech, poplar and even walnut, hickory, cherry and teak. Pine is the most popular of the softwoods. Flooring comes in thin or wide strips, squares or parquet pieces. The wider the boards, the more the tendency to expansion and shrinkage under certain weather conditions. Wood has a fine appearance whether given one of the surface finishes, such as varnish, shellac, lacquer or a synthetic, or one of the penetrating sealers.

In the resilient flooring field, there is a wide choice, the most popular being vinyl asbestos, which can be used anywhere in the house or on a concrete basement surface. The most inexpensive kind, asphalt tile, can be used below grade or above grade where it is not likely to be subjected to spilled liquids, especially grease and oil. Care must be taken not to use paste waxes which contain solvents.

Vinyl tiles and sheets are resilient, comfortable, stain resistant and easy to maintain. If you see wide differences in the prices of vinyl flooring, it's because some kinds are solid and some merely have vinyl veneers; also, some have high quality backings, some have cheap backings.

Cork tiles are quiet, very resilient and luxurious, but are susceptible to stains unless given some kind of clear finish, preferably at the factory. Rubber tiles are excellent to walk on, but show marks from furniture legs more than most other types. Cork, rubber and the old favorite, linoleum, which is easy to keep clean, should not be installed over concrete below ground level.

Add to this list such floors as seamless, stone, brick, ceramic tile, terrazzo and several other specialty types and you can see that the choice is almost endless.

Is Meat Needed For Good Diet?

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

Dear Dr. Lamb—My teenaged sister and her friends don't like the idea of eating meat because it is a dead animal. I told her that your body needs the protein to rebuild itself. Is it possible to get enough protein from other foods to eliminate meat from the diet?

Dear Reader—Yes, it is. Strict vegetarians are living proof of this. Not only that, many vegetarians are in exceptionally good health. One reason for their good health is that eating a strictly non-animal product diet usually tends to eliminate a lot of calories, particularly those that come from animal fats. In general, individuals who avoid eating excess numbers of calories and excess amounts of fat in their diet are healthier than most of the rest of the general population, if they don't overdo it.

It is true that the body needs a variety of sources for protein. Studies have been done, however, that show that the body can get by on proteins from gelatin (which is an animal product) and the protein from wheat. It is usually better for the health to be sure that the body gets a variety of types of proteins. Some non-meat sources include the dairy products (and if you need to restrict the saturated fat intake, you would want to use non-fat and low-fat dairy products such as fortified skim milk and uncreamed cottage cheese). The whites of eggs are a particularly good source of protein. The mature seeds of the bean family usually contain a lot of protein. Soy beans are a principal source of proteins in the vegetarian diet. They are relatively rich in protein. People who don't eat meat, fish, or chicken need to know a lot more about diet than some young people following harmful fads do.

Dear Dr. Lamb—I would like to know if bleeding from the rectum can be the symptom of something more serious than just a very bad case of hemorrhoids. I don't mean just a showing of blood; he really bleeds, especially after a bowel movement. If he has had anything to drink, the bleeding is more.

Dear Reader—There are constant numbers of letters to this column concerning this problem. It is exceptionally important that everyone recognize that bleeding from the rectum can represent serious disease. In some instances, it is the first sign of cancer of the rectum, although there are many other causes for it including hemorrhoids. No case of bleeding from hemorrhoids, however, should be ignored. Each one deserves a medical examination because what is often overlooked is

Q. — Our house has one of those small cellars with a dirt floor. We have been in the house for seven years, but only recently has a musty odor invaded the cellar. How can we get rid of it?

A. — A musty odor is a sign that mildew is present. Mildew is a growth that occurs in damp areas where there is no sunlight. To get rid of the odor, keep the area well heated and dry for a period of three or four days. Sprinkle some chlorinated lime over the dirt floor and let it stay for a couple of days. Sweep up the lime, then repeat the treatment. This usually will remove the musty odor, but it may be back after a period of time unless steps are taken to get rid of some of the dampness. One way to do this is to have an exhaust fan in one of the cellar windows. On a dry day, open a window as nearly opposite the fan as possible, then turn on the exhaust for a couple of hours. Doing this periodically on dry days should eliminate most or all of the dampness.

Q. — I plan soon to put a 50-gallon drum into the ground to use as a dry well, filling it with large rocks. How deep should it be?

