

# Kinnelon school budget ready \$15.5M proposal is one of county's lowest

KINNELON — Before a packod house at Pearl Miller School on
Wednesday evening the Board of
Education, by a 4-0 vote, approved a \$15.5 million 1994-95
budget. The fiscal measure will
be voted on in the upcoming April
19 school election.

The proposed budget marks a
\$225,455 increase over the current 1993-94 budget of \$15.3
million, or 1:47 percent. The fiscal measure is one of the lowest
in Morris County and well within
the cap limitations of 4.88 per-

cent for top-level schools such as Kinnelon.

If approved, this will raise the school tax rate to 1.53 from its present level of 1.478, or \$142 on a house assessed at \$250,000. Based on projected enrollment for 1994-95 of 1,310 full-time students, and three students from sending districts, this represents a cost of \$11,668.84 per pupil. Specifically, the proposed budget reflects revenue from Riverdale students no longer being sent to Kinnelon and a \$65,000 reduction in transition and a feet of the state. In a cost-containment effort the budget slab attempts to reduce staff without sacrifice to quality of teaching. To achieve these focused economies the proposed budget replaces them with the hiring of two administrative assistants. In terms of program, the budget eliminates the file foreign language program now offered in grades three and five (Communed On Page 3)

and decreases the music program. In an offset, the budget contains a 2.5 percent transportation cost increase and no increase in supplies and materials. In appealing to the public for support of a basically hold-the-line effort, Dr. Lois McGuire, superintendent of schools, focused remarks on the positives that the budget will allow If approved, the Kinnelon system will have stronger computer programs in both high school and middle school, an SAT course for nigh school sophomores, and two new AP courses, one in history and one in current problems of government.

Robotics will be introduced through the expanded science lab. Another proposed curriculum innovation will end Clevel courses in favor of integrating those students in regular English, math, history and science courses.

In a further commitment toward excellence, Meguire proposed a Student Advisory Committee to assure more student input in program activities and more parent involvement on the secondary level to supplement teaching efforts.

McGuire also seeks to establish a Kinnelon Education Foundation with a Board of Directors charged with dispersing funds to teachers and students who write successful grant appeals for special projects.

Offsetting that effort will be the elimination of stipends for two dozen school sponsored activities; for example, marching hand, Ski Club, Chefs' Club, a project fair, German Honor Society, a Dean of Students, a year-book assistant, and a graphic arts after-school program.

The proposed school budget combines capital outlay so that voters April 19 have only one, YES or No choice. The budget, as proposed, includes \$675,348 in debt service, \$244.213 in special revenue funds from state and federal aid, and \$40,000 in tuition leaving a total of \$12.8 million to be raised by local property tax dollars. The budget as proposed also includes state aid of \$1.4 million as part of the general fund total of \$14.6 million and \$100,000 of revenues added to debt service from investment income received from monies appropriated by bond but not yet expended.

In a final motion of the evening, the board also voted unanimously to submit to voters a proposal to reappropriate \$161,778 of the proceeds of bonds remaining unspent and authorized at the Dec. 17, 1991 special election which approved the building of the new Kiel School. These funds will be used to provide furnishings and equipment for the new school.

Schools Superintendent Joel McKenzie said, "Pompton Lakes has a fine home-economics Program," and added that he hopes to see home economics mandated as a required course.

Kester has been Lenox School ibrarian for the past 17 years and will retire so she has "plenty of time to enjoy her family, especially her grandchildren," according to board documents.

Rainey has been a teacher in the Pompton Lakes School System for 25 years and has taught at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. Recently, she was an instructor in the basic skills math program, which prepares students for the High School Proficiency Test.

# Survey reflects school choices

The Ad Hoc Citizens Advisory Committee to the Lincoln Park Board of Education has compiled the results of the community survey sent out in February 1994. There were 811 actual surveys returned for a 20% response percentage.

The preliminary data indicated that the majority of responding residents were not in favor of building a new middle school, but would rather consider a plan to build extra classrooms to the

elementary schools and upgrade the facilities in the middle school.

Based on these results and other findings, the committee has recommended that the Board look into the cost effectiveness of modular units to be added to the Patania School due to the availability of land there and site constraints at Pinebrook School. It also recommends upgrading Chapel Hill School with a new gymnasium and cafeteria.

"Ultimately, we'd really want all the Mount Laurel units to be saleable," said Councilman Michael Krause. "We have too many rental units in town already."
The council believes people.

The council believes people who own the units will maintain them more thoroughly than renters.

Township Attorney John Florello said rejecting the Mount Laurel revision would have caused problems for Lincoln Properties. The financial backer of the proposed Pike Drive development said he would not fund the project unless the units could be sold. Rather than reject the change, and jeopardize a project completion date of 1996, the council voted to approve the developer's request.

"This is not a substantial change in the Mount Laurel plan," Fiorello said.

While a majority of the council agreed, some members couldn't conceal their disdain for the many revisions

"We should have voted no on all this garbage from the begin-ning," said Councilman Joseph DiDonato. "There's no end to this."





# Early detection can halt skin cancer

POMPTON PLAINS - Last

POMPTON PLAINS — Last year, more than half a million cases of skin cancer were diagnosed in the United States. The most serious type of skin cancer malignant melanoma-was responsible for 75 percent of all skin cancer deaths.

Fortunately, most skin cancers, including melanoma, can be cured if detected early. Chilton Memorial Hospital physicians will conduct a free skin cancer screening from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturday, April 23, in the Rehabilitation Services area of the hospital.

the hospital.

At the screening, which usually takes about 10 minutes perperson, participants are checked for possible cancerous skin

lesions or conditions. Should a suspicious lesion be found, a written report is given to the participant to direct his or her own dermatologist or family physician for confirmation of the screening's findings, and subsequent treatment.

Since biopsies are not performed at the screening, participants with a suspected skin cancer are encouraged to seek further medical care. In cases of suspected melanomas, this step could be lifesaving.

The American Cancer Society projected 32,000 new cases of matignant melanoma nationwide

represents an increase of only 200 from the previous year, possibly indicating that more Americans are becoming aware of the danger signs of skin

of the danger signs of skin cancer.

The majority of skin cancer cases can be attributed to damage done to the skin by over-exposure to the sun. Malignant melanoma also has been linked with exposure to sudden bursts of sunlight and a family history of the disease.

Skin cancer is not just a disease of the elderly. In 1993, 25 percent of those with malignant melanoma were under age 39, partially due to unhealthy tanning habits. Since it takes 10 to 20 years of accumulated sun exposure to

cause the disease, younger peo-ple are at risk right now. One serious childhood or adolescent sunburn can double the chances of getting skin cancer, especially melapons

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States, with the number of malignant melanoma cases doubling each decade. By the year 2000, if the current trent continues, it is expected that one in every 75 Americans will develop melanoma in his/her lifetime, and one in seven will have some form of skin cancer.

Siena Village will account for 125 units in the township's af-fordable housing plan. The pro-ject will be financed by state and private grants and Siena Village will make payments on a town-ship bond.
