Student scores improve overall in both HSPA and GEPA

WAYNE - Students across the state faired well as 2004-2005 district report cards reveal a positive outcome for the most part.

Some of the biggest improvements came in elementary and high school math as well as reading, officials say.

Reportedly, many attribute the outcome to the connection between classroom materials as well as professional development and the state core curriculum content standards, which is a year-byyear body of skills and knowledge. And these ideals are the basis of

the statewide exams

Wayne Valley High School had 5.9 percent fail the math portion of the High School Proficiency Assessment (HSPA) and 49 percent pass, reflecting a 5.7 percent change from 2003-2004. A total of 7.6 percent of students at Wayne Hills High School failed the HSPA while 41.3 passed, revealing a 2.7 percent change from 2003-2004. Language scores have WVHS with 4.2 percent failing and 63 percent passing, showing a 3.2 change from 2003-2004. WHHS had 7.5 percent failing and 57.2 percent passing, a -0.2 change from 2003-2004. George Washington Middle School had 18.5 percent fail the

math portion of the Grade Eight 7.7 percent failing and 53.1 passing test scores and responding to the Proficiency Assessment (GEPA) and 54.5 percent pass reflecting a -0.2 percent change from 2003-2004. Schuyler-Colfax Middle School had 15 percent fail the math and 50.8 percent pass showing a -0.1 percent change from 2003-2004. While 10.8 percent of students at George Washington failed the language portion and 78.4 percent passed revealing a 2.4 percent change from 2003-2004. Schuyler-Colfax had 6.5 percent of students fail the language portion and 75.1 percent pass reflecting a 1.7 percent change from 2003-

George Washington produced

in the science portion showing a 2.9 percent change from 2003-2004 while Schuyler-Colfax had 5.4 percent fail and 57.1 pass, revealing a 3.2 percent change from last year.

On a whole, 95.9 percent of students at WHHS passed the HSPA while 95.8 percent of WVHS students passed it. A total of 79.0 percent of WHHS students are graduates to a four-year college and 0.7 percent to a military school. WVHS has 70.3 percent of students are graduates to a four-year college and 1.1 percent to a military school.

"We are currently analyzing the

issues that each school represents," said Superintendent Dr. Maria Nuccetelli. "We did as well as expected however."

In regards to the core curriculum content standards, Nuccetelli stated that it depends how each student learns.

"The curriculum is devised according to each student's needs," she added.

As far as administrator's salaries were concerned, statewide increases were seen. Teachers' salaries slightly increased as well

"Depending on multiple years experience, some salaries rose slightly, Nuccetelli said.



WAYNE - Displayed on a home, waving with the wind in front of a school or magnetically affixed on a vehicle you can find them everywhere. It is the American flag or Old Glory as it sometimes is affectionately known.

But as years pass, a cloth American flag unwillingly becomes faded, torn or tattered and will be replaced with a new flag. So what do you do with the old one?

The American flag is a symbol of courage and bravery and needs to be treated with respect when it is retired, opposed to being put in the trash," said Bob Gascoyne, a Wayne resident and historian of Veteran Post 450 in Pequannock.

"The public needs to know there are strict guidelines on how to

formal flag burning ceremony. With dignity, the veterans will properly retire an American flag during this ceremony."

The flag burning ceremony begins with a member or members of a Veterans post inspecting the flag. Depending on the number of flags being burned there is also the determination of where the ceremony will take place. The ceremony can take place either in a fireplace or stacking the flags outside on a level surface.

The ceremony begins with the "Pledge of Allegiance," and members of the Veterans post giving prayer as the flag(s) is soaked with lighter fluid or sprayed with kerosene. Arms are presented in memory for those who died, and the flag is ignited. Once the flag is burned with respect and dignity,

We have maybe one American flag burning ceremony a year at Veterans Post 450," said Gascoyne.

A recent ceremony yielded more than 500 American flags.

We are thankful to everyone who respected and thought about the importance of these colors, stars and stripes. And letting Veterans Post 450 retire these American Flags with proper dignity."

The most popular days to fly the American flag are Memorial Day, Flag Day, Labor Day and Sept. 11.

Everyday is a good day to fly a flag," said Gascoyne. "Its symbol may be different to each of us, but to veterans it lets us know you care!

Spaghetti Bowl work to cause traffic snarls

WAYNE - Township officials are warning motorists to gear up for traffic snarls as the Department of Transportation (NJDOT) begins roadway construction as part of a \$195.4 million safety initiative.