A. — You should make a hole large enough for the drum, plus about one foot between the top of the drum and the surface of the ground. Be sure there is a solid top on the drum, made of concrete or heavy planking. Fill with dirt around the sides and over the drum top and pack tightly.

Q. — I am putting up some galvanized downspouts at four locations around the house. I want to paint them, but seem to remember reading somewhere that new galvanized iron should not be painted until it has been washed with vinegar. Is this true or is it just an "old wife's tale?"

A. — Regular household vinegar has been used for many years as a wash for galvanized iron which has just been installed. But it is now generally conceded that it may or may not accomplish the purpose of weathering the metal before it is painted. Sometimes it seems to work — that is, prevent future peeling of the paint — and sometimes it doesn't. It is better to let the galvanized surface weather naturally for six months before painting. Even better is to coat the galvanized iron with a primer of zinc dust or zinc oxide. Tell your dealer what it is for so that he can select the right kind for the job. After this has thoroughly dried, you can go ahead with the painting even though the galvanized downspouts are new.

Q. — We have a large gilt frame that needs touching up in a few places. I'm afraid that regular gold paint won't be a good match. How can I get the proper color match?

A. — Artist materials stores (and some hardware and paint stores) carry a gilt powder that can be used. It comes in various shades and you can probably find what you want.

**Storage Space for Toys
Made of Old Bookshelves**

DEAR POLLY—S. W. who needs help with planning storage for her kid's toys could utilize the old diaper bags she has on hand by using them to hold small toys. They could be attached to the outside of the toy box like big pockets. Another space saver is to attach a big cloth pocket on the inside of a large toy box. A big, old purse or school satchel could also hold small things and just be tossed in the box. If shelves are to be made for such storage use, measure the heights of the items to be stored and space the shelves so they fit. This will save space as well as one's temper and the item can be removed without everything else falling out. A half shelf on one side would leave space for taller things on the other.—ALVA

DEAR POLLY—I am answering S. W. who is worried about shelf space and a toy container for her son's room. Old bookshelves can be used quite effectively to solve such a storage problem. These can be bought reasonably at secondhand stores, auctions, bargain shops, etc. She should buy those of a height that her son could easily reach. Paint them white or a preferred color to match the room's decor. Buy colored plastic dishpans in the desired color or colors that would fit between the shelves. Smaller toys could be stored in these pans and the larger things placed on the shelves. If her son cannot read, she could cut out and paste on magazine pictures of toys similar to those that go in each dishpan so he can tell at a glance which toys are where and also know where to return them. Polly's Problem

MASTERING MASSAGE

In starting a massage you will find that few object to your starting with the head. It is one of the safest areas as most people are nervous about being touched. We feel the least force of our culture's taboos against physical contact in the head, the hands and the feet. To start, stand or kneel facing the top of your friend's head. Apply only a few drops of oil to fingertips since the face area is small. Start at the top of the forehead, work down to the chin, ears, neck and finally do the scalp. First to accustom your friend to your touch center the forehead with the heels of your hand. Now begin massage with the forehead with the balls of your thumbs. Start at the center of the forehead just below the hairline, glide both hands at once in either direction outwards along the topmost strip. Press moderately. Continue to the temples and end there by moving your thumbs in a single circle about half an inch wide.

The main stroke which covers large areas of the body surface easily and quickly and is one of the most effective strokes in massage. With slight variations, it can be done on the chest and stomach, the arm, the front of the leg, the back of the leg and the back.

The chest and stomach are part of the main relaxing massage. First spread oil over the areas including the sides of the torso and the shoulders.

Stand or kneel above your friend's head. Place your hands with palms down in the middle of the chest. Rest heels of hands just below the collarbone with fingers pointing to the feet and thumbs lightly touching each other. Glide both hands slowly forward, pressing firmly on the chest and then more lightly on the stomach. Keep hands together until you reach the lower half of the stomach; then separate them, moving both hands straight to the sides. Bring both hands over and down the hips all the way to the table or floor surface.





DO-IT-YOURSELF**Fans Out of Date? Not So**

By MR. FIX

You would think that with the popularity of air conditioning, especially by way of one-room units, that the electric fan would be obsolete.

It isn't.

If anything, fans come in a wider variety of models, in sizes that vary from tiny desk models to giant exhaust fans that will empty an entire house of its stale air in minutes.

Not everyone wants air conditioning and not everyone needs it. In moderate

climates a fan will provide all the relief you need from the heat.