A portion of the project address-es Route 46 from the Passaic River to Galesi Drive in Wayne costing \$70 million. This includes bridge deck replacement, realignment and resurfacing, ramp modification and the addition of signs, lighting, guide rails and accelera-tion and deceleration lanes.

The DOT recently announced various lane closures mandatory in

Starting this week, the right lane of traffic on Route 46 eastbound will be closed between the NI Transit overpass and the Service Road east merge, located near Wayne Ford. The lane closure will remain in place until November

The left and right lanes of Route 46 westbound will be partially closed between Galesi Drive and the NJ Transit overpass through December 2006. One lane of traffic will remain open at all times. Open portions of the lanes will be shifted to accommodate the lane closure.





Passport now required for more destinations

Maryanne Batten recommends a.m. to 2 p.m. getting passports now to insure you have them in time for your summer vacations.

Changes in travel regulations have taken place and the United States Department of Homeland Security has changed the requirements for certain air and sea travel. Starting this year, travelers will be required to present a passport when traveling to or from Bermuda, the Caribbean, Central and South America.

These new travel security measures require passports for most international destinations. Because of these changes there may be a rush this spring to obtain passports. "Applying for your passport in advance will enable you to avoid delays that could affect your travel plans," said Batten. Passport applications are accepted at the Paterson Main Post Office on


Fill out the passport application (DS11), before you come to the post office. You can download it from http://travel.state.gov/download applications.html

The right lane of Route 23 northbound over 1-80 will be closed from Feb. 9 through September 2008.

DOT will close the Route I-80 westbound ramp to Route 23 southbound from April through January 2007. Motorists will be instructed to follow a 1.2-mile detour from the Route I-80 westbound ramp onto the northbound service road to the West Belt interchange and back onto Route 23 southbound.

The Wayne mayor and council have been working in conjunction with the DOT as well as the management of Willowbrook Mall, and the project contractor Anselmi & Decicco in order to devise the best situation as far as road closures are concerned in hopes of easing traf-

fic backups.

"We have no control over this but we've been doing our best to work with the DOT because traffic additional anywhere near Willowbrook Mall will be terrible. Creating lanes near ramps built on soil is obviously easier versus structural ramps though," said Mayor Scott Rumana.

Utilizing the shoulder as an extra lane near the mall was one of the ideas brought up to the DOT.

"Two narrow lanes won't back up traffic as closing down an entire lane would. It would still be a slow go but at least there would be some movement." Rumana said.

Motorists are advised to leave earlier to allow extra travel time and to remember that patience is important.

"It will be frustrating, there's no way around that but the work must get done for safety reasons. Northeast New Jersey drivers know about traffic all too well," said Lt. Paul Dring of the Wayne Police Traffic Division.

Township officials say that the DOT has been doing all it can to minimize congestion.

"They've done what we've asked them to do within reason of course and they've been advising us as the project goes along," Dring stated.

The possibility of working at night was inquired by the township however the DOT said it would drastically drive the cost up.

"We're making a diligent effort to coordinate improvement to Routes 46, 23, and I-80 with local businesses and township officials to mitigate effects to roadway improvement," said Erin Phalon, spokesperson for the DOT.





Parents informed about drug program

WAYNE -Several concerned parents turned out for a town meeting at Wayne Valley High School to learn more about a drug program being instituted in the district

Since the death of six students over the last few years as the result of either drugs or alcohol, district administrators established a committee in hopes of devising a way to deter students from drug abuse.

Be Proud is a voluntary drug testing program that will target both township high schools starting in September.

Negative peer pressure is a big issue and school administrators wanted to instill in students the belief that they can stand their ground by utilizing inner strength and self-confidence.

"We want the kids to feel strong and proud of themselves when tion and a urinalysis test will be

they walk away from drugs instead done to check for various illicit of feeling insecure. The important drugs. factor here is those kids who say no to drugs and alcohol are more popular and not the other way around. And this can be done by influencing peers in a positive manner by taking part in the pro-gram," said Theresa Curreri, Wayne

Board of Education president.

The cost of the program is \$120,000, which will be reflected in next year's school budget.

Two nurses currently working part time will be made full time and a program coordinator will be named to oversee the day to day process," Nuccetelli stated.

Entrance into the program will require a student and parent signing a contract. Participants will be assigned an identification number and a coordinator will randomly choose a set number to be determined by enrollment. A saliva test will be done for alcohol consump-

According to Assistant Superintendent Dr. Howard Lerner, in the event a student tests positive they will be sent to Chilton Memorial Hospital or to a personal physician for further evaluation of vital signs. At that point, a more elaborate test, comprised of 13 panels, each one designated for a separate drug, will be given. The first eight panels come back within a 24 to 48-hour period, the latter five come back in

The student is allowed to return to school within 24 hours of the first screening.

"If any of the panels are considered dirty, the student must follow the district's drug requirement which dictates that a student must provide a clean sample, meet with a student assistant counselor, and follow a drug assessment," said

Wayne's rookie joins the Oscar race

WAYNE - The nominations for the 78th Annual Academy Awards were announced Jan. 31 by Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences President Sid Ganis and Oscar-winner Mira Sorvino.

"Murderball," featuring Wayne resident Keith Cavill in a lead subject role, was nominated for an Oscar in the documentary category. The film is about competitive quadriplegic rugby players.

'My sister-in-law Mary called, after receiving an e-mail boasting of the news," Cavill said. "My mom burst into my room!"

Cavill, a C5/C6 quadriplegic (injured in a 2003 motocross accident) quickly transferred from his bed to his wheelchair to check his email. "My inbox was full of congratulatory emails," he said, adding that "Murderball" producers Dana Adam Shaprio and Jeff Mandel were among the many who sent word of the nomination.

"Mark Zupan (Para-Olympian

featured in "Murderball") sent me a funny e-mail, saying we are going to crush the penguins!"

The uncensored athletes of "Murderball" will face off with the cute, wobbly penguins of "March of the Penguins," a 2005 blockbuster. Also in the race for an Oscar statuette are "Darwin's Nightmare," "Enron: The Smartest Guys in the Room," and "Street

"Murderball" was first documented by Dana Adam Shapiro for Maxim magazine. He pitched his editors with the idea of writing an article on the USA Para-Olympian Rugby team. Maxim, a man's man glossy, loved the idea. Henry Alex-Rubin joined forces with Shapiro and video-recorded the mad-max duel between Team USA and Team Canada. Two years of non-stop filming made for an intense sports movie.

Rubin and Shapiro wanted to show audiences what it was really like for a newly injured Mark Zupan, the months following his accident. The filmmakers found


themselves at Kessler Institute in West Orange, with the anticipa-tion to shoot a couple hours of Broll footage of newly injured quads in their daily activities. However, upon meeting Cavill, a (then) 22year old, they switched gears and signed him for what would ultimately be the wildest ride of his life


"I let them shoot everything. There is a scene of me with a feeding tube in my stomach, asking my doctor if I can ever have sex again. There's another of me crying on my first day home. One of me struggling to Velcro my shoe strap. The worst... holding my crushed motocross helmet," he says.

The filmmakers captured fleet-ing moments in Cavill's journey scenes that can never be reproduced. The media tagged Cavill "The Every Quad."



Send some love to soldiers and veterans

Think of Valentine's Day and you will probably visualize red, lace-trimmed hearts, flowers, romantic cards and boxes of candy. But what about olive drab and camo?

Although there's less than a week to go before Valentine's Day, there is still time to send a greeting to a member of the United States Armed Forces serving overseas. "Operation Dear Abby" has been sending greetings to men and women in the military since 1967. The letter-writing campaign, as it was originally, has been suspended due to concerns about mail delivery but e-mail messages are welcome.

For individuals far from home, living in danger, a small gesture can mean a

Dear Abby, the U.S. Department of Defense, and the U.S. Department of the Navy's LifeLines Services Network are providing a private and secure online resource that will enable individuals to send a greeting to a Sailor, Marine, Soldier, Airman, or Coast Guardsman. A generic greeting to any U.S. military serviceperson can be sent. Users select a branch of the military, then type in a brief message.

Service personnel who have Internet access can read the messages on OperationDearAbby.Net. For service members who do not have Internet access, company commanders can download bulk messages to be printed and distributed according to service branch and location.

Similar ways to send e-mail messages are available through http://americas-upportsyou.mil. The site will also lead you to many other avenues of showing support for U.S. troops any time of the year. These include donating computers, frequent flyer miles, and phone cards, as well as sending packages to the troops.

Closer to home, you can contact a nursing home, senior center or veterans' home to inquire about sending Valentine cards or packages to those who may not be receiving gifts from anyone else. In New Jersey, the Division of Veterans Healthcare Services operates three long-term care nursing homes, in Paramus, Menlo Park, and Vineland, plus medical centers in East Orange and Lyons.