Use portable fans to give quick comfort in a small area. For larger areas consider exhaust fans. There are small window mounted units or big ones that can be placed in the ceiling. Installed and used properly, they can move cool air through an entire house.

The exhaust fan is used throughout the night when outside air is cooler and is used to replace the warm in-

side air.

Once the house is cooled off in the morning, the fan is turned off and window shades and windows are kept closed on the sunny side of the house. The idea is slow up the heating process until night rolls around again and you can pump more cool air in again.

Most people can make do with window fans. The fan is placed in an open window. Sometimes the removal of a window unit is required.

Don't put the fan just any-



where. Best place is an upstairs window on the sunny side of the house. Open a window on the shady side so that you replace hot air with cool air.

Windows adjacent to the fan must be closed. Leaving them open will short circuit the air, moving it from the window next to the fan right through the fan without ever moving the air through the house.

Attic fans are bigger and more efficient. Install the fan high in a central location so that it draws air through the whole house.

There must be exhaust openings in the attic. These can be in the roof, gable ends or under the eaves. You may have to put in a special louver. Openings should be screened.

Whatever fan you use, keep doors and windows on the lower level of the house open during the night. This allows cool air to enter to replace the warm air that is being exhausted.

A Boston Warehouse Becomes an Apartment

By VIVIAN BROWN

Many old buildings are being razed because some cities consider them useless. But foresighted people buy such structures as wise investments.

In remodeling an old waterfront warehouse, Boston architect Gerard R. Cugini, converted it into a triplex living arrangement above two floors of offices.

It earned him first prize in the 14th annual S.M. Hexter awards program as the "Interior of the Year."

"One purchasing an old structure and helping to preserve it gives a city a sense of

continuity" says Cugini. "It is also a great way to acquire a lot of space in a building."

His award winning living interior is 21 x 60 feet with three major balconies of plaster leading into rooms. The painted walls are on the original old brick. Flooring is white oak. The main living area with music center is 21 x 37. At the same level are a master bath and bedroom 21 x 15.

"Warehouse construction is almost the easiest to deal with as there is no tricky demolition, but major site factors often must influence design solutions," Cugini explained.

Water, providing the only good view from the warehouse, was the stimulus for the multi-level design for the living area. The water can be seen through a large expanse of glass. He also made great use of natural light coming from a skylight 35 feet above the living area. There are flattering patterns of light throughout the room.

The rear view of the building shows the north end of Boston and other warehouses.

Before buying such a structure, engineers should check out roof, floors and foundation, Cugini points out.

In South Dakota, He's Still 'Ole George'

MITCHELL, S. D.—Sen. George McGovern may be, as Robert Kennedy suggested, the most decent man in government. He may be, as his employees insist, a kind of political second coming. He may even be, if the hopes of millions of American voters are justi-

fied, the next (36th) president of the Union. But here in Mitchell, the man's hometown, George McGovern is still just George McGovern, "ole George," nice fella, a little big for his britches maybe, but, well, "Say, that looks like a thunderhead don't it?—my, oh my, it's been a wet spring here."

The 14,000 residents of this comfortable community on the eastern edge of South Dakota's ocean of prairie are not given to hero worship. They are plain and laboring folks, "Giants in the Earth" as author Ole Rolvaag called them, people who tend their lawns and churches with equal dedica-

tion, men and women who even if they want to loaf will get up—for an early start. There's just no time for star-gazing.

Not that South Dakotans have had many stars to gaze at. Home-grown luminaries have always been a premium. There were some famed early Indians like

Chief Crazy Horse. Former Gov. Joe Foss was a distinguished World War II air hero. And Mitchell's own Joe Robbie is now the owner of the pro football Miami Dolphins—"Or is it the Sharks?" asks a local, "I never get the nicknames straight."

So maybe this is it: Maybe George McGovern isn't heroized here, because, as a woman feeding her chickens puts it, "We haven't had much practice at heroizing."

In any event, Ole George, nice fella, is just another potato in this town's patch. There are not many suggestions in Mitchell, as there are elsewhere in the nation, that the junior senator from South Dakota is headed for sainthood. There is a small highway sign announcing this as "The Home of Sen. George McGovern," but there is also a sign announcing it as the home of Ordell Braase (a one time Baltimore Colts linebacker). McGovern's small office next to the Woolworth building remains quiet and decidedly uncrowded; his \$7.65 biography is not for sale on the main street; and the only political announcements on auto bumpers are "America—Love It or Leave It."