Active military personnel and veterans deserve our attention and our thanks at any holiday and on any day.



PCSD deputy dies in car crash

WAYNE - Witnesses are sought concerning a fatal eastside motor vehicle accident this weekend, in which a Passaic County Sheriff's Department (PCSD) deputy perished.

On Sunday just before 5 a.m., at least eight Wayne police units responded to 321 Hamburg Turnpike - near the PCSD's Wayne station - on a serious two-vehicle collision call. Also responding were the Wayne First Aid Squad, St. Joseph's Hospital paramedics, and Wayne Traffic Bureau Officers Nugent Zaccardi, Jon Liebchen, and Leonard Lanza, according to

A 1994 eastbound Chevrolet driven by PCSD Officer Kamal Kazan, 30, of Haledon - collided with a westbound 1987 Oldsmobile - operated by Edwin Martinez, 40, of Wayne. Both motorists and a Chevrolet passenger – Larence Jatker, 27, of Prospect Park - were taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Paterson, according to Steve Giardino, Wayne Traffic Bureau second-in-command.

In addition, PCSD Sheriff Jerry Speziale responded to the scene along with other county officers, according to Bill Maer, a PCSD spokesperson.

"The sheriff got the call and rode

Wayne Police Detective Capt. Paul in the ambulance with the officer," Maer said, referring to Kazan. "It's a major loss to the department, and our hearts go out to the family."

Kazan was pronounced dead at 5:45 a.m. that morning. Martinez and latker are listed in stable condition, he said.



Communities Against Tobacco (CAT) Coalition and Wayne's Child Health Conference partnered in an outreach effort to disseminate information about the dangers of secondhand smoke on

The "Bibs Campaign" distributed infant bibs imprinted with "Smoke-Free Drool Zone" to mothers at the Child Health Conference where Stefka Wittig and her daughter Juiette received the bibs. Stefka stated she has been smoke-free for 5 days and that she had made New Years resolution to quit smoking. "I have quit three times before so I feel I can do it again." She stated the hardest times are when her and her husband go

WAYNE - The Passaic County out to eat and people are smoking, "I get the urge to smoke." She was informed about the possible passage of the "Clean Indoor Air" bill and stated passage would help her stop. Charles DeVeau, CAT coordinator, explained the dangers of secondhand smoke on infants and gave educational materials about the effects of secondhand smoke. DeVeau stated, "many mothers are not aware of this danger and it's important that they be informed."

Tobacco smoke can no longer be tolerated as harmless in a home. Many smokers believe that they can protect their children from tobacco smoke if they smoke outside, or in a different room. A new study from researchers at San Diego State University and the

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suggests that these parents may not be offering much protection to their children from secondhand smoke for a number of reasons. Babies who live with smokers may be exposed to cigarette fumes that may contaminate dust that settles in carpets, floors, toys, furniture surfaces, and on the floor. Babies spend a lot of time crawling on the floor and they tend to put things in their mouth and may ingest these contaminates.

The Passaic County CAT Coalition will be partnering with local baby wellness clinics and hospitals in Passaic County to distribute the bibs and information about the dangers of secondhand on infants

Maine Lobster Salad with Julienne Vegetables and Truffle Tahitian Vanilla Emulsion

Serves 4 Ingredients

For the vegetables:

- 4 green and 4 white asparagus, blanched, cut in half lengthwise
- 1 red bell pepper and 1 yellow bell pepper, julienned
- 1 bulb fennel shaved paperthin
- 1 head of frisee, use only the white leaves
- Salt and pepper

For the truffle vanilla emulsion:

- 1 dozen mussels, scrubbed and de-bearded
- I cup dry white wine
- 3 large egg yolks
- Scrapings from 1 vanilla bean
- 1 Tbsp. pure vanilla extract
- 1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard

- 1 dash Tabasco sauce 1 cup of canola oil
- 1 Tbsp. white truffle oil
- 3 Tbsp. heavy cream Salt and pepper

For the champagne vinalgrette:

- 1 tsp. Dijon mustard
- 1 pinch of fleur de sel or sea salt
- 1 tsp. finely minced shallots
- 2 tsp. good quality extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tsp. champagne vinegar 1 tsp. white truffle oil
- 2 11/4 lb. fresh live Maine lobsters, steamed. Remove the claws and tails from the shells. Cut the tails in half.
- 2 Tbsp. each snipped fresh chives and fresh chervil

Preparation

Preparing the truffle Tahitian vanilla emulsion:

Cook the mussels with the wine until they open. Remove the mussels and reserve for another use.

Strain the liquid into a glass measuring cup.

In the work bowl of a food processor, place the egg yolks, vanilla bean scrapings, vanilla extract, Dijon mustard and Tabasco and pulse to blend. Add the canola oil, the white truffle oil, 1/2 cup of the mussel liquid and the heavy cream and pulse until blended. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Preparing the champagne vinalgrette:

In a small bowl, whisk together the mustard, fleur de sel, pepper and shallots.

Whisk in the olive oil, add the champagne vinegar and whisk to form an emulsion.

Whisk in the truffle oil.

Presentation and finish:

Place all the vegetables in a small bowl and toss with just enough champagne vinaigrette to coat the leaves and season to taste with salt and pepper.

For each serving:

Position a ring mold in a center of a plate.

Mound the vegetables into the ring mold pressing down to compact them. Add a halftail and a claw and the truffle Tahitian vanilla emulsion. Carefully remove the ring mold.


With Clifton's season virtually hanging in the balance, the Mustangs expectedly came out strong and stayed with the Bulldogs for the first half, despite PCT's 27-24

WAYNE - The Wayne Valley boys' basketball team was arguably the hottest team entering the Passaic County Tournament. The Indians entered the round-robin event having triumphed six times in their last seven outings. The team's loneblemish came on a last second buzzer-beater by Newark West-

Wayne's scorching run prompted head coach Joe Leicht to express hopefulness regarding his team's prospects.

The Indians found out the hard way that the Defenders are for real. Justin Arthur pumped in 22 points as HCA recorded its first win ever in tournament history. Jordan Minnema tallied 16 points.

"We're not supposed to win anything," Arthur said. "We're certainly not supposed to beat great teams like Wayne Valley."

"It's a huge feat," Minnema added. "We had to play as a unit to beat a talented team like Wayne Valley. We had to play good defense and needed patient offense

Charlie Rigoglioso paced the Indians with 15 points, but it was not enough. Nick Agelis and Arber Zuberi added 10 and 9 points respectively.

The Indians will now have to put this setback behind them as they prepare to take part in their third straight Section I, Group III playoffs.

Before losing to HCA, Valley was indeed "clicking."

Agelis scored a career-high 27 points in the win over West Milford. The senior also grabbed nine rebounds and dished off five assists. Rigoglioso contributed 17 points, nine assists, six rebounds and four steals. Drazen Res chipped in with 15 points, including three 3-pointers.

Rigoglioso had 24 points, seven assists and four steals in Wayne's heartbreaking loss to West Side. Remo Fioranelli added 10 points.







Caulk or weather seal windows to cut down on wind drafts.

Tag the location of your main water valve and make sure you can easily turn it on and off.

If you have a thermostat that uses a battery, be sure to replace it regularly.

If you plan to travel or be away from home for an extended period of time, ask a friend or neighbor to check your pipes and the temperature in your home.

During a deep freeze, consider the following steps:

Try to keep the temperature in

your home at 68 degrees.

Keep cabinet doors open to allow heat from the home to circulate around the pipes

Check the water flow from all faucets before retiring for the evening and again in the morning. (Reduced water flow can be a sign of early freezing.)

Allow your faucets to drip lukewarm water in order to minimize the chances of a pipe freeze.

Remember that a pipe doesn't necessarily burst the first time it freezes. Sometimes it takes several freezes and thaws before damage occurs. However, special care and forethought could help swing the odds in your favor.



First coat: Fine to small drywall and plaster cracks require only one application of joint compound, while deeper cracks require two or more coats of compound. Using a putty knife, apply a good amount

(NAPSI) - There are easy ways loose material with a screwdriver of joint compound over the crack the coat dry completely. and smooth it out.

Reinforce: Deeper or wider cracks need to be reinforced with paper joint tape. Apply a thin coat of compound over the crack. Then embed a strip of paper joint tape into the compound to bridge the crack. Draw a knife firmly over the crack to tightly embed the tape. Let

More compound: Apply a coat of joint compound over the tape to level the repair. Then apply a generous amount of compound with a drywall knife and smooth and feather the compound out along the edges of the repaired area. Let the repair harden and apply another coat of compound, if necessary.

Finish: Smooth the surface once the wall is completely dry. Lightly smooth the edges of the repaired area with fine sandpaper or a damp sponge. Prime the patched area with a high-quality primer or a flat wall paint.