In mostly Republican, mostly conservative South Dakota, the liberal-radical Democratic frontrunner is liked, but not loved. "McGovern?" says Gus Swanson, 83, a veteran of World War I, "I think he's all right. I mean he's done good by himself. But he shoots his mouth off too much. I don't think a public official ought to go around criticizing the government the way he does. And I don't like all this anti-war stuff. It aids the enemy, is all. If you ask me, I think George has killed more people over there in Vietnam than everybody else put together."

Still, even in this luke-warm atmosphere, even without the hoopla, there is in Mitchell and throughout the state fair respect for the 49-year-old onetime preacher, professor and insurance salesman. "I mean he's done good for himself" is another way of saying "wow." As a leftist peacenik he may be, as the Democratic county chairman here says, "Like Jesus in Jerusalem," but even his political enemies admit their awe. Says one GOP leader: "When ole George was a kid he was so poor he went barefoot. Now he's become one of the most respected and admired men in the country. Gawd Almighty, who would have ever thought it possible?"

Who indeed? Apparently nobody. People who remember McGovern as a lad say he was common as chickweed. Born in Avon, S.D., (current pop. 600) McGovern was one of four Depression era children of a respected but somewhat itinerant fundamentalist minister. As such, he was not only poor, but giggled at. The family religion, Wesleyan Methodist, was in those days hinted at as the Holy Rollers. Services were highly emotional. Amens. Hallelujahs. Screams and faintings. McGovern was raised on the proposition that to blaspheme was to risk eternal damnation.

Summer Gardening

WATERING HOUSE PLANTS IN SUMMER

The water required by indoor plants can change during the summer.

Air conditioning units can lower humidity as well as temperature. Both foliage and soil lose moisture rapidly in a very dry atmosphere. The long summer days and bright light usually result in rapid growth. The plants which are growing rapidly require more moisture.

PREPARE SOIL WELL FOR SODDED LAWN

Sod can give you a new lawn within a few hours, but you'll waste time and money if you don't prepare the soil properly to receive the sod pieces.

You can expect to be disappointed if you place your sod on an old lawn or on compacted, infertile soil carelessly prepared.

You must provide the same basic needs for sod as you do in preparing the soil for a needed lawn.

To be successful with a newly sodded lawn, you should:

-Provide the soil with adequate amounts of lime and fertilizer, the best guide to use is a soil test on a sample of soil from your lawn area. On sandy and heavy, clay-type soils, add organic matter. Incorporate all these materials into the soil at least 6 inches deep.

-Rake the seedbed level and smooth, and firm it slightly with a roller. Fill the low spots. It will be hard to correct rough areas after the sod is in place. Soil prepared in this manner is ideal for placement of the sod.

-Water the soil lightly if it is extremely dry.

-Place the sod, making sure that the pieces fit together tightly and evenly.

Don't wait to finish the job before you water. Lay several pieces, roll lightly, and water so that the sod is wet all the way through to the soil below.

Your job is by no means finished when the sod is in place. The few days after the laying of the sod are critical ones. Don't let it dry out.

Keep the sod pieces completely moist, and check on the adequacy of moisture by lifting a corner of a sod piece occasionally.

With this kind of treatment the sod should "knit" to the soil within 10 days after placement.

Then water and care for the sodded lawn about as you would any established lawn. A sodded lawn will only be as good as the care you give it.

REGULAR SPRAYING HELPS KEEP APPLES WORM-FREE

Homeowners interested in growing worm-free apples this year should control codling moth infestations now.

This is our advice to homeowners who have been troubled with wormy or deformed fruits in past years.

Methoxychlor or malathion are satisfactory insecticides for controlling this pest.

Repeat this spray every two weeks until the end of August. Otherwise, foliage and developing fruits will not be protected when the ever-present codling moth and other apple pests appear.

JAPANESE BEETLE TIME AGAIN

Once again it's time for the annual battle against Japanese beetles, which damage or destroy many trees, shrubs and plants.

Immature beetles are called grubs. Wormlike, they feed on the roots of lawn grasses. Adult beetles come out of the ground in June and July. The females deposit their eggs in the soil during the summer. The eggs hatch into grubs that feed until cold weather makes them go deeper into the soil. During the spring, the grubs move closer to the soil surface and again begin to feed.

About two weeks before the adult beetles emerge, the grubs enter a stage in which they make the change to adults.

Carbaryl (Sevin) is an effective insecticide for protecting ornamental plants from beetle attack. Repeated applications are necessary.







FREE THE MALE MAN! By Shepherd Mead. Simon and Schuster. \$5.95.

Men of the world unite! You have nothing to lose but your chains! At least the ones placed about you by women.

With women's lib so loud on the lip these days, it was foreseen that humorist Mead, who seems to publish a dandy little book annually, would turn to the subject of male liberation. And so he has in this funny volume, which gets immediately to the point by noting, "Remember, you are more than 'man' — you are a Male Man! 'Mankind' includes womankind. 'Man' can mean all human beings, and includes women. We of Men's Liberation are for freeing all Mankind, including women — but our first task is to free the Male Man, who needs liberation far more than Female Man at this moment."

Exhorting his male readers to "be proud you're a Mascul-

ist" and to join the "Men's Organization to Uplift and Support Each other (MOUSE)," Mead presents a male manifesto which includes, among other demands, equal work from women, earlier retirement for men, an end to sexually segregated draft laws, and sexual equality for men.

Mead, best known perhaps for his "How To Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," writes pithily and well and as he warms to his subject the material gets hotter and the humor better and better.

His chapters cover the route from "How to Resist Your Mother" to "How to Avoid Becoming a Sex Object," to "Can Freud Help Us?" and at the very end his final, yet rallying, cry is, "Set men free!"

TAMING THE NILE
WASHINGTON — Egyptians are learning it will take more than the Aswan High Dam to tame the Nile.

Because of the dam, the muscle of the mighty river flexes with new vigor, threatening to undermine 550 bridges built within the last 19 years as well as three diversion dams, old but still needed.

The dam has strained out the silt, washed down from Ethiopia and central Africa. Without this burden — 110 million tons a year — the river surges through the valley of the Nile with new force, chiseling out river banks more than ever.

Ten new but smaller dams, costing about \$22 million each, are planned downstream to slow the water on its way toward the Mediterranean. Otherwise, engineers say, damage from erosion will be severe in 10 to 15 years.

FAMILY NEED \$11,090
NEW YORK — A family of four — working father, mother and two children under 14 — needed \$11,090 a year to maintain a moderate standard of living in New York City last October, says the Community Council of Greater New York.

The social-welfare planning group said this was an increase of 37 per cent over October, 1970.

HORSE PAPER CLOSES
NEW YORK — After 139 years as a newspaper specializing in past performances of thoroughbreds, The Morning Telegraph has ceased publication.

The paper, which sold for \$1, was struck by union printers in April and one week later publisher Stewart Hooker announced the end of publication. The paper was owned by Triangle Publications which will continue to publish The Racing Form for the nation's thoroughbred and harness racing fans.

1972 U.S. Spending To Rise Above Expectations

July 5 Federal spending seems likely to exceed the \$246.3 billion projected in the Federal budget for fiscal 1973 and current budget proposals signal a continued sharp rise in expenditure for the years ahead, Tax Foundation, Inc. reports.


In a new study of the future implications in the budget proposed for the year beginning July 1, the private, non-profit research organization says that more than two-thirds, or \$174.6 billion, of the spending total is classified officially as "relatively uncontrollable."

Moreover, new or expanded programs in the budget, estimated to cost \$11 billion in fiscal 1973, would require outlays of almost three times that amount by fiscal 1977.

"These and other factors should alert officials and taxpayers to the need for exercising greater discipline over Federal expenditures," said Alfred Parker, Executive Director of the Foundation. "Loose control of government spending with resulting deficits is one of the chief causes of inflationary pressures that have brought the cost of living to new highs."



Outdoor Echoes

by Dick Schweighardt

The 1972-73 N.J. game code was finalized at the regular monthly meeting of The Fish and Game Council held June 13. The seasons established are: Upland and small game- November 11 to December 2, and December 11 to February 3 (with exceptions); archery deer - October 7 thru November 9; firearm deer (antlered) - December 4 thru December 9 and a special deer of either sex day will be held on Wednesday December 13. For full details, sportsmen can consult the new compendium available from license agents in August.