Homebuyers may wonder what's on the horizon for condos and apartments

Condos have been the big story in multifamily housing in the past year, representing half the new multifamily units built. They're likely to continue to be a major factor in many markets, according to Jerry Starkey, president and chief executive officer of WCI Communities of Bonita Springs, Fla., speaking at a press conference today at the International Builders'

In 2006, Starkey predicts more competition. The inventory of existing condo units will be larger and, while there are increasing numbers of buyers attracted to the condo lifestyle, some will be constrained by high prices and rising interest rates.

Rental apartments, which traditionally serve those who choose not to buy or cannot afford to buy, are in shorter supply these days. According to developer Eric Blue-

Organization, Fresh Meadows, N.Y., many apartment communities have been converted to condominiums, especially in hot condo markets such as the New York City area and South Florida. To further complicate things, developing new rental apartments has become more difficult, because condo developers are willing to pay much more for land than rental developers.

In many markets, the shortage of rentals - especially affordable rentals - has pushed rents quite high. While Bluestone notes that the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program continues to create opportunities for workers who make less than their area's median salary, the number of such communities is limited.

Even in the tightest, most expensive markets, well designed com-

Attention to detail, power are bred into Volkswagen's Passat

Volkswagen has made some odd decisions in recent years, but the 2006 Passat isn't one of them. The all-new model reveals no shortcuts or budget dilemmas in creating a technologically advanced family sedan.

Except it's almost too stylish to lump in the midsize group with the Toyota Camry and Honda Accord. Those are safe choices anybody could recommend - to a relative, perhaps.

The last generation started out with a four cylinder, added a V-6, all-wheel drive, then a V-8, which was overkill, but an attempt to raise the public's impression of VW.

But there always will be those who want more, and I hear the 280-horsepower VR6 model is a tire smoker. The four-motion all-wheel-drive system will be offered on VR6 cars and wagons, which debut later in the year.

The 200-horsepowered turbocharged four-cylinder models should be well-received, given the price of fuel.

Two models of the four-cylinder Passat come with a six-speed manual transmission or optional six-speed Tiptronic automatic transmission.

The Passat Value Edition 2.0T with six-speed manual transmission has a starting price of \$23,565. The "value" is in the simplicity of its checklist of features: less chrome, fewer upgrades - no sunroof, power mirrors or front reading lights - and just the basic eight-speaker, single disc CD audio.

What it does have is a leatherette interior, remote locking, air conditioning with pollen

filter, power windows with onetouch up-down, power heated mirrors, tilt-telescopic steering wheel, eight-way manually adjusted front seats, split folding rear seat back with ski passthrough, electric parking brake and a nifty umbrella storage slot in the door - but you provide the

The 2.0T model has a starting price of \$24,515 and can run to \$31,565, as did my test car. It was as well-finished as a modest luxury sedan.

This sixth-generation Passat is 3 inches longer and wider than last year's car. Legroom in the back seat is 37.7 inches - about 2 1/2 inches more, which means there's decent adult space even if the front passenger seat has been moved back. A tall exhaust tunnel compromises foot room in the center position, though.

The new chassis is much stiffer with the use of more highstrength steel and lighter (more expensive) materials. That helped the engineers give the Passat a supple ride.

It also encourages enthusiastic driving, though the suspension can easily outperform the stock all-season tires. Upgrading to a touring tire would help.

The cabin is well-soundproofed, except for some noise transfer from the tires on concrete highways, which might be filtered out by a touring tire.

The trunk is wide, flat and expandable with the split folding seat back. There's a full-size spare under the floor.

Inside, the Passat is attractive and roomy, with an array of integrated storage areas, including large door pockets (front and rear) and that compact umbrella holder.

The materials are of good Euro-looking stock, and the panels have well-aligned edges and corners. The design should remain contemporary for years. The nighttime gauge illumination is still blue.

The front center armrest is height adjustable, with storage below, but it can be a fingerpincher until you get the hang of raising and lowering it.

And neighbors will be entertained by the big VW badge on the trunk lid that doubles as the release. Push on the top and the badge tilts inward, like the special book on the shelf at the haunted house that reveals a hidden staircase.

Passat received Double Best Pick honors from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, earning top ratings in head protection, injuries and structural design for side impact and frontal tests.

Another useful driver aid is the hill-holder function with the manual transmission. When stopped on a hill with the clutch depressed, the car won't roll backward.