Two new regulations were also set into the Fish and Game Statutes. This year anyone taking a deer will have to bring it to one of the 75 checking stations that will be operated during 1972 archery, firearm and special day deer seasons. Sportsmen will also be asked to assist the Bureau of Wildlife Management in their research by delivering the jaws, reproductive tracts and other data, of deer killed during the season to one of the checking stations. This is especially important during the special deer

day. Locations of the stations and additional information will be published at a later date.

The second regulation concerns the individual who will secure his first hunting license this Fall.

Legislation passed in 1971 makes it mandatory for any prospective bow or firearm hunter, regardless of age, to take a hunter safety course. Until now the applicant would contact an instructor to arrange for a course, but this is a thing of the past.

Applications will now be secured from license agents, conservation officers or from The Division of Fish and Game, in Trenton. The forms will then be completed by the applicant and mailed to the conservation officer whose name and address appears on the reverse side. The C.O. will then send this form to a county coordinator for processing and lining up of the courses.

Applicants will then be notified by phone, or mail as to time and date of his scheduled course. Some agents now have applications, and all will have them by July 1. It should be remembered that a separate application

is needed for archery and firearm. Act now and prevent the usual log jam that occurs just prior to opening day.

It might be interesting to note that about 150 sportsmen showed up at the Council meeting to speak out against the special deer day. This would seem to shoot down the anti-hunting crowd's claims that anyone who goes afield with a gun, is a blood thirsty butcher bent on "mayhem and murder." But I suppose we'll hear and read more of this tripe before opening day.


Study Shows N.J. Residents Approve of Deer Hunting:

San Juan, Puerto Rico — Tom Fleming, William Paterson College's premier distance runner with Olympic aspirations, is looking more and more like he might be headed for Munich, Germany. This past weekend skinny Tom, as the Puerto Ricans came to know him, won the biggest race of his running career. The race was the second annual 450 Marathon of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Two-hundred runners from 50 countries participated in what will be an annual race. The race was run in 90 degrees heat which took its toll on many of the top runners. Fleming took the lead at the eight mile mark and was never seriously challenged by any of the runners as he opened up a 300-yard lead.

Fleming's main challenge came from the heat which was the hottest week in the recorded history of San Juan. Fleming

stated, "I was very surprised not to be challenged, but at times I was not sure if I could go another step because of the heat."

This win could help Fleming move into the spotlight for the U.S. Olympic Trials to be held July 9 in Eugene, Oregon. His coach, Dean Shonts, stated "If it is a hot day in Eugene, Tom will be at a distinct advantage over any of the other runners, since he spent a week running in temperatures over 90 degrees and ran the best race I have ever seen him win. Right now Tom is ready for anything and should definitely be considered as a contender for one of the spots on the Olympic Team."

Fleming's time of 1:42:39 was one minute and forty seconds ahead of Gaspar Garcia, the outstanding Mexican who has placed very high in past Boston Marathons.

The results are especially interesting in that a handful of people have obtained a court injunction halting a proposed public deer hunt on the Great Swamp National Wildlife Refuge in New Jersey. Refuge biologists had requested the hunt to reduce the number of deer and prevent further habitat and private property damage.

The study shows that 54 percent of New Jersey's residents approve of deer hunting, 38 percent disapprove, and 8 percent are undecided. Some 24 percent had hunted, 76 percent had not. When asked if they would vote for a referendum outlawing deer hunting in the state, 41 percent said they would, 47 percent said they would not, and 12 percent didn't know. Responding to whether there are a "lot of deer" in New Jersey or "not many," 29 percent said there are "a lot," 37 percent said "not many," and 34 percent were undecided. There are about 46,000 deer in the state. Asked what the coat of a newborn fawn looks like, only 29 percent answered spotted, flecked, etc.; 71 percent had no idea.

After looking in disgust at the swollen streams and lakes in the area, the other day, I returned home and picked up a detailed description of the Muskaloonge hatchery operation in New York. After hatching the eggs, the fry are fed daphnia, and minnow fry. As the fish progress in size the diet is changed to fathead minnows and small carp. From mid-spring, the time the fry emerge, till the end of August, the youngsters will have attained the size of 8-9 inches. Many of these fish will be stocked in Chautauqua Lake near the hatchery.

The part of this story that will make you sit up and take notice is - although only one angler in four will take a Muskie from this lake, and spend an untold amount of hours before success is achieved; 40 tons of Muskies will be taken, each averaging 34 inches in length and weighing in at about 10 pounds—eat your heart out.


